

ve recently been musing on the uniqueness of Groveland and Pine Mountain Lake - especially when it comes to volunteerism and community self-sufficiency. Examples abound. After all, we're the village that built our own library and museum - one aluminum can at a time. Lately the County has made it clear they have no funds to put into sorely needed maintenance of the airport. Instead of whining, the PML airport community has stepped up, raised money, and taken care of it. The Friends of the Groveland Library raise enough money each year, through their Saturday book sales, to keep our library open six days a week, despite County cut-backs. Last week we attended the Cinco de Mayo fundraiser at Camp Tuolumne Trails. In the course of an evening, about 150 people helped Southside Senior Services meet their financial goal to fund programs and services. On May 22, PML homeowners will again step up and help STCHS raise operating funds for the museum by participating in the Wine Cruise.

Speaking of Tuolumne County, I recently attended a number of meetings where John Gray, our district supervisor, and Craig Pedro, our county manager, addressed the current financial state of the county; like the State of California, the news is very bleak. My interest is in understanding how county funding or lack thereof will affect PML

and the local airport. The short version is that the county is facing a \$6 to 9 million dollar short fall in their forthcoming budget. We will have to be proactive to ensure that certain county projects around our community remain a high priority. While the local airport is not a PML responsibility, a significant number of PML property owners use the airport; we need to raise county maintenance issues so the airport continues to serve our members.

I mentioned in my May note that the cart barn design was presenting serious financial challenges. I am happy to report that a design review has resulted in significant cost reductions so there may be a light at the end of the tunnel, and it is not a train. A new design has been developed that maintains the required functionality but strips out some features that we just cannot afford. The cart barn committee will be making final recommendations in the next few weeks, and then the redesign can be completed.

cruisers can be seen venturing around the lake. The Lakeside Café (formally the Marina Grill) will be open by the time the newspaper hits your mailbox so, drop by and have a burger, they are best on the hill!

The Quagga mussel continues to be a problem for foothill lakes so, if you move your boat between lakes, please power-wash the hull or let the boat dry out for seven days before dropping the boat in our lake.

I hope all of you will fill out the PML long-range planning survey which you can find on www.pinemountainlake. com or in hardcopy at the Administration office. Your opinions count, and the results of the survey will help guide the decisions and priorities for coming years.



#### **3-Year Reserve Study**

The law requires associations to conduct a comprehensive onsite reserve study every three years and a review and update every year. We are fortunate that the software system we use through our vendor, allows us to update our reserve listing on a monthly basis. We are sched-

uled and budgeted for the onsite study this year. The study will be conducted by our reserve specialist company, Hughes Reserves.

#### **Electric Golf Cart Building**

As reported in previous issues of the PML News, we received the bids for the new electric golf cart building and the prices were much higher than what we have available for the project. We started reevaluating the project to come up with ways to accomplish the objectives while staying within budget. The project committee recently met with one of the bidding contractors who gave a presentation that included ideas on how to modify the original plan to cut down on costs. The plan looks promising and we should have a quote for Board consideration prior to the next meeting.

# PMLA Compliance Chatter

BY DENNIS PIPAL, COMPLIANCE OFFICER

Safety inspections for 2010 will be in full swing as we continue our Fire Abatement Program to assure our community is safe from wildfire. We have three (3) field inspectors who have been trained by CalFire to assist you in preparing your property for fire season safety. They will be looking for the following hazards that place you and our community at risk:

- 1. Do you have a thirty (30) foot Defensible Space around any structure?
  - a. Dead leaves, needles, cones and grasses on the ground
  - b. Dead leaves, needles, cones on roof or gutters
  - c. Tree limbs within 10 ft of a chimney or stove pipe
  - d. Hazardous vegetation within 10' of propane tanks
  - e. Firewood stored near or under any structure
- 2. Do you have a one hundred (100) foot Reduced fuel Zone around any structure?
  - a. Dead or dying brush, trees,limbs and branches within 15'of the ground
  - b. Too many trees for the area and/or tree limbs too close to the ground
  - c. Large masses of vegetation with no fire breaks (horizontal

continuity)

- d. Brush under trees without proper spacing (vertical continuity)
- 3. Lots without structures: Do you have?
  - a. Grasses longer than 3" on entire Lot
  - b. Dead trees, downed limbs, dead limbs on live trees and any dead vegetation
  - c. Tree density too thick and tree limbs too close to ground
  - d. Vertical spacing between brush and trees too close causing ladder fuels
  - e. Horizontal spacing too thick without fire breaks

If you have any of these hazards, they must be eliminated by July 1, 2010. We have a free consultation with one of our Fire Inspectors available to you each Saturday before the July 1 deadline. We urge you to take advantage of this opportunity by calling (209) 962-1240 to schedule your appointment.

We have all read the headlines from around the State when a community is destroyed by wildfire. Our goal is to prevent, or at least substantially reduce, the likelihood of that event ever happening in Pine Mountain Lake. Are you with us?

The following is a proposed new resolution. The purpose of the resolution is to educate members on proper burning techniques within PML to limit the impact of smoke and fire on other members. The Board plans to accomplish this by requiring that all members that wish to burn, receive educational material on burning and be issued a PML burn permit. The Board of Directors are soliciting input from the membership on the content of the resolution. The resolution is scheduled to be approved by the Board of Directors at the Board meeting to be held at the Lake Lodge on June, 19 2010. The meeting is scheduled to start at 9 a.m. and all PMLA members are welcome to attend.

# PMLA Outdoor Burning-STANDARDS AND PROCEDURES

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors has determined there exists a threat to human health due to excessive smoke from outdoor burning.

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors has determined there is risk of larger fires as a result of escaped outdoor burning,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Board of Directors does hereby approve and adopt the attached policy "PMLA Outdoor Burning Standards and Procedures".

# OUTDOOR BURNING - NOTICE TO HOMEOWNERS

Pine Mountain Lake property owners are required to reduce fuel loads on their properties to minimum levels in order to reduce the risk of wildland fires.

Property owners are strongly encouraged to dispose of unwanted fuels in ways other than burning. PMLA provides a compost pile to property owners for this purpose.

The goal of this program is to drive the number of complaints received by the Safety Department about smoky neighborhoods to zero, and find that no outdoor burning results in escaped fires.

Those property owners who feel compelled to bum on site must

follow the outdoor burning permit process:

- #1- Property owners must call the PML main gate to report their intent to burn.
- #2-Burn only on a "permissive burn day" as determined by the Tuolumne County Air Pollution Control District.
- #3- Have in possession a valid PMLA Outdoor Burn permit.
- #4- Have in possession a valid CAL-FIRE Burn Permit when required.
- #5- Burn only clean and dry vegetation.

No burning is allowed during the PML no burning season, usually scheduled June 1 to September 30. Dates may be adjusted seasonally based on conditions.

# ISSUING PMLA OUTDOOR BURNING PERMITS

- 1. Property owners will pick up a PMLA Burn Permit and educational video at the PMLA Administration Office or Main Gate. Permits and videos will be mailed on request.
- 2. There is no fee for the permit.
- 3. Permits are valid for 5 years.
- 4. Permit holders agree to watch the supplied educational video on fire safety and comply with its best practice recommendations.
- 5. Options for viewing the video include:
  - a. a seminar conducted by PMLA within the subdivision
  - b. at home as self-conducted viewing
- 6. The seminar is conducted by PMLA trained staff and may also be attended by CAL FIRE or Groveland Fire staff.
- 7. The location of the seminar is within the subdivision.
- 8. PML Administration will advertise a schedule of dates for the seminars.
- 9. Property owners must register for the seminar at least 5 days before the seminar. Seminars may be cancelled if there are no registrants.
- 10. The seminar is offered free of charge.

ENFORCEMENT PROCESS

The PML Safety Department will:

1. Record the PMLA Burn Permit



# Department of Safety

he Summer Season is upon us, which brings a stop to the rain and snow that we all endured this winter. This time of year also brings increased traffic and other safety conditions. Please take care and slow your speed down when traveling in the area of the Marina. As you all know, due to the limited parking at the Marina during the weekends, parking along Pine Mountain Drive does present a traffic safety issue. People will be walking along the shoulder and care should be taken while in this area. As usual the Water Taxis will be running from the Lake Lodge and Dunn Court to the Marina and should be considered as an alternative to trying to find a parking space at or near the Marina.

I would like to encourage all of those who like to skateboard, to please take advantage of the great Skate Park at the Youth Center. We continue to have problems with children and young adults skateboarding on PML streets. Due to the lack of sidewalks, and the size and layout of PML streets, skateboarding presents a safety hazard to the skateboarder and traffic. As a result, this activity is prohibited on our streets and in the common areas.

We have seen the birth of many new fawns towards the end of May. As I have often warned, if one deer crosses the roadway, be aware of the ones that will be following. Pine Mountain Lake and the Department of Safety have been as-

sisting Fish and Game in their ongoing study of the unknown sickness that affected our herd last year. In early May, Fish and Game returned to re-capture the deer that they had tagged in late December of 2009. I will update once we receive the information from Fish and Game.

The Department of Safety has been working closely with the Sheriff's Dept. to address certain problems that have occurred within PML. The Sheriff's Department is suffering from budget cut backs and has limited resources. Sheriff Jim Mele conducted a Town Hall meeting in April at the Lake Lodge and addressed these problems. The Sheriff's Dept., like most Law Enforcement agencies, is geared towards calls for service. This means that the deployment of Patrol Officers is planned by trends from the calls that the department receives. It is imperative that if you call the Department of Safety with a law violation that you also contact the Sheriff's Department. They may not have the personnel to dispatch a unit at that time (for minor incidents) but a record is made for future staffing needs. Always dial 911 in emergencies and use the regular number for non-emergencies – 533-5815. If there is an emergency and you are using a cell phone, the Sheriff asks that you use the 533-5815 number. This will speed up the time that emergency personnel can reach you.

PINE MOUNTAIN LAKE **ASSOCIATION BOARD OF DIRECTORS** POLICY RELATING TO WORK-**PLACE ABUSE** 

> Zero Tolerance for Workplace Abuse

WHEREAS, the Association desires to establish a policy for the protection of employees to establish and maintain a work environment conducive to maintaining personnel.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Board of Directors for Pine Mountain Lake Association adopts the following policy:

The Association is an employer and as such, state and federal employment laws require the Association, as the employer, to do everything possible to protect its employees from harassment, abuse and a hostile work environment. The Board accepts that obligation and expects that the employees will be treated with courtesy and respect.

Allowing any abusive or offensive conduct toward employees places the Association at tremendous risk inasmuch as the Association could be accused of allowing a hostile work environment to exist. Because the Board has a responsibility to all of the homeowners, it will aggressively protect its employees from abusive homeowners, tenants and guests.

Therefore, the Board will not tolerate homeowners, tenants or guests verbally abusing the Association's employees. It is the desire of management and the Board to correct problems as quickly as possible, therefore, any comments regarding the work product of the employees or complaints thereof must be addressed to the Association's General Manager.

The Association's Rules and Regulations prohibit homeowners, tenants or guests taking any actions against employees. The Board will enforce the Rules and impose fines for violations.

number when property owner calls the main gate to notify their intent to burn.

- 2. Inquire about property owner's possession of other needed permits.
- 3. Send a patrol officer to observe outdoor burning when a property owner complaint of excessive smoke is received. The officer will ask to see the permits required on that day.
- 4. Require the property owner to extinguish the fire if the property owner does not have the required permits.
- 5. Request the property owner extinguish the fire if the property owner is burning in such a way as to produce excessive smoke that impacts neighbors, or creates a possibility of fire escape.
- 6. In the case of excessive smoke and an uncooperative property owner, call the Tuolumne County Air Pollution Control District to request an on-site visit from a representative who will instruct the property owner to extinguish the fire. Fines may be assessed at the discretion of the Air Pollution Control District.

#### **VIOLATIONS**

- 1. Violations of the burn permit process include:
  - a. Burning outdoors without a PLMA burn permit
  - b. Burning without a CAL-FIRE permit when required
- c. Burning outside burn permit season or bours
- 2. Violations of this resolution could result in the member being fined in accordance with the PMLA **Enforcement Procedures and** Schedule of Fines.

#### **MEASURING SUCCESS**

The PML Safety Department will provide a monthly report to the General Manager with the following data:

- 1. Unit and Lot number of property owners who called to register their intent to burn
- 2. Unit and Lot number of persons reporting excessive smoke, unsafe burning practices, or an escaped
- 3. The Unit and Lot number of the offending burning property
- 4. A summary report of discussion, requests and action taken as a result of meeting with the Property Owner, including any action by the Air Pollution Control District.

# PMLA Money Matters

ave you been to the Pool yet this year to see the all new deck and drain system? Visited the Marina and seen the completely rebuilt restrooms? Gone to the Stables and taken a look at the brand new multipurpose building that's been installed? Checked out the completely revamped restrooms at The Grill? Attended an event at the Lake Lodge and sat in the new chairs?

These are just a few of the projects that have happened over the last few months. There are a lot more things that have happened and will happen "behind the scenes". Such things as a new Curb Machine for maintenance that makes curb repair faster and more efficient. A new convection oven at the Grill to prepare your next meal to perfection. A new mower for the golf course to keep that beautiful, green grass at the right height. The new boat storage facility and upgraded utilities at the Marina.

I could go on but you get the idea. A lot of things keep happening around PML to keep all of the amenities and infrastructure in great shape. As we all know, the Association is over 40 years old and as such requires more upkeep (I know I need more "upkeep" than I did 40 years ago!). As with all things the cost of this upkeep rarely decreases and almost always costs more than it did just 5 years ago.

By now some of you have figured out where I am going with this discussion. That's right, it's time for another edition of "As The Reserve Fund Turns". If you have read this column in the past, attended a Board meeting where the subject was discussed, read the Annual Report, or reviewed the yearly Budget, you have been exposed to a good deal of discussion about our Reserve Fund. This is the money we set aside each year to pay for the major repair and maintenance of the common areas within PML.

For years this fund has been undervalued and was unprepared for future demands. In recent years the Board has begun to address this issue by increas-

ing the level of assessment dedicated to this important area of the Association's finances. While the steps taken so far have been in the right direction, we still need to work hard to build up this Reserve so we can fund projects like the ones mentioned above, and many, many others.

While we try and estimate how much we will need, there are always things that happen unexpectedly and cost more than originally thought. We want to be prepared for this. I never want to see the day that we either don't have the funds available to complete an important project or have to raise the specter of the dreaded Special Assessment.

This summer we will be performing our required three year update of the Reserve Study. During this process we will review all aspects of the Association and the expected costs for future repair and replacement of the multitude of items that make up this great community. Unfortunately this upkeep costs money and will continue to do so. Only by building up our Reserve Fund can we be sure that the Association can continue to be maintained to the standards that you all have come to expect and deserve.

Like any prudent savings program we need to have some money set aside for the unexpected things that pop up or the items that cost more than we anticipated or the things we thought would last another year or two that suddenly need attention now. We probably don't want to have more money than we need set aside but we definitely don't want to have less set aside than we have to have.

I ask that you keep all of this in mind as we move into budget season later this year. Maintain the perspective on the funding required and what it means to you and the other homeowners here at PML. It's never too late to expand the process of putting money aside to do things like refreshing the pool with a new, colorful deck, buying new golf carts, replacing that old truck, etc., etc., etc.....

Tinter has been very persistent in hanging on this year. The cold wet weather has delayed some projects and has not allowed us to mow on a regular schedule.

The greens develop a disease that is annoying during the wet months of winter but is less likely to create problems as we move into May. This year, after greens aeration and with the majority of sand not being worked into the turf due to the weather on the Tuesday following aeration, all of our greens developed some snow mold. As soon as it was spotted we began spraying for it and have continued into May to control the fungus due to weather conditions. I want to thank our members for their patience and understanding during the healing process of the greens and any inconvenience that our other projects have created. Your golfing experience, along with maintaining the course for your pleasure, is our #1 priority.

Other tasks that we are required to complete do not always involve maintaining the course.

Rob Abbott, along with Toby Granger from our Street Maintenance department, trained as certified crane operators to be able to safety operate the crane truck that our street department purchased. A skill test, along with a written test, are state requirements to complete certification.

Ron Prieto, from our Safety department, and I are completing a Hazardous Training Response Class that is also a state requirement. This consists of a 40 hour class and then a test to become certified.

These are just a couple of projects that are required by the county or state to operate our maintenance facility.

Enjoy your summer of golf. Play well, play often and remember to do the little things, such as ball mark repair or rake a bunker following that wonderful bunker shot, so the players behind you can enjoy the same course you are.




# Pine Mountain Lake Computer Users Group

If you are not potty trained you must be "double-bagged" – a swim diaper with a plastic pant over it, is the best way to avoid nasty illnesses. We sell them in the pool store, if you forget yours. Don't be insulted if you are asked to show us that your baby is properly bagged. It's our job to keep all swimmers healthy. During the regular season, we close at 9 pm every day of the week, which means all swimmers are asked to get out of the pool by 8:45 pm so we can clean and cover.

No floaties of any kind are ever allowed in the pool - it's not big enough for bathers and rafts/boats too, sorry. During weekends and holidays, there will be 2 pool attendants instead of just one. Property owners and registered guests with proper passes are the only ones allowed access to the PML Pool, especially during those crazy peak holiday events. 

he ROOFBB's held our Spring Luncheon at The Grill on April 24. Included in the program was an update for our ROOFBB sisters and friends on the "Support Our Troops" program, which was launched in September, 2009. As program chair, I shared some statistics as well as some of the stories about the troops to whom we have sent care packages, and some of the thank you letters received. In an incredible outpouring of support for the program, in addition to the items placed in the donation box, I received an amazing \$360 for the purchase of care package items.

The first step in the shopping process is to download the wish lists provided by our troops from the anysoldier.com web site. From the wish lists I built a shopping list so we knew we would be shopping for exactly what the recipient wants or needs. Mal and I made a whirlwind shopping trip to Sonora, coming home with endless bags of supplies and \$2.64 left in my jeans. The bounty was spread all over the kitchen counters and dining room table and boxes were packed. In each box I include a history of the ROOFBB's, a summary of Groveland's past, a Chamber of Commerce map and photos of Groveland. If a soldier has specifically requested a letter, and many do, I write a few pages about what is happening in the area.

This program covers male and female soldiers in all branches of the service, and even canine soldiers. In addition to sending packages to individual soldiers, we also have two orphanages and a canine rehab center on our list. Because of the generosity shown at the luncheon, and donations through the mail, I shipped 25 boxes on May 4, bringing our total number of boxes shipped since the inception of the program to 71. # Genealogy Workshop BUT IT SAID SO IN A BOOK! BY BONNIE LAMONT STEVENS

ne of the hard lessons we learn as genealogists is that publication does not necessarily turn guesses into facts. We want to trust researchers and reporters whose work is preserved in bound volumes in our public and private libraries. In the real world, especially in genealogical research, we cannot. A good example is the Ulloa family in the STCHS publication, History Makers South of the River by Dr. Allen Repashy.

Dr. Repashy did the community a huge service when he inventoried the graves at Our Lady of Mount Carmel Cemetery in the late 1970's. He did us an equally large service by recording hours of conversation with the community's senior citizens, many of whom have since passed away.

Dr. Repashy freely acknowledges that he did not research census records, baptismal records, burial permits, church burial records, land deeds, wills, or any of the other sources genealogists use to document a person's life and to link individuals into families. The facts in his book are merely as good as the memories of the community member with whom he spoke. In most cases, those memories are excellent. In others, they perpetuate misinformation. Dr. Repahsy welcomes the work of researchers who add reliable, documented facts to the memories he collected.

Of the Ulloas Dr. Repashy writes (emphasis added): Everyone knew that the Ulloas came from South America, but no one knew who is actually buried beneath the 16'x 10' concrete slab. There is general agreement that the cement work bere, as well as at...the [adjacent] Morton plot, was done by Louie Ulloa who is buried in Sonora.

There is **speculation** that Louie Ulloa's mother, Martha, is buried here. She and her son, Louie, lived with Tim Carlon. Louie was unhappy with the situation and left home at the age of

According to Tuolumne County records, Domingo Ulloa was buried here in 1913. He is probably the father of Louie. The records also state that Martha Ulloa was buried bere in 1922. She is most likely Louie's mother....The key words in this text are "no one knew", "speculation", "probably" and "most likely."

The Ulloas appear in the 1860 census as residents of Big Oak Flat. At that time,

"Big Oak Flat" described everything in Tuolumne County west of the Divide between Groveland and Big Oak Flat and south of the Tuolumne River. Domingo, born about 1822, was head of the family. The other adult in the household was his wife Ventura, born about 1832. The 1880 census confirms this relationship.

Domingo and Ventura had a son Louis, born in "Chili" about 1849. Clearly he is NOT the Louie who did the concrete work on the Ulloa and Morton graves in the late 1940's, who died in 1970 and is buried in Sonora. The younger Louie, Louis Edward Ulloa, died in Calaveras County. His burial permit in Tuolumne County says that he was born in 1879.

The Baptismal Register of St. Patrick's Roman Catholic Parish in Sonora lists the baptism of Louis Edward Ulloa – as Louis Olloa -- and his sister Carmel. Their parents are named: Louis Olloa (sic) and Pauline Hammill. Louie is the son of Louis Ulloa, not Domingo. Louis and his family appear in the 1880 census living in Branch Township (near La Grange), Stanislaus County -- indexed as Ulroe.

There were two Charles Kassabaums, both immigrants from Germany and of similar age, living in the same part of Mariposa County from about 1870 onward. One married the widow Margaret Porath, who has descendants buried at the Divide Cemetery. The other married the widow Pauline Ulloa.

When Mariposa county rancher Charles Kassabaum died and was buried in Coulterville in April, 1894, he left a pregnant widow, Pauline, and two small children. In 1900, Pauline Kassabaum was working as housekeeper for Tim Carlon. She was the mother of 5 children. Pauline was also the widow of Louis Ulloa, Sr. She had two Ulloa children. Her three Kassabaum children were living with her in 1900. Those who said Louie Ulloa's mother, Martha, "lived with" Tim Carlon were almost correct.

The 1900 census records that Domingo Ulloa was born in Chile in August 1830, came to the US in 1854, and was a naturalized citizen of the US. Note than in 20 years Domingo lost 8 years in age.

Martha Ulloa was the youngest child of Domingo and Ventura Ulloa. She never married. Martha was the daughter who came home to care for her parents, and was living with Domingo at least from 1900 until his death in 1913. There

is no evidence that she ever lived with Tim Carlon.

The good folk of Groveland and Big Oak Flat speculated. Louie was an Ulloa. No one remembered that Domingo had any sons. Louie, therefore, must be Domingo's son. Martha lived with Domingo. Martha must be his much younger wife and therefore Louie's mother.

"We know Louie is also related to the Mortons, but we don't know how," added the informants. Once again the record provides the answer. Mercedes

Morton is Domingo Ulloa's daughter, Martha Ulloa's sister, and Louie's Ulloa's

Until we do, we have clues, not facts.

# Shanghai-Style Pork and Bean Sprouts

RECIPE PROVIDED BY TOM KNOTH AND PAULA MARTELL



his is a quick and healthy stir fry dish, and it tastes great! If you prefer you can substitute chicken for pork. We have also substituted other veggies for a portion of the bean sprouts.

1/2 lb lean pork butt or boneless loin chops (you can also substitute chicken breast or thigh meat)

1-2 cloves finely chopped garlic 1/2 tsp finely chopped Serrano or Jala-

1/2 tsp finely chopped Serrano or Jala peno chili pepper

1/2 tsp finely chopped fresh ginger 4 tsp Rice wine, Dry sherry, or Sake

1 1/2 tsp cornstarch

1 Tbsp soy sauce

1 tsp sesame oil

1 Tbsp sugar (or Splenda sugar substitute)

1 tsp salt

1/2 tsp ground white or black pepper

2 Tbsp peanut or canola oil

1 lb bean sprouts

In a shallow bowl, add the garlic, 2 teaspoons of the rice wine, the cornstarch, soy sauce, sesame oil, sugar, 1/2 teaspoon of the salt, and 1/4 teaspoon of the pepper.

Slice the pork into 1/4-inch-thick slices, then stack the slices and cut into 2-inch-long matchsticks. Put the matchsticks in the sauce prepared above and stir to combine.

Heat 14-inch flat-bottomed wok over high heat until a bead of water vaporizes within 1 to 2 seconds of contact. Swirl in the olive oil and add the pork, spread it around it in the wok. Cook undisturbed for 20-30 seconds, letting the pork begin to brown. Then, using a metal spatula, stir-fry the pork until it is no longer pink, about 1 minute. Add the bean sprouts, then remaining 2 teaspoons rice wine, 1/2 teaspoon of salt, and 1/4 teaspoon pepper and stir-fry 1 to 2 minutes or until the pork and bean sprouts are just cooked through.



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# Southside Senior Services Inc. **Conducts Study**

outhside Senior Services, Inc. (SSSI) today announces that Uthey have entered into a third party agreement with the environmental consulting firm, Michael Brandman Associates, to complete the environmental studies required by law before any work can begin on the Gathering Place project.

SSSI has been raising money over many years with the intent of building a facility to house programs and services that will meet the wide variety of needs of the multiple generation of seniors in our community - from early retirees seeking an active lifestyle to older seniors facing economic and health challenges.

A study conducted in 2009 for SSSI by the Wagner Company concluded that

there was strong community support for the Gathering Place project, but that people needed more experience with our organization before they would be willing to contribute the level of funds needed to launch the project. Therefore, the SSSI Board of Directors decided that its 2010 priorities would focus on expanding programs and usage at its current Little House facility while determining how and when to move forward with the Gathering Place project.

"During the last six months the number of people engaged in programs at the Little House facility has more than doubled," said SSSI Board President Ron Harms.

"The demand for our meals program has increased significantly and a variety of new offerings have been added to the program calendar. We are already beginning to experience some capacity limitations at the Little House facility. As a result, the SSSI Board has decided to take the next incremental step in moving the Gathering Place project forward - that is the completion of the environmental impact study.

"By initiating the environmental study now, the time required to complete the Gathering Place project, once it has been funded, will be shortened.

"The SSSI Board is realistic in its outlook on how long it may take to line up the funding required for the Gathering Place project. While acknowledging that fact, we have also concluded that the project time could be reduced by 18-24 months once the project is funded if we begin the environmental studies now," Harms said.

The Gathering Place project would be located on a portion of the North Side Facilities Development Area east of Ferretti Road, adjacent to the existing Leon Rose Ball Field.

# Streamflow Measurements Resume on Clavey

the Stanislaus National Forest, in partnership with the City and County of San Francisco Hetch Hetchy Project, has re-installed a stream flow measurement gauge on the free-flowing lower Clavey River. Reinstatement of Clavey River flow measurement operations will provide scientists with a rare opportunity to gather data on natural, undisturbed stream flows in a large Sierra Nevada watershed.

The new stream gauge replaces the

original historic gauge once operated by the United States Geological Survey until its termination in 1995. At the time, budgetary constraints required the discontinuation of several of the agency's stream flow measurement operations in California, including the Clavey River. Re-installing a stream flow gauge on the Clavey River was first recommended in the Forest's 1997 Clavey River Wild and Scenic River Review.

The partnership project jelled quickly since the City of San Francisco is inter-

ested in gauging all major streams in the Tuolumne River system to better understand how to improve releases from Hetch Hetchy Reservoir to better meet multiple, downstream beneficial uses of the river, including water supply, hydroelectric power generation, recreation activities, and protection of aquatic species.

A key benefit of the Clavey gauge is that it adds to the history and understanding of natural flows in the Sierras, and it also provides real-time data for anyone interested in flow information. Those members of the public interested in the information include anglers as well as expert kayakers who rate the Clavey as an extreme run in the spring when flows are within a range that offers high challenge. The information is valuable because the flows of most other Sierra Nevada Rivers are regulated by dams and diversions.

Now that the stream flow gauge is again in operation, Clavey River stream flow data is easily available on the California Data Exchange Center website at <a href="CDEC.water.ca.gov">CDEC.water.ca.gov</a>, real-time data, code "CBU" to access the Clavey flow information.

# Groveland Rotary Walk for Water

e take safe drinking water for granted in Groveland. However, over 1.2 billion people in the world (1 in 5) do not have access to reliable, safe drinking water. Eight thousand people die each day due to water related diseases. Two-hundred and fifty children die each hour from lack of safe drinking water. The people who get sick from drinking contaminated water occupy 50% of the world's hospital beds. On average women and children in Africa walk 6 kilometers carrying 6 liters of water each day (and this water is often contaminated). This activity takes so much time out of their day that the kids do not have time to go to school and women do not have time to contribute to the income making of their households. Poverty keeps getting worse.

These are grim statistics. But Groveland Rotary has teamed up with the kids at Tenaya School and Tioga High School to do something about it. On April 17<sup>th</sup>, kids from these two schools conducted the First Annual Walk for Water. After

receiving pledges, the kids walked 3 kilometers, from the new Groveland Youth Center to Leon Rose Field and back, with water on their backs, to raise money for a water project in Africa. They raised \$1,282.

In addition to the funds raised by the kids, \$300 in corporate sponsorships was received from the Black Oak Casino and Ron & Carole Smith Accountants. Together with these funds, Groveland Rotary Club contributed \$1,000, bringing the total raised to \$2,582.

Groveland Rotary Club is teaming with the Harare Rotary Club in Harare, Zimbabwe, to develop a water supply for a school in rural Zimbabwe. Zimbabwe is the poorest nation on Earth. The climate is dry and water is scarce. The project will likely consist of drilling a water well, installing a hand pump and, if money remains, building latrines that will improve community sanitation. The kids in Groveland will also get the chance to correspond with the kids they are helping in Zimbabwe.

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# Just How Good is Our Water?

BY JIM GOODRICH, GCSD GENERAL MANAGER

Groveland area from somewhere else. As you have traveled, you have probably noticed that the taste of drinking water can change dramatically from place to place. I came from Orange County where most of our water comes from the Colorado River. The dissolved salt content for that water is about 500 milligrams per liter (mg/l). Dissolved salts are what generally give water its taste, though other things can contribute, too. Health standards suggest that drinking water should have a dissolved salt content of less than 1,000 mg/l. Orange County water had a distinctive "flavor." It was okay, but it wasn't bottled water.

Most of you have tasted the water served in restaurants in Sonora. That water has a REALLY distinctive flavor...approaching "yuck" status. Water delivered in the Sonora area comes from open ditches, where the water has a chance to mellow on its way from its Sierra snow field origins. Though their water meets health standards, it picks up its taste which is likely due to exposure to organic materials in the ditch system.


Groveland's water comes from the Hetch Hetchy Reservoir, which is owned and operated by the City and County of San Francisco. Groveland is their first customer. This water is

The dissolved salt of that water is about 500 as per liter (mg/l). Dissolved pristine. It has a dissolved salt content that ranges between 15 and 30 mg/l. By comparison, water is considered distilled if it has a dissolved salt content of less than 10 mg/l. Our water also doesn't have the telltale chlorine taste often found in drinking water because we disinfect with chloramines and high-intensity ultraviolet (UV) light, which don't leave a residual taste.

Recently, the GCSD Operations staff (they are the ones responsible for treating your tap water) entered our water in a competition between water agencies from all over California and Nevada. This event was sponsored by the California-Nevada Section of the American Water Works Association—the largest municipal water trade organization in the world, boasting over 25,000 members

Through the long tasting process, Groveland's water made it through the rounds of judging, finally ending up in the final four. In the end, we received the silver medal for our water. First place went to Mount Shasta. I guess their water is closer to the snow fields than our water.

GCSD is proud to deliver such highquality, good tasting water to you. We encourage you to enjoy a cold glass of tap water and savor its excellent, awarding-winning taste.

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# The Pinwheel Galaxy

wo years ago, in the June 2008 PML Newsletter, I shared an image of the Pinwheel Galaxy that I had taken in May of 2005. Five years have passed and I'd like to share the same Pinwheel Galaxy recently taken from my new observatory.

Historically, galaxies have been categorized according to their visual shape. A common shape is the spiral galaxy. Spiral galaxies are disks with spiral arms that extend from the galactic bulge (large tightly packed group of stars) in the center of the galaxy. The spiral arms are brighter than the surrounding disk because they are sites of ongoing young and hot burning star formation. Many scientists believe that there is a massive black hole in the center of these galaxies. There are probably more than a hundred billion galaxies in the observable universe.

The Pinwheel Galaxy is the brightest

systems of interstellar matter and stars that come in many shapes. They typically range from a few thousand to several hundred thousand light-years in size and have masses between several million to several trillion times that of our sun. Galaxies can also contain many multiple star systems, star clusters, and various interstellar clouds. Our Sun is one of the stars in the Milky Way galaxy; our Solar System includes the Earth and all the other objects that orbit the Sun.

The Pinwheel galaxy is a relatively large galaxy. With a diameter of 170 thousand light-years it is nearly twice the size of our Milky Way and is approximately 24 million light-years away from Earth. Another interesting property of the Pinwheel galaxy is that it seems to be asymmetrical on one side. Notice that the spiral arm at the bottom of the image is separated from the center more than the other spiral arms. It is thought that the Pinwheel galaxy underwent a near collision with another galaxy and the associated gravitational tidal forces caused the asymmetry.

This image of the Pinwheel Galaxy is from 84 minutes of total exposure. I'm using a new camera made by a company called Quantum Scientific Imaging (QSI). QSI makes scientific grade CCD cameras especially designed to image astrophotography. This camera images in monochrome. Color images are created by placing a clear (luminance), red,

sor to combine the color data into an image.

Best viewed in the skies above Pine Mountain Lake during the months of March through August, the Pinwheel is not visible to the

naked eye – you'll need a telescope with a reasonable aperture (5" or more is recommended). When viewed through a telescope, the Pinwheel will appear as a faint fuzzy patch of light - in larger telescopes you can make out more of the spiral shape.

Long exposures from today's digital camera sensors can capture light far too faint for our unaided eyes to see. This image of the Pinwheel galaxy has 84 minutes of exposure time and clearly shows off the spiral shape in all its magnificent glory. Given its relative distance from the Earth, 24 million light-years, it's amazing to be looking at "light" that has taken 24 million years to reach our eyes - or in this case the camera sensor. Just to put that into perspective, many scientists believe that "modern" men and women have only walked the earth for the past 20 thousand years.


Both the dinner and the performance

ne of the many *minievents* of the John Muir Festival includes a fundraising benefit for the Vietnam Moving Wall.


You'll be able to enjoy pork roast carnitas with beans, rice and salad for only \$10 a plate.
