

General Manager's Message

Electric Golf Cart Building Project

At the date that this article was written, the Electric Golf Cart building project was nearing completion. All that remained was to finish restructuring the driving range, installing equipment in the Snack Bar and the electrical connection by PG&E. We anticipate completion in time for the scheduled delivery of the new electric golf carts on April 15th.

Driving Range Net Approved for Limited Upgrade

At the March Board meeting, the directors approved the restructuring of the Driving Range safety netting so that golfing members would not be limited to irons only. Part of the old netting will be recycled to provide a barrier between the 10th Tee, Cart Building and Driving Range. The purpose of the new netting is to increase height on the end of the left side and the rear of the range to make it safer for members and guests playing on the 10th and 11th holes.

Lake Dredging Project Extension

The deadline for the Lake dredging Project was March 31st. PML filed for an extension until April 15th to finish up the remainder of the project. Weather and other variables put our contractors behind schedule slightly, but we anticipate completion this month.

After the project is completed, we plan to work with our consultants on more comprehensive erosion control measures that may include sediment capture ponds, tanks, weirs or other devices. With any large project, we have an after-project review with our consultants and contractors to ensure that all areas were completed in accordance with the contract.

Some lakeside owners that were interested in optional dredging did not get their areas dredged due to the constraints of the original plan in accordance with the Department of Fish and Game agreement. We believe it is our right to maintain our lake on

an on-going basis and will continue to pursue this vigorously with the governmental agencies. Our plan is to meet and work with the agencies to find a way going forward that is less restrictive and costly.

Reported Burglaries since January
There have been four burglaries
reported to PML since January of this
year. One was a former tenant in dispute with the owner. There is something to be said for reference, background and credit checks of rental
applicants.

At the March Board meeting, I provided handouts of information on ways to protect your home. These handouts were compiled by our Director of Safety, John Edner, and they are available at the PML Administration Office. Members who are interested in protecting their property are welcome to stop by and pick up a copy. If you are a member with a vacation or weekend home, we recommend that you have an alarm installed to protect your property. None of the homes that were burglarized had an alarm system installed.

Neighbors are an important source of protection if you plan ahead. I review our Department of Safety blotters daily and noticed at least six instances in the last two months that members have called in when they noticed suspicious activity at a neighbor's home. Getting to know your neighbors and communicating really does help.

Traffic Sign Upgrade Some of our meml

Some of our members noticed that the amenity traffic directional sign on Ferretti Road, across from GCSD, was missing last month. It is good to see that our members are keeping an eye on things and called it in! The sign was upgraded for easier visibility and includes new information.

Independence Day Celebration at the Marina Operational Ideas and Discussion

Last year we received several suggestions from property owners regarding the Independence Day Celebration at the Marina. Over the years, the fireworks event on the lake has become a very popular event for our members and guests.

Unfortunately, with popularity comes larger crowds and with larger crowds comes operational issues. Safety and control are our major concerns and we work very hard to put on a safe, fun event. Unfortunately, there are some that get too intoxicated, start fights, use illegal drugs, use profanity in front of others and cause problems for everyone else.

We do not want to find ourselves in a situation where someone is seriously injured and we are forced to cancel this event in the future. To ensure this does not happen, PML is taking action to minimize the issues of safety and crowd control.

Last year we budgeted to hire an outside event security firm to supplement and support our Marina and Department of Safety staff. We are in contact with multiple security firms and will select one to handle our event. The next step is to discuss some other safety control measures and come up with ways to mitigate issues.

Below is a list of <u>proposed ideas</u> that were discussed at the March monthly Board meeting. Most of these ideas came from PML members that have been negatively impacted in the past by problems at this event. PML is considering implementation of these new policies and the Board of Directors has directed staff to solicit input from the membership.

1. Limit the number of event wristbands to something less than last year. Each property owner would be limited to how many they could purchase. We need to control the maximum number of people attending this event if possible. The size of the crowd is getting too large and the event becomes less fun and safe for most of those attending.

- 2. Have 2 types of wristbands, 1 for the beach area, and 1 for boat dock users only. We continue to receive complaints from members that pay to dock their boats at the Marina. They are currently charged the same fee for wristbands as those that utilize the Marina beach area.
- 3. Reduce the price of wristbands for boat dock users that only want access to their boat on the lake. Increase price for beach wristbands to \$8 or more. The idea is to charge a reasonable fee for the use of the Marina beach and lawn area and charge a lower fee for those that only want access out on the lake. These fees go to offset the cost of the event.
- 4. Outlaw all outside alcohol on the beach and stop selling same at 7 pm. The number of alcohol-related incidents has been rising each year. It is also difficult to control underage drinking.
- 5. No couches, recliners or furniture that is not normally considered temporary beach seating will be allowed to be brought into the Marina.
- 6. No one gets into the Marina before 6 am. Have security coverage all night to stop folks from sneaking in to mark their spot. There have been too many people that take up all of the prime spots the night before the event. This rule would eliminate the issue.

The Board of Directors encourages interested members to attend the Board meeting and voice their opinion. Members that cannot attend the meeting are welcome to put their opinion in writing by submitting a letter or email to the Board.

Proposed PML Shooting Range & Policy BY JOE POWELL, GENERAL MANAGER

As I mentioned in previous issues of the PML News, years ago, PMLA operated a shooting range in Unit 16, up behind the Campgrounds. Over time, the range fell out of use. In the last few years, members have expressed an interest in re-opening the range. Last year, a PML Shooting Club was formed and a proposal was made to the PML Board to re-open the range. Prior to consideration, several key issues had to be resolved. Management was assigned the task of researching and providing information to address, noise, safety, cost, insurance and planning. This information was gathered and a noise test was conducted to determine the nuisance effect on members.

The next step in the process was to provide multiple opportunities for PML members to voice their opinion on the matter. At the January 15th Board meeting, the subject was placed on the agenda for discussion and a draft shooting range policies and procedures resolution was presented for review. The subject and draft were also placed on the agenda for the February 19, 2011 Board meeting. Unfortunately, the Board meeting was postponed due to the impact of the snow storms. The subject and draft was placed on the agenda and discussed at the March 19, 2011 Board meeting. A couple of changes were made to the minimum age requirements and requirements for access to the range.

The following, draft Board resolution is being published for member review and comment. The purpose of the rules if adopted, are to establish policies and procedures in the operation of the Shooting Range. The effect of the establishment of policies and procedures is to ensure that the Range is operated in a safe and effective manner.

The decision to re-open the PML Shooting Range will be made at the April 16, 2011 Board meeting. The meeting will be held at the PML Lake Lodge starting at 9 a.m. The draft resolution will also be discussed and considered for approval at that time.

The Board of Directors encourages interested members to attend the Board meeting and voice their opinion. Members that cannot attend the meeting are welcome to put their opinion in writing by submitting a letter or email to the Board.

PMLA Shooting Range Policies and Procedures
DRAFT 3.19.11

PMLA Shooting Range

The PMLA Shooting Range is a pistol and small-bore rifle, practice range located in Unit 16 above the PMLA Campgrounds. The use of the Shooting Range is governed by the PMLA CC&R's and all subsequent rules and policies as adopted by the PMLA Board of Directors. The use of the PMLA Shooting Range is limited to PMLA members and guests in accordance with Association Policies and Procedures.

Operational Authority

The Association General Manager is authorized to manage, operate and delegate the daily operational tasks of the PMLA Shooting Range in accordance with Association policy and all applicable State and Federal laws.

Certified Range Masters made up of PMLA members in good standing and/or PMLA personnel may be designated by the General Manager as authorized to operate the Shooting Range in a responsible, safe manner.

Range Masters

The Association may solicit volunteer assistance from the PMLA Shooting Club to provide members that have Range Master certification as defined by the NRA or other sanctioned training agencies. A certified Range Master will be present at all times that the Shooting Range is in operation.

The Range Master will be responsible for the safe and compatible operation of the range as well as complying with all PMLA Shooting Range rules, policies and procedures. The onsite Range Master will have the right to expel any user that, in his/her opinion, is not acting responsibly or safely. The minimum age requirement to serve as a PMLA Shooting Range Master is 21 years of age.

Range Masters will have the final say on the weapons that can be used on the range. Their concern will be based on insuring all weapons are in a safe operating condition and that the report of the weapon is not inconsistent with the compatible use of the range.

Rule Violations

Should the General Manager or designated PMLA management be made aware of any violation of the established Shooting Range rules, policies and procedures, they may close the range and convene a meeting with the Shooting Club officers and/or onsite Range Master as applicable to review the rules violations. The Shooting Range will remain closed until the General Manager or designated PMLA management is satisfied that the approved rules are being applied properly. Multiple rules violations could result in the Shooting Range being closed for an extended period of time.

Range Schedule

The Shooting Range is scheduled to be open on Tuesday, Thursday, and Saturday, weather permit-

ting, from 9:00 am to 5:00 pm as long as a PMLA approved Range Master is present. The range may be opened on other days for special events as authorized by the General Manager. The range schedule may be changed without notice.

Range Access

The gate to the Shooting Range can only be accessed by authorized PMLA staff upon the presence of an approved Range Master consistent with the range operating schedule. All users of the range shall register with PMLA before their first time use to insure they are PMLA property owners in good standing. Registration forms are available at the PMLA Administration Office or Main Gate, Department of Safety.

The range will be available to any PMLA resident in good standing in accordance with the current fee schedule. All shooting Range users must show documentation of completion of a certified hunter safety course, authorized NRA-sponsored gun safety course, or other authorized gun safety course as determined by the PML General Manager.

Those members using the range will be responsible for providing their own ammunition, paper targets and cleaning up after themselves when they are done. PMLA members that wish to use the range should call the Administration Office or Main Gate Department of Safety to determine if the range is open prior to driving to the range. Access to the range will be controlled by a locked gate. The road to the range may be closed

due to weather and road conditions.

Range Use Fee

A fee to use the PMLA Shooting Range will be charged in accordance with the current fee schedule, as authorized by the PMLA Board of Directors.

Age Minimum

The minimum age to use the Shooting Range is 12 years, with a parent or legal guardian present at all times. Shooting Range user's ages 12 years to 17 years old must be accompanied by a parent or legal guardian at all times. The parent or guardian is responsible for the actions of the child or young adult while at the Shooting Range.

Authorized Weapons

PMLA strictly controls the types and calibers of weapons that may be fired at the Shooting Range. The following types and calibers of weapons are authorized to be used at the range:

Handguns; .22, 38, 357, 9mm, 40, 45acp. No magnum loads.

Rifle: .17, .22 only.

No other types or calibers of weapons will be allowed without the express approval of the General Manager or PMLA Board of Directors.

Alcohol Consumption

Alcohol is not allowed at the PMLA Shooting Range. No persons under the influence of alcohol or drugs may use the range. PML NEWS • APRIL 2011 FINANCIALS 7

PML Burn Permit Process Well Under Way

I'm sure you remember, last year we put in place an Outdoor Burning Permit process. In order to burn outdoor vegetation, you have to get a burn permit, watch a video, and burn with minimal smoke produced. 885 permits have been issued to date and we've showed the video to and trained 47 vendors who do brush clearing.

The program is an educational program. We educate those intending to burn outdoors, and when we get a complaint about too much smoke in the neighborhood, our Safety Department goes out to investigate. Our goal is to educate the member.

I thought you'd like to hear how the program is going.

For the months October 2010 through January 2011, here are the statistics:

October: Number of burn piles: 14 - Number of smoke complaints: 0

November: Number of burn piles: 73 - Number of smoke complaints: 2 December: Number of burn piles: 74 - Number of smoke complaints: 4 January: Number of burn piles: 61 - Number of smoke complaints: 4

Total burn piles: 222 - Total complaints: 10

Each member who called the main gate had their permit numbers in hand, clearly having prepared for the process. When Safety visited the offending site, they found a cooperative member who extinguished the fire. The visit was an educational one, and I'm confident that next time this neighbor burns outdoors, they will take steps to assure they don't produce excessive smoke.

We believe we will see the number of complaints reduce each year as the educational process gets some momentum. Our goal is to drive complaints to zero.

Jump Start Program

2011 is year 4 of our "Jump Start Program". We will be masticating again in Units 14/16 above the campground. The Assistant to the General Manager, Rick Whybra, is touring the vendors and seeking bids. Work will begin when the weather dries up a bit.

New Plan for the Slash and Compost Site

The Slash and Compost Site above the Campground has become a critical element of our work to reduce risk from wildfires. Most of our property owners prefer to haul away the debris from their constant fuel reduction work, as opposed to burning on site. The PMLA Board and staff are committed to providing an inexpensive and convenient place to deliver unwanted fuels. Do you know that if you were to take your slash to the compost pile in Sonora you'd be charged \$5 a cubic yard? At PML, our property owners can

deliver their slash for free, and we're talking unlimited trips, too. Now that's a great deal!

Last year we saw big changes at the site with a huge increase of deliveries. And we had trouble with how and where the deliveries were made. For 2011, our budget allows for an attendant to greet members and direct them where to dump, and what to dump where. Look for Tom Moffitt's article in this issue for the details of the changes going on at the site. I think you'll be pleased that we're taking steps to assure that the site is well managed and we can continue to use it for years to come.

Compliance Chatter BY DENNIS PIPAL

Gone to the Dogs

Death and Taxes have long been considered life's twin inevitabilities. But for community associations there may be a third: pets.

In 2005, there were 88 million more pets than people in the United States. According to the American Pet Products Manufacturing Association, 81 million American households counted a four-legged friend among the family with many households having multiple four-leggers.

Dogs represent about 60% in total pet numbers nationwide but many times I feel it is much higher here in PML. Most of the complaints I receive involve dogs. Dogs pooping, dogs barking and dogs running loose. I'd like to take each of these violations and expand on them here.

Unscooped Poop (CC&R's, Article VIII, Section 4 – Prohibition of Noxious Activities)

Unscooped poop is an enforcement headache because it's impossible to know who isn't scooping. Even if you see a resident walk away without picking up, they claim they went home to get a bag or they cleaned it up later. No one is ever responsible, yet the Common Areas are littered with land mines.

Uncollected pet waste is going to become more than an enforcement headache for community associations, which increasingly are coming under the watchful gaze of the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), especially in states like California.

Stepped-up monitoring by the EPA of compliance with the Federal Water Pollution Prevention and Control Act is mandating that associations take responsibility for removing pet waste from their Common Areas. Recently, an association in California was fined \$100,000 for failing to report what actions it was taking to comply with the Clean Water Act. A wallop like this is telling associations that pet waste is no longer merely a nuisance, but a serious problem that boards must resolve. If you are not scooping, please get on the program.

Barking Baxter (CC&R's, Article VIII, Section 4 - Prohibition of Noxious Activities)

Next to uncollected pet waste, barking is probably the most frustrating pet problem faced by associations. Dogs left alone all day get bored and restless, and many find relief in barking. Nothing is as annoying as incessant barking- even for dog owners. So, if Baxter is barking all day, his owners might not realize he leads a double life when he's alone. Once notified, most owners will respond with compassion and fix the problem. Some mistakenly believe there's nothing they can do about it, but actually there are a few suggestions:

- · Training Always the first recommendation for any behavioral problem. Help is as close as the yellow pages.
- · Citronella collars A humane alternative to the electric-shock, antibarking variety that costs about the same. Available on the web and in pet stores.
- · Confinement Sometimes simply bringing an outspoken dog indoors or confining it to a crate can cut down on the disturbance to neighbors.
- · Reduced stimulus Close the drapes to help muffle street noise, or leave a radio on to mask it. Disconnect telephones and doorbells if they cause Baxter to holler.
- · Companionship Dogs are pack animals; they need companionship – a cat, a bird or other dog. Consider a mid-day visit from a pet-sitting-service, or send Baxter to daycare once or twice a week.

Roaming Rover (CC&R's, Article VIII, Section 6 (b) – Household Pets

Our local leash law coincides with the Tuolumne County leash law. Dogs roaming our neighborhoods is a safety issue. Also, if your dog causes bodily injury or property damage while running at large the owner is guilty of a misdemeanor and on conviction thereof shall be punishable as set forth in Tuolumne County Ordinance Code #1.08.010. And yet, many owners have no idea where their dog is on a daily basis.

PMLA is committed to enforcing the leash law on association property so that all residents may enjoy our community. But, we're also concerned about the health and safety of Rover. Did you know that an unleashed dog has an average life span of less than four years? Allowing Rover to run free not only imposes on the neighbors, but also threatens Rover's health and welfare, and the happiness he/she brings.

We trust we can count on all dog owners in our community for voluntary compliance with the leash law. We don't like to call animal control, but we won't have any choice if we continue to receive more complaints about roaming Rover from other residents.

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Ready for the Fire Season?

The preparations for the 2011 fire season are underway. Winter has made a mighty big impact on the trees and brush here in PML. People have been busy removing brush and debris from their properties this long hard winter in anticipation of this summer's fire season. Then, along with all the usual planned fire abatement work, there arrives a series of harsh winter storms. Heavy snows have downed many trees, and broken more than a few heavy limbs. This weather related damage has hit our oak trees the hardest.

PML Maintenance Department has been working through the winter months with construction and improvements at the Slash and Compost Piles site. These improvements have been made in anticipation of handling large amounts of woody debris from Pine Mountain Lake Association properties. The site now has a second road which will be the new entrance to the site, with the old road being the exit. Traffic will be divided, one-way single lane entrance and exits, and the roads are signed. This will alleviate the risk of collisions and confusion when visiting the site. In whole, the site has been enlarged, and areas are segregated for slash, compost, and firewood. Signage has been improved to direct users to the proper areas, and the rules are still in force as to which materials can be taken to the sites. A check-in point has been built, traffic signs placed, and users must stop at this point before being directed to the proper area.

Compost Piles and Slash Piles Procedures Changes and Uses

With all of these improvements has come the most significant of site use changes. The site will now be staffed with a PML employee who will be checking loads, verifying PML property owners, PML Unit and Lot numbers, PML vendors and contractors. Information will be logged, vehicle license number recorded; the staff employee will inform and direct site users to the designated areas. Please have a verifiable PML Identification with you when you visit the site. An acceptable verifiable PML identification is a PML Gate Card, a PML Gate Clicker, a PML Auto Sticker, a PML Day Pass, a PML Preferred Vendor, or a PML Contractor Card. Visitors who are not eligible to use the site will be turned away at the

check-in point.

The days and hours of operation have also changed. The days on which debris will be accepted are Wednesday, Thursday, Friday, Saturday, and Sunday. The hours of operation are 9Am to 5PM during the months of April through October, and 8AM to 4PM in the winter months of November through March. The site may be closed due to weather conditions or special circumstances.

The area has been segregated into several drop areas with specific uses. These areas are the Slash Pile, Compost Pile, Firewood Pile, PML storage area, and the Composted Organic Materials Piles.

The Slash Pile is designated to accept woody debris such as brush, limbs, trees and tree limbs that are 6-inches and less in diameter. This slash is reduced by seasonally burning, and by grinding to produce chips suitable for recycling. It is very important that this woody debris be clean slash, free of dirt, rocks, foreign materials and debris. The staff employee will direct the user to the drop site area. You may be required to segregate the materials to the specific site areas.

The Compost Pile is for leaves and pine needles. This material is piled and allowed to decompose into usable composted organic material. It is important that this material be free of brush, limbs, plant clippings, and foreign materials (especially plastic bags and trash). The action of composting organic materials produces heat and can create a fire by spontaneous combustion. The composting piles are monitored and turned, speeding the composting processes. Composted Organic Materials are segregated, the piles set aside for recycling, and are free to PML property owners for personal use.

A separate bin site in the Compost Pile area will be for horse manure. This material will compost rapidly and can become a ready source of organic material suitable for gardening, and as a soil top dressing. It is important that this product be segregated from the other composting material piles. It can be mixed with the other organic materials when the composting cycle is completed.

The Firewood Pile is where wood, suitable for recycling as firewood

is stored. These tree timbers, large branches, and tree sections larger than 6-inches in diameter are piled to be cut for firewood uses. The wood dropped and stored at this site must be limbed, free of rot, in sections no longer than 16 feet in length. This firewood is preferably oak and cedar wood. A Firewood

Cutting Permit can be purchased for \$20 at the Maintenance Yard Office on Mondays through Fridays before 3PM. This permit is available for PML property owners for one week of firewood cutting. For questions, contact Susan at the Maintenance Department Office, telephone 962-8612.

If you have filled your car up with gas lately I am sure you know what I mean.

"I am a part-time resident I don't understand why I have to pay to support those amenities I don't use. I never go to the Stables and I don't play golf. Can you explain this?" - George O.

Unfortunately George PMLA is not a "buffet" Association. When someone buys a lot or a home here they sign up for the whole package. The community belongs to all property owners and therefore has to be financially supported by all property owners. This is a fact of life in any HOA and is always something to be aware of when buying property.

Shades of Green

The projects we have been working on in late February and March are taking longer to complete due to the rain and snow. The storms left us with a lot of cleanup to do from entire trees falling over to major limb damage that required the tree to be removed. We do have fire wood available. If you would like to be added to the list give Susan a call at 962-8612 and she will issue you a permit for \$20.00. It is for a pickup load and it is only cut into sizes we could handle to bring in from the course.

We have three projects that have started. They are repairing the retaining wall to the upper tee on #7, along with removing the sod there and leveling the tee surface and installing new sod. The area to the left of #3 green is another project that we have stripped the sod on and are going to add drainage there along with new grass. We will do the same improvements to the left of #17 green. The third project is the landscaping around the new cart barn and to improve the tee surface out in front of the new pads from all the construction there.

Another project that we started in late February is to improve the appearance of our irrigation pond by using a portable pump that our street maintenance crew allowed us to borrow.

We have used an aquatic herbicide in the past, without a lot of success, to control the duck weed so we needed to try another way. Ed had always talked about building a skimmer and Rob did some research and saw some commercial pumps and filters that were kind of expensive. So one Saturday morning, when the course was still closed from snow, they put the pump in the water and built a skimmer and installed a filtration system on the slope above the pond and are pumping the water and duck weed through the filter trapping the weed and allowing the water to flow back into the pond. We owe these guys and the rest of the crew, who helped and came up with ideas, a "thank you" as we are hoping this system, along with additional spraying, will keep the duck weed under control.

Other projects for March and April are to aerate the course, finishing with the greens on April 25th and 26th. Also, before the trees leaf out in early spring, we will be doing some trimming to the oaks near #10 and #15 greens.

This means spring is here, so enjoy the golf course and remember to wait three weeks into May to plant those summer annuals or vegetable gardens. We look forward to seeing all of you back out playing as the weather improves.

Horsing Around at the Stables

In The Kitchen With Chef Carrie

Spring has sprung and there is lots of good food to look forward to. I always look forward to spring, because it's the begin-

ning of all the excellent produce that is available to me that I can bring to The Grill. Asparagus, strawberries, artichokes and tangerines are in season with cherries and baby spinach just around the corner. I will be using the bounty that springtime brings us to create sensational specials.

April means that Easter is upon us and we will be celebrating with our Easter Buffet. This year we will be serving a variety of brunch specialties, including our fresh homemade baked morning buns and a variety of delicious desserts. We will also have many of your traditional favorites including carved Prime Rib, Old Fashioned Ham, made to order omelets and Eggs Benedict. And just to tempt your taste buds; Stuffed French toast with Blueberry Sauce, Blintz with peaches and cream, Cheese Puffs, Lemon Tarts and so much more. Come relax with family and let our staff pamper you with great food and great service.

If you haven't been to one of our buffets yet, be sure to make a reservation early so that you don't miss out.

April also is Garlic month. Surpris-

ingly, garlic was frowned upon by foodie snobs in the United States until the first quarter of the twentieth century, being found almost exclusively in ethnic dishes in working-class neighborhoods. But by 1940, America had embraced garlic, finally recognizing its value as not only a minor seasoning, but as a major ingredient in recipes.

Fresh spring garlic is a great find at the farmers' market. I like to use spring garlic or green garlic as a substitute for regular garlic, I chop it up like a green onion, then I use it sparingly raw, and abundantly cooked. It's great in a potato soup, or thrown in with the onions at the beginning of many dishes that start with, "cook the chopped onions in oil or butter". Try a simple dish with chicken breast sautéed with mushroom and spring onion, and deglazed with white wine and finished with a dab of butter at the end. Delish!

Green Garlic Mayonnaise

- · 2 whole eggs
- · 1/2 teaspoon salt
- · 1 teaspoon or a little less Dijon mustard
- · 4 stalks green garlic, cleaned as you would leeks, white and pale green parts chopped roughly
- · 3 teaspoons lemon juice or rice wine vinegar
- · 2 teaspoons more rice or white wine vinegar
- · 1 1/4 cups corn or other vegetable oil

Then with the processor running, add oil in a thin steady stream through the top opening until all oil is completely incorporated. If the food pusher has that little hole, use it by pouring the oil into that, it works great. This is great as a dip for Grilled Asparagus or

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
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
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
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Friends of the Lake Learn All About Dredging





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

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John Gray 4th District, Supervisor Update

At the March 15th Board of Supervisor's Meeting County, Administrator Craig Pedro, presented a multi-year budget projection for 2012-2013. This presentation provided recommendation on strategies to help guide Board Action as we move forward in these difficult and trying times.

During the presentation Mr. Pedro noted some key comments made by Diane Swonk, Senior Managing Director and Chief Economist for Mesirow Financial at the 2010 Fall Conference of the International City/County Management Association. Below is a recap of what I feel are the most glaring issues that Ms. Swonk addressed.

· We continue to operate in unprecedented and unchartered waters without sign posts.

· We have all been living in an illusionary environment, a house of cards over the past 3 decades rooted in an overheated economy supported by record debt amounts in all sectors of the economy-personal, corporate and government.

· Unemployment insurance and oth-

er government programs are currently supporting the economy. An example is that about 2/3rds of the people who lost their jobs in 2008 are still living on unemployment checks.

While Ms. Swonk is just one voice among many on the state of our national economy, her comments reflect those shared by most economists. In short, we continue to find ourselves in one of the most challenging financial times that our nation has ever faced and it will take years before we return to a stable economy.

As I listened to Mr. Pedro's presentation, I could not help but be reminded of the difficulty in the future decisions the Board of Supervisors will have to make. We can do the best job possible but we are so dependent on the functions of the Federal and State Government.

Federal program reductions are being detailed now. The current amount being discussed at the Federal level as possible program cuts range from \$11 to \$61 Billion. These are relatively modest cuts in the big scheme of things as compared to the annual deficit of \$1.645 Trillion. At this time we do not know how all county

programs will be affected. What we do know, however, is that there are two specific programs that have been targeted and if made would severely impact Tuolumne County. Those two programs being considered for elimination are "Payments In Lieu of Taxes" and a "Secure Rural Schools and Communities Self Determination Act". If these programs are eliminated, it will mean approximately \$800,000 lost in County Benefits equally divided between schools and road maintenance. The County has received these funds for many years based on the assumption that nearly 70% of the county is owned by the Federal Government and cannot be taxed.

We all know what is happening at the state level or maybe a better term is what's not happening. Even as I write this article there is still a political stalemate.

What this all means is that no matter how hard we work at the county level we are still dependent on what happens at the state and federal level.

There is a bright spot. Tuolumne County Economy is beginning to turn around. Progress continues to be made with respect to our local economy. It is growing. While we continue to suffer from the large job losses seen in 2008 and 2009, great progress has and continues to be made in regaining many of those lost jobs. Some of the new employment opportunities in 2010 included:

- · Sandvik 76 jobs
- · Lowes 120 jobs
- · Kohl's 130 jobs
- · Tractor Supply 20 jobs
- · Columbia State Park Concession Re-Opening

As we look into 2011 a few of the most notable and tangible projects that are well into the planning and development stage that will be creating additional jobs are:

· Sierra Pacific Industries Mill Re-Opening with 130 jobs plus hundreds of "spin off" jobs

· Avalon Health Care Center 110 jobs

· New Crossroads Shopping Center Tenants-Pet Co, JoAnne's Fabric and one additional retail business

In addition to the above mentioned, it is important to note that the Tourism Industry is stronger than ever.

This is all positive news but we recognize that there are still several years

Even with some good news, we have a significant budget shortfall projected for 2011-2012. The shortfall looks to be about \$4,000,000. The County cannot operate like the Federal Government. The budget has to be balanced. The additional cuts will be painful but have to be made. Plans are being developed to cover this shortfall. Five Rotary clubs and three Lions clubs met in Calexico on Thursday, Feb. 17 and off loaded 3000 lbs. of clothing that made it to four orphanages and two mental hospitals for adults in Mexicali. Medical equipment of approxitmently \$5,000.00 found its way to the Mexicali General Hospital that did not get the "wrecking ball" as was expected, due to last year's massive earthquake.

On Friday and Saturday the twenty who went down, which included eight doctors, performed exams at clinics and installed playground equipment at the "Soledad Ponce De Leon" elementary school in the Centinela area of Mexicali which is 18 miles southwest of the city.

238 eye exams were performed by three optometrists and 178 pr. of glasses were dispensed. Sixty foot exams were performed with two surgeries and one pr. of braces that will be shipped to one child. 80 rabies vaccines were performed by two veterinarians, one of which is a resident of Mexicali and attended Cal Poly Pomona, Ca. The dental clinic consisted of 40 exams and 90 fluoride treatments.

The playground equipment installed consisted of "Playschool" brand commercial equipment with swings and slides, with a value of \$25,000.00, new, a tether ball and a teeter totter rounded out the play area.

The following clubs were represented on this, my 30th consecutive trip of goodwill to Mexico. Groveland, Oakdale Sunrise, Escondido Sunrise,

Calafia De Mexicali district 4100 and Tupi Paulista district 4510 Sao Paulo, Brazil Rotary clubs with its exchange student, Luan Macena Ferreira e Silva, and the Interact club of the Calafia club. The Lions clubs included Sonora Mountain Lions, Oakdale and the Alameda Breakfast clubs. Appreciation certificates were given on Sat. evening to those that have made the trip a minimum of three times which added up to ten. Six others that could not make the trip due to illness or out of town will be given theirs at another date.

California. Registration and pre-payment is required by the April 5, 2011 deadline. Seating is limited to 20, so call the Tuolumne County Chamber of Commerce at (209) 532-4212 or log on to www.tcchamber.com to reserve your spot. The cost is \$150.00 per person. Any person attending the March 14 class who may need to retake the exam, the cost is \$75.00. The ServSafe Certification Class on March 14 is sold out.

Is your restaurant or food facility in compliance with State food safety regulations and who needs a ServSafe Certificate? Here are the facts: "Each food facility shall have an owner or employee who has successfully passed an approved and accredited food safety certification examination....The certified owner or employee need not be present at the food facility during all hours of operation." (CA Health & Safety Code Sec. 113700-113733). Senate Bill 602 requires, food handler who is involved in the preparation, storage or service of food in a food facility has to have a valid food safety certificate (temporary food facilities are exempt and DO NOT require a food card). Effective June 11, 2011."



Praline Bacon

RECIPE PROVIDED BY TOM KNOTH AND PAULA MARTELL



This recipe is dangerously easy and it is obviously not the healthiest thing to eat, but it is so tasty and we all deserve an occasional treat. Add this palate pleaser to your Easter Brunch menu and you will hit a home run!

10 strips Thick-Cut Bacon 2-1/2 ounces Light Brown Sugar (about 6 tablespoons) 1-1/2 ounces Pecan Halves or Pieces

Preheat oven to 400 degrees F.

Position a cooling rack over a foil or parchment lined baking sheet (for easy clean up). Lay the strips of bacon on the rack and place in the oven to bake for 6 to 10 minutes until partially cooked. They should be lightly browned, but still moist and limp.

Meanwhile, combine brown sugar

and pecans in a food processor. Pulse about 15 times or until the pecans are finely chopped.

Generously sprinkle each strip of the already partially cooked bacon with the brown sugar/pecan mixture and bake until the sugar melts and caramelizes and the bacon is crispy, about 6 to 8 minutes; watch them like a hawk and don't let them burn! Remove from the oven and allow bacon to cool a little and crisp up (a couple minutes), then serve.

Note: For a simpler "candied bacon", you can just use brown sugar and omit the pecans. Other options are to use maple syrup or honey instead of brown sugar.

Within a brief span of five years, America pushed the edge of settlement to Texas, the Southwest, and the Pacific Northwest.

Where and when did your ancestors fit in this drive to improve their lives and that of their children? Were they driven from their homes by conflict? Were they seeking freedom from religious persecution? Were they seeking cheap land or looking for work?

The study of migration patterns may shed light on many genealogical research mysteries. This is important because most offspring of most immigrants eventually left the communities of original settlement in the east and headed westward. In many cases family lines can be extended by identifying common migration movements of various ethnic groups and it's important to remember that people seldom traveled alone. They often followed groups made up of their own ethnic group, church group, neighbors, friends, etc.

Contributions toward a bryoflora of California part 1: A specimen-based catalogue of mosses, and part 2: A key to the mosses published in Madroño 51: 1-269.

A recent book titled 'California mosses' by Bill & Nancy Malcolm, Shevock, and Norris was published in the fall of 2009. This picture book with nearly 2,200 color images provides a portal into the wonderful diversity of California mosses. His plant collections, currently at over 37,000 specimens, are housed at the herbarium of the California Academy of Sciences (CAS) with selected duplicates provided to major bryophyte herbaria around the world. Jim has 7 flowering plants and 5 mosses named in his honor included the moss genus Shevockia, endemic to Yunnan Province, China.



Has it been a while since you have had a check-up? Not feeling quite up to par? Feeling great and want to make sure you stay that way? Then you are in luck because Soroptomist of Groveland will be hosting the 11th annual Family Wellness Faire at the Tenaya Elementary School on April 26. Results of blood work are

provided directly to you by the hospital a few days later.

Among the free tests offered are bone density scanning, glucose testing, hearing screening, oral cancer checks, eye checks which include pressure testing for glaucoma, and blood pressure. Ever popular "The Doctor is In", featuring Dr. Shields, will be available to answer your health questions. At registration you will be given a health assessment form that is filled out as you move through each booth and testing area. When you have successfully "made the rounds" a health representative is available to go through your assessment and discuss your personal wellness measures.

Discovery Space Shuttle Launch

This month's newsletter is going to be a little different.

About a week before the launch of the Space Shuttle Discovery on February 24th, I received a telephone call from a good buddy of mine, Lou

Winoski. Lou and I work for the same company, National Technical Systems, and we do work for several of the large contractors for NASA. The conversation with Lou went a little something like this ...

Lou: "Hey Eddie what are you and Lisa doing on February 24th?"

Eddie: "Not sure, I think I'm free." Lou: "Well then, I think you better sit down - I have two NASA VIP passes for the Discovery launch - and they're yours if you want them."

Lou didn't have to ask twice - my wife, Lisa, and I booked our flights to Kennedy Space Center, Florida, that night!

About 6 months prior to this conversation, Lou and I had been to an executive retreat where we, along with two dozen other people, went around the room and as an "ice breaker" shared our dream events. I had what I thought were the typical "guy" things - drive a Formula 1 race car, fly in a fighter jet, ... watch a space shuttle launch close up and in person. Lou, having many NASA contacts, tucked away that bit of information and when the opportunity presented itself, he

thought of me.

As you may or may not know, and I'll try to remain politically neutral, the current administration has decided to discontinue the manned space program. Once this was announced it became increasingly more difficult to get into Kennedy Space Center on launch days. In fact, NASA moved to a lottery system for launch tickets. I had my name in this lottery system for well over a year, but no luck. With the exception of having "press credentials", a NASA VIP pass is about the best you can get. So this was very special

Space Shuttle Discovery is one of the three currently operational orbiters in the space shuttle fleet. The other two are Atlantis and Endeavour. Discovery was first flown in 1984 and is currently the oldest orbiter in service. It gets its name from four British ships of exploration named Discovery, primarily HMS Discovery, one of these ships was commanded by Captain James Cook during his third and final major voyage in 1776-1779.

Discovery was the shuttle that launched the Hubble Space Telescope and has been chosen twice as the "return to flight orbiter", first in 1988 after the 1986 Challenger disaster, and then in 2005 after the 2003 Columbia disaster. Discovery also carried Project Mercury astronaut John Glenn, who was 77 at the time, back into space in 1998, making him the oldest human being to venture into space. With the most recent launch, Discovery has flown 39 flights, which is more than any other space shuttle. Unless the decision to cancel the space shuttle program is changed, this is the last flight of the Space Shuttle Discovery. There are only 2 more space shuttle launches (Atlantis and Endeavour) scheduled in the coming months. Then, that's it - no more manned space flight on the books for the United States. Americans will pay the Russians to transport us to and from the International Space Station.

Each space shuttle launch is designated an STS number. STS stands for "Space Transportation System". The launch on February 24th was designated STS-133, which is the 133rd space shuttle launch. The first operational test flights for the space shuttle program began in 1981. At launch, the Space Shuttle consists of the shuttle stack, which includes a dark orangecolored external tank, two white solid rocket boosters, and the orbiter vehicle, which contains the crew and payload. Several minutes after liftoff, the shuttle reaches a speed of 17,500 MPH - which is the necessary speed to achieve low earth orbit and dock with the International Space Station, which is about 250 miles above Earth.

Our launch day activities began when we boarded the NASA bus about 5 miles outside of Kennedy Space Center. We were taken to the Banana Creek viewing area which is about as close as any civilian can get during a launch. This is the same location that former astronauts and astronaut families view the launch. The viewing area contains grandstands, countdown clocks, and loudspeakers with a direct audio feed from NASA's flight operations center. It is actually rare that there are no delays during a countdown (sometimes these delays can

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last days or even weeks) – so we had our bit of drama when the countdown was held at T-minus 5 minutes for a problem with the ranging system. There was only a 10 minute launch window, and with 2 seconds to spare,

the countdown resumed with a cheering crowd.

I have to tell you that being there in person, close up, is nothing like watching a launch on television - the excitement of the crowd, the feeling of camaraderie, the mix of colors and brightness (often washed out on video as the camera saturates) during

liftoff, and the deafening roar of the engines as nearly 7 million pounds of thrust accelerate the space shuttle to over 100 MPH even before its engines pass the launch tower. It's like nothing I've ever experienced and will likely remember for the rest of my life.

Printed with this article are photographs that I snapped just moments after liftoff. Lisa shot video with her Flip video recorder. I normally don't post links in my articles (because they can be long and hard to copy), but this time I wanted to share with

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Contractor Checklist for Homeowners

- ☐ Will the contractor get any needed permits before the work starts?
- ☐ Are the permit fees included in the contract?

CHECK OUT YOUR CONTRACTOR

- ☐ Did you contact the Contractors State License Board (CSLB) to check the status of the contractor's license? Contact the CSLB at 1-800-321-CSLB (2752) or visit our Web site: www.cslb.ca.gov.
- ☐ Did you get at least three local references

from the contractors you are considering?

☐ Did you call them and see the work the contractor completed?

CHECK OUT THE CONTRACT

- ☐ Did you read and do you understand your contract?
- ☐ Does the 3-day right to cancel a contract apply to you?
- Does the contract tell you when work will start and end?
- ☐ Does the contract include a detailed descrip-

tion of the work to be done, the material to be used, and equipment to be installed? This description should include a plan and scale drawing showing the shape, size, dimensions and specifi cations. It should include brand names, model numbers, quantities and colors. Specific descriptions now will prevent disputes later.

☐ Are you required

to pay a down payment? If you are, the down payment should never be more than 10% of the contract price or \$1,000, whichever is less.

- ☐ Is there a schedule of payments? If there is, you should pay only as work is completed and not before.
- Did your contractor give you a "Notice to Owner," a warning notice describing liens and ways to prevent them? Even if you pay your contractor, a lien can be placed on your home by unpaid laborers, subcontractors, or

material suppliers. A lien can result in you paying twice or, in some cases,

losing your home in a foreclosure. Also check the "Notice to Owner" for ways to protect yourself.

- ☐ Did you know changes or additions to your contract must all be in writing?
- ☐ Putting changes in writing reduces the possibility of a later dispute.

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
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
