## **General Manager's Message**

#### **Board Resolution Amendments**

PML operates under the governing documents and the policies as adopted by the Board of Directors in the form of resolutions or policy statements. We have resolutions that date back to the 1970's and we evaluate these resolutions from time to time to determine if they are still applicable, useful and valid.

Over the course of a given year, we may review and evaluate 5 to 7 resolutions that need amendment or rescinding. The management team then proposes amendments to bring these resolutions up to date with current laws or standards within our community. If the resolution is outof-date and unnecessary, we propose the resolution be rescinded and archived for historical purposes.

### Golf Course Policies and Procedures Committee

The Golf Course Policies and Procedures resolution has not been amended for over 10 years, and is in need of an update. Last year, I asked our Golf Professional, David Rau to review the resolution with his staff and come up with recommendations for an amendment. Mr. Rau has completed this task and has prepared a draft for review.

Given the size and scope of the Golf Course Policies and Procedures resolution, we recommended that

the Board of Directors form an adhoc committee for the purpose of reviewing these recommendations. After the ad-hoc committee reviews the draft and comes to a consensus, they would then propose a final amendment to the Board for adoption. We felt that it was important to get members of the golfing community in the process, as these policies directly involve their recreational activity. The Board of Directors agreed and instructed staff to proceed with the solicitation of committee applications and preparation of a committee charter.

Members interested in serving on this ad-hoc committee are asked to complete a committee application and submit it to the Administration Office. These applications will be reviewed and considered by the Board of Directors at the March Board meeting. Committee applications are available at the PML Administration Office and there is a copy posted to the PML website for easy access.

#### Loose Dogs

Our members and staff continue to experience problems with loose dogs in PML. Our Dept. of Safety staff has been active in picking up the dogs and working with Animal Control, unfortunately, some dog owners do a poor job of controlling their pets. Our Community Standards department has seen an increase in enforcement actions and is working to come up with ideas to help mitigate the problem.

We are working to increase awareness among the membership of the importance of following the County leash law and PML rules. We are also considering an amendment to the dog control resolution and recommending an increase in the fine schedule to help mitigate this problem. We should have a draft within the next 60 days. If you are a dog owner, please help do your part and make sure that you observe the County leash law and the PML rules regarding pets.

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## **PMLA Money Matters**

Someone once told me that if you don't toot your own horn then who will. I have never been a big horn tooter (is that really a word?), but sometimes things happen that you can take pride in and that, frankly, deserve a bit of recognition.

Now before you think I am heading on an overblown ego trip please bear with me as I explain the reasons for this bit of self-indulgence. As many of you know the Association contracts with an outside CPA firm (SBH and Associates) to conduct an annual audit of our financial records. This audit is designed to provide a level of reassurance that your money is being handled properly and that the financial statement we present to you accurately reflect the financial position of the Association.

We just recently completed the audit for the year ending December 31, 2011. The audit includes a complete review of our internal controls, discussions with management and Board members as well as testing of our financial

records and transactions for the entire 12 month period. The audit team spends 2-3 days here prior to year end (typically in October/November) and then for the better part of a week in late January. They complete their review once they leave and have an opportunity to analyze everything they have seen during their visit. Any adjustments to our results are also presented at this time.

The net result of this audit is the issuance of an opinion letter issued by the auditors. The desired result for any organization is what is called an unqualified opinion. This means that no significant issues arose during the audit that would call into question the accuracy and completeness of the financial records. This kind of opinion assures you, the property owner, that things are being handled properly from a financial perspective. Our opinion letter this year will be an unqualified one and has been for many years.

The second result of an audit is

the issuance of a Management Letter. This letter details any deficiencies or major suggestions the auditors might have regarding our internal controls, processes and financial management. The letter is addressed to the Board for their review and possible action.

Now comes the horn tooting part of this article. Over the last six years we have, 1) not been required to make any material adjustments to our financial results. In fact any adjustments that have been required have been for less than \$1,000.; 2) received an unqualified opinion from the auditors, and finally 3) we have had no findings reported to the Board via the Management Letter. This is a big deal. Adjustments mean we have been sloppy in our record keeping. Management Letter comments/suggestions reflect poorly on an organization's operations. They indicate issues that need to be addressed and improvements that need to be made in an organization's way of doing business. In my opinion the lack of Management Letter issues and significant adjustments speaks to the high level of professionalism exhibited by the management team in general and the accounting team specifically.

While I would love to take credit for this streak of excellent audit results I can, in reality, only accept a small part of the credit for this. In fact the real reason we are so successful is due to the hard work and dedication of my team in accounting. Every day I see the efforts put in by Gene Zanoni, Michelle Ronning, Karen Peracca and Stacy Gray. These are the individuals who put the forth the effort, working tirelessly for the benefit of the Association and all of the individual property owners. The skill and dedication they bring to their tasks truly keeps things running smoothly, efficiently and, most important, accurately. They are the reason we have such a good string of audit results. My personal thanks go to each one of them for making my job a lot easier.

# Horsing Around at the Stables

I would like to take this opportunity to tell you about our trail rides. Back in May of 2005 when I first started managing the stables for Pine Mountain Lake, there were a few old and very tired horses that were used on trail rides. After taking a good look at past procedures I was convinced there was a better way. After some time and research, I

was able to locate a private contractor to take over the trail rides. That contractor is Dan Fraser. By using a private contractor, we eliminated the need for PML to own trail horses,

and pay for tack, feed, veterinary and Ferrier (horseshoeing) services.

The trails contractor is responsible for furnishing trail horses and their equipment and handling their upkeep. The contractor is paid a percentage of what is charged for each trail ride. PML stables staff takes care of all bookings and handles all monies taken in for the rides. So far, this has been a successful business partnership.

To ensure that PMLA is protected, all trail riders must first sign a waiver and release form. Riders are also required to wear a safety helmet (which is provided) and closed-toed shoes or boots. This helps protect the riders feet while on the trail. It also helps to wear long pants. To participate in a trail ride, the rider must be at least 8 years old and 44 inches tall. Riding double is not permitted. For the younger kids we can usually provide a pony ride on a horse if we receive advanced notice. Riders are instructed on what to do while riding the horses on the trails.

PML leases part of the Long Gulch Ranch and this is used for our trail

Rides are on a set schedule all year long, weather permitting. During the busy part of summer we run rides seven days a week. During slower times of the year we run trail rides on Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays. We will also schedule other days for rides with a little bit of notice. Normal ride times are 9:00 am, 11:00 am, 1:00 pm and 3:00 pm.

The cost of our trail rides is \$35.00 for a one hour ride, \$65.00 for a two hour ride, or for other rides please call the stables office. It is always a good idea to call the stables office to make a reservation for rides. The stables phone number is (209-962-8667). Happy Horsing Around!

- Pull carts shall never be parked or pulled across any approaches and/or fringes
- Avoid cutting corners with Golf Carts
- The edges around the paths are what I like to call part of the "Frame round the Picture" A great frame can make a great picture even greater

#### FOLLOWING COURSE SIGNAGE

- Cart signs in fairways extend and include through the rough
- Driving around the signs or cutting inside them defeats the purpose and destroys sensitive areas that are meant to be protected
- Never driving beyond the signs in the rough and/or fairways ensures a healthier more appealing looking golf course.

### PACE OF PLAY

- Always keep up with the group in front of you
- If you can't see the group in front For now we have TaylorMade, Cobra-

need to catch up.

- Never look back to gage your pace; the group behind you does not dictate your pace, the group ahead does
- Keep an eye on your partners shots. Helps avoid prolonged searches for those sneaky, hiding golf balls and keeps everybody's attention on the game and makes the round more enjoyable

#### **PLAYING "READY GOLF"**

- Take 3-clubs with you to avoid unnecessary trips back and forth to the cart
- Avoid excessive practice swings; save energy and time and take them while you're waiting
- Get to your golf ball before it's your turn to hit
- Mark your scores on the next tee; this allows the group behind you to continue playing and gets your group out of potential harm's way

This is OUR golf course. We are the ambassadors and caretakers. Following these guidelines will allow us to continue to improve playing conditions and have more enjoyable rounds for us and our guests while adding to the overall value and attractiveness of our course to new golfers and potential property owners. #### **LESSON CORNER – Telling The Honest Truth About Uneven Lies**

One of the best defenses that PML Golf Course has is its hilly terrain. Here are a few quick tips on how to deal with those difficult shots that you'll inevitably come across:

- **Down Hill Lie** Play the ball back in your stance - aim left as the tendency is to push or fade the ball right
- Up Hill Lie Play the ball forward in your stance – avoid falling back - aim right as the tendency is to pull the ball left
- **Ball above the feet** Play the ball slightly back in your stance – aim right as the tendency is to pull the ball left - take one less club to compensate for a gain in distance

due to a lower hooking trajectory as a result of a flatter swing plane

Ball below the feet - Flex your knees and maintain that flex to allow yourself to get down to the ball - your swing will be a little more upright – aim left as the tendency is to push or fade the ball right - take one more club to compensate for a loss in distance

For all of these uneven lies, take an extra practice swing to determine where your club is impacting the ground. Swing easier to help maintain balance throughout the swing. This will help ensure a cleaner strike on the golf ball.

## **Hiking and Walking Trails**

The Pine Mountain Lake hiking and walking trails have been expanded, improved, and are receiving some greatly deserved embellishments. Enhancements to these trails will be published in this year's PML Activity Guide, available this May. The trails will have many newly constructed trailhead kiosks, displaying trail information and seasonal notifications. Please familiarize yourself with the Trail Rules of Use, posted at the kiosks, before using the trails.

Added to the PML trail network is the Big Creek Trail at the southeastern area of our community. The trail is a 2-mile round trip, a moderate walking path, ending at the PMLA boundary. Trailhead parking is available at the north side of the Big Creek Bridge on Pine Mountain Drive. The trail is accessed at the trailhead gate, and travels for a mile along Big Creek on the old Hetch Hetchy railroad grade. Please use the mandated diversion trail which leaves the railroad grade, runs below the grade, and along the creek for a short distance. This is



necessary in respect to private property and homes along the old railroad grade. There are resting benches on the trail, no restrooms facilities, and be sure and carry drinking water.

The Rock Canyon Trail has been enhanced with the completion of the trail loop. This trail is accessible from the trailhead vehicle parking at Fisherman's Cove playground, and by foot from several places along Rock Canyon Way and Crescent Way. There are three foot bridges on the trail, two bridges complete the trail loop, and a bridge crosses the creek to the Tennis Courts across from the Rock Canyon Mail House. There is a picnic area mid-way on the trail, which is the connection for the trail loop.

A great amount of work has been completed for the Recreation and Trail Area in Unit 16. This is the area on the north side of PML, above the Campground, north of Ferretti Road. With the completion of the fire abatement work, the Maintenance Department has expanded the trail network here. The access roads have been graded, and a new Fenceline Trail has been added. Three picnic areas have been constructed on the trails, adding a place to rest and enjoy the view.

While the Big Creek Trail and the Rock Canyon Trail are moderate walking trails, this Recreation and Trail Area offers hiking trails which are more strenuous for the day hiker. The new Fenceline Trail is the steepest of the trails in this network, but offers a connection trail between the largest trail loops. The trails in this area will now be signed with

the official access road names. These road names will also appear on satellite mapping of this area. This will also help in emergency situations which require immediate response. Restrooms and water are available at the Campground.

Trailhead vehicle parking is available at the Campground designated parking area at the road end of Rocky Point Drive. Follow the trail use guidelines which are posted, enjoy the use of these hiking and walking areas.

Some members clean their Lots themselves, and many hire vendors to perform this work. In fact, many have the same vendors clean their Lot every year. We work closely with vendors who perform this work and we know some of the frustration members go through in this annual process.

This coming 2011-2012 fire season we would like to offer one more option to our members. It is called our "Auto Clean-up Program." For those members who choose to participate, we will have the member's Lot cleaned by a pool of approved vendors according to our standards, and have this approved amount added to the member's account.

We are always looking for ways to add value to property ownership, and this will help alleviate the worry about this annual responsibility. Members will have the opportunity to approve the bid and feel comfortable that the Lot will be cleaned on time. This option will be ideal for absentee Owners who don't visit their property on a regular basis and for Owners who just don't want to deal with it, yet know it has to be done.

## Welcome Campground Master

Campground Master? Who is the Campground Master? Did they hire a new person? Campground Master is a software program designed around campground reservation management. As many members are already aware, the Campground is one of many amenities at Pine Mountain Lake. It is utilized throughout the year by the public, members and guests of members alike. With the decline in the economy, more and more people have sought out cheaper vacation alternatives, such as camping. In turn, we have seen a sharp increase in the number of reservations at our Campground since about 2009. The Department of Safety has also become more inundated with calls from those who would like to reserve and those who are just simply inquiring. On average, Safety staff spends roughly 20 minutes on the phone or in person with a customer answering questions and completing each reservation. During the busier times of year, a few 20 minute phone calls can turn into hours spent reserving, modifying and cancelling campsite reservations.

The campground reservation system at Pine Mountain Lake has not been without evolution. Prior to 2009, the Department of Safety was utilizing a three ring binder in which reservations were recorded in a ledger and on a printed calendar. During 2009 the campground reservation system was revamped and converted to a similar setup in Microsoft Excel. As many of you know, Excel's main function is strictly for collecting and analyzing raw data. These rudimentary Excel spreadsheets were designed in the hopes that a separate software system would prove unnecessary. With the increase in reservations we have thus far experienced, using Excel in this capacity was no longer feasible or practical. ## **Shades of Green**

What is on tap for late winter and early spring for golf maintenance?

The drainage project near #4 green should be completed and the lateral hazard there a thing of the past.

Selected trees around the course will have some winter maintenance, either in house using the bucket truck or hiring professional tree climbers to come in and do the high work.

We will be improving some bunker edges and leveling a tee or two.

Also during this time we will be mowing and doing course cleanup as needed. The tees and collars are mowed about once a week in the winter and greens one to three times just to cleanup and smooth out. We have not mowed a fairway since early December!

As the soil temperatures begin to rise, we will vertical cut, seed, top dress, and fertilize thin areas around the course. We are limited in the cold of winter to do some things to improve various areas around the course, due to the cold soil temperatures.

Two areas that need constant work are to the left of #4 fairway, especially near the dogleg, and to the right of #9 fairway. We will poke holes, apply extra fertilize, say a few prayers and seed these areas to make them more playable. Other areas will also be worked.

Seeing membership enjoy their course gives the golf maintenance crew a lot of satisfaction. [Maybe a good cheeseburger too] Becoming very familiar with the same course can lead to habits that we don't give a lot of thought to. These habits could be to not rake the bunker you have just played out of, or not looking to repair your ball mark on the green.

As mentioned last month, another habit that sometimes we don't think about, is driving the golf cart. Some of the most intelligent people in the world play golf, [it must be Thursday] yet when these same people drive golf carts, common sense is absent. During dry, cold conditions like we are experiencing this winter, it is even more important that you are aware of where you drive the golf cart. The areas mentioned above would be much better off without cart traffic and would be more playable year around if you stayed on the path in these compacted areas. Constantly driving around tees and greens will also add to the compaction in these areas, along with leaving unsightly tire marks. We certainly appreciate all you can do to make the playing conditions as good as vou can.

At times during our winters we will have trees damaged or knocked down due to the weather.

During the only storm in January we lost a cedar to the right of #11 fairway. Trees are such an important part of our course, and most courses, that you hate to see them go down. Losing this tree did us a favor as it will allow more sunlight to the area, especially during the winter months when there is frost. It will also assist with our summer time irrigation scheduling. Some of our evergreens just don't need to be where they are.

Enough said! Play well, enjoy the company that you are in [unless it is...] and please help us in taking care of your course.

- 1 3/4 cups buttermilk

In a large bowl, combine the flour, sugar, baking soda, baking powder and salt. Cut in butter until mixture resembles coarse crumbs.

Well, year Add raisins. Stir in buttermilk just until moistened. Turn onto a lightly floured surface; gently knead 6-8 times.

Place on an ungreased baking fantastic year sheet; pat into a 7-in. round loaf. Using a sharp knife, cut a 1-in. cross about 1/4 in. deep on top of the loaf. Bake at 375 degrees F for 40-45 minutes or until golden brown. Cool on a wire rack.

## On the Lake: Sediment, an Ounce of Prevention

Good news! Since last month's article, we did get enough rain to fill and spill the lake. The storms weren't enough to end the threat of a drought, but at least we're heading into the spring with a full lake.

Last month, I ended with a teaser, suggesting that our lake would become a meadow within 300 years or so. Facts, and specific studies done on our lake, support this. Nothing but the facts! In a nationwide study of lakes (reservoirs) constructed prior to 1954, 33% of them had lost one-quarter to one-half of their capacity due to sedimentation. Another 14% had lost one-half to three-quarters, and 10% had completely filled in. I'm confident we will fare better than that. However, it won't come without a price, commitment, and involvement.

Several studies done on our lake show that it continues to accumulate enough sediment to cover the entire bottom of the lake with one to three inches per year. Two of those studies compared the lake volume based on predam surveys, to measurements made with sophisticated depth sounders in 1994 and again in 2005. Another study done over 8 years, measured the actual amount of sediment being deposited in "traps" deployed at various locations on the bottom of the lake. I even ran a model that considers soil erosion, precipitation, land use, and slope. They all came to the same conclusion; the lake gets an infusion of 20,000 to 60,000 cubic yards of sediment every year. Remember that number.

Now it gets down to the "ounce of prevention." We already know what a pound of cure cost. Last year's dredge project was mostly successful, but costly. It removed about 20,000 cubic vards of sediment. And it certainly wasn't a be-all and end-all fix or a simple one-time operation. I know that, the Association knows it, and so does the lakefront property owner up in the Garrotte area who was fairly unpleased (understatement) that they had already lost a foot of depth after the dredge was complete. That gets into shoreline management and is a subject I'll cover later.

So, what is an ounce of prevention, and how many ounces will it take? By

far, the biggest ounce will be borne by the Association. They are already working on a sediment mitigation plan. In the end, it will likely include a variety of measures that will substantially reduce the amount of sediment entering the lake. These might include; armoring and redirecting small gullies to slow the eroding force of the water, planting and enhancing soil binding vegetation in high erosion areas, providing more guidance and oversight on construction sites, and enforcement of existing codes. I saw one lakeside lot being sprayed with herbicide. I know that's not good for soil binding, and I'm fairly certain it is illegal. I saw another burning brush right at the shoreline... more sediment, ash and fertilizer into the lake.

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The plan will also look at the feasibility of sediment interceptors or basins on the inflowing creeks to capture some of the sediment load. Additional, small scale dredging in areas susceptible to high deposition might be required. However, even if the Association does everything within its control, it will also have to look at cooperative agreements with land owners and managers outside of PML. The majority of land that contributes sediment into the lake is outside of the boundaries of PML. During a heavy rain last year, I walked up Second Garrotte Creek to identify sources of the mud and sediment laden water entering the lake. A major contributor appeared to be poorly maintained roads along a power line right-of-way.

In the end my friend, it is all the "little ounces" that will really make a difference. Every property owner has a part. I don't write about this to scare you into thinking that someday you will wake up to a mud-hole rather than a beautiful lake. Instead, I hope to encourage you to get involved (constructively), learn about your lake, do your part on your property and don't be afraid to encourage others to do the same.

**Fact:** In an average water year (Oct 1 to Sept 30), Pine Mountain Lake receives enough inflow to refill the lake, even if were COMPLETELY empty. Caveat, average can be very misleading.

The following proposed Board resolution is an amendment to Resolution # 95.04, Fire Safety Plan Policies and Procedures. The purpose of the amendment is to update the policies with regard to inspection requirements, notification, information guides, and to enact burn pile standards.

The effect of the amendment will be a more streamlined and effective fire safety inspection process. The main effect and change in this draft is the addition of burn pile standards. This draft was discussed at the February 2012 monthly Board meeting. This published draft will also be discussed by the Board of Directors at the March 2012 monthly Board meeting at the PML Lake Lodge. The Board will make a decision on the adoption of the draft at that meeting. The meeting starts at 9 a.m. and all PMLA members are welcome to attend.

## FIRE SAFETY PLAN POLICY AND PROCEDURES

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors has determined there exists a threat to property occupants and others should wildland fire strike the subdivision,

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors has conducted a study to identify those fire safety concerns,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Board of Directors does hereby approve and adopt the fire Safety Plan developed by Robert Irwin and William H. Bowman to reduce or eliminate the wildland fire potentials, the attached policy entitled "Fire Abatement Notice and Enforcement Standards and Procedures".

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the annual deadline for property owner fire safety compliance is July 1st.

### FIRE ABATEMENT NOTICE TO HOMEOWNERS

California's wildfire history over the last several years has caused those residents who live in rural areas to understand the need to do fuel reduction work prior to each fire season. Pine Mountain Lake is clearly one of those communities at risk for major loss. That's why volunteers and staff have developed a Community Wildfire Protection Plan. It's a strategy for PML that articulates what we need to do to reduce the threat, and helps us focus on specific tasks. As an example, our Board of Directors has taken aggressive measures to reduce fuels in our greenbelt areas.

Similarly, our staff and Board of Directors have reviewed the status of fuel reduction work done by property owners on privately owned lots. Thankfully, there are hundreds of property owners who do a stellar job of reducing fuel loads and maintaining their properties. Unfortunately, there are hundreds of lots that are not fire safe. This has resulted in a decision to strengthen our enforcement policies and procedures.

Please read the attached PMLA FIRE ABATEMENT STANDARDS, INSPECTION SCHEDULE AND FINE POLICY. It provides:

- Reference to sources for fuel reduction standards
- Revised inspection schedule
- List of actions for those properties found not in compliance

Also, be aware that Cal-Fire is empowered to inspect PML properties and levy fines for non-compliance.

You are welcome to contract with a private firm or to perform the work yourself. However, if you wish to obtain a bid from the company that will be providing fire abatement services to Pine Mountain Lake Association on common areas, as well as many of the owners of developed and undeveloped lots, please contact the PML administration. And if you would like assistance in deciding what action needs to be taken on your property, contact the PML Fire Safety Coordinator. He can help you develop an "Individual Fire Abatement Plan" that not only brings your lot into compliance with standards, but also provides a park like setting for your property, as well as improving the health of our forest.

Thank you in advance for your cooperation. Only as a community taking action together can we reduce the threat of wildfire.

## INSPECTION SCHEDULE AND FINE PROCESS

- 1. All properties must be in compliance with fire abatement standards on July 1<sup>st</sup> of each year.
- 2. PML staff will conduct inspections of private property June 1 June 30 starting July 1 of each year.
- 3. Those properties found not in compliance will be sent non-compliance letters, stating necessary changes.
- 4. Property owners will have 15 days from the date of the letter to remedy non-compliance issues called out in the letter.

5. PML staff will conduct a follow-up inspection for those properties notified as not in compliance. PMLA will take the following action for those properties found to have uncorrected deficiencies:

### a. "Summary Judgment Letter" "Final Notice Letter" sent to property owner.

- b. Property owners will have 15 days to request a hearing regarding these actions
- c. Property owner fined \$500 as a charge to the property owner's member account.
- d. The property will be immediately abated by the company providing fire abatement services to Pine Mountain Lake Association, with the cost of the fire abatement services being charged to the property owner's member account.
- e. The property will be scheduled for abatement the following year by the company providing fire abatement services to Pine Mountain Lake Association, with the cost of the fire abatement services being charged to the property owner's member account.

Authority: special individual assessment, as set forth in Article IV, Section 4 (a) (iii) of the First Restated Declaration of Restrictions). A special individual assessment shall be a continuing <u>lien</u> upon the property against which each such assessment is made per PMLA CC&Rs, Article IV, Section 4 (a) (iii) in accordance with the members right to notice and hearing pursuant to Article XIV, Section 6.

### PMLA Burn Pile Standards

November 1 - May 31 (burn season)

- Maximum pile size is 4' x 4' x 4'
- A ready water source available
- Attendance by an Adult until fire is out
- 10' Diameter clearance from vegetation or flammables
- PML burn permit required by property Owner and any other required permits.

June 1 – October 31 (no burn season)

- Disposal at the compost dump is required for all brush, limbs, leaves/needles
- A cut and stack (burn pile) for future burning must be authorized by PML Fire Safety Coordinator

• Conditions at the time will dictate the criteria for authorization to maintain a burn pile for future burning

The registered riders will be competing in 25, 50, 75 or 100-mile rides. The 75 and 100mile riders will have a glimpse of back of their horses. Even the Fun Ride will be slightly challenging with some stream crossings and uneven

terrain, so be sure to get you and your horse in shape if you decide to enter. The riders in the 25, 50, 75 and 100-mile rides will each receive a completion award, and, in addition, have a chance at money prizes associated with their placement, time, and horse condition. The payout formula for figuring placements is based on the formulas used in barrel racing and is explained on the website.

Each horse must pass a pre-ride veterinary inspection before their final entry can be accepted, and veterinarians

thinks you're safe. However, when you get to your ball it's out of bounds. What are your options?

According to Rule 27-1 b. you must play a ball "as nearly as possible at the spot from which the original ball was last played". That's it. In this case you have to go back to the tee and hit again.

The only way to avoid this is to play a

provisional ball. If you had hit a provisional ball, you could have saved the time it takes to go all the way back to the tee, and you would have avoided the inevitable heckling from the group behind you. When in doubt, hit a provisional ball.

Until next month, put your drives in the fairway, your putts in the hole and have fun out there.

## **RECIPE OF THE MONTH**

## Beer Battered Cod

RECIPE PROVIDED BY TOM KNOTH AND PAULA MARTELL OF "TWO LITTLE PIGS BBQ CATERING"

#### INGREDIENTS

- 3 quarts Peanut or Canola Oil
  1 1/2 cups All-purpose Flour,
  preferably unbleached
  1/2 cup Cornstarch
  1/2 tsp Cayenne Pepper
  1/2 tsp Paprika
  1/8 tsp Black Pepper, freshly ground
  Kosher Salt
  1 tsp Baking Powder
  1 1/2 lbs Cod Fillet, 1 inch thick (or
  other thick white fish) cut into eight
  3-ounce pieces
  1 1/2 Cups Beer (12 ounces), cold
- Malt Vinegar or Tartar Sauce

#### DIRECTIONS

Whisk flour, cornstarch, cayenne, paprika, pepper, and 2 teaspoons salt in large mixing bowl; transfer 3/4 cup of mixture to rimmed baking sheet. Add baking powder to bowl and whisk to combine. In heavy-bottomed Dutch oven, heat 3 quarts oil over medium-high heat to 375 degrees. Meanwhile, thoroughly dry fish with paper towels and dredge each piece in flour mixture on baking sheet; transfer pieces to wire rack, shaking off excess flour. Add 1 1/4 cups beer to flour mixture in mixing bowl and stir until mixture is just combined (batter will be lumpy). Add remaining beer as needed, 1 tablespoon at a time, whisking after each addition, until batter falls from whisk in thin, steady stream and leaves faint trail across surface of batter.

Using tongs, dip 1 piece fish in batter and let excess run off, shaking gently. Place battered fish back onto baking sheet with flour mixture and turn to coat both sides. Repeat with remaining fish, keeping pieces in single layer on baking sheet.

When oil reaches 375 degrees,



increase heat to high and add battered fish to oil with tongs, gently shaking off excess flour. Fry, stirring occasionally, until golden brown; 7 to 8 minutes, or until internal temperature of fish is 145 degrees. Transfer fish to thick paper bag or paper towels to drain.

Serve with Malt Vinegar or Tartar Sauce.

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## From Your Tuolumne County District Supervisor

JOHN GRAY, TUOLUMNE COUNTY 4TH DISTRICT SUPERVISOR

In thinking about the subject for this month's article, I looked back at some of the articles I wrote in March over the past couple of years. Especially those comments related to government activity-or inactivity-at the State level.

The budget will certainly be an issue this year as it is every year.

The newest figures from the State Controller pointed out that the State missed its revenue mark for January by \$528M. What it means for Counties is that the State will begin delaying payment for state mandated programs and will require the Counties to dig into their pockets to fund these same programs.

I would anticipate that Realignment, Pension Reform and Redevelopment will take up most of the Governor's and our legislators' time. On the topic or "realignment", it appears that the State will be allotting about twice as much in funding this year as was provided last year.

This, in itself, is good news but it is still unclear as to whether or not it is enough. Our main focus will be to make sure that there is in place some constitutional provision to insure that the State funds the program.

From what I have read, Pension Reform will have to happen in some manner. It's very clear that we cannot continue the course upon which we are headed as we will eventually run out of money.

Although redevelopment is not an

extremely big issue for the County financially, it is for the City of Sonora. When the California Supreme Court upheld the elimination of redevelopment funding by the State it did not make the issue go away. We still need the tools for local economic development and workforce housing.

The Tuolumne County Economic Development Authority has been busy and there is a lot happening. A few high points in this area are:

The Business Alliance has begun its business class series for 2012 including a series on "Facebook for Business". The Small Business Resource Guide, funded by the Sonora Area Foundation will be added to the tools used by clients and counselors to improve business. If you live in the City of Sonora and want to start a business, the City has a program offered through TCEDA. For those "shoe shoppers", Famous Footwear will be opening in the Junction Shopping Center sometime this summer. A Junior Achievement is also sponsored by the TCEDA. Twenty-five students have been selected to participate in the 13 week course. Please take time to check the TCEDA website at www.tceda.net to find out more about this TCEDA.

At the February 7th meeting, the Board of Supervisors directed staff to bring a ballot measure back to the board to expand the TOT (transient occupancy tax) to include camp grounds, house boats and other lodging. This is not an increase in the present 10% tax but merely an addition of the types of facilities included under the present tax. It is anticipated that this tax could generate approximately \$300,000.

As you may know, the Governor has chosen to reduce funding to fairs and to eliminate funding entirely for certain state parks. Our Mother Lode Fair and Railtown 1897 are both on this "list". The majority of the new inclusionary TOT tax money will go toward the funding of Railtown 1857 and the Mother Lode Fair for a three year period. Without these 2 operations, the overall economic condition of the County could suffer.

It seems short sighted for the State to consider closure when both facilities and the many events and visitors to each generate revenues that far exceed the costs of running them.

Progress is being made on developing a public transportation route into Yosemite National Park. No matter how you feel about public transportation, we must come to the realization that it is "here to stay". Public transportation along the Highway 120 corridor will benefit business and help the local economy.

I would also like to offer "Kudos" to the Park Services for being very aggressive in getting the Highway 120 Entrance to Yosemite National Park opened so quickly after the recent rock slide. Our businesses and our County greatly appreciate the effort.

Have you seen the news regarding the Amgen Tour? This famous bicycle event is coming to our area for the first time ever. The City of Sonora will be hosting the 4th leg of the Amgen Bicycle Race. This is quite an honor for the City of Sonora and for Tuolumne County. It is expected that this event will bring thousands of visitors to the foothills.

The 4th and final leg of the race starts

in Sonora and ends in Clovis 130 mile s away.

A good place to experience the race is in Sonora, but because the route travels on Highway 49 to Oakhurst, Coulterville will also be a very good viewing point, especially for people in the Don Pedro and Greeley Hill areas. Check out the various events that will take place before, during and after the event. Find the schedule by googling Amgen 2012.

On February 7th, the Board of Supervisors endorsed a certificate of special recognition to the Lake Don Pedro Fire Company for the 30 years of service provided to the community. It was an honor to present this certificate to these fine men and women that volunteer their time to benefit our community, our residents and our County.

On February 11th, I had the pleasure of attending the 30th annual Sweet Heart Ball at the Hacienda in Don Pedro. This was a very special event for many reasons. Held as a benefit to recognize the tireless efforts and contribution made by members of the volunteer fire department to the Lake Don Pedro community, it also provides an opportunity for neighbors to dress up, gather together, and to enjoy good food, good music and friendly conversation. It is a social occasion marked on everyone's calendar. This is a great way to celebrate with your "Sweet Heart on Valentine's Day".

Well, are you ready to face your truth? Yes, you are getting older and "It's A Good Thing". As I mentioned in Aging – Part 1, we are living longer and better than our ancestors. There are more people living until they are one hundred years old and more. That had never been a real consideration for previous generations.

So, why is this happening? First, the obvious is that science and medicine have made great strides in learning more about the human body including the differences between men's and women's physical make up and childhood development. Intensive research has developed more and better medical solutions to treat illnesses and disease. Through the miracle of the internet, their findings and recommendations are easily available for anyone owning a computer to access. The Federal Drug Administration has been vigilante in trying to insure safety for the medications that they approve.

Secondly, the focus has moved from curing diseases to preventing them. The emphasis has been to encourage every person to take responsibility for their own health and that of their families. Genetic factors play a role in one's health history, but there are other factors that may play an even greater role, such as our lifestyle.

Researchers at Northwestern University concluded that strategies to improve lifestyle behaviors may have a major impact in cutting the chances of developing heart disease. ## How to Photograph the Moon

Taking a photograph of the moon can be quite easy. All you need is a camera (even the camera on your cell phone will do) and a telescope (or binoculars attached to a tripod). I'll share a very simple technique that can be used to take, what may be for some, your very first astro-photograph. To demonstrate this technique I'm going to use the first astro-photograph that I took in January of 2004.

The very first photograph that I took of the moon was very simple. I held a small digital "point and shoot" camera up to the evepiece of a telescope and took the photograph. This is a technique that can be used with any bright object in the sky. By "bright object", I mean celestial objects that you can see with your eyes when you look up at the night time sky. This is in contrast to many of the "deep sky" photographs that I normally take with very long exposures. Deep sky objects include any celestial object that is too faint to see when you look through a telescope - like many of the nebula and galaxies that I've written about over the past 4 1/2 years. Astrophotography is used to reveal what the human eye can't see. Today's digital camera sensors have the benefit of acting like a bucket that collects photons (light) - the longer the exposure, the more light (color and details) that's captured and displayed in the photograph. Long exposures from these cameras can capture light far too faint for our unaided eyes to see.

I've written several articles about the detailed process of taking long exposure time astro-photography in previous newsletters. Most photographs

that you may take have exposure of precisely aligning times that are measured in fractions of a second, the long exposure astrophotography photographs that I take are measured in minutes or even hours. I take many separate photographs with exposure times as short as 15 seconds and as long as 30 minutes. Then, all the individual photographs are aligned and digitally "stacked" one on top of another to create the final image. It is this long exposure alignment and stacking technique that creates an image with the level of detail visible in the photographs that have been printed in this newsletter. Depending on how faint the object is that I'm photographing, the total exposure time of the images that I stack have been over 12 hours. In this case, I will take photographs over several evenings to create the final image. Processing all the individual images to create the final image typically takes 60 to 80 hours.

Most of the challenges that exist when taking long exposures of deep sky objects don't exist when taking a short exposure photograph of a bright object. What you see in the eyepiece of a telescope (or binoculars) will be captured by the camera - almost exactly as it appears to your eye when you look through the telescope. One of the most obvious bright objects in the night time sky is the moon, which was the subject of my very first astrophotograph. The "hold the camera up to the telescope eyepiece and take a photograph" technique that I'm describing in this article doesn't require any expensive telescope equipment, nor does it require the several hours a telescope to track the sky for long exposures. Long exposures require precise tracking of the telescope because tracking errors quickly elongate stars in a photograph, and thentheylookoblong or like streaks. The "hold the camera up to the telescope eyepiece and take a photograph" technique doesn't have the challenge

that comes with trying to focus your camera on an object that you can't see, because your camera should be able to focus on almost any object in the telescope eyepiece that is bright enough for your eyes to see. Lastly you don't need any special computer software to process the photograph, like how I align and stack the many individual photographs to create the final image of a deep sky object.

Try using this technique yourself if you own a telescope and a camera. If you plan to use binoculars, attach them to a tripod to reduce the amount of shaking when you hold the camera up to the eyepiece. Even if you don't own a telescope, many digital cameras have an optical zoom that can take a nice photograph of the moon. You'll have to take your camera out of its "automatic" mode to get the best photographs and you should use a tripod. Use a shutter speed that is faster or an



aperture that is smaller (under-expose) then the camera recommends when you take a photograph of the moon, else the picture will just look like a bright white (over-exposed) object. I usually take many photographs with different exposure times and then just keep the ones that I like best. Printed with this article is the first astrophotograph that I took with a telescope. This photograph of the moon appears almost exactly as how it appeared to my eye when I viewed it through the telescope, and reveals the many details of the cratered lunar surface.

## **Just How Safe is Hunting**

I have been avid outdoors type most of my life and got started in the shooting sports at a very young age. Starting with archery in my pre-teens shooting bales of hay in moms back yard. A bit later I picked up shooting clays with high school friends at a local range and my first hunting experience was with my younger brother Tom. Through an archery shop, we went squirrel hunting with about 15 others.

Later, another brother Dan, joined us and just about every weekend the three of us would go around to different archery ranges practicing, competing and ribbing each other the whole day through.

We even joined a hunting ranch for awhile and met some of the neatest people from just about everywhere it seemed, all with the same passion for the shooting sports and the outdoors. The only injury anyone got was from exhaustion from the days hunt, climbing hills, walking trails or the hurt pride because the "one that got away" was this big... and that story was usually told around the camp fire everyone shared at the end of the day laughing and reminiscing, eager to do it all again the next morning.

Today, I'm an archery instructor and working on my Hunter Education certification. I donate time to the California Deer Assoc and the Women & Kids day events where shooting archery and rifles can be taught in a safe and controlled environment.

In a recent Press release from the National Shooting Sports Foundation, Inc (NSSF) relating injuries to sports activities, their findings may be very different than what you might think.

Hunting is Safer than Golf and most other activities. You can visit *NSSF.org* to view their report but here are some of the findings:

#### **Hunting Versus other Activities:**

- A person is 11 times more likely to be injured playing volleyball than hunting.
- A person is 25 times more likely to be injured cheerleading or bicycle riding than hunting.
- A person is 34 times more likely to be injured playing soccer or skateboarding than hunting.
- A person is 105 times more likely to be injured playing tackle football than hunting.

In January, two church regional youth retreats returned for their fourth annual visit. The Church of Christ brings junior high students and the Christian Church of Northern California brings teenage groups. They missed the snow, but did some serious hiking along with their retreat activities.

In keeping with our mission to provide a special and safe place for people with special needs, Tuolumne Trails has expanded its activities to provide programs for returning veterans with war-related injuries and their families. We have begun

two organizations. One provides service dogs to disabled veterans returning from Iraq and Afghanistan. At Tuolumne Trails, they learn how to work with their dogs and discover how the dogs can help them handle their new lives.

The other group focuses on veterans returning from war with "invisible wounds," including post-traumatic stress syndrome, panic attacks, and depression. Their programs teach the soldiers how to be civilians and how to reintegrate into their families and society. We're proud to be able to help our returning heroes.

Then funding was cut for the Groveland program but services continued to be provided at the old Tuolumne General Hospital in Sonora. Another round of cuts and that program became history also.

While there is nothing to take the place of what we lost up here on the hill a Oak Terraces in the Sonora area is piloting a Day Stay Program. Located in Soulsbyville, the program provides those with dementia structured activities, a warm meal, medication management and incontinent care for approximately six hours at a cost of \$45, well below what the county charged for the old program.

## **Twelve Baptized at GEFC**

Twelve people were baptized at the Groveland Evangelical Free Church in the Sunday morning worship service on January 22. Pastor Ron Cratty explained the ordinance of baptism in a sermon before taking his place at the baptistery (normally hidden from view behind the elevated platform where the service is conducted).

"Baptism is an outward sign of a changed life" Pastor Cratty said. "It is an act of obedience for those who have accepted Christ as their Savior." He explained that John the Baptist popularized the practice, which is symbolic of rising up from the dead. Baptism is a picture of our new life in Christ, the change Saint Paul spoke of in Ephesians when he told the church ... even though we were dead because of our sins He gave us life when He raised Christ from the dead. (Ephesians 2:5 NLT)

A baptism at GEFC is especially moving because each person chooses a spiritual mentor or special friend to read their written testimony—the story of how and why they decided to stop putting themselves first and<br/>begin a life of serving Jesus Christ.words of John 3:16. "For God so<br/>loved the world that He gave his<br/>only begotten Son that whosoever<br/>should receive Him shall not perish

While serving in the Air Force, a friend confronted David with the reality of Jesus Christ. "I thought of God as a power of energy," David wrote. But he prayed with his friend and then asked him if he would feel anything that would assure him that Jesus was now his savior. "It depends on what you feel in your heart," his friend told him. As David drifted off to sleep in a cold tent in a sub-zero temperature he was overcome by feeling of warmth and he knew in his heart there was a God.

Teenage Savannah became a Christian when she was six years old. Now she says her world would be upside down without God. Knowing that God will never put her is a situation that she can't handle or leave her despite what's going on in her life gives her confidence.

Johanna was raised Catholic in the Netherlands and lived by the

words of John 3:16. "For God so loved the world that He gave his only begotten Son that whosoever should receive Him shall not perish but have everlasting life." However, the trauma of life caused her to doubt the goodness of God. Her pastor counseled her to trust her personal relationship with God over what she had been told she was supposed to do. Since then, she has felt the Lord's spirit enable her to deal with life's difficulties.

Mark fell desperately ill as a young man and cried out to God from a bed of intense pain. He awoke rested, pain free, at peace and fully aware that God was in the room with him.
