

Two directors have been


President's Message

Electric Golf Cart Storage Facility

The Electric Golf Cart building project continues to be on schedule. Plum Construction finalized the engineering and site survey and submitted the plans to the County for review and permitting.

Our staff met with Plum Construction to discuss the logistics for this project and to plan for temporary food service, cart parking and the mitigation of the overall construction impact to our golfing members and guests. Demolition of the old Cart Barn building is scheduled for the end of this month.


Security Cameras at Dunn Court

The new security cameras installed at Dunn Court have already been found to be a great deterrent to criminal activity. Our staff observed some suspicious individuals at night and dispatched Patrol to investigate. The individuals fled the scene when our staff arrived.

These new security cameras are in response to multiple cases of theft and vandalism on the Lake and in and around Dunn Court. The cameras will be monitored real-time by our Department of Safety staff and act as a deterrent to criminal activity.

We continue to receive reports of criminal activity in areas around the Lake and Dam. We have stepped up patrols of these areas and have been working with law enforcement to catch the perpetrators. If you witness unusual or suspicious activity in any area of PML, please call the Main Gate immediately. If you witness a crime, please call the Sheriff's Office right



Budget Process

The annual budget process has begun with the management team meeting to discuss possible recommendations to the Board. This month's Board meeting is scheduled for September 11th and one of the agenda items is the proposed 2011 Amenities Fee Schedule. All members that are interested are welcome to attend. The meeting will be held at the Lake Lodge and start at 9 a.m.

After the Board discusses the fee structure for next year, the next step in the process is the annual budget meeting. This meeting will be held on October 23rd at the Lake Lodge and start at 8 a.m. This is the day-long, comprehensive meeting where the individual amenity managers present their budget proposals to the Board for review and discussion. We encourage all members to attend. During this process, the Budget and Finance Committee and the individual Board members are provided copies of the proposed budget information for review and comment.

Once the final changes have been made to the 2011 Budget draft from the October meeting, the Board approves the Budget at the November Board meeting. This year, the November meet-

ing is scheduled for the 13th and will be held at the Lake Lodge. The starting time is scheduled for 9 a.m.



PMLA Money Matters BY KEN SPENCER, ASSOCIATION CONTROLLER

By the time you read this summer will be entering its final stages. Labor Day is upon us and schools have started back up again. Soon the chill will be in the air and thoughts of the coming holidays and the return of winter weather will enter our thoughts. This subtle change in the weather also signals the start of another season unrelated to temperature or precipitation. September is the beginning of a three month process (some would call it an ordeal) that results in the creation of the Association's Budget for 2011.

Unlike any time in recent memory PML's Budget has been the topic of a great deal of discussion and debate over the last few months. I personally am glad to see an increased level of interest in this time consuming, critical and complex process. The creation of our annual budget lays out the blueprint for how we operate in the coming year as well as establishing the level of assessment for the following 12 months. As such the budget affects ALL property owners to one degree or another, regardless of whether they spend 365 days a year here or rarely, if ever, venture "up the hill".

I am a great believer in the right of all people to have an opinion on any topic and express that opinion freely.

However, I also believe that it serves any discussion well for an individual to be fully informed on a topic before engaging in the debate or discussion, and certainly prior to forming any strong opinion on the issues. Part of this information gathering process is to read any facts available on the subject, talk to other, well-informed people and ask questions in order to get the full and complete picture.

Over the course of the next 6-7 weeks the members of the management team, the Budget & Finance Committee and your Board of Directors will be working hard to craft the budget for 2011. This will entail countless hours of research, analysis, study and discussion on the appropriate level of fees to be charged next year, the nature, purpose and level of expenditures as well as the status and funding of our critical Reserve Fund.

A budget for a homeowner's association like PML, is different than most typical "business" organizations, since we are a non-profit and the majority of our "revenue" comes from our "shareholders" (you property owners). All of us in the management team are acutely aware of this and strive to create reasonable, realistic and achievable targets in our budgets each year.

The initial operational budgets of all amenities/departments are scrutinized several times by the B&F Committee, the Board, the General Manager and myself. We all constantly strive to ensure that we receive the maximum benefit for every dollar we spend and reduce unnecessary costs wherever possible, while still providing the level of service that you have come to expect and deserve. Revenue projections are questioned and efforts are made to increase them wherever possible. The justification for capital purchases is explored in depth and Reserve Expenditures are reviewed and analyzed for appropriateness.

This is not a process that occurs only once, as several iterations of the budget are developed prior to the report that is presented annually at the open Board meeting in October. This is where you come in. The meeting in October is an all day affair and covers every aspect of the budget. Presentations are made by each manager explaining the reasoning behind their proposed budget. Every line item is open for discussion, review and questioning. The meeting takes all day and is open to all property owners. This is the time and place to get the facts and listen to the discussion concerning

the Association's financial plan for the coming year. As in all Board meetings, your comments and concerns are welcomed, listened to and appreciated.

The Board has the difficult task of absorbing all this information and making a final decision on the budget. The Board represents you, the property owner, in these discussions. The management team works hard to balance the conflicting demands of cost control and high service level. We want your input, we value your concerns and we care about your opinion.

So, circle the date, Saturday, October 23 and plan to be at the Lake Lodge to be part of the process of determining the financial future of Pine Mountain Lake. Your management team will be there, the Board will be there, some of your fellow property owners will be there. Will you?

Maintaining Road Frontage

The Pine Mountain Lake Maintenance Department performs work on our roads throughout the year. The PMLA Streets Crew conducts various forms of maintenance and construction. The work varies from tree trimming and removal, brush trimming and removal, shoulder work, embankment work, drainage repairs, pavement repairs, curbing, and sign placement. An area of concern came to surface during this season's fire abatement work. The property owners road frontage, where the property meets the pavement.

Properties do not border directly to the road pavement. Your property pins may be set back anywhere from 10 to 20 feet from the roadway pavement. There is a roadway easement, and an exclusive use common area. But whoa, not that simple is it? Who is supposed to take care of this? What will happen to my beautiful landscaping? And whose property is this?

Traveling about the association, we see a variety of landscape treatments along the curb-line of many roadways. Some areas have well maintained property owner's landscaping, some are road embankments, maybe a drainage ditch, and with many sections, the landscaping is the natural combination of brush and trees. The PML Maintenance Department has an easement along these roadways, the utility companies have easements, and there may even be a drainage easement, drainage intake, or drainage protection areas there, too. Your home has a driveway that crosses this area, and connects with the roadway, this is the driveway apron. This area between the property pins and the road easement is the property owner's exclusive use common area, the road frontage of

your property.

The responsibilities with this exclusive use common property rest primarily with the property owner. The roads and the road shoulders are the responsibility of PMLA. Trees may be limbed, and brush removed, that is creating visibility and clearance problems along the roadway; this is an ongoing task, and continues throughout the year.

The Maintenance Department follows a careful lot by lot respect of properties and their frontage improvements. We do our best to not be invasive, nor do we wish to remove any property improvements. Many of our property owners have had personal visits by PML Staff to discuss drainage fixes, driveway aprons, embankment treatments, seasonal fire abatement work, hardscape projects, landscape projects, tree removals, barrier placement, curbing, and sign placement.

Some problems are an easy cure, some are complex. Our goal is to keep these road shoulders and frontage properties well maintained, and safe.

This is a wonderful community; we will keep it distinct and as naturally aesthetic as possible. It is a joint effort, and let us all respect some basic rules.

When mowing the weeds and grasses, cut them all the way to the road pavement.

· Keep your ornamental plants away from the traveled portions of the road and shoulders.

Respect the vehicle traffic by keeping personal signs and barriers set back from the roadway.

• Secure hardscape materials to the property, keeping them from falling onto the roadway.

• Driveway aprons are to be properly attached to the roadway, maintaining the road drainage grading, and must always keep the snow plow road edge unobstructed.

• Traffic signs are placed in accordance with traffic safety; please do not remove them for any reason.

• The improper placement of lights, reflectors, and markers can be a hazard to drivers

The Maintenance Department will be performing streets maintenance tasks from now through the rainy season. They will be doing roadside brush work, embankment grading, tree trimming, drainage, culverts, curbing, and asphalt repair work in Units 2, 7, and 8. Embankment work has been completed on some of the busiest sections of Pine Mountain Drive. The grading will aid drainage and keep soil and loose material from washing onto the roadway. Traffic sign placements will be upgraded before the winter season.

Shades of Green

On September 13th 2010 at eight o'clock in the morning our annual U.S.G.A. consulting visit is scheduled. Any members that would like to participate and ask questions as to why we do things the way we do, and are tired of my responses, are welcome.

Our late July greens aeration went well and in a short period of time the greens grew in very well. The golf maintenance staff would like to thank you for your patience and will be asking for it again for the next few summers to keep the greens happy and healthy.

Every year I hear statements that we can not wait for winter to allow things to dry out! I certainly agree that areas become saturated and at times too wet. The course is wet in the mornings and by afternoon the "spots" of turf, or localized dry spots, are wilting to the point of no return. Not only are these spots unsightly and not healthy, the area then can fill in with weeds. That is why we spot fertilize, spot aerate and use a wetting agent, and topdress to improve the ability to wet the soil.

We have multiple types of turf throughout the course. Most are considered cool season grasses that need more water when it gets 85 degrees and up and then the Bermuda grass which loves the heat. Trying to irrigate these varieties with one sprinkler head, and it happens to be at the bottom of a hill or in a swale, and you begin to see that it is not as easy as it would appear. Then you get three days of above 95 degrees and then it drops 10 degrees and you have more challenges to keep those areas playable. We have 1730 sprinkler heads and adjustments are made daily. We observe and get feedback from our operators and membership at times. Any and all information is appreciated.

If you have any questions please call 962-8610 and speak with us or leave a message and your call will be



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returned. Please participate in the U.S.G.A. visit as it is always informative and educational.

September projects are aerating our course wall to wall with a fall application of Gypsum on the fairways. Greens aeration is September 27th and 28th.

Rare Duck Spotted on Pine Mountain Lake!

You may have spotted it too, if you have been spending much time at the lake this summer. The Moto Moto is an 8 foot plywood sailboat, made completely of items collected from the garage, and a few trips to the hardware store.

PML resident, Eric Heim, built most of the boat last year and made the final touches this summer. The Puddleduck hit the water this July and has been spotted weekly ever since.

Wikipedia defines it as "the easiest sailboat in the world to build". It is an 8 foot long racing sailboat, so it doesn't need to be registered with the State of California. It's hull is a simple box, usually built out of plywood. Free building plans are available on line at PDRacer. com. If you've ever had the desire to build your own sailboat, the Puddleduck is a simple design to begin with and offers a great family experience.

Eric estimates that the cost of building this boat can range between \$100 and \$500, depending on what materials you have on hand. Eric built the boom out of the telescoping handle of an old broken tree saw. Other

unique features of this boat include batons made from old fishing poles, a tight sealing compartment lid made from the top of an empty plastic paint container, and zip ties to fasten the sail to the mast. Eric's wife made the sail from material purchased on ebay, and his kids helped sand, paint, and name the boat (Moto Moto was a character in the Disney film "Matagascar", a rather large hippo with great attitude...memorable for great quotes, such as "name's so nice, gotta say it twice").

Now that Eric has mastered the sailing of this little vessel, the rest of the family is receiving sailing lessons. The gracious folks involved with the PML sail club, "The Windjammers", invited Eric to join the club and have offered helpful advice. Improvements continue to be made to the Moto Moto and sailing speed has improved dramatically!


This month we are doing a profile on Jim Goodrich, one of the founding members of the PML Aero Club, and Board members. Jim is currently our Board Secretary. Listed below is Jim's Bio:

"In 1969 I discovered flying at UC San Diego, which had a soaring club that took advantage of a WWII era glider strip that trained glider pilots for D-Day and the Far East Theater. We used a high-speed winch to launch our sailplanes over a 400-foot high cliff that overlooked the Pacific. To solo you had to be able to land on the beach below the landing strip... which had its own set of distractions, world famous Blacks Beach, which was clothing optional. You also had to get used to landing on the 1,200foot-long strip with a 20-knot tail wind. I went on to earn my private pilot's license-glider, while at UCSD. But, as fate would have it, after college, a new bride and a new career overseas took me away from flying for 30 years.

Then we ended up in Vancouver, WA in 2001 where I joined the local soaring club. I soon became the

maintenance manager for 10 sailplanes and 5 airplanes. We rebuilt one glider and one Piper tow plane. I earned my commercial glider rating. A small band of commercial pilots and I gave rides for the club, which earned over \$35,000 each year for the club. I was logging over 20 hours a week. While there, with an airport next door, I got my singleengine land rating. I had access to a Piper J3 and a Taylor Craft L2. Of my over 500 hours, nearly 90 percent is in low-powered (or no-powered) tail-draggers. I was just getting ready to go after my single-engine seaplane rating when I moved to Groveland. I was hoping to continue my flying in Groveland, but the opportunity never arose until we formed the PML Aero Club. Now, I can fly whenever I want in our hot rod Cessna 172-we call it a Cessna 182 Lite because of its larger than stock engine. Finally, I'm back doing an activity that I truly love."





Hei Gung requires no special clothing or equipment. Wear something





Justin Woods, from Madera, is a camper with the Fresno youth group. All of his family is very involved in the search for a cure for muscular dystrophy. Justin has Duchene Muscular Dystrophy, a particular kind of progressive muscular dystrophy which occurs only in boys and is often fatal. Justin's dad created the Justin Woods Foundation to try to raise money for MDA camp and for research for a cure for this disease. Justin and his family and friends organize pancake breakfasts, sell fireworks and candy, put on sponsored walks and host weekly karaoke-for-a-cure nights.

This year Justin turned 18 and is now officially too old for the Fresno MDA Youth camp, but he is such a part of the group that they invited him to come as their official photographer.

This summer, Anthony Lewis, son of Jerry Lewis, was the special guest at Riley's Tavern in Madera to support Karaoke for a Cure, an ongoing fundraiser for the Justin Woods Foundation. Jerry Lewis has spearheaded fund-raising telethons annually since the 1950s and is the national chairman of the Muscular Dystrophy Association.

On September 6, 2010, Justin's grandmother, Sandy Smith, will be on the Jerry Lewis Telethon doing whatever she can to help raise money for a cure and to help send these kids to the MDA Summer Camp. As she says, "for children with neuromuscular diseases, MDA Summer Camp is a magical place where barriers simply do not exist. Camp is the one-week of the year when these kids can just be kids and they finally feel included. At school, the mall, wherever they go they are usually left out of fun and games, but at MDA Summer Camp they can do everything!"

In August, we were pleased to host the third annual Adult Muscular Dystrophy reunion. This is a group of folks (with families and helpers) who met years ago at camp as children. They continue to get together for reunions and are thrilled to find a facility like Tuolumne Trails that suits their physical needs. They are a good indication of how important camp experiences are to children with special medical needs and how lasting the experience can be.



Only A Few Bricks Left For Veterans Memorial BY GEORGE ELDRIDGE

There are only about 200 bricks and a few pavers left to be purchased for the Veterans Memorial at the Veterans Affairs (VA) Medical Clinic on Mono Way in Sonora. According to Frank Smart, committee chair, "We hope to have all the bricks done by the dedication on September 11. We've been getting donations for several months, but now that it's coming down to the wire, they're starting to go quickly. So, if you've been procrastinating, now's the time to act."

The beginnings of the Memorial began many months ago when a committee of the Vietnam Veterans of America, Chapter 391 of Sonora met and planned a Veterans Memorial for the new VA Medical Clinic on Mono Way. Local artist Gereon Rios, also a Vietnam Veteran, presented a design to the committee and it was accepted. According to Rios, "This memorial is a great piece of art which will rival those in San Franciso, New York, Los Angeles, and other cities in America and it's a great tribute to our veterans." Thus far, over 1,000 bricks and pavers have been placed around the Memorial.

The Memorial will be dedicated and unveiled on September 11 beginning at 6:30 p.m. The evening was chosen in order for everyone to see the Memorial with the lights lit showing the Memorial in its splendor. According to Rios, the design was conceived as a "Peacemaker" revolver cylinder. This was a weapon used during the late 1800s in the West and carried by lawmen. There are six stainless steel cylinders surrounding a main stainless steel cylinder which has a diameter of 2.5 feet. This inner cylinder is 5.75 feet high with the added American

eagle's talons on top. The flagpole rises from the center of the talons. Each service's shield is located in a 45-degree cutout on each of the six cylinders. Each service's motto is laser-cut into the metal and is backlit with each service's color. Rios will also be offering laser prints of the Memorial, signed and numbered.

John Bright, a committee member assisting Smart, said, "The pavers are great if you have two or three veterans in a family or a particular group or if you have more than four lines of information." The pavers have eight lines of 18 characters while the brick has four lines of 18 characters. The brick donation is \$50 and the paver is \$100. This is half what most other brick/paver fund-raisers are asking," he said. Bright urges people to act quickly as there are so few left. You can get forms at the Clinic or at the County Veteran Services Office in the old Tuolumne General Hospital. You can also get them on-line at www. VietnamVeterans391.org.

VVA Chapter 391 is the largest chapter in California and is 7th largest out of 650 in the entire country. For the past two biennial California VVA State Council Conventions, the chapter has been named Chapter of the Year for all they have done, which includes being the first and only Welcome Home Vietnam Veterans Parade in the U.S. Also in June, 2010 at the Convention, Chapter 391 was awarded Newsletter of the Year and Web Site of the Year for California. Black Oak Casino and the Tuolumne Band of Me-Wuk Indians were nominated by Chapter 391 to receive the Business Supporter of the Year Award which was presented to them in July.

Columbia College has purchased 5.9 acres of property in Calaveras County for the purpose of establishing a permanent presence in providing higher education opportunities to area residents. As part of the Measure E Bond Program, Columbia College purchased two (2) parcels of property, totaling 5.9 acres from the Calaveras County Office of Education for \$615,000. The property is located on Murphys Grade Road within the City of Angels Camp city limits and is currently undeveloped.

Dr. Joan Smith, Columbia College President, is pleased with the purchase, "This will be a great addition to Calaveras County for the College. We look forward to providing even more educational services to the area." Columbia College has maintained a presence in Calaveras County for a number of years serving area residents previously at the Glory Hole location. Currently, Columbia College offers a two-year degree pattern of classes at the Bret Harte High School campus.

In 2004, voters within the Yosemite Community College District ("YCCD") service area passed the Measure E Bond, which allotted funds to provide for the purchase of a Calaveras educational site. The purchase of this site is the first step to being able to offer expanded instructional and student services in Calaveras County. Planning for a permanent center on the site may now begin. "Today is just wonderful news for Calaveras County," says Pat Dean, YCCD Board of Trustees Chair who represents Tuolumne, portions of Calaveras and East Stanislaus Counties. "We can continue our mission of meeting the needs of our local students in the district. Providing a permanent presence in Calaveras County has been long in coming. Completing the process with the purchase of Calaveras County Office of Education land is a very big step in securing the educational opportunities that we can build upon in the future."



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Yosemite National Park Announces Public Meetings Regarding the Tuolumne River Plan

Yosemite National Park Superintendent Don Neubacher announces several public meetings regarding the Comprehensive Management Plan for the Tuolumne Wild and Scenic River (Tuolumne River Plan). The public meetings will take place at Parsons Memorial Lodge in Tuolumne Meadows on August 20, September 10, September 11, September 17, and September 18, 2010. All meetings will occur from 1:00 - 3:00 p.m.

In 1984, the Tuolumne River became a federally protected Wild and Scenic River. Yosemite National Park is currently drafting a management plan for the 54 miles of the Tuolumne River that flows through the park. The Tuolumne River Plan and Draft Environmental Impact Statement will be released for public comment in late 2010 or early 2011.

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2010 '49er Parade Grand Marshals – Feeding Groveland for OVER 75 Years BY PATTI BEAULIEU

When you add the years that our trio of Grand Marshals have been providing meals to Groveland, it totals at least 75 years. Ruben Bacci has been spearheading the Thanksgiving Day dinner since 1991 and cooking at the Rebekah Breakfast since 1985, Lil Dawson has been working at and/or running the Rebekah Breakfast, held the 1st Sunday of each month, since 1975 and Edith Gray has been the 'hostess with the most-est' at the Thanksgiving Dinner since 1991. These generous folks continue to volunteer their time and energy to these events, that are enjoyed by locals and visitors, month after month and year after year.

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Lil and her husband came from San Jose to Groveland for a visit in 1954. They loved the area, as we all do, looked at property and wanted to buy 5 acres. They ended up with 40 acres that they purchased in 1956. They built their home, which was near the Sugar Pine Ranch on Highway 120. Prior to moving here, they lived in San Jose where Lil retired from the Postal Service in 1973. She joined the Rebekahs when they moved here and started working the breakfast with Winnie Black, a long time resident of Big Oak Flat. Of all the tasks she's done at the breakfast - staff scheduling, bookkeeping, cooking, ordering, cleaning, setting up, storing supplies, etc. - she readily admits she was a waitress only 1 day. When she gave the last egg to the wrong customer, that ended her waitress days. Over the years, she's seen the prices change, the menu change and generations of people come in with kids of kids that have been coming for years. She credits all the people that volunteer there each week that help it run smoothly and Ruben for making some significant changes for the better. Fifteen years ago, you got over-easy eggs. Didn't matter how you wanted them, they came to you over-easy. They started taking orders for 'eggs your way' (within reason) and that made a big difference. She's seen how the program has grown over the years, as it used to serve about 50-60 and now each month they average 100-130 breakfasts.

Her favorite part is seeing all the 'regulars' and meeting people from all over the world who travel through, see the sign and stop. She rarely misses a month, and will continue to be a part of it as long as she can. She might have slowed down a tad, but she is still there each month, coordinating and handling all her duties. Days after this interview, Lil took a nasty fall while unloading the supplies for the August breakfast. It resulted in severe injuries, a hospital stay and quite a long recovery period. As of this writing, she is in San Jose near family. We wish her a full recovery and hope she'll be well enough to be in the parade, but if not, we know she'll be there in spirit.

Each month, you can find Ruben manning the flat top and cooking 'eggs your way' at the Breakfast. He's not a trained chef, he just loves to cook and has certainly mastered it. He was a postal carrier in Sonora and moved here in 1984 to become the Post Master in Big Oak Flat. He retired from that position in 2002. He was a member of Odd Fellows at the time and they were involved in the Breakfast. Since Odd Fellows and Rebekahs share the kitchen duties, they also share the profits, which enable them to award a Tioga scholarship each year as well as purchase the commercial refrigerator that is now in the Community Hall kitchen. At the breakfast he's known as the 'head honcho' and handles the kitchen with ease. He'll wander out and see the customers from time to time, but he's kept hopping calling the orders and cooking the eggs. He's even weathered some strange requests, such as a customer wanting their food on a certain colored plate. To get a sense of the enormity of this meal, each month he orders and picks up 30 lbs. of bacon, 25-30 dozen eggs, 40 lbs. of pancake mix and they serve over 350 cups of coffee. The kitchen staff consists of someone making pancakes, usually one of the Odd Fellows, and another making bacon, Ruben frying the eggs and another doing scrambled eggs. In addition, there are 3 or 4 waitresses, a bus person or 2, a ticket seller, clean up crew and Tioga High School kids doing the dishes. The only paid positions are the kids doing the dishes. It's a big job to keep this breakfast going, but between Ruben, Lil and their dedicated team of volunteers, it continues to flourish and be a special day of the month for the community.

If that weren't enough, all year long Ruben is thinking of and planning the 'Main Event', the Thanksgiving Dinner at the Groveland Community Hall. This is also strictly run by volunteers and his present core team of Edith Gray, Judy Meyers, Bob Giordano, and Tony Flores. It is free to all that attend - locals, families, visitors and passerbys. Here again, Ruben is the one who orchestrates the day. He has helped it grow from a 'get together' for the community by cooking 8 – 10 turkeys, to now serving 18 turkeys, 4 - 15 lb. hams, 15 gallons of gravy (homemade by Ruben), 36 dozen rolls and 50 - 60 pies. In addition they have yams, mashed potatoes, stuffing, corn and peas and relish plates. A true Thanksgiving feast in every sense of the word. They now serve an average of 420 meals each year. Even though it's a free meal, the donations received are enough to keep it going the following year, as well as give a scholarship to a deserving Tioga High School Senior. Each year Ruben tries to 'tweak' it to make it better. Most recently was a change to the yam recipe which, he attests, is delicious. This is a project that also involves many people to make it a success. There are cooks, waitresses, line servers, drink servers, clean up crew in addition to community members who cook turkeys at home and bring them in that day for serving. Ruben is modest about his contribution, but everyone knows it's Ruben's day. His wife, JoAnne, has always been there, working at the breakfast and the

dinner, to help out and stay as long as she's needed. Ruben has had some serious health problems this year that has kept him out of the kitchen for a few months. He is still doing what he can by phone, and plans to be 'back in the saddle' before too long.

The hostess at the Thanksgiving Dinner is Edith Gray. Even though she is a huge part of it, she is still amazed how smoothly it runs and marvels at the coordination and cooperation it takes to put it on so successfully. She retired from Laney College in Oakland and her husband needed a quieter pace and a calmer place to live. They found their dream home in 1989 and moved here in 1991. Her home was where the family always went for Thanksgiving Dinner. One year she finally said 'no more cooking' so sisters, nieces and nephews come to enjoy the Groveland Community Thanksgiving Dinner. They still travel from Oklahoma and Sacramento to stay for a week and enjoy Thanksgiving in Groveland.

Edith is the greeter at the door, and demands a hug from everyone. She makes them all feel welcome - if they are hungry and need a free meal, a family passing through town or members of the community that are alone for the holiday. She loves meeting new folks and seeing all her friends and neighbors. Months earlier she rounds up her volunteers and schedules the front of the house staff by shifts. That day she makes sure all the tables are filled, the diners are seated quickly, everyone signs the guest book and is offered fresh fruit when they leave. Since service is from 11:30 to 4, that makes a very long day. She looks forward to it all year and is grateful, at her spry 88 years, that she's still able to contribute. She plans to continue as long as she possibly can.

Meeting with these three, all at once, it was obvious that they all have mutual love, respect and admiration for each other. They all depend on the other for their contributions and are quick to compliment each other and modestly down-play their own role. We all know, however, that without this dynamic trio, our community meals, eaten with friends, old and new, neighbors and visitors, would not be the same.

Please help the community acknowledge their contributions for all these years by cheering them on as they travel the parade route on September 18th.

We feel privileged and proud to have them as the 2010 '49er Parade Grand Marshals.





Genealogy Workshop – Dig a Little Farther

Census records are a standard resource for those of us addicted to genealogy. They are readily available on the Internet, and indexed for easy searching. But every so often (sometimes more often than not), the person you are looking for cannot be found in those straightforward searches. It is time to modify your search strategy, to think "out of the box".

Try creative spelling. Replace a vowel with a wildcard to catch some spelling errors. Tack a wildcard at the end of the name. I have found people with the surname MORRIS indexed as MORRISS and as MORRISON.

How many ways can you think of to spell a name? Do not limit yourself. Can you think of 125 ways to spell FITZGERALD? The 1850 census did!

Think with your ears. Can you hear the rolling 'r' of the Ayrshire burr in the surname GARIG? It probably sounded more like GHA-rrrig. I was looking for GREIG.

Sometimes you can find a person by searching on a combination of criteria other than name. Both Ancestry.com (available by appointment at the History Resource Center in the Groveland Museum) and Heritage Quest Online (available from home with your Tuolumne Co. library card) allow searching by age. One of my favorite finds was a great-uncle who got lost in the census when his surname, YONGE, was indexed as GAUGE. I found him by searching for a male born in Arizona 1883-1887, then looking for a familiar name in the filtered list.

In another case, I was searching for a woman's maiden name. Her obituary said she was born at Don Pedro Bar in Tuolumne Co. in January 1861. A census record said her father came from Ireland while her mother was born in Germany. Don Pedro Bar, now under the reservoir, was never a large town. How many families had lived there in 1860? How many of those had a husband born in Ireland and a wife born in Germany? Was the family there in 1860? I tried a line-by-line read of the community of Don Pedro Bar (thankfully, only two or three pages), and found a couple that met my criteria. In 1870, this couple had a daughter of the right age and with the right given name to be the person I sought. Her siblings in 1870 matched some of the siblings named in her obituary. It was the correct family.

From 1850 onward, Ancestry.com indexes every person named in US census records, while Heritage Quest Online continues to focus on the head of household and others in the household with a *different* surname. If you cannot find the head of household, consider looking for someone else – especially someone with a different surname. In several cases, I have found a mother who has either remarried or taken back her maiden name by searching for her children.

Lillian Mitchell turned up in 1900 as a 5-year-old granddaughter in the household of Alexander and Sarah Mc-Swain. Her mother, Maria, disappeared from the record as Maria Mitchell, emerging in 1900 living with her parents as Maria McSwain.By 1910 she had remarried, becoming Maria Adams.

In another case of Mom taking back her maiden name (a surprise for all of her descendants), a combination of ages and given names of the children found siblings Irene, Ogden and Rolla Barker (we knew them only with the surname Alger), identified their father as William Barker, and confirmed their mother's ancestors and siblings. This search depended on given name, age and birthplace for one child, and was confirmed by the names and ages of other children in the household.

Interestingly, in both these cases, the motivation for the name change was the husband's conviction and imprisonment for murder.

Census records can also be deceptive. Residents "on the hill" know Kassabaum Meadow on Hwy 120 near Hells Hollow Rd., even if we don't recognize it by name. In the HRC, we found Charles Kassabaum, a single man born in Germany, living in Tuolumne Co. in 1880. In 1900, we found Charles Kassabaum, with wife Margaret and several stepsons with the surname Porath. They lived out near Bower Cave in Mariposa County. Then we found a photograph of a grave in the Coulterville Public Cemetery. The grave was for Charles Kassabaum, age 64 years at his death -- in April, 1894. How could Charles die in 1894 and be alive for the 1900 census? Oh-oh!

We found Pauline Kassabaum working in 1900 as a housekeeper for Tim Carlon. Then we found Pauline's obituary, telling us that she was the widow of Charles Kassabaum who had died in 1894.

Pauline's Charles was clearly not the same man as Margaret's Charles. They had the same given name, different middle initial – which neither man used consistently. Both were born in Germany, less than 10 years apart. They are buried in the same small cemetery in Coulterville. Both had surviving sons. We had to dig deeper than the census records to distinguish between the two men.

Keep digging.Find the *whole* story. Interested in learning more about genealogical research? Workshops are held in the downstairs meeting room of the Groveland Branch Library at 1:00 p.m. on the 4th Friday of each month January through October (dark November and December). Anyone with an interest in genealogy is welcome to attend and get some help.

The Herman Van Kessel **Art Collection On Loan To** Columbia College BY CONI CHAVEZ, EXECUTIVE ASSISTANT TO THE PRESIDENT

Open to the community, the Columbia College Manzanita Building Rotunda will host an exhibit featuring the work of Mr. Herman Van Kessel. On display from August 10, 2010 to September 8, 2010, the collection includes airbrush portraits of stars from Hollywood's Golden Age painted during the last years of Van Kessel's career (1930-45). Through the week of August 16, summer hours for the Rotunda are Monday through Thursday from 7:30 a.m.-5:30 p.m. Beginning August 23, the Rotunda will be open Monday through Friday from 8:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. Parking passes may be purchased at the entrance toll booth for \$1 per day.

Born in 1878, the artist, Mr. Herman Van Kessel, began studying art at a very early age and continued to study and create art throughout his life. After opening a studio in Los Angeles, Van Kessel's clients in the 1920's included Loew's State, Graumann's Chinese, Hollywood Pantages and RKO Theaters. His work in original paintings and retouching photos was a great enhancement for lobby theater displays of the time. To produce these works of art, a studio still photograph

was used to paint an original one-ofa-kind poster which hung in theater lobbies. When no longer needed in the theater, the portraits went back to the studio—a highlight of the collection is the Wallace Berry as Poncho Via portrait which is a "studio original." Most of the paintings on display are presented in period frames researched and purchased by Van Kessel's son Howard. Later, in 1941, Van Kessel built his own studio and was noted as the best airbrush artist on the West Coast.

This private collection is being loaned to Columbia College by the Van Kessel family, supporters of the college for many years. Howard Van Kessel (son of Herman Van Kessel) and Richard "Duke" S. York (stepgrandson of Herman Van Kessel) are both Columbia College Hall of Fame award recipients, 2003 and 2006 respectively. Additionally, Mr. York volunteered his time to serve on the College District's Citizen's Bond Oversight Committee (2005-2007). Janet Van Kessel (wife of Howard and daughter-in-law of Herman Van Kessel), is a long-time contributor to the Columbia College Foundation.



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This is a photograph that I took in July 2010 of the Crescent Nebula. The Crescent Nebula is what is referred to as a planetary nebula and is located about 4,700 light-years away from Earth. This means that the light the camera captured to create this image left the Crescent Nebula 4,700 years ago. Light travels 186,000 miles per second, and there are 60 seconds in a minute; 60 minutes in an hour; 24 hours in a day; and 365 days in a year. That's a total of 5,865,696,000,000 miles every year - so it can be hard to imagine how far away 4,700 light-years really is from Earth!

A nebula is a cloud of gas and/or dust in interstellar space. A nebula can make itself visible by glowing as an "emission nebula", by scattering light from stars within them as a "reflection nebulae", or by blocking light from things behind them as a "dark nebula". A planetary nebula is a specific type of emission nebula.

Despite the name, "planetary"

nebulas are totally unrelated to "planets". The terminology was invented because they often look a little like planets in small telescopes. Planetary nebulae are shells of gas thrown out by some stars near the end of their lives. Typical planetary nebula are generally faint objects; none are visible to the naked eye.

Looking similar to an emerging space cocoon, the Crescent Nebula was created by the brightest star in its center. Many scientists believe that the Crescent Nebula began to form about 250,000 years ago. At that time, the massive central star had evolved to become a special type of star called a Wolf-Rayet star. Wolf-Rayet stars are massive stars, often 20 times the size of our sun, which shed enormous amounts of their mass in the form of a strong solar wind. This wind is impacting the surrounding gas that was left over from a previous phase, compacting it into a series of complex shells, and lighting it up by way of the energy from the central star. A planetary nebula forming around a Wolf-Rayet star is actually quite rare, most planetary nebula are formed by a star that is several billion years old and is going through the end of its lifecycle as a red giant. Our sun will probably form a planetary nebula in about 5 billion years when it goes through its red giant phase.


Taking a photograph of the detail shown in this Crescent Nebula image requires a telescope mount that can accurately track the sky over long periods of time and very long exposures with a camera. This image was created by attaching a digital camera to the end of a telescope where the eyepiece is normally inserted. Many separate 10 minute long photographs were taken. Then, all the individual photographs are digitally "stacked" one on top of another to create the final image. It is this long exposure stacking technique that creates an image with the level of detail visible in this photograph. For this image, I took a total of 33 separate 10 minute exposure photographs over 2 different nights totaling 330 minutes of exposure time. Composing the photograph over several nights can be a challenge because the image isn't visible until after you take a long exposure. The level of detail from each separate photograph is much less than the final version with the total exposure time. In fact, the outline of the Crescent Nebula is barely visible in each of the separate photographs - but all that changes once the exposure time is increased by "stacking".



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Contractor Checklist for Homeowners

CHECK OUT YOUR CONTRACTOR

Did you contact the Contractors State License Board (CSLB) to check the status of the contractor's license? Contact the CSLB at 1-800-321-CSLB (2752) or visit our Web site: www.cslb.ca.gov.

Did you get at least three local references from the contractors you are considering?

Did you call them and see the work the contractor completed?

BUILDING PERMITS

Will the contractor get any needed permits before the work starts?
 Are the permit fees included in the contract?

CHECK OUT THE CONTRACT

- Did you read and do you understand your contract?
- Does the 3-day right to cancel a contract apply to you?
- Does the contract tell you when work will start and end?

Does the contract include a detailed description of the work to be done, the material to be used, and equipment to be installed? This description should include a plan and scale drawing showing the shape, size, dimensions and specifi cations. It should include brand names, model numbers, quantities and colors. Specific descriptions now will prevent disputes later.

□ Are you required to pay a down payment? If you are, the down payment should never be more than 10% of the contract price or \$1,000, whichever is less.

 $\hfill\square$ Is there a schedule of payments? If there is, you should pay only as work is completed and not before.

Did your contractor give you a "Notice to Owner," a warning notice describing liens and ways to prevent them? Even if you pay your contractor, a lien can be placed on your home by unpaid laborers, subcontractors, or



material suppliers. A lien can result in you paying twice or, in some cases, losing your home in a foreclosure. Also check the "Notice to Owner" for ways to protect yourself.

Did you know changes or additions to your contract must all be in writing?
 Putting changes in writing reduces the possibility of a later dispute.

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
