Directors Election and Governing Documents Revisions...PLEASE VOTE!

On July 9th the annual election ballots will be mailed to the membership. Members will need to decide which two candidates out of the four that they wish to elect to govern our association. Another important consideration on the ballot is the revision of our CC&R's and Bylaws. These two documents are very important as they define how PML will be governed. I encourage all members to **vote YES** for both revisions.

The changes included in these revisions include updates in accordance with current law, better clarification of enforcement and architectural standards and some money-saving provisions. We ask that all qualified members please vote. We do not want to waste association funds by going out for additional balloting to those members who do not return their ballot. Help save PML and in turn the membership money by voting.

Shooting Range Project

The Shooting Range Project is finished. Management met with the Shooting Club and worked out operational procedures, scheduling and maintenance responsibilities. The fees and SOP were adopted at the May Board meeting. The Shooting Club RSO's conducted a training session on June 19th and a grand opening on June 23rd. The range will be open Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays from 9 am to 5 pm. Passes can be purchased at the Main Gate Department of Safety. There is a registration process and all users must provide evidence of firearm safety training. Accepted forms of certification are available at the Main Gate and the PML Website. Roads Refurbishment Project

The 2012 Roads Rehabilitation Project will begin on Monday, July 9th, and is scheduled to conclude by July 23rd. Road reconstruction will be in PML units 3, 5, 8, 10, and 12. Most of the work will be in lower traffic areas, with road repairs and paving work on Mueller Drive impacting traffic flow and amenity access.

The project will involve road surface grinding, asphalt section repairs, road reconstruction, asphalt overlay paving, repainting of lines and legends. Construction crews will be busy from 7AM to early evening each workday, Mondays through Fridays during the project. Construction traffic will be heavy in the work areas, anticipate delays on roads where the construction is being done.

Fire Safety Inspections and July 1st Deadline

Outside burning has been suspended in PML and the fire safety program inspections have begun. July 1st is the deadline for fire safety compliance. If you are a PML member and have not taken steps to ensure that your lot is cleared of brush, grass, tree limbs and other material, you are already behind and can expect an enforcement letter soon. Please contact our Fire Safety team at (209) 962-8616 and they will assist you with resolving the fire safety violation.

I am worried. Like many owners, I have reviewed the proposed changes in language to our CC&Rs. Not yet a full-time resident, I am unable to attend on site meetings, but would like my voice heard.

With the phrase "deteriorating assessment base" rolling around in my head, I read through the documents and could not help but notice several pages addressing assessments.

Both federal and state income taxes are proportional and grounded in the principle of the more you earn, the more you pay. Ditto property taxes: higher property values and larger lots demand higher tax assessments. Rather than retain regressive, flat association dues, why not base them on property values? People who own the huge wedding cake houses high above the lake, and the Victorian or log cabin behemoths deep within the development may be able to spare a few more dollars. I know as a PML homeowner I do not enjoy the same serene quality of life out on the fringes of the relentlessly noisy Ferretti Road, where the 35 mile an hour speed limit appears to be more of a recommendation than actual law, and pugnacious foul-mouthed neighbors (siblings?) routinely argue – loudly, while still yet a drummer-in-residence across the street fastidiously practices nearly daily. The Waterfowl Management Committee is looking at ways to make the geese feel uncomfortable on your beaches and golf course in an effort to reduce the amount of droppings left by them. The Waterfowl Management Committee is implementing a new program of property owners using their dogs to chase the geese off the golf course and beaches. Seasonal Summer Work

The summer days are busy days, an intense time to get maintenance work handled, repairs made, and hot weather projects completed. PML has a full lineup of seasonal tasks for the Maintenance Department this summer.

The 2012 Roads Rehabilitation Project will begin on Monday, July 9th, and will conclude by July 23rd. Road reconstruction will be in PML units 3, 5, 8, 10, and 12. Most of the work will be in lower traffic areas, with road repairs and paving work on Mueller Drive impacting traffic flow and amenity access.

Unit 3 – Green Valley Circle

Unit 5 – Mueller Drive from Ferretti Road to the Entrance Gate 3 Unit 8 – Mills Street and Alcan Court

Unit 10 – McKinley Way

Unit 12- Beaver Court, Clifton Way, Hemlock Street, Iris Court, Jimmersal Way, Mule Court, Woodside Way, and Yorkshire Rd

The project will involve road surface grinding, asphalt section repairs, road reconstruction, asphalt overlay paving, repainting of lines and legends. Construction crews will be busy from 7AM to early evening each workday, Mondays through Fridays during the project. Construction traffic will be heavy in the work areas, anticipate delays on roads where the construction is being done.

The Pine Mountain Lake Maintenance Department Streets Crew will begin the seasonal road work on many PMLA roads, shoulders, and parking lots. We will be repairing drainage problems,

making asphalt repairs, building berms, constructing asphalt curbs, performing shoulder repairs, section asphalt repairs, and coating parking lot surfaces. The work begins in mid-summer and will continue into the rainy Fall season, when the wet weather hampers construction.

Seasonal fire abatement work has concluded as of the end of June. Maintenance Department crews have worked on removing grasses, weeds, and woody debris from PML owned lots, common areas, road shoulders, and from greenbelt areas. The Terex skid steer tractor has been operating with a floating mowing deck; which handles large areas and properties in short fashion, cutting grasses, weeds and brush in an eight foot wide swath. The tractor is also grinding brush in the fire abatement areas, and has proved a valuable resource in our operating equipment.

This fire season will be a time to be cautious, alert, ready, and careful with any outdoor construction activities. Tools and equipment with steel parts can ignite a fire easier than one may expect. We anticipate the dangers and possibility of fires in our common open areas. At times we may need to restrict the work and access into these areas.

Fire abatement work with the PML Maintenance Department continues all year. Tree removals and hazard reduction are amplified during the wetter months, November through June, when the fire danger is lowest.

July 7th Marina Information

The Marina parking lot hours are from 6 am to 10 pm. Access to the Marina, by any means (boat, walk-in, etc) is prohibited until 6AM. Cars must be removed from all beach location parking lots after hours or they will be subject to towing.

On July 7th the Marina closes to vehicle traffic at 4 pm. The Marina parking lot usually fills up by 7 am. You will be allowed to drop off people & gear until 3 pm. The shuttle buses will begin running at 4 pm until 11 pm.

Unfortunately every year we are forced to tow vehicles parked in marked tow away zones and unauthorized areas. It is costly to the owner (\$300, or more — cash or credit card only) and it is an unpleasant ending to a fabulous day at the Marina. On the Lake

Let's Talk Fish

There have been concerns expressed about the quality of fishing in the lake, so let's talk fish. Some folks think that the dredge project had a negative effect on the fishing. Others think that people are over-fishing. Both are legitimate concerns. A fried fish doesn't do much for repopulating and providing more fish for following years. Likewise, if fish don't have a place to spawn and a place for their young to hide from predators, they stand little chance for survival. But, it's never that simple.

Let's start with the fish. I know there are rainbow trout in the lake. Every year, the lake is stocked at least twice with a couple of thousand pounds of catchable sized trout. This is what we fish biologists call a "put and take" fishery. The fish are expected to be caught and end up on the dinner table. OK, there is a chance that some of them will survive, over-winter and be a little larger and fatter the next year. I've even seen trout spawning up in Big Creek. There isn't much suitable spawning gravel up there, so I doubt there is much natural production going on. My advice for managing the trout fishery is, season well and cook in olive oil

We also have largemouth bass in the lake. This is a fish that does need a little

management to sustain. First, they need a place to make a nest and lay their eggs. The dredge project did reduce some of the shallow flats where they prefer to nest, but probably not enough to affect the overall population. One female can lay tens of thousands of eggs. It doesn't take many nests to keep the population up. They also need vegetation and suitable habitat for the babies to hide in and escape from hungry predators. This was also affected by the dredge project. The mats of vegetation that grow in the shallow coves have been reduced, but they are coming back. In the meantime, there is a lot of suitable cover in the cattails and tules. Another factor that can affect this fishery, is overfishing. During the nesting season, male bass stay near the nest and guard it ferociously. We currently don't have any special regulations to protect these fish, but I would strongly recommend that you release any bass caught in the shallows from May through July. And lastly, they need something to eat.

Any knowledgeable angler knows that bass will eat some pretty big things. I've done surveys where we pumped the stomachs of bass to see what they ate, While I didn't find any license plates or car parts (as in Jaws), I did find baby ducks, snakes and voles (gopher like creatures). In our lake, we also have plenty of other fish for the bass to fatten up on. We did an electrofishing survey on our lake in 2010. The fish are stunned to the surface by shocking them from a specialized boat... kind of like a fish-taser. We found plenty of small sunfish (bluegill, red-ear and green sunfish). We also found a lot of young bass. That tells me two things. There should be a lot of opportunities for young folks to catch feisty sunfish, and there should be a lot of young bass that will grow up and keep the bass fishery healthy.

Can we do more? Definitely! A couple of year ago, I put angler survey boxes around the lake where fisherman could comment on the fishing experience and report how many and what kind of fish they caught and kept. We might expand this program. It isn't the best scientific data because fishermen are notoriously good at fibbing (you should have seen the one that got away). This year, I also plan on doing snorkel surveys. A properly designed snorkel survey can provide solid data on species composition and sizes.

Based on the results of these studies, we can make some pretty good decisions on any actions that might be needed. If there are too many small and stunted fish, we can stock forage fish or crayfish

that will provide the needed food base. We can also explore fish limits and restrictions as long as the California Department of Fish and Game (CDFG) is supportive. We might also look at restocking the lake with fast growing bass. Back in 1985 or so, CDFG introduced the Florida strain of bass into the lake. These fish can get BIG and provide a real trophy fishery, but after a while, their genetics get watered down. And one last thing, bass do smarten up after being ripped in the lips a few times by artificial lures. Just because YOU aren't catching them, it doesn't mean they aren't there.

My advice as always is to get involved, provide constructive comments, and most of all... ENJOY YOUR LAKE.

Community Standards

Fire Safety Surprise??

I'm not fond of surprises any more than you are. But some of you may be receiving one very shortly in the mail. It's called a Notice of Non-Compliance. If you didn't follow our fire safety requirements by July 1 you will be receiving one of these surprises and a 15 day notice to bring your Lot into compliance or face a \$500 fine plus the cost of bringing your Lot into compliance.

Now if that didn't get your attention.

Most of you did a super job and PML has never looked better. Thank you for all your support in making PML a fire safe community. Now onto other topics...

You and Critters: Living with Wildlife

Wild Animals are beautiful when they're safe in their environment and we're safe in ours. When environments do overlap, the consequences can range from fear of physical harm to the spread of deadly diseases. The best Rule of Thumb – don't take chances.

Equipped with the right information and tools, most homeowners can handle their own problems and learn to live with wildlife. For example, trimming trees and shrubbery are ways of changing a habitat to make it less attractive to unwanted visitors. Many problems with wildlife are caused by attractants left in the yard – for instance, pet food, water, fruit, vegetable gardens and garbage cans. Never feed wildlife

Mountain Lions and Bears

As bear and lion habitat continue to decrease, the number of interactions between these animals and humans continues to increase. Bears are noted for destroying vegetable gardens and trees, demolishing the interiors of cabins and campers, scavenging in garbage cans and killing livestock. Good garbage control, including depriving aroma through effective wrapping and morning in lieu of night before "leave outs" will reduce the enticements for animals. Remember, access to food takes the "wild" out of wildlife. Mountain lions are elusive and usually avoid most contact with humans. They live in areas with plentiful prey on which to feed such as deer. They are also predators of sheep, goats and domestic pets. Maintaining your property free of dense foliage where they can hide and avoiding plants that deer like to eat can make your property unattractive to the mountain lion and hence less likely for you to have an encounter.

Raccoons

Raccoons are easily attracted to food sources like garden produce, garbage and pet food. To help prevent scavenging, use metal trash cans that are fastened to a pole or other solid object. A strap, latch or tight fitting bungee cord that secures the lid of the garbage can is also helpful. They will also inhabit chimneys, attics, basements and sheds. Make sure to properly secure doggie doors, window screen doors and vents. Use of ammonia in or around the area of concern should discourage the animal from returning. Raccoons are considered primary carriers of rabies, raccoon round worm and other potentially dangerous infections and diseases so keep children and pets at a distance. In the event a raccoon enters your property, leave an escape route between yourself and the raccoon as they can get hostile when cornered. Open windows and doors to allow the animal to escape. Do not chase the animal out, as this will cause the animal to behave defensively, possibly resulting in injury to you or the animal.

Having wildlife neighbors can be complex. Once problems develop, resolution can be costly and restricted by environmental laws. Many problems can be avoided through learning to live in harmony among wild animals. Always remember, YOU are the visitor. If you have questions or concerns contact the Dept of Fish and Game at (559) 243-4005. The following is a proposed new resolution. The purpose of the resolution is to establish rules and guidelines for the newly installed water ski slalom course on the Lake. This serves as notice of Board decision to enact these rules now to test and make adjustments as necessary. Members are welcome to provide input to the Board regarding these new rules and may do so through email at pmlaboard@pinemountainlake.com or in person at the monthly Board

meeting.

The resolution will be considered for amendment or final adoption by the Board of Directors at the Board meeting to be held at the Lake Lodge on Saturday, July 21, 2012. The meeting is scheduled to start at 9 a.m. and all PMLA members are welcome to attend.

The water Ski Club in conjunction with the Marina manager will recommend usage and safety guidelines to the General Manager for the daily use of the newly installed sinkable water ski slalom course. These guidelines will be made part of the Good Neighbor Rules and will be available at the Marina.

To use the water ski course boats must request use of the course when they make a water ski reservation.

All competition ski boats will be eligible to run the course. Other boats wanting to run the course are required to have a maximum width of 92 inches at the water line.

INITIAL GUIDELINES:

SIGNUP & CHECKING-IN

Ski Boats wanting to use the course will signup at the Marina Office and check-in with the Boat Patrol prior to entering the ski circle as per the regular PML Boating and Lake Rules.

USAGE

If there are any other skiers ACTIVLEY skiing in the larger ski circle the course is a one-way course with skiers starting from the Lake Lodge end. The skier should be dropped at the end of the course, picked up and brought to the starting end of the course to run the course again. If another boat is waiting to use the course they can take their pass through the course while the first boat returns at a wake-less speed.

Please be very wake sensitive while the course is in use.

Boats pulling skiers using the larger ski circle while the course is in operation are requested to stay clear of the course if a skier is running the course.

One boat at a time may use the course. If the skier falls before the fourth turn buoy, the driver should pick-up the skier and bring them back to the re-start of the course otherwise the pass is considered complete. After three falls the next boat gets a turn. If there are other boats waiting to use the course, a maximum of two passes and the next boat gets a turn. A pass is defined as traversing the course once in any direction.

Multiple passes may only be taken if there are no other boats fast boating in the ski circle.

The course waiting area is located outside the ski circle at the lake lodge end of the lake. Please stay clear of the route that the Water Taxi uses.

Boats exiting the course shall keep clear of the course and drive at a wake-less speed if there are other boats using the course.

DRIVING THE COURSE

To get used to driving the course, have your observer watch your prop wash when traveling through the sets of buoys, and tell you when the wash is in the center. Next, look for the next right-hand guide buoy. Follow it down the right edge of the boat until it disappears from sight. The point where it disappears is where you want every buoy to disappear while driving through the course.

Do not make power turns in the course. When performing power turns, the rope catches buoys and tears up the course. You also send rollers down the course. When a skier falls, throttle back, and turn around at an idle before returning to your skier and pull in the rope as soon as possible. Watch the rope as you turn so it does not hang up on the buoys. As a general rule you always want your boat up on plane or at a slow idle while in the course. Plowing creates large rollers.

DRIVING AROUND THE COURSE AREA

Always operate your boat at a very slow idle when you are around the course. This does not necessarily mean that your boat idle is slow enough. Bumping your boat in and out of gear will produce the desired wake-less effect. Never enter the course traveling in a path that is perpendicular to the length of the course. Always enter at a parallel path down the course. When approaching the course, please help minimize wakes in the course by going wake-less.

12 **ADMINISTRATION**

The following document is a draft amendment to Board Resolution # 01.16,

GOLF COURSE POLICIES AND PROCEDURES

The purpose of the amendment is to update the resolution for current operational practices and policies. This serves as notice to all members that the amendment is under consideration by the Board of Directors and was discussed on June 16, 2012 at a duly noticed monthly meeting.

Please note: The following CC&R provision, Article VIII, Section 1. (j) may be added to this draft amendment upon approval by the Board at the July 21, 2012 Board meeting, "Owners of lots adjacent to the golf course shall permit entrance upon their lots in order to permit retrieval of a player's golf ball."

The main effect and change in this draft is a clarification of the current rules to bring them in accordance with changes that have occurred in the operation of the Golf Course over the last 10 years. The draft is hereby published for member review and comment. Members should note that the draft amendment is scheduled for final consideration and adoption at the July 21, 2012 monthly Board meeting. The location of the meeting is the PMLA Lake Lodge and is scheduled to start at 9 a.m.

PINE MOUNTAIN LAKE ASSOCIATION GOLF COURSE POLICIES & PROCEDURES

A. GOLF COURSE HOURS AND USE

- 1. The Pine Mountain Lake Golf Course is open seven (7) days per week, year round, except: i. Christmas Day
 - ii. On approximately the 3rd Monday and Tuesday in the months of April and September for greens aeration.
- 2. The golf course may be closed by the joint decision of the Head Golf Professional or Assistant Professional and the Golf Course Superintendent or Assistant Superintendent with proper notification to the General Manager. Closure is based on unsafe conditions for players and possible damage to the facility. Golf cart use restrictions may be imposed to limit damage to the facility.
- 3. Hours of Operation
 - i. Hours of operation are established by the Board of Directors with advice from the General Manager and the Golf Professional.
 - ii. Normal Hours Golf Shop Operation:
 - a. Pacific Daylight Time One hour prior to the first tee time 6:00 p.m.
 - b. Pacific Standard Time 8:00 a.m. 5:00 p.m.
- 4. Twilight begins at 2:00 p.m. all year round
- 5. Player Registration
 - i. All players are required to register in the Golf Shop at least 30-minutes prior to play and pay the appropriate fees.
- 6. Starting Play
 - i. Starting the Monday after daylight savings time begins, until the Sunday before the end of daylight savings time ends, tee times are assigned at 9-minute intervals from the first tee. The Golf Shop Starter is in control of the tee, and no players are to start without being called to the tee. Tournaments, special events, and holiday weekends may require other starting methods to maximize golf course use.
 - ii. From the Monday at the end of daylight savings time through Sunday before daylight savings time begins the play format will be an 11:00 a.m. Shotgun.
 - iii. Thanksgiving Day is a 10:00 a.m. shotgun.
 - iv. Play will start at 9:00am from the start of PDT until the first Sunday of April.
 - v. Play will start at 8:00am from the first Monday of April to the first Sunday of May.
 - vi. Play will start at 7:00am from the first Monday of May to the first Sunday of September.
 - vii. Play will start at 8:00am from the first Monday of September to the first Sunday of October.
 - viii. Play will start at 9:00am from the first Monday of October to the end of PDT.
 - ix. Earlier tee times may be prearranged with the Head Golf Professional.

B. ETIQUETTE AND GENERAL RULES

- 1. All divots must be replaced or sanded, ball marks on the greens must be repaired, and bunkers raked after use.
- 2. Practice is allowed in designated practice areas only.
- 3. Five-somes are not permitted unless prearranged with the Head Golf Professional and/ or the Assistant Golf Professional. If the five-some cannot or will not keep pace with the group in front of them, they will be split into two groups. Opportunities for future five-somes may be denied if the group does not maintain pace of play.
- 4. Golf Course grounds are limited to playing golf only. No walkers, joggers, athletic events or unauthorized vehicles are allowed on the grounds.
- 5. Range balls are for use exclusively on the driving range tee and practice greens.
- 6. No pets are allowed on the golf course.
- 7. No swimming, fishing or wading is permitted in designated water hazards (reclaimed wastewater).
- 8. There are no refunds, rain-checks or snow-checks once a player has begun his/her round of golf.
- 9. Players causing damage to houses or other personal property are responsible for that damage.
- 10. No foul or abusive language.
- 11. Refer to Inside and Outside Tournament Play for food and beverage restrictions. Refer to Section F. 1. ix thru xi.

C. DRESS CODE FOR PINE MOUNTAIN LAKE GOLF COURSE

1. All clothing must be neat and clean in appearance at all times. Appropriate golfing attire is required for users of the Golf Course and is defined as follows:

i. Blue denim or cotton sweat pants are not permitted on the golf course.

ii. Men:

- a. Tops: Collared shirts are required. Mock turtlenecks, both short and long sleeved are acceptable. No T-shirts, tank tops or muscle shirts will be allowed.
- b. Pants & Shorts: Shorts must be no shorter than mid-thigh in length. No cut-offs or swimsuits.
- iii. Women:
 - a. Tops: T-shirts are permitted as well as sleeveless tops with a minimum 4" shoulder strap. No tank tops or half shirts.
 - b. Pants & Shorts: Shorts must not be shorter than mid-thigh in length. No cut-offs or swimsuits.
- iv. Shirts and non-metal spiked shoes are necessary at all times on the golf course and practice areas.
- v. T-shirts and blue denim are permitted on the practice areas at PMLGC. Practice areas are defined as the driving range, the chipping green and the putting green.

D. PACE OF PLAY AND MARSHALLING

- 1. Players will be required to maintain the pace of play. (Maximum round should be 4 _ hours for 18 holes and 2 _ hours for 9 holes e.g. 15 minutes per hole.)
- 2. Players falling more than one hole or 15 minutes behind will be given their first warning and asked to either increase their pace of play or allow the faster groups to play through.
- 3. After a second warning for slow play, the Marshall will request that the group either move aside, allowing faster players through, or "skip" the next hole to get back to their proper position on the golf course.
- 4. Flagrant violations of Golf Course Policy or continued slow play will result in removal from the Golf Course and possible restriction of playing privileges.
- 5. The Golf Course will be marshaled when play and conditions warrant it.
- 6. "Ready Golf" should be employed when it is safe and appropriate. See appendix A for definition of ready golf.

E. GOLF CART RULES

- 1. Players using golf carts will be held financially responsible for any damage to the cart.
- 2. Property Owners are assuming responsibility for the golf cart upon checking in and must return it in the same condition as issued.
- 3. All non-property owners renting carts must sign the cart rental agreement.
- 4. Rental and use of a PML Golf Cart is at the Renter's risk. The Renter will hold Pine Mountain Lake Association and its employees harmless for any and all injuries or damage to any person(s) or property arising from the use of the golf cart. The Renter will use care and precaution necessary to prevent injury to the renter, to others, or damage to the cart or other PML property. No one under age 18 may rent a cart. Age 16 or older may drive a cart, with a valid driver's license.
- 5. The Renter of the cart must be one of the riders in the cart.
- 6. Cart capacity is limited to two persons and two sets of clubs. Only paid riders and their clubs may use the golf cart. The Renter will not allow walking golfers to ride in the cart or on the back of the cart, or place clubs on the cart.
- 7. Golf cart use is mandatory for guests and public play on weekends until twilight time. Golf cart use is mandatory for all play on all holiday weekends.
- 8. Golf carts must remain on the cart paths around all tees and greens.
- 9. Weather permitting; golf carts may be driven across the fairways at 90 degrees. (Drive your cart on the paths and in the rough, crossing 90 degrees to the ball).
- 10. Golf carts may not be driven past the cart signs on the fairways (unless occupant has a blue flag).
- 11. Players using carts must observe posted "no cart areas".
- 12. Carts must not be driven outside the boundaries of the course.
- 13. "Blue Flag" Policy
 - i. Members and Guests must present the Head Golf Professional yearly with a letter from a physician stating the reason for special use of the golf cart or provided a Medical Card to be copied and kept on file.
 - ii. When carts are allowed off of the cart paths "Blue Flag" holders may drive carts beyond signs that direct carts off the fairway. "Blue Flag" holders should observe posted "No Cart Area" signs and should stay 30-feet from all tees, greens, and bunkers.
 - iii. Blue Flag holders shall not take the cart out on fairways that have been restricted to "cart paths only".
- 14. Personal (1 bag) carts must be kept 20 feet from all tees, greens, and bunkers

F. GOLF COURSE USE PRIVILEGES AND APPLICABLE RATES

1. Regular Play

- i. Property Owners
 - a. All Association Members in good standing may use the golf course at Property Owner rates.
 - b. Children that are 17-years of age and younger, and live at home are considered Association Members and pay property owner fees.
 - c. Holidays are defined as New Years Day, Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day and the day after Thanksgiving. If a holiday falls on a weekday it is both a holiday and weekday for golf annual purchasers.

ii. Guests

a. Guests of Association Members may use the golf course. To receive guests' rates Association members must play with their guests or they must contact the Pro Shop and provide their Unit, Lot number and phone number.

iii. Public

a. The Public may use the golf course at public rates.

iv. Replay Policy

- a. Players may be allowed to replay the Golf Course when space is available with approval of the Golf Professional. A reduced green fee and regular cart fees will be charged.
- v. Professional Courtesy Play
 - a. PGA and LPGA Members, Golf Course Superintendents, General Managers and Directors from other clubs may use the golf course. These players must be approved by the Head Golf Professional or the General Manager.
 - b. Green fees are waived, and Guest cart fees are charged unless waived by the General Manager and/or the Head Golf Professional.
- vi. Employee Play
 - a. If times are available prior to twilight on the day the employee wishes to play the Golf Shop may accommodate their request.
 - b. Loss of playing privileges shall result if an employee violates any Golf Course Policies and Procedures.
 - c. A Department Manager may choose to set up a golf outing for his/her staff. This may be done through the Golf Professional.
 - d. Employees must wear proper golf attire. Work uniforms are not acceptable.
 - e. Tee times may not be made more than 5 days in advance.
 - f. Employees and their families' use privileges are governed by the PMLA Employee Manual.
- vii. Special Business Guests
 - a. Special Business Guests may play when authorized by the General Manager and/or the Head Golf Professional.
 - b. Fees may be waived at the discretion of the General Manager and/or the Head Golf Professional.
- viii. PML Organized Groups
 - a. Pine Mountain Lake Men's Club may use the golf course for special events that are approved by the Head Golf Professional.
 - b. The Pine Mountain Lake 18-Hole Ladies Club may use the golf course for special events that are approved by the Head Golf Professional.
 - c. The Pine Mountain Lake 9-Hole Men's Club may use the golf course for special events that are approved by the Head Golf Professional.
 - d. The Pine Mountain Lake 9-Hole Ladies Club may use the golf course for special events that are approved by the Head Golf Professional.
- ix. Invitationals and waived green fee tournaments and practice rounds.
 - a. Property Owner cart fees are charged for all participants in the Mother Lode and Pine Tree Invitational with the approval of the Board of Directors.
 - b. Property owner fees are charged for non-property owner players on Women's Golf Association of Northern California (WGANC) open days, team play days and senior events with the approval of the Board of Directors.
 - c. All Food & Beverage for waived green fee tournaments must be purchased from The Grill and/or Snack Bar
- x. Inside Tournament Play
 - a. A limited number of inside tournaments are allowed each year. Tournament fees will be charged. Tournament fees are negotiable by the Head Golf Professional with approval from the General Manager.
 - b. All Food & Beverage for property owner and/or club tournaments that is consumed at the Golf Course must be purchased from The Grill and/or Snack Bar
 - c. No outside coolers will be permitted on the course without the approval of the General Manager and/or Head Golf Professional at least 14-days prior to the event.
- xi. Outside Tournament Play
 - a. A limited number of outside tournaments are allowed each year. Tournament fees will be charged. Tournament fees are negotiable by the Head Golf Professional with approval from the General Manager.
 - b. Tioga High School's Golf tournament schedule must be approved by the General Manager. Waiver of green fees for Tioga High School golf tournaments must be approved by the Board of Directors.
 - c. All Food & Beverage for outside tournaments that is consumed at the Golf Course must be purchased from The Grill and/or Snack Bar.
 - d. No outside coolers will be permitted on the course without the approval of the General Manager and/or Head Golf Professional at least 14-days prior to the event.

G. TEE TIME RESERVATIONS

1. Association Members:

i. During the Tee Time season Association Members may make tee times up to 14 days in advance by telephone only at the designated call in time.

- ii. During the Shot Gun Season Members may make tee times up to 14 days in advance by telephone only starting at 8 a.m.
- iii. Tee time reservations for Holiday Weekends are taken for all days of the weekend 14 days in advance of the first day of the holiday weekend.
 - a. Holiday weekends are defined as New Years Day, Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, and Thanksgiving Day.
- 2. Guests and Public:
 - i. During the Tee Time and Shotgun season guests and public may make tee times up to 10-days in advance.
 - ii. Tee time reservations for Holiday Weekends are taken for all days of the weekend 10 days in advance of the first day of the holiday weekend.
 - a. Holiday weekends are defined as New Years Day, Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, and Thanksgiving Day.
 - iii. Guests of Association Members may have the Member make the tee time reservation for them. (All guidelines in Section F., 1., i. & ii. apply).
- 3. No Show/Cancellation Policy
 - i. All reservations should be cancelled at least 24-hours prior to your start time
 - ii. All property owners (including annual members) will be charged the appropriate daily fee if they fail to cancel their reservation 24-hours prior.
 - iii. Under special circumstances (weather conditions, illness, etc.) the Head Golf Professional or the Assistant Professional may waive fees.
- 4. Professional Courtesy Play:
 - i. Members of the PGA, LPGA and the Superintendent's Association must contact the Head Golf Professional or Superintendent to block a starting time.
 - ii. General Managers and Directors from other private clubs must call the General Manager and/or the Head Golf Professional to block a starting time.
- 5. Special Association Business Guests:
 - i. The General Manager or Administrative Assistant may obtain starting times for special guests. Times are given on a space available basis.
- 6. PML Organized Groups
 - i. All recognized groups must submit their tournament schedule prior to the end of the year for approval by the Head Golf Professional.
- 7. Inside Tournaments
 - i. Inside Tournaments are any group (outside of the normal PML Organized Group Tournament Schedule) that is being booked, hosted, or organized by a Property Owner or a PML Organized Group Member.
 - ii. Inside tournament groups consist of 13 or more players
 - iii. All inside groups will be contracted with deadlines, due dates, and deposits clearly defined.
 - iv. All inside groups are to be approved by the Head Golf Professional.
 - v. Inside tournaments may schedule events after PML Organized Group schedules have been approved by the Head Golf Professional.
 - vi. Golf carts are mandatory for all inside tournaments.
- 8. Outside Tournaments
 - i. Outside tournament groups consist of 13 or more players
 - ii. All outside groups will be contracted with deadlines, due dates, and deposits clearly defined.
 - iii. All outside groups are to be approved by the Head Golf Professional.
 - iv. Outside tournaments may schedule events after PML Organized Group schedules have been approved by the Head Golf Professional.
 - v. Outside tournament groups are required to have their food and beverage service provided by either The Grill or the Snack Shack.
 - vi. Golf carts are mandatory for all outside tournaments.
- 9. Men's and Ladies' Day (During the Tee Time Months)
 - i. PML Men's Golf Club
 - a. Wednesdays from the start of play until 11:00 a.m.
 - ii. PML Ladies Golf Club
 - a. Thursdays are Ladies' Days
 - b. 9:00 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. (when first time is at 9:00 a.m.)
 - c. 8:00 a.m. to 10:30 p.m. (when the first tee time is 8:00 a.m. or earlier)
 - iii. 9-Hole Men
 - a. Wednesday are reserved for 9-Hole Men
 - b. March June will start Wednesday at 12:00 Noon with tee times
 - c. July August will start Wednesday at 7:30 a.m. in a shotgun
 - iv. 9-Hole Ladies

- a. Thursdays are also reserved for the 9-Hole Ladies Club. The 9-Hole Ladies Club uses the back nine holes.
- b. The last Thursday of each month the 9-Hole ladies will use the front nine.
- v. Unused or unfilled times may be filled with property owners, guests and or public play.
- vi. The nines may be reversed whenever Golf Course Operations require it.

H. RULES AND POLICY VIOLATIONS

- 1. Violations of Golf Course policies and procedures may result in removal from the Golf Course and possible loss of playing privileges.
- 2. Further action may be taken in accordance with Pine Mountain Lake Association's current Enforcement Procedures Policy. This document is available at the Pine Mountain Lake Association Office.

I. CLUB STORAGE AND LOCKER FACILITIES

- 1. The club storage facility is used for storing clubs and articles likely to be in golf bags only (no valuables).
- 2. Property Owners using the club storage facility may store one golf bag and its contents (no loose items may be stored unless they are properly stowed in the golf bag)
- 3. Apparel locker facilities are not intended for golf club storage.

Appendix A

READY GOLF GUIDELINES

- 1. BE AWARE-Watch yours and your playing partner's tee shots. When you see where the ball has come to rest pick a landmark (tree, bush, cart sign, etc.) to help you remember the area where the shot came to rest.
- 2. BE PREPARED-On the way to the shot, start thinking about how far the ball is from the green or your next target and which club or clubs you will be most likely to use. Take 2 or 3 clubs with you to the ball.
- 3. BE ON THE BALL-If you are playing with another golfer or a whole four-some, once someone is at their ball, walk or ride over to yours so that by the time they hit their shot you are ready to hit yours. This will also give you more time to decide and commit to a shot and club selection. Once they hit, you're ready. In cart play, after you hit a shot get into the cart and drive to the second player's ball. At the second player's ball replace the head cover and put the club in your bag.
- 4. PUTT OUT-Once you're on the green a good rule to follow is continuous putting. Unless, of course, your stance would be interfering with someone else's line.
- 5. KEEP MOVING-Once your group has finished putting out, move immediately to the next tee box. Write your scores down on the next tee NOT while you are parked by the green.
- 6. KEEP POSITION-KEEP UP WITH THE GROUP IN FRONT OF YOU. This is how you know if you are out of position on the golf course. Remember; your position on the golf course is dictated ONLY by the group in front of you NOT the group behind you.

What's New at the Grill

This month's featured winery is Klinker Brick. They are doing our wine tasting dinner on July 5th, which may have passed by the time you get

the paper. But we have had a couple of their excellent Old Vine Zinfandels on our wine list for several months now. I first came upon their wines when I was visiting Twain Harte. I stopped by the local market because someone told me that they had an excellent "Local" wine selection. The following is from their website;

Five Generations of Wine Making

Steve and Lori Felten are fifth generation grape growers in the Lodi region, they continue the tradition of cultivating "Old Vine" Zinfandel vineyards that their ancestors planted in the early 1900's.

With roots in Germany, Russia and later the Dakotas, the family settled in Lodi, first producing watermelons. Recognizing that the soil and climate were ideal for growing grapes, they began to plant varieties that included Zinfandel, Tokay, Carignane, and Alicante. For over one hundred years, the family bas cultivated the land with the aim of producing top quality fruit. Zinfandel was one of the first grape varieties to be planted in the Lodi appellation, although it had also been established in other parts of the California.

Grapes were originally packed in boxes for shipment to the East Coast and Canada for the purpose of bome winemaking. In the early days of production, nearly all of the Zinfandel grapes were shipped with the exception of grapes that were used for making wine at home.

By the mid 1930's, grapes were sold primarily to cooperatives and larger, private wineries with a small portion of the production shipped east.

Historically, the vineyards were irrigated by flood or ditch irrigation and the inability to regulate the amount of water applied resulted in

larger yields of marginal quality. In the late 1980's, drip irrigation was introduced, providing the ability to control the amount of water applied to each vine. This resulted in the ability to control the vigor of the vine, bealthier fruit and ultimately, lower yields. With the introduction of more sophisticated vineyard practices, including shoot thinning, leaf pulling, color thinning and the removal of a second crop, the ability to produce the grapes of exceptional quality was realized.

Part of the extended Felten Family includes their winemaker, Barry Gnekow, who is responsible for crafting the wines from the inaugural vintage. Barry, a Davis graduate with over 25 years of experience of winemaking, has a unique ability to bring the best of the vineyard into the cellar, year after year, producing wines of distinction for Klinker Brick.

Another extended family member is Lynne Wbyte Barnard, the President of Klinker Brick Winery. Lynne bas brought a wealth of entrepreneurial experience to the winery, baving owned her on wholesale company and directing sales and marketing for prestigious wine producers in California. She was instrumental in the development of the Old Ghost wine, label design and has been responsible for selling all of the vintages produced to date, developing national and international distribution.

Lodi is known by some as the "Zinfandel Capital of the World". Even though its vintages have been less prestigious than those of Sonoma and Napa counties, in recent years, the Lodi Appellation has become increasingly respected for its Zinfandel wine and other eclectic varietals. After tasting Klinker Bricks Old Vine Zins you'll have to let me know what you think. Don't forget to make those reservations early 209-962-8638. It's Hot and We are Cookin' at The Grill

Summertime is in full swing, it's hot outside and we are cookin' in the kitchen. Someone turn on the air conditioning! I am sure PML residents are enjoying

spending time on the lake, kicking back at the marina or best of all a great meal with friends on our terrace. We are enjoying another very busy summer.

Summer is the optimal time for entertaining, if you are not bringing your guest to The Grill for some scrumptious dinner, this is one of my go to recipes for the BBQ. One time when this was on the grill at my house the neighbors a block away came over and invited their selves to dinner!

Grilled Tri Tip Roast with tequila marinade and Cherry tomato relish Marinate the tri-tip for at least 2 hrs.

Yield: Makes 8 servings

Ingredients

- 1/2 cup fresh lime juice
- 1/2 cup chopped fresh cilantro
- 1/2 cup olive oil
- 1/3 cup soy sauce
- 1/4 cup tequila
- 7 garlic cloves, finely chopped
- 2 teaspoons grated lime peel
- 2 teaspoons ground cumin
- 2 teaspoons dried oregano
- 1 teaspoon ground black pepper
- 2 2-pound beef loin tri-tip roasts, trimmed

Directions

Whisk first 10 ingredients in medium bowl. Using small sharp knife, pierce meat all over. Place meat in large resealable plastic bag; add marinade. Seal bag. Refrigerate at least 2 hours or overnight, turning plastic bag occasionally.

Prepare barbecue (medium-high heat). Remove meat from marinade. Discard marinade. Grill meat to desired doneness, about 10 minutes per side for medium-rare. Transfer to cutting board. Tent with foil; let stand 10 minutes. Cut diagonally across grain. Serve meat with Cherry Tomato Relish.

Grill Tip: let the meat sit for a 30 minutes to come to room temperature also this lets the marinade drip off so you won't have flare ups.

Cherry Tomato Relish

Yield: Makes 8 servings

This also great with chicken or a hearty fish like sword fish or Ahi tuna

Ingredients

- 1/4 cup balsamic vinegar
- 4 teaspoons chopped fresh oregano 3/4 cup olive oil
- 1/8 cup drained canned dice mild green chilies
- 4 green onions, finely chopped
- 4 cups halved cherry tomatoes

Directions

Whisk vinegar and oregano in medium bowl to blend. Gradually whisk in oil. Mix in green chilies and green onions. (Can be made 6 hours ahead. Cover; chill.) Add tomatoes; toss to coat. Season with salt and pepper.

Happy 4th of July! It is hard to is biodegradable and does a little less believe that we are half the way through another year. The seasons seem to be moving along faster and faster. When Uncle Milt decided to move to Pine Mountain Lake, half dome was full. Soon

it will be fall and then Christmas, then we will start the cycle all over again. The same is true with the golf maintenance crew. We are busy watering and mowing; just trying to keep up with the different things each summer brings us. We were quite fortunate to have nice weather for the Mother Lode tournament and we

hope that the ladies are as fortunate for their invitational.

On #1 fairway we experienced some decline in the turf {mostly bent grass} during the cold, dry winter we had. The area is a little slow to recover, we are sanding and fertilizing every 10 days or so to speed up the recovery.

In the approach to #11 green, we had a hydraulic hose on a greens mower fail. We did see some turf loss and will over seed and sand that damage. It wasn't a large area, it just had to be in the front of the green and approach. Our greens mowers do use a hydraulic fluid that

Most of you that are familiar with our budget process, know that all assets are given a life. When a new course is built today, the different parts of the course are

also given a life. The life given to different areas of a course by today`s standards are: greens 15-30 years, bunker sand 5-7 years, irrigation system 10-30 years, concrete cart paths 15-30 years, tees 15-20 years, practice range tees 5-10 years, pump station 15-20 years, corrugated

metal pipes or culverts 15-30 years. Most of these areas we are very close to when we plan for the future. We are currently in year two of replacing the 42 year old culverts around the course. The new irrigation system is 12 years old and has been a wonderful asset to the course. Bunker sand is scheduled for next year, this year we did need to add around 25 tons to help use through 2012. While these are educated guesses, we do see how important it is to plan ahead, so we don't get surprised in the future.

I mentioned last month that I might have some things to say about our golf professional, who is leaving us much earlier than we had hoped for. He took my game from an 8 handicap to a 14. He taught me how to hit the drive right to left, at times going back to the tee because those white stakes were on the wrong side of the golf ball. The short game! I believe this is where he helped the most. What use to take 30 to 33 putts per round and is now nearly 40. Every part of my game has seen the numbers improve, an increase with each outing. Is this bowling or what? I believe his motive to be the fact that the 18th hole was a beverage hole and he made sure who had to buy.

In reality, David you will be missed. You have been a pleasure to know and work with. You have helped make our course a better one to play. Your sense of humor and long drives always makes us smile. Much luck in the future and see you at Oakmont!

Pending Litigation News

Dear Pine Mountain Lake Association Members,

It has come to our attention that Mr. Malcolm Milliron and Ms. Wendy Greer have been circulating a letter around Pine Mountain Lake and Groveland titled "\$100,000.00 Of Your Money Wasted." As many of you may already know, Milliron's and Greer's interpretation of the pending lawsuit against them is exaggerated and just plain false. In an effort to disclose information about this matter to the Association Members, without jeopardizing privileged information and documents, the Association has the following response to Milliron's and Greer's letter.

Background: Greer's Violations of the Association's Governing Documents

Since 2009, Greer has stored garbage, rubbish, used equipment, parts and other materials on her property within the Association. She also stored boats, trailers, vehicles, construction equipment and personal items on her unimproved, vacant lot in violation of the governing documents. Contrary to the letter's statements, Greer did not have a permit or any other form of permission from the Association to store such items on any of her lots.

The Association continued to receive numerous complaints from property owners that live near the Milliron and Greer properties, demanding action be taken to enforce the governing documents.

For nearly one year, the Association sent Greer numerous notices regarding her violations of the CC&Rs and other Association governing documents. For nearly one year, the Association received no response from Greer. As a result, the Association levied fines and penalties against Greer.

Thereafter, when Greer would still not clean up both properties and had failed to pay any part of her fines/penalties, the Association had no choice to file a lawsuit against Greer for unpaid fines and penalties and for an injunction ordering Greer to clean up her two lots.

The Lawsuit and Attempts to Mediate

The lawsuit against Greer has been on-going for nearly two years now. This is mainly because Greer has taken every effort to delay the entire proceeding, waste the Superior Court's time, and cause the Association to incur significant attorneys' fees. For example, in an effort to play "catch the ball" with the Association and its attorneys, Greer transferred some interest in the two properties to both Milliron and a trust that she is trustee of. This has not only delayed the proceeding, but required the Association to bring the lawsuit against all three parties- Greer, Milliron, and Greer in her capacity as Trustee (collectively, the "Defendants"). Additionally, the Defendants have had a total of four defaults taken against them. Furthermore, despite repeated recommendations that they obtain counsel to efficiently defend themselves, Greer and Milliron have refused to. Moreover, despite the Association's repeated statements that a trustee must be represented by counsel, Greer has only obtained an attorney in the past few months. (Note that the attorney does not represent all three Defendants, just Greer in her capacity as Trustee, which means that the Association's counsel has to deal with three people now- Greer, Milliron, and the trustee's counsel.)

With respect to the mediations, Greer and Milliron were correct in stating that the parties attended to mediations. However, this was not at the insisting of either Greer or Milliron, but was ordered by the Superior Court. And, during each mediation, the parties agreed to the basic settlement terms, only to have Greer and Milliron renege on their agreements once they were expressed in writing by the Association's counsel.

The Clean-Up and Legal Fees

In late 2011, after initiating and going through with this lawsuit for over one year, Greer and Milliron finally cleaned up their properties. However, this was only after the Association had already incurred over approximately \$60,000 in attorneys' fees. In response, the Association has decided that it will continue with the suit so that it may rightfully collect its attorneys' fees from Milliron and Greer.

Greer's and Milliron's Real Agenda

I would like to remind our Members that homeowners' associations exist so that people with common interests and the common goal of keeping their properties aesthetically appealing (and, thereby, maximizing their property values) can live in a community that fosters those same ideas. Greer's, and now Milliron's, failure to maintain their properties in a manner that comports with the Association's governing documents not only compromises the integrity of such documents, it has an effect on all of the Association's Member's property values.

Furthermore, Greer's and Milliron's only real interest is to drive up the Association's legal costs. In delaying the legal proceedings, and refusing to settle, Milliron and Greer are intentionally causing the Association to extend more in legal fees. As stated, the Association must continue with this legal proceeding in order to collect its attorneys' fees. Milliron and Greer, by and through their letter, hope that the Association will dismiss their lawsuit-which would not only jeopardize the Association's governing documents but would mean that the Association would not be able to collect one penny of its now nearly \$100,000 in legal fees.

The bottom line is that Greer and Milliron forced the Association into this situation by not following the rules. Greer and Milliron had an opportunity to settle the matter and reneged on the agreement. Greer and Milliron are the ones driving up our legal costs unnecessarily. The Association has been fair and reasonable throughout this entire situation, and now Greer and Millirion would have you believe that the Association is to blame. Don't you believe it!

When you locate the balls, they are very close together, and it turns out that you are both playing identical balls, and neither of you had marked your ball in any way. There is no way to know for sure which ball is yours. What is the correct procedure?

Both rules 6-5 and 12-2 state that it is the player's responsibility to play the proper ball, and that the player should put an identification mark on his ball. Since neither of you has put such a mark on your ball, and you therefore cannot identify your ball, both balls are considered lost. Rule 27-1 applies, and you must take a penalty stroke and replay your tee shot.

Until next month, put your drives in the fairway, your putts in the hole and have fun out there.

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Groveland Area Fishing Report

the South and Middle Fork of the Tuolumne River are already in great shape and providing some terrific dry fly and nymph fishing, with the

South Fork flowing at 36 CFS and the Middle Fork flowing at 41 CFS. We have blue winged olives, pale morning duns, and some caddis and stoneflies emerging on the South and Middle Forks of the and our best Rainbow. producing flies have



been Parachute Adams, E/C Caddis, Elk Hair Caddis, Black Copper Johns, and Bead Head Hare's Ears - all in size 16.

The main stem of the Tuolumne is just coming into shape for fly fishing at "Early Intake", and Lumsden should be fishable soon as well. For bait and lure fisherman, "Lumsden" is already a good area to target larger rainbows and browns. Local fisherman Rick Martinez recommends Panther Martin Salamander Spinners or mini crawlers for river fishing.

Pine Mountain Lake provides good fishing for Rainbow Trout, Largemouth Bass, Black Crappie, and Bluegill. All species except Bluegill will be hanging out deeper by July and for fly fisherman, black, olive, or rust colored Beadhead Seal Buggers or Crystal Buggers in size 8 are a good choice for the trout, bass, crappie, or the occasional monster bluegill. Nearly any smaller fly will take Bluegill in the shallows and it is a great opportunity to get the kids into fishing. Bait fisherman can use red worms for Bluegill and Crappie; night crawlers for Bass, Crappie, and Trout; and powerbait for Trout. Bass anglers are finding action at 15-20 feet deep during the day and they are best fished with rubber worms in crawdad colors, rigged Carolina style. Some top water action is available early and late, using chug bugs or buzz baits.

PML Trout fishing has been tougher since dredging last year, but the lake was planted last month, and

As of this writing, flows on local angler, Paul Pieretti, has been doing well by trolling Powerbait (yes, Powerbait) behind flashers. Apparently, Paul is as creative in fishing as we know him to be

> in poker. He likes rainbow, orange, or white powerbait with glitter and scent. More traditional boat fishing methods that work at Pine Mountain Lake are trolling a night crawler, Kastmaster, or Needlefish behind flashers. By July, the fish should be

around 30 feet deep. Morning and late afternoon to dusk are the best times to fish for trout. For bank fisherman, Fisherman's Cove is a good location to target all species. Another option is to rent a boat at PML Marina (http://www.pinemountainlake. com/Marina~334979~21389.htm), which opens up the entire lake to fishing for you. Near the dam is a good location to target Trout, while the Bass and Bluegill can be found anywhere.

Paul Belluomini is our local lake fishing guide for Lake Don Pedro and reports that Kokanee Salmon and Rainbow Trout are on the bite at 30-50 feet depths. Silver/Blue Needlefish or Excel Lures with Garlic or Kokanee Special Scent are good producers. Rick Martinez adds that he likes to use a pink or orange "Uncle Larry's Spinners" with a piece of night crawler on the hook. King Salmon are at 25-90 feet and can be taken with "rolling shad". Hatch Creek Area and Middle Bay are good areas to fish. Water temp is 75

What Is Anger? - Part 1

"I get so mad I could" Does this phrase sound familiar to you? Among the many feelings that we experience, anger is one of the most complex and confusing. Anger is a powerful emotion. It is not a behavior. It gets people's attention and it can mobilize us to deal with problem situations. It can have a positive effect like giving you strength or determination to keep going when things get tough. "I'm mad that I got a failing grade on my math test but I'll have to study harder," high school senior, Mike complained.

On the other hand, anger can be a disruptive and destructive force in its effects on ourselves and others. Unfortunately, when anger jacks up your blood pressure you may act on impulse which can lead to aggression which is an action that causes harm. Being upset is one thing; hurting someone is a different matter with serious and often regretful consequences.

Because anger does have some positive aspects, you might not always recognize when it has become a problem for you. The aspects of anger reactions that could indicate that anger has become a problem are: frequency, intensity, duration, and form of expression.

Some things would make anybody angry, but when routine situations and minor things are making you angry, it's probably happening too often. It is understandable to get angry if things are not going exactly the way you want them to, but it may not be a necessary, appropriate or useful response.

It is important to notice how often you are getting angry and distinguish those times when it is all right to be angry, from those times when it serves no purpose.

High intensity anger is almost never useful. When you get really mad or "lose your temper," you say or do things that you later regret. High levels of anger not only lead you to act on impulse and prevent you from thinking clearly.

High levels of anger are a stress on the body. During anger your blood pressure rises, the heart beats faster, blood sugar increases and muscles become tense. This causes unnecessary wear and tear on the body. Scientific studies have found that recurrent anger contributes to a number of serious illnesses, including heart disease and hypertension among others.

The duration of anger can also be a problem. When you hold on to it and relive it over and over in your mind, it interferes in many aspects of your life. It also becomes easier to get angry all over again when something else goes wrong.

When anger turns to aggression it often gets you in trouble. Wanting to clobber somebody and actually doing it are two different things. Sometime you might jump all over someone for offending you because it is the only way you know how to act. Verbal aggression, like name calling, and physical aggression, like hitting, are ineffective ways of dealing with conflict. They hurt other people and have a way of backfiring on you.

When anger interferes with doing a good job or making it hard for people to relate to you, then it starts to have a high cost. It can prevent you from concentrating on your work, cause you to make mistakes, and keep you from being satisfied with your life. Anger pushes people away and makes it difficult for them to like you. When it is directed at your family and friends, it not only hurts them, it reduces their interest in being supportive of you and can destroy relationships. "I divorced my husband because he was always angry and it scared me," the wife stated.

In learning about anger we must learn to minimize the negative effects and maximize the positive ones. Anger is often misused as a way to solve problems. We think that if we shout loud and long enough, then the other person will do what we want. In the words of Dr. Phil, "How is that working for you?" Is fear the response you are looking for? Let's look for a better way.

The students are given a lesson and demonstration of how and why Truss Bridges are used in today's design world. They learn the attachment with Mathematics and the real world this project has. Students see real life examples of bridges and study why certain shapes are used in terms of load and weight distribution. The upper

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Saturn - A Wandering Star with Rings

July is a great month to write about the planet Saturn because it shines prominently in our night time sky. Saturn is easily visible to the unaided eye. It looks like a bright star, slightly orange in color, and is easy to identify as a planet because it doesn't "twinkle" like the stars do. The Sun, moon, and naked eve visible planets all travel approximately the same ecliptic path in the sky from our point of view on Earth. Because our solar system is almost flat it forms a plane. This plane is called the ecliptic of our solar system. Look for Saturn, as well as other bright planets like Jupiter and Mars to travel the ecliptic of our solar system throughout the year. Just remember the path that the sun and moon travels in the sky as a guide to look for planets, like Saturn. In ancient times, astronomers could see that there were some "stars" that moved across the sky differently as compared to other "stars". Early Greek astronomers called these objects "planets" or wandering stars. Back then, everyone believed that all the planets, the Moon, the Sun and even the stars orbited around the Earth.

During the month of July, Saturn appears high in the night sky crossing the meridian at about 7 PM, when it's still too light out to see it. The meridian is the imaginary line that connects the North Pole, passing overhead, to the South Pole. This means that by the time the sky gets dark in July, Saturn will appear overhead traveling along the ecliptic path, and will set in the west a little after midnight. There are several Web sites that show the current position of Saturn (and the other planets) in the sky. You can use these resources to find an accurate position for Saturn.



Saturn is the sixth planet from the Sun and the second largest planet in the Solar System, after Jupiter. Along with the planets Jupiter, Uranus, and Neptune, it is classified as a gas giant planet which means it is comprised mostly of hydrogen. It is believed that a small core of rock and ice lies at the center of the planet. In diameter, Saturn is almost 10 times the size of Earth. In Roman mythology, Saturn is the god of agriculture and is the root of the English word "Saturday".

Saturn's system of rings, consisting mostly of ice particles with a smaller amount of rocky debris and dust, are visible with a small telescope. These rings are huge, they would cover twothirds the distance from the earth to the moon. Saturn's atmosphere consists of bands of clouds, similar to the planet Jupiter, that can be seen on a clear night with a reasonable (6 inch aperture or more) size telescope. One interesting thing about Saturn is that it is less dense than water – this means it would float on top of a very large body of water.

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Saturn is so great to observe because its rings make it so recognizable – it is probably one of the most photographed planets in our solar system. This image was taken from Pine Mountain Lake with telescope equipment that I had set up in my driveway. Almost without exception, a first time viewer of Saturn exclaims "wow – I can really see the rings".

As described in previous articles, most images that I take are long exposures. Imaging bright planets like Jupiter or Saturn is an exception. Because these planets are so bright, long exposure times are not needed. What is needed are clear skies with minimal atmospheric turbulence (for a clear, crisp image) and high magnification. This can be accomplished with the use of a webcam that has been modified to replace the evepiece of a telescope. The advantage of shooting video with a webcam, instead of still images with a camera, is that you can capture many (often 10 to 30) frames per second. Because our atmosphere, which is the air that you look through when you view with a telescope, is constantly changing, brief periods of exceptionally calm conditions can be captured with this webcam video technique. Then, using computer software, the best (most sharp) frames from the video can be stacked to form still images that rival

the best images taken from professional telescopes and camera equipment only a decade ago.

The image shown here is an "aligned and stacked" image from the best 67 of 445 frames of video. Very little other post-processing was done to this image other than some sharpening. Several of Saturn's atmospheric cloud bands are clearly visible as well as, of course, those magnificent rings.

Get Wet!

In therapy we often hear from our patients how hard it is to get started back into exercise, especially if you have painful joints limiting your mobility. One answer is to "get wet"! The water helps to support your body weight, taking the stress off your joints.

Exercising in water has been shown to decrease stiffness, swelling and pain, and to increase mobility, strength and function of muscles and joints. The water environment improves cardiovascular endurance, circulation and respiration. Water based exercise is so effective that it is used by professional athletes and NASA for cross training.

Another benefit of exercising in the water is that it improves balance

and coordination.

You don't need to be able to swim to exercise in the water. Stay in the shallow end of the pool, the more of your body that is submerged, the more of your weight is taken off your joints. You can also get a flotation device that fits around your waist like a belt or hang on to a "floating noodle" and jog in place.

Take two Americana singersongwriters, an indie-rock veteran of a drummer, country-born bassist, and metal-bred pedal steel player, and what do you get: the rough-hewn yet driftwood-smooth; rebel-headed, but heart-of-gold sound of *The Good Luck Thrift Store Outfit.* Likened to anything from *Old Crow Medicine Show* and *The Avett Bros.* to *Asleep at the Wheel, Bob Wills* and even *Neil Young* (depending on which live set you happen to catch) they most often defy categorization, usually settling for some hybrid of Americana, folk, rock, bluegrass, and that sweet, old country & western. They describe their efforts as trying to make good, honest, insightful music, that's not afraid of a good time and a little fun; tunes that people will move their feet to, and that also goes real well with a straight road and a long drive.

The Trespassers have been playing original, string band music together for eight years. They are most often described as a Bluegrass band, but their influence stems from many genres. Bronco Ben's songwriting is gritty and gutsy, and, though they are acoustic musicians, his compositions take them through rock, blues, gypsy jazz, and country. Andy's original songs are most often inspired by old-time music, but instead of an Appalachian feel, they have a Western twist. Andy also writes melodic banjo and fiddle tunes, heartwarming folk songs, and all sorts of dancehall numbers. Now that the election is over, it's time to get back to "full time" on County Government Issues. My thanks to Nolan Matter for keeping the contest on the high road and I wish good luck to him in his future.

I'd also like to congratulate Merlin Jones on his successful run for Mariposa County Supervisor. He has "big shoes" to fill. Lyle Turpin has always been a strong advocate for the people he represented and I am sure that Merlin will move forward in this same tradition for the people in his district. Southern Tuolumne County and Northern Mariposa County have developed a good working relationship and I look forward to working with Merlin on the issues that affect our mutual and respective interests.

In my latest article, I gave a brief outline of Board priorities in preparing of the County's annual budget. Those priorities have not changed. They remain public safety, road improvement and quality of life programs, such as libraries and recreation. It is difficult when composing a monthly article to give a timely forecast but I will do my best to present a reasonable guestimate on where we will be when we adopt our final budget in August. Unlike the State or Federal Government, the County Budget must be balanced and unfortunately we rely on State and Federal monies to fund our important programs.

Two programs that were originally funded with State and Federal monies are the Tuolumne Narcotic Task Force which is run by the Sheriff's Department, and the Victim Witness Program, run by the District Attorney's Department. Both of these programs will now have to be funded by general fund monies to keep them active.

So, how do we do it?

We will have to "cut" somewhere -either in the Sheriff's Department, District Attorney's Department or any and all other departments within the county.

It is no secret that we are in difficult economic times. In 2006/2007 the total for expenditure for all budgeted funds was \$187,936,458. In 2011/2012, that amount is \$126,447,923....a 32.7% reduction.

The challenge to find more reductions and still provide an adequate level of services is becoming increasingly more complicated.

The adoption of a County Budget has typically involved a straight two step process. The first step is the adoption of a recommended preliminary budget before the end of June each year. The second step is adoption of a final budget after a formal hearing sometime in late summer.

In recent years, due to the uncertainty of State and Federal funding and the overall state of the economy, budget planning has become a non-stop year round job. We are continually plugging the holes in one area while watching others spring up in another.

It has become necessary to take budget action sooner rather than later as delaying the inevitable will only make things worse in the following year.

So what do we do to balance the budget and still provide for essential services?

At the June 3rd Board meeting, the Board by consensus recommended a budget as generally outlined in the County Administrative Officer (CAO) Memorandum with the following modifications: 1) funding for employees facing layoff be continued through the final budget hearing; 2) funding for Victim Witness Advocates and relief Animal Control staff be continued at current levels through the final budget hearing; 3) funding to restore the trapper to full-time from the Fish and Wildlife Fund be incorporated; 4) the e-Track-it, website and video streaming software to be removed but noted as an option for restoration during the final budget hearing. The CAO is also to prepare approximately \$1,000,000 in alternatives to cut from other areas of the General Fund Budget in order to restore funding for public safety departments. These alternatives are to be returned for Board consideration by early August. The Board further agreed that no area of the budget is off limits from potential cuts.

The crux of the above direction is that no one is to be laid off or have their hours reduced until after the Final Budget Hearing in early September. This will give the Board the opportunity to consider \$1 million in alternative cuts in other areas of the General Fund budget in order to restore funding and positions in public safety departments and potentially reverse the 4 potential lay-offs and voluntary reductions.

Needless to say, the decision will be difficult. As Supervisor Pland stated at our June 3rd meeting, "there are no sacred cows" in the budget process. Cuts are going to have to be made.

On a more positive note, I want to congratulate the City of Sonora and Tuolumne County for the hard work and earnest efforts to make the "Amgen Tour" a great success. The promotion of our communities and of the many attractions that our Mother Lode has to offer has been showcased to a national and international audience. New visitors are expected to find their way into our area as a result of the Amgen Tour publicity and favorable comments of its riders and followers.

We are hopeful that two of our major attractions will find a way to stay afloat financially. With the removal of State funding to Rail Town 1897 and the Mother Lode Fair, these popular destinations are in danger of closing. The volunteers and supporters of Rail Town 1897 in Jamestown and the Friends of the Mother Lode Fair have been actively working to secure financial support to keep these attractions open. To lose either one would create additional economic hardship on many businesses. It appears that through volunteer effort, both may be able to operate a while longer.

The second weekend in June found many of us celebrating John Muir Days in both Coulterville in the morning hours and later in the day at the Highway 120 and Smith Station Road Junction at the Big Creek Meadow Ranch on the way to Yosemite. This event was enjoyed by all in attendance. Delicious food, foot stomping music, fellowship and a generally good time was the rule of the day.

The local Yosemite Chamber of Commerce office in Groveland is in full operation at its new location across from the historic jailhouse in the middle of town. It is open 7 days a week and in addition to the Chamber staff, we are fortunate to have the expert assistance of the National Park System. A representative from The Park is here to assist visitors in the exploration of our beautiful area. I'd also like to mention a changing of the guard in the Chamber staff, as well. Kristiy Brower has been the Chamber's "Gal Friday and Jack of all trades" and a fixture in running the day to day operation of the Chamber.

Recently, Kristy opened her own new business in town and she will now be a member of the Chamber and no longer "staff". I wish her the best of success in her venture. Carolyn Botell, a very active member of the community, has taken the helm and will be steering the Chamber. She has a love of the outdoors and is a great ambassador for the community. We welcome Carolyn and look forward to seeing her smilin' face chatting with the visitors that come from around the world to enjoy our historic communities.

There's a lot to love about living in Tuolumne County. We have our struggles but we meet challenges head-on and those of us in County Government will continue to do our very best to provide the services that our residents deserve.

For nearly the last four years, I have been conducting office hours in both Groveland and Lake Don Pedro. Most often I spend the time in both places making notes, reviewing paperwork and answering emails. Visits from the public have been disappointedly infrequent. I plan to continue committing time to these office hours through the remainder of the calendar year. However, I have come to the conclusion that a better use of valuable time would be to meet "by appointment" in both Groveland and Don Pedro.
