Electric Golf Cart Building Project Continues to Make Progress

The Electric Golf Cart building project is nearing completion. The building was painted in February and the remainder of the driving range retaining wall was built. Most of the finish work is under way and the Snack Bar equipment is being installed. We anticipate completion in time for the scheduled delivery of the new electric golf carts in April.

The deal with EZ-GO was finalized last month and the order for the new electric golf carts was placed. We anticipate receiving the new carts towards the middle of April. Most of the old gasoline golf carts will be traded in to help offset the cost of the new purchase. Over the past three years, members have expressed an interest in purchasing the used gasoline golf carts. We decided to hold back ten of the best gasoline golf carts so that we could offer them for sale to our members. Members that are interested in bidding on one of the used carts should contact our Golf Pro, David Rau, or the Golf Pro Shop staff for more information.

Lake Dredging Project Continues

The lake dredging project continues and, while some adjustments have been made to the work schedule, the project continues.

Our contractor, Cooper Crane and Rigging, completed the Unit 4 North area near the end of February and moved to the Unit 4 South location.

The Marina and other areas will continue to be closed temporarily to allow for the staging and operation of equipment. There is continued activity at the Marina and we ask that all members and guests stay out of the area until we open it back up. Members can access the lake, but must stay away from the dredging equipment and pipes. Safety and security are high priorities and we thank everyone in advance for their anticipated cooperation.

Snow Storms and Power Outages Impact PML in February

PMLA experienced back-toback snow storms in February that caused significant damage due to fallen trees and dangerous road conditions. Some trees took out power lines to many homes within the subdivision and some members were without power for days. Our Maintenance and Safety staff was on storm duty and put in a lot of hours running the snow plows, clearing streets of trees, and assisting stranded members and guests. There were some minor vehicle accidents but, thank God, no one was in-

Living in our area presents some difficulties during inclement weather, but a prepared individual will experience less of an impact. Monitor the weather and plan ahead for inclement weather. It is surprising how many people are caught off-guard and get stuck or inconvenienced. A little planning goes a long way.

If you plan to travel in an area that could be impacted by snow, carry chains or use a 4-wheel drive vehicle. Keep in mind that having 4-wheel drive does not mean you can drive as fast as you want. We had at least three 4-wheel drive vehicles get stuck during these last snow storms. If you do not need to be on the road, please do not travel. Our Maintenance staff needs time to safely plow the snow off the roads and other vehicles slow them down. If you do need to travel, do so slowly. Take it easy and be safe.

Pack food that is easily prepared for meals during power outages. Think about what you would do if the power went out. Do you have enough wood to heat the house? What about lamps, flashlights and candles? These may seem like some common sense suggestions, but I see the same issues every year.

For those members that planned ahead or helped assist their neighbors during the storms, I would like to thank you. Your support, and positive actions helping others, are the reason why I am proud to call PML my home.

New Recycling Program

I am writing to express my reservations regarding the new recycling solution adopted by the Board at the end of last year. Whilst I applaud the Board's efforts to find a solution for the whole community, I feel the agreed proposal does not address the needs of all the residents:

The solution provides four different collection locations around PML every other Tuesday and details an existing drop-off location at the Moore Brothers' facility in Big Oak Flat Monday through Saturday until 6pm. Whilst that seems fine, it fails to consider weekend residents, many of which do not have the option of living in PML full time. For most weekend residents (almost 60% of all owners, I believe) this recycling solution does not accommodate our needs: We ar-

rive on Thursday or Friday nights and do not leave PML until Sunday. This is a time when, according to the new plan, there are no local (In PML or BOF) recycling options. Thus, we are left with the choice to either transport our recycling back to our weekday houses or to leave it behind and make a "recycling trips" on our next visit (risking a potential vermin or bug infestation in the meantime).

Since we all (full or part-time residents) pay the same fees, I urge the board to reconsider the solution reached with Moore Bros...as, whilst it may attend the needs of many, it does not address the needs of the majority.

Proposed PML Shooting Range & Policy BY JOE POWELL, GENERAL MANAGER

Years ago, PMLA operated a shooting range in Unit 16, up behind the Campgrounds. Over time, the range fell out of use. In the last few years, members have expressed an interest in re-opening the range. Last year, a PML Shooting Club was formed and a proposal was made to the PML Board to re-open the range. Prior to consideration, several key issues had to be resolved. Management was assigned the task of researching and providing information to address noise, safety, cost, insurance and planning.

This information was gathered and a noise test was conducted to determine the nuisance effect on members.

The next step in the process is to provide multiple opportunities for PML members to voice their opinion on the matter. At the January 15th Board meeting, the subject was placed on the agenda for discussion and a draft shooting range policies and procedures resolution was presented for review. The subject and draft were also placed on the agenda for the February 19,

2011 Board meeting. Unfortunately, the Board meeting was postponed due to the impact of the snow storms.

The following draft Board resolution is being published for member review and comment. The subject of re-opening the PML Shooting Range will be discussed at the March 19, 2011 Board meeting. WHEREAS, Article III, Section 6 of the CC&R's gives the Board of Directors the powers and duties necessary to conduct the affairs of the Association and to make such rules and policies as the Directors deem in the best interest of the Association; and WHEREAS, for the safety, welfare and consideration of all residents, the Board wishes to establish Shooting Range policies and procedures so that the PMLA Shooting Range is used and managed in a legal, safe, and effective manner; THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the attached policies and procedures referred to as "Exhibit A" are adopted by the Board of Directors effective and that notice of their adoption shall be given to the membership within 15 days of today's date.

PMLA Shooting Range Policies and Procedures
DRAFT 1.15.11

PMLA Shooting Range

The PMLA Shooting Range is a pistol and small-bore rifle, practice range located in Unit 16 above the PMLA Campgrounds. The use of the Shooting Range is governed by the PMLA CC&R's and all subsequent rules and policies as adopted by the PMLA Board of Directors. The use of the PMLA Shooting Range is limited to PMLA members and guests in accordance with Association Policies and Procedures.

Operational Authority

The Association General Manager is authorized to manage, operate and delegate the daily operational tasks of the PMLA Shooting Range in accordance with Association policy and all applicable State and Federal laws.

Certified Range Masters, made up of PMLA members in good standing and/or PMLA personnel, may be designated by the General Manager as authorized to operate the Shooting Range in a responsible, safe manner.

Range Masters

The Association may solicit volunteer assistance from the PMLA Shooting Club to provide members that have

Range Master certification as defined by the NRA or other sanctioned training agencies. A certified Range Master will be present at all times that the Shooting Range is in operation.

The Range Master will be responsible for the safe and compatible operation of the range as well as complying with all PMLA Shooting Range rules, policies and procedures. The onsite Range Master will have the right to expel any user that, in his/her opinion, is not acting responsibly or safely. The minimum age requirement to serve as a PMLA Shooting Range Master is 21 years of age.

Range Masters will have the final say on the weapons that can be used on the range. Their concern will be based on insuring all weapons are in a safe operating condition and that the report of the weapon is not inconsistent with the compatible use of the range.

Rule Violations

Should the General Manager or designated PMLA management be made aware of any violation of the established Shooting Range rules, policies and procedures, they may close the range and convene a meeting with the Shooting Club officers and/or onsite Range Master as applicable to review the rules violations. The Shooting Range will remain closed until the General Manager or designated PMLA management is satisfied that the approved rules are being applied properly. Multiple rules violations could result in the Shooting Range being closed for an extended period of time.

Range Schedule

The Shooting Range is scheduled to be open on Tuesday, Thursday, and Saturday, weather permitting, from 9:00 am to 5:00 pm as long as a PMLA approved Range Master is present. The range may be opened on other days for special events as authorized by the General Manager. The range schedule may be changed without notice.

Range Access

The gate to the Shooting Range can only be accessed by authorized PMLA staff upon the presence of an approved Range Master consistent with the range operating schedule. All users of the range shall register with PMLA before their first time use to insure they are PMLA property owners in good standing. Registration forms are available at the PMLA Administration Office or Main Gate, Department of Safety.

The range will be available to any PMLA resident in good standing in accordance with the current fee schedule. Those members using the range will be responsible for providing their own ammunition, paper targets and cleaning up after themselves when they are done. PMLA members that wish to use the range should call the Administration Office or Main Gate Department of Safety to determine if the range is open prior to driving to the range. Access to the range will be controlled by a locked gate. The road to the range may be closed due to weather and road conditions.

Range Use Fee

A fee to use the PMLA Shooting Range will be charged in accordance with the current fee schedule, as authorized by the PMLA Board of Directors.

Age Minimum

The minimum age to use the Shooting Range is 16 years, with a parent or legal guardian present at all times. Shooting Range user's ages 16 years to 20 years old must be accompanied by a parent or legal guardian at all times. The parent or guardian is responsible for the actions of the child or young adult while at the Shooting Range.

Authorized Weapons

PMLA strictly controls the types and calibers of weapons that may be fired at the Shooting Range. The following types and calibers of weapons are authorized to be used at the range:

Handguns; .22, 38, 357, 9mm, 40, 45acp. No magnum loads.

Rifle: .17, .22 only.

No other types or calibers of weapons will be allowed without the express approval of the General Manager or PMLA Board of Directors.

Alcohol Consumption

Alcohol is not allowed at the PMLA Shooting Range.

PROPOSED PML SHOOTING RANGE FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

Where is the proposed location of the range?

Unit 16, up behind the PML Campgrounds.

If the range is re-opened, who can use it?

PMLA members, their guests and authorized law enforcement agencies.

What are the key issues to re-opening the shooting range?
Noise, safety, cost and insurance.

What about the noise from the range?

PML conducted a noise test that included multiple areas that could be impacted by the range. It was determined that the noise would be negligible and in most cases would have little or no impact on the overall membership.

What about insurance costs?
The proposed range was discussed with the Association's insurance broker and the cost would be negligible.

What about safety issues?

The location of the range is designed for safety and all precautions would be followed in accordance with PML policies and procedures.

How much will the range cost?
The initial cost estimate to build a small bore range to NRA standards is around \$24K. Other costs like road upgrades for access, grading and restroom facilities are being researched and considered. Costs to the Association may be reduced through the use of volunteer labor or a reduction in the scope of the construction.

Will there be a fee to use the range? This is still under discussion, but there will most likely be a nominal use fee if the range is approved.

Who will operate and run the range?

A certified range master provided by the PML Shooting Club or the Association.

What are the proposed hours of operation?
Tuesday, Thursday, and Saturday,

weather permitting from 9 a.m. to 5

p.m. A PMLA approved Range Master must be available and present at all times the range is open.

What is the minimum age requirement for using the shooting range? Age 16 with a parent or guardian.

What size and types of guns are proposed for use on the range? Small bore pistols and rifles. Handguns; .22, 38, 357, 9mm, 40, 45acp. No magnum loads. Rifle: .17, .22 only.

Has the PML Board of Directors approved the shooting range?
No decision has been made to re-open the range. The proposal is currently under review and will be discussed at multiple Board meetings.

How do I voice my opinion on the proposed re-opening of the Shooting Range?

Attend the open, monthly Board meetings at the Lake Lodge or write a letter to the PMLA Board of Directors.

COMPLIANCE CHATTER

BY DENNIS PIPAL, COMPLIANCE OFFICER

Many of our members choose to use their home in PML as a rental. Some hire a property manager to supervise this process and others choose to manage it themselves. Some have long term tenants and others have a short term. Either way, these tenants have the benefit of using our facilities and our amenities.

There are some common issues that go along with allowing nonmembers to live here in PML. These tenants, while enjoying the benefits of living in PML, also have the obligation to abide by the same rules the Owner agreed to comply with when they purchased their home here.

Our Board of Directors, over the years, has had to address some of the inherent problems that will occur from time to time when non-Owners fail to live by our rules and regula-

tions. In January of 1996 the board passed Resolution #95.14, Tenant Registration and Fee Policy. This was amended in February of 1997 and again in April of 2001. This resolution sets forth the requirements for Owners who want to use their home as a rental.

This regulation requires the Owner to submit a \$160 refundable deposit. This deposit is held by the Association during the term of the tenancy as security for the return of all gate cards, PML identification cards, parking passes, and as security against the risk of damage to, or destruction of common facilities of Association property by the tenant.

The regulation also requires the tenant to register with the association and for long term tenants; a copy of the rental agreement between the

Owner and tenant must be on file in the Association office.

Unfortunately, many of the complaints I investigate involve renters. When a tenant violates our rules we notify the tenant and the Owner of this violation and it is up to the Owner to make sure the violation is corrected. If the violation is not corrected the Owner may be subjected to any fines levied by the Association that result from our enforcement process.

If you currently rent your home

or are thinking about renting may I suggest you read Resolution #95.14 Tenant Registration and Fee Policy. You can find a copy on the PML website at www.pinemountainlake.com. The proper selection of rental tenants and the education you provide them about our rules will go a long way in making your rental income a worthwhile experience as opposed to an expensive nightmare. Speaking of conditions, I'd like to offer a big "Thank You" to all of you golfers that have continued to help keep the course and pace of play in great condition. I've had the pleasure to meet with the Tournament Chairs and President's of the Men's and Ladies 9-Hole and 18-Hole groups to revitalize and review course conditions, course etiquette, and ways to enhance pace. The response is slowly but surely visible in our golfers driving and playing habits.

Shades of Green

Last month I discussed what impact the cold, wet weather has on the golf course and the operation of golf carts during the winter months. While Mother Nature turned off the water fountain, she allowed Jack Frost to hang around. The water flow of some of the springs has slowed and most of the course has dried out. BUT, there are still areas that are extremely wet. To the right of #7 and the beginning left rough of #8 still have active springs. We have ropes and signs in these areas to ask that you not drive in there. The beginning of #8 fairway is a perfect example of the need to avoid driving on, due to the shaded areas not seeing any winter sun and is slow to dry out even in periods of dry weather.

The impact the winter months have on our golf course also makes certain areas more difficult to walk on. With only a little rain followed by a hard freeze, makes some areas very slippery. The severe slopes that see very little winter sun can be downright hard to negotiate. In conditions like this you must be aware that it is easy to lose your footing. Please make the effort to use another route to get to your ball, if at all possible, to avoid the steepest of hills. Your safety on the course is extremely important; if you have any ideas to improve course

safety, please share your thoughts with us.

Each month David Rau and I meet with representatives of each golf group. As we discuss multiple subjects of our golf operations we hear the word awareness used quite often. Awareness is defined as the ability to perceive or to be conscious of events. A few of the questions asked during our monthly meetings are: Do we properly get the word out that our members need to be aware to observe the ropes and signs on the course to avoid damaging the course? Are our members that walk aware that they are asked to keep their carts 30 feet away from the greens? Are we aware that we need to observe the 90 degree rule or the need to repair that ball mark before holing out for that much needed birdie? Many subjects we discuss are the little things that are not always thought of but, when followed, allows the course to be a little more enjoyable for the players behind you or reduces course damage from golf cart traffic in the winter months.

Enjoy what is left of the shot gun season, look forward to seeing every one enjoy the golf course but, most of all, please be AWARE that golf is a game to enjoy your friends and the great outdoors.

To name a few of the finer points we reviewed:

- Pull carts shall never be parked on approaches and/or fringes
- · 90-degree rule
- · Stay on the path until you are at a 90-degree angle with your ball and the green
- Cart partners can walk ahead (within reason) and meet you back at the cart and/or path. This saves wear and tear on the course and helps pace.
- · Avoid cutting corners with Golf Carts
- The edges around the paths are what I like to call part of the "Frame round the Picture". A great frame can make a great picture even greater.

- · Following course signage:
- · Avoid passing each other on Cart Path Only holes
- · Cart signs in fairways extend and include through the rough
- · Driving around the signs up into the rough defeats the purpose of the signs.
- Never driving beyond the signs in the rough and/or fairways ensures a healthier more appealing looking golf course.
- · Use your sand bottles
- · Fill your divots and a few others while waiting to hit your next shot.
- This also allows Alan and his crew to do and focus on more course enhancing projects.
- Refill stations are located near #4 green, #10 tee, and a new location on #13 tee.
- · Always keeping up with the group in front of you
- If you can't see the group in front of you, you are out of position and need to catch up.
- Never look back to gauge your pace; the group behind you does not dictate your pace, the group ahead does.
- Avoid excessive practice swings; take those while you're waiting, not when it's your turn to hit.
- Watch each other's shots to help avoid prolonged searches for those sneaky hiding golf balls. This also helps keep everybody's attention on the game and makes for much more enjoyable rounds.
- · Playing "Ready Golf"

- Take 3-clubs with you to avoid unnecessary trips back and forth to the cart
- · Getting to your golf ball before it's your turn to hit
- · Mark your scores on the next tee; this allows the group(s) behind you to continue playing and gets your group out of potential harm's way



Each month I try to write an article that is pertinent, interesting and offers meaningful information about county operations. The only way I know if I am successful in this goal is by receiving feedback from readers. I do appreciate the comments that have been given...both good and bad. The bad ones make me work a little harder and the good ones provide the energy needed to go on.

This month I want to paint a picture of what it means to be a department head in Tuolumne County Operations during these tough economic times. We can use "Animal Control" as an example.

This County Division is headed by Jennifer Clark. Jennifer is one of the most dedicated employees the County has on its team. She works countless hours to keep up with the demands on her division.

Animal Control has only 4 officers to cover the needs of the entire county 24 hours a day 7 days a week. Given the condition of the current economy, the division's workload has increased and the staffing to cover public demand has been reduced considerably. Priority calls for these officers include situations related to; aggressive/vicious dogs (or other animals), animal neglect and cruelty, animal quarantine (some related to required reporting from local veterinary or medical facilities), loose livestock on state and county roadways and to assist in supporting local law enforcement in drug raids and other arrests.

Along with the field work, there is also the responsibility of running the animal shelter. State law dictates the standard of care that is to be provided for sheltered animals. Here we are experiencing increased activity combined with a growing number of abandoned animals and even more animals requiring euthanization. To put this in perspective, consider that during 2009 the shelter took in 776 dogs and 1084 cats. (We are more successful in adopting out dogs and puppies than cats and kittens). The figures for 2010 are not yet in, but we do know that the estimates are coming in even higher.

If you call animal control and ask for help, they will respond...But, it may "take a little longer". Given the staffing constraints, service demand and priorities noted above, Jennifer and her officers are doing a tremendous job!

Animal control is a good example of the challenges other county departments are facing as they address the increased service demands of the public with reduced staffing. This "taking a little longer" scenario will continue to be true for many county departments for some time to come.

The goal of the Tuolumne County Supervisors is to do the best job possible with the resources available to us. Remember, constructive ideas and suggestions from the public that will contribute to our ability to do a better job are always welcome. The challenges that face our county may be many, but there is strength in working together for the betterment of our community in a focused and positive manner. This is how problems are solved and goals are met.

Talking about "positive" notes, you may have seen some activity around the old Mervyn's Department Store building lately. This location is to be filled with multiple tenants. Those who take the occasional drive to Modesto to go shopping at Jo-Ann Fabric and Crafts will be pleased to learn that we will soon have one right here in Sonora. Watch future announcements for more good news.

So what's happening on the state level? Not much. As we near the end of the 1st quarter of 2011 we find that there is still little movement on the State Budget and our economy is still suffering. According to a recent article in the California County News, it was noted that 15 of the 20 most economically stressed counties in the country are located in one state.

And just where might that be? You guessed it...California! The rankings are based on unemployment, foreclosures and bankruptcies filed. Those counties closest to us in proximity that made this list are Merced County at #4, Stanislaus County at #12 and Calaveras County at #19.

This is one list on which I don't want to see the name "Tuolumne County"!

As your elected officials, represent-

ing the needs of the public, we, the Tuolumne County Board of Supervisors, will continue to be aggressive and pro-active on the economic development front. I am certain that we will see continued improvement in Tuolumne County.

GENEALOGY WORKSHOP

When friends and acquaintances ask me about beginning their search for ancestors, the first thing I tell them is to gather together all the information they have about the person or persons they are researching. The second thing is to obtain birth and death certificates, marriage licenses and divorce decrees for each individual. I'm not sure if any of them have ever done it, but if they haven't they are missing the valuable information contained in these documents. That information could save endless hours of research.

The information included in these documents varies from state to state, but there is no doubt you'll find important facts about your ancestry. My birth certificate gives the state, county, city and street address of my parents at that time. It also gives my

fathers full name, age, birthplace and occupation. The information for my mother includes her maiden name and the number of children previously born to her. My husband has an Abstract of Record of Birth, which gives only the basic information; however, it gives the volume where the original certificate is recorded.

My father-in-law's death certificate has his full name, place of birth, name of wife, name of father and mother (including her maiden name). Also included are his occupation and his WW II veteran status and, of course, cause of death.

If I have convinced you to send for the above information, you can go to www.cdc.gov for information on where to write and the cost of the document. The homepage gives an A to Z Index, go to the V and scroll down to Vital Records and all the states are listed. It can get a bit pricey but the information is priceless.

perform during the opening night gala and all intermissions. Here's a chance to experience great voices from your community.



Scoozi Bread

RECIPE PROVIDED BY TOM KNOTH AND PAULA MARTELL



I first discovered Scoozi Bread at a great restaurant named "Barone's" in Pleasanton, CA and later learned that it was served at another restaurant by the name of "Girasole", also in Pleasanton. There seems to be some dispute about who originated the recipe, but I have recently found that a couple of local restaurants "Peppery Gar and Brill" (yes, that is their name) in Sonora, and "Camps" in Angel's Camp have been wise enough to start serving this fantastic dish as well. So, if it sounds good, but you don't want to go to the effort of making it, you can always get it at the above mentioned restaurants.

I did some cook detective work in a few of these restaurants to figure out the recipe, and I think I have come up with a recipe that is a pretty good match. One warning...you must love garlic to enjoy this.

2 Small Pizza Dough Skins (home-made or obtained from Pizza Factory)

2.5 Ounces Crumbled Gorgonzola Cheese (1/2 of a 5 oz container), available at Marval Market. 1 Green Onion, minced 1 Egg, beaten Canola Oil, for deep frying

2-3 Cloves Fresh Garlic, pressed or finely minced.

Kosher Salt, to taste

Using a rolling pin, roll out each pizza dough skin until they are 1/4

to 1/2 inch thick and equally sized. Cover one of the skins with the gorgonzola and green onion, leaving the outer inch of the skin uncovered. Brush the uncovered ends with beaten egg and then place second skin on top. Press the dough together with your finger tips or palms, sealing the area brushed with egg. Compress dough together using a rolling pin. (You can make the Scoozi to this point ahead of cooking time and refrigerate if cooked the same day).

Place an inch of oil in a frying pan large enough to accommodate the Scoozi, and heat to 375oF. Place Scoozi in oil and cook until lightly browned on bottom, then flip and brown other side. The Scoozi will puff up during cooking. When done, place on paper towels and pat top with paper towels. Rub top with the garlic and sprinkle with salt to taste. Cut into pizza wedges and serve immediately with fresh Tomato-Basil Salsa.

Fresh Tomato-Basil Salsa
1 lb fresh tomatoes, peeled and seeded
1/2 cup loosely packed fresh basil leaves
1/4 small red onion
1 tsp red wine vinegar
1/4 tsp salt
1 clove garlic, pressed or finely minced (optional)

Combine ingredients in food processor; process until finely chopped but not smooth. Makes about 1 cup.


There will be a Nature Tour in

Half Dome Cables Day Use Permits Available for Reservation Starting March 1, 2011 Yosemite NP Instituting Permits 7 Days Per Week in 2011

National Park will require Day Use Permits seven days per week for climbing the Half Dome cables during the summer 2011 season. Day Use Permits were required Fridays, Saturdays, Sundays, and holidays during the 2010 summer season. However, due to high volumes of people on the cables during the non permitted days, the park is instituting the seven day requirement. This is part of a two year interim program designed to address crowding on the cables that has been occurring over the past few years.

Hiking to the top of Half Dome is one of the most popular hikes in Yosemite National Park. The iconic granite monolith, at 8,842 feet above sea level, attracts people from all over the world who attempt to climb to the summit. Most visitors ascend Half Dome via the cables, which are in place from mid-May through mid-October. Most visitors begin and end their hike at Happy Isles in Yosemite Valley. This is an approximately 17 mile round-trip journey.

Permits are available by reservation starting March 1, 2011 for climbing the cables in May and June, 2011. Reservations for the permits can be made online at www.recreation.gov or by calling 1-877-444-6777. Subsequent permits will be available at the beginning of each month for permits three months in advance. Each person climbing the Half Dome cables will be required to have their own permit. Up to four permits may be obtained under one reservation. The permits are free, however, there is a non-refundable \$1.50 service charge per person for each permit obtained.

The previous system did not allow hikers to cancel a portion of their Day Use Permit without canceling the entire permit. However, several user-friendly changes have been made to maximize flexibility for hikers wishing to obtain a permit. These include a feature that allows users to reduce the number of hikers on their existing reservation without canceling the entire permit. Another added feature is that

users can cancel unneeded permits up to the day before their planned climb. Additionally, users can now reserve available permits up to the day before their planned climb.

Hikers who obtained Half Dome Cables Day Use Permits and are unable to use them are urged to cancel their reservations through www.recreation. gov. Although the service charge will not be refunded, this will enable other hikers to obtain available permits. Hikers interested in reserving a Day Use Permit should be aware that the Half Dome cable permit page on www.recreation.gov will not be fully functioning until the week prior to March 1, 2011. However, information regarding the Half Dome hike is currently available on the website.

The Dumbbell Nebula

The Dumbbell Nebula was the first planetary nebula ever discovered. A planetary nebula is a glowing shell of gas formed by certain types of stars at the end of their lives. They are relatively short-lived, lasting a few tens of thousands of years, compared to a typical stellar lifetime of several billion years.

Like most planetary nebulae, the distance of the Dumbbell Nebula is not very well known – most scientists have agreed on a value of 1,200 light years. Recent Hubble Space Telescope images have revealed that many planetary nebulae have extremely complex shapes and exhibit vibrant colors. Only about one in five are roughly spherical is shape.

Stars that often become planetary nebulae spend most of their lifetime shining as a result of nuclear fusion reactions converting hydrogen to helium in its core. The energy released in the fusion reactions prevents the star from collapsing under its own gravity, and the star is stable. After several billion years, the star will run out of hydrogen, and there is no longer enough energy flowing out from the core to support the outer layers of the star. The core contracts and heats up. Then, the outer layers of the star expand enormously because of the outward pressure from the very high temperature of the core. Eventually huge pulsations build up, which become large enough to throw off the

outer gases of the star into space. These ejected gases form a cloud of material around the exposed core of the star. As more and more of the atmosphere moves away from the star, deeper and deeper layers at higher and higher temperatures of the star's core are exposed. When the exposed core reaches a high enough temperature, the outer gases that have been ejected begin to ionize and glow. Thus a planetary nebula is born.

Our Sun will probably produce a planetary nebula in about 5 billion years. These nebulae have nothing at all to do with planets; the terminology was invented because they often look a little like planets in small telescopes. Typical planetary nebulae are less than one light-year across and are generally faint objects; none are visible to the naked eye. Long-exposure time astrophotography is used to reveal what the human eye can't see. Today's digital camera sensors have the benefit of acting like a bucket that collects photons (light) - the longer the exposure, the more

light (color and details) that's captured and displayed in the photograph.

Taking a photograph of the detail shown in this image of the Dumbbell Nebula requires a telescope mount that can accurately track the sky over long periods of time and very long exposure time with a camera. To capture this image of the Dumbbell Nebula, I manually "hand-guided" the telescope while the photograph was taken. I use two telescopes when taking my astro-photographs. The "image scope", in this case an Orion ED 80 Refractor, has the camera attached to it - and the second is a "guide scope" that I use to keep the camera perfectly aligned on the object that I'm photographing. Hand-guided means that I control the movement of the telescope mount to make any adjustments while the camera shutter is open. Photographs that I don't "hand-guide" are often "autoguided" with a separate camera that controls the movement of the telescope mount via a computer. Precise tracking of the "image scope" is critical as tracking errors quickly elongate stars in a photograph, and then they look oblong or like streaks.

To create this final image of the Dumbbell Nebula, several separate photographs were taken with exposure times of about 10 to 15 minutes each. Then, the individual photographs were digitally "stacked" one on top of another to create the final image. In the case of this image of the Dumbbell Nebula, there is a total exposure time of 44 minutes. When looking at this image, one can imagine its formation from a centrally located star whose outer gasses have been thrown out into space and have formed this expanding and glowing planetary nebula.








Tioga Student of the Month

Groveland Evangelical Free Church What happens at Hume Lake doesn't stay there

Twenty seven teenagers from Groveland went to winter camp at Hume Lake this year. GEFC youth director, Tom Radanovich, spent a year preparing for the experience. The logistics are challenging. Each family dynamic is different. A teen may live with a grandparent, but permission to attend camp may rest with a parent who is difficult to reach. Teens often have a network of people who need to be informed of their activities. And, though Hume Lake Christian Camp keeps the cost reasonable (\$199 for a three-night stay), 22 of the 27 teens who went this year needed financial help. Aid comes in the form of a line item in the church budget, fundraisers the youth group does throughout the year, and individual scholarships people in the congregation provide.

Government mandated medical check-ups on all camp attendees must be performed within 24 hours of time before kids show up at a camp the size of Hume Lake. How do you coordinate that? It helps to have a physician in the congregation. Online registration often needs to be facilitated for kids whose parents have no access to a computer. These are some of Tom's challenges, but preparation goes beyond logistics. Tom and his volunteer youth workers, Trichelle Clark, Kristin Arretche and Ron and

Lori Demmers, participate and attend off site meetings with camp staff to stay current on the issues that teens face. In addition to the usual suspects –drugs, alcohol, shoplifting, cutting, parental neglect – there is also the lure of unique dangers kids encounter on the internet such as pornography and stalking.

"Camp is where we begin to see the fruit from what we are building into the kids all year," Tom says. "We see kids make a decision to follow Christ or rededicate themselves to living a truthful life before God." Visible life change may not happen for years. Spiritual growth is slow, Tom says. As teens mature, they begin to understand that camp is more than broom hockey, ice skating, music and video entertainment. "We see the beginning of changes in their outlook as they learn to care about each other instead of just themselves."

Tom labels his work a sending ministry and says it is like working in a factory. His job is to tighten a nut and send the product down the line. "You never see the end of your work. In Groveland, 90-95% of our kids move off the hill. Some will be like seed scattered on the path that the enemy robs." The most sinister threat will come from parents who don't want to see their kids living a truthful life before God be-

cause it challenges their lifestyle. Tom's goal is to help create the 10 percent who will work for the kingdom of God. "When I hear of kids who leave the hill and become involved in ministry elsewhere, I have done my job. That's success, building future workers for the harvest, laying a foundation of Jesus Christ that other people will build on."

This year Tom saw teens beginning to realize that at 16 or 17, they would be leaving school soon. Camp staff challenged them to fill themselves with the things of God that last and to make lifestyle changes – to move from self-seeking, self-centered, self-serving behavior to care more for their community and other people. How? By making time for prayer, acts of service, studying God's word, and gathering with other believers.

This year's theme was Fill, Full, Fall, based on Ephesians 3:14-21. Engaging speakers challenged the teens with the Jewish concept of Habel. Like the steam that rises from a cup of coffee many things we see in life are mist and vapor. Many activities are empty, fruitless and vain. We are called by God to disregard what is temporary in favor of being filled with the fullness of God and to allowing Him to overflow into the lives of others, at school and in our community.

What will the teens remember from their days at camp? Teenagers remember the people who were there for them, Tom says. They pattern their lives to be there for each other. Kids who rely on each other for the things they aren't getting from adults are prone to sin, lie and drink together. Guide them to Jesus, who understands our trials and stresses, help them understand that people may fail them but God never fails or disappoints and they will find a true friend who is there for them.



CHECK OUT YOUR CONTRACTOR

- ☐ Did you contact the Contractors State License Board (CSLB) to check the status of the contractor's license? Contact the CSLB at 1-800-321-CSLB (2752) or visit our Web site: www.cslb.ca.gov.
- ☐ Did you get at least three local references

from the contractors you are considering?

☐ Did you call them and see the work the contractor completed?

CHECK OUT THE CONTRACT

- ☐ Did you read and do you understand your contract?
- □ Does the 3-day right to cancel a contract apply
- ☐ Does the contract tell you when work will start and end?
- ☐ Does the contract include a detailed descrip-

tion of the work to be done, the material to be used, and equipment to be installed? This description should include a plan and scale drawing showing the shape, size, dimensions and specifi cations. It should include brand names, model numbers, quantities and colors. Specific descriptions now will prevent disputes later.

☐ Are you required

to pay a down payment? If you are, the down payment should never be more than 10% of the contract price or \$1,000, whichever is less.

- ☐ Is there a schedule of payments? If there is, you should pay only as work is completed and not
- ☐ Did your contractor give you a "Notice to Owner," a warning notice describing liens and ways to prevent them? Even if you pay your contractor, a lien can be placed on your home by unpaid laborers, subcontractors, or

material suppliers. A lien can result in you paying twice or, in some cases,

losing your home in a foreclosure. Also check the "Notice to Owner" for ways to protect yourself.

- ☐ Did you know changes or additions to your contract must all be in writing?
- ☐ Putting changes in writing reduces the possibility of a later dispute.
