General Manager's Message

Annual Meeting of the Members and Installation of Directors

The Annual Meeting of the Members of Pine Mountain Lake Association is scheduled for Saturday, August 20th. The meeting will be held at the Lake Lodge as usual and start at 9 a.m. There are two candidates running for one vacancy on the Board.

An outside accounting firm is hired as our Inspector of Elections in accordance with our rules and the Civil Code. At the meeting the Inspector of Elections will provide a summary of the process and give a report on the establishment of at quorum. After this, the Inspector and their team will count the ballots on site in accordance with the California Civil Code. All members are welcome to attend.

Bear Sighting in Unit 3

We received reports of another bear sighting in Unit 3. The bear was foraging for food and going through garbage cans. Members should take precautions by removing outside food sources such as garbage cans left out overnight and pet food out on their decks. If you see a bear within the subdivision, please call the Main Gate Dept. of Safety immediately and report the sighting. Do not approach the bear or put yourself at risk. If a bear becomes a nuisance, we will take action to try and scare it off. We also report all sightings to Fish and Game so that they can monitor activity and take further action if necessary.

Fawn Season

It is fawn season and the local deer herd is very active. Baby fawns are difficult to see, so it is important to watch your speed as you travel within PML. Do not attempt to feed or go near a fawn. A doe can become very aggressive and attack if it feels its baby is being threatened. Also, feeding the wildlife is illegal and bad for the health of the animals.

Swimming Pool Repairs

In the last month the Swimming Pool was shut down twice, temporarily, for repairs to the pump and filtration systems. Our Maintenance staff jumped on it quickly and worked with a professional pool technician to resolve each repair as quickly as possible.

Access Gate Follow-Throughs

We have seen an increase in vehicle and gate damage due to followthroughs. It is important that everyone observe the rules and only use the gates one vehicle at a time.

When you follow a vehicle through the gates, you run the risk of having the gate arm come down on the vehicle. The cost of damage to your vehicle and restitution you must pay to repair the gate is not worth the five to ten seconds saved by following another vehicle through.

2012 Budget Process

The 2012 Budget Process begins this month with the management

team budget kick-off meeting. This is a meeting of the management team as we work to prepare the budget draft for presentation to the Board, Budget and Finance Committee and, ultimately, the membership. The budget preparation process takes several months and includes several meetings and input from Board members, committee members and property owners.

The day-long, open Budget meeting is held in October and the approval of the Budget is handled by the Board of Directors at the November Board meeting. We will be publicizing the dates and times in future issues of the PML News and the information will be posted to the PML Website.

My family moved to PML in 1999; my wife, Kate Newcomb, is a doctor in Groveland, and our daughter attends Tenaya Elementary. I also serve on the school board, and am working hard to protect this community's assets and keep this a great place to live.

PML is a complex place to manage.

We have full-time retired residents, full-time working residents, part-time vacationers, and people who rent their properties as investments. Everyone's vote counts and everyone's priorities matter. It's not easy to balance all points of view, but as an engineer, I am trained to be practical and logical; I form opinions based on facts, not emotions or politics.

As a PML board member, I have learned how this Association runs – what it does well and where it can be improved. I am proud that your board of directors today is a team-oriented, productive organization. We never want to return to the animosity and personal agendas that once characterized the board.

As a board member my job is to continue to provide a calm and reasoned voice, to help set our strategic goals,

and to monitor the budget carefully and conservatively as employees implement the plans.



PMLA Money Matters

What's the weather going to be like tomorrow? How about next week? Next month? Next year? The answers to these questions become more difficult the further out you look. This is the same type of problem that occurs when a budget is prepared. It can be as simple a budget as one that an individual might prepare or one as complex and overwhelming as the budget for the U.S. Government. Somewhere in between there is the budget for PML.

Trying to estimate how much revenue an organization will generate over a 12 month period requires a very clear understanding of all the factors that affect that revenue. In our case this includes things like the weather, the overall economy, the demographics of our residents, the cost of items being sold, the current and future trends for discretionary spending (golf, tennis, dining, etc.) and the position of Mars in the sky (just kidding about that last one, but you get the idea).

Attempts to estimate the other side of the budget coin (expenses) is just as complex and involved. Factors such as union contracts, expected wage rates, estimated insurance cost increases, the price of oil, overall inflation, expected level of services to be provided, age and condition of the facilities and the level of my retirement fund in the Caymans (kidding again!) all need to be taken into account

Finally to add another level of complexity to all of this estimating is that we at PML have to do this well before each new year starts. It is generally felt that if an organization can come within about 5% of its total budget for the year they are doing pretty well. As with any projection of the future, some things will be greater than expected and some will be lower than expected. It is extremely rare that any such estimate exactly matches reality. It would take a highly polished crystal ball to accurately predict the future and if I had one, I would want to know who wins the 2011 World Series (Vegas here I come!).

With all of that in mind you might find it interesting to know that for the first five months of 2011 the Association is 8.2% better than budget from a total operating cost standpoint. Now, while we would all like to see us within that magic 5% variance range, it is good to note that our variance of

8% is a positive one. (As a side comment, some of this positive result is caused by a few expense timing issues and will probably go down in the coming months.)

It is understandable that no one wants to pay more for something than they have to. This is equally true when it comes to the annual assessment. We work hard to prepare an accurate and realistic budget, however it is always our goal to perform better than budget so we do not run the risk of creating a deficit which must be made up in future assessments or, in the worst case, a Special Assessment. Remember that as a non-profit organization we don't just build up this surplus every year. Instead this positive variance stays in the Association and is used for future expenses and goes to continue to make us financially sound. For example, recent positive results have been used to more adequately fund our Reserves and allow the completion of such important projects as the Lake Dredging and the construction of our new electric golf cart storage facility. These funds are always used to improve or maintain all of the amenities and common areas of the Association.

While no variance is always the goal, it is better to have a positive variance against your budget rather than a negative one. Very rarely is someone upset because they have more money than they expected as opposed to having less. As always, we use past experience, combined with our best estimates of the future, in attempting to prepare the most realistic, achievable and safest budget. Like you, we prefer no surprises in our financial forecast. Hope for the best and plan for the worst.

Personally it is always more enjoyable for me to present positive results. Hopefully you all enjoy hearing good news as much as I enjoy delivering it. We want to continue to report results that meet or exceed your expectations and reflect a favorable performance versus what was budgeted.

The PMLA Archery Range

The PMLA Maintenance Department has performed the seasonal work in restoring the Archery Range in Unit 16 for use. Members are using the range for archery practice and sport.

Where is the Archery Range? The range is located on the northern boundary of PMLA property in Unit 16, which is the property north of the Campground.

When is it open for use? The range is open Wednesday through Sunday from 10AM until 4PM. The range may be closed because of weather or in seasons of severe fire danger. Visitors to the range must be out of the area by 4PM, and return the same way as entering, always checked in and out by the Compost Pile attendant. If you are not out of the area by 4PM, a Safety Department Patrol Officer will be dispatched to locate

you and ensure the area is vacated and all persons are in safe condition.

How do I get there? You can access the range by driving into the Compost Pile entrance, checking in with the attendant, and follow the signs to the range. The roads are graveled dirt access roads and are drivable. There is one slightly steep loose grade which is half way to the range. Please keep the vehicle driving speed to 15 mph or less, and watch for other vehicles or hikers. Best if you drive a truck or vehicle



which can be driven on rough graveled dirt roads.

What is at the range? The Archery Range has a vehicle parking area, picnic table, bow rests, yardage markers, hay bales, targets, and an earthen backstop. PMLA does not supply bows, arrows, water, restroom facility, or instruction.

Who can use the Archery Range? The range is a PMLA recreational amenity, and is open for use by all PML members and their guests. You will be asked for your Unit and Lot numbers when

> checking in with the Compost attendee. Your vehicles license number will also be recorded.

What are the rules for using the range? The Archery Range is for archers using bows and arrows only. Arrows with field points only are to be used at the range. There is NO Range Captain on site. Users must exercise safety and respect for others at or near the range. NO firearms are allowed at the Archery Range at any time. Shots must be directed to the placed targets. Archers using the forward shooting stations have the range total use; all other archers must have their bows at rest and wait until the

range is clear, the forward shooting station vacated before taking a shooting station. All persons must remain behind the firing line when the range is in use.

Rules for use are posted and available as a handout. An access map is also available.

At the June PMLA Board of Directors (BoD) meeting, the Long Range Planning Committee (LRPC) received approval to create a new program to capture the "best ideas" of all of our stakeholders, especially property owners and employees.

One of the primary goals of this new program, currently named the Conceptual Ideas (CI) Program, is to improve the overall quality of life for all property owners by formally soliciting and reviewing improvement ideas received from its constituents.

The LRPC and the management of PMLA are committed to continuing their efforts to seek out constructive input to help improve PML. Last year, the Property Owner Survey received over 925 responses and now we'd like to selectively decide on which ideas/suggestions to proactively pursue for implementation.

The PMLA CI Program is being modeled after a similar program currently used at a large, Home Owner Association (HOA) in Arizona that several members of the LRPC felt was useful in building property owner and employee involvement. One of the obvious objectives is to increase communication with those constituents who genuinely want to be engaged in helping to improve our amenities.

The AZ HOA's program promotes involvement, transparency, and accountability in researching new ideas. Some highlights of their program (and associated benefits) are as follows:

- A "good idea" can come from any HOArelated source, eg property owners, staff, organized groups, BoD. (Benefit: expand the sources for good ideas that get considered by the BoD.)
- The "good idea" is submitted on a structured form containing pertinent info

about the idea and the group/person proposing it. (Benefit: serious/informal suggestions get documented and do not disappear for lack of follow-through.)

- Each month, a list of submitted "good ideas" is reviewed by the BoD and/or a designated official committee to determine which are worthy of further study.
- Those ideas worthy of continued study are given a number, displayed on the HOA official website for more comment, and assigned to the appropriate committee for follow-up with the original submitter. (Benefit: submitted ideas are publicly visible to all property owners for comment; the submitter is involved in the idea's detailed definition and "further investigation" phase.)
- After "further investigation" (typically within 30-60 days), a decision is made by the committee, **with submitter involvement**, to proceed with the recommendation for the BoD to either consider the idea or reject it.
- A report on each "good idea" is prepared and put on the HOA website and a list of all ideas appears in the monthly newspaper. (Benefit: property owners can easily see the status of all submitted ideas.)

The exact details of the processes that will be included in the PMLA Conceptual Ideas Program are currently being defined. Within the next 90 days, the LRPC expects to formally announce the program so start thinking now about what "good ideas" you have to make PML an even better place to live. Shades of Green

BY ALAN MACDONALD, GOLF COURSE SUPERINTENDANT

This quote came from an article in a monthly magazine distributed by the Golf Course Superintendents Association. It allows us to know and feel what the turf is going through.

"If turf could talk. Help! It's already July and it hasn't rained for six weeks. The thatch on my surface is over a half inch, causing localized dry spot. My pores are naturally tight so even though I'm getting plenty of irrigation, none of it is reaching my root zone. What's a golf green to do?"

This sums up the need for summer time aerating and vertical cutting. It is suggested that subtle forms of aeration be performed on three week intervals. Along with aeration, the greens should be top dressed with sand every 2 to 3 weeks during the growing season with about 1000 pounds of sand per green.

Performing these needed tasks is occa-

sionally a minor disruption to your round and we thank you for your patience. They will provide better playing conditions and healthier turf in the long run.

Remember when the course was closed on Monday's? We could do a lot of the needed projects on that day and not have to do them in play. The same thing goes for our mowing practices. We must mow the driving range early in the morning when there is no range balls present for us to destroy. This takes about 90 minutes and the range must be closed until the mowing has been completed. We try to mow fairways later in the day because it gives us a much cleaner cut when they are dry. Again we thank you for your understanding.

Does anyone remember while watching Mayberry that Andy and Barney would allow the truckers on the interstate outside of town to exceed the

speed limit in order to gain enough speed to get over that hill? That's the understanding we need on occasion when choosing hole locations and the proper colored flag. Greens like two, seven and others are difficult to put a white flag on without always being in the same area due to how they are sloped. If at times it is close and not exactly the right color we can blame Andy and Barney.

The drinking fountains on the course are gravity fed through the G.C.S.D. water system. When the weather warms up and there is a lot of demand we can experience low pressure. Part of our setup each day is to check them as we go around the course. While they may operate just fine early in the morning, as demand increases they lose pressure. Thought you might like to know why they are inconsistent in their operation.

Thank you for doing your part of making the course a little better for those behind you. Enjoy your August golf. Make many birdies [that is 1 under on a hole, Uncle Milt] and pars.

August brings us to the heart of the summer. To me, there is nothing better than cold watermelon on a hot summer day. Fresh herbs are

plentiful in my garden and also in my kitchen at The Grill. It is a good idea when buying fresh herbs to air dry the remainder to use them at a later date. Here is an easy guide that helps pair wines with herbs.

Herb & Wine Pairing Guide:

Rieslings - Chervil, dill, parsley and coriander

Pinot Gris - Tarragon and anise

Sauvignon Blanc - Basil, garlic, oregano and rosemary

Chardonnay - Ginger, lemon zest, tarragon and thyme

Merlot - Basil and Oregano

Syrah - Basil, oregano, thyme and rosemary

Cabernet Sauvignon - Mustard, paprika, rosemary and thyme

Heirloom tomatoes are abundant and The Grill will be using them in our specials throughout the month. My favorite summertime memory growing up in Walnut Creek was swimming all day and eating tomatoes right off the vine. There was always a salt shaker nearby and we would eat them like apples. My 4 year old son told me just the other day, after eating a sweet yellow cherry tomato, that they were his favorite. Music to a mother's ear!

When it comes to fruits and vegetables, we've gotten spoiled compared to decades past. When something was out of season, it was mostly unavailable unless it was canned or frozen. There was always

some type of fruits and vegetables in stores, but they were always a lot more expensive and not quite up to par with something grown in season. With the wonders of intraand intercontinental shipping, most fruits and vegetables are in stores all the time, and for the most part they're pretty good. But no matter how good the produce from distant lands, whether from Mexico or Peru, there is still nothing like getting ears of sweet corn fresh off the Brentwood farms - many times picked the same morning before the farmers market - or bright red tomatoes that actually taste like the tomatoes we had growing up.

When I bring up tomato sandwiches, it's amazing how so many people eat them the same way: bread, mayo, salt and pepper. That's it! Reservations Recommended

Last year at this time I only had one thing on my mind, and that was to get people to come in and give the new Grill a try. My marketing goal was to get

people in the door. We did that with coupons and the Internet. Then, for those of you who gave us the opportunity, my team's goal was to serve you great food with great service for a great value. We use an online survey to get your realtime feedback to see if we meet your needs. And judging by the amount of guests that continue to return, we feel that we have exceeded your expectations.

However, with success comes a few good problems, trying to find parking and trying to get a table. Parking is always a challenge even when the Grill is slow, so we recommend arriving early. For those that don't mind a short walk, there is usually parking available in the outlying lots near the Tennis Courts.

I do highly recommend making a reservation at least 24 to 48 hours in advance when planning your next visit to the Grill, especially on Friday and Saturday nights. Even making reservations on the other days of the week will help us in preparing to give you the high level of service that you expect. Reservations will assist us in making sure we have enough staff to serve you. Also, by making advanced

reservations, Chef Carrie can make sure that she prepares enough food. Sounds simple enough, but our new found success has us scrambling most of the time.

In this economy, most restaurants would be happy to do the same amount of business as last year. For the Grill in July, we have doubled the amount of people we served last year. In numbers, that means we now serve between 200 to 225 guests on Friday and Saturday nights. On the other nights we serve between 80 and 100 guests. In 2010, we served on average 120 guests on the weekends and anywhere from 30 to 50 guests Sunday through Thursday.

Here are some reservation tips: Arrive early - making a reservation means that we will get you a table, but remember that depending on how busy it is, you may have to wait until a table becomes available. Call at least 24 hours in advance - calling the day of is helpful but doesn't help us to staff the restaurant or prepare enough food. 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

PML Aero Club

Our plane was out of service for the annual inspection and Bob Hornauer, our licensed aircraft mechanic, gives us the low down on all of the work that was completed to keep our Cessna air worthy:

During the month of June and early July, several of the members helped do the "Annual Inspection" of our club Cessna 172. An "Annual" is required on all active general aviation aircraft and is designed to catch any malfunctions or, just as importantly, any potential malfunctions of systems or components of the aircraft. It is performed at a specific calendar time based on when it was performed the previous year, hence the term. Inspection panels come off and the internal workings of the aircraft are thoroughly checked out. This year

was an especially challenging annual due to a couple of items needing attention – the seat tracks needed to be replaced and one of the cylinders needed to be re-worked due to low compression.

The seat tracks are small "rails" that the seat slides forward and backward on to allow the pilot to adjust to the proper distance from the controls. They have several holes that a pin engages to keep the seat securely in position. They occasionally wear out and must be replaced if they are out of specification. They are riveted in when the aircraft is originally manufactured, but when being replaced there is not enough clearance to use rivets, so small bolts and nuts are used. This was a real challenge making the holes, installing the hardware and making everything

fit and work properly.

A special instrument is used to check the compression of each cylinder and it turns out that one of the cylinders had a compression that was too low to pass. So out the cylinder comes to be serviced by a knowledgeable company – in this case our own Alan Buchner. The cylinder was then reinstalled and the airplane reassembled and readied for flight.



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

If you have been following the local news lately you have probably heard references to the Tuolumne County **Economic Development Authority** (TCEDA.) The TCEDA Is a joint powers authority formed between the City of Sonora and Tuolumne County. The Board has seven members. Two County Supervisors, Dick Pland and myself, Sonora City Council members Bill Canning and Hank Russell, public members Jim Gianelli, Patricia Jones and Dennis Dahlin plus ex-officio members, Tuolumne County CAO Craig Pedro and Sonora City Administrator Tim Miller. Because the Authority has been in the news, I have received a number of inquires about the Authority and more importantly the question as to what is its purpose and what are the duties of Board members.

When I began to think about how to give a brief but good answer to the questions, I went back and read the original agreement signed by the County and the City of Sonora. Following are excerpts along with my interpretation of specific elements of the agreement. For a complete text and more information of all the good work that has been and continues to be done by TCEDA go to www.tceda.org.

The simple definition and general purpose of the Agreement is to provide a united, coordinated, orderly, positive and more effective means for implementing and carrying into execution an Economic Development Authority for the benefit of all of the people of Tuolumne County.

The Authority is vested with the powers to effectively implement, coordinate and administer general economic development programs within the County and the City of Sonora, in accordance with local, state and federal laws. The general economic programs shall include, but are not limited to: 1) business retention and expansion; 2) business attraction; 3) business assistance programs; 4) identification of appropriate locations for and the creation of "shovel ready "commercial land and industrial properties including but not limited to adaptive reuse; 5) support the creation and rehabilitation of public infrastructure needed to support and sustain local business and industry(e.g. roads ,water ,power, sewer, telecommunications etc.; 6) Assist with educational and training

opportunities tailored to equip and support the community's workforce; and 8) the pursuit of funding sources to facilitate all of the above.

As you can see it's a pretty broad purpose. The good news is that the Authority Board with the guidance of the Economic Development Director Larry Cope has been very successful in fulfilling its purpose.

We are very fortunate to have found Mr. Cope and applaud the success of the Authority directly related to the hard work that he and his staff of one, Beth Hartline, have put in. The Authority Board sets the policies. Staff is the engine that makes it work.

A brief description of Board duties should you ever want to apply for a board vacancy:

- 1. Establish the vision and mission of the organization consistent with the "purpose "statement contained in the JPA and ensure that the organization remains focused and committed to accomplishing the same.
- 2. Govern the organization by broad policies, goals and objectives, assignment of priorities and ensuring the organization's capacity to carry out services and programs by continually reviewing its work.
- 3. Select and appoint a Director to whom responsibility for the administration of the organization is delegated, including:
- Reviewing and evaluating his/her performance regularly on the basis of a specific job description including executive relations with the board, ;leadership in the organization, service and program planning and implementation, accomplishment of the annual work plan activities, and management of the organization and its personnel
- · Offering administrative guidance
- · Determining whether to retain or dismiss the Director
- 4. Establish committees (standing and/ or ad hoc) as needed to explore, initiate and/ or maintain activities that further the vision and mission of the organization. This is a prime area in which the community knowledge and technical expertise of Board members can be utilized.

- 5. Acquire sufficient resources (public and private) for the organization's operations and to finance its services and programs adequately.
- 6. Account to the public for the services and programs of the organization's operations and expenditure of its funds including:
- *Requiring regular progress reports towards achieving Board adopted goals and work plans
- Providing for fiscal accountability by approval and monitoring of an annual budget and formulation of policies to ensure good stewardship of the organizations resources
- Requiring completion and presentation of regular financial reports and annual audits
- 7. Develop and maintain communication links and beneficial relationships with all major stakeholders in the community to enhance the organization's image and success.
- 8. Provide for the continuous selfevaluation and renewal of the board itself

You can see that a considerable amount of hard work is expected of the members on this board.

Last month I predicted that we would have a budget before the deadline. I was betting on your state representatives wanting to "get paid". Well, it happened and I commend the Governor for getting it done on time. There was some good news, some confusing news and some bad news, too.

By passing the AB117-the Criminal Justice Realignment Bill- and funding the program as the governors promised allowed the County to retain all of the jail clerk positions that have been noticed for lay-off. In hindsight, I think that we should have gambled and kept the positions in the final budget review. It is disheartening to put people on notice and disrupt their lives but with the information at hand it was the fiscally responsible action to take. I wish that I had more faith in Sacramento but their track record is shameful.

Along with AB117, AB109 was also passed. This bill shifts the responsibility for certain adult offender popula-

tions onto the Counties. The total of the funds set aside to implement this bill is \$354M. Tuolumne County's share is estimated at about \$780,000. Right now there is the uncertainty of whether the designated amount of funding is adequate, or not. AB117/AB109 are not perfect solutions but they represent a negotiated agreement that will enable California's counties to move forward with the dramatic changes necessary to make realignment successful.

Clearly, the successful implementation of realignment will require a significant paradigm shift in our public safety department. The successful model, more than likely, will not be an incarceration model, but one that seeks to divert and rehabilitate citizens, returning them to be productive members of our community.

It will be a different way of doing business.

Some bad news in the State budget was the passing of the \$150 State Responsibility Area fee (SRA) for fire protection in rural areas of the state for all properties that have a residence on them. Something like this just adds salt to the wounds of those fire departments that already have an assessment structure. It also questions the equitability of our current auto-aid response system, especially for those districts with their own special assessments. There has been some uncertainty expressed as to the legality of this fee.

If you live anywhere in Tuolumne County outside the limits of the City of Sonora, you will be affected. Contact the Governor and our State Representatives to voice your opinion.

In closing, most of you that read the paper regularly know that Mariposa County Supervisor, Lyle Turpin, was injured working on his ranch near Coulterville. Lyle is truly "one of the good guys" and has always looked out for the people he represents. He is held in high regard by those that know him personally and professionally. Our prayers are with him and with his family and we send him our very best wishes for a speedy recovery.

GRAND MARSHALL'S OF THE 2011 49ER FESTIVAL PARADE

Meet Grand Marshal Hal Mayo



Hal Mayo, 89, Pearl Harbor Survivor, joined the Navy after high school at the age of 18. He thought that this would be a great way to see the world and be paid doing it. This was going to be his career and he had no idea what lay ahead of him. Hal was assigned to Patrol Wing 1, which was operating out of a new base, NAS

Kaneohe Bay, in Hawaii. They had 36 PBY's, which were assigned to fly patrols over Hawaii.

On December 7, 1941 the base came under attack 3 minutes before Pearl Harbor was hit.

The squadron had 3 aircraft out on patrol and 33 on the ground when the attack began. The Japanese aircraft came in low and the only thing that Hal had was a Colt 45 revolver and he began firing at the planes. When his clip was empty,



other sailors ran to find more firepower. They were able to salvage a 50-caliber machine gun from one of the aircraft. The only problem was they had no ammunition. He ran to the armory and began belting 50-caliber ammo when the hanger about 150 feet away was hit by a bomb. Knowing this was not a good place to be, he took what ammo he had and went back to the area where the sailors had mounted the machine gun on a stack of lumber. The Japanese bombers were out of range and shooting at them would be useless. The base remained on alert for 3 days and finally


on Wednesday they were allowed to return to the barracks, shower and have a good meal.

Hal served as the Crew Chief on a Liberator bomber at several different locations in the Pacific during the war including Midway and Guadalcanal. He returned stateside in 1944 and finished out his tour of duty in Oakland, CA.

He said the happiest day of his Navy career was April 7, 1946 when he was honorably discharged from the Navy.

After being discharged, he enrolled in school to become an aero-

> nautical engineer. This was short lived, as the GI Bill per diem did not cover his cost of transportation, let alone food. He looked for part time work, landed a job in fire protection, and spent the next 34 years as a fire protection inspector. His



As with most survivors of the events which took place in Hawaii on December 7, 1941 he is very humble about his involvement but, to us, those who were there are all heroes in their own way.

Get To Know Grand Marshall Lee Dunlap

Long time Big Oak Flat resident Lee Dunlap has seen a lot in his 90 year life. He is a WWII hero, has been a logger, a sawmill worker and an antique dealer and basically a Lucky Man!

Born in Dumont, Texas, Lee lived in Coolidge, AZ where he was drafted into the U.S. Army in 1942. He was part of the 104^{th} Infantry known as the Timberwolves


that was the first group sent directly from the United States to land in Normandy. He saw much front line action, taking part in at least five battles including the Battle for Germany where Lee spent a grueling five months locked in combat with German soldiers. During his time in the military Lee had several "close calls" with enemy soldiers and refers to himself as "a lucky man". Such as the time he

stayed with a stranded Jeep while under fire from the Germans. This happened during a battle on the borders of Belgium and Holland, and earned Mr. Dunlap the Bronze Star for his bravery. Or the time that his regiment was near Cologne, Germany and were saved from a marauding German fighter plane by a half-track with anti-aircraft machine guns that just happened to be parked nearby. Luck, is always close by this heroic veteran.

After the war Mr. Dunlap ended up

in Greeley Hill working with his father in the logging industry. He started out driving a horse drawn log wagon. As a logger and sawmill worker he was employed throughout the Mother Lode at various locations. He eventually worked for Snyder Lumber Company of Turlock doing road construction throughout central California. He also helped build

the logging road from Highway 120 into Cherry Valley in the late 1940's and early 1950's. Then, some twenty years later, his son Ron worked on the road from the Tuolumne side to Cherry Valley. Between the two of them they helped create a road from Highway 120 all the way through the Stanislaus National Forest to Tuolumne.

Mexican Corn Bread

My first experiences with corn bread have been pretty disappointing. It has usually been pretty dry and needed to be smothered with butter to be made palatable. That all changed when I tried Paul Weaver's cornbread. Paula and I were at Paul's home for dinner one night and he was excited to serve us his corn bread; I think he said that he got the recipe from an attorney friend. We put on our best act to show our enthusiasm to taste his dish (which we were not at all excited to try), and low and behold, we loved it! It was surprisingly moist and so incredibly tasty!

Paul Weaver has been one of our local treasures for the last few years. He recently sold his fishing lodge in

British Columbia and smartly transplanted to PML for retirement. Paul has a very fascinating background in publishing, sailing, and much more, and we have been fortunate to become very good friends with him, and to be graced with some of his great recipes. If you are not a corn bread fan, forget about all cornbread that you have tried before, and try this recipe. You wont be dissapointed!

INGREDIENTS

2 Large Eggs
2/3 Cup Safflower Oil
1/2 Cup Sour Cream
1 - 15 oz can Creamed Corn
2 Tbsp Onion, minced
1 - 7 oz can Ortega Green Chiles,

finely chopped 1-1/2 Cups Yellow Cornmeal 2 Tbsp Baking Powder 1/4 lb Cheddar Cheese, grated

Pre-heat oven to 350 degrees. Oil a 9 x 11.5 inch baking dish. Mix together the eggs, safflower oil, sour cream, and creamed corn. Mix in onions and chiles (add some finely minced jalapenos if you want a spicier corn bread). Mix the dry ingredients (but not the cheese) together and then mix with the wet mixed ingredients quickly, leaving a few lumps.

Place half of the mixture in the oiled baking dish, and then cover with all of the shredded cheese; then top with remaining corn



bread mixture.

Cook for 45 minutes or until done; cool 10 minutes.

The Dead Sea, Afghanistan, and a Comic Pilot

What a busy month. Being part of the world's strongest Air Force is a tough gig sometimes, but somebody has to do it. Since I wrote last I've been places here that I didn't know would be so much fun. I was fortunate enough to spend a week in Amman, Jordan with the best set of aircrew and Ravens ever. That, of course, is personal opinion. I have to say though, our pilots, crew chiefs and loadmasters were the most down to Earth people I've met on this trip and they welcomed us with open arms. Together, a total of 9 of us packed into a van/shuttle thing and rode along for 2 hours to the Dead Sea.

I know it sounds weird, but if you

ever find yourself wanting to head to Jordan, visit the Dead Sea. It's the lowest point in the world, being about 410 meters below sea level. The salt content is so high in the Dead Sea that nothing can live in the water, so when I was floating around I wasn't afraid something was going to come up and eat me. Believe it or not, that is a regular fear I have.

I've seen a lot of this part of the world and I never realized how beautiful it was. The 9 of us were lounging in the water, in silence, as we stared across the beautiful landscape into Israel and the ancient city of Jericho. We all were floating on our backs in the sea because it is nearly impossible to sink due to the

amount of salt in the water.

Landing back here safely and wide awake was a great feeling. I lugged my weapons, gear and personal bags back to their respective homes and waited for the next trip. I can't wait to get back home to Groveland and just hang out. I've worked myself to the bone the past 3 years and I would like to sit among family and friends. I'll be back in town soon to see my friends, give my Papa a hard time about him being old and torment my Nan when she's cooking dinner. Should be a great time.

Depression

Depression is the most common mental illness in America. It is more than just the blues. It occurs when the feelings that accompany sadness or grief linger and interfere with a person's ability to carry on daily life or enjoy activities that previously brought pleasure.

Depression is not limited to specific times and places because it is a reaction to stress. It is a negative mood that can occur to anyone. Many people are not aware that they have depression. They confuse it with ordinary unhappiness. Everyone experiences circumstances in his/her life that cause some unhappiness. To be unhappy is to be sad or discontent when things go wrong, it does not cause a loss of perspective. One man said it this way, "When my wife and I have an argument, I am unhappy about it. I don't like it but it is a part of living. We make up in a short time and I can sleep okay and am in good spirits." Being depressed, on the other hand, is a mood which affects a person's basic emotional disposition.

There are popular misconceptions about depression as a mental illness. Some people still regard it as a mark

of weakness which gives them a sense of embarrassment, so the signs of depression are ignored.

Depressive reactions can be generally divided into 2 forms: acute or chronic. Acute depression is a shortlived, intense, painful, change of mood and is directly related to the event or situation causing it. Another man declared, "I loved my job but one day I was called into the boss' office and told that due to a financial setback in the company I was being transferred to a lower position and there would be a minimal cut in my pay. I was shocked and went home feeling like a failure. When I talked about it with my wife we agreed that it wasn't the best thing that could have happened but I still had a job. After a sleepless night worrying about my finances I realized that it wasn't the end of the world. I grumbled for a while but eventually got over it."

The signs of chronic depression are similar to acute depression, only more so: low self esteem, insomnia, high degree of sensitivity to criticism, withdrawal, difficulty in making decisions and a tendency to put things off. Acute depression can change

into chronic depression when the signs don't go away in a reasonable amount of time and the symptoms become more intense with feelings of hopelessness, lack of self worth, persistent worrying, and thoughts of doing personal harm. Marital problems, financial difficulties, sexual frustration and many other problems become paramount. Chronic depression is a serious mental illness. It robs people from fulfilling their dreams and having a happy life. It can be life threatening.

"When I'm depressed", a young woman reported, "it hurts all over. I can't sleep or eat and have no interest in my family. It colors the way I look at everything. I have no energy to deal with problems at my work, my marriage seems hopeless and I have a total loss of self confidence. I feel empty."

Some depressions seem to be the result of a poorly functioning brain. These depressions are treated biochemically. Many new and more effective antidepressants are available with fewer side effects. Antidepressant drugs are not addicting in the usual sense; the patient does not crave them

when they are withdrawn. Medication is not given as an instant cure. It is administered so that the patient can explore the causes of the depression and learn new coping skills to combat it. In the case of chronic depression medication alone is not enough. Both acute and chronic depression need to be accompanied with psychotherapy. It is important to work with a trusted professional therapist who understands, empathizes and has the counseling skills to guide the process.

If you have 5 or more of the following symptoms for 2 weeks or more, you could have clinical depression and should seek help. The earlier the treatment, the more effective the outcome: 1. Persistent sadness 2. Sleeping too much or too little 3. Reduced appetite with weight loss or increased appetite with weight gain 4. Loss of pleasure and interest in activities you once enjoyed 5. Restlessness, irritability 6. Chronic pain or digestive disorders 7. Difficulty concentrating, remembering or making decisions 8. Loss of energy 9. Feeling helpless, hopeless or worthless 10. Thoughts of suicide or death.

49er 2011 Parade Rules. Please Read And Save These Rules And Guidelines

WE MUST follow Cal Trans and local law enforcement agencies guidelines for the Parade.

RULES:

All entries MUST register at the Yosemite Bank registration table no later than 8 a.m.

- 1. NO PARKING is allowed in the Parade staging area at Yosemite
- 2. Horse trailers MUST park at the Medical Clinic (entrance is to the left of Mountain Sage)
- 3. For horse entries: No trailers allowed at Yosemite Bank. Horses and riders only.
- 4. You'll receive your parade placement number and line-up map at the registration table.
- 5. IN ADDITION TO RIDERS, ALL HORSE ENTRIES MUST HAVE A WALKER TO LEAD THE HORSE. If no lead is present, they will be unable to participate.
- 6. Children's entries must be accompanied by an adult

- 7. Floats cannot be wider than 8 feet
- 8. Absolutely no throwing or distribution of any candy, flyers, balloons or any other objects during the parade.

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

This month, August 2011, marks the 4th anniversary of these articles being printed in the PML Newsletter. The first article, about our galaxy the Milky Way, was printed in August 2007. I thought it might be interesting to explain the process that I use to take these photographs.

My imaging session usually begins just before sunset when I open the dome to the observatory. There are many pieces to the setup that I use. First there is the telescope mount. The telescope mount is securely attached to a permanent pier and is the part of the system that tracks the sky and must be precisely aligned to avoid tracking errors. It is connected to a computer and with the aid of an alignment routine (described in more detail later in this article) - the mount knows where it is pointed in the sky. Because the images that I take are long exposures, precise tracking of the telescope is critical as tracking errors quickly elongate stars in a photograph and then they look oblong or like streaks. The main telescope, referred to as the imaging scope, attaches to the mount. The imaging scope is where I attach the imaging camera. Because of the precise tracking requirements, I also use another camera that is attached to the imaging telescope. This camera is called a guide camera. I use the guide camera to correct any tracking errors by focusing on a star, called a guide star. By placing a guide star in the "cross-hairs" of the guide camera, small adjustments can be made to the mount tracking. The guide camera, which is attached to a computer, sends electronic signals to the mount to make the small corrections needed to ensure precise tracking of the sky.

Because the equipment is in an observatory and the mount is attached to a permanent pier, the mount only needs to be polar aligned if I make changes to the setup. Without going into a complicated discussion of polar alignment, let's just say that parts of the telescope must be pointed precisely at Earth's North Celestial Pole. The Earth rotates around its poles (north and south) making one revolution each day - approximately 24 hours. This rotation can be seen by noting the change in position of celestial objects in the sky. Most notably during the day is our Sun, and in the night, our Moon. The stars and other celestial objects move across the sky in much the same way as the sun and moon. For people in the northern hemisphere, which would include the residents of Groveland, there is one point in the sky that doesn't appear to move. It doesn't appear to move because this is the North Celestial Pole, the point in the sky around which all the stars seen from the northern hemisphere rotate. The North Star, also called Polaris, is located almost exactly at this point in the sky. If you go out at night and find the North Star you will notice that it doesn't move during the course of the night, while all the other stars do move, they rotate counter-clockwise around the North Star (from east to west - think about the sun rising in the east and setting in the west). It's similar to spinning a basketball at the end of your finger; the point where your finger contacts the basketball is almost stationary as

The next piece of equipment in the process is the imaging camera. I use a special digital camera designed exclusively for astrophotography. This camera is very specialized and may be a good topic for a future article. The imaging chip in the camera is cooled to reduce the noise in long exposures. The camera attaches directly to the telescope where the eyepiece (the part of the telescope that you look into) is normally located. In this way, the telescope becomes a very big lens for the camera. Focusing the camera can be a difficult process because the telescope needs to be focused manually by turning the focus knob on the telescope to move the camera whichever way is appropriate to achieve focus. I focus the camera by tak-



the rest of the ball rotates around it. This alignment of the telescope with the North Celestial Pole is critical to taking long exposure photographs of the sky.

Once the telescope system is polar aligned, I need to align the mount to its geographic location. This is done by pointing the telescope to several known stars in the sky. The mount has a database of celestial objects and it can "learn" its exact location by referencing this database with the position of the stars. This alignment routine, similar to the polar alignment process, does not need to be repeated unless I make changes in the setup. Now the mount can point the telescope to any object in the sky that I want to image.

ing a quick image of a star, downloading the image to a computer, magnifying the image for greater detail, and making small adjustments to the telescope focus knob until the image is perfectly focused. I am currently experimenting with a computer controlled motor on the focus knob of the telescope. This will allow the use of an automated focus routine to take exposures to find the best focus for the camera.

Once the camera is focused I can point the telescope to the position in the sky that I want to photograph and take some short (about 2 to 5 minute) exposures to confirm that it's pointed in the right place and to frame the object in the center of the photograph. It's important to remember that many of the celestial objects



that I photograph are so faint that you can't see them visually when you look through a telescope. Astrophotography is used to reveal what the human eye can't see. Today's digital camera sensors have the benefit of acting like a bucket that collects photons (light) - the longer the exposure, the more light (color and details) that's captured and displayed in the photograph. Long exposures from these cameras can capture light far too faint for our unaided eyes to see.

Once it's dark enough and the camera is focused, it's time to take some photographs. I take many separate photographs with exposure times as short as 15 seconds and as long as 30 minutes. Then, all the individual photographs are aligned and digitally "stacked" one on top of another to create the final image. It is this long exposure alignment and stacking technique that creates an image with the level of detail visible in the photographs that have been printed in this newsletter. Depending on how faint the object is that I'm photographing, the total exposure time of the images that I stack have been over 12 hours. In this case, I will take photographs over several evenings to create the final image. Processing all the individual images to create the final image typically takes 60 to 80 hours.

Printed with this article is a photograph of my astrophotography setup. The telescope mount, which moves the telescope and tracks whatever I happen to be photographing, is attached pier. Only the very top of the pier can be seen in this photograph. There are 2 main imaging telescopes that I use, a 3" and a 6" refractor. In this photograph, the image and guide cameras are attached to the larger 6" refractor. I also have a 10" reflector telescope attached to the mount that is used as a visual telescope. This visual telescope has an eyepiece that allows observing without disturbing the imaging camera setup.

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
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Helping Hands Happenings

Genealogy Workshop

From 1790 to 1840 the U.S. Federal censuses listed only heads of household by name and the number of other members of the household between certain specific ages. However, the 1820 census had a column headed "Foreigners not Naturalized." This would be the first record of citizenship indicated on a U.S. Federal census. Citizenship records are also found in the 1830, 1870 and 1900 censuses.

Be careful when interpreting the 1820 census because the age breakdown for the "Free White Male" column is misleading. The headings are men aged under 10, 10 to 16, 16 to 18, 16 to 26, 26 to 45, 45 and over. The problem is the columns headed 16 to 18 and 16 to 26. The government wanted an idea of the number of males that could qualify for military duty so the additional column for males 16-18 was included on the census form. This has caused many a family historian to spend a considerable amount of time hunting for a male that didn't exist or to follow the wrong family because of the age breakdown columns. What is not readily apparent is that any males listed in the 16-18 column are also listed in the 16-26 column.

When working with the census it is a mistake to assume that all the information is correct. Also, not all the youngsters are necessarily the children of the adults with whom they are enumerated or even that the adult woman is the wife of the head of house and/or mother of the children. Keep in mind too, all people listed in the household may or may not be the nuclear family. They could have been a neighbor, visiting family, laborers, boarders, etc.


Don't assume that a parent is dead simply because he or she isn't on subsequent censuses. That person may have gone to live with adult children who would be listed as the head of household. Lastly, do not assume the head of household was alive at the time of the census. The enumerator's instructions were to list the names of individuals in the household on the official date of the census (7 Aug 1820) not the day of the visit, which could have been as late as 7 Sep 1821. Bear in mind that many people probably couldn't remember who had actually been in their home 13 months before, so the census taker would record the family (as it was remembered.)

MERLE IVERSEN HEATH

September 17, 1917 - June 25, 2011

Pine Mountain Lake Resident, Merle Heath, passed away at Drs. Medical Center in Modesto on June 25. She was 93.

Merle was born to Ingeborg and Anders Iversen in Cedar Falls, Iowa, one of three children and the only girl. Her parents had immigrated from Denmark in 1915. She grew up in Cedar Falls and attended two years at Iowa State Teachers College before she fulfilled her life long dream and went West to California in 1937.

Merle went to work as a secretary in the film industry and then for Hughes Aircraft, witnessing the construction of the Spruce Goose!

that reads: Merle and Charlie Heath Skate Park: Dedicated to those with the energy to make the dream come true...Charlie passed away in 2007.



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
