don't know about you but I find our current weather patterns very confusing: first we have the "storm of the century" and then 65 degree days over Christmas? Well at least it is currently good golfing, tennis, and flying weather!

We took advantage of the clear flying weather and made a quick trip to Palm Springs last week, left PML in long sleeves and coats and upon exiting the plane we were shedding clothes in 75 degree Southern California. The purpose of the trip was to enjoy friends and the Palm Springs Film Festival for a few days – interesting films, good food and delightful weather.

Well, let's get the bad news out of the way first: the dredging project will have to wait until next November as the Army Corp. of Engineers issued our 4th and final required permit way too late to start the project this first quarter. The official dredging window is October through March each year, and when you figure the time it takes to get the large equipment up here and prepare our site, there was too little time to get ready and still have enough time to complete the dredging. The good news is that we now have all the permits; we will send out the RFP's this summer for a start date in November, 2010.

were questions about the need for our an reserve funding program. I covered vet these questions in a previous president's of message and will not drag them out co again, but I recently noticed that some banks are no longer loaning money this on home sales in a Homeowner's Association if the HOA reserves are not pla adequate. The definition of "adequate" de varies, but the point is, if we did not

have a reserve funding program in place some of our homeowners might have a problem selling their homes and that would certainly affect property values. I continue to believe that our reserve funding program is the correct and proper way to run a railroad.

The Long Range Planning Committee will be creating a short member survey to get your thoughts on a few topics in and around PML. Look for that Internet survey in the spring. I encourage you to take the time to respond to this short survey as a means of conveying your thoughts to both the survey team and the PML Board of Directors.

By the time you read, your Board of Directors will have started the discussion on controlling outdoor burning. As you know we received a petition signed by 100 property owners asking the board to outright ban burning period. While a total ban is not being considered, some sort of resolution to require a PML permit to burn is being considered. One possible resolution is printed in this paper. Please read it and provide your thoughts either by attending the February board meeting or by sending a note to the board.

At the request of a group of property owners, PML is looking into the possibility of building a Shooting Sports Range. What is envisioned is the simple construction of an outdoor range suitable for low-power handguns and rifles. The range would be about 50 yards long and located in Unit 16. This is the undeveloped area at the northwestern edge of the PML above the Campgrounds and compost area. The NRA offers grants for range construction, and as part of this investigation we have applied for a grant. We shall see how that application plays out. There are lots of issues to be dealt with and we are just beginning the process.

The Grill at PML continues to surpass expectations. I was having dinner there one recent Tuesday night and was amazed to see that all but one table was being used. The place was jumping and on a Tuesday night no-less! Revenues are up over a year ago and I have high hopes that the trend will continue. We continue to receive positive comments regarding the new menu and the attentive wait-staff.

While we are on the subject of the Grill, the restaurant consultants we hired were surprised to learn that PML "loans" out the Grill kitchen to certain organized groups for fund-raising and social events. They expressed concern about such an activity and suggested that we curtail such activities. At the January Board meeting we discussed some sort of policy that would continue to allow group use of the Grill kitchen but with some health and safety restrictions such as requiring a kitchen staff employee be present during such activities. This employee would be there to oversee use of all kitchen equipment and to ensure that the food is prepared in a clean and safe manner and be "Food Safe Certified," per California commercial kitchen rules. This discussion will continue for a few more board meetings before the final policy is completed.

February brings us longer days with lots of nasty weather, so stay warm and dry and don't forget Valentine's Day for your loved one!

Every year the management team works with the Board to set goals and objectives for managers and key personnel. The list below includes some of the items that were accomplished in 2009:

- Conduct feasibility study to bring high-speed Internet service to all PML owners
- Reevaluate/revamp pricing structure on complete Amenity Fee Schedule for 2010 budget
- Conduct three in-house Management Employee level training classes
- Convert all possible 2008 member files to digital
- Successfully negotiate new collective bargaining agreements (Safety/Maintenance/Golf Maintenance)
- Obtain all permits and begin Lake Dredging
- Reduce Pro Shop inventory by 25%

I would like to thank my managers and staff for their hard work and effort on behalf of our members in 2009. Your Association came in better than budget and we accomplished a lot thanks to these folks. I think it is also important to recognize the time and effort of our Board members as well. Their vision and stewardship of our Association is often a thankless job, but we appreciate their support for the betterment of PML.

Pre-Entry Structure and Sign

The pre-entry sign at Ferretti and Pine Mountain Drive near the Main Gate had deteriorated and was in danger of falling down. This is the sign that is behind the fountain at the turn into the PML Entrance and it is an important PML landmark. The sign structure was scheduled for replacement in 2010 but we were forced to take immediate action the end of last year. Unfortunately the project became delayed due to the snow storm and other weather conditions.

Since this structure is a main focal point for PML, we decided to use the same design to maintain the historical appearance. The structure has been refurbished with a new foundation, timbers and roof. The fountain pump, lights and electrical were revamped as well. I am happy to report that the project is completed and looks great.

Marina

As reported in past issues; the Marina Restroom project is completed and it looks great.

We have started work on the upgrade to the electrical service to the Marina. Over the years, more and more equipment has been added to the Marina facility requiring more electricity. We worked with PG&E to determine the current and will be trenching from the power-pole at the Marina entrance, across the parking lot to the service panel.

As part of the Marina renovation, the boat rental huts are scheduled for replacement this year. The plans are completed and we have initiated the permit and bidding process so that we

can get this project completed before the start of the summer season.

Electric Golf Cart Storage Facility

The Golf Cart Facility project is on track. We solicited pre-qualification from contractors that wish to bid on the project, sent out bid packages and the working group will be reviewing the bids. Once a contractor is selected, the metal building company will be selected and permits will be finalized with the County. The project is complicated due to the location of the building and the logistical problems of storage and heavy equipment access. Even so, we will work hard to limit the impact on our golfing members and guests as much as possible.

Dredging Project

We finally received the permit agreement from the Army Corps of Engineers. The agreement was executed in January when the Corps Director signs off on it. We worked with our consultants to mitigate several of the unnecessary and costly requirements of the agreement, but the Corps still retained many of the items. Our consultants will update and finish the bid packages later in the year to coincide with a bidding schedule that will allow the final contractor to perform the work in the timeframe as required.

Monterey Pines

There are several Monterey pines near the Administration building and Main Entrance.

The trees are nearing the end of their life-span and a few are dying due to age and infestation. We were concerned and hired a professional arborist to inspect the trees. Acting on his recommendations, we removed two trees last year and replaced them with a better species of native trees. Two more trees were removed recently and replaced as well.

The following is a proposed new resolution. The purpose of the resolution is to educate members on proper burning techniques within PML to limit the impact of smoke and fire on other members. The Board plans to accomplish this by requiring that all members that wish to burn, attend a short seminar on burning and be issued a PML burn permit. The resolution will be discussed again by the Board of Directors at the Board meeting to be held at the Lake Lodge on February 20, 2010. The meeting is scheduled to start at 9 a.m. and all PMLA members are welcome to attend.

PMLA Outdoor Burning-STANDARDS AND PROCEDURES

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors has determined there exists a threat to human health due to excessive smoke from outdoor burning,

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors has determined there is unnecessary risk of larger fires as a result of escaped outdoor burning,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Board of Directors does hereby approve and adopt the attached policy "PMLA Outdoor Burning Standards and Procedures".

OUTDOOR BURNING - NOTICE TO HOMEOWNERS

Pine Mountain Lake property owners are required to reduce fuel loads on their properties to minimum levels in order to reduce the risk of wildland fires.

Property owners are strongly encouraged to dispose of unwanted fuels in ways other than burning. PMLA provides a compost pile to property owners for this purpose.

The goal of this program is to drive the number of complaints received by the Safety Department about smokey neighborhoods to zero, and find that no outdoor burning results in escaped fires.

Those property owners who feel compelled to burn on site must meet several requirements:

#1- Property owners must call the PML main gate to report their intent to burn. (This is also a good place to determine if other requirements are in place.)

#2- Burn only on a "permissive burn day" as determined by the Tuolumne County Air Pollution Control District.

#3- Have in possession a valid PMLA Outdoor Burn permit.

#4- Have in possession a valid CAL FIRE Burn Permit when required.

#5- Burn only clean and dry vegetation.

No burning is allowed during the PML no burning season, usually scheduled June 1 to September 30. Dates may be adjusted seasonally based on conditions.

ISSUING PMLA OUTDOOR BURNING PERMITS

- 1. Property owners must attend a "Burn Safe - Burn Clean" seminar
- 2. The seminar lasts approxi-

- a. Selection of safer vegetation to grow near the home
- b. How to reduce horizontal and vertical continuity of fuels
- c. How to conduct outdoor burning to reduce smoke and reduce the risk of escapes
- 2. The staff answers questions and probes for reactions from property owners

ENFORCEMENT

The PML Safety Department will:

- 1. Record the PMLA Burn Permit number when property owner calls the main gate to notify their intent to burn.
- 2. Inquire about property owner's possession of other needed permits.
- 3. Send a patrol officer to observe and report the burning practice of a sample number of property owners burning, as time and resources allow.
- Send a patrol officer to observe outdoor burning when a property owner complaint of excessive smoke is received. The officer will ask to see the permits required on that day.
- 5. Require the property owner to extinguish the fire if the

property owner does not have the required permits.

- 6. Require the property owner to extinguish the fire if the property owner is burning in such a way as to produce excessive smoke or create a possibility of fire escape.
- 7. Call Groveland Fire and request an on-site visit from a representative who will instruct the property owner to extinguish the fire, when the property owner refuses to follow instructions of the PMLA Safety Department officer.

MEASURING SUCCESS

The PML Safety Department will provide a monthly report to the General Manager with the following data:

- 1. Unit and Lot number of property owners who called to
- register their intent to burn2. Unit and Lot number of persons reporting excessive smoke, unsafe burning prac-
- tices, or an escaped fire3. The Unit and Lot number of the offending burning property
- A summary report of discussion, requests and action taken

PMLA Compliance Chatter

This article is the "maiden voyage" of the new Compliance Officer, that's me, Dennis Pipal. Over the last six months I've had the opportunity to meet and work with many of you. First, as a Fire Safety Inspector and recently, as the new PMLA Compliance go-to-guy. I've honestly enjoyed getting to know many of you and look forward to many more new acquaintances.

My goal each month is to bring you topics that I hope will interest you on the compliance side of our great community. My first topic for the new year is one near and dear to our hearts...those love-able-hate-able PETS!!!

The following is from an article from the Association Times, reprinted with permission, I thought you would enjoy as it humorously emphasizes the issues around this sensitive topic.

"There is an old saying that 'it's raining cats and dogs'. Well, this saying (or so I'm told) came from days of yesteryear when roofs were made of straw and the steep angle required for good run-off brought the eve way down fairly close to the ground. The cats and dogs weren't allowed in the house in those days, let alone in the bed as present-day pampered pets prefer. So they, the dogs and cats that is, would make a snug place to sleep within the straw roof. The heat from the fire inside kept the roof warm in winter and the night air made the straw cooler in summer. All in all, the roof was a nice place for an animal to nap. Well...that's it. These are my thoughts on Cats and Dogs and homeowner associations.

The truth is that the world is divided into pet owners and everyone else. Those without pets will just never understand why the other group wants an animal living with them. So, take a look at your associations' Governing Documents and see where you stand. As for me, I'll be refereeing those occasional disputes among neighbors...and their 'furry friends'."

"Supervisors Want Input on County's Future"

he Tuolumne County Board of Supervisors wants input from residents on what they feel are the most important things the County should be doing over the next several years. This input will be used in the development of a first ever 5-Year Strategic Plan for the County. To emphasize how important citizen input is to the Board and make it convenient for residents to provide input, the Board of Supervisors has directed two outreaches. First, the Board has scheduled a series of special meetings for the full Board to go into each supervisorial district for the specific purpose of seeking citizen input into this planning process. The schedule is shown below:

Second, the Board has directed that a basic survey be prepared that citizens can complete by accessing the County's website at www.tuolumnecounty.ca.gov. This survey will be available starting January 26 through February 23.

The major questions the Board is seeking input on are as follows:

• What are the greatest needs within the County right now?

• What are the highest priority County services?

• What are the main issues the County should be planning for in the future?

Second, the Board has directed that •How should County leaders go about balancing future budgets?

Upon completion of the special meetings and survey, County staff will begin drafting a 5-Year Strategic Plan reflective of citizen input for Board consideration. Citizens will be able to comment on the resultant draft plan as well. The Board hopes to adopt a final plan within the next several months.

uring the winter months when we trim trees or do cleanup after storms we will have firewood available. Amounts and when it's available will vary but if you are interested in purchasing some you may call Susan at 962-8612 and we can add you to the list.

After the snow storm of early December we had quite a bit of damage and lots of cleanup to do. The brush and smaller debris that we are no longer burning on the course will be piled in different areas waiting to be chipped. At this time we borrow from the Street Maintenance department their chipper when available; they also have a lot of cleanup to do. Early in 2010 Golf Maintenance will acquire their own chipper and, weather permitting, cleanup will not take as long as it has this season.

A couple of projects completed around the holidays were our concrete pad for our new Wash Rack in our Maintenance yard and the annual tree maintenance of our old oaks.

The new pad will allow us to eliminate the asphalt pad near our irrigation pond. I thank our neighbors on #9 for their patience while we are completing this project.

By early February the filtration skid

should be in and operating. This project was a must as now all waste water is treated and recycled for equipment maintenance. Welcome to the 21st century.

The tree work is scheduled every year to maintain these trees to promote both good health of the trees and to allow more sunlight through to the grass. This work will extend the life of these trees and make them a little safer than they were prior to trimming.

Both of these projects were assisted by our Street Maintenance crew, and their teamwork is appreciated.

In last months article our Golf Professional asked that you leave the course a little better than you found it. Part of improving the course you don't see or think about, is the operation of Golf Carts. During winter conditions cart traffic adds to the compaction of the soil and restricts root growth, which will have an impact on the grass as the warmer weather arrives. Please observe the 90 degree rule or park on the path a little more often and walk to your ball. There were years that we restricted driving on a fairway on each nine for 30 days at a time and we rotated this process.

Be aware of your driving habits, every little bit helps.

Men's 9ers

• ome golfers are not playing as much golf as they usually would because of our weather...It's cold out there. They'd rather stay home and watch Judge Judy or This Old House... right Wally?

So I thought I'd revisit some exercises I found on the web. Authored by Susan Hill, a Golf Biomechanic, Sports Nutritionist and President of Fitness for Golf. These exercises help to keep you in shape for golf while you stay home nice and warm. They are in fact core exercises made up of small movements...easy to do, yet pack a punch. They can help to lower your handicap

Glute Bridge

This movement is designed to strengthen the glutes as well as improve their firing rate.

Instruction:

· Lie down on the floor on your back

· Bend your knees and place a small ball or folded towel between your knees

· Place your hands at your side and lift your toes off the ground with heels remaining

Engage your abdominals and glutes, then slowly lift your hips off the ground

· Don't let the glutes touch the ground while you perform the repetitions.

Core Flex

This movement is designed to strengthen and stretch the core muscles.

Instruction:

· Lie down on the floor on your back

· Bend your knees and place your feet flat on the ground.

• Put your hands flat on the floor out from your sides with your shoulders flat on the floor.

· Slowly move your knees from one side to the other. Get as close to the floor with your knees as you can without lifting your shoulders.

Sitting Leg Lift

This movement is designed to activate your hip flexor and thigh muscles while stabilizing your abdominal's and spine.

Instruction:

· Sit on a Swiss Ball or chair with your feet shoulder width apart

· Rest your hands on each side of the ball/chair

Tighten your abdominal muscles and maintain a straight spine

· Begin by slowly lifting one leg at a time, a few inches off the floor

· Alternate between each leg in a marching motion

Tuolumne County Supervisor Message

Triting a monthly article for publication can be quite difficult at times. Journalism has never been one of my "strengths" as I'm more of "pick and shovel" kind of guy. It's not that there isn't enough to write about--quite the opposite! There are so many topics of interest to share with you that selecting the subject becomes a project in itself.

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My plan is to pick a few topics each month, give a little detail on each and offer my opinion on the subject. If it peaks your interest and you want more information about my position, or on the subject itself, you are welcome to contact me personally so that we can discuss it in more depth.

On January 8th, the final report regarding the escaped Yosemite Control Burn which resulted in the destruction of timber and vegetation on over 7,000 acres of the Park, was released. You may recall that shortly after the fire, Park Superintendant, Dave Uberuaga, stated that knowing what he knew then, he would make the same decision. It is good to see now that the Park Service and the Superintendant have reconsidered their position and have expressed extreme regret for what happened. According to the report, the Park's Staff was overconfident in their assessment of controlling the fire. The Park Superintendent has ordered a revision of the Park's policies for tracking fuel danger, moisture, fire behavior and weather.

CAO, Craig Pedro, and I, along with other County Staff, will be meeting with the Park Superintendent on January 25th as a follow up. I want to personally thank Superintendent Uberuaga for the openness that he has shown over the past months on this and other issues concerning the Park.

In December the Stanislaus Forest Supervisor, Susan Skalski, announced the release of the final record of decision (ROD) regarding the Motorized Travel Management Project. It is part of a national effort to designate transportation systems on each National Forest. The goal is to establish a network of sustainable roads and trails that provide opportunities for access and recreation while protecting natural and cultural resources. The environmental statement which was completed on this topic is more than 600 pages long and covers a variety of issues. The final ROD itself will state the regulations pertaining for motorized use on over 2200 miles of Forest Service Roads and Trails.

To come to a conclusion that is balanced and protects the environment and the rights of the user is very difficult, to say the least. It is my opinion that Forest Supervisor Skalski made a strong effort to achieve this balance in her record of decision. As she has stated, it is a "work in progress" and changes can be made along the way. Many of the items that the County Board of Supervisors commented on were considered, however, the Board majority feels that there still needs to be more deliberation on a number of additional subjects including: (1) seasons of use (2) vehicle parking restrictions and (3) the continued use of dispersed camping, to name a few.

At this point in time, it appears the Board will appeal the record of decision (ROD). The Board's decision to appeal is not meant to question the USFS but rather it is the process that needs to be followed to forward the Board's position.

down is needed so that repairs can beinmade to portions of the Hetch HetchyWwater system.in

Planted fish provide important recreation opportunities to the residents of the county and the tourists that come here to enjoy our outdoor recreation opportunities. Many businesses depend upon this and other tourism related attractions for their financial livelihood. It is estimated that fishing alone injects approximately \$6.8M into our local economy. We have been informed that there will be additional shut downs in the future that will again interrupt the water supply to the hatchery. We need to have a plan in place to insure that an adequate amount of fish will be planted in our streams in order to maintain the recreational fishing opportunities.

Recently Supervisor Murrison, CAO Craig Pedro and I met with representatives of the Hetch Hetchy, SFPUC and the Dept of Fish and Game. The goal of these meetings is to work together to develop a long term plan to protect this important resource. In my opinion, the meetings have gone extremely well. Everyone at the table has shown a willingness to step up and find a solution. We aren't there yet but we are certainly in a better position than we were a few months ago. I can't say enough about the cooperation we have received from all parties. Fish and Game, Hetch Hetchy and the San Francisco Public Utilities Commission representatives are all to be commended for the effort they have put forth.

As always, I welcome your comments and discussion on topics of importance to you. white belt and match it with a colorfully printed nylon shirt that was popular in 1975. This outfit goes with your bushy sideburns and largelensed glasses of the same era. If she has a good imagination, she should be able to see the delightful guy you are, and not be distracted by petty fashion.

You also have a house for sale. A superbly built home on the best lot in the neighborhood, and you want "top dollar". The walls have dark brown paneling and the windows are heavily draped in harvest gold brocade. Tall lamps with pale orange shades and avocado green glass bases dominate the side tables. Your aunt made the crocheted bedspreads. The patterned rust-colored carpet in the kitchen is soft on your feet. The huge grandfather clock in the entry takes up a lot of space, but you think it will wow them.

Pictures of your house are displayed on multiple internet sites, where 85% of buyers start their search. These prospective buyers are underwhelmed by what these pictures reveal. This is not where they want to bring friends and family! And they perceive that it will cost a fortune to bring it up to current style standards. (Actually taking out the drapes, lamps, bedspreads, and clock will cost nothing. Painting the paneling, and putting in new kitchen floors would be a small, but worthwhile, investment for this seller).

This house is branded a "fixer-upper". And after the area Realtors tour the house, they bring few prospects to look at it. You turn down one "bargain hunter" who offers \$70,000 less than the asking price. But months later, you have reluctantly dropped the price by that amount, and then go even lower. Why can't buyers see what a great house it is and make their own changes after they buy it?

Not every Groveland house sale in

2009 was a horror story of painful price reductions after years on the market. Here are three shining exceptions:

"June" House. Listed in May and sold 3 weeks later. Priced at \$375,000, and sold for full price: \$375,000. Immaculate, beautifully staged with soothing colors, inviting deck furniture, and a fire blazing in the hearth in the pictures.

"August" House. Listed in August, sold 8 days later with multiple offers. Sold over list price. A cheap house? NO-the price was \$780,000! This house was built in 1974, but over the years the owners had updated the kitchen, painted the inside light and bright, created a delightful lake front setting, removed all the clutter, and staged it with stylish, but minimal, decor.

"October" House. Listed in June for \$469,000, reduced price to \$449,000, then sold in October for \$440,000. This was 6.2% less than the original list price, after 15 weeks on the market. House was gorgeously furnished. When this SAME house was an empty "spec" house priced at \$595,000, it languished on the 2007 market for over a year.

These are local examples that reinforce the findings of a National Association of Realtors survey: The longer a home stays on the market, the further below list price it drops. Nationally, homes that sold in the first 4 weeks averaged 1% more than the list price; 4 to 12 weeks averaged 5% less; 13 to 24 weeks averaged 6.4% less than original list price (this matches the results of the "October" PML house mentioned above); and 24 weeks averaged more than 10% less than list price.

A classic true story of losing equity over time is the "Jones" primary home, originally priced at \$595,000 in 2004 and marketed by the owner. Lots of people dropped in on their open houses, but nobody wanted to pay \$595,000. They listed with an agent in 2005 and asked \$542,500. Then switched to a differ-

ent agent at a price of \$545,000, then dropped to \$498,000. By 2007 they moved out and were trying a third agent with the price at \$489,000. They rented to a tenant that left the house messy and had a big dog. Lowered price to \$469,000. Got a different tenant with small dogs. Lowered price to \$398,000. That tenant moved out, and the house was empty. Price put at \$375,000, then \$329,000. Finally they hired a fourth agent with the price at \$299,000. They accepted \$275,000 for their Pine Mountain Lake property in its "AS IS" condition. And it sold. Five years later, and 53% less than the original asking price!

Homes don't sell quickly for two main reasons: they're overpriced and/ or they don't "show well". Even in the overheated "sellers" market of 2002 to 2006, some drab, price-inflated houses didn't sell. When you were a child and someone let you choose from several pieces of cake, didn't you choose the biggest one with the most frosting? If given a choice, don't you usually want the biggest and best you can afford, and at a price you know is reasonable?

"Staging" is focusing in on the target market that will be attracted to your

house and highlighting the property features that will appeal to them. You may think your house is already decorated. But "decorating" is making your home reflect your personal style and making it comfortable for you to live in. Staging helps buyers feel how wonderful it would be to live there. In each room they can envision their furniture, their decorations, their enjoyment. Entertaining their friends on the deck with their kids playing in the back yard. Them relaxing by the fire with a beverage, their boat stored in the garage, ready for good times on the lake. For the buyer to see this rosy future, the seller has to remove themselves, and their treasured stuff, from the picture.

I hope to convince you in the next few articles how some level of staging can help you sell your home faster and for more money. I will explore:

Mongolian Beef

his dish was one of my favorites in a "mom and pop" Chinese restaurant in Fremont, CA., that went by the name of "Full Kings". Being a frequent customer and acquainted with the owners, I one day got the nerve to ask the ingredients and to my surprise was invited to see it cooked in the kitchen.

The chef, with all of the ingredients prepped and ready, put this dish together in under three minutes as I quickly jotted down the recipe. This is the beauty of stir fry cooking, that such fabulous dishes, bursting with flavor, can be prepared in such a short time. If you like to entertain, you can keep your kitchen time to a minimum with stir fry dishes, and still serve a meal that will dazzle the fussiest of palates!

12 oz (3/4 lb) Flank Steak, sliced 2 in wide in direction of grain, and then into ¼" thin slices (perpendicular to the grain), then sprinkle with white or black pepper

- 2 Tbsp Soy Sauce
- 1 Tbsp Cornstarch

1 Tbsp Wine (Dry Sherry or Rice Wine) 2-3 Tbsp Peanut Oil 4-8 Dried Red Chilies (Chile de Arbol) 1 Clove Garlic, finely chopped 1/2 tsp Ginger; finely chopped 5-6 Green Onions (Scallions), chopped (on a diagonal) into 1" pieces

30 (1/2 can) Water Chestnut Slices (optional)

SAUCE 1 Tsp Soy Sauce 2 Tbsp Hoisin Sauce 1 tsp Sesame Oil 1 Tbsp Sherry or Rice Wine

For marinade, mix Soy Sauce, Cornstarch, and Wine. Combine with Steak

Slices and refrigerate 30 min to 2 hours.

Combine Sauce ingredients and set aside. Using scissors, snip the chilies into ³/₄ -inch pieces, discarding the seeds; set aside.

In Wok over high heat, heat Peanut Oil, than add Chiles, Garlic, Ginger; and Beef. Stir fry 1 minute and then add Water Chestnuts and white portions of Green Onions.

Stir Fry 1 minute then add green portions of Green Onions and Sauce, cook 1 minute more or until done.

We had another good season of See's Candy sales, despite four snow days. We want to acknowledge the hard work and dedication of Opal Berg, Barbara Wizner and more than 50 volunteers who staffed the booth. Also, through their Thrivent program, The Mountain Lutheran Church of Groveland supplied seven volunteers and a matching donation.

This year, Opal and Barbara are passing leadership of the Candy Booth on to a new team. We thank them for their years of coordinating the ordering, stocking, staffing, selling and tabulating that goes into this endeavor. It is a vital part of our success.

The Candy Booth will be relocated soon. Watch for an announcement about our new location. We'll have signs out letting you know when we are once again open for business. one-on-one with their mentor. When the volunteer is convinced that the student has read and understood the book, the student is rewarded with one dollar. This provides some immediate gratification and big smiles.

At the end of the term, the students are rewarded with a second dollar per book as a lump sum; they experience the thrill of a larger sum and delayed gratification. We also talk to them about how they will use the money – save, donate, or buy things for themselves or others.

A charitable trust provides funding, and GAINs (Groveland Area Involved Neighbors) handles transfers to the program. "Brainy Groveland" encourages kids to realize that being smart and working hard in school is 'cool' too.

Throughout the fall semester 30 third-grade students participated in the program. Together they read 279 books and received a total of \$570 in reading rewards (some kids earn an extra dollar for reading a long or more advanced book). The program continues in the third grades this winter, and in the spring, second-graders will be able to join.

In December, Steve and Kathy Ryan and FOGL president Nadine Pedron met with students from both classrooms to award the "second dollar" lump sums for all of the books read in the fall semester. Eight students received either \$15 or \$16, and a total of 30 students received awards totaling \$285. The "champion readers" who each received \$30 or more this term are:

Mrs. Groh's class: Lucas, Sha'nece, Merana and Madison.

Mrs. Jeffrey's class: Nikki, Allondra, Trey and Kenna.

The kids say that in addition to the fun of reading, interacting with the reading mentors is one of the best things about the program.

committee of representatives from community groups is meeting with GAINs to talk about a new kind of scholarship for Tioga graduates, one that would provide money and support for four years in college or for completing trade school. Moore Creek Group Site

The Forest Service today announced that, effective January 1, dispersed camping is allowed at the Groveland Ranger District's Moore Creek Group Campsite. The large group campsite is now available on a first come, first served basis, similar to the other individual dispersed campsites along Moore Creek.

In keeping with dispersed site management, all developed features including the picnic table, fire ring, and informational signage will be removed. Campers will be required to observe a "pack it in, pack it out" policy and always leave a clean camp. A free campfire permit is required for building a campfire at the site. The Moore Creek Group site is included within the High Hazard Area, and will be subject to fire restrictions when they are in effect.

The 2007 Stanislaus NF Recreation Facility Analysis (RFA) determined that the Moore Creek Group site should be managed as a dispersed, rather than a developed campsite. Reservations will no longer be required at the Moore Creek Group Campsite, and there will continue to be no charge for camping at the site. Returning to dispersed management of the site will improve operational efficiencies and comply with current Forest Service campsite reservation policy guidelines.

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Genealogy Workshop — Land Records by KAREN DAVIS

ne of the subjects that will be covered in this year's Genealogy Workshops is how to use land records to learn about your family's history.

According to the National Archives website, the land records that are generally of most interest to genealogists are the land entry case files. These are records that document the transfer of public lands from the U.S. Government to private ownership.

Land case entry files can contain a

wealth of genealogical and legal information. Depending on the type and time period of the land entry, the case file may yield only a few facts already known to the researcher or it may present new insights about ancestors, family history, title, and land use issues. For example, the records may attest to the one's age, place of birth, citizenship, military service, literacy, and economic status, and may even include similar information about family members.

*A footnote of history on the jailhouse... It is estimated the jail was constructed sometime between 1895 and 1903. A "common map" drawn in 1903 shows the jailhouse. Its history shows that during the height of the hard rock mining boom, during those years, a number of boarding houses, restaurants, saloons and brothels were prospering in the Mother Lode, to cater to the needs and wants of this large itinerant labor force. It isn't surprising that a few young men would sometimes find themselves at cross purposes with the law. We can only assume that the jailhouse most likely served as a "holding facility" for the local constable. It is doubtful that the building saw much use after the 1930s. It's a small single story wood frame building that contains only two rustic cells. The building has a rock pier and a post foundation, "V" soffit and frame. Corrugated metal sheeting covers the roof. The wide cornice boards are mimicked by similar corner trim, and the gables have "returns" in each end. This defines the building's neoclassical architectural heritage - a common style used in Groveland throughout the 1920s. A small plank door is centered on the front gable end.

The Orion Nebula

Readers who have been following these articles since the first one in August 2007 may remember that I wrote about "The Great Orion Nebula" in the January 2008 issue of the Pine Mountain Lake Newsletter. One of the great experiences about watching celestial objects each evening is that you get to enjoy encore performances year after year. Objects in the nighttime sky, like the Orion Nebula, become like familiar friends that come to visit, make their trek across the sky as the months pass, and then reappear at the same time the following year. Each visit is a little different as your viewing experience is shaped by the weather, seeing conditions, phase of the moon, and other unexpected visitors like comets.

As you read this newsletter in February, the Orion Nebula will be prominently on display high in the nighttime sky. It is the brightest nebula in the sky, and one of the brightest of all Deep Sky Objects. A nebula is a cloud of gas and/ or dust in interstellar space. The word nebula in Latin means "cloud"; its plural is "nebulae". The Orion Nebula is visible to the naked eye under moderately good seeing conditions. It is seen as the middle "star" in the sword of Orion, which are the three stars located below Orion's Belt. The star appears fuzzy to observers with good eye-sight, and the nebulosity is easily seen through binoculars or a small telescope. The Orion Nebula is located in the constellation Orion and is approximately 1,500 light-years away and spans about 30 light-years. It is an example of a stellar nursery where new stars are being born. Observations of the nebula have

revealed nearly 1,000 stars in various stages of formation. For those of us fortunate to enjoy the dark Groveland skies, the con-

can be seen in the south-east sky as soon as it gets dark.

stellation Orion

One thing that I've explained about taking photographs of Deep Sky Objects (nebula, galaxies, etc...) is that the final image is all about long exposure times. To put this into perspective, most daytime photographs have exposure times that are measured in fractions of a second. Most Deep Sky Object astrophotography has exposure times that are measured in minutes or hours!

Anyone who has viewed the Orion Nebula through binoculars or a telescope already knows that the human eye isn't sensitive enough to detect color under very low light conditions. The human

> eye contains two types of photoreceptors, rods and cones. The rods are more numerous. some 120 million, and are more sensitive than the cones. However, rods are not sensitive to color. This is why you typically see shades of gray, instead of color, in low light conditions. Try it yourself, take a colorful picture outside at night and see how little color information is detectable. Today's digital camera sensors don't have these low-light color restrictions.

You can think of a digital camera sensor as a bucket that collects p h o t o n s (light) - the longer the

exposure, the more light (color and details) that's captured and displayed in the photograph. Stars are like pinpoints of light. Tracking errors while the camera is taking a photograph can quickly elongate stars in a photograph, and then they look oblong or like streaks. So exposure times of minutes or hours can be a real challenge.

The image of the Orion Nebula printed with this article was created by taking 36 separate photographs, ranging in exposure time from 30 seconds to 5 minutes, and stacking them one on top of another to create the final image. The total exposure time is 155 minutes. One challenge specific to the Orion Nebula is that I needed to take exposure times of multiple durations. These multiple duration exposures are needed to capture the dimmest and brightest areas in the nebula. For example, the bright core was exposed for 30 seconds while the dimmest regions around the outside edges of the nebula were exposed for 5 minutes. All these separate photographs were stacked and blended together to create the final image.
