Maintenance of Road Frontage

The Pine Mountain Lake Maintenance Department performs work on our roads throughout the year. The PMLA Streets Crew conducts various forms of maintenance and construction. The work varies from tree trimming and removal, brush trimming and removal, shoulder work, embankment work, drainage repairs, pavement repairs, curbing, and sign placement. An area of concern came to surface during this season's fire abatement work. The property owners road frontage, and where does the property meet the pavement?

Properties do not border directly to the road pavement. Your property pins may be set back anywhere from 10 to 20 feet from the roadway pavement. Annual Budget Meetings

This month's Board meeting is scheduled for October 23rd. This is a day-long, comprehensive meeting where the individual amenity managers present their budget proposals to the Board for review and discussion. We encourage all members to attend and members are welcome to address the Board at meetings, but it is important to remember that the Board and management are limited by the Civil Code as to how much discussion they can have with members. I have included specific information at the end of my article for review.

We walk a very fine line between transparency and violating the law. We can all thank the politicians in Sacramento for creating these onerous laws that lack common sense.

Just to be clear, while we are unable to get into a lengthy discussion with a member at an open Board meeting, my staff and I will be happy to address member questions or concerns after the meeting or during normal business hours. Just give us a call or send me an email.

The meeting location was moved to the Grill Restaurant at the PML Golf Course to accommodate a member wedding at the Lake Lodge. The meeting is scheduled to start at 8 a.m.

Once the final changes have been made to the 2011 Budget draft from the October meeting, the Board approves the final Budget draft at the November Board meeting. This year, the November meeting is scheduled for the 13th and will be held at the Lake Lodge. The starting time is scheduled for 9 a.m.

Electric Golf Cart Storage Facility

As I write this article, the Electric Golf Cart building project continues to be on schedule. The County approved our grading and demolition permits and we are scheduled to begin demolition of the old Cart Barn building the first week in October.

Our Maintenance staff installed a new wireless intercom box on the #9 Tee of the Golf Course. Members will be able to use this intercom to communicate with our Snack Bar staff and place orders for limited menu items. We will be providing food and beverage service at our Golf Course in a temporary location during the construction of the Cart Barn. Please see our Pro Shop staff for details as the project progresses.

Lake Dredging Project

The bids were received for the Dredging Project and, at the date of this writing, we are evaluating these bids with our consultant, Moffat and Nichol. We will provide an update to our members once we complete the bid process and provide a recommendation to the Board.

Fish Plant

The second fish plant of the year was conducted at the PML Marina on September $24^{\rm th}$. This is a fun project that my Assistant, Rick Whybra, is in charge

of. Every year we plant fish in our Lake to maintain the stock for sport fishing at Pine Mountain Lake. This year it was two plantings of 1000 pounds of 1-1/2 to 2-1/2 pound rainbow trout. Avid PML fishermen, like Bill and Barbara Floren and Jim and Karen Lopes, are big supporters of this program and our Lake and look forward to the fish plantings each year. We appreciate their support and all member input on these types of activities.

These requirements do not apply to executive sessions.

Archery Range?

I'm here once a month and love to take my bow and arrows out to kill bales of straw. I looked forward to going to the range located above the campground. I tried twice and haven't been able to find it. I walked the Vista Trail, didn't see it. I followed the Vista Loop Trail, missed the turn off. Tomorrow I hope to make it through the correct turn and actually be where the Map says the range is located. The complaint I have is the distance required to get to the range. My age and condition don't allow me to carry archery equipment that far. I'd like to see easier access for this range.

Can we start a special interest group to help support this activity? I have used Archery ranges in Santa Clara and Santa Cruz Countys. Both have active clubs that provide maintenance and activities. When working on targeting skills, bales in good condition is worthwhile. For hunting skills, walking around a loop with targets at varying locations is very useful. Each club maintains a roster of participants. The Santa Cruz Club provides key access for vehicular access to the range.

For \$25 a year and one weekend of maintenance labor the amenity is quite cheap. Bales are paid for by the club. Targets are also replaced and maintained by the club. I'd like to see graveled parking to provide fire safety and access to the range for those who can shoot but cannot walk the distance.

DIRECTOR'S CORNER Long Range Planning Committee: Survey Results



Thanks to you the Long Range Planning Committee (LRPC) has completed our most successful homeowners' survey to-date. We thank the

almost 1000 of you who participated in this year's survey.

Our previous survey was completed in August 2007; as a result of the data provided then by homeowners we embarked on many projects and improvements. We followed up with a detailed restaurant survey in 2008, which led to the new menu and new look at the Grill.

One of the common comments your board members hear is that communications with the property owners is paramount. We could not agree more, hence the use of surveys to garner opinions and preferences from property owners. The most recent survey had over 900 respondents which are more than enough to be statistically relevant; the total count is up dramatically from previous surveys.

The data from all three surveys has been used to help the Board of Directors and the LRPC decide on what projects, improvements and areas of interest are most important to our property owners.

This article focuses on some of the highlights of the survey results. The complete survey report is available at the main office.

62% of the respondents use PML as a vacation or occasional use home. That's important because it means we have a good representation of all of our owners - full time and vacationers.

According to the respondents, the six most important amenities and/or services which add to your enjoyment of PML are (in order): Lake and Marina, Safety Department, Fire Abatement, Golf Course, Compost Pile, and The Grill. We should budget to properly support those top rated amenities and services.

When asked about how the restaurant is meeting expectations, 72% of the respondents rated their experience as "Excellent or Good." This is up from about 46% during the last survey. This tells us that the restaurant renovation is resonating with our property owners.

As you might expect, since the compost pile made the top 6 picks, it is also true that 84% of the survey respondents use the compost pile to dispose of yard debris. Therefore, we need to think about how to improve the compost pile both in grinding down the dumped debris and improving the access road.

During the discussion leading up to the creation of the new outdoor burning resolution, smoke creation was of paramount concern. One of the survey questions asked how many times the respondent was negatively affected by smoke over the past three years; surprisingly 81% said only one to three times or never. This may be because many property owners are not here during the burning season.

In the first survey we did not ask any questions regarding the pool, this time we covered that amenity. 27% of the respondents use the pool from weekly to once a month and the most asked for improvements of this amenity are to build an enclosure over the existing pool so it can be used yearround or build another larger pool elsewhere at PML.

88% of the respondents read some or all of the articles found in the PML News. Now, that is a nice surprise.

When asked how the respondents felt about how their assessments were being spent, 70% were either satisfied or very satisfied. That response indicates that the staff and board are doing a good job of looking after everyone's interest at PML.

The top three amenities or services in need of the most improvements turned out to be:

· Swimming pool, Lake/Marina/ beaches, and (no surprise here) the Lake Lodge, in that order. These are all big projects that will require long range planning to address.

The top five amenities/services that people feel add the most economic value to your property, in order are:

- · Lake/Marina/Beaches.
- · Golf Course
- · Grill/Bar
- · Safety Department
- · Swimming Pool

This tells us it's important to keep these amenities working well to continue to add to our property values.

Finally, the survey asked what

increase in annual assessments the respondent would be willing to accept to add new amenities or make significant improvements to existing amenities

- · 51% said that they could accept an increase up to 20%.
- · 49% would not like to see any increase in their assessment.

The "glass half empty" folks will grab onto the 49% and say no increase should happen while the "glass half full" people see an opportunity to add new amenities or do major improvements. As a board member, this is a difficult choice.

Creating and managing a survey

is a huge commitment. We believe it provides very valuable information from our property owners for your board and association management. The LRPC all had a hand in the survey but the lion's share of the work was done by Gary Oing. I thank Gary for all of his effort both in creating the survey and compiling all the responses.

The LRPC is made up of the following volunteers: Gary Oing, Ken Codeglia, Janice Mussatto, Ron Dodson and myself. We are always on the lookout for other folks who want to join the LRPC and work on various projects. If you are interested in joining the LRPC please contact me.

PMLA Money Matters BY KEN SPENCER, ASSOCIATION CONTROLLER

"What do I pay my assessment for?" We in Administration probably hear this question from property owners more than just about any other. I thought I would take this opportunity to provide an answer to this important question.

Let's start with some basic information. The assessment for 2010 is \$1,788 per property owner. In general terms this assessment pays for all of the various services provided within PML. This includes the cost to support all of the Association's amenities above and beyond the revenue they generate.

From a global perspective your assessment breaks down like this:

Each of these categories consists of multiple line items that detail the

exact nature of the expense involved. These would include such things as personnel costs (wages, taxes, insurance, etc.), supplies (gasoline, hardware, paper, etc.), outside services (janitorial, legal, laundry, insurance, etc.) and utilities (propane, electricity, phone, etc.).

Let's take a closer look at some of the areas listed above. The first, and largest, component of your assessment is for Capital and Reserve Funding. The broad category is divided into two sub-groups. The New Capital component, as the name implies, pays for new, long life equipment that is needed to improve service and perform new or additional functions. A great example of this is the new mastication machine purchased in 2010 that efficiently and effectively cleans large areas of overgrown brush, thus reducing the potential for fire. The second portion is for Reserve Funding which is used to pay for the repair and replacement of existing long term assets and facilities. Such items as golf carts, trucks, golf course mowers, and computers fall into this category.

The next largest area of spending is the Facilities & Road Maintenance department. This group is responsible for making sure that all of the PML facilities are kept operational. They are continuously engaged in the day to day maintenance of the many and varied buildings and amenities within PML, including the country club building, the Marina, the pool, the stables

and lake lodge. All of our infrastructure requirements such as basic road and curb maintenance, gate operations, HVAC units, doors, painting and equipment repair and upkeep are handled by this group. As all of PML ages the demands on this department continue to grow and become more challenging, just as with any 40 year old structure.

The Administration area consumes the next largest part of your assessment. In some ways this might be harder for many property owners to understand than almost any other area. In Administration we oversee the entire operation of the Association including all accounting functions (paying the bills, collecting amounts owed and keeping the books), human resources, ECC and customer service. We coordinate with the Board of Directors who create the overall direction and focus of our efforts. In addition the Admin staff handles the interface with almost all outside governmental agencies and insurance providers.

One of the most visible departments is next up, the Safety

Group. They provide 24 hour service including patrolling the entire Association and manning the main gate to monitor and control access to our community. Among the many services they provide are the investigation of noise complaints and animal sightings. They also check to be sure all amenities are secure and work to coordinate traffic control during special events and provide a wide range of support to property owner concerns.

That's all the time I have this month but next month I will continue the rundown of where your assessment dollar goes by department as well as delve a little bit deeper into the multitude of "little things" that all add up to encompass the "big picture" of our financial situation here at PMLA.

Well that's it for this month. Pine Mountain Lake Fire Abatement Update - Fall Is Here

PML Burn Permit Process In Place

Fall is here and many of us are continuing our year-round work to reduce fuels on our property. We know that most property owners take their pine needles, oak leaves and tree limbs to the compost pile. But if you need to burn in place, for the first time in our history, you'll need a PML Burn permit. It's easy to get. Just go to the PML Administration building or the main gate to pick up your permit and an instructional video. We ask you to watch the 23 minute video and comply with the best practice suggestions you'll see there. If everyone burns properly, we won't have any complaints of smokey neighborhoods.

Fire Safety Seminar

Even though you don't need to take a class to get a PML Burn Permit, we offered 2 seminars at the Lake Lodge and 32 people elected to come out. I appreciated the sense of community. It feels like we're all working together to reduce fuels and eliminate smoky neighborhoods.

We don't have any other seminars planned, but if you watch the video and have any questions, feel free to call Dennis Pipal at (209) 962-1240.

Fire Safety Video Available

You may not be one who needs to burn yard debris, but you might be interested in watching the fire safety video we created. Section 1 has to do with how to landscape for fire safety, and Section 2 covers how to reduce fuels. Section 3 has to do with how to dispose of unwanted debris and includes techniques on how to "burn safe and burn clean". But if you don't burn, who cares?

Stop by the admin building or main gate to pick up your free DVD. And again, if you have any questions feel free to call Dennis Pipal at (209) 962-1240.

Let It Be- A New Culture at Pine Mountain Lake

For decades some of our neighbors have had a fall tradition of raking up wet leaves in the fall and setting them on fire, which is one of the reasons we have smoky neighborhoods. One of the new concepts we've been promoting is the idea that we leave them on the ground. The idea is to use the leaves to help avoid soil erosion during the rainy season and act as mulch to create nutrients for your trees. In the spring, when the fire season approaches, if you feel you have too much material on the ground, you can rake it up and haul it to the compost pile.

Greenbelt "Jump Start Program" - Year 4 of 5

We started our "Jump Start" program in 2008. The plan was to hire a contractor to bring in heavy duty mastication equipment and rapidly reduce the amount of fuels loading our greenbelts. Once that was done, we could ask our maintenance department to maintain the areas over time. Tom Moffit, our maintenance manager, has a new "mini-masticator" that the staff is using to do maintenance. We finished our greenbelts areas in 2009 and spent 2010 working part of Units 14 and 16.

We are now in the process of preparing a budget recommendation for 2011. Rick Whybra reports we are ahead of schedule. My thanks to Rick and Tom for doing an excellent job managing this project.

Curbside Pickup Program Curbed

Because the Fire Abatement Team was looking for ways to make it easier for property owners to do their annual fuel reduction work, we investigated a curbside pickup program for yard debris. We wanted to look at a service where we'd have a contractor come by 2 times week during the winter months to pick up tree limbs and other brush.

We struggled with the lack of data (what would the demand be) and a potential cost of \$42,000. And we could not come up with a practical plan to deal with leaves and pine needles. We looked at the responses from

our Property Owner Survey and found that most of us are already taking our debris to the compost pile.

With all these considerations we've decided not to pursue the curbside pickup program at this time. Without a good solid plan in place, we don't want to risk a budgetary impact, again respecting a very important consideration for all of us.

PML Property Owners Attend Fire Safety Seminar

In my daily duties as an enforcement officer nothing is more challenging than hearing and responding to complaints about other people's pets, namely dogs. Our Rules and Regulations are very clear when it comes to a pet Owner's responsibility.

Article VIII, Section 6 of our Association's CC&R's tackles the Household Pet issue and an Owner's responsibility to manage their animal's

care, maintenance and control. Sub section (b) is the section at issue in many of these complaints. This section states "Dogs shall only be allowed on the Common Area when they are leashed and otherwise under supervision and restraint of their Owners."

Having dogs running loose in our neighborhood creates a lot of frustration. There are safety concerns first and foremost as some dogs have an aggressive nature when confronted with people they are unfamiliar with. They can also attack other dogs being walked on a leash by their Owner. Needless to say, an Owner's first responsibility is to be in control of their animal at all times and allowing them to roam the neighborhood is unacceptable.

Nuisance barking is another common complaint. This conduct is covered under Article VIII, Section 4 under the

title of Prohibition of Noxious Activities. While this is a catch-all section for many types of unacceptable conduct, it specifically notes that..."no Owner shall permit noise, including, but not limited to, barking dogs...to emanate from an Owner's Lot or from activities within the Common Area, which would reasonably disturb any other Owner's

or tenant's enjoyment of his or her Lot or Common Area."

Tuolumne County Animal Control regulations address Animal Nuisance in section 6.04.360 where it states "No person shall own, keep, harbor or maintain any dog or puppy within the unincorporated area of the County that barks, howls, bays, or whines for longer than thirty (30) minutes at a time."

I honestly don't know how a dog Owner can allow their dog to bark for ten minutes, let alone thirty minutes at a time. Sometimes this is a result of the dog being at home alone and the Owner is unaware of its behavior. In this scenario, there are products on the market which will train your dog to not bark incessantly while you are away from home. These products can also be used by a neighbor to help train a neighborhood dog from barking continuously. Thorough investigation of these products and their success rate should be a caveat for any buyer.

Being sensitive to your neighbor is important whether you are a dog Owner or the non-Owner neighbor. For non-Owners, keep in mind that dogs will bark at passersby and other animals but the barking is usually short-lived. And Owners, keep in mind that your neighbor can accept some barking but

that they expect you as an Owner to do everything in your power to prevent your dog from being a nuisance to the neighborhood.

Last but not least is the "poop" issue. I am reminded of one association's board of directors who decided to have all dogs DNA tested so they could determine who the offending dog was and supposedly have it banned from the community. This idea was quickly aborted when they found out a special assessment would be needed to handle the cost for testing. But this example shows how emotionally charged this issue can be.

This issue is generally handled by Article VIII, Section 6 (c) where it states, "Each person bringing or keeping a pet on the Properties shall be solely responsible for the conduct of the Owner's pet and also fits into Article VIII, Section 4 – Prohibition of Noxious

Activities where offensive activities are prohibited.

I have heard the argument that wild animals do this all the time. What's the big deal? It comes down to a matter of control. If we could control the Canada geese we wouldn't have that problem either. If you take your dog off your premises to poop, maybe that's because you don't want that stuff on your property. Then...why would we want it on the Common Area or another's property?

The truth is, the world is divided into pet Owners and everyone else. Those without pets will never understand why the other group wants an animal living with them. We all live in this great community together and a little compassion going both ways will go a long way to a peaceful coexistence. As for me, I'll be refereeing those occasional disputes among neighbors...and their "furry friends."

We had three tournaments in August. Here are the results:



Shades of Green

Summer has come and gone for 2010. What wonderful temperatures we experienced for most of it. The cool season grasses require less irrigation and we have used about 10% less water this season than last.

For September and October we will be aerating all areas of the course and applying soil conditioners as our soil samples suggest. While playing and you see areas of thin turf, just look nearby and you see healthy turf and the same sprinkler waters the entire area and it is difficult to understand. The soil under the grass is not all the same and the types of grass are also different. When aerating we get much needed air to the roots and also gives the water that might get stuck in the thatch a chance to move through the

soil and allows the area to dry out a little quicker. The areas of thin turf need this process done more than twice a year as we try to change the profile of these thin areas. Please remember that during your round and we are aerating or verticuting, that our goal is to improve playing conditions and make your course a little more enjoyable to play each year.

Thank you for your patience while we waited for a new pump for the fountain on #1. The old one failed and we installed the new one as soon as we received it.

Have a great autumn of golf, play as often as you can and enjoy the beauty that the season gives us. WE WILL GET THOSE LEAVES PICKED UP AS SOON AS WE CAN.



roadways. Some areas have well maintained property owner's landscaping, some are road embankments, maybe a drainage ditch, and with many sections, the landscaping is the natural combination of brush and trees. The PML Maintenance Department has an easement along these roadways, the utility companies have easements, and there may even be a drainage easement, drainage intake, or drainage protection areas there, too. Your home has a driveway that crosses this area, and connects with the roadway, this is the driveway apron. This area between the property pins and the road easement is the property owner's exclusive use common area, the road frontage of your property.

The responsibilities with this exclusive use common property rest primarily with the property owner. The roads

and the road shoulders are the responsibility of PMLA. Trees may be limbed, and brush removed, that is creating visibility and clearance problems along the roadway; this is an ongoing task, and continues throughout the year.

The Maintenance Department follows a careful lot by lot respect of properties and their frontage improvements. We do our best to not be invasive, nor do we wish to remove any property improvements. Many of our property owners have had personal visits by PML Staff to discuss drainage fixes, driveway aprons, embankment treatments, seasonal fire abatement work, hardscape projects, landscape projects, tree removals, barrier placement, curbing, and sign placement. Some problems are an easy cure, some are complex. Our goal is to keep these road shoulders and frontage properties well maintained, and safe.

This is a wonderful community; we will keep it distinct and as naturally aesthetic as possible. It is a joint effort, and let us all respect some basic rules.


- · When mowing the weeds and grasses, cut them all the way to the road pavement.
- · Keep your ornamental plants away from the traveled portions of the road and shoulders.
- · Respect the vehicle traffic by keeping personal signs and barriers set back from the roadway.
- · Secure hardscape materials to the property, keeping them from falling onto the roadway.
- · Driveway aprons are to be properly attached to the roadway, maintaining the road drainage grading, and must always keep the snow plow road edge unobstructed.
- · Traffic signs are placed in accordance with traffic safety; please do not

remove them for any reason.

· The improper placement of lights, reflectors, and markers can be a hazard to drivers

The Maintenance Department will be performing streets maintenance tasks from now through the rainy season. They will be doing roadside brush work, embankment grading, tree trimming, drainage, culverts, curbing, and asphalt repair work in Units 2, 7, and 8. Embankment work has been completed on some of the busiest sections of Pine Mountain Drive. The grading will aid drainage and keep soil and loose material from washing onto the roadway. Traffic sign placements will be upgraded before the winter season.



October 2010 Supervisor Article BY JOHN GRAY

You would think that writing just one article a month would be an easy task. I wished I would have paid more attention in the one and only journalism class I took over 40 years ago. I struggle each month to come up with something that is meaningful and newsworthy a month from when the article is actually published. The process that I go through is one of total frustration. A brilliant idea, or so it seems at the time, pops into my head. I write a couple of pages, read it and cast it aside. It usually doesn't make the grade because of poor grammar, too many harsh words not fit for the general public's eyes and

most often appears just to be whining. It's not that there aren't good things happening in our County, I'm just like most everyone else. It's really easy to dwell on the negative and be critical of everything that did not go exactly as planned. Yes, like most everyone else, I want the outcome of every decision to be perfect. I want my way because I'm usually always right; just ask those closest to me. So after nearly two years in office I'm going to make a pledge that I will do my best to stop the whining, but not until after I take one passing shot at our state legislators.

As I write this article, California is now 69 days into the fiscal year without a state budget, the second longest delay in state history. The longest was in 2008 when the Legislature acted on September 19 and the Governor signed the budget on September 23. This legislature appears to want to be number one. A solution that many have come up with is no budget; no pay check. It makes a lot of sense to

Communication between government and the people is of paramount importance. If there's one thing that I want to accomplish during my term, it is to provide as much information as possible on what's going on in county government. I know from experience that face to face communication is always best but, as we all know, it's impossible to achieve - so we rely on local media. There are numerous monthly periodicals, local radio stations, The Union Democrat newspaper and MyMotherLode.com available and all are good resources where one can go to find out about what's happening in the neighborhood. When I'm away and not able to be in the front line, I always use those resources to help keep me informed on what happening locally. Often I hear people railing about something that the Board of Supervisors has done and that the public was not properly informed...If you want to really know, you have to be proactive. Use the resources available. Start with reviewing the county web page on a regular basis. Attend Board and committee meetings. Your Board of supervisors sit on over 50 individual committees that meet on a regular basis with most all of those meetings "open to the public". If something is really bugging you, call me. If I can't give you an answer I will do my best to find someone that can. Sounds like

ing, Agricultural Commissioner Vicki Helmar presented the "Tuolumne County 2009 Tuolumne County Crop Report." The 2009 value is estimated at \$20,215,400, a 24.6% decrease from the 2008 value of \$26,831,100. The timber industry was hit especially hard in 2009. Production values from public and private forestlands dropped

number of board feet harvested and a 43.5% in the price per board foot were the elements of the decline. Timber receipts from this land were the lowest since 1981.

Why such a decline? The answer is twofold. We can blame the economy for some of the impact but the real problem is our inability to agree on how to manage our forest. According to information provided by the Sierra Nevada Conservancy, the Sierra Nevada Region is California's principal watershed and the origin of 65% of the state's developed water supply.

The Sierra Nevada Region serves as one of the state's premiere recreation and tourism destinations for more than 50 million visitor days each year; is used to provide between one third and one half of the state's annual timber harvest; produces nearly three-quarters of the state's hydroelectric power; is home to two-thirds of the state's bird and mammal species, half of the state's plant life, and more than 600,000 humans. Pretty significant resource, to say the least, and all could be at risk if we do not develop a plan to manage the resource to its fullest. All sides can agree that much of the forestlands are in ecologically unhealthy condition, including public lands managed by the federal govern-

We seem to be content to watch the forest burn in massive amounts instead of harvesting the excess biomass before it has a chance to burn. By being proactive we would protect our valuable forest and create jobs along the way helping the local economies. By using forest health as the primary goal, all sides of the management controversy would benefit.

On September 19th and 20th Supervisor Teri Murrision, CAO Craig Pedro and myself will be traveling to Trinity County to meet with regional forester Randy Moore to discuss forest management and fire protection issues. It will be a "boots on the ground" meeting in the forest that will give those that attend the opportunity to discuss the issues with the examples in front of us. Maybe we can find a solution in the forest instead of the courtroom. I will report back next month.

Poached Pears in Strawberry Port Reduction RECIPE PROVIDED BY TOM KNOTH AND PAULA MARTELL

We are not big pear fans, but this recipe transforms the pear into an incredible dessert. The title of the recipe makes it sound like it belongs on the menu of an upscale restaurant...and it does. But the great thing is that this recipe is very simple. We recommend using a good drinking port such as Mt. Brow's, which I think is carried by Marval Market, and I know is carried by Cost-u-less in Sonora. Mt Brow Winery itself is located in Sonora. Garnish this dish with mint leaves and/or strawberries and cream and enjoy!

1 lb package of frozen strawberries, thawed and pureed 2 cups water 1/2 cup sugar

1 1/2 tsp vanilla

- 1 Tbsp lemon juice
- 1 Tbsp ground cinnamon
- 8 ripe pears (any type) pealed and cored
- 2 cups good quality Port (or other sweet) wine

mint leaves for garnish

Combine first 6 ingredients in 4 qt pot. Bring to boil. Add pears and simmer, covered, for 30 minutes. They should be tender enough that a pairing knife slides in easy, but not mushy. Remove pears. Boil liquid, uncovered, until reduced by 1/3 (about 15 minutes). Add Port and boil for 15 minutes.

While liquid is reducing, prepare pears for serving/presentation: Slice each pair in half and remove pit. Cut halves into smaller pieces if desired.



To serve, spoon sauce around each pear and garnish with mint leaves. Serves 8

Winterize Your Home


In early December 2009, our community experienced a cold snap that produced over 75 water line breaks in less than 48 hours. This resulted in the loss of over 3 million gallons of water. Virtually all the water line breaks were on the customers' side of the water meter. Nearly all of these breaks were at vacation homes or homes in which the owners were off the hill for the winter. The one thing they all forgot to do was to turn off their water at the main water shut off valve. In one incident last year, a customer received a \$4,000 water bill for 337,000 gallons of water that flowed from a broken pipe through their property. Another claimed \$100,000

in damages due to a water line break inside their home. Please don't let this happen to you.

As we move from summer to winter, we need to pay particular attention to our home water systems. First, if you haven't done it yet this year, you should have your pressure regulator checked by a plumber. This should be an annual homeowner task. With the mountainous topography that makes our area beautiful comes the risk of water pressure fluctuations. This is why virtually every house in our service area has a pressure regulator. It is usually located where the water service enters the house (often in the basement). The pressure regulator helps protect your water pipes

and appliances from high water pressure.

If you live off the hill and don't make it up to Groveland much during the fall and winter months, or if you go RV cruising for extended periods of time in the winter, you should make sure that your water is turned off at the master valve, which is generally located where the water pipe enters the house. Better yet, have a valve installed on your side of your water meter and keep it turned off while you are away. After closing your master valve,

open a water tap (preferably the lowest one in your home) so that water doesn't freeze and break a pipe inside your home. Finally, drain your irrigation system. Many of the water line breaks were in drip irrigation systems that froze and ruptured.

Please remember that anything that occurs on your side of the water meter is your responsibility. If you have questions about winterizing your house, please give our office a call at 209-962-7161 x10, or go on line at http://www.gcsd.org for more information.


In September we look forward to hosting Groveland women at their Yosemite Gateway Women's Retreat. It's nice to have our friends and neighbors use the wonderful facilities.



Groveland Yosemite Gateway Museum Gold Rush Activities Remembered

One very interesting exhibit in our Museum is the Arrastra. This was equipment used in processing gold ore. It was an ore crushing device used on bold bearing ore. Flat bottomed drag stone was placed in a rock lined pit, connected to a center post by a long arm and pulled by a horse, a mule, or a human being. Ore placed between the stone floor and the drag stone was then crushed to coarse powder to produce slurry, then removed to sluices from which the gold was recovered. This procedure was followed until early in the 20th century when power machinery

became common.

This equipment had been located in Gentry Gulch but had been stolen in March, 1997. It was recovered in March, 1998 and was under the control of the Stanislaus National Forest - Groveland Ranger District until May, 2003 when title was transferred to our Museum. It is a most interesting exhibit.

A fun exhibit we have is that of various animal pelts, ten in all. Visitors are invited to touch the pelts and we have kids from age 5 to 95 doing so. Smiles, Smiles!!

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Yosemite National Park's 120th Birthday Party **Set For October 3rd**

The historic Hotel Charlotte and Dori's Tea Cottage on Highway 120 in Groveland, headquarters for Yosemite's 120th birthday celebrations, will host a reception on Sunday, October 3, 2010, beginning at 2:00 p.m. Festivities include unveiling of the historic town's "Celebrate Yosemite"

banners, created by Silicon Valley graphic artist, Patty Cimlov-Zahares, and "Happy Birthday, Yosemite" posters, created by Groveland artist, Christina Wilkinson. The ceremonial presentation and introduction of dignitaries will take place at 3:00 pm.


Dignitaries invited to attend the October 3 celebration include Don Neubacher, superintendent of Yosemite National Park; Mike Tollefson, president of Yosemite Conservancy and former superintendent of Yosemite; John Gray and Teri Murrison, Tuolumne County supervisors; Donna Sisson, Yosemite's chief of public outreach; Dan Jensen, president of DNC, Yosemite's concessionaire; James Nagle, Yosemite Chamber of Commerce president; Conrad Anker, famed Mount Everest Climber and Groveland native; and Shelton Johnson, Yosemite park ranger and star of Ken Burns' PBS series, "The National Parks, America's Best Idea." Goose, the dog duly voted in as Groveland's honorary mayor, will make a special appearance.

Yosemite National Park celebrates its 120th birthday as a national park on October 1, 2010. Lobbied for by John Muir and publisher Robert Underwood Johnson, the United States Congress officially declared 1,500 square miles of lands surrounding Yosemite Valley and the Mariposa Grove of Big Trees as the nation's second national park on October 1, 1890. (Yellowstone was the first.) Previously, in 1864, Abraham Lincoln had already convinced Congress to set aside Yosemite Valley and the Mariposa Grove for preservation and public use, although for many years the "Yosemite Grant," as it was called, was managed as a California State Park. Finally, in 1906, Yosemite National Park incorporated the Yosemite Grant within its

The pioneer town of Groveland is situated on California Highway 120, Yosemite's scenic northern entrance, which was one of the original stagecoach roads into the park. Today, Highway 120, open year round, is the most direct route to Yosemite from San Francisco and all of northern California. Groveland, once a gold rush town, boomed during the building of Yosemite's Hetch Hetchy dam, which was John Muir's final and ill-fated campaign for scenic preservation. The town still sports many picturesque buildings from that era, including the original jail, Iron Door Saloon, Hotel Charlotte, and Dori's Tea Cottage.

The Hotel Charlotte was built in 1921, and operated by Charlotte De Ferrari, to house workers from the Hetch Hetchy dam project. Later, Charlotte combined her hotel with the restaurant next door, creating the structure that today is the charming Hotel and Café Charlotte. Dori's Tea Cottage, built in 1935, was once the home of Groveland's first female postmaster, Minnie Ferretti, and is now a picturesque boutique and bistro featuring a pleasant outdoor patio with one of the several murals adorning the town. Hotel Charlotte and Dori's Tea Cottage are situated mid-town in Groveland and are the headquarters for Highway 120's celebration of Yosemite's 120th birthday.

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The Planet Jupiter

October, 2010 is a great month to write about the planet Jupiter because it shines prominently in our night time sky. Jupiter is easily visible to the unaided eye, meaning you don't need a telescope. The Sun, Moon, and naked eye visible planets all travel approximately the same ecliptic path in the sky from our point of view on Earth. Because our solar system is almost flat - it forms a plane. This plane is called the ecliptic of our solar system. Look for Jupiter, as well as other bright planets like Venus, Saturn and Mars, to travel the ecliptic of our solar system throughout the year. Just remember the path that the Sun and Moon travels in the sky as a guide to look for planets, like Jupiter.

In October, 2010, Jupiter will appear above the southeastern horizon shortly after the sky gets dark after sunset. It is easy to spot because it will appear as the brightest "star" in the sky. I say "star", but remember Jupiter is a planet and has no source of light of its own. What we see as a "star" is the light of our sun reflected off of Jupiter – much like how we see the moon because it reflects the light of our sun. There are several internet web sites that show the current posi-

tion of Jupiter (and the other planets) in the sky.

Jupiter is the fifth planet from the Sun and is the largest one in the solar system. It is the fourth brightest object in the sky (after the Sun, the Moon and Venus). It has been known since prehistoric times as a bright "wandering star". If Jupiter were hollow, more than one thousand Earths could fit inside. It also contains more matter than all of the other planets combined. Colorful latitudinal bands, which are atmospheric clouds and storms, illustrate Jupiter's dynamic weather systems. The wind speed in the upper atmosphere of Jupiter is believed to exceed 400 MPH.

Jupiter is a "gas" planet. Like our Sun, it is composed mainly of hydrogen and helium. Other "gas" planets include Saturn, Uranus, and Neptune. The gas planets do not have solid surfaces; their gaseous material simply gets denser with depth. What we see when looking at these "gas" planets with a telescope are the tops of clouds high in their atmospheres. The cloud patterns on Jupiter can change within hours or days. The vivid colors seen in Jupiter's clouds are probably the result of subtle chemical reactions in Jupiter's atmosphere. The colors correlate with the cloud's altitude - blue lowest, followed by browns and whites, with reds highest. Sometimes we see the lower layers through holes in the upper ones.

Jupiter is just about as large in diameter as a gas planet can be. If

more material were to be added, it would be compressed by gravity such that the overall radius would increase only slightly. A star can be larger only because of its internal (nuclear) heat source which pushes out from the center of the star in a tug-of-war against gravity. Jupiter would have to be at least 80 times more massive than its current mass to become a star.

Jupiter has rings like Saturn's, but they are much fainter and smaller. They were totally unexpected and were only discovered in 1979 when two of the Voyager 1 scientists insisted that it was at least worth a quick look to see if any rings might be present. Everyone else thought that the chance of finding anything was nil, but there they were. Unlike Saturn's, Jupiter's rings are dark. They're probably composed of very small grains of rocky material. Also, unlike Saturn's rings, they seem to contain no ice. Ice

reflects sunlight and makes Saturn's rings much easier to see.

As described in previous articles, most images that I take are long exposures. Imaging bright planets like Jupiter or Saturn is an exception. Because these planets are so bright, long exposure times are not needed. What is needed are clear skies with minimal atmospheric turbulence (for a clear, crisp image) and high magnification. This can be accomplished with the use of a webcam that has been modified to replace the eyepiece of a telescope. The advantage of shooting video with a webcam, instead of still images with a camera, is that you can capture many (often 10 to 30) frames per second. Because our atmosphere is constantly changing, that is the air that you look through when you view with a telescope, brief periods of exceptionally calm conditions can be captured with this webcam video technique. Then, using computer software, the best



(most sharp) frames from the video can be stacked to form still images that rival the best images taken from professional telescopes and camera equipment only a decade ago.

The image shown here, taken from our home in Pine Mountain Lake, is an "aligned and stacked" image from the best 256 of 607 frames of video. Very little other postprocessing was done to this image other than some sharpening. Many of Jupiter's atmospheric bands are clearly visible. I always enjoy looking at Jupiter through my telescope and sharing this giant "gas" planet with others, because the atmospheric bands are so easy to see and they change from night to night. Another great feature of observing Jupiter is that most nights at least a couple of its moons are easy to spot orbiting the planet. One of Jupiter's moons (the moon "Io") can be seen in this

image - it looks like a small light colored "speck" at about the 9 o'clock position relative to Jupiter.

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
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Contractor Checklist for Homeowners

CHECK OUT YOUR CONTRACTOR

- ☐ Did you contact the Contractors State License Board (CSLB) to check the status of the contractor's license? Contact the CSLB at 1-800-321-CSLB (2752) or visit our Web site: www.cslb.ca.aov.
- Did you get at least three local references from the contractors you are considering?
- ☐ Did you call them and see the work the contractor completed?

BUILDING PERMITS

- ☐ Will the contractor get any needed permits before the work starts?
- ☐ Are the permit fees included in the contract?

CHECK OUT THE CONTRACT

- ☐ Did you read and do you understand your contract?
- ☐ Does the 3-day right to cancel a contract apply to you?
- ☐ Does the contract tell you when work will start and end?
- ☐ Does the contract include a detailed description of the work to be done, the material to be used, and equipment to be installed? This description should include a plan and scale drawing showing the shape, size, dimensions and specific cations. It should include brand names, model numbers, quantities and colors. Specific descriptions now will prevent disputes later.
- ☐ Are you required to pay a down payment? If you are, the down payment should never be more than 10% of the contract price or \$1,000, whichever is less.
- ☐ Is there a schedule of payments? If there is, you should pay only as work is completed and not before.
- Did your contractor give you a "Notice to Owner," a warning notice describing liens and ways to prevent them? Even if you pay your contractor, a lien can be placed on your home by unpaid laborers, subcontractors, or

material suppliers. A lien can result in you paying twice or, in some cases, losing your home in a foreclosure. Also check the "Notice to Owner" for ways to protect yourself.

- ☐ Did you know changes or additions to your contract must all be in writing?
- ☐ Putting changes in writing reduces the possibility of a later dispute.
