

I would like to congratulate our General Manager, Joe Powell, for recently receiving national certification. Joe received the designation as Certified Manager of Community Associations. This certification is earned through the National Board of Certification for Community Association Managers. This designation is in addition to the California certification that he earned many years ago. By increasing his skills and education, Joe is able to apply best practices in the management of our community.

## **General Manager's Message**

#### Financial Adjustments Successful

Last month I described the adjustments we made to mitigate the negative financial results for PML at the end of August. It appears that our efforts had a positive effect, as the monthly financial results were better than budget at the end of September. We will continue to monitor the financials weekly and make other adjustments as necessary as we progress through to the end of the year.

#### 2012 Budget Process Almost Complete

The day-long, open Budget meeting was held on Saturday, October 15<sup>th</sup> at the Lake Lodge. The meeting started promptly at 8 a.m., and we were pleased to note that thirty three members were in attendance.

Each manager presented their individual budgets by providing a general overview and line item review to the Board. The Board discussed the individual budgets at length with the management team, and members were allowed to comment and ask clarification questions.

The final approval of the Budget will be handled by the Board of

Directors at the November Board meeting which is scheduled for Saturday, November 12<sup>th</sup>. This meeting will be held at the Lake Lodge and begin at 9 a.m.

#### **Vacation Rental Parking Passes**

We continue to experience issues with vacation rentals by owners. Members that rent out their house, condo or townhouse are required to register with the Association. It is also a requirement that all shortterm renters purchase a vehicle access pass for every vehicle that is brought into PML.

Some members are simply providing the guest hanging tag to their short-term renters rather than purchasing the vehicle access passes. Vehicle access passes can be purchased at the Main Gate Safety Department. We encourage all members to follow the rules and have stepped up enforcement methods to ensure that it happens. ## **Horsing Around At The Stables**

#### At the Stables

It seems that not only is fall in the air but also a little bit of winter. The ground around here sure soaked up the rain we had.

Here at the stables we do a lot more than just feed and cleanup after the horses. We also keep a very close eye on the horses to make sure that they eat right and don't have any health issues that need attention. The people that own the horses that we board depend on us to take good care of their horses.

I would like to take this opportunity to share some cowboy history with you that is about the ways he gets his job done.

#### **History of American Cowboys**

The history of American cowboys tells a fascinating story. The cowboy - the heroic figure of popular novels and films - was in reality an underpaid, under-thanked, but highly important, laborer employed in difficult, dangerous, and sometimes dreary, work.

#### When Did It All Start?

The true beginning of the history of American cowboys began immediately after the Civil War. It was in these years the range cattle industry developed first in Texas, beginning in the 1870s, in the Southwest and on the northern Great Plains. Although some of the young men who worked on these ranches were from the northeastern states, probably a majority came from the South, and many had fought in the Civil War.

For their techniques and equipment, cowboys drew on both the Spanish traditions of northern Mexico and southern Texas and those of the Gulf coastal states.

The work year centered on two events: The roundup and the long drive. Roundups were held in the spring and often also in the fall. After the cowboys herded cattle to a central location, they branded newborn calves, castrated and dehorned older animals, and in the spring, chose the cattle to be taken to market.

#### The History of American Cowboys Makes One Thing Real Clear...

A cowboy's best friend was often his horse. They depended on each other, the cowboy and his horse...and it is said they could herd cattle in their sleep. It is from this remarkable group of men that the fine art of breeding and training reining horses and cutting horses has evolved.

From 1865 to 1880 at least 3.5 million cattle were driven in herds of between 1,500 and 3,000 from southern Texas to cattle towns in Kansas, Nebraska, and Wyoming. The route most frequently used was the Chisholm Trail, which went to Abilene, Kansas - one of the wildest towns in the west.

Working up to 20 hours a day, cowboys drove the animals from one watering place to the next, guarding against predators, straying cattle, and the dreaded stampedes at night. Cowboys daily faced many obstacles and dangers. For his hard and demanding work the typical cowboy earned between \$25 and \$40 a month.

## **PMLA Money Matters**

Where does all the money go? How many times have you asked this question, either about your personal finances or those of the Association? If you are like me the answer is...plenty. Without getting into the personal part of this question I can give you a bit of insight on the Association's aspect of this important topic. This month I'd like to talk about some of the less visible things that your assessment helps to pay for.

Let's start with insurance. As with any individual or organization, having the right amount and type of insurance is critical to any operation. At PML we spend in excess of \$200,000 annually on the various types of insurance required to protect the Association from loss. This includes such things as property insurance to cover all of the Association's assets and common areas including the dam. We also carry liability insurance and full coverage on all PML owned vehicles. Coverage is provided for the Board of Directors in the performance of their duties. In this age of the internet and the wave of cyber

crime we have a policy in place to protect against these losses. Finally an umbrella policy is in place to provide additional blanket coverage in excess of the individual policies.

Another often overlooked aspect of our expenses is an area common to all of us...utilities. The Association pays for the same types of these services that each of you does. Electricity to light and cool all of our buildings, amenities and outside areas. Propane to heat these same buildings and cook all of that great food prepared at the Grill and the Marina Café. Telephone service to answer all your questions and give you access to the Golf course and the Grill for reservations and tee times. Water that serves a variety of needs. Add these all up and the bill comes to over \$350,000 annually.

Over the past four years the Association has spent approximately \$450,000 to reduce the danger of wildfire inside PML's borders. This money has gone to cleaning up our greenbelt areas and the other parts of the Association which are unde-

veloped and had become overgrown. These efforts will go a long way towards making us a much more fire safe community. In many ways this is another form of insurance protection for all of us.

Unfortunately another, often overlooked, cost to the Association has been made more expensive as a result of the economic issues of the past few years. As more and more property owners fail to make their monthly assessment payments we have to set aside money to make up for the shortfall. This amount has risen dramatically and now consumes \$120,000 each year, in spite of our best efforts to collect these assessments.

The price of gas affects each of us whenever we fill up at the pump. The Association is no different and we have experienced this increased cost in order to fuel the various vehicles and equipment that is used to maintain PML. In addition these increased fuel costs affect the price of almost everything we buy, from food to equipment and supplies. The direct cost of gas alone costs us over \$130,000 each year.

One final, relatively minor, cost is also one I am sure each of you can relate to...property taxes. The Association pays a little over \$23,000 per year in property taxes for all of our common ground and PML owned equipment. Speaking of taxes, it is worth reiterating that we no longer pay Federal Income Taxes since our recognition as a non-profit, tax exempt organization by the IRS in 2009.

I hope this gives you a bit of insight into some of the less obvious ways in which your assessment dollar is spent.

## **Getting It Done This Fall**

The PML Maintenance Department has been working hard on getting the roads projects completed this fall. With the decrease of seasonal traffic on Pine Mountain Drive, the Streets Crew has been working en masse constructing asphalt curbs at several areas. The curbing construction improves the storm water run-off, channels the water to the drainage culverts, and preserves road shoulder embankments.

Construction work on our main traffic corridor requires a

larger than normal Streets Crew, with the addition of flaggers and traffic control. A primary goal is to decrease the impact on vehicle traffic in our busy recreational season when placing traffic controls, detours, lane controls, and flaggers. The presence of the construction equipment creates a hazard for normal traffic flow, and safety is always the utmost concern. We do thank all of you for your patience and cooperation during these road construction occasions.

This year has provided a shorter window of opportunity for many of our roads projects. But, with the addition of some construction equipment, the work has proceeded with greater speed



and satisfaction. The PML Streets Crew has gone from laboriously constructing 150 feet of asphalt curbing in a day, to constructing as much as 950 feet in a single day. Hats off to Streets Crew: Toby, Luke, Bill, Tony, Tawni, Beth, Steve, Joe, and the Maintenance Shop for getting it done this fall.

The road construction work will continue this fall with much more additional maintenance work, with weather permitting. There is a full plate of asphalt section repairs, drainage repairs, embankment work, and as always, the clearing of leaves, pine needles, rocks, soil, and debris, from the DI's (drainage inlets), when those rains fall. Mix this in with some early snow and ice? Yeiks! Dare we think that we will have a repeat of last year's weather? These are some busy workers.

With the fall season comes the beginning of the Maintenance Department fire abatement season. The crews will be back out performing greenbelt maintenance this fall and winter. There are still many downed trees and debris piles throughout the greenbelts, from last year's storms. These trees will be skidded out and taken to

the firewood pile. Debris piles will be reduced when the fire season is over for this year and the weather is approved for debris pile burning.

The firewood pile up at the PML Slash and Compost Site has an abundance of good oak, cedar, and pine available for cutting. Be sure and obtain a PML Wood Cutting Permit from the Maintenance Office. Permits are still \$20, available Monday thru Friday from 7AM to 3PM. Call or stop in and see Susan at the Maintenance Yard, telephone 962-8612. The Firewood Site is open Wednesday through Sunday, 9AM to 5PM, at the east end of the PML Slash and Compost Site, weather permitting.

## **Shades of Green**

Fall has arrived with the 1.6" of rain in early October; we are headed towards another winter of rain and snow. The early rains assisted with the greens healing after aeration. Prior to the early storm, we had reduced irrigation on much of the course, so the rains soaked the ground and assisted with fairway and rough aeration.

Brian Whitlark, an agrominist from the U.S.G.A., was here on September 20th to assist us in our maintenance program. P.M.L. has welcomed the U.S.G.A. here for the last thirty five years. Members are always encouraged to attend these visits, this year there were just a couple. When the visit is completed, Brian writes a report on our discussions and ideas. This report is also available, should anyone like to read it, by calling Susan at 962-8612 and she can send it over to you via e-mail.

Congratulations to Rob Abbott and Matt Smith. Rob and Matt both studied hard to take and pass the state test for pesticide licensing. Sites that use pesticides are required to have staff licensed to use and train others to use the products. While we try hard to limit pesticide use as little as possible, they are always needed for pre or post emergent weed control, various diseases on greens or insect control.

We have had several reserve projects to complete for 2011. Last spring we purchased six irrigation controllers to complete the front nine with all new controllers that communicate with our irrigation computer in the office. During greens aeration Down to Earth Construction completed a new retaining wall for the upper tee on #12. See attached photo-



graph. The remaining project is for drainage improvements near the 4th green.

Another goal for 2011, by your entire golf operations (maintenance and golf shop), is to improve the lateral hazard area to the right of the 5th green, so we can remove the hazard. This requires us to establish turf in this area prior to the heavy rains to prevent erosion. We have filled in the ditch that is caused by runoff and over seeded. We have also adjusted our irrigation to irrigate the area. We may even need to add a sprinkler or two. If all goes well and the rains do not erode the area prior to turf establishment, in the future we can have a party to celebrate the hazard removal.

It is hard to believe it is November. Shotgun season begins, Veterans Day and Thanksgiving holidays are celebrated, most of you are a year older. Have a great fall and winter of golf. Please use the 90 degree rule when operating the golf cart, remain on the paths around tees and greens.

It's almost a 180 degree shoulder turn. That is where the power comes from on the serve. Watch the pros as they serve and you will see what I mean - some of them actually almost turn their back to the net as they start the motion. Most of us are serving with both of our shoulders facing the net and using only our arm to propel the ball. Anyway, try it with a basket of balls, a little at a time, until it feels natural. You'll become a pro in time!

### **PML Aero Club**

The month of September and the beginning of October have been busy for our Aero club members. For the month of September we all logged in over 10 hours of flight time. Danielle, Rick and Janet have been training vigorously and yours truly did the long cross country trip on October 7, 2011, which was really a big deal for me.

There has been a lot of talk about our club purchasing an LSA (Light Sport Aircraft) so I did some research in some of my AOPA magazines and found out some interesting facts. Listed below are some bullet points that you might be interested in knowing about the sport pilot:

- On its face, sport pilot is readily understood and easily communicated. It's a faster, hopefully cheaper, way to indulge your aviation passion. Sport pilots require fewer training hours and are limited to aircraft that fall under the Light Sport aircraft rules. Certain aspects of the rules, however, continue to confuse and astound the general pilot population. Here are a few examples:
- Medical or no medical? Sport pilots can self-certify with a valid driver's license so long as an application for an FAA medical certificate has never been denied, revoked, suspended, or withdrawn. If selfcertifying, any limitations on a driver's license (use of corrective lenses, for example) carry through to piloting privileges.
- Limited to LSAs? A sport pilot can only act as pilot in command of an aircraft that meets the light sport aircraft requirements. But, nothing in the rules prohibits a student from receiving dual in-

struction from a CFI in a non-LSA aircraft. Theoretically, a student could receive dual training in a Cessna 150 (which does not meet the requirements for light sport aircraft), so long as he soloed and took the checkride in a Cessna 162 Skycatcher (which does).

• CFI versus CFI-SP: CFIs don't need any additional rating, endorsement, or proficiency to train sport pilot candidates within the category and class listed on their certificate. Just as a private pilot can exercise the privileges of a sport pilot, a CFI can operate as a sport pilot instructor, which means he, too, can self-certify with a valid driver's license. The same stipulation about prior medical certification applies. If operating as a CFI-SP, the instructor must adhere to the privileges and limitations spelled out in FAR 61.429.

Sport pilots are limited by regulation to flying only Light Sport category aircraft (LSA). New students will find sport pilot to be a quick, less expensive, and satisfying way to get into the cockpit. It's also remarkably easy for those who hold a more advanced pilot certificate to begin exercising their privileges as a sport pilot.

Dennis Smith, our President, would like to hear from anyone who is interested in joining our Aero Club and would also like to know how much interest there is in the community for our Club to purchase a Light Sport Aircraft. In order for our club to purchase a LSA we would need to grow our group by at least 10 members so, if you are interested, give him a call at 962-4950.

## **Online Marketing of The Grill**

What a great tool the internet is to market small business. I'm discovering new ways to use the internet every day. For me the endless websites,

blogs, newsletters and webinars have proved to be a wealth of information. I thought I'd recap a recent article that I found (*bttp://bbswk.bbs.edu/ item/6833.btml*). The original paper was written by Harvard Business School professor Michael Luca. His findings were based on the review of Yelp postings about restaurants in Seattle, WA, between 2003 and 2009. Luca then compared the ratings by civilian reviewers with sales figures for the restaurants, as provided by the Washington State Department of Revenue.

I have been in the restaurant business for many years and, like most restaurateurs, I cringe at the very mention of Yelp, but this Harvard study suggests that the negative outlook that we have of these websites should stop and that we should work toward a better review from the service's civilian critics. An upgrade of just one star can deliver as much as a 9 percent jump in sales, according to the findings, unless you're part of a chain. Chain restaurants spend a lot of money on their brands and that advertising trumps what Yelp's citizen-reviewers have to say about one of its units, Luca concluded.

He goes on to write how Yelp can provide powerful marketing for free. He suggested the service's power as a modern-day word-of-mouth tool. "Consumer reviews provide a substitute for more traditional forms of marketing." says Luca. As I watch my 2 college age kids texting on their phones, like many of their peers, I see that this studies' results are already emerging as reality. So, the next time you log on to your favorite web search, or when you check your emails, please visit one of these free marketing websites like Yelp and give us a 5 star review. You now have the power to help the Grill directly.

66 short films were screened at the Sonora Opera Hall and the Groveland Community Hall over the course of the festival and workshops took place throughout the day at the Sonora Inn and at Stage 3. 

## John Gray, Tuolumne County 4th District Supervisor

Taking up a lot of time these days for County Staff is working out the details for AB109, the Governor's plan for realignment. It appears that first wave of prisoners being released from State Prisons to Counties is already happening. The county is developing a plan to manage the return of these "low risk" prisoners.

The dilemma for Tuolumne County is what to do with these releasees if they violate the rules of their release. Our jail is full and as I said three years ago, the jail should have been our first priority at the new Law and Justice Center. The State will be providing funds to the County to build the courthouse and juvenile detention facility but with the \$30M dollar limit to counties on AB900 grant funding for jail construction, it does not give us enough money to fully fund a new jail whose cost is estimated at about \$70M.

I anticipate that some type of solution to the funding shortfall will be addressed in the near future by the Board of Supervisors. The Governor has promised that the State will provide full funding for the realignment program with a possible Constitutional Amendment through a ballot measure in 2012. The Governor has stated that the constitutional amendment would involve tax increases which is sure to provoke resistance between our representatives in the state legislature. As Craig Pedro, our County Administrator, says, "news at eleven". A back-up plan pursuing an initiative to secure funding for realignment is being looked at by the California State Association of Counties should a constitutional amendment fail.

There has been a lot of news in the papers lately about the Delta Water Plan. This plan is being developed to administer the use of all the water that flows through the Delta. The outcome of this plan will have a significant impact on the counties where the water originates. We certainly don't want to risk the chance of losing water that we need at home for other purposes outside of our local area. We send enough water south already.

Tuolumne County has gone on record to support an Alternative Delta Plan submitted by the Ag-Urban Coalition. This plan, in my opinion, contains many solutions which meet both the upstream user/suppliers goals as well as those of the Delta itself. The final Delta Plan will affect us all in the State. Follow it closely. The current Fifth Draft of the Delta Plan continues to improve upon previous plans but does not go far enough, in the Boards' opinion, to protect the upstream user...which is "us".

By the time you read this, the County will have addressed the medical marijuana dispensary ordinance. I think that many of us agree that medical marijuana has its place. The Federal Government is cracking down on all forms of collectives and dispensaries in the state. It is against federal law to sell marijuana-medical or not. The problem for county officials is that we may not be immune to prosecution if we make ordinance provisions that allow marijuana disbursement. I do not know how to fix this one. Federal Law generally trumps State Law in most cases. I have been told that marijuana is easier to grow than tomatoes. A simple solution is to just grow your own but don't sell any of it! Too simplistic but it would work much better than what we are doing now. The Board of Supervisors finds itself in a difficult situation. Putting an ordinance in place that allows the violation of Federal Law may not be in the best interest of "all the people".

It's been a busy year for the planning and newly created Community Resource Department. One of the Board of Supervisors goals is to make the development process more business friendly and streamlined. This past year we have addressed the Big Box Ordinance, Biological Resource Guide, Inclusionary Housing, Grading Ordinance and the Second Home Ordinance to name a few.

The development process needs to be balanced. Unfortunately many rules that have been adopted over the past 25 years may have hindered healthy growth in our county. George Segarini, President of the Tuolumne County Chamber of Commerce, has formed a population 2010 working group to determine why Tuolumne County's population only grew a little over 1% in the past 10 years. Two key points that he cited in a short report presented to the Board of Supervisors that would help fix the problem of limited population growth were that county staff needs to "facilitate not negotiate" development and that streamlining of the planning process is needed. I agree and will continue to work towards improving the process. Obviously, these are not the only reasons that our county did not grow as much as other neighboring counties. In Mr. Segarini's report, he stated "It needs to be also pointed out that around 2007 a "perfect storm" hit Tuolumne County affecting population growth. Five economic categories were impacted around the same time: loss of jobs in the timber industry, fall-off of home construction, closing of major retailers, government cut-backs and less "in-migration" of retirees".

There is some good news however. In the last article, I mentioned the importance of our Economic Development Authority. I have also mentioned in previous articles that we should see a gain of about 1000 new jobs in 2011. We are seeing this happen!

- Sierra Pacific Industries (Saw Mill)- 130 jobs with an estimated 500 associated spin-off jobs
- Sandvik- 150 jobs over 3 years-so far 76 new jobs realized
- Avalon Health Care- 85 jobs with the new expanded facility to open in November/ December
- Former Mervyn's Building which will be occupied by Jo-Ann Fabrics, Pet Mart and Big Lots to employ 100 to 120.

• Kohls- 85 to 100 jobs

#### • Lowes- 120 jobs

The County, the City of Sonora and the Economic Development Authority have been instrumental in helping to move these projects forward. With each new project comes new opportunity for our community to prosper and our residents to improve their quality of life through gainful employment.

Jeff Northrup, our Southside road division foreman and his dedicated crew are doing an outstanding job to keep our roads in good repair and to get them ready for winter. They have only been limited by the funds that the county is able to provide them for road materials. I want to thank Jeff, his crew and Road Superintendent, Barry Bynum, for their insight to use the left over materials from the Priest Coulterville Road chip seal project to seal Memorial Drive. Great job and great initiative was shown on this project.

I have more road issues to inform you about but this will have to wait for a future article. We definitely need more funding in our road maintenance program, I have a few ideas that I am working on and will let you know later.

For those that have been concerned about the Groveland Creek, I have been informed that the Cal Fire Prisoner crews will be working on the creek in early November. My thanks go to Maintenance Superintendant, Ed Hoag, for championing this project.

There will be no article in December or office hours in Groveland or Don Pedro... I'll be working on my campaign for re-election. I've enjoyed the past three years representing the people of the fourth district and would like to continue for another term.

In closing, I wish to extend my best wishes to you and yours for the coming holiday season.



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

#### STCHS Monthly Program for November 2011 "John Sutter And His World" Groveland Community Center Saturday evening,

November 19, 2011, 7:00 PM

This outstanding "STCHS" program by Steve Beck is about early California history, John Sutter, Sutter's family, Sutter's circuitous route to Yerba Buena (San Francisco), about Sutter's Fort, land grants and Sutter's unique and significant relationship with the Indigenous People of the Sacramento Valley. Mr. Beck recently spoke to the 400 member Sacramento Rotary Club and received a standing ovation which is a very unique endorsement by that club. During his presentation the PA system failed. Quoted are the written comments in the weekly bulletin by the club president. "Historian and 'Orator' Steve Beck led the membership through a descriptive humorous and energetic lineage of the history of Sutter's Fort, John Sutter and the

myriad of characters surrounding him in this pivotal chapter of the evolution of our state...virtually without the benefit of a microphone and sound system. Would you agree that his enthusiasm and speaking abilities actually benefitted from the mishap? Concluding to a standing ovation, all seemed to be enthralled with his delivery and content." Very impressive.

Steve Beck has been a resident of the Sacramento area since 1967. Beck holds degrees in Anthropology and Geology from California State University, Sacramento. For the last fifteen years Steve Beck has worked at Sutter's Fort State Historic Park. He is currently the Program Lead for Hands-on-History, an interactive way of delivering history to the public us-

ing docents, demonstrations and historical material and culture projects for adults and children. Mr. Beck has also directed educational programming at sutter's Fort and has been the museum archivist. Beck has written several monographs on the history and anthropology of the Sacramento region including articles about the Donner Party, Bear Flag Revolt, and the relationship between John Sutter and the Indigenous People of the Sacramento Valley. He has been a contributor in many books about the region. Beck frequently is invited to speak on the subject of John Sutter and his world. He has appeared on the History Channel, Discovery Channel, and PBS. It is suggested you arrive early and enjoy a very educational and entertaining speaker.

# The 1940 Census: You Can Help

The FamilySearch.org web site, https://familysearch.org/1940census has posted the following announcement:

"On April 2, 2012, NARA [the National Archives and Records Administration] will provide access to the images of the 1940 United States Federal Census for the first time. Unlike previous census years, images of the 1940 U.S. Federal Census will be made available as free digital images.

Upon its release, FamilySearch and its partners will coordinate efforts to provide quick access to these digital images and immediately start indexing these records to make them searchable online for free and open access."

On April 2, images of the 132 million names in the 1940 census will be made available for free, but they need indexes. You can help to make a quality, accurate index to these names by joining the indexing effort at FamilySearch.org. You do not have to be a member of the LDS Church to participate. Family-Search states a large percentage of indexers are members of genealogy societies. Indexing is fun, takes no special skills, other than patience and can cost you as little as a few minutes a day. But be aware: indexing is habit-forming, and you'll be contributing to a great resource for all genealogists.

For more information, and to help index the 1940 census, go to *https:// familysearch.org/1940census* 

As I write this, only 189 days remain until the census will be released. Remember, when you index, your efforts can help your own research.



# **Addictions**

Nowadays we hear that almost everything is an addiction; alcohol, drugs, sex, food, shopping, hoarding and anything else we do persistently or habitually that is not in our best interest. It used to be related mainly to drug or alcohol abuse but the field has broadened. People have found different ways of coping with the daily stresses of life. Anxiety, depression, fear and anger are common painful emotions we experience and we want to get rid of them. For example:

Jack was faced with being out of work after he just bought a house and had another baby. He felt overwhelmed by his responsibilities and the fear he had about not being able to provide for his family. "I found that when I drink alcohol I can blot out these feelings of failure and impotency and then I don't have to think about them." This was actually one of the worst decisions Jack could have made. His wife suffered his rages when she complained about his drinking and eventually asked for a divorce.

Then there was Susan, a single mother at 16 years old who had lived in foster care since she was 5 years old. She had to move out when she got pregnant the first time. Two more pregnancies followed within 3 years. Susan felt overburdened with having to care for her three young kids as well as work a full time job. "I have no help, I'm angry and I can't do it all." And she couldn't. She was always tired, getting sick and losing her patience with her children. Then she met someone who introduced her to drugs which led her to illicit sex. She had some temporary relief from her anger and depression when she used the drugs and had more money from having sex with strangers. But she found herself spiraling down, even more impatient with her kids and filled with guilt. She worried that she would lose her kids and they would have to go to foster homes as she did.

All of these addictions are an attempt to avoid the emotional pain and ignore the difficult circumstances. Unfortunately, they don't do either. The problems don't go away. They usually make the situation worse. The circumstances are often bad enough, but adding an uncontrollable addiction to the mix only compounds the problem. Everyone suffers, especially the children. These are not uncommon examples of people in trouble and the way they have tried to cope with them. They have lost control over their lives and don't know how to get it back.

What to do?

First, one needs to acknowledge the problem. Denial is a powerful defense against the truth and will prevent resolution. Many will say they have tried everything but nothing works. That could be true if no one ever recovered or changed his/her life. That still qualifies as denial.

Second, investigate the resources available to you. There are many agencies, programs and professionals who work with these problems. They understand the pain these circumstances cause and they are there to help not only the addicted person but the entire family, because addiction is a family problem. As previously stated, everyone suffers.

Recognizing that asking for help and accepting it is not shameful. (If someone needed your help wouldn't you give it to them?)

Thirdly, give yourself time and patience to put things right. Work on the issues you have been repressing most of your life. Take a positive direction and do what needs to be done to have a happy life.

You owe it to yourself and your family. You are all worth it.





# **The More Photons The Better**

If you've ever looked through a telescope at the nighttime sky you may have noticed that what you see through a telescope with your eyes is much different than the photographs you've seen in many of these PML Newsletters. This is because the human eye, even with its amazing ability to turn photons into electrical signals that our brain can recognize as imagery, is no match for the light gathering ability of a digital camera.

The human eye contains two types of photoreceptors, rods and cones. Rods are more sensitive than cones but they are not sensitive to color. Basically rods "see" in shades of grey. This is why you see shades of gray, instead of color, in low light conditions. Try it yourself, take a colorful picture outside at night and see how little color information is detectable. Today's digital camera sensors don't have these low-light color restrictions. You can think of a digital camera sensor as a bucket that collects photons (light) - the longer the exposure, the more light (color and details) that's captured and displayed in the final photograph.

Photographing Deep Sky Objects (nebula, galaxies, etc ...) is all about long exposure times. To put this into perspective, most daytime photographs have exposure times that are measured in fractions of a second. Most deep sky object astrophotography has exposure times that are measured in minutes or hours!

Taking photographs of deep sky objects requires a telescope mount that can accurately track the sky over long periods of time to provide long exposure times with a camera. This is accomplished by attaching a digital camera to the end of a telescope where the eyepiece is normally inserted. One of the big challenges is accurate tracking of the sky while the camera shutter is open. Stars are like pinpoints of light. Tracking errors quickly elongate stars in a photograph, and then they look oblong or like streaks. So exposure times of minutes or hours can be a real challenge. Many separate photographs are taken with exposure times that range from 2 to 15 minutes each. Then, all the individual photographs are digitally "stacked" one on top of another. It's a real "eye opening" experience to see these deep sky images, which individually have little detail, take shape as all the collected

light that left these stars 400 years ago and have ended their journey at the back of your eyes. If you have less than excellent eyesight, Pleiades may look more like a small fuzzy patch, about the size of a dime at the end



photons of light are stacked to create the final detailed image.

Included in this article are images that I've taken of Pleiades, also known as the Seven Sisters for the seven stars that can be seen by someone with excellent eyesight. The Pleiades are a prominent sight in winter viewed on a dark night in Pine Mountain Lake and to the naked eye appears as a small cluster of stars which just happen to be about 400 light-years from Earth. This means that you are looking at photons of of your fully extended arm.

In addition to the stars, Pleiades contains a reflection nebula. Reflection nebulae are clouds of dust which are reflecting the light of a nearby star or stars. Similar to how the headlights on a car illuminate fog. Thus, the color shown by reflection nebulae is similar to that of the illuminating stars.

I've included 2 images of Pleiades in this article. The first image illustrates what you would expect to see when viewing Pleiades through a typical amateur telescope. The most visible feature is the stars, as little, if any, of the reflection nebulosity can be seen. The second image illustrates an image of Pleiades after 520 minutes of exposure with a digital camera. Fifty-two individual images, 10 minutes of exposure time each, taken over 3 separate evenings reveals Pleiades in all its glory. These 520 minutes of exposure reveal the complex nature and color of Pleiades with all its reflection nebulosity. Quite a difference between what our eyes can see and what a digital camera attached to a telescope can reveal.

Two images of the same beautiful deep sky object with vastly different detail. At one end of the spectrum, the telescope view, is the real-time "being one with the universe" personally viewing the light that left Pleiades nearly 400 years ago. Then, at the other end of the spectrum, is the image created from nearly 8 1/2 hours of exposure time, with all the beauty and color revealed, thanks to the power of exposure time.

Newspaper print, like the PML Newsletter, doesn't have nearly the resolution or color range to show all the fine details in this image. 

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# CONTRACTOR CHECKLIST FOR HOMEOWNERS

#### **BUILDING PERMITS**

Will the contractor get any needed permits before the work starts?

Are the permit fees included in the contract?

#### **CHECK OUT YOUR CONTRACTOR**

- □ Did you contact the Contractors State License Board (CSLB) to check the status of the contractor's license? Contact the CSLB at 1-800-321-CSLB (2752) or visit their Web site: www.cslb.ca.gov.
- Did you get at least three local references from the contractors you are considering?
- Did you call them and see the work the contractor completed?

#### **CHECK OUT THE CONTRACT**

- Did you read and do you understand your contract?
- Does the 3-day right to cancel a contract apply to you?
- Does the contract tell you when work will start and end?
- Does the contract include a detailed description of the work to be done, the material to be used,

and equipment to be installed? This description should include a plan and scale drawing showing the shape, size, dimensions and specifi cations. It should include brand names, model numbers, quantities and colors. Specific descriptions now will prevent disputes later.

- □ Are you required to pay a down payment? If you are, the down payment should never be more than 10% of the contract price or \$1,000, whichever is less.
- □ Is there a schedule of payments? If there is, you should pay only as work is completed and not before.
- Did your contractor give you a "Notice to Owner," a warning notice describing liens and ways to prevent them? Even if you pay your contractor, a lien can be placed on your home by unpaid laborers, subcontractors, or material suppliers. A lien can result in you paying twice or, in some cases, losing your home in a foreclosure. Also check the "Notice to Owner" for ways to protect yourself.
- Did you know changes or additions to your contract must all be in writing?
- Putting changes in writing reduces the possibility of a later dispute.


