Fire Safety Inspections and Abatement

July 1st is the deadline for fire safety compliance on member lots. Our fire safety inspectors have been methodically inspecting every lot within PML, and it is clear by their reports that the majority of our members are doing a great job! On behalf of your Association, I would like to thank all of those members that cleared their property for fire safety before the deadline. Your diligence helps keep PML fire safe.

Swimming Lessons

PML is offering swimming lessons starting this month at the Pool Center. In years past we have had difficulty getting a certified water safety instructor to provide lessons to all of the kids and grandkids at PML. This year we decided to have all of our Pool staff trained so that we could ensure that we have complete coverage and could provide lessons. My Assistant, Rick Whybra, was instrumental in coordinating the training program, and made sure we were able to pull it off this season.

The W.S.I. course is very challenging and includes several days of in-water and written classroom training. Congratulations to Swimming Pool Manager, Sheila Eslick and her team, for passing their training certification with flying colors!

The Canada Goose Problem

As most members know, the summer season amplifies the need to reduce the Canada Goose population within PML. Messy beaches and amenities, as well as turf destruction, are the result of this situation. There are health concerns that can be attributed to this problem, even though we do our best to keep the affected areas clean.

Those members that frequent our Marina and Golf Course bear the brunt of the mess. Members that live around the lake also deal with the problem on their own private property. The geese like to feed on the lush turf, and in turn deposit their annoying, hazardous waste. Our staff works diligently to chase the geese away and clean up the "deposits", but it continues to be a problem.

Over the years, we have tried many techniques and products to haze our resident Canada Geese in an attempt to get them to move on. We have seen a reduction in the number of geese due to our attempts, but not enough to eliminate the problem.

The Canada Geese are protected by Federal and State law and anything we do is covered by very cumbersome regulations and permits. Even so, my staff and I have not given up and will continue to work on ways to mitigate this problem.

complaints of violations, usually neighbor vs. neighbor. Barking dogs, loose dogs, loud music and noise late at night seem to be the biggest issues. Trespassing is another prob-

creased population within PML bring

issues. Trespassing is another problem as some folks feel it is ok to walk through the neighbor's lot to get to a green belt to walk on a trail or simply take in the view.

We also see an increase of folks riding bikes, walking dogs and playing football on the fairways of our Golf Course. Some are members, some renters and some guests. We negotiated a new contract with union employees that saved \$475,000 over three years. We reduced employee turnover, resulting in financial savings as well as better service to members. The new electric golf carts are energy efficient and cheaper to maintain.

Are there more savings to be made? Absolutely, and that will be my focus. However, I will not ignore problems or leave a mess for the next generation of home owners to deal with. I will protect our investment in this community and make sure that PML remains a safe, caring and desirable place to live.

The new carts, storage facility and snack shack are all first rate. The Grill not only has had a complete make-over, but now provides quality food and service on a consistent basis with revenue at record levels. (Have you tried going in for dinner on the weekend without a reservation? Good luck.)

The lake has been dredged and the coves are in great shape. The Marina is better than ever with new merchandise and services as well as a good meal. The pool has been redone with a new interior and exterior surface. The Reserves are slowly returning to a healthy level, allowing us to plan for the future and continue to keep PML up to date and looking good.

All of this has been done with minimal assessment increases and include a reduction this year. Not many services have had a price reduction recently.

By these kind of measurements I would argue that the Association is a success. But success is never a stationary target. In order to continue to be successful we need to keep moving; keep striving to provide the services that you as a property owner have come to expect and deserve.

It's hard to believe that the 4th of July is here. What a long, wet winter and spring. With over two inches of rain in early June, it brought our totals to nearly 58 inches for the year. All the water does have some advantages. The cool season grass never felt so good going into the middle of June. The normal nightly irrigation cycles have not been so normal, as we have not had to irrigate as often this season.

The U.S.G.A. visit is scheduled for September 20th. All are encouraged to tour the course with Brian Whitlark, who is an agronomist with the U.S.G.A. He sees many different courses around the southwest and our area each year, and brings valuable information with great ideas to his visit. We will meet near the first tee around 8: 00 am. Please come on out, ask questions and participate in his visit. I believe you will find it to be fun and educational.

The project to improve the low areas next to # 3 and 17 greens will be tested this summer. Nightly irrigation was a factor in these areas staying so wet. Located in the swale or at the bottom of the slope, as is the case with # 3, it is difficult to irrigate the slope enough to keep it healthy, while not flooding the low areas. So hopefully, when your ball gets a little off track and you find yourself missing a green, your playing conditions will

have improved with the project that we completed in early spring.

A couple of the projects that needed to be completed after the new cart barn was finished are now done. The new netting for the driving range was completed a day or so before the Mother Lode Tournament. The landscaping of the hillsides has also been completed. Take the time the next time you are down there to look around at the improvements. Fighting with Mother Nature to complete the netting and working on those steep slopes to do the landscaping was a challenge. The street department, along with golf pro shop staff, assisted us in these projects; I thank them for their contributions.

Don't forget that on July 11th and 12th we are scheduled to aerate the greens. We will not be closed for this summer aeration. We will do all that we can to complete this needed project, as quickly as possible, while play is on the course. The greens and I thank you ahead of time for your patience.

Have a fun and safe 4th of July. Please come out to enjoy the beautiful course that we get to maintain. As the weather warms up, play nine in the evenings to enjoy the afternoon breezes, sit outside and have a beverage on the deck and appreciate what a beautiful area we get to live in.

Doing More with Less

Pine Mountain Lake Golf News

"SUMMER PACE"

The 2011 Mother Lode Invitational was played on June 10th and 11th this year and we had all the makings for a fantastic event, great weather not being the least of them. This year's event was a huge success and I'd like to extend a huge "Mahalo" to all of the Golf Staff (Maintenance & Pro Shop) for all of their efforts. In additional, I'd like to extend my thanks to all of the volunteers that gave their time and effort to the event.

One week later, Pine Mountain Lake Golf & Country Club had the ladies take their shot at conquering the golf course in the 2011 Pine Tree Invitational. Again, the event was a huge success do to all the hard work put forth by the Ladies Club and all of the volunteers that assisted in creating yet another fantastic event.

Changing gears a bit, I'd like to devote some of this article to addressing the all so important issue of Pace of play. We've added marshals to the golf course and, while this certainly helps keep things moving, there are a lot of little things that every golfer can do to ensure they, and the rest of the golfers out there, have an enjoyable round of golf. Pace of play is probably the most focused on aspect of any golf course. A good pace can mean the difference between having an "okay" experience on the golf course or a truly "great" one.

What is a good pace for a golf course? While pace can vary from course to course depending on difficulty, length, and crowdedness, a typical 18-hole round of golf should take between 4-hours and 4-hours and 15-minutes. This works out to be about 14-minutes to play each hole. Sounds reasonable, but inevitably, on many occasions in the business, we run into 4-hour and 30-minute rounds and 5-hour rounds that frankly, is too much time to spend playing 18-holes of golf.

There are many ways to address pace of play issues. Obviously, having a marshal helps, but in my 18 years in the golf business I've found that educating golfers on how to improve pace is much more effective than telling them to speed up! Personally, I've made a lot more friends educating than marshalling. The goal is not to make golfers feel uncomfortably rushed, running from tee to green, but there is a term that can

help everyone have a relaxed, enjoyable and most of all, a timely round of golf. The term is "Ready Golf".

Ready Golf has many aspects and I feel like I could write a chapter in a book about it but I'll try to sum it up with a few key bullet points:

• BE ON TIME

First and foremost, check in for your round at least 20-minutes prior to your tee time. If you are planning on practicing before your round of golf, you should show up 40 to 60-minutes before your tee time, depending on how much of a "range rat" you are.

• BE READY

Before your actual tee time, get your glove, get your balls, get your tees, get your ball-markers and organize your clubs so you know where they are at in your bag. Searching for these items when you should be teeing off wastes unnecessary time.

• G0

Once it is your turn to tee off, it's time to play. Think of a tee time as a flight. Golf is a great opportunity to talk and share funny stories, but save them for the time spent riding in the cart or walking to your next shot. Standing on the tee (or putting green), telling a story when it's open to hit in front of you is a "no-no".

• BE AWARE

Watch yours and your playing partner's tee shots. A lot of time is wasted looking for golf balls because there weren't enough eyes watching where the shots went. When you see where the ball has come to rest, pick a land mark (tree, bush, cart sign, etc.) to help you remember the area where the shot came to rest.

• BE PREPARED

On the way to the shot, start thinking about how far the ball is from the green or your next target and which club or clubs you'll be most likely to use. Take 2 or 3 clubs with you to the ball. Walking back and forth between your ball and clubs is another time waster.

• BE ON THE BALL

If you are playing with another golfer or a whole four-some, once someone is at their ball, walk or ride over to yours so that by the time they hit their shot you are ready to hit yours. This will also give you more time to decide and commit to a shot and club selection. Once they hit, you're ready.

• PUTT OUT

Once you're on the green, a good rule to follow is continuous putting. This simply means that once you start putting you should continue putting until your ball is in the hole. Unless, of course, your stance would be interfering with someone else's line.

KEEP MOVING

Once your group has finished putting out, move immediately to the next tee box. Write your scores down on the next tee NOT while you're parked by the green. Someone behind you is probably waiting to hit their shots onto the green.

• KEEP POSITION

Keep up with the group in front of you. This is the big one folks! This is how you know if you are out of position on the golf course. Remember, your position on the golf course is dictated ONLY by the group in front of you NOT the group behind you.

All of these points sound very basic, and actually even trivial, and each one of these actions or inactions probably only save or waste 20-seconds to a 1-minute. However, if two or three of these "Ready Golf" basics aren't being followed on a hole, that could add up very quickly to as many as 2-minutes, maybe even 3-minutes, per hole that is wasted. What's the big deal about 3-minutes? At 3-minutes per hole, that's 54 minutes per round. That's the difference between a 4-hour and 5-hour round!

Please note: not once during any of these points did it require you to rush your shot or skip your routine or hurry your swing. These are simple, effective ways to manage the time spent on the golf course and hopefully, maximize everyone's potential to enjoy the game at a comfortable pace.



Compliance Chatter

By the time you read this we will have started our re-inspections for the 2011 Fire Safety season. The Courtesy Notices we sent from our first inspections were down about 25% from prior years. This is primarily due to the outstanding work you have accomplished over the last few years in reducing fuel by "getting rid of the dead stuff and thinning out the live stuff."

The late rains created challenges for all of us. I've personally had to cut my weeds 3 times this year because they keep growing back. I know this is frustrating for many of you and we appreciate your extra effort in keeping us as fire safe as possible. If you have hired a vendor to do the work and they have been waiting for the weeds to die, just call and let us know who you have hired and we will notate our log. Communication is a good thing.

All the downed trees and limbs from the rough winter season have created additional challenges. One of the most frequent questions has been the property line issue where trees/limbs have fallen from one property into the neighbor's property. Property Owner's rights and responsibilities are best resolved by communication. We recommend you contact your neighbor and work out a compatible solution you can both live with.

Many of you have waited to cut your weeds because they were still green well into June this year. As I write this (the middle of June) the temperature in is the 90's today so the weeds will be dying and you will have time to complete your work before the July 1 deadline. We will begin our re-inspections on July 5 and in the order we did the initial inspection. If you receive a second notice you will have 15 days from the date of this second notice to complete your work before we move to the final step of enforcement. Please communicate with us as to your plans. We are more than willing to work with you to accomplish our common goals.

We are very proud of the work you have done over the past few years in implementing the fire safe guidelines on your property. And what we have accomplished as an Association in reducing fuel in our greenbelt areas is nothing short of spectacular. PML has become the poster child for successful implementation of California PRC Code #4291. This Code spells out the statewide requirements to be fire safe and is implemented by our defensive partner, CalFire. We all have a lot to be proud of.

Hey, it's July and the grass is green, the lake is high, and the creeks are flowing. But just like snow in January, it is the fire season again. Maintenance has been spraying herbicides for months, more than once in some places, turning green things brown, then, when the time is right, we whack it down to the ground. I know all of our property owners are also busy with fire abatement work on your own lots. That buzzing sound from weed whackers makes PML sound like a huge beehive on many days.

The PML Fire Abatement Plan is contingent upon a great effort from everyone; from property owners to vendors, from contractors, our Fire Safety Department, and the Maintenance Departments. A recent visit from Groveland's Cal Fire Battalion Chief, Jeff Sanders, gave us a huge endorsement on the successes of all of our combined efforts. PML properties are looking fire safe, the greenbelts and common areas are being treated to reduce the debris. The Slash and Compost Piles have never looked better. We are becoming the model of a fire safe community.

This year's addition of a fulltime attendant at the Slash and Compost Piles is Maintenance Department staff employee, Joe Ronning. He has the Slash and Compost Piles site prepared for visitors five days a week, Wednesday through Sunday, 9AM to 5PM; the materials are properly sorted and staged, firewood is piled, compost is piled, wood chips are piled, and the manure is piled. We are handling a high volume of slash this year from the increase of downed trees and limbs

from the storm season. We are accepting over 120 loads a day, averaging 200 cubic yards of materials accepted each day. So please keep the tree limbs and brush properly tied down when you are transporting the materials to the site.

PML is in the fourth year of the Five-Year Fire Abatement Plan for making Pine Mountain Lake fire safe. A huge effort has been made to reduce the forest debris, remove trees, brush, and thin our greenbelts. The treatment plans for our 805 acres do vary for each location, yet have created the same targeted results. The trees are limbed up along the border areas with property owners, brush and trees are masticated, erosion is controlled, shaded fuel breaks are constructed. The protection is two-fold: the community is protected from a wildfire; the event of

a fire beginning with PML is contained, controlled, and manageable.

The bulk of the greenbelt mastication work is performed by machines. The large machine can grind trees and brush to chips in minutes. There have been two large machines working the area on the north side of the Campground in Unit 16. This treatment has enlarged the vista, ground not seen in decades, and has provided a fire safe shaded fuel break.

Difficult greenbelt areas with thick brush, common areas near to houses, and greenbelt maintenance work are performed with our Terex PT100 forestry skid steer tractor. The operator can clear and mulch Manzanita, buck brush, small trees and debris in minutes. In other words, it does more in five minutes than I get done on a weekend! With the addition of a rotary mowing deck, the machine will mow grass and brush to mulch and maintain our treated areas.

The implementation of these machines and operators has greatly increased our productivity, lowered the cost of treatment per acre, and has allowed PML to reach its fire safe goals. Mastication has proved itself a functional tool in the conservation of our forested areas, reducing the demands on the reducing of slash by additional methods, controlling erosion, and creating a healthy fire safe zone.

A special thanks to the hard work performed by our contractors, the Maintenance Department Staff, the Fire Abatement Team (FAT), Glenn Gottschall of Forestland Consulting, and the Assistant to the General Manager, Rick Whybra, for all the teamwork to get this work accomplished.

Free Chipping by Fire Safe Council

The Yosemite Foothills Fire Safe Council (YFFSC) recently announced that sign ups are being taken for the chipping of dangerous brush, slash and debris later in June. This homeowner program is designed to eliminate hazardous fuels by providing a free chipping service to homeowners who cut and stack brush, small trees and other slash. The goal is to assist residents and land owners in complying with state law requiring one hundred feet of defensible space around a residence.

The YFFSC will subsidize the entire cost and hire a chipping crew to dispose

of the brush, trees and other fuels. The program is offered only for a limited time on a first come, first served basis and also depends on scheduling considerations to maximize the chipping of debris. Property owners are asked to cut and stack brush along an accessible road and to stack the slash with the butt end facing the road.

"With debris burning season winding down chipping is a safe means of eliminating unwanted brush and other tree limbs for residents to reduce the fire hazard on the property" according to Nancy Longmore, fire preventions

specialist with the California Department of Forestry and Fire Protection (CAL FIRE). "Chipping has proven to be a great tool to eliminate the flammable debris around homes and get in compliance with the defensible space regulations" Longmore added.

The program is not designed to chip piles that have sat for burning as the amount of labor and time to separate the piles waste valuable program resources. The program is limited to residents located in southern Tuolumne and northern Mariposa Counties.

Chipped material is left on site and

the wood chips can be recycled as mulch, decorative landscaping, dust and weed control and many other uses.

The Yosemite Foothills Fire Safe Council is a non-profit entity with a simple goal of reducing the fuel around homes and communities so that a wildfire can be stopped quicker and with less damage to life, property, habitat and the forest. Preparedness and prevention of catastrophic fires are our goals.

Just The Facts About Pork (and a recipe)

Part of my job as Head Chef involves staying up to date on industry news, trends and fads. I received this press release

from the Daily Livestock Report. The USDA has announced what Chefs have been aware of for some time now, but now they have made it official...It is okay to eat pork pink. The article states; "In the culmination to a years-long campaign by pork producers and processors, the latest major push of which began in 2006, the USDA announced that it is reducing its recommended cooking temperature for pork muscle cuts to 145° F internal temperature followed by a three minute rest time before carving or consuming. The change, announced by USDA Under-Secretary for Food Safety, Dr. Elizabeth Hagen, creates a uniform cooking temperature recommendation for all muscle cuts of meat (beef, pork, veal and lamb) and establishes a uniform three minute rest time recommendation for all

cuts. The rest time is important as it allows heat to be conducted from hotter surface areas into the middle of a cut, pushing internal temperatures to the point that any pathogens which may be present are destroyed. It should be noted that the USDA still recommends that ground meats be cooked to 160° internal temperature and that all poultry be cooked to internal temperatures of 165°."

Why is this a big deal? A bit of history is in order. Pork has always carried a "there's something in there that you have to kill" albatross around its neck. The "something" that has caused generations of mothers and grandmothers to teach their daughters (and sons!) to cook pork until "it" (and the pork itself, in most opinions!) was dead is trichinella spiralis, a parasite that was once relatively common in pigs. The good news is that the incidence of trichanella spiralis in the U.S. pig population has fallen to virtually zero according to Len Steiner and Steve Meyer who publish the Daily Livestock Report. The disease is so rare in pig populations that a USDA trichanella monitoring

and eradication pilot project in the late 1990s had one major problem: It could find hardly any infected pigs. The second reason that this is an important action is that modern pork is not nearly as forgiving when overcooked. Lean pork simply cannot withstand the overcooking that once was masked by higher external and internal fat content. The move to heavier-muscled, leaner hogs was driven by consumer demand as well as production economics. When fat and cholesterol phobia first hit U.S. consumers in the mid-1980s, pork demand fell by an average of 4.5% per year for 5 straight years. Pigs were getting leaner and pork producers launched "The Other White Meat" campaign to highlight this product improvement and position the product closer to white meat chicken which was perceived to be the gold standard for "healthy" meat. The "leaning" of pork really got rolling in the 1990s when better genetics, nutrition and breeding systems pushed fat content lower and lower. Those experiences were made even worse by consumers who, based on grandma, mom and USDA's 160° recommendation, continued to cook pork until "it" was dead to over-cooked. This change to 145° F plus 3 minutes rest allows me to serve a high quality lean and healthy pork chop to our members.

Raisin Sauce – This recipe was given to me by a good friend; it was handed down to her from her grandmother.

A perfect accompaniment for any pork dish

1.5 c seedless raisins

1.5 c water

5 whole cloves

1.5 c white sugar

4T cornstarch mixed with 5 cups cold water

2T butter

2T vinegar

Bring first 3 ingredients to a boil and simmer for 5 minutes. Remove cloves. Add sugar and reheat until mixture boils. Thicken with cornstarch and water mixture. Remove from heat and add butter and vinegar.



John Gray, Tuolumne County 4th District Supervisor

At the June 7th Board of Supervisors meeting County CAO, Craig Pedro, provided the status of this year's budget and asked the Board for direction in developing the budget for 2011-2012. Finances and economic health seem to be the main topics of many conversations nowadays and Tuolumne County is no exception where this is concerned.

If you are one that has been following Tuolumne county finances, you may recall that \$3.5M in non-recurring funding (one-time money) was used to support the current year's budget. This was done in the hope and anticipation that we would be experiencing an improved, or at least an improving, economy by this time. Unfortunately, this turn-around has not happened. I believe that the use of one-time money to balance the operation budget cannot be continued. Below are the estimated operating shortfalls for future years in the General Fund only.

Fiscal Year 2011-2012 (\$4,092,000); Fiscal Year 2012-2013 (\$6,000,000); Fiscal Year 2013-2014 (\$6,586,000)

The figures above suggest that additional permanent reductions must be made starting in 2011-2012. The use of non-recurring funds again would only prolong necessary reductions.

The question is "What can we do to provide essential services to the people of Tuolumne County and to balance the budget as required by State Law?" We must have a plan.

The Board, with the help of staff, has developed policies and priorities for budget adoption. To review the details of the policies, please refer to the County's web page. In short, the policies direct staff to take a very conservative approach in budget preparation.

In previous articles I have noted the concessions that county employees and elected officials have taken to help balance the budget. That practice will continue. The Board has expressed its desire, as part of its labor negotiations and budgeting, to protect base staffing to the highest extent possible for the benefit of our employees, the essential services they provide to the public and their overall contribution to the economy. Lastly, the Board has also acknowledged a priority to support base level staffing to insure adequate operation of all revenue generating functions.

When trying to close such a large gap (\$4.092M) and still provide for essential service, staff reduction is necessary.

At the June 14th Board meeting a recommendation was made to the Board to issue lay-off notices to 60 county employees in nearly all departments. The lay-off notices were given so as to be in compliance with labor agreements that the county has with its employees. If you have ever managed people and have a heart, you know that this is one of the most difficult decisions that one has to make.

One position that was not approved for reduction at this meeting was in Veterans' Services. That department provides assistance for veterans in acquiring benefits from U.S. Veterans Services. In a unanimous vote of the Board, this position will continue to be filled "full time". The men and women that have served in the military and put their lives on the line deserve as much help as we can give them. The dedication demonstrated by veteran's services staff members is shown every day as they succeed in helping veterans understand the network of government rules, regulations and paper work.

The final lay-off decision will be made at the July 21st Board of Supervisors meeting. As required by law, the County must pass a balanced budget by June 30th. Staff has been directed to come back to the Board with recommended changes to the budget should our financial position improve.

Hopefully, by the time you read this article, the State will have passed a budget. I know that this is wishful thinking but one can always hope. Today, June 14th, a state budget plan is in the works. It is disappointing to see that this proposed



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budget contains many of the same "smoke and mirrors" solutions that have been represented in the past. This plan continues to attempt to balance the state budget on the backs of the counties. I understand that the choices are difficult. Our legislators must make a greater effort to seek compromise. The impact of an "all-cuts" budget will negatively affect every citizen in every community. Partisan differences must be put aside and everyone needs to work toward a compromise on our behalf.

The good news is that if the state budget deadline is not successfully met, our representatives will, like so many others, not be receiving a paycheck!

On a more positive note-we will soon be celebrating Independence Day-the 4th of July, immersing ourselves in BBQ's with family and friends, outdoor picnics, camping trips, fireworks and all manner of "fun in the sun" days. This, our National Holiday, recognizes the pride we have in our history and heritage, the respect we hold for our laws and the admiration for the strength of character demonstrated in our society and in our people.

Tough times are a test and one that we will not fail.

Good Morning Groveland! Greetings from Southeast Asia

It's been a long time since I've written for this paper. I apologize. I was at home with my family in Tampa, Fl. Now I'm in Southeastern Asia, deployed again. This particular trip is so much better than my last. No more outside the wire convoys, no Humvee's without A/C, I'm strictly a flyer now.

My mission is simple; when an aircraft flies, no matter what it is, I go with it. I protect it, the cargo and the personnel on board with a team of 2 other Airmen. To do this special mission. I went to Phoenix Raven school at Joint Base Dix-Mac-Guire-Lakehurst, NJ. I had the Hell beat out of me for 17 days. Anything from defending myself with an ASP Baton to ground and pound MMA fighting. It was a great time to learn something new. The Phoenix Raven program was implemented after the Khobar Tower's incidents in Saudi Arabia on 25 JUNE 1996 and in Malaysia where stow-aways sneaked into the wheel well of a C-17 and eventually died from frigid cold. Since 1997 there have been less that 2,000 airman that have passed Raven school, we are each assigned numbers and I am #1908.

At the ripe old age of 23, I'm blessed at the amount of traveling I have been able to do. Various countries in South America and the Middle East, but as for the upcoming months, I'm back in the desert. My plane landed at 0700 hrs and the temperature on the tarmac was 109 degrees. I thought that it was a glitch in the aircraft's system, so I ignored it. As we waited for the Airman from the Passenger (PAX) terminal to arrive and give us information, I noticed the temperature starting to rise...110, 111. By 0800 we were throwing bags for 250 people from the bottom of the aircraft in 114 degree weather. Not bad for the first day. After unloading bags and grabbing our weapons, my room mate and I went through se-

curity. I told the security guard, "Ah salam alaykum" (May peace be upon you) or "Hello" in Arabic. He smiled and replied "Alaykum Salam." (And peace upon you). He then said in English, "I see you've been to this part of the world before." I laughed, nodded and went through customs.

Being at this base isn't bad. It's nice, they even have a pool. I'm not used to walking around in the desert without a pistol, but this kind of 'deployment' is only what most airmen know. So, I guess I can't complain. It's not like anyone would listen anyways. We are constantly flying to different countries around the "sandbox", whether we're transporting US troops or prisoners from other bases in Iraq or Afghanistan. Coming up in August too, I will have been deployed for over 400 days in the last 600. Not too shabby.

I just wanted the chance to write again and thank Groveland. I miss it and I'll be back home soon with my wife and kids. Thank you for your continued support for the troops and everything we do. Trust me, we need all we can get.

Oven Roasted Salmon with Lemon Dill Butter Sauce

RECIPE PROVIDED BY TOM KNOTH AND PAULA MARTELL

INGREDIENTS

1.5 lbs Skin-on Salmon Filet

2 tsp Olive Oil

Kosher Salt and Freshly Ground Black Pepper

SAUCE

4 Tbsp Butter, melted

1 Tbsp Lemon Juice

1 tsp Dry Dill Weed (or 1 Tbsp Snipped Fresh Dill) PUT OVEN RACK ON LOWEST POSITION. Place a rimmed baking sheet on the rack and heat oven to 500 F.

Melt Butter and combine/whisk with lemon juice and dill.

Remove any whitish fat from the filets, pull out any detectable bones, and cut into 4 equal weight pieces (about 6 ounces each). Pat the salmon dry with paper towels. Rub the filets evenly with the olive oil and season liberally with salt and pepper.

TURN OVEN DOWN TO 275 F. Remove the baking sheet, spray with Pam (or brush olive oil on), and place salmon filets on baking sheet – skin side down. Make sure that the oven is set at 275 F, and place baking sheet with salmon on the lower oven rack. Roast for 9-13 minutes until the center of the thickest part of the filet is 125 degrees F.

Microwave Dill Lemon Butter just before service and top salmon filets with it. Garnish with lemon rounds and/or fresh dill.

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Genealogy Workshop

Just about everyone who begins researching his or her family uses the U.S. Federal Census and, over the next few months, I will be giving you more information on the various censuses and what to look for.

The first Federal Census was taken in 1790 and included only the name of the head of the household, number of free white males of sixteen years and older, number of free white males under sixteen years, number of free white females, number of all other free persons, number of slaves, and sometimes town or district of residence. At that time, the government was mainly concerned with assessing the country's industrial and military potential, thus the question free while males 16 and older (a primary goal of providing information on men eligible for the military.)

The states included in the 1790 census were: Connecticut, Maine, Maryland, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, New York, North Carolina, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, South Carolina, Vermont and Virginia. Many of these records were lost or destroyed, but those that still exist can be found in libraries or on the Internet. Online census records can be accessed free at Heritage Quest Online using your Tuolumne County Library card or from *Ancestry.com* with a free two week trial subscription.

Information found in the 1790 census, while not as much help as later censuses, should still be noted. For example, knowing the number of males and females in the household is useful in differentiating one family from another when heads of household have the same name. Take down the information on any family that could be yours and also look at the people who lived nearby for possible relatives (a married daughter, parents, siblings, etc.).

Some individual states have also taken censuses and those are a valuable source of information as well. Remember to always look at the original document and to look at neighbors of your relative.

The Little House Transportation Dilemma for Seniors

A statistic that may surprise you is that Americans live on average seven to ten years beyond the date that they become aware that they are unable to drive. Do you have a plan when you can no longer drive? How will you get to the doctor's office, the library, get food from the grocery store, go to the bank? How about that trip to Sonora you frequently take?

There are very few transportation options in this area. Southside Senior Services, a non-profit organization operating out of The Little House in Groveland, is looking at ways to help adults in our community stay healthy and active and developing a plan for Senior Transportation is among our initiatives. A group of eight people is working on this project.

Many of us are aware of seniors "on the hill" who can't drive due to illness, incapacity, loss of driving license or other circumstances. We see them become isolated, lonely and unable to take care of their basic necessities. They may feel forced to move to the flatlands at a time when mountain property is difficult to sell. That can add financial hardship if people are forced to move.

One of our first tasks is to determine the nature of transportation needs of seniors in our community. Do seniors perceive the need? Where do they want to go to, how

often do they need to be there and how long do they need to stay at their destination before being taken home? We have developed a survey that will be sent out by GCSD in the July monthly billing. To ensure that we maximize the rate of responses to the survey we are also reaching out to churches, organizations and other friends in the community to distribute these surveys.

If you are a GCSD customer, please look for the survey in your bill around the first of July, or pick one up at Groveland Family Medical Center, the Therapy Center, the Library, the Little House or the church or organization you attend.

Please complete a survey and give one to any senior folks you know, especially those who you believe might benefit if a transportation plan is developed and implemented. By completing this survey, you will be part of the planning process for transportation programs. You help yourself and your neighbors remain in our foothill community. Please discuss this subject with your friends and neighbors and make sure everyone understands the importance of transportation for seniors in our community now and in the years ahead.

The Sun

WARNING
Never look at the Sun without
using the proper filters. Looking at the Sun directly will
severely damage your eyes.

Who said you have to do astronomy in the dark? This month's article is about the most prominent feature in the sky, our Sun. The Sun is a star. For most of its life, a star shines due to thermonuclear fusion in its core releasing energy that radiates into outer space. Due to their great distance from the Earth, all stars, except the Sun, appear to the human eye as shining points in the night sky that twinkle because of the effect of the Earth's atmosphere.

A star begins as a collapsing cloud of material composed primarily of hydrogen, along with helium and trace amounts of heavier elements. Once the stellar core is sufficiently dense, some of the hydrogen is steadily converted into helium through the process of thermonuclear fusion. The star's internal pressure prevents it from collapsing further under its own gravity. Once the hydrogen fuel at the core is exhausted, those stars having at least 40% of the mass of the Sun expand to become a red giant star.

Most stars are between 1 billion and 10 billion years old. Some stars may even be close to 13.7 billion years old - the observed age of the universe. The oldest star yet discovered is an estimated 13.2 billion years old. The lifespan of a star becomes shorter as the star becomes more massive - this is because massive stars have greater pressure on their cores which cause them to burn hydrogen more rapidly. The most massive stars last an average of about one million years, while stars of minimum mass (red dwarfs) burn their fuel very slowly and last many billions of years.


The Sun is the star at the center of our Solar System. The Earth and other matter in our Solar System (including other planets, asteroids, meteoroids, comets, and dust) orbit the Sun. Energy from the Sun, in the form of sunlight, supports almost all life on Earth via photosynthesis, and drives the Earth's climate and weather.

The Sun's hot surface temperature gives it a white color that often,

because of atmospheric scattering, appears yellow when seen from the surface of the Earth. This is a subtractive effect, as the scattering light from the Sun removes enough violet and blue light, leaving a range of light that is perceived by the human eye as yellow. It is this scattering of light at the blue end of the light spectrum that gives the surrounding sky its blue color. Now you know the answer to the question "Why is the sky blue".

non-eclipsed Sun. This can damage the eye, resulting in small permanent blind spots for the viewer. The hazard is insidious for inexperienced observers and for children, because there is no perception of pain, that is - it is not immediately obvious that one's vision is being destroyed.

One way to view the Sun safely is by projecting its image onto a screen (or sheet of paper) using a telescope and eyepiece. This should only be done



When the Sun is low in the sky, even more light is scattered so that the Sun appears orange or even red.

It is thought that the Sun is about 4.5 billion years old and is about half way through its expected 10 billion year lifespan. In about 5 billion years from now it will enter a red giant phase, where its outer layers will expand as the hydrogen fuel in the core is consumed. Following the red giant phase, intense thermal pulsations will cause the Sun to throw off its outer layers, forming a planetary nebula - similar to the photographs of planetary nebula shown previously in this monthly newsletter.

Sunlight is very bright, and looking directly at the Sun with the naked eye for even brief periods can be painful and can cause damage to your eyes. Viewing the Sun through light-concentrating optics such as a telescope or binoculars is very hazardous without

an appropriate filter that blocks UV (ultraviolet) light and substantially dims the sunlight. Unfiltered optics can deliver over 500 times as much energy to the retina in the eye as using the naked eye, killing retinal cells almost instantly. Even brief glances at the midday Sun through unfiltered binoculars can cause permanent blindness. Partial solar eclipses are hazardous to view because the eye's pupil is not adapted to the unusually high visual contrast. That is, the pupil dilates according to the total amount of light in the field of view, not by the brightest object in the field. During partial eclipses most sunlight is blocked by the Moon passing in front of the Sun, but the uncovered parts of the sun have the same surface brightness as during a normal day. In the overall gloom, the pupil expands and the eye receives about ten times more light than it would looking at the



with a small refracting telescope with a clean eyepiece - refer to the user's manual of the telescope and eyepiece to determine if this is an appropriate method to use because some kinds of telescopes and eyepieces can be damaged by this method. The other way to view the Sun safely is to use an appropriate Sun filter that blocks UV light and dims over 99.9% of the sunlight. Solar filters can be used with telescopes and binoculars. Binoculars are easy to use because they don't require sophisticated mounts that may be difficult to use. Remember – never observe the Sun without the proper use of a solar filter.

When observing the Sun with appropriate filtration, the most immediately visible features are usually its sunspots, which are well-defined surface areas that appear darker than their surroundings because of lower temperatures. The number of sunspots visible on the Sun is not constant, but varies over an 11-year cycle known as the solar cycle.

The photograph of the Sun shown in this article was taken by placing a camera at the viewing end of a small refractor telescope equipped with a solar filter. The telescope was attached to a mount that tracks the movement of sun in the sky. Because the Sun is so bright, long exposures are not necessary as most exposure times are just a small fraction of a second. Two sunspots are visible in the lower left side of this image. 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
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Where The Hell Is Groveland Car Show News
