### **General Manager's Message**

#### Directors Election and Governing Documents Revisions... PLEASE VOTE!

On July 9<sup>th</sup> the annual election ballots were mailed to the membership. Members will need to decide which two candidates out of the four that they wish to elect to govern our association. Another important consideration on the ballot is the revision of our CC&R's and Bylaws. These two documents are very important as they define how PML will be governed. I encourage all members to **vote YES** for both revisions.

The changes in these revisions include updates in accordance with current law, better clarification of enforcement and architectural standards and some money-saving provisions. We ask that all qualified members please vote. We do not want to waste association funds by going out for additional balloting to those members who do not return their ballot. Help save PML and in turn the membership money by voting. For more information, copies of the proposed documents and a summary of the changes, please visit the PML Website at www.pinemountainlake. com for more information.

Rather than sending out another mailing to the members with the updated revision documents, we posted these to the PML Website for easy access. This saves money and allows members to access them at their leisure. Members who wish to have a hard copy are welcome to make their request and my staff will mail it to them.

The costs for the Document Revision Project are listed below:

Legal	\$19,633
<b>Document Mailing</b>	\$15,000
<b>Postcard Mailing</b>	\$1,600

The ballot printing and mailing costs remain close to the same as last year. This gives us a total of \$36,233 for the Governing Document (CC&R's Bylaws) revision project. We normally get a 47% return on ballots from the membership. If we were to estimate the cost of sending ballots out to those members who do not normally vote, we can conservatively put it at 53% or a cost of approximately \$3,800. The worstcase scenario for the total cost of the document revision project is a little over \$40,000. So do your part as a member and PLEASE VOTE!

#### Thank You to Mike Gustafson

I would like to Thank Director Gustafson for his service to our community during his two terms as a PML Director. Mike served as Board Treasurer, Board President and Chairman of the Long Range Planning Committee. Mike's term ends on August 18<sup>th</sup>, and he will be going off of the Board after the Annual Membership Meeting and Election. I hope that he remains involved through our Long Range Planning Committee as he provided wisdom and support through many challenging projects and issues. Thanks again Mike, your contributions greatly enhanced and improved our community.

#### **Roads Refurbishment Project**

The 2012 Roads Rehabilitation Project began on July 9th, and concluded at the end of last month. Road reconstruction was performed in PML units 3, 5, 8, 10, and 12. Most of the work was in lower traffic areas, with road repairs and paving work on Mueller Drive impacting traffic flow and amenity access.

Despite the articles, flyers, website postings and other communication, there were still some members that found themselves unaware and impacted by the project. The project involved road surface grinding, asphalt section repairs, road reconstruction, asphalt overlay paving, repainting of lines and legends.

Construction traffic was heavy in all the work areas, and members experienced delays on roads where the construction took place. Initially there were some issues with traffic control, but we soon remedied the situation. We apologize for any inconvenience members may have experienced during this important project. I would like to thank those members who paid attention and helped out by using detours and observing directional signs. I have found that members who stay informed have a more positive experience.

### **CONCERNED**

I am very concerned about the comments by Bruce Lay in his "President's Message" in the June, 2012 PML NEWS.

In the last paragraph he states that "your vote on the Offered Governing Document Revisions is very important. 51% of the voting power of the membership is required".

He then states that the same Offered Governing Document Revisions will have to be voted on again "UNTIL THE 51% IS ACHIEVED".

I was at the meeting at the Lake Lodge concerning these Offered Governing Document Revisions. In fact, the Lodge was nearly full with members. MANY of us stated shortcomings and flaws in the Offered Governing Document Revisions as prepared for the membership to vote on.

I have sent my objections in detail to the board through Joe Powell.

Bruce Lay comments show he has apparently NOT paid attention to any of the flaws in the Offered Governing Document Revisions and says \*\*we will keep sending out ballots until the existing Offered Governing Document Revisions are passed, even if we have to keep it up until only 100 members vote and 51 of them agree to them\*\*

**GOVERNING DOCUMENT REVISION** 

to vote "NO" on the proposed revision of our governing documents. This undertaking is a big waste of our time and money, and completely unnecessary. I did a complete review of the initial proposed changes and found them full of improper references, spelling errors, and over complication of simple issues.

Our current documents, combined with existing state laws, are more than adequate and certainly more understandable. The proposed "updating" attempts to insert sections of California Civil Code into our documents, making an already bulky document even more cumbersome and difficult to understand. It would be much simpler to add one addendum to our documents referencing the codes. This would require no vote of the membership, no revision of the documents, and would save us considerable money.

The total cost of this proposed revision could be more than \$100,000 when we include all the associated costs: legal fees, repeated printings and mailings, time spent by staff. That money could be better used to reduce our assessments or improve our amenities.

Further, these changes will do nothing to prevent future legal

challenges and litigation. The more complicated governing documents become, the more interpretations they can be given.

### **PMLA Money Matters**

Where does empathy for another person's misfortune bump into our own personal and financial well being? How much sympathy do we extend to someone whose actions (or lack of actions) cause an additional monetary burden on his or her neighbors? Can you put a price tag on the financial burden you would be willing to accept to make up for someone else's shortfall? \$10? \$50? \$75? \$100 or more?

The cold hard reality is that each property owner within PML has contributed over \$117 apiece in the past four years to make up for the failure of some of their fellow property owners to pay their fair share. That represents the \$418,000 that the Association has had to set aside since 2009 to reserve for what we call Bad Debts. This is the amount that we have to write off because some property owners don't pay their monthly assessment. And the sad news is that this number will definitely go up for at least 2-3 more years as the full impact of the economic downturn is felt.

Many of you may be shocked by this number and disappointed that the Association cannot do more to collect these assessments. After all the assessment is secured by the property right? The answer is not a simple yes or no. Yes, we do place a lien on the property of owners who are past due in their assessment payments. However, for a variety of reasons this is many times insufficient leverage to get the property owner to pay their assessment. Property owners declare bankruptcy thus preventing us from further collection efforts. A senior lender (bank or finance company) with a priority lien above the Association forecloses, thus wiping out our claim. We obtain a legal judgment against a property owner and they disappear, leaving us with no way to collect. Even when we find a delinquent property owner they may have no other assets that we can go after.

The frustration you may have with this is certainly indicative of how we here in the trenches feel each day as we pursue this quickly mounting pile of debt that is due to the Association. It seems as if each effort we make to recover these overdue amounts is met with another roadblock that continually seems to favor those individuals that cannot, or will not, meet their obligations.

The impact of this problem has a

definite ripple effect on many aspects of PML's financial situation. Rising assessment has often been blamed for one of the reasons so many property owners become delinquent. I can tell you from personal experience that a \$5-6 increase in the monthly assessment is not the difference between a property owner making it or going bankrupt. By the time they reach that point they have much bigger problems than our assessment to worry about. Mortgage payments take a much bigger bite out of someone's wallet than the Association's monthly assessment.

Had we not had this dramatic increase in our losses from non-payment of assessment it is a fact that your assessment would have been over \$29 less each year since 2009. In a time when we are being asked to cut back and be aware of the financial hardship faced by all property owners it is interesting to note that some of the assessment increase over the last handful of years is, and remains, completely out of our control.

Well that's it for this month. 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### **Canada Goose Problem**

Thank you to the property owners and their dogs who have volunteered to be deputies in our effort to chase the geese off the beaches and golf course. We are still in need of more volunteer deputies. We find we especially need volunteers between 10:00 p.m. and 6:00 a.m. Since there is no one on the beaches during this time the geese are taking full advantage of this, despite the Department of Safety's periodic patrols to chase them away. So if any of you are night owls and would like to volunteer for this time period, please let us know. Your help would be very much appreciated.

We continue to monitor the Canada Goose population. As of the end of June, we have counted upwards of 160 geese and goslings. Currently most of the geese have been spotted on the lake and the beaches. Once the geese have finished molting and the goslings are able to fly, we anticipate that this number will increase and that more geese will again be seen on the golf course. At press time, we are awaiting installation of retractable fencing at the Lake Lodge beach in an attempt to keep the geese off the beach at night. The fence will be put up in the

evening and taken down first thing in the morning. We want to see how effective this fencing will be before proceeding to install fencing for the Marina and Dunn Court beaches.

As a reminder, please DO NOT feed the geese! Not only is it against federal law to feed the geese, but it also encourages them to continue to hang out on our beaches. Thank you for your cooperation.

Pine Mountain Lake members have a new regulation Water Ski Slalom Course. With the addition of the new sinkable Water Ski Slalom Course, we have introduced a new challenge to the youth that can be seen from the Marina Beach and Jetty. You will see rows of yellow buoys that the ski boats drive between and the skiers turn around the red competition buoys or the green practice buoys. The course is a real challenge to run and skiers can make it as hard to run as they want by shortening the ski rope. Check out the many YouTube videos to see how much fun can be had.

For the fisherman please be aware that there is a cable running down the length of the course between the yellow buoys and the course anchors extend out each end of the course another one hundred and fifty feet. Please be aware when you are anchoring or trolling, there is hardware submerged in the water that support and actuate the sinkable ski slalom course. Use caution when you are above the course so damage doesn't occur when dropping an anchor and/or a line doesn't get snagged. The entrance and exit points of the course are identified by two side by side red buoys.

When calling in a reservation for a ski time, please indicate whether you intend to use the slalom course so we can properly accommodate you and other skiers for that ski time. We hope you have a chance to try out and enjoy the new addition to our lake.

### SKI SLALOM RULES AND GUIDELINES

#### RESOLUTION

The water Ski Club in conjunction with the Marina manager will recommend usage and safety guidelines to the General Manager for the daily use of the newly installed sinkable water ski slalom course. These guidelines will be made part of the Good Neighbor Rules and will be available at the Marina.

To use the water ski course boats must request use of the course when they make a water ski reservation.

All competition ski boats will be eligible to run the course. Other boats wanting to run the course are required to have a maximum width of 92 inches at the water line.

#### INITIAL GUIDELINES:

#### **SIGNUP & CHECKING-IN**

Ski Boats wanting to use the course will signup at the Marina Office and check-in with the Boat Patrol prior to entering the ski circle as per the regular PML Boating and Lake Rules.

#### USAGE

If there are any other skiers ACTIVLEY skiing in the larger ski circle the course is a one-way course with skiers starting from the Lake Lodge end. The skier should be dropped at the end of the course, picked up and brought to the starting end of the course to run the course again. If another boat is waiting to use the course they can take their pass through the course while the first boat returns at a wake-less speed.

Please be very wake sensitive while the course is in use.

Boats pulling skiers using the larger ski circle while the course is in operation are requested to stay clear of the course if a skier is running the course.

One boat at a time may use the course. If the skier falls before the fourth turn buoy, the driver should pick-up the skier and bring them back to the re-start of the course otherwise the pass is considered complete. After three falls the next boat gets a turn. If there are other boats waiting to use the course, a maximum of two passes and the next boat gets a turn. A pass is defined as traversing the course once in any direction.

Multiple passes may only be taken if there are no other boats fast boating in the ski circle.

The course waiting area is located outside the ski circle at the lake lodge end of the lake. Please stay clear of the route that the Water Taxi uses.

Boats exiting the course shall keep clear of the course and drive at a wake-less speed if there are other boats using the course.

#### **DRIVING THE COURSE**

To get used to driving the course, have your observer watch your prop wash when traveling through the sets of buoys, and tell you when the wash is in the center. Next, look for the next right-hand guide buoy. Follow it down the right edge of the boat until it disappears from sight. The point where it disappears is where you want every buoy to disappear while driving through the course.

Do not make power turns in the course. When performing power turns, the rope catches buoys and tears up the course. You also send rollers down the course. When a skier falls, throttle back, and turn around at an idle before returning to your skier and pull in the rope as soon as possible. Watch the rope as you turn so it does not hang up on the buoys. As a general rule you always want your boat up on plane or at a slow idle while in the course. Plowing creates large rollers.

#### **DRIVING AROUND THE COURSE AREA**

Always operate your boat at a very slow idle when you are around the course. This does not necessarily mean that your boat idle is slow enough. Bumping your boat in and out of gear will produce the desired wake-less effect. Never enter the course traveling in a path that is perpendicular to the length of the course. Always enter at a parallel path down the course. When approaching the course, please help minimize wakes in the course by going wake-less.

The resolution amendment was considered and adopted by the Board of Directors at a duly noticed meeting held at the Lake Lodge on Saturday, July 21, 2012.



### PINE MOUNTAIN LAKE ASSOCIATION GOLF COURSE POLICIES & PROCEDURES

### A. GOLF COURSE HOURS AND USE

- 1. The Pine Mountain Lake Golf Course is open seven (7) days per week, year round, except: i. Christmas Day
  - ii. On approximately the 3rd Monday and Tuesday in the months of April and September for greens aeration.
- 2. The golf course may be closed by the joint decision of the Head Golf Professional or Assistant Professional and the Golf Course Superintendent or Assistant Superintendent with proper notification to the General Manager. Closure is based on unsafe conditions for players and possible damage to the facility. Golf cart use restrictions may be imposed to limit damage to the facility.

3. Hours of Operation

- i. Hours of operation are established by the Board of Directors with advice from the General Manager and the Golf Professional.
- ii. Normal Hours Golf Shop Operation:
  - a. Pacific Daylight Time One hour prior to the first tee time 6:00 p.m.
  - b. Pacific Standard Time 8:00 a.m. 5:00 p.m.
- 4. Twilight begins at 2:00 p.m. all year round
- 5. Player Registration
  - i. All players are required to register in the Golf Shop at least 30-minutes prior to play and pay the appropriate fees.
- 6. Starting Play
  - i. Starting the Monday after daylight savings time begins, until the Sunday before the end of daylight savings time ends, tee times are assigned at 9-minute intervals from the first tee. The Golf Shop Starter is in control of the tee, and no players are to start without being called to the tee. Tournaments, special events, and holiday weekends may require other starting methods to maximize golf course use.
  - ii. From the Monday at the end of daylight savings time through Sunday before daylight savings time begins the play format will be an 11:00 a.m. Shotgun.
  - iii. Thanksgiving Day is a 10:00 a.m. shotgun.
  - iv. Play will start at 9:00am from the start of PDT until the first Sunday of April.
  - v. Play will start at 8:00am from the first Monday of April to the first Sunday of May.
  - vi. Play will start at 7:00am from the first Monday of May to the first Sunday of September.
  - vii. Play will start at 8:00am from the first Monday of September to the first Sunday of October.
  - viii. Play will start at 9:00am from the first Monday of October to the end of PDT.
  - ix. Earlier tee times may be prearranged with the Head Golf Professional.

### B. ETIQUETTE AND GENERAL RULES

- 1. All divots must be replaced or sanded, ball marks on the greens must be repaired, and bunkers raked after use.
- 2. Practice is allowed in designated practice areas only.
- 3. Five-somes are not permitted unless prearranged with the Head Golf Professional and/ or the Assistant Golf Professional. If the five-some cannot or will not keep pace with the group in front of them, they will be split into two groups. Opportunities for future five-somes may be denied if the group does not maintain pace of play.
- 4. Golf Course grounds are limited to playing golf only. No walkers, joggers, athletic events or unauthorized vehicles are allowed on the grounds.
- 5. Range balls are for use exclusively on the driving range tee and practice greens.
- 6. No pets are allowed on the golf course.
- 7. No swimming, fishing or wading is permitted in designated water hazards (reclaimed wastewater).
- 8. There are no refunds, rain-checks or snow-checks once a player has begun his/her round of golf.
- 9. Players causing damage to houses or other personal property are responsible for that damage.
- 10. Owners of Lots adjacent to the golf course shall permit entrance upon their Lots in order to permit retrieval of a player's golf ball.
- 11. No foul or abusive language.
- 12. Refer to Inside and Outside Tournament Play for food and beverage restrictions. Refer to Section F. 1. ix thru xi.



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#### C. DRESS CODE FOR PINE MOUNTAIN LAKE GOLF COURSE

- 1. All clothing must be neat and clean in appearance at all times. Appropriate golfing attire is required for users of the Golf Course and is defined as follows:
  - i. Blue denim or cotton sweat pants are not permitted on the golf course.
  - ii. Men:
    - a. Tops: Collared shirts are required. Mock turtlenecks, both short and long sleeved are acceptable. No T-shirts, tank tops or muscle shirts will be allowed.
    - b. Pants & Shorts: Shorts must be no shorter than mid-thigh in length. No cut-offs or swimsuits.
  - iii. Women:
    - a. Tops: T-shirts are permitted as well as sleeveless tops with a minimum 4" shoulder strap. No tank tops or half shirts. b. Pants & Shorts: Shorts must not be shorter than mid-thigh in length. No cut-offs or swimsuits.
  - iv. Shirts and non-metal spiked shoes are necessary at all times on the golf course and practice areas.
  - v. T-shirts and blue denim are permitted on the practice areas at PMLGC. Practice areas are defined as the driving range, the chipping green and the putting green.

#### D. PACE OF PLAY AND MARSHALLING

- 1. Players will be required to maintain the pace of play. (Maximum round should be 4 \_ hours for 18 holes and 2 \_ hours for 9 holes e.g. 15 minutes per hole.)
- 2. Players falling more than one hole or 15 minutes behind will be given their first warning and asked to either increase their pace of play or allow the faster groups to play through.
- 3. After a second warning for slow play, the Marshall will request that the group either move aside, allowing faster players through, or "skip" the next hole to get back to their proper position on the golf course.
- 4. Flagrant violations of Golf Course Policy or continued slow play will result in removal from the Golf Course and possible restriction of playing privileges.
- 5. The Golf Course will be marshaled when play and conditions warrant it.
- 6. "Ready Golf" should be employed when it is safe and appropriate. See appendix A for definition of ready golf.

#### E. GOLF CART RULES

- 1. Players using golf carts will be held financially responsible for any damage to the cart.
- 2. Property Owners are assuming responsibility for the golf cart upon checking in and must return it in the same condition as issued.
- 3. All non-property owners renting carts must sign the cart rental agreement.
- 4. Rental and use of a PML Golf Cart is at the Renter's risk. The Renter will hold Pine Mountain Lake Association and its employees harmless for any and all injuries or damage to any person(s) or property arising from the use of the golf cart. The Renter will use care and precaution necessary to prevent injury to the renter, to others, or damage to the cart or other PML property. No one under age 18 may rent a cart. Age 16 or older may drive a cart, with a valid driver's license.
- 5. The Renter of the cart must be one of the riders in the cart.
- 6. Cart capacity is limited to two persons and two sets of clubs. Only paid riders and their clubs may use the golf cart. The Renter will not allow walking golfers to ride in the cart or on the back of the cart, or place clubs on the cart.
- 7. Golf cart use is mandatory for guests and public play on weekends until twilight time. Golf cart use is mandatory for all play on all holiday weekends.
- 8. Golf carts must remain on the cart paths around all tees and greens.
- 9. Weather permitting; golf carts may be driven across the fairways at 90 degrees. (Drive your cart on the paths and in the rough, crossing 90 degrees to the ball).
- 10. Golf carts may not be driven past the cart signs on the fairways (unless occupant has a blue flag).
- 11. Players using carts must observe posted "no cart areas".
- 12. Carts must not be driven outside the boundaries of the course.
- 13. "Blue Flag" Policy
  - i. Members and Guests must present the Head Golf Professional yearly with a letter from a physician stating the reason for special use of the golf cart or provided a Medical Card to be copied and kept on file.
  - ii. When carts are allowed off of the cart paths "Blue Flag" holders may drive carts beyond signs that direct carts off the fairway. "Blue Flag" holders should observe posted "No Cart Area" signs and should stay 30-feet from all tees, greens, and bunkers.
  - iii. Blue Flag holders shall not take the cart out on fairways that have been restricted to "cart paths only".
- 14. Personal (1 bag) carts must be kept 20 feet from all tees, greens, and bunkers

#### F. GOLF COURSE USE PRIVILEGES AND APPLICABLE RATES

- 1. Regular Play
  - i. Property Owners
    - a. All Association Members in good standing may use the golf course at Property Owner rates.

- b. Children that are 17-years of age and younger, and live at home are considered Association Members and pay property owner fees.
- c. Holidays are defined as New Years Day, Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day and the day after Thanksgiving. If a holiday falls on a weekday it is both a holiday and weekday for golf annual purchasers.

ii. Guests

a. Guests of Association Members may use the golf course. To receive guests' rates Association members must play with their guests or they must contact the Pro Shop and provide their Unit, Lot number and phone number.

iii. Public

- a. The Public may use the golf course at public rates.
- iv. Replay Policy
  - a. Players may be allowed to replay the Golf Course when space is available with approval of the Golf Professional. A reduced green fee and regular cart fees will be charged.
- v. Professional Courtesy Play
  - a. PGA and LPGA Members, Golf Course Superintendents, General Managers and Directors from other clubs may use the golf course. These players must be approved by the Head Golf Professional or the General Manager.
  - b. Green fees are waived, and Guest cart fees are charged unless waived by the General Manager and/or the Head Golf Professional.
- vi. Employee Play
  - a. If times are available prior to twilight on the day the employee wishes to play the Golf Shop may accommodate their request.
  - b. Loss of playing privileges shall result if an employee violates any Golf Course Policies and Procedures.
  - c. A Department Manager may choose to set up a golf outing for his/her staff. This may be done through the Golf Professional.
  - d. Employees must wear proper golf attire. Work uniforms are not acceptable.
  - e. Tee times may not be made more than 5 days in advance.
  - f. Employees and their families' use privileges are governed by the PMLA Employee Manual.
- vii. Special Business Guests
  - a. Special Business Guests may play when authorized by the General Manager and/or the Head Golf Professional.
  - b. Fees may be waived at the discretion of the General Manager and/or the Head Golf Professional.
- viii. PML Organized Groups
  - a. Pine Mountain Lake Men's Club may use the golf course for special events that are approved by the Head Golf Professional.
  - b. The Pine Mountain Lake 18-Hole Ladies Club may use the golf course for special events that are approved by the Head Golf Professional.
  - c. The Pine Mountain Lake 9-Hole Men's Club may use the golf course for special events that are approved by the Head Golf Professional.
  - d. The Pine Mountain Lake 9-Hole Ladies Club may use the golf course for special events that are approved by the Head Golf Professional.
- ix. Invitationals and waived green fee tournaments and practice rounds.
  - a. Property Owner cart fees are charged for all participants in the Mother Lode and Pine Tree Invitational with the approval of the Board of Directors.
  - b. Property owner fees are charged for non-property owner players on Women's Golf Association of Northern California (WGANC) open days, team play days and senior events with the approval of the Board of Directors.
  - c. All Food & Beverage for waived green fee tournaments must be purchased from The Grill and/or Snack Bar
- x. Inside Tournament Play
  - a. A limited number of inside tournaments are allowed each year. Tournament fees will be charged. Tournament fees are negotiable by the Head Golf Professional with approval from the General Manager.
  - b. All Food & Beverage for property owner and/or club tournaments that is consumed at the Golf Course must be purchased from The Grill and/or Snack Bar
  - c. No outside coolers will be permitted on the course without the approval of the General Manager and/or Head Golf Professional at least 14-days prior to the event.
- xi. Outside Tournament Play
  - a. A limited number of outside tournaments are allowed each year. Tournament fees will be charged. Tournament fees are negotiable by the Head Golf Professional with approval from the General Manager.
  - b. Tioga High School's Golf tournament schedule must be approved by the General Manager. Waiver of green fees for Tioga High School golf tournaments must be approved by the Board of Directors.
  - c. All Food & Beverage for outside tournaments that is consumed at the Golf Course must be purchased from The Grill and/or Snack Bar.
  - d. No outside coolers will be permitted on the course without the approval of the General Manager and/or Head Golf Professional at least 14-days prior to the event.

#### G. TEE TIME RESERVATIONS

- 1. Association Members:
  - i. During the Tee Time season Association Members may make tee times up to 14 days in advance by telephone only at the designated call in time.
  - ii. During the Shot Gun Season Members may make tee times up to 14 days in advance by telephone only starting at 8 a.m.
  - iii. Tee time reservations for Holiday Weekends are taken for all days of the weekend 14 days in advance of the first day of the holiday weekend.
    - a. Holiday weekends are defined as New Years Day, Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, and Thanksgiving Day.
- 2. Guests and Public:
  - i. During the Tee Time and Shotgun season guests and public may make tee times up to 10-days in advance.
  - ii. Tee time reservations for Holiday Weekends are taken for all days of the weekend 10 days in advance of the first day of the holiday weekend.
    - a. Holiday weekends are defined as New Years Day, Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, and Thanksgiving Day.
  - iii. Guests of Association Members may have the Member make the tee time reservation for them. (All guidelines in Section F., 1., i. & ii. apply).
- 3. No Show/Cancellation Policy
  - i. All reservations should be cancelled at least 24-hours prior to your start time
  - ii. All property owners (including annual members) will be charged the appropriate daily fee if they fail to cancel their reservation 24-hours prior.
  - iii. Under special circumstances (weather conditions, illness, etc.) the Head Golf Professional or the Assistant Professional may waive fees.
- 4. Professional Courtesy Play:
  - i. Members of the PGA, LPGA and the Superintendent's Association must contact the Head Golf Professional or Superintendent to block a starting time.
  - ii. General Managers and Directors from other private clubs must call the General Manager and/or the Head Golf Professional to block a starting time.
- 5. Special Association Business Guests:
  - i. The General Manager or Administrative Assistant may obtain starting times for special guests. Times are given on a space available basis.
- 6. PML Organized Groups
  - i. All recognized groups must submit their tournament schedule prior to the end of the year for approval by the Head Golf Professional.
- 7. Inside Tournaments
  - i. Inside Tournaments are any group (outside of the normal PML Organized Group Tournament Schedule) that is being booked, hosted, or organized by a Property Owner or a PML Organized Group Member.
  - ii. Inside tournament groups consist of 13 or more players
  - iii. All inside groups will be contracted with deadlines, due dates, and deposits clearly defined.
  - iv. All inside groups are to be approved by the Head Golf Professional.
  - v. Inside tournaments may schedule events after PML Organized Group schedules have been approved by the Head Golf Professional.
  - vi. Golf carts are mandatory for all inside tournaments.
- 8. Outside Tournaments
  - i. Outside tournament groups consist of 13 or more players
  - ii. All outside groups will be contracted with deadlines, due dates, and deposits clearly defined.
  - iii. All outside groups are to be approved by the Head Golf Professional.
  - iv. Outside tournaments may schedule events after PML Organized Group schedules have been approved by the Head Golf Professional.
  - v. Outside tournament groups are required to have their food and beverage service provided by either The Grill or the Snack.
  - vi. Golf carts are mandatory for all outside tournaments.
- 9. Men's and Ladies' Day (During the Tee Time Months)
  - i. PML Men's Golf Club
    - a. Wednesdays from the start of play until 11:00 a.m.
  - ii. PML Ladies Golf Club
    - a. Thursdays are Ladies' Days
    - a. 9:00 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. (when first time is at 9:00 a.m.)

- b. 8:00 a.m. to 10:30 p.m. (when the first tee time is 8:00 a.m. or earlier)
- iii. 9-Hole Men
  - a. Wednesday are reserved for 9-Hole Men
  - b. March June will start Wednesday at 12:00 Noon with tee times
  - c. July August will start Wednesday at 7:30 a.m. in a shotgun
- iv. 9-Hole Ladies
  - a. Thursdays are also reserved for the 9-Hole Ladies Club. The 9-Hole Ladies Club uses the back nine holes.
  - b. The last Thursday of each month the 9-Hole ladies will use the front nine.
- v. Unused or unfilled times may be filled with property owners, guests and or public play.
- vi. The nines may be reversed whenever Golf Course Operations require it.

#### H. RULES AND POLICY VIOLATIONS

- 1. Violations of Golf Course policies and procedures may result in removal from the Golf Course and possible loss of playing privileges.
- 2. Further action may be taken in accordance with Pine Mountain Lake Association's current Enforcement Procedures Policy. This document is available at the Pine Mountain Lake Association Office.

#### I. CLUB STORAGE AND LOCKER FACILITIES

- 1. The club storage facility is used for storing clubs and articles likely to be in golf bags only (no valuables).
- 2. Property Owners using the club storage facility may store one golf bag and its contents (no loose items may be stored unless they are properly stowed in the golf bag)
- 3. Apparel locker facilities are not intended for golf club storage.

Appendix A

#### **READY GOLF GUIDELINES**

- 1. BE AWARE-Watch yours and your playing partner's tee shots. When you see where the ball has come to rest pick a landmark (tree, bush, cart sign, etc.) to help you remember the area where the shot came to rest.
- 2. BE PREPARED-On the way to the shot, start thinking about how far the ball is from the green or your next target and which club or clubs you will be most likely to use. Take 2 or 3 clubs with you to the ball.
- 3. BE ON THE BALL-If you are playing with another golfer or a whole four-some, once someone is at their ball, walk or ride over to yours so that by the time they hit their shot you are ready to hit yours. This will also give you more time to decide and commit to a shot and club selection. Once they hit, you're ready. In cart play, after you hit a shot get into the cart and drive to the second player's ball. At the second player's ball replace the head cover and put the club in your bag.
- 4. PUTT OUT-Once you're on the green a good rule to follow is continuous putting. Unless, of course, your stance would be interfering with someone else's line.
- 5. KEEP MOVING-Once your group has finished putting out, move immediately to the next tee box. Write your scores down on the next tee NOT while you are parked by the green.
- 6. KEEP POSITION-KEEP UP WITH THE GROUP IN FRONT OF YOU. This is how you know if you are out of position on the golf course. Remember; your position on the golf course is dictated ONLY by the group in front of you NOT the group behind you.

I wonder how the County spends that additional tax revenue. If you add on the beaches, boating, swimming etc, the value (economic benefit) would climb a lot higher. However, as we all know, it isn't the dollar value of the lake that attracts us to the water. If you've ever seen the ear-to-ear grin on a child when they reel in a wriggling fish... that's REAL value.

Speaking of beaches, I get a lot of questions about the quality of water at the swim beaches, mostly because people are concerned about the goose doodle. This is a tough one to answer because it's one of those "do you want the good news first?" The good news is, from May through October, the water is tested to see how much bacteria is present. The results for all 3 beaches are about 10 times lower than the requirement for beaches. The bad news is, geese leave most of their doodle on the beaches. If it weren't for the relentless effort of the "scoopers," there would be... not pretty.

And speaking of geese, what's up with these creatures? A few weeks ago, I counted over 200 of them strolling on the beach. They weren't the least bit interested in flying away when I approached them. And there's a reason for that. Not only are they unafraid of humans, they can't fly. For a few weeks every summer, geese molt... that is, they lose some of their flight feathers before growing new ones. By the time you read this, the geese will probably be flying again, spending a lot of time on the golf course and sharing their doodle with the duffers. Let me say one last thing about the geese, if you're concerned, get involved with the Waterfowl Management Committee. Among other

things, the Committee is trying to recruit volunteers willing to walk their dogs through high goose use areas. If you're interested in participating, or have a goose control success story to share, contact the Committee at: *pmlawmc@pinemountainlake.com*.

Why does the lake level get lower throughout the year? If your guess is evaporation, you get partial credit. Using my fuzzy math calculator again, evaporation only accounts for about half of the decrease in water level. An equal amount is used for irrigating the golf course. The lake doesn't provide all of the irrigation water used on the golf course, it is blended with treated water from GCSD.

So, why do we release water in the fall? For one, it's a legal requirement. The Division of Safety of Dams (DSOD) requires us to operate the valves that release water from the lake. It's always an anxious time when we do this. If one of the gates were to malfunction, the lake could go way down. To help prevent this from happening, the gates are pre-inspected by an underwater dive team. The hydraulics that operate the valves are also tested regularly and key components are periodically replaced.

After the gates are tested, we sometimes leave one of the valves open for a few days to release some of the water from the bottom of the lake. This is an accepted practice in lake management that helps prevent algae blooms and increases water clarity by releasing nutrient laden water that builds up during the summer. This is also an anxiety producer. You'll be happy to know that we use more than fuzzy math to determine how much water to release. We have years and years of rainfall data, inflow volume, and climatology to help insure that the lake will completely fill when the rains come.

No anxiety today! It's a beautiful warm day and at some point, I will find time for a dip in the lake. Enjoy Your Lake

A Standing Ovation is our response to your fire safety efforts in 2012. We went out on a limb this year by not performing pre-inspections. We said "you are on your own." You took the ball and scored a touchdown. We are so proud of your efforts. Let me share some of the numbers.

Last year we sent 2650 Courtesy Notice Inspection letters. This year, Zero. Last year we sent 377 Notice of Non-Compliance letters. This year, 140. Last year we sent 58 Final Notice letters. This year, 50. Last year we spent about \$15,000 on payroll and postage. This year, Zero, Ziltch, Nada.

And the word is getting around. We have been asked to make a presentation about our fire safety program success to the SouthWest InterFaceTeam, a group of wildfire professionals dedicated to reducing and fighting wildfire in Mariposa and Tuolumne Counties.

Again, you have a lot to be proud of. Your efforts have made PMLA a poster child for the prevention of the ravaging effects of wildfire. Well done!

I also want to give recognition to the vendors who do this kind of work in

PML. Their communication and support go a long way towards achieving our common goal. Our records indicate that about 25% of you have your lot cleaned by one of these vendors. They are indeed an important asset in our quest to be ready and be safe from the threat of wildfire.

Also, kudos goes to the PMLA Fire Abatement Team Leader, Ken Codeglia. The Fire Abatement Team is a group of volunteer Owners who do a lot of behind the scene work developing strategies for improved communication and performance of our fire safety program. Ken also spearheaded, wrote, and produced the "Be Ready, Be Safe" fire safety video that so many of you have watched. The 23 minute video is still on our website at www.pinemountainlake. com as a training tool for cleaning your Lot and still a requirement to receive a PML burn permit.

The Fire Safety Team wants to thank you again for a very successful fire safety cleanup season. Take a drive sometime to view all the success stories and the show of pride in how we maintain our Lots for a common cause well worth the effort.

### **Chatom Vineyards** She Wines - Made by Women, for Women

to Napa each winery charged me \$10 to \$15 for tasting. So for a few bucks more you can get dinner at the Grill too. And we don't stop there if you really like the wine you can purchase the wines that night for a discounted price. This month's wine tasting features a local foothill winery, Chatom Vineyards.

In 1980, a city girl with a background in technology and marketing moved to a remote ranch in the Calaveras County countryside with a vision to start a vineyard. That young woman, Gay Callan, must have looked crazy to a majority of local ranchers but with hard work and determination--and an excellent choice of land--she made her story a success.

There were some integral men on the scene early on (including Vineyard Manager David Bassham who has been with Chatom for 30

years), but Chatom quickly became known as a winery started and owned by a woman, and run by women. In 2002 another woman arrived on the scene-a winemaker! The addition of Mari Wells as winemaker sealed the deal for Chatom being known as the "female winery." It was just a matter of time before Mari came up with the concept of creating a red wine blend made "by women, for women." The concept for "She Wines" was born and the first release was in July of 2004.

A few years after the first release, with the She Wines going strong, Gay made the decision to "give back" to the community by donating partial proceeds from the She Wines to local women's health related charities. A portion of proceeds from She Red went towards Heart Disease concerns and a portion from the She White went towards Breast Cancer charities.

Today, Chatom is known more for their consistently excellent wines than their employees' gender (their incredibly talented winemaker, Mark Künz, does happen to be male). The She Wines label has been temporarily retired, but the spirit with which it was

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### What's Cooking With Chef Carrie

Cooking in the summer can be one of the most enjoyable activities in the summer. The produce is at the peak of quality and flavor. Tomatoes, beans, corn, zucchini are all abundant in my garden. Did you know that the 8th of August is 'Sneak zucchini on to your neighbor's porch day"? The real downside of summer cooking is turning on the oven. Here is a recipe that you don't have to heat your kitchen up and is sure to be a hit with your guests. It has always been a crowd pleaser when I have served it.

#### **FRESH TOMATO SAUCE**

Serves 3-4

*The key to this dish is the best tomatoes you can buy or grow* 

#### Ingredients

1 small garlic clove

- 3 lb tomatoes
- 2 tablespoons fresh lemon juice
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon sugar (optional)
- 1/2 teaspoon black pepper
- 1/2 cup extra virgin olive oil
- 1 lb dried capellini (angel-hair pasta)
- 1/2 cup chopped fresh basil
- 1T fresh thyme
- 1t fresh rosemary
- 1T fresh Italian parsley

#### Directions

Remove the stem end of the tomatoes and discard. Chop the tomatoes coarsely and place them in a glass or stainless steel bowl. Crush the garlic cloves by placing them, one at a time, on your work surface and placing the side of your knife blade on it. Use your fist to firmly press the blade down, crushing the garlic in the process. After smashing the garlic, chop it finely and add it to the tomatoes. Remove the basil leaves from their stems, chop them coarsely, and toss with the tomatoes and garlic. Add the olive oil and toss again. Let the mixture rest in a cool spot, but not the refrigerator, for about 2 hours. Cook the pasta and drain it. Season the tomato sauce with salt and black pepper and add the pasta to the sauce. Toss the mixture and serve immediately. Round out this great pasta with a Caesar salad, crusty loaf of bread and beautiful glass of Syrah.

### The Dog Days of Summer

Just what are the dog days of summer? I got to thinking about this and decided to do some research. According to Wikipedia:

"Dog Days" (Latin: diēs caniculārēs) are the bottest, most sultry days of summer. In the Northern Hemisphere, the dog days of summer are most commonly experienced in the months of July and August, which typically observe the warmest summer temperatures. In the Southern Hemisphere, they typically occur in January and February, in the midst of the austral summer. The name comes from the ancient belief that Sirius, also called the Dog Star, in close proximity to the sun was responsible for the hot weather.

The Romans referred to the dog days as dies caniculares and associated the hot weather with the star Sirius. They considered Sirius to be the "Dog Star" because it is the brightest star in the constellation Canis Major (Large Dog). Sirius is also the brightest star in the night sky. The term "Dog Days" was used earlier by the Greeks. The Dog Days originally were the days when Sirius rose just before or at the same time as sunrise (heliacal rising), which is no longer true, owing to precession of the equinoxes. The Romans sacrificed a brown dog at the beginning of the Dog Days to appease the rage of Sirius, believing that the star was the cause of the hot, sultry weather.

Dog Days were popularly believed to be an evil time "the Sea boiled, the Wine turned sour, Dogs grew mad, and all other creatures became languid; causing to man, among other diseases, burning fevers, hysterics, and phrensies." according to Brady's Clavis Calendaria, 1813.

The modern French term for both this summer period (and for heat waves in general) "canicule", derives from this same term. It means "little dog", again referring to Sirius.

In Ancient Rome, the Dog Days extended from July 24 through August 24, or, alternatively, July 23 through August 23. In many European cultures (German, French, Italian) this period is still said to be the time of the Dog Days.

The Old Farmer's Almanac lists the traditional timing of the Dog Days as the 40 days beginning July 3 and ending August 11, coinciding with the ancient heliacal (at sunrise) rising of the Dog Star, Sirius. These are the days of the year when rainfall is at its lowest levels.

For the ancient Egyptians, Sirius appeared just before the season of the Nile's flooding, so they used the star as a "watchdog" for that event. Since its rising also coincided with a time of extreme heat, the connection with hot, sultry weather was made for all time: "Dog Days bright and clear indicate a happy year. But when accompanied by rain, for better times our hopes are vain."

In recent years, the phrase "Dog Days" or "Dog Days of Summer" have also found new meanings. The term has frequently been used in reference to the American stock market(s). Typically, summer is a very slow time for the stock market, and additionally, poorly performing stocks with little future potential are frequently known as "dogs."

A casual survey will usually find that many people believe the phrase is in reference to the conspicuous laziness of domesticated dogs (who are in danger of overheating with too much exercise) during the hottest days of the summer. When speaking of "Dog Days" there seems to be a connotation of lying or "dogging" around, or being "dog tired" on these hot and humid days. A similar myth asserts that the time is so-named because rabid dogs are supposed to be the most common then. Although these meanings have nothing to do with the original source of the phrase, they may have been attached to the phrase in recent years due to common usage or misunderstanding of the origin of the phrase.

Wow, how's that for a history lesson. I hope that you all are enjoying our dog days of summer and should you need to cool down come into The 19th Hole Lounge and enjoy an ice cold adult beverage.

### **Shades of Green**

August! What`s on tap for the rest of the summer for golf maintenance? Our main goal is to keep our cool season grasses alive through the heat of summer, giving you the best product we can, day in and day out. There are days that we will give the greens a break and not mow or roll because it is better for them. The same holds true about hole locations, there will be days that they might be in the same location if you happen to play two days in a row. Another challenge of summer is to keep the course dry enough for you to enjoy, yet keep the turf alive during the heat. When you have all the trees we have, it can create two different moisture needs in one small area, one being the shade of the tree or further out away from the drip line of the tree.

As I write this it is early July and we have not completed our summer time aeration. [July 16, 17] We would like to pull cores but the heat will limit how aggressive we can be. The reason we need to do these things is to reduce the thatch and allow the greens to breathe, along with some sand to improve putting quality. These greens are forty two years old and need a little extra attention each year. Just to put greens care in perspective, the greens at the Olympic club were great for the U.S. Open this year. Leading up to the event they closed the lake course and rebuilt the greens and the course was closed for seven months. Although our summer greens projects might be a little nuisance while you are

playing, they will make them better for years to come.

I often hear from our membership that the greens speed is different today than yesterday or the last time they played. There are many different factors that make this happen. Where they mowed and rolled or just mowed or just rolled? Is it hot, do they require more irrigation to get through those ten days in a row of temperatures above ninety? Was there a fertilizer application or a fungicide application that was required and additional water was required, or did we just deep water and then let them dry out for a day or two? Did we have employees on vacation or one or two that called in sick or had a family emergency that could not make it to work today, that affected our daily set up? These are examples of our day to day operations that make conditions a little different each day.

Some of our other projects of mid to late summer that we will work on that are not as noticeable to the player, but are needed to provide better irrigation coverage is the leveling of sprinkler heads and nozzle checks. For the most part our irrigation system has performed brilliantly, but does need to be repaired or upgraded occasionally.

Uncle Milt has said he might pursue some sort of action if I continue to discuss that extremely sensitive topic of age. So, for August I would like to apologize to Half Dome for comparing it's age to the gentleman on #16.

- Raking bunkers. For some of us getting out of a bunker can be difficult. If you have ever found your ball in someone else's footprint in a bunker you know how hard that shot is. The best way to rake a sand trap is to push the sand away from you and then rake it back towards you as to back your way out of the trap. Try it the next time you find yourself bunkered.
- Driving 90 degrees on the fairways. The longer a golf cart stays on the grass the more damage it can do to the ground. So the best route to your ball may not be the shortest, most direct way but it will keep the grass healthy, strong and green longer.

### Home On the Archery Range

The Archery Range is receiving greater interest this season. The Maintenance Department has performed the seasonal work at the Archery Range. Many members are using the range for archery for bow practice and for sport. We are alternating the targets to compliment persons who are new to archery. The larger multi-colored targets are for target arrows being shot by bows of less than 40 pounds of pull. The smaller cube targets are useful for

archers using compound bows, which have a much greater pull and arrow velocity.

You can access the range by driving into the Compost Pile entrance, checking in with the attendant, and by following the signs to the range (PML Members or members with their guests only please!). The roads are graveled dirt access roads and are drivable. Please keep the vehicle driving speed to 15 mph or less, and watch for other vehicles or hikers. Best if you drive a truck or vehicle which can be driven on rough graveled dirt roads.

The Archery Range is located on the northern boundary of PMLA property in Unit 16, which is the property north of the Campground. The range is open Wednesday through Sunday from 10AM until 4PM. Understand that the range may be closed because of severe weather or in seasons of severe fire danger. Visitors to the range must be out of the area by 4PM, and return the same way as entering, always checked in and out by the Compost Pile attendee. If you are not out of the area by 4PM, a Safety Department Patrol Officer will be dispatched to locate you



and ensure the area is vacated and all persons are in safe condition.

The Archery Range has a vehicle parking area, picnic table, bow rests, yardage markers, hay bale target backstops, targets, and an earthen backstop. PMLA does not supply bows, arrows, water, a restroom facility, or instruction. Restroom facilities are available at the Campground.

The range is a PMLA recreational amenity, and is open for use by all PML members and their guests. You will be asked for your Unit and Lot numbers when checking in with the Compost attendee. Your vehicles license number and arrival time, will also be recorded.

There are rules of use posted at the Archery Range. The range is for archers using bows and arrows only. Only arrows with field points are to be used at the range. Most important, there are NO fees required to use the range.

Whether a beginner, or an accomplished archer, members should feel free to visit the range, and if nothing more, enjoy the views from the Unit 16 ridge, and have fun!

Oh, two more rules of use – NO Hunting – NO Smoking.

# Friends of the Groveland Fire Dept SAVE OUR SERVICES

The Groveland Fire Department budget is approximately \$300,000 short for fiscal year 2012-2013, as of July 1, 2012. This is because Measure D, which was on the June 5 ballot, did not pass.

Measure D would have implemented a special parcel tax for ten years to help fund the Groveland Fire Department which provides service to the communities of Groveland, Big Oak Flat and Pine Mountain Lake. This tax would have replaced an expiring special assessment. Measure D would have added approximately \$23 per year to the fire tax that was already in place making a total of \$107 for the year.

One argument against Measure D: We, the people, are hurting in this economy and have to tighten our belts SO our governmental entities should do the same. Unfortunately, the Groveland Fire Department cannot tighten their belt by \$300,000.

A special committee, made up of GCSD Directors and members of the public, was created to scrutinize the fire department budget to see just how much tightening could be done. The Directors are working on finalizing a budget partially based on the two budget ideas presented by this committee. The Directors may also be looking at disbanding our current fire department and contracting out the fire/medical services to Cal Fire.

Friends of the Groveland Fire Department do not want to lose our existing fire department.

In order to make the current budget work and keep our existing fire department, our community

needs to donate a minimum of \$30,000 for the year. Our target is \$100,000 to avoid cuts in equipment and facilities maintenance and to begin to catch up on long term maintenance.

Please help us **SAVE OUR SERVICES** by donating \$107 to the Fire Department. (IRS Publication 526 states money or property you give to "federal, state, and local governments, if your contribution is solely for public purposes" are "deductible as charitable contributions". *http://www. irs.gov/pub/irs-pdf/p526.pdf* )

The donations are a bridge to maintain our Fire Department services until we have a long term solution.

Please share this information with other property owners you may know. This is an opportunity for those who could not vote on Measure D, because they were not registered to vote here, to vote with their donations.

# Causes Of Anger - Part 2

Last month's article answered the question, What is anger? You learned about the nature of anger and some of the problems that can result from it. Now let's look at the causes of anger which may be helpful in dealing with the negative and sometimes painful reactions to anger and prevent them from happening.

Your expectations about the way things should be or ought to be can lead to anger. When expectations of yourself or others are set too high or are unrealistic, you set yourself up for anger experiences. There is nothing wrong with having high standards as long as they are realistic and flexible, which means that you must adjust the expectations according to the situation.

First, difficult external events or circumstances can provoke emotional reactions like frustration, such as being blocked from doing what we want to do. We become annoyed when someone's car alarm goes off in the middle of the night or we get irritated when we are unable to find our car keys. If someone is abusing us verbally or physically our anger button is pushed. There have been situations when we have not been treated fairly or haven't received what we think we deserved. We also can get angry at injustice or mistreatment when it is happening to someone else. These are all pretty common, though simplified causes of anger.

However, anger is not caused only by the external events, but how we think of these happenings. Some situations can mean different things to different people. How you think about situations and events determines how you experience them and whether or not you become angry. In other words, what goes on in your head decides how you feel. How you appraise or interpret the situation or what happens determines whether or not you will get angry. An important way that thinking influences how we feel is through the things we say to ourselves. Self-talk will express how we really feel. This oftentimes adds fuel to the fire and our anger is unleashed and out of control. "Why doesn't she just get off my back, I'd like to shut her up," can lead to serious inappropriate physical behavior.

Bodily states of arousal and activation have a part in anger. The saying, "His blood is boiling!" is an apt description of the increase in blood pressure. The heart beats faster, muscles become tense, breathing is more rapid, blood sugar increases and a variety of other biochemical changes take place in the body. When you are under pressure or stress, then you can become angry more quickly. When we are strung-out, we are more easily provoked. Tension and agitation are the companions of anger. When our tension level is high, it takes something less serious to set us off. We respond to simple annoyances as if they were major catastrophes. Work pressures, noise, driving in traffic, drinking excessive amounts of coffee and smoking are some of the causes which affect our sense of perspective of the total aspects of our lives. Being tense colors our entire disposition towards life, work and people. When we take life too seriously we lose our sense of humor. We need to roll with the punches rather than stand rigidly with clenched fists and learn to tell the difference between less serious from the more serious. Your health, your relationships, your future and your overall outlook on life is at stake.

The next issue will deal with how to manage anger and look toward a calm and positive future. Believe that it is a possibility for you.

remaining active and preventing falls. Unfortunately it is yet another thing that becomes a challenge as we age. Loss of balance is the primary factor in falls, fear of falling, changes in walking habits, and limiting activity.

Good balance is dependent on sensory input from the eyes, inner ear function, posture, strength, and our ability to sense the position and movement in our feet, legs and arms. That may sound like a lot of things to work on at once, but the way our mind and body is wired there are some simple ways to maintain good balance through our lifetime.

One is to remain active! Whenever you move your motor and sensory systems integrate to work together. The more you challenge these systems the better they get.

In therapy we have adopted the use of Wii-Fit Nintendo system to improve balance. The Wii system has been subjected to studies to evaluate it's

effectiveness in stroke rehabilitation, balance and coordination training and passed with flying colors.

The Wii games we use for balance training are, Deep Breathing, Tilt Board, Single leg Stance, Bubble River Float. Watching the TV screen allows our eyes to be our biofeedback to our brain, sending messages to our core muscles, inner ear, and our leg muscles and joints. The main hurdle we have in maintaining any fitness program is motivation. The Wii adds the "fun" component that keeps people coming back for more.

Don't wait for a fall to start working on your balance.

If you have concerns about starting to work on your balance on your own ask your doctor about coming in to see a physical therapist to be evaluated and to set up a program that fits your needs. You'll also get a chance to experience the Wii-Fit balance program and have fun while you get your life back in balance.

When Glen Denny moved to Yosemite in 1958 to learn to climb, the first ascent of El Capitan was underway. Inspired by this historic event, he was soon climbing the most challenging routes in Yosemite Valley, including some of the early ascents of El Capitan, with many of the big-wall pioneers of the late fifties and early sixties. Originally self-taught, Glen began photographing Yosemite climbs and climbers in the early sixties before studying photography and filmmaking at San Francisco State University, where he earned a Masters of Fine Arts degree.

Mr. Denny's slide lecture is based on his book, Yosemite in the Sixties, published by Patagonia in 2007. It consists of approximately 130 black and white digital slides showing major climbs of the sixties with important characters of the period including Royal Robins, Warren Harding, Chuck Pratt, Yvon Chouinard and Tom Pratt. During the show, Denny discusses the images, gives and insider's view of this important era through stories and anecdotes, and invites questions from the audience.

# From Your Tuolumne County District Supervisor

June has been a busy month for Tuolumne County. Lots of visitors enjoying what our county has to offer and what we can enjoy every day! If you love the outof-doors, there is no limit on the type of activities that can be found here.

Speaking of limits, I recently had the opportunity to enjoy a bit of recreation myself. With my 82 year old fishing partner, Aunt Mary, we fished on Melones with Fishing Guide Gary Burns for kokanee. (in my estimation the best tasting fresh water fish available). We started fishing at 7 AM and had three limits in the boat by 10:30 AM. We even tossed a few back into the water and, of course, lost a few as well. We also took a ride over to "the east side" and fished one of my best kept secret spots on the Walker River and limited out in just a few hours. All nice fish, the largest about 17 inches.

So why the "fish story"? For the past year or so my focus has been on trying to solve problems that are complicated and, in some cases may be unsolvable. When I'm fishing I just focus on the fish. When doing that, I'm usually successful in filling up the ice chest. One fish at a time. This may be a better approach to problem solving.

Trying to fix everything at once is like having too many lines in the water at the same time. We just end up with a tangled mess.

I think that is some respects it's easy for public officials to be overwhelmed by the sheer complexity of Government. We lose our focus on how the process works and what we can actually do to solve the problems brought to us. There is also the misunderstanding or the lack of knowledge on the part of the public as to what your officials can or cannot accomplish.

In nearly every article that I have written, I ask for your input. I do this because I truly want to know what you think and what issues you would like to me to work on. Not a day goes by that I don't receive some sort of inquiry or question that needs to be addressed. The amount of time we have is limited so like everyone I try to prioritize those inquiries.

In the past few weeks, I have received a number of calls and e-mails concerning an upstart business in Groveland. A business that provides jobs and services to the community is a benefit. The Groveland business certainly fits "the mold". And, yes, I am pro business and believe that the more successful business becomes, the sooner we will have a real chance at economic recovery.

I have been publicly and privately accused of "not caring" or not trying to help the business owner. This is far from the truth.

This business opened up without obtaining proper permits that are required of any start-up business in the county. When I was made aware of the problem in May, I asked staff to work to seek a successful resolution to the various code compliance violations. It was due to my intervention on behalf of this business owner that they were able to stay open for a longer period of time.

Code compliance issues are taken very seriously by the Board of Supervisors and by County Staff. A County Supervisor, however, can never direct County Staff to turn their backs on violations of the County Ordinances and State Laws which would put the citizens of the county and our visitors at risk. Each member of the Board of Supervisors takes an Oath of Office to uphold the laws of the State and County. I will never turn my back on someone seeking help, but it is my duty to follow the oath of office and obligations as a member of the Board of Supervisors. The outcome may not always be what you want but I will make every effort to do the right thing.

Recently, I had an opportunity to turn over the keys of a new 2012 4 x 4 Chevrolet Ambulance to the Groveland Ambulance crew. The purchase price was \$120,000 and came to us fully loaded with life saving equipment. The ambulance has in it a 2012 Heart Monitor Defibrillator that is "state of the art" according to Tuolumne County Ambulance Manager Bill Caldera. The monitor does 12 lead EKG testing and also interprets the heart rhythm to aid paramedics in determining if a person needs to be flown to a cardiac center in the valley. Some heart attacks show abnormal heart rhythms that can indicate a need for immediate intervention. The patient may be flown or driven to a valley hospital where the size of the heart attack can be reduced by the placements of stents. These monitors cost \$27,000 each but are certainly worth every cent.

The complete ambulance package runs about \$190,000. The unit was purchased from the Tuolumne County Ambulance

# **Raspberry Ice Cream**

RECIPE BY TOM KNOTH AND PAULA MARTELL

Homemade ice cream is hard to beat, and with raspberries in season, this recipe is the perfect treat on a hot summer night. Feel free to substitute other berries such as our local blackberries. Electric ice cream makers are available at Wal-Mart and start at \$25; for us it was a great investment!

### **INGREDIENTS**

1 Pint Fresh raspberries

1-1/2 Cup Sugar

1/2 Lemon; juice of

2 Large Eggs

2 Cups Heavy Whipping Cream 1 Cup Milk

1/2 tsp Raspberry Extract (optional)

### DIRECTIONS

Toss the raspberries, 3/4 cup sugar, and the lemon juice together in a bowl. Cover and refrigerate for 2 hours, stirring every 30 minutes. Place mixture in a blender or food processor and puree.

Whisk the eggs in a mixing bowl or

Enterprise Fund as a capital expenditure. User fees created the revenue for the purchase. No tax dollars were used.

As many know, the south side ambulance is partially funded by an ambulance assessment. This assessment is earmarked to maintain paramedic personnel 24/7 in the South County. The ambulance is known as Medic 41 and covers all of South County in addition to responding as mutual aid in Northern Mariposa County.

Tuolumne County's partnership with Manteca Ambulance has provided uninterrupted paramedic services to Groveland and the South County for over 25 years. The community has continued to provide support in sustaining this vital service. User fees, County Ambulance fund subsidy and an assessment approved by the voters have allowed the much needed service to continue.

The Tuolumne County Board of Supervisors took action at the July 17th, meeting to place a ballot measure for the November 6th 2012 election to extend/ renew the South County Zone Tax for an additional 5 years. The county will be sponsoring a meeting on August 16th at the Groveland Community Hall at 6:00 PM to provide additional information and answer questions related to this issue.

food mixer until light and fluffy, 1-2 minutes. Whisk in the remaining 3/4 cup sugar, a little at a time; continue whisking until completely blended, about 1 minute more. Pour in the heavy cream and milk and whisk to blend. Strain juice from raspberry mixture into the cream mixture and blend. Add up to 1 teaspoon of raspberry extract if desired (we use 1/2 tsp).

Transfer the mixture to an ice cream maker and freeze following the manufacturer's instructions. Makes 1 generous quart.
