# President's Message

As we go into December the weather has certainly changed. We had snow in November with the temperatures dropping down into the 30's in the mornings. Our Maintenance staff has done an excellent job, clearing the roads and maintaining our golf course.

The 2013 Budget and assessment were finalized at the November Board meeting. The Board, management, and Budget and Finance Committee put in a lot work on the budget in an effort to keep our assessment as reasonable as possible. The final amount was close to the same as 2012.

Unfortunately, I could not give my "aye" vote to approve the 2013 Budget as I felt we could do more to cut labor costs and benefits. Nevertheless, I understand that governing a largescale homeowners association is a team effort and my fellow Board members, management, and the Budget and Finance Committee worked very hard on your behalf. To that end, I am committed to working with our management team to come up with ways to further reduce employee medical benefit costs to our Association. I have been brainstorming some ideas with management and believe we have a reasonable plan that my fellow Board members will feel comfortable implementing.

Unfortunately, PML has seen a continuation of lot mergers and as a result, the final 2013 assessment will be \$1.00 more per month. If there had been no lot mergers this year, it is my opinion that we would have seen no increase in our assessment for next year. This is the main reason why we have pushed so hard to get the CC&R revision passed. If passed, it will effectively end the continued deterioration of our assessment base from lot mergers. If you have not voted on this revision, please vote YES!

The good news is; if you pay your annual assessment in full at the start of the year, you still receive a \$60 discount.

### The 2013 Budget includes:

A carryover of \$100K in operational surplus from 2012

A decrease in overall headcount for PML from 2012

A restructuring in the Annual Golf Fees to better suit our membership

Equipment to help reduce speeding within PML


\$5K to investigate the viability of a year-round swimming pool

Continued funding to replace the deteriorating Marina Store/Café

Maintenance of our current infrastructure with NO increase to our reserve contribution

I am happy with what we have been able to achieve, but unhappy with the overall economic situation as I would have liked to see no increase in our assessment this year. We had to make some tough choices and in the end, the Board had to weigh member service against increase in assessment.

I can assure you that the Board and management team will continue to strive to operate our Association as cost-effectively as possible. While we have made some inroads to cutting labor costs without affecting member service, we are always looking at other



ways to improve the bottom line.

We are currently involved in the Labor Contract negotiations with our union employees which is due to expire December 31, 2012. Given the economic climate as it is, we are hopeful we will come to a suitable agreement for both parties before this contract expires. We have a strong negotiation team who will do a good job representing our homeowners. Hopefully I will have an update on this in January's article.

Please continue your support to all our amenities and PLEASE drive safely, slowly with respect to others on the road as well.

# General Manager's Message

#### DAM GATE EXERCISE SUCCESSFUL

I am pleased to report that our annual dam gate exercise was successful. Each year we exercise the hydraulic dam gates in accordance with California Division of Dam Safety regulations. The purpose of the dam gate exercise is to ensure that the hydraulic systems are working properly and to release water from the bottom of the lake.

Over the year, the lake accumulates hydrogen sulfide, as plant life and other materials break down. It is important to release the hydrogensulfide laden water to keep our lake healthy. This year, a little less than two feet was released and this should be recovered with the winter and spring rainfall.

# 2013 BUDGET AND ASSESSMENT MAILING

After months of work and review, the 2013 Budget, Assessment and Fee Schedule were approved by the Board of Directors. In an effort to save money we are combining the budget and assessment materials in the same package.

Members with multiple properties will receive one complete package and then additional assessment mailings as applicable. Members should receive the budget/assessment packages by December 15<sup>th</sup>. Members who chose to "Opt-In" this year and receive their documents by email will receive their parking stickers and tags by mail, but the rest of the material will arrive by email.

# CC&R'S REVISION STATUS UPDATE

On November 10<sup>th</sup>, the PML Inspector of Elections conducted a count of the second balloting for the CC&R Revision. As of the November meeting, PML received a quorum, but not the necessary 51% approval by the members to adopt. Given the high rate of approval of voting members, Association Counsel recommended

proceeding with an additional and final re-ballot. These ballots will only be sent to those members who did not vote in the first two balloting processes. We encourage all members who did not vote to please vote YES for the CC&R Revision.

We have tentatively scheduled a Special Meeting on Saturday, December 15<sup>th</sup> at the Lake Lodge. The meeting will start promptly at 9 a.m. If we receive enough returned ballots, we will hold a final vote count. If not, the current CC&R's will remain in effect

For those members who cannot attend, we will provide the final vote count on the PML website and publish it in the January issue of the PML News.

#### PML FINANCIAL WEBPAGE

The PML Website contains a lot of useful information for our members. One of the pages provides detailed financial information such as the fee schedule, annual report, pro-forma budget, collection policy, house charge and automatic debit and credit payment authorization. We used to include a summarized version of the monthly financials. We changed this to include a detailed version of the monthly financials so that members have easy access 24-hours a day. This will save our members and staff time, and PMLA money in printing and mailing costs.

### **SAFE WINTER DRIVING**

The winter season brings with it rain, ice and snow. It is important

that all members and guests follow the speed limit and also slow down during inclement weather. Road conditions should be used as an indicator of speed. Be aware of the ramifications of icy road conditions while traveling downhill and around corners. If you are stopped around a turn in the roadway on a cold and icy day, you run the risk of causing an accident. I have seen many of our members and guests stopped in the road admiring a deer or squirrel, oblivious to the risk they are taking. On-coming traffic may not be able to stop in time to avoid your vehicle.

Our staff works very hard to keep our roads clear and safe to use. Please obey all traffic laws, observe the 25 mph. speed limit and watch for deer and pedestrians. Speeding, blowing through stop signs without slowing down or stopping, driving in the wrong lane and not watching for pedestrians are the usual complaints. Many deer vs. vehicle accidents can be avoided by obeying the speed limit

One of our members reminded me recently that another issue is the "Road Hog" or driver that uses the middle of the road or other lane. Most roads within PML are narrow in comparison to County and State roads. It is important to be extra diligent to stay in the proper lane. Please do your part and help keep PML safe for everyone.

# **PMLA Money Matters**

With the Association's budget for 2013 approved by the Board of Directors at the November 10 open meeting we know that the assessment for 2013 is \$1,896 (\$1,836 if you pay in full before January 31, 2013). This is a small \$1/month increase over the 2012 assessment. This represents a less than 1% increase (actually .6%). With the CPI (Consumer Price Index) rising 2.6% our 2013 assessment is well below that figure.

A huge concern to many property owners is the level of the assessment. Even with our efforts to control the level of assessment the questions about where assessment dollars go and why they continue to increase remain. In fact it is probably the number one concern that I hear from many of you.

The basic type of question about assessments concerns the overall level of the assessment and what members "get" for their dollars. This is particularly true of property owners who are not full time PMLA residents. Unfortunately there is no easy answer to either of these issues.

As with most complex questions the answers are just as complex.

Why do assessments go up? The simple answer is that things cost more from one year to the next. It's called inflation. If all the things we do each year never changed (a completely unrealistic assumption) then assessments would rise by the level of inflation (generally in the range of about 3%). Unfortunately other things affect assessment levels. Not the least of which is the age of some of our facilities. As just about everything else it costs more to maintain a 40+ year old building or amenity than it does one that is brand new or even just a few years old.

"Pay me now or pay me later." We all remember this phrase from numerous commercials. Unfortunately PMLA for many years chose the latter option. We can no longer keep putting off the kinds of maintenance and repair items that for many years kept assessments artificially low. Pay me later has become pay me now!

Our Reserve Funds are at an

unacceptably low level and need to be increased so that the types of major expenses on our horizon can be paid for when needed and not put off and passed on to the next group of property owners. Fortunately your Board of Directors has wisely decided to continue the long process of building up a sufficient level of Reserve Funding in the coming years. It is important to note that there is no increase in the Reserve contribution contained in the 2013 Budget.

This often leads to a related question that goes something like, "Why should I pay into a fund that is for something I may never see or use in the future?" My answer to this question is that these funds in reality go to pay for the use that members have already received and simply maintain all of PMLA in the condition it was in years past.

Finally the concern from many property owners who do not live at PML is that their assessment goes up and yet they get "no fair amount of benefit from these payments".

Assessments are not based on the level of amenity usage but simply on the fact that one owns/lives in Pine Mountain Lake. Look at it as a bit of insurance for the value of owning property in PML. If our facilities were not maintained then it is likely that less prospective buyers would be interested in purchasing here.

Please be assured that the Board and management team at PML continue to work hard and find ways to save money and get the job done in the most efficient and cost effective way possible. It is our responsibility to keep Pine Mountain Lake the beautiful place to live that all of you have come to know and enjoy.

# **Shades of Green**

BY ALAN MACDONALD, GOLF COURSE SUPERINTENDENT

I hope everyone had a wonderful Thanksgiving meal that followed an enjoyable round of golf with family and friends.

The projects that are planned for winter and early spring are:

Tree trimming - remove lower hanging limbs for improved irrigation

coverage and to allow our mowing equipment to get under the trees. Remove a dead digger pine on hole #7 and a few other trees that are dead or dying.

Irrigation improvements - We have over 1,700 sprinklers on the course. A portion of these are adjustable part circles that do not make a complete revolution. Most of these

are located around greens and the perimeters of our property. Some were put in to eliminate the water under our oak trees. The majority of sprinklers are full circles and these make a full revolution. In order to improve playing conditions in certain areas with improved irrigation neither of these sprinklers are a good choice. We will pick out a few areas to improve with sprinklers that will allow us to give one area plenty of water and not get the area nearby unplayable. We might try multiple smaller sprinklers or a second part circle for better water control. One area we will target first is along #3 as we approach the green and closer to the green near the left approach. The pine tree to the left draws a lot of water away from the turf and it is on a steep slope that faces south. Less than 40 feet away is the shade from a large oak and the terrain is fairly

flat, so you can see the challenge of keeping playable turf in both locations We will also be raising and leveling sprinklers for improved coverage.

> Behind the scenes we will have a service to our pump stations and conduct a pressure test in the field as part of that service. Proper water pressure, level sprinklers, and good performing nozzles are all parts of a fine tuned irrigation system. Next year our new irrigation system will be 14 years young.

Drainage projects - We are in year two of improving our failed galvanized culverts around the course. We will do improvements to the drainage under #6 fairway and in front of the driving range tee that runs across #10 fairway. Both these locations receive water from nearby road surfaces.

As we perform these projects we will be working on fall cleanup and winter storm damage cleanup. {I HOPE WE HAVE A WINTER

In last month's article I had mentioned that golf maintenance had a full time staff of 11.7. That was an error as our F.T.E. is 10.7 and has remained around that for the last six or seven years. The .7 is when Eddie doesn't work hard!

Enjoy December and the spirit of the holiday season.

# Balloting for Second Restated Declaration of Restrictions (CC&Rs)

The Annual Meeting of the Members and election was held on Saturday, August 18, 2012. The required quorums for the election of directors and the Bylaws revision were achieved. A quorum was achieved with this extended balloting deadline. However, the return envelope on some of the ballots cast was not executed properly. The Board of Directors is exercising its right to extend the voting deadline a final time, to December 14, 2012, to give the entire membership a chance to be heard.

The election results show that the majority of Members are in favor of the Second Restated Declaration We need just 421 more affirmative votes to pass this revision.

# **Grounds and Landscapes**

Lake Association's Maintenance Department sub-departments is our Grounds crew.

We have two full-time Grounds personnel who are dedicated to maintaining our grounds, landscaping, and seasonal recreation areas. Twenty year veteran Steve Sawyer is the lead grounds worker on maintaining our irrigation systems, landscapes, grounds, tennis courts, play grounds, and grassy lawns. Additional workers are teamed with Steve to keep our grounds in good working order. Trash, garbage, and the debris removal are foremost. When you get to the end, you go back to the beginning, and start all over again.

The Grounds Department's work is spread through-out all our amenities, performing daily tasks and weekly duties each and every day. Seasonal weather changes impact the tasks, and labor hours are adjusted to meet the demands. One of the largest components of our grounds maintenance has been collecting and disposal of garbage. During the summer months, with more visitors, trash and garbage gets huge. With the fall months, it is pine needles and leaves, a constant vigil. The winter has workers de-icing walkways, shoveling snow, working on hardscape projects, and irrigation work. Early spring is herbicide spraying and lawn preparations, spring plantings, then the pollen storms arrive, masks go on, hoses come out, let the battle begin.

By the time we get the pollen washed down, and the winter debris

The final article on Pine Mountain removed, the weeds come back with a vengeance. Keeping green plants green, weeds brown and gone, is a constant battle for the grounds crew. Timing is everything when treating weeds and grasses in early spring and in into the summer; a systemic treatment properly applied, will provide a bountiful roundup of invasive weeds and plants, pun intended. The Grounds Crew has a plethora of sprayers and applicators to wage this war. Proper weather and applications will save hours of hand work later. Ignore the early signs of pre-emergence, the invasive species, and any healthy landscape becomes a weed garden.

The local Canada Geese are now the grounds workers number one pest, topping the deer and gophers combined. These illegal aliens, no longer itinerate creatures, who continue to assault our grass lawns and beaches to no end, know no boundaries. A special appreciation goes out to the many PML personnel who are involved with clearing our recreation areas of dreaded goose poop each and every day. The use-to-be migratory birds eat the grass lawns down to the dirt, like sheep with wings, amazing. A special thanks to all the property owners who also donate their time to discourage the birds from retiring here.

The PML Grounds Crew exercises due diligence at keeping our amenities landscape looking natural, a few accent plantings here and there, and a splash of color when the seasons change virtute et armis.

# **Community Standards**

### **PLEASE SLOW DOWN!**

I continue to receive complaints about the driving habits of our residents, guests, contractors and vendors. This is very frustrating because we are all at risk of a devastating wreck.

Traffic control is a police function and as you know, with the cuts in resources at the County and State level, it's a challenge to have police respond to a serious crime let alone a violation like a speeding citation.

The type of driving complaint varies from speeding and running stop signs, to passing over a double line. Needless to say all of these create a hazard for walkers, children and animals.

We can all change this trend by setting a good example. 25mph is the speed limit within PML except for Ferretti Rd which is 35mph. If you see someone who is blatantly ignoring our speed limits or driving in some other ridiculous fashion, please call the main gate and report it. If you can get a license plate number we can send a letter letting them know we are watching them and any additional complaints will result in a monetary fine. At the very least a description of the vehicle and any markings on it would be very helpful.

### **NEEDLES AND LEAVES**

As we move into the fall and winter season, do not rake up those needles and leaves into piles and try to burn them. First of all, it's good for the soil to leave them on the ground in the winter season plus it is good erosion control. Second, our

number one smoke complaint comes from burning needles and leaves. They never seem to dry out when they are in piles and trying to burn anything that has moisture in it is going to create a smoky mess in the neighborhood.

When the fire season begins next May we are going to ask you to remove all needles and leaves within 30' of your structures and take them to the compost dump. This is a CalFire requirement, so put this on your agenda. We have been weak in this area and it will be a major focus of our fire safety efforts next May and June.

### **BURN PERMITS**

Just a reminder...your burn permit is valid for 5 years so no need to get another permit this year. If you are new to the burning process you can obtain a permit at the main gate or the admin office and be sure to watch the "Be Ready, Be Safe" fire safety video at www.pinemountainlake. com/firesafety before you light that match. Have your permit in hand and be sure to call the main gate to see if it's a burn day as determined by the Tuolumne County Air Quality Control Board.

SPECIAL NOTE: CalFire may require a burn permit also. They are available at the Groveland Fire Station.

### **Personal Conduct:**

- 1. Allowing loud music
- 2. Uttering abusive language or conduct that would be offensive to a reasonable person
- 3. Using the property Owner's gate card or clicker

### **Work Related Conduct**

- 1. Starting work before 7am or continuing after 7pm
- 2. Allowing dogs at construction sites
- 3. Performing work on Sunday
- 4. Cutting down a tree in excess of 5" without PMLA approval
- 5. Trespassing on neighboring property
- 6. Using neighbors water or electricity without written permission
- 7. Leaving construction signs longer than 5 days after work has been completed
- 8. Nailing signs to trees
- 9. Storing building materials on street or easement
- 10. Beginning exterior construction without PML Association approval

# The Safety Department

Pine Mountain Lake Association • Amenity and residential alarm calls members will begin receiving their annual member packets in the mail this month. I would like to take a moment to outline what your assessment provides in terms of the Safety Department, one of the many amenities here at Pine Mountain Lake. Safety Officers operate both out in the field and in the Main Gate's dispatch center. The Safety Department is comprised of one Director, one supervising Sergeant, and twelve cross-trained patrol/dispatch officers. We operate 24 hours a day, seven days a week. The Main Gate services approximately 5,600 calls per month and processes 12,000 vehicles per month on average. Although we provide assistance and support to the Tuolumne County Sheriff's Office, we are not actually law enforcement. The Department of Safety is, however, responsible for:

- Operating the dispatch command center and Main Gate
- Greeting and screening incoming
- Assisting members with a variety of questions, including requests for service and/or assistance
- Verifying property owner information and issuing guest passes
- Providing courtesy calls for property owner's guests that do not have passes
- Maintaining records of all incidents reported to the Safety Department
- Booking found property and releasing to verifiable owners
- Regulating temporary resident registration and associated fees
- Notification of special circumstances to non-resident property owners, i.e. water breaks, tree hazards, etc.
- Notifying agencies of emergency situations requiring their response
- Responding to emergency situations and providing secondary support to emergency agencies
- Opening, closing and conducting checks of all amenities
- Conducting daily and weekly special residence watches
- Patrolling all residential areas
- Responding to a variety of incidents involving suspicious circumstances and/or persons
- Hazard identification and containment
- Reporting law violations to the Tuolumne County Sheriff's Office
- Conducting welfare checks of elderly and physically-challenged individuals

- Residential disturbances
- Enforcing Association parking restrictions
- Providing transportation for members in need of assistance
- Providing vehicle jump starts
- Property owner complaint mediation and resolution
- On-scene enforcement of Association CC&Rs and Resolutions
- Issuing courtesy notices
- Investigation of member or Association property damage
- Inspecting roads for ice and/or hazardous conditions
- Dead animal retrieval and disposal
- Dog impoundment and safe-keeping
- Dog disturbances and barking dog complaints
- Leash law enforcement
- Dog Registration and tag issuance
- Monitoring tennis courts
- Scheduling tennis reservations and issuing tennis passes
- Gate malfunction inspection and resolution
- Investigation of gate follow-throughs, tampering complaints and damage
- Collecting Campground fees and booking reservations
- Monitoring Campground activity
- Dumpstation operation
- Supplying Moore Brothers garbage bags
- Selling fishing licenses
- Off-season boat registration
- Weekend gate card issuance
- Traffic control at vehicle accident
- Assisting the Tuolumne County Sheriff's Department as needed
- Event management
- Emergency Evacuation Plan implementation and response

# CHEF CARRIE'S FAVORITE EGG-A-NOG Ingredients

- 4 egg yolks
- 1/3 cup sugar, plus 1 tablespoon
- 1 pint whole milk
- 1 cup heavy cream
- 3 ounces bourbon
- 1 teaspoon freshly grated nutmeg
- 4 egg whites\*

### **Directions**

In the bowl of a stand mixer, beat the egg yolks until they lighten in color. Gradually add the 1/3 cup sugar and continue to beat until it is completely dissolved. Add the milk, cream, bourbon and nutmeg and stir to combine.

Place the egg whites in the bowl of a stand mixer and beat to soft peaks. With the mixer still running gradually add the 1 tablespoon of sugar and beat

In the midst of until stiff peaks form.

Whisk the egg whites into the mixture. Chill and serve.

Cook's Note: For cooked eggnog, follow procedure below.

In the bowl of a stand mixer, beat the egg yolks until they lighten in color. Gradually add the 1/3 cup sugar and continue to beat until it is completely dissolved. Set aside.

In a medium saucepan, over high heat, combine the milk, heavy cream and nutmeg and bring just to a boil, stirring occasionally. Remove from the heat and gradually temper the hot mixture into the egg and sugar mixture. Then return everything to the pot and cook until the mixture reaches 160 degrees F. Remove from the heat, stir in the bourbon, pour into a medium mixing bowl, and set in the refrigerator to chill.

In a medium mixing bowl, beat the egg whites to soft peaks. With the mixer running gradually add the 1 tablespoon of sugar and beat until stiff peaks form. Whisk the egg whites into the chilled mixture.

### \* Raw Egg Warning

FDA suggest caution in consuming raw and lightly cooked eggs due to the slight risk of salmonella or other foodborne illness. To reduce this risk, we recommend you use only fresh, properly refrigerated, clean grade A or AA eggs with intact shells, and avoid contact between the yolks or whites and the shell. For recipes that call for eggs that are raw or undercooked when the dish is served, use shell eggs that have been treated to destroy salmonella, by pasteurization or another approved method.

# Happy Holidays at the 19th Hole Lounge

The holidays are upon us and winter is just around the corner, from all of us at The 19th Hole Lounge may all of you have a safe and happy holiday season.

We have some great new wines at the 19th Hole Lounge and this month I am highlighting the Sierra Vista winery. I hope you enjoy the new wines from this sierra foothill winery.

FAMILY OWNED AND OPERATED the winery is on RED ROCK RIDGE, half a mile high in the Sierra Nevada Mountains thirty miles west of Lake Tahoe in the Sierra Foothills of California.

In 1972, John and Barbara MacCready bought their property on the Eastern Highlands of the Sierra Foothills of California and pioneered the rebirth of mountain viticulture in the re-emerging premium wine region of El Dorado County. At that time all the Sierra Foothills were classified as Zinfandel country so when they planted Cabernet Sauvignon they were bucking tradition as they have ever since. Luckily they planted the cab on a site which produces great Cabernet Sauvignon.

The winery farms thirty-two acres of mountain vineyards on challenging slopes from 2800 to 2900 feet elevation. Mountain vineyards are low yielding with intense flavors, outstanding character and provide thrilling tractor driving. Extensive studies John MacCready made in the eighties showed the climate at Sierra Vista to be very similar to that of the Northern Rhone Valley of France. This was the deciding factor in determining which grape varieties to expand to in our vineyards. Rhone wines have developed into the perfect grape for the area and develop in time to emulate the better wines of Cote Rotie and Hermitage in the Northern Rhone.

The first crush was in 1977, with grapes purchased from local Vineyards. Only 1,200 cases of wine were made that year. Annual production has grown gradually to the current 7000 cases. Several different wines have been produced since the first crush: these include Cabernet Sauvignon, Zinfandel and Chardonnay, Fume Blanc, Viognier, Roussanne, Syrah, Grenache, Mourvedre and a Rhone Blend called Fleur de Montagne.

In 1979, Sierra Vista planted Syrah, whose lineage traces to Chapoutier's vineyards in the Northern Rhone appellation of Cote Rotie. In 1990, John MacCready made a study comparing the northern Rhone Valley to El Dorado County. He found that much of the El Dorado appellation is very similar to the northern Rhone Valley in climate, rainfall and soil type. Because of this, Sierra Vista's emphasis in the future has been the development of Rhone varieties. In addition to Syrah they have introduced Grenache, Mourvedre, Cinsault, Viognier and Roussanne. From these grapes they make varietals and Rhone style blends.

Sierra Vista Vineyards located on the top and sides of the curving half mile high ridge has four different terroirs or microclimates where they have vines appropriate to the climate planted.

- 1. There is a western facing slope, just off the ridge top, with a 15% 20% slope. It looks very much like the soil at Chateau Rayas in Chateauneuf-du Pape. This hillside at 2800ft and is the warmest slope.
- 2. The top of the ridge has a slightly south slope and is also at 2800ft. The soil is the same as that of the first terroir and the trees are similar to those at Hermitage and Cornas.
- 3. This microclimate-terroir is just off the ridge top with a north east slope of 10% to 15% grade where the soil is the same as that of 1.
- 4. This vineyard has a steep northwest slope of about 20% to 30% grade. The vineyard is terraced on decomposed granite as in Hermitage and is at 2400ft

In the late '90s Sierra Vista was the first winery in the El Dorado AVA to install photo-voltaic solar panels at the winery. A 14.4kw system was installed on the roof of the winery and reduced energy consumption from the grid by around 94% the first month it was fully operational.

I hope you enjoyed the info about this wonderful winery. We proud to carry the Sierra Vista Cabernet, Zinfandel and Merlot on our wine list and sell each by the glass so the next time you visit us give these wonderful wines a try and again Happy Holidays.

"Operators who stay ahead of the curve, in an increasingly competitive market, will need to evaluate the best use for the latest tech trends and decide how to integrate them into their operations in a way that's efficient and beneficial to consumers. It should complement and enhance the restaurant experience for all age groups, which may mean having a printed menu available, as well as an iPad/tablet."

Other highlights from Technomic's latest survey include:

• More than half of respondents (51 percent) consider it important for restaurants to integrate technology into their ordering capabilities;



- Technologies related to ordering, coupons or special offers sent via email or text message have the highest usage rates. Nearly three-fifths (58 percent) of panelists say they use these at least once a month;
- Among technologies designed to entertain restaurant-goers, Wi-Fi access and LCD flat-screen TVs are used the most;
- Out of all restaurant segments and types of retail stores, consumers are most receptive to technologybased orders at casual dining restaurants;
- In general, younger consumers are more interested in technology at restaurants than older diners. Consumers from 18–44 years old are far more likely than those over 45 to say they might connect to their favorite restaurants via a mobile app and order using a touch screen kiosk. Interest is highest among 25- to 34-year-old Millennials.

### **PML Aviation Association**

At our November 6 meeting we bid farewell and thank you to our outgoing board and welcomed a list of new board candidates. Marle Hewett has finished his term as president. I know most of our aviation group knows about Marle but I would like to take this opportunity to acquaint the rest of you with this unusual man.

Marle is part of the Red Bull Stratos team. (The team that successfully launched a man from a balloon at 128,000 ft.) He had been working on the project for 2 1/2 years. After retiring from the Navy (carrier pilot, test pilot, Air Force exchange test pilot), he worked for Northrop, Texrtron and NASA Dryden for a number of years and eventually founded his own company providing consulting services to the aerospace industry for the last fifteen years. On the Stratos project he was the Mission Director, Lead Flight Test Engineer and consulting engineer in aerodynamics, high altitude atmospherics, and capsule electrical/electronic systems. Marle holds a Masters degree in Electrical Engineering and a PhD in Aeronautical Engineering.

Since the mission has been completed, the flying phase of the project is over. The core technical team must now complete the data analysis and publication tasks. They will be writing papers for a number of journals and publications including Aviation Week and Space Technology, National Geographic,

Scientific American, Aerospace Medicine, Journal of Aerospace Engineering, International Journal of Aerodynamics, etc.

The successful flight set three records that the FAI (Federation Aeronautique Internationale) will recognize:

Longest freefall distance: 119,846 feet

Highest exit altitude: 128,000 feet Highest vertical speed: 833.9 mph, Mach 1.24

Following records were also set but not officially recognized by the FAI:

First human to break the sound barrier

Largest balloon used for manned flight: 29.47 million cubic feet Highest manned balloon ascent

One record they missed - Longest duration freefall. The jumper, Felix Baumgartner, failed to break Joe Kittinger's record set in August 1960 - he was going too fast.

The sonic boom was heard by a number of people on the team AND some local farmers near their launch site in Roswell, NM. It was recorded by one of their JLAIR (tracking) units.

An interesting side light to this accomplishment is- Marle was in Italy celebrating his and Judy's fiftieth wedding anniversary when the jump took place. "After our first attempt at launching Manned Flight Three (the record jump) failed when a wind gust took out the partially filled balloon, I left Roswell to meet Judy in Italy for our 50th wedding anniversary celebration, so I missed the successful launch four days later. I had a great backup in mission control so there was no problem." Marle's seat was

next to Joe Kittinger's and if you look at the news footage of mission control you will see that it is empty.

Connie and Alan Buchner will hold a dinner and dance for the PMLAA group at their hangar. The date is December 1st so mark your calanders.

If you have ever wanted to learn to fly or have a pilot's license then you won't find a better deal than our own Pine Mountain Lake Flying Club. The Pine Mountain Lake flying club owns a Cessna 172 with 180 horse power engine and fixed pitch prop. This is a great training aircraft and is also useful for flying to all those faraway places. 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# Groveland 'Volunteers' for Wheels\*

November 5th is the launch date of Phase One of Wheels\* which is a transportation program for seniors who are unable to drive and have no family locally to help them. The program is designed to connect clients with the community by providing round trip car rides from their homes to destinations in the Groveland area such as doctor and dentist offices, library, banks, stores etc.

The program, which is an initiative of The Little House, has been 18 months in the making and has attracted many volunteers who want to help make a difference to the lives of seniors in our mountain top neighborhood.

Client Advisers, Jim Thayer and Joyce Reitzen, have enrolled 15 seniors in the program and it may be necessary to begin a waiting list for additional clients. We feel it sensible to limit the number of clients we enroll at program start-up so that we are comfortable with our systems and processes and we know that we are providing the level service to our clients that they expect.

Mike Carbonaro has developed the on-line computer system which schedules drivers and clients and he has a team of 5 volunteer schedulers undergoing

training in the system. Clients enrolled in the program may call the Wheels\* voice mail system and request transportation up to a day in advance of their needs and the scheduler advises the driver signed up for that day of the assignment.

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# 2013 Proposed Rate Change for Moore Bros. Scavenger Customers

Moore Bros. Scavenger is currently anticipating a new solid waste collection rate beginning in January 2013. The new rate will be based on the recent increase in the Consumer Price Index (CPI) which is 2.64% for our area.

Our rates are determined by the County of Tuolumne and must be approved by the Tuolumne County Board of Supervisors before they can be modified. On December 4th, 2012 Moore Bros. Scavenger will appear before the Tuolumne County Board of Supervisors and ask that they approve our request to take this year's CPI increase.

We understand that any rate increase from our customers' point of view is never popular, especially with the state of our current local economy. We are aware that the recession has been devastating to many of our friends and customers. It was for this reason in part, that we opted not to request the CPI for 2012. In fact, we were the only trash hauler in Tuolumne County that didn't raise our rates. Unfortunately, to keep up with the ever increasing costs to operate, we feel it is necessary for 2013.

Since we will have to wait until the December 4th Board meeting it is possible that our annual payment coupon / information billing packets could be delayed in getting to you by or before January 1st of the New Year which is our usual practice. If this occurs, we will waive the late charge fee for all customers in January.

We also want to take this opportunity to remind you that the Groveland Transfer Station will be accepting Christmas Trees during the month of January during regular business hrs. of 8:00 A.M. to 3:45 P.M. Wednesdays and Saturdays only, AT NO CHARGE. The minimum gate fee of \$14.70 will be charged for flocked trees of any kind. If you cannot self haul your live tree either to the slash yard at Pine Mountain Lake or the Groveland Transfer Station, you may call our office at 962-7224 to make an appointment to have your tree picked up at no charge. Trees must be unflocked, cut into 5 ft. lengths and bundled. Please remove all tinsel, decorations and nails.

### A Review of RED RIBBON WEEK

On Thursday, February 7, 1995, Enrique "Kiki" Camerena, 37, stashed his badge and service pistol in his desk drawer and headed for lunch with his wife Mika. Kiki, a U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration Agent, had been on the trail of Mexico's marijuana and cocaine barons. He was due to be reassigned in three weeks. He had come dangerously close to unlocking a multi-billion dollar drug pipeline which he suspected extended into the highest reaches of the Mexican army, police, and government.

According to the DEA's reconstruction of events, as he headed to lunch, five men appeared at the agent's side and shoved him into a waiting car. That was the last time anyone but his kidnappers would see him alive.

Kiki Camerena's body was found

one month later in a shallow grave 70 miles from Michoacan, Mexico. He had been tortured, beaten and brutally murdered. Mika would have to tell her three sons that their daddy would not be coming home again.

As news of the atrocity began to appear in the newspapers and on radio and television broadcasts, many school parent associations, already angry and sick of the killing and destruction caused by alcohol and other drugs in America, were looking about for some way to proclaim their concerns and make a demand for action in their local communities. Several of these groups banded together and selected a red ribbon as a symbol and set about creating a red ribbon campaign to show intolerance for drugs in our schools, our work places, and our communities.

In 1988, with Nancy Reagan as honorary chair, an eight day "RED RIBBON WEEK" was proclaimed by the Congress of the United States. Each year, since 1988, the Red Ribbon campaign has grown and now impacts millions of Americans like no other drug prevention movement in history. In schools, in particular, when everyone is wearing a red ribbon, and this little piece of satin carries the message that it is "OK TO SAY NO TO DRUGS".

Thanks to the efforts of Wynette Hilton and the Student Body Councils, plus the schools, for all the work they put into the Red Ribbon Program. They are a real credit to Groveland.





# Healthy Habits from Pine Mountain Therapy

#### **KEEP YOUR FEET HAPPY**

One of the most common and easily treated foot pain syndromes we see at PMT is plantar fasciitis. Plantar Fasciitis is named for the thick tissue on the bottom of your foot, that runs from the heel to the toes and supports the arch, the plantar fascia. The "itis" part happens when the tissue is overused or over stretched and becomes inflamed. Once the tissue becomes inflamed you will experience pain either in the heel or the arch or both. Symptoms usually are worse when you take your first steps in the morning, after standing or walking for a long period, when climbing stairs or after intense activity.

Plantar fasciitis affects both men and women but is most common in men 40-70. Increase risk of developing foot pain comes with either high arches or flat feet, long-distance running or walking, sudden weight gain or obesity, tight achilles tendon (heel cords) and shoes with poor support.

#### What to do?


First be sure you have shoes with good support! Shoes do not have to be expensive or have custom insoles. Quite often when we take a history on a patient with plantar fasciitis we find that they spend a lot of time in flip flops, slippers or go barefoot in the house. Your arches need support from the time you get up in the morning until you go to bed at night. Having a pair of "house shoes" with adequate support can make a huge difference. Ice will often ease the pain by decreasing the inflammation. Here's a two for one hint: Freeze a water bottle. Put a towel down on the floor and roll your foot on the frozen bottle. You get a massage and ice treatment in one!

In therapy we teach simple stretches and use modalities to bring down the inflammation and rehabilitate the fascia and improve the function of the surrounding muscles. Other treatment may include injections by your doctor, wearing a night splint or in severe cases having to wear a cast boot. But, if you catch plantar



fasciitis early the simple tips above and seeing a physical therapist may prevent the need for further more severe treatment.

# **Pimento Cheese**

We just returned from a week of visiting Savannah, Georgia and Charleston, South Carolina. Six days of dining in these magnificent cities, despite walking 3-5 miles per day, resulted in Paula gaining 3 lbs and me gaining 6. But, it was worth it!

It was an incredible gastronomical journey through a maze of way too rich and fattening dishes unique to the region, and we thoroughly enjoyed it. We feasted on "She Crab Soup", Shrimp and Cheddar Grits, Fried Green Tomatoes, chicken that was deep fried in a waffle batter and topped with maple syrup, fried pork belly, and many other overthe-top dishes that forced my belly over-the-belt.

One item that really grabbed us was Pimento Cheese. It's been called the "Pâté of the South" and "Carolina Caviar." It's the kind of thing that Southerners get all misty eyed remembering from their youths and Yankees get all wondrous and rapturous about when they discover it.

We appreciate a little "kick" in our food and Pimento Cheese gave us an opportunity to satisfy our cravings for both cheese and spice in one bite. You can use this cheese dip mixture for numerous culinary purposes. Paula had a terrific pimento cheese omelet at "The Glass Onion" in Charleston, and I had it as a burger topping at "The Brick" (also in Charleston). "The Olde Harbour Inn", a Bed and Breakfast that we stayed at in Savannah, served raisin bread and pimento cheese tea sandwiches (very tasty!). Many restaurants offered grilled pimento cheese sandwiches. You could also use it as a dip for crackers or veggies, serve it on potato skins, or make cheese balls out of it and then press them



in chopped pecans. How about Pimento Mac and Cheese? The ideas are endless, but needless to say, we are now hooked on this stuff, and we hope that you will try our "souvenir" from the Old South.

#### **INGREDIENTS**

- 1 3 oz package Philadelphia Cream Cheese, softened
- 1 Cup Sharp Cheddar Cheese, grated
- 1 Cup Monterey Jack or Pepper Jack Cheese, grated
- 1/2 Cup Mayonnaise
- 1/2 teaspoon Salt
- 1/8 teaspoon Garlic Powder
- 2 to 3 Tablespoons Pimentos, finely diced
- 1 teaspoon Onion, finely grated or chopped

Cracked Black or White Pepper (to taste)

Cayenne or Chipotle Pepper (optional, to taste)

#### **DIRECTIONS**

Using an electric mixer, beat cream cheese until smooth and fluffy. Add all of the remaining ingredients and beat until well blended.

# The Sky Above Iceland - A Young Moon

Many of the images that I share in the Pine Mountain Lake Newsletter are taken with the aid of an array of telescopes, telescope mounts, and cameras – but anyone can take beautiful pictures of the evening sky with just about any camera.

Taking a photograph close to or just after sunset requires some special considerations. In order to collect enough light, the exposure time will be greater then daytime photographs. Longer exposure times require a very steady camera so the image doesn't come out blurry. The best way to accomplish this is by using a tripod or setting your camera on a steady surface. Another challenge is camera focus. The auto-focus feature on your camera requires a minimum level of light to operate properly. One trick that I use is to focus on a distant bright object and then use that focus setting when taking photographs of dim objects that are a similar distance away.

I enjoy looking towards the west in the early evening to see what bright sky objects are visible. Start by looking at the sky just after sunset. As the sky darkens, look for bright objects. Often the brightest "stars" in the sky aren't stars at all, but planets. Naked eye visible planets (that don't require the use of a telescope or binoculars) include Mercury, Venus, Mars, Saturn, and Jupiter.

Recently my wife, Lisa, and I were on a transatlantic cruise traveling from northern Europe to the eastern United States by way of the northern route, stopping at Iceland and cruising just south of Greenland. Just after sunset on September 18th, we were treated to a view of a very thin young crescent moon, floating in the red post sunset sky, just above the Atlantic Ocean. A young moon occurs just a few days after a new moon, a new moon being when no moon is visible in the sky. Young moons are often difficult to see because they set shortly



after sunset when the sky can still be quite bright. The clear mid-Atlantic ocean skies and the contrasting red sunset sky helped to make this young moon easily visible.

I took the photograph printed in this newsletter while we were on the balcony of our stateroom on the ship. We were at a very northern latitude, at approximately 64 degrees. In comparison, Groveland is at about 38 degrees latitude. This additional latitude leads to much longer daylight. This photograph was particularly difficult because I needed a long exposure time (0.2 seconds), however there was a lot of movement on the cruise ship so a tripod wouldn't provide much help. I took about 30 photographs and was lucky enough to get this one in-focus.


# Pine Cone Singers Present "Christmas Wishes & Holiday Dreams"
