## **General Manager's Message**

#### Lake Sediment Mitigation Plan

Over time, sediment flows into our Lake through the multiple inlets and coves. During the Lake Dredging Project, we consulted with governmental agencies to determine what measures will be required to mitigate sediment flow into the lake.

We are working with our Lake Limnologist, Michael Horvath, to draft a plan to determine what methods would be best suited for each cove inlet. Under consideration is the installation of concrete capture basins, ponds and weirs. Each method is used according to the type of sediment flow and terrain.

Once a plan is drafted, we will present the information to the Board of Directors and membership for review, funding and implementation.

#### **2012 Budget Process**

The 2012 Budget Process began in August with the management team budget kick-off meeting. This is a meeting of the management team as we work to prepare the budget draft for presentation to the Board, Budget and Finance Committee and ultimately the membership. The budget preparation process takes several months and includes several meetings and input from Board members, committee members and property owners.

The day-long, open Budget meeting will be held on Saturday, October 15th

at the Lake Lodge. The meeting starts promptly at 8 a.m. and we encourage all interested members to attend.

The final approval of the Budget is handled by the Board of Directors at the November Board meeting, which is scheduled for Saturday, November 12th. This meeting will also be held at the Lake Lodge and begin at 9 a.m.

#### **Fire Abatement**

The fire safety compliance deadline has come and gone and the majority of the membership has performed the necessary work. Our fire safety team is finishing up with the final letters and coordination of lot clearance. Unfortunately, we had some members who decided to ignore the compliance letters. Those members that chose to ignore the packet of information and many letters that were mailed out will be receiving notices of hearing before the Covenants Committee.

We would like to express our thanks to those members that took the time to ensure that their property was in compliance with the fire safety rules. Your efforts will keep you and your neighbors safe and mitigate the risk of a wildland fire.

#### **Canada Geese Issues**

We continue to experience issues with the resident Canada goose population. The geese propagate, eat the grass at the Marina and Golf Course

and, of course, leave many pounds of feces in their wake. The impact of the geese is felt on private member property as well. Over the years, we have tried many non-lethal methods to haze the geese in an attempt to get them to move to other areas.

We are considering the formation of a waterfowl management committee to enlist assistance from the membership. If you are a member who is interested in serving on this proposed committee, please let our Administration staff know. If we get enough members who are interested in volunteering their time to serve on this committee, I will ask the Board of Directors to approve a charter and form the committee.

## **PMLA Money Matters**

Ever hear the phrase "too late now, that train has left the station"? How about "closing the barn door after the horse has gotten out"? Or "you won't get it unless you ask for it"? Finally, how about "you get what you pay for"? I imagine all of us have heard some version of one or more of these common refrains many times in our life.

These well worn clichés all apply to various aspects of the service and financial plan of your Association. From the planning stage (budget) to the execution stage (operations) we have to take all of these factors into account when determining our answer to the age old questions known as the "Five W's and One H". Who, what, where, when, why and how.

In the case of an organization like PMLA many of these questions need to be asked and answered long before anything can actually be done. This is particularly true if the "what" involves expending Association resources (time, money, etc.).

It all starts with the budget process (yes, that again). During the budget preparation and review process these questions get asked a lot. It helps us analyze the things that we want/need to accomplish in the coming year. It is also important because failing to go through this process can mean projects or efforts that are important to you, the property owner, can't be accomplished.

If individuals or groups don't express an opinion on things they want done in the Association then the Board and Administration have to use their own judgment when allocating the limited PML resources during the budget process. Requesting that the Association provide some additional service or perform some task that requires a significant amount of resources after the budget has been set can be very difficult.

Setting goals and outlining a spending and financial plan for the Association is the Board's job. Implementing this plan and carrying out the plan to meet the established goals is the job of the management and employees of PML. If we don't hear from you then we can hardly be expected to know what you want.

Of all the questions that are part of the Five W's and One H", perhaps the most difficult is the H, the How. The "How" generally involves spending money to accomplish a task, either through a direct expense or indirectly through staff wages, etc. In order for a specific project to be undertaken the appropriate level of funding must be in place. This brings us back to the budget. If you as a property owner feel strongly enough that something needs to be done, then your support for the project is important. Voice your opinion on the topic and, just as important, show your support for the appropriate level of funding required, even if that means an increase in your assessment. That is the true test of support, are you willing to help pay for what you want.

It is important to remember that the Board ultimately makes these types of decisions, but as the old saying goes, "you won't get it unless you ask for it".

I mentioned in last months article the need for adding sand to the greens. It seems every time we do this we will get questions as to why it is done. It is recommended that every two to three weeks we apply about 1000 pounds of sand per green. The goal is to reduce thatch density and maintain sand as the dominant component of the soil, to maintain a balance between air filled and water filled pore space. An added benefit is the putting surface will also improve a little each time we complete this project.

For those of you that live on the course and have landscaping bordering the property lines, we ask that it be kept from growing onto the course. We do need a clear line of sight between out of bounds stakes and the landscaping can interfere with this as well as affect our sprinklers ability to cover the turf properly.

We are in our eleventh year of operation with our new irrigation system and are now replacing nozzles in a couple of hundred sprinklers. They wear out and will not properly cover the area as designed, so the turf can be affected either to wet or dry. Around the pond on #1 we installed a single strand of wire around the perimeter at 8" above the ground to try and control the geese. This method is recommended as the geese have difficulty trying to get out of the water. Strands can be added at 6" and 12" if it seems necessary.

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While on the topic of geese, the golf maintenance staff will try to agitate the geese with a dog or just chasing them to get them off of the course. There is no intention of hurting them. They are an inconvenience to both the players and staff and create more work in cleaning up after they leave.

Remember that on September 20th at 8:00 a.m. the U.S.G.A. agronomist will be here for his annual visit. It is a great time to come out and ask questions or just listen to his advice and experience that he has obtained from visiting hundreds of courses each year.

We will be closed on September 26th and 27th for greens aeration.

Speaking of education, I've had a great opportunity to meet monthly with Alan Macdonald and the Presidents and Tournament Chairs of the 18-Hole Men & Women and the 9-Hole Men & Women's Groups. Discussions focus on course conditions, ongoing and necessary maintenance practices as well as golf rules, etiquette, and pace of play. I've enjoyed writing the last few articles discussing Pace of Play, Golf Etiquette, and Ready Golf but, in meeting, playing and discussing these items, it has become apparent that there is some lack of clarity about some of the rules on how to proceed if your ball enters a lateral hazard (red staked areas).

When your ball enters a lateral water hazard you have 5 options. Option #1 incurs no penalty. Options #2 through #5 will cause the competitor to incur a one stroke penalty.

- Play the ball as it lies (no penalty-you may not ground your club or remove any loose impediments)
- Drop the ball up to two club lengths (no closer to the hole) from the point of entry into the hazard
- Drop the ball on the other side of the hazard (equidistant from hole-no closer) up to two club lengths
- Drop the ball as far back as you'd like, keeping the point of entry and the flagstick in line
- Play a ball as near as possible from the original or last position that you hit the ball from

Additional Q & A's about Lateral Water Hazards:

Q. If my ball enters a lateral water hazard may I drive my cart into the hazard?

A. Yes, you may drive your cart into a lateral water hazard however, a hazard is usually a sensitive area and to help protect and heal these areas it is highly recommended that you avoid driving your golf cart into the hazard. Personally, I treat all hazards with the same respect; I wouldn't drive my golf cart into a bunker "sand trap" so why would I drive it into a lateral water hazard?

Q. May I carry my clubs and/or bag into the lateral water hazard?

A. Yes, you may take more than one club (or your whole bag) into hazard. However, you are not allowed to ground your club in the hazard. You may place or park your clubs in the area but, if your fellow competitors feel you have grounded your club, the burden of proof falls on you to convince them that you did not ground your club. In these situations my feeling has always been to avoid any possibility of penalty or doubt by carrying one club into the hazard.

There are a plethora of rules and scenarios that come into play on the golf course. I encourage all of you to, first and foremost, get yourselves a rules book and read it. The Rules of Golf can and will help you play and enjoy better rounds of golf. I am always happy to discuss the rules and the many questions that arise from them. I also welcome any suggestions for future rules Q & A's to be discussed in my monthly articles.

## **Compliance Chatter**

The 2 1/2 months known as the Fire Season was extremely intense for the Fire Safety Team. PML is in the third year of increased focus on fuel reduction and our goal is to assist you with this effort. As usual we received many phone calls and assisted property owners with their questions and concerns.

We thought it would be helpful to provide you with a summary of the process we use to get the job done. We also came up with some common questions and comments to help address your concerns. Hopefully, you will find the information helpful.

- Annually, our three Fire Safety staff members inspect approximately 3,550 lots.
- The initial inspections occur from June 1 June 30.
- This year we mailed Courtesy Notices to about 50% of the membership. These are folks whose lots were not in compliance with the fire safety rules.
- The annual date to be in compliance is July 1. The first week of July we re-inspect these same Lots to see if they are still out of compliance.
- This year we mailed 376 Notices of Non-Compliance (second notices)

giving the member 15 days to bring their lot into compliance.

- On July 15 we re-inspect these same Lots. Those lots not in compliance are put out to bid to our local vendors.
- This year 37 lots were put out to bid. This work was completed by August 15 and the cost was applied to the non-compliant member's account.
- These members receive a Notice of Summary Judgment giving the member 30 days to request a hearing before the Covenants Committee to explain why they should not be fined \$500 for not complying with Resolution #95.04, Fire Safety Plan Policy and Procedures.
- In between...we field up to 100 phone calls per day for 6 weeks. This is a daunting task. With your help we can reduce the number of phone calls. Here are a few of the common questions we receive by phone:

#### "My Lot wasn't inspected until June 25<sup>th</sup> and you want me to be in compliance by July 1 and I don't bave enough time."

The inspection process takes 30 days to complete. Some lots are inspected

on June 1 and some on June 30. July 1 is the deadline for compliance regardless of when your Lot is inspected.

We mail our Fire Safety Package to all members on May 15 of each year. This Package explains everything you need to know. It is important to plan to have your lot cleaned in June. Waiting for a Courtesy Notice to tell you what needs to be done is not the way to go. Let's face it, weeds need to be cut every year. Fallen limbs need to be removed every year. Dead stuff needs to be cleared every year. It's just part of owning property in the wildland urban interface.

#### "I got a bid from a local guy for \$500. Is that about the right price?"

We don't get involved in pricing. We have our Preferred Vendor list which is available on our website and also included in our Fire Safety Package which is mailed on May 15 of each year. We recommend that you call several of them and comparison shop.

#### "My neighbors Lot is a buge fire hazard. How come they don't have to clean their Lot?"

We keep an inspection log on every Lot. One way or the other it will be cleaned by August 15. The process takes time, but it is effective and gets the job done.

#### "I've been on vacation for 6 weeks and just got my mail."

Again, if you wait to get a Courtesy Notice you will run the risk of receiving a non-compliance letter. We don't like to send those out any more than you like receiving them. Plan ahead. If you plan your vacation during this time frame you will need to hire someone to put it on their schedule so you don't have to worry about it. Our vendors fill their schedules fast. Making the arrangements in May is a great idea.

#### "I want to live in the forest. Why do I have the thin out those beautiful trees and brush?"

Before people inhabited this area Mother Nature would remove all the extra brush and trees with low intensity fires that got rid of the dead stuff and thinned out the live stuff. Now we need to be in charge of that process. Besides, all that vegetation fighting for what water and minerals we have, it's just not healthy. Improving the health of what you want to keep is environmentally positive.

Thanks to all of you for your support. Reducing the threat of wildfire is a goal we can all be proud of. Each year we achieve more than the previous year. And yes, for those of us in the middle of the action, it's all worth it.

## **Summertime Blues**

Well, I am going to raise a fuss, and I am going to raise a holler. About working all summer just to try and finish all the roadwork. The PML Maintenance Department got a short summer season, and before we know it, the rainy season will return. Yikes, it started raining on October 4th last year, and never stopped till sometime in June! Still, we will continue with the roadwork for as many days as possible. The roads were striped, the road legends painted, a fire lane was placed at the Lake Lodge, and a few intersections changed in June. Major road work is still before us in this coming year.

This year's roadwork has covered

several facets of maintenance and improvements. Several roads received crack sealing work. Roadways in Units 3, 4, and 8 were crack-sealed as pavement maintenance this summer. Preparations have been made for parking lots at the recreational amenities in Unit 3 to be sealed and coated. The lot at the Tennis Courts 3 & 4 will be coated, and the lines striped this September.

Work will continue on embankments, curbing, and drainage repairs into the rainy season. Drainage repairs are made year around, and the work is increased in the fall with the rains and falling leaves. There are several sections of asphalt that have been lifted and broken by tree roots, these damaged roadways will be sectioned and replaced as road repairs. Unit 15 will have work done on Lower Skyridge at several locations, especially where the two water springs are undermining the road bed near Miner's Camp. Asphalt curbing work will be continued on Pine Mountain Drive, and on the Longview Median.

With the close of the summer months, the days late in September, there comes a welcomed end to our hot weather. The day after the Labor Day weekend, the PML Maintenance Crews will be focusing on getting the road work accomplished as a priority. Asphalt work is performed in the warmer months of our seasonal year. Drainage ditches are cleared and dug when the ground is dry, firm, and workable. Regardless, plan now for another wet year. Property owners should also be checking their property drainage, clearing ditches of debris, and digging out the sediment buildup that clogs and dams the storm water runoff.

Several roads projects are planned to get our roads, amenities, and parking lots, ready for the next year. Much of this work has been accomplished during these summer months of July and August, and the improvements can be seen. The mail house at Rock Canyon is the first of the mail house improvements. Broken and deteriorated asphalt has been replaced; several protective bollards have been placed to protect the structure from vehicle collisions, parking is being improved.

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## Community Cowboy Poetry Coulterville Style

Coutlerville, California: Cowboy Poetry returns to the "True Western Town" of Coulterville, California on October 1, 2011. BY DALE SILVERMAN

The Cowboy, horses, cattle, wide open spaces, the howl of a coyote in the night, times when a handshake was a contract, songs and stories around a campfire: there are places in the west where all these things are still alive and well. In the good ol' days the cowboy was the glue that held the West together. Ranchers would hire cowboys to keep a watchful eye over the herds on the wide open range. Although the addition of fenced in herds has removed some of the need for cowboys, today's cowboys still have the skill of the olden days. They are still using the lasso, and roping, tying steers and telling stories. As the written word was scarce, the rhyme of a Cowboy's story helped him to recall the tale. Complemented with instrument and song, Wendy Brown-Barry (and her dog Flash), Keith Keenom, Dan Routh, Madison Seamans and John Silveria will transport you to the old western campfire reminiscent of the era when cowboys told stories. Keith and Dan, along with Fred Stepp on a terrific fiddle, will provide the musical inspiration, a toe-tappin' beat.

Coulterville California is a true Western Town. Many towns can be found in the American west; ones that exemplify the spirit and dedication of the people who founded and built them up over the years. But, according to True West Magazine, 10 of them stand out–and they are the True Western Towns of 2011, (in the January/February 2011 issue). The top four are Pendleton, Oregon; Prescott, Arizona; Dubois, Wyoming; followed by one of California's best kept secrets: Coulterville, California! "This year the competition was very tight," explains True West Executive Editor Bob Boze Bell. "But these towns really stand out. If you're into the history and the heritage of the West, you need to go visit each and every one of these towns." Coulterville has preserved its history through old buildings, museums, events and promotions of historic resources such as Cowboy Poetry. Travelers discover Coulterville on their trek to Yosemite National Park via Hwy 132 or Hwy 49. Since the founding of this town, beginning in 1850, Coulterville has persevered. The town has survived three major fires in the 1800s-plus a flood! Today, the town in the foothills of the Sierra Nevada's, is doing more than just getting by; Coulterville is moving ahead, using its history as a springboard to the future with Coulterville Cowboy Poetry!

The taste of the west begins at high noon on Saturday October 1st with "western" booths and cowboy games for kids and adults. Cowboy Poetry, for a mere \$5 donation for each adult (kids are free), will begin at 6:30 pm. Coulterville Park is at the intersection of Highways 49 and 132, adjacent to the Jeffrey Hotel. Don't be surprised when you see some real-life cowboys shootin' it out in the park – just protect them thar little ones and have yur' self a real good time!

## **Zucchini Crust Pizza**

RECIPE PROVIDED BY TOM KNOTH AND PAULA MARTELL

It is squash season and zucchini makes a surprisingly tasty, yet very healthy pizza crust. You could also substitute several other varieties of squash for the zucchini, and the toppings for this recipe are just one suggestion. So use your imagination with ingredients and create your own masterpiece!

#### INGREDIENTS

- 3 Cups Shredded Zucchini
- 1-1/2 tsp Salt (divided)
- 3/4 Cup Egg Whites
- 1/3 Cup All Purpose Flour
- 8 oz Mozzarella Cheese, sliced
- 2 small Tomatoes, halved and thinly sliced
- 1/2 Cup Red Onion, thinly sliced
- 1/2 Cup Green Bell Pepper, thinly sliced

- 1 tsp Dried Oregano (or 3 tsp fresh Oregano, julienned)
- 1/2 tsp Dried Basil (or 1-1/2 tsp fresh Basil, julienned)
- 1 tsp Red Pepper Flakes (optional)
- 2 cloves Garlic, finely minced (optional)
- 3 Tbsp Parmesan Cheese, shredded

Combine 1 tsp of the salt with the shredded zucchini and spread in a colander or salad spinner; allow to drain over a bowl for 1.5 hours. Combine this mixture with egg whites, then add flour and1/2 teaspoon of the salt and stir well. Spread on bottom of a 12 inch pizza pan, well coated with nonstick cooking spray.

Bake at 450F for 10-12 minutes until medium browned on top. Remove and reduce heat to 350F. Layer sliced



mozzarella on zucchini crust, then tomatoes, onion, bell pepper, oregano, basil, red pepper flakes, garlic, and parmesan cheese.

Bake for 15-20 minutes or until onion is tender and cheese is melted.

# Sober Living Homes, Storm Clean-up, and More Earn Foundation Grants

For 10 years, Beki and Bobby Medina have been setting up and running sober living homes for recovering addicts and alcoholics in Tuolumne County. For the most part, they're helping troubled adults who have burned all their bridges and have no where else to turn.

"This is not a pretty population and these aren't pretty stories," Beki Medina said, "but it's everyone's problem when someone has an addiction or other mental illness and is out of control. We provide a safe option."

In this economic climate, the need is greater than ever, while local options and support services have become even scarcer. To help, trustees at the Sonora Area Foundation this month awarded the Medina's We Care Sober Living Homes a \$20,000 grant. It will support efforts to reopen a second Sober Living home in Sonora. The Medinas have had as many as six homes operating in the past, but had to scale back in the last three years as the economy declined and social services cut programs. They now have just one home for men in downtown Tuolumne.

Judge William Polley, a Sonora Area Foundation trustee, said the Medinas are doing work that no one else tackles, and it benefits the community as a whole.

"The people they're helping in a lot of cases have criminal, drug and alcohol problems, and they aren't going to be welcome anywhere else," he said, "so having these homes mean they're not on the street."

Polley said he also admires that the Medinas set up and run homes without taking salaries for themselves. "They put every grant dollar into the program."

The Medinas will give priority for residents ages 55 and older, because older people have so few affordable options locally. We Care residents contribute to rent and living expenses, and a house manager keeps the household running smoothly. Residents must agree to stay sober, look for work if appropriate, and regularly attend either recovery meetings such as Alcoholics Anonymous or Narcotics Anonymous.

The Sonora Area Foundation awarded a number of other grants to local projects and nonprofits in the past quarter, some through the Foundation's community grant program and some on behalf of donors with donor-advised funds at the Foundation. These included:

Winter storm damage clean-up – The Highway 108 Fire Safe Council will be able to provide extra services to community groups helping homeowners clean up downed trees and slash left from heavy winter storm damage. The Fire Safe Council received a \$10,000 grant to provide extra wood chipping and firewood transportation. Several local groups are helping with the effort, including Interfaith Social Services, the Red Cross, Area 12 Agency on Aging, service clubs and area churches.

Sierra Repertory Theatre – To help Sierra Rep continue its community services – including education programs, children and senior discounts, benefit previews and donations to community groups – SRT received a \$15,000 grant from the Irving J. Symons Foundation (IJS), a supporting organization of the Sonora Area Foundation.

Veterans History Project – A volunteer effort to collect first-hand accounts of local veterans and preserve them in a set of booklets received a \$2,500 award, with \$1,500 from the IJS Foundation and the remainder from three of the SAF's donor-advised funds. Central Sierra Arts Council Executive Director Deanna Mauer is coordinating the project with a team of 10 volunteers.

Interfaith firewood program – A community program to supply free firewood to disadvantaged families and elders was awarded \$27,000 to help erect a metal storage building. The program is run by Interfaith Community Social Services. Funding was awarded by the IJS Trustees Fund and one of the SAF Foundation's donor-advised funds.

Autism and related services – Mind Matters, a nonprofit clinic that provides assessments and therapies for children and adults with autism and related learning disabilities received an \$8,000 award to help serve Tuolumne County children under age 6, and those who cannot afford services. Funding was provided by the IJS Foundation.

Smile Keepers dental services – Smile Keepers, Tuolumne County's long-established program that provides free dental screening and prevention services for school children has received a \$25,000 matching grant for the coming school year. Program advocates are in the process of raising the matching funds to continue services for more than 3,350 Tuolumne County children. Funding was provided by SAF and the IJS Foundation.

Historic Jo Mora art exhibit – A six-week exhibition of artwork by Jo Mora, a well-known turn-of-thecentury California painter, sculptor and writer, will take center stage at the Central Sierra Arts Council's gallery in August and September. The SAF provided \$4,000 to support the project, which also includes publication of a journal and artwork from Mora's 1904 wagon trip into Yosemite Valley.

Tuolumne County archives – Tuolumne County's Carlo M DeFerrari Archive, which houses more than 4,300 books, papers and periodicals focused on Tuolumne County history, will be able to add more spacesaver shelving, thanks to a \$9,878 award from the IJS Foundation.

Challenge Day - A successful youth leadership program that challenges young people to reduce bullying, isolation and negative behavior at school and in the community will continue in the coming school year, with the support of a \$10,000 SAF grant. Challenge Day assemblies and follow-up activities will be coordinated by Friday Night Live, a program of the Amador-Tuolumne Community Action Agency, in partnership with the Tuolumne County Behavior Health Department, the YES Partnership, the Center for a Non-Violent Community and participating schools.

Hospitalized veterans – Volunteers who visit hospitalized veterans and remember their birthdays and holidays received a \$2,000 award. Funding comes from one of SAF's donor-advised funds and the IJS Foundation.

Fire season support – Volunteers with the City of Sonora fire department will be able to purchase a commercial ice machine to keep fire trucks supplied with ice every day during fire season. A grant of \$1,350 will be matched by \$1,900 from volunteers.

Donor-advised grants – Special grants were also awarded to two projects from donor-advised funds: support for the Dancing with the Stars benefit organized by the local chapter of Omega Nu and support for the Sonora Cat Rescue's spay-neuter program.

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The Sonora Area Foundation was established in 1990, and is a Community Foundation that channels donors' charitable contributions to worthy projects in Tuolumne County. Its mission is to strengthen its community by promoting philanthropy through assisting donors, making grants and providing leadership.

The Foundation, along with two supporting organizations, The Irving J. Symons Foundation and the Symons Family Fund, now have assets of more than \$26 million. The governing boards regularly award grants that fulfill needs in Tuolumne County. Those grants totaled \$1.1 million in 2010, and exceed \$14 million since inception. The Sonora Area Foundation also administers more than 170 charitable funds set up for scholarships and other charitable causes.

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# 42 **COMMUNITY** Photographing the Early Evening Sky

Many of the images from the articles that I write in the Pine Mountain Lake Newsletter are taken with the aid of an array of telescopes, telescope mounts, and cameras – but anyone can take beautiful pictures of the evening sky with just about any camera. One thing that I like to do is to take photographs of the early evening sky just after the sun sets. Often I will include some terrestrial reference like a tree line or the horizon in the same photograph. This terrestrial reference can give night sky objects more perspective.

Taking a photograph after sunset requires some special considerations. First of all, in order to collect enough light, the exposure time will be greater than day-time photographs. Longer exposure times require a very steady camera so the image doesn't come out blurry. The best way to accomplish this is by using a tripod. If a tripod isn't available, try setting your camera on a steady location, like a wall or chair, and use the "countdown timer" feature for your camera shutter. Using the countdown timer will minimize the camera shake that would normally occur when you press down on the shutter button. Another challenge when taking photographs in low light conditions is camera focus. The autofocus feature on your camera requires a minimum level of light to operate properly. One trick that I usually use is to focus on a distant bright object so the camera can focus, and then use that focus setting when taking photographs of dim objects that are a similar distance away.

Another fun thing that I like to do in the early evening is to look towards the west and see what bright sky objects are visible. Then I try and fit as many of these objects in the same photograph as possible. Often various bright objects will be close together, or aligned in a way that will make the photograph more interesting than if you just zoomed in on each object individually. Start by looking at the sky just after sunset. As the sky darkens, look for bright objects. Often the brightest "stars" in the sky aren't stars at all, but planets. Naked eye visible planets (that don't require the use of a telescope or binoculars) include Mercury, Venus, Mars, Saturn, and Jupiter. The Sun, moon, and naked eye visible planets all travel approximately the same ecliptic path in the sky from our point of view on Earth. Because our solar system is almost flat it forms a plane. This plane is called the ecliptic of our solar system. Take notice of the path that the sun and moon

mounted on a tripod. This image shows an interesting alignment of three planets and the moon taken about 45 minutes after the sun set. In the upper left is the planet Venus. Venus is the second planet from our Sun and is often mistaken as the brightest "star" in the sky. Venus is an "inner planet" – this means that Venus is closer to the sun than our planet. Because it's an inner planet, Venus is only visible a few hours before or after the sun rises or sets.



travel in the sky, and look for naked eye visible planets traveling along the same ecliptic path. Many web sites are available to help you identify what's good to look for in the evening sky. Many of these web sites even include what bright objects will appear close together. One web site that I like to use is *www.SkyAndTelescope.com*.

I took the photograph that's printed in this newsletter from a high point in Big Oak Flat. I used an expensive "point and shoot" digital camera This is why Venus is also called the "morning star" and the "evening star". Next in the alignment is the 3-day old crescent moon. Even though the moon is a crescent, you can clearly see the outline of the entire moon. This is due to the Sunlight that is reflected from the Earth to the night side of the Moon – this is typically referred to as Earthshine. The night side appears to glow faintly and the entire orb of the Moon is dimly visible. The last two planets shown in this photograph



are Jupiter and Mercury. Jupiter is the fifth planet from the Sun and is the largest one in our solar system. If Jupiter were hollow, more than one thousand Earths could fit inside. Mer-

cury is the innermost (closest) and smallest planet in our solar system. The planet Mercury is reasonably bright in the sky but it is often difficult to see because it is so close to the Sun - this means that it never raises high into the sky and often sets just after sunset and before the sky can get very dark. I've added labels to this photograph so you can easily identify the location of the moon and planets. The resolution of a newspaper print photograph can make it difficult to see details as faint as a single "star" (or in this case a planet), but with the labels you can see where they are in the photograph.

The position of the planets varies from month to month. During the month of September 2011, Jupiter will be visible after about 10PM as it rises in the east. Saturn will be visible very low in the west at the beginning of the month, but will have set before the sun sets later in the month. Mars will rise in the east very late in the night – at about 2AM. Venus is not visible in September, and Mercury is visible in the east just before sunrise. Mercury

is always difficult to spot because it's quite dim and can only be seen very close to sunrise and sunset which is when the sky is still bright so there is limited contrast. Kind of like how the stars are still out during the day, but the sky's just too bright to see them.

# **Genealogy Workshop**

Previous columns have dealt with the United States Federal Population Schedules from 1790 thru 1840 and the information they contain. There are other censuses that are less well known but may contain information not found in the others. These are called "Non-Population" schedules. Not all states retained these census schedules and of those that did some information has been destroyed; however, they are worth a look.

The Slave Schedules were taken in 1850 and 1860. In some cases the name of the slave is given but for the most part there is little more information than name of owner and age of the slave.

The Federal Mortality Schedules were taken from 1850 to 1880 and in six states (Colorado, Florida, Nebraska, New Mexico, North Dakota, and South Dakota) in 1885. Deaths that occurred in the twelve months prior to these censuses were noted and this may help you find an individual who had previously disappeared.

The Agricultural Schedules were taken from 1840 to 1910. Unfortunately only those 1840 thru 1860 remain and they are not stored in a central location. If available, these will give the name of the owner of the farm, how long he had farmed, the amount of acreage and information about the crops or cattle and expenses. These schedules may be valuable if land and property records are missing or have been destroyed. The Manufacturing Schedules were taken 1810 thru 1880. The 1810 schedules were lost and the rest are incomplete; however, if they are available they may contain name of the owner and type of business.

Veterans Schedules were taken in 1840 and 1890. The 1840 schedule listed Revolutionary War pensioners and the 1890 listed Union Veterans and/or their widows. Portions of the 1890 schedules were destroyed, those portions that survived contain the Civil War veteran's name, widow's name (if appropriate), rank and unit with which he served, dates served, enlistment, discharge and length of service. Some Confederate veterans were enumerated in these schedules.

In addition to the decennial censuses conducted by the federal government, some individual states took censuses. Those that did usually did so every ten years, on the five year mark (1855, 1865, etc.).

Obviously a lot of information is contained in these often overlooked census schedules. Ancestry.com and Familysearch.org have the majority of these schedules and the rest may be found by going to Google and searching for the specific schedule.

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# Contractor Checklist for Homeowners

# **BUILDING PERMITS**

Will the contractor get any needed permits before the work starts?

Are the permit fees included in the contract?

## CHECK OUT YOUR CONTRACTOR

- Did you contact the Contractors State License Board (CSLB) to check the status of the contractor's license? Contact the CSLB at 1-800-321-CSLB (2752) or visit their Web site: www.cslb.ca.gov.
- Did you get at least three local
  references from the contractors
  you are considering?
- Did you call them and see the work the contractor completed?

## CHECK OUT THE CONTRACT

- Did you read and do you understand your contract?
- Does the 3-day right to cancel a contract apply to you?
- Does the contract tell you when work will start and end?
- Does the contract include a detailed description of the work to be done, the material to be used, and equipment to be installed? This description should include a plan and scale drawing showing the shape, size, dimensions and specifi cations. It should include brand names, model numbers, quantities and colors. Specific descriptions now will prevent disputes later.

- Are you required to pay a down payment? If you are, the down payment should never be more than 10% of the contract price or \$1,000, whichever is less.
- Is there a schedule of payments? I If there is, you should pay only I as work is completed and not before.
- Did your contractor give you a "Notice to Owner," a warning notice describing liens and ways I to prevent them? Even if you pay your contractor, a lien can be placed on your home by I unpaid laborers, subcontractors, or material suppliers. A lien can result in you paying twice or, in I some cases, losing your home in a foreclosure. Also check the "Notice to Owner" for ways to protect I yourself.
- Did you know changes or additions | to your contract must all be in writing?
- Putting changes in writing reduces the possibility of a later dispute.
