General Manager's Message

RESTATEMENT OF PML BYLAWS AND CC&R'S

The PMLA Covenants Conditions and Restrictions have not been updated since 1990, and the Bylaws of our Association have not been updated since 2005. The Civil Code, Corporations Code, procedures and practices have changed over the years, and these important Association documents are due for restatement.

Last year, the Board of Directors tasked management with the preparation of draft restatements of both documents. The criteria given was to update in accordance with current law, provide further clarification with regard to environmental control, enforcement and other issues that continue to raise questions with regard to interpretation. One of the highest priority goals is to resolve the continuing issues with lot mergers and the deterioration of the Association assessment base.

Our team worked with Association Counsel, and after a year of hard work, now have draft documents for member review and comment. The first of several meetings will be held on May 12th. This town hall meeting will be held just after the distribution of the drafts to the membership. The purpose of the meeting is to provide an overview of the changes, answer member questions and consider information.

The CC&R Town Hall meeting is scheduled for Saturday, May 12, 2012 at 9 a.m. and will be held at the PML Lake Lodge.

POSITIVE FIRST QUARTER RESULTS

At the April Board meeting, our Controller, Ken Spencer presented the Associations financial results for the first quarter of 2012. While we are concerned with the member assessment delinquency rate, we are working with professionals and taking the appropriate action to handle the situation. It appears that the rate is starting to flatten out and we are watching these numbers closely.

Even with the state and county-wide economic problems, we continue to operate better than budget and PML is strong financially. We have been able to downsize some positions due to cross-training and new technology, and this will result in a significant savings over time. My management team and I are committed to keeping costs under control and managing Association funds effectively. Our mantra around here is "get the best bang for the buck", and it seems to be working.

CAMPAIGN ADVERTISEMENTS AND SIGNS

It is easy to see it is campaign season as politicians and political groups post roadside signs around PML. Every year we receive calls from members, upset that our beautiful, wooded environment is "being littered with all of these signs". PML usually does not get involved with the regulation of campaign signs if they are on private property or the County roadway. Ferretti Road is a Tuolumne County maintained roadway and this is the reason why campaigns signs are allowed along the side of this road.

Posting political signs at amenities or on Association common ground are not allowed. This includes Federal, State and County elections as well as PML Board elections. There are laws and policies that govern this, and they are in place to reduce problems within the Association common area.

Political advertisements, with the exception of PML Board of Directors elections, will not be published in the PML News. This is in accordance with the PMLA Editorial Policy. The PML Editorial Committee is tasked with determining if an advertisement is political.

Legitimate campaign and political signs are allowed on a member's private property as long they do not pose a safety hazard or cause a real nuisance for the neighbors. Please note that dislike for a candidate or proposition is not a reasonable nuisance complaint. Members who are interested in more information on County elections should check out the Tuolumne County Website or call the County Elections Department.

ISSUES WITH LOT IMPROVEMENTS

Our Environmental Control department has seen an increase in home renovations and improvements on member properties. Some members choose to perform the work themselves and many use local contractors and vendors. Almost all improvements and renovations require approval from the Environmental Control Committee prior to starting the project. The reason is that there are setbacks, drainages areas, easements, square footage, and other considerations that must be evaluated.

Many members, contractors and vendors, have been ignoring the rules and performing the work with no approvals from PML or the County building department. The member is ultimately held responsible for failure to get the required approvals. Failure to get approval can result in a stop-work order, fines and other actions against the member. Some members have been forced to remove unapproved concrete, walls and other structures. Something as basic as a tree removal can cost a member thousands of dollars in fines. Failure to get approval can result in a delay in the project, higher construction costs and possibly legal action.

So be sure to get approval before moving on a project. If you are unsure what is required, give us a call. Our Environmental Control Coordinator, Sandy Golden is available to answer questions and make the process as easy as possible for the member. VEHICLE SAFETY

We continue to receive complaints regarding vehicle safety violations. PML has a 25 mph. speed limit and it is often ignored. Members and guests are encouraged to observe the posted speed limits and obey all traffic laws. Speeding, blowing through stop signs without slowing down or stopping, driving in the wrong lane and not watching for pedestrians are the usual complaints.

Keep in mind that the California Highway Patrol and the Tuolumne County Sheriffs Officers help PML by enforcing the vehicle code and speed limit within PML. We work in partnership with local law enforcement and appreciate their efforts towards public safety.

PMLA Money Matters

Raise taxes (assessments)! Reduce expenses! These are the battle cries of two groups with different ideas on how to balance a budget. The budget involved can be as complex and massive as the Federal government or as relatively simple and minimal as a homeowners Association. Regardless of the size of the budget, the passion behind these two, seemingly opposite approaches is usually very strong and is supported by a deeply held belief and conviction (listened to the "debate" in Washington lately?).

As is the case in most vastly divergent approaches to an issue the real answer lies somewhere in between the two viewpoints. The trick is in finding that middle ground. It has been said that real compromise is only achieved when neither party is truly happy with the result. This means that neither side got everything they wanted, but each side achieved at least a portion of their goals. After all the dictionary definition of compromise is - "a settlement of differences by mutual concessions; an agreement reached by adjustment of conflicting or opposing claims, principles, etc., by reciprocal

modification of demands".

I am a true believer in compromise. It really is the only way to get something accomplished (outside of a dictatorship). However compromise is never as easy as it would first appear to be. Strongly held beliefs lead to an entrenched position that is, by nature, resistant to change or "giving in". Balancing these conflicting demands is a challenging and often impossible task.

All of this brings me to a brief explanation of how the PML budget for 2012 came together using the art of compromise. It is always a challenge for us when preparing the annual budget to balance our duty to provide service to property owners and maintain all of the facilities and infrastructure of the common areas (now and in the future) with the desire to be fiscally responsible.

Raising assessments is always the easy way to solve the need for additional funding. However raising assessments has a negative impact on the financial resources of all property owners and should be used sparingly and in consideration of its overall impact. Conversely it is always simple to say, just

cut expenses. Like raising assessments this approach has consequences as well. Such things as reduced service levels, deferred maintenance and reduced hours of operation are all considerations when making these types of cuts. Additionally we are faced with the choice of what to cut and where. To paraphrase an old saving one man's fat may be another man's muscle. No matter what or where the impact there will always be those that don't want to see these changes affect an amenity or service that they use.

In preparing the 2012 Budget we achieved several significant financial savings. First, all non-union employees had their wages frozen. Next we were able to control our benefit costs by achieving a zero increase in premiums. Likewise we signed a 3 year lock agreement with our Liability and Property Insurance carrier that holds our costs constant for the near future. After several years of increase we are holding the line on the cost of Supplies in 2012 from 2011. Unfortunately some costs go up no matter what we do. The price of oil continues to negatively impact us on many fronts. The general economy situation means a higher level of uncollectible assessments which we must account for. While not a cost cutting move we have increased the revenue received from user fees and sales

in 2012. These increases serve to offset expense increases in other areas.

Finally, when all is said and done we are left with an increase in the annual assessment. While no one wants to pay more for anything it is a fact of life that prices do continue to go up. This is where compromise comes in. We have achieved what I think is a good balance between these two competing philosophies. In addition our efforts to closely monitor where your money goes continues throughout the year. We are always looking for ways to save money and do things more efficiently.

While it is never the perfect answer we need to remember that a true compromise is one where neither side is completely happy with the result. Our goal is to accomplish as much as we can while spending your money effectively and wisely.

Financial Statements Correction

An error occurred in the presentation of the Association's financial information in both the January and March editions of the PML News. This error occurred as a result of some final year end adjustments to our results that were inadvertently left out of the December statements and incorrectly included in the January statements.

Both of these errors have been corrected and the actual results are included in the Annual Report all property owners received with the April edition of the PML news. In addition the correct numbers are reflected in the year to date results for 2012 as presented in the April PML News. These changes occurred as a direct result of our review process which includes oversight by the Board of Directors, the Budget & Finance Committee and other concerned property owners.

Below is a recap of the numbers previously published, the correct amounts and the budgeted amounts as they are now reflected in our financial reports. All results include depreciation (a non-cash expense):

The net effect of this error is a reclassification of expense from 2012 into 2011 of \$82K. This reflects the proper treatment and recognition of this expense in the correct period.

We apologize for this error and assure all property owners that additional controls have been put in place to ensure this type of misclassification does not recur. In addition future year end results will not be published until we are 100% certain that all appropriate revenue and expense amounts are properly recognized in the appropriate period.

Most members have the annual lot cleanup responsibility well in hand. Some members utilize vendors who clean their Lots each year, and other members do the work themselves. In any event, by July 1, PML is looking great!

Starting July 1 we will be inspecting for Lots that have been overlooked. They won't be hard to find and these members will receive a Notice of Non-Compliance to encourage them to complete the work.

We understand that some members don't have the opportunity to visit their property very often. If this is the situation, members have two options to get this work completed each year. First, contract with one of our Preferred Vendors to have them schedule your work to be performed by July 1 of each year. Second, members can choose to participate in our New Auto-Cleanup Program where we will have the member's Lot cleaned from a pool of our Preferred Vendors according to our standards and have this approved amount added

PML Golf: Back to Basics

We are heading full force into Peak Season here at Pine Mountain Lake Golf & Country Club and for those of you that have been playing all winter and spring the golf course is looking better than ever. Alan and his mighty crew have completed many course enhancing winter projects that have improved the overall condition of the golf course. Not to beat a dead horse but in order to continue to help course conditions I'd like to revisit some of the more basic cart etiquette "violations" that we witness continually that counteract the beauty, ascetics and playability of the golf course:

- ALWAYS PARK GOLF CARTS ON THE CART PATHS AROUND TEE BOXES AND GREENS
- Never drive within 30-feet of a tee or green
- Yes, #10 Green Tees count as a tee box
- CARTS ARE TO REMAIN ON PATHS ON ALL PAR 3's (ALWAYS)
- NEVER DRIVE BEYOND CART SIGNS IN THE FAIRWAYS
- When you come to a cart sign; drive directly across to the cart path before moving forward
- These are not randomly placed signs to test your ability to follow instructions; these are boundaries that extend across the fairways and roughs placed to protect and enhance playability and promote the healing of damaged and/or sensitive areas on the course

Let's all try and assist Alan and his crew in keeping YOUR Golf Course looking great by following these basic rules of cart etiquette.

LESSON CORNER – BALL POSITION

Most people I teach are surprised to learn the importance of ball position and its impact on every shot. An incorrect ball position can quickly turn a good swing into a bad shot. Here are a few fundamentals to guarantee that you have the correct ball position:

The first is when you are facing the golf ball, how far away should you stand? The way to establish this is by taking a good stance, heels of your feet should be at approximately shoulder width and your posture should be in a good athletic position, knees and hips flexed to create a good spine angle, well balanced, arms hanging straight down from the shoulders (think of a quarterback taking the snap or the baseball outfielder in ready position). Once in your athletic position, let your hands hang freely in front of you. Bring your hands together and grab a club. Hands and arms should be hanging directly below your shoulders with about six inches of clearance away from your body. Now, place the head of the golf club on the ground directly in front of you. The sole of the club should be flat on the ground (no

toe up, no heel up). With the sole of the club flat on the ground, you're in good athletic position, arms hanging straight down from your shoulders. The club's contact with the ground will be at the correct distance from your body.

The second consideration is where the ball should be relative to your stance (towards your left foot or your right foot). In general there is a simple way to find the right position. I like to think of my 5-iron or 6-iron as my middle club. I start with the ball position in the middle of my stance (between my heels). As you move into your longer irons and even into your fairway woods, your ball position will be farther away and your impact point or "moment of truth" will move slightly forward in your stance. It follows then that our driver would be played the furthest forward and the furthest away from you. It also follows that your 9-iron and wedges will dictate a ball position closer to you and back in your stance-towards your right foot (for a righthanded golfer).

Just as everyone's swing varies based on physical build, height, arm length, athletic ability, physical restrictions, injuries, etc., so will their ball position vary slightly from person-to-person. Try finding your correct position at your local practice facility or see your local PGA pro for additional instruction.

Shades of Green

Now May is here and we have completed most of our spring aeration projects. The fairways and roughs were completed in early April, and the greens a week ago. We appreciate your patience when we are doing these needed projects during your round of golf.

Why do we aerate and top-dress? Compaction occurs primarily in the surface of the turf. A compacted layer as thin as 1/4 to 1/2 inch can greatly impede water infiltration, nutrient penetration, and gaseous exchange between the soil and the atmosphere. When pulling plugs from the soil, it will create an artificial system of large pores, allowing the soil to breathe and to accept moisture and plant nutrients.

Why the need to top-dress? When we top-dress after greens aeration, we are filling the holes left behind. Around 20 to 25 percent of the greens surface is replaced during each aeration. Topdressing the greens during the growing season is also an important factor of greens care. The grass on the greens produces large amounts of organic matter or thatch during ideal growing conditions. Numerous light, frequent applications of top-dressing are more effective in diluting organic matter than a single application of a large amount of top-dressing. Spot top-dressing the fairways is a great way to begin to change the profile of the soil, to help reduce compaction, and over time will build up a layer that will allow the water {irrigation or winter rains} to get into the soil quicker and provide a better playing condition. Doing all of these projects will continue to improve the golf course over time. {I can only imagine the topdressing program at Augusta; did you see

the structure of their divots during the Masters?} These projects can impact your round, especially the frequent light topdressing of the greens, please remember we are doing these to make conditions better. We will plan ahead and try to do these projects with as little impact on play as possible.

What else is ahead for our spring projects? Our mowing will be more frequent as the spring heads toward summer. We plan to improve some additional bunker edges, along with edging the cart paths again. We will continue to spray both a selective herbicide to control broadleaf's, and a non-selective herbicide to eliminate the weeds in our landscapes and common areas. It seems the warmer the water temperature gets, the more duck weed we get, so we will be skimming it out of the irrigation pond. Our pond on #1 is also becoming infested with the duck weed, and it will be controlled by an aquatic herbicide, as we do not use it for irrigating the turf.

Did anyone notice the latest improvement to the new wall near the upper tee at #12? The guys installed a split rail fence just above the wall to give a little protection from getting to close to the edge. It does look very nice and gives the area a look of completion.

It's been two years since David Rau, our golf professional has been here, we are lucky to have him. If David's been here for two years, then Mr. Murphy, our OLD pro must have been retired for two years. I hope Tony has enjoyed his retirement as much as we have enjoyed him being retired.

Rental Responsibility

With the decline in sales in the real estate market, came an increase in rentals. Currently, there are 400 registered rental properties within PML and these are tenant occupied, both short and long term. That's about 14% of our improved Lots. Of the current complaints which are under enforcement, 40% come from tenant occupied Lots.

So, 14% of our Lots are causing 40% of the complaints. That said, there are many property owners that take the time to screen renter applicants properly and follow up to make sure the renter knows and understands the rules. If the renter violates the rules, the owner or property manager quickly resolves the situation. Unfortunately, we still have members that are ignoring this responsibility.

Enforcing the rules with tenant occupied Lots can be difficult at times for PML staff. In fact, many renters feel our rules and regulations don't apply to them. It is up to property owners to resolve these situations.

Our Governing Documents are very clear as it pertains to the Owner's responsibility for the violations of their tenant. Section 6.02 of the Second Restated Bylaws states..."at all times the Owner shall remain responsible for compliance by the Owner's lessee or tenant with the provisions of the Governing Documents."

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Our CC&R's, Article II, Section 3 (b) states..."in the event that any tenant or lessee fails to honor the provisions of any Governing Document, the Association shall be entitled to take such corrective action as it deems necessary which may include...the imposition of fines and penalties against Owner or tenant."

Property owner/landlords, are expected to handle the responsibility of ensuring their tenants follow the rules. Owner/landlords have more leverage, as there is normally a contractual agreement with their tenant. The Owner/landlord can, and should make compliance with PMLA rules and regulations part of the rental contract.

If you rent your home or use a rental management company, please make sure you communicate the importance of making PMLA rules and regulations part of the tenant orientation. The next step is to include language in the rental contract that addresses a tenant's responsibility to comply with our governing documents.

The quality of life in our community is influenced greatly by how well we live together. Complaints about rules violations are frustrations we can all avoid with a little communication.



2012 Roads Project

It has been three years since the last major road construction project was here within Pine Mountain Lake Association. The road repair project in 2009 was performed in Unit 1, Unit 7, Unit 8, Unit 13, and on major sections of Pine Mountain Drive in Units 3 and 4. The 2012 Roads Project will continue on sections of Unit 8, and Unit 10, which remained from the 2009 Project; with road construction on Mills Street, Alcan Court, and McKinley Way.

Road construction engineers have been evaluating our roads for several years. From their on-site evaluations, a 5-year study is produced. This study creates a long-term schedule of which roads require the most work, the deterioration of the asphalt pavement, the condition of the road base, and the application of road work construction to be performed. Add to this, we do have roads which receive a greater volume of vehicle traffic use. These high use roads do receive preferential attention.

Our high volume roads are marked with double-yellow median lines. Pine Mountain Drive, Mueller Drive, Pleasant View Drive, Golden Rock Circle, and Hemlock Street, are all high use roadways. The section of Mueller Drive from Ferretti Road to Gate 3 is a high priority road slated for re-construction this year. With part of the road being Tuolumne County, and the majority of the road belonging to Pine Mountain Lake Association, we will be performing major repairs to the roadway this year. The engineers white markings on the pavement tell

the tale, and this will be a lasting improvement.

The road construction this year will be done primarily in Unit 12. There is a section of Hemlock, between Hillcroft and Yorkshire, which will require road re-construction and asphalt overlay. Two other roadways in Unit 12 are high priority for reconstruction; these roads are Clifton Way and Jimmersal Lane. The repairs will involve asphalt grinding, section repairs, and asphalt overlay. When completed, the roads will look brand new, and will last for many years to come.

The 2012 Roads Project is planned for this May and into June. There will be traffic controls in the road construction areas, please drive safe, and obey the instructions from the flaggers. This is the list of roads to be worked on within this 2012 Roads Project:

- Unit 5 Mueller Drive, from Gate 3 to Tannahill Drive
- Unit 8 Mills Street, upper section, and Alcan Court
- Unit 10 McKinley Way
- Unit 3 Cresthaven Drive, between the Green Valley Circle intersections, Green Valley Circle
- Unit 12 Hemlock Street, between Hillcroft Drive and Yorkshire Drive, Clifton Way, Jimmersal Lane, Hillcroft Drive, Yorkshire Road, Woodside Way, Beaver Court, Mule Court, Larkspur Court, and Iris Court.

Fawn Times My Deer

As many of you Pine Mountain Lake residents already know, we have deer here. We have a lot of deer here actually. Visitors to Pine Mountain Lake are oftentimes struck in awe of the docile deer we have roaming through our community. Why they're just so cute!

Our resident deer herd here in Pine Mountain Lake is a distinctive group in and of itself. Deer naturally travel between different territories depending on the season. In the winter deer migrate to the lower elevations and in the spring they migrate to the higher elevations. This migration allows deer to seek out sufficient cover and food. In point of fact, cover is more important than food during the harsh winter months. By contrast, our deer herd for the most part remains in Pine Mountain Lake throughout the year. This unfortunately, is partially due to human interaction with the animals. Feeding the deer, either by accident or from a misplaced desire to do good, is actually harmful to the animal's ability to survive. This practice diminishes their natural instinct to migrate. The perceived overall safety and readily available food sources cause the deer to remain in an area with insufficient coverage for survival where they have a higher chance of succumbing to the elements.

Deer have grown accustomed to our human population in Pine Mountain Lake. They do not have the same reverence for cars or people that truly wild deer typically have. Perhaps they got a hold of Resolution 89.15 that names Pine Mountain Lake as a private refuge with no hunting allowed? Perhaps it's just good ol' animal intuition. Whatever the case, the abundance of available food and the safety that our community provides has led to a higher density population of deer here in Pine Mountain Lake. They are very much aware that this is a safe haven. With a higher density population come a variety of issues. The number of vehicle collisions rise, as does the predator count. Does become unusually aggressive to pedestrians and pets alike in an effort to defend their young. The spread of disease also increases, sometimes with devastating effects on the herd's population. Case in point: In 2009 we witnessed a virus, more commonly known as Blue Tongue Disease, sweep through the deer population here. A majority of the deer did not possess the natural ability to fight off the disease and died. In addition, the higher the population spikes the more of a challenge they can present for the human residents living here in Pine Mountain Lake.

This brings us to the topic at hand. As spring rapidly approaches does will be fawning here in our community of Pine Mountain Lake and the surrounding region. We all enjoy watching the adorable, dappled fawns run around on their wobbly legs. The Safety Department however, often receives reports about deer that have been involved in collisions with vehicles and are left with severe and sometimes grotesque injuries. As a member of this department, it is still very hard to come across an injured fawn that has been hit by a vehicle. Moreover, as long as a deer is able to maintain walking, the Department of Fish and Game will not authorize its euthanization. Be on the lookout as deer cross the road. Where there is one: there are usually more. Even a seemingly lowspeed collision with an adult deer can cause major damage to your vehicle, not to mention the deer. Please remember how important it is to keep your speed down to 25 miles per hour and to exercise caution while driving in Pine Mountain Lake.

2009 Amador County Zinfandel

Birthplace of the California gold rush - circa, 1840's Amador County is located about 50 miles southeast of Sacramento in the Sierra Foothills. The region is renowned for producing outstanding Zinfandels dating back to 1856. The county was created in 1854 from parts of Calaveras and El Dorado Counties and was named in honor of the early Spanish gold miner and rancher, Jose Maria Amador. It is common that many of the Zinfandel plantings in the area are well over one hundred years old. Forget 'Old Vine' Zinfandel - Amador is 'Ancient Vine' Zinfandel country.

The area enjoys a variety of growing conditions helping to define this appellation (growing region). Vineyard elevations range from 250 feet on the western slopes of the foothills up eastwards along Sierra Nevada range to around 3000 feet. Similarly, assorted soil types ripple throughout the region imparting flavor nuances specific to that area. Delta breezes provide the ideal cooling conditions needed in this region where temperatures during the growing seasons range from the eighties to over one hundred degrees. Haraszthy Family Cellars Amador County Zinfandel is produced from grapes grown in the Shenandoah Valley and the Fiddletown sub-regions of the Sierra Foothills appellation.

Stylistically, Amador County Zinfandels exhibit deep rich concentrated fruit forward flavors with a bouquet described as "holiday spice"- nutmeg, cedar, vanilla. Our Amador County Zinfandel is not over ripe or extracted. Please refer to our tasting notes for specific details about

The Bear Label

Extinct in California since the 1920's, the image of the California grizzly bear (Ursus Arctos Horribilis) proudly adorns the California state flag. It was first flown in Sonoma where the so-called "Bear Flag Revolt" played itself out over 160 years ago.

War between Mexico and the United States seemed unavoidable. Events in Texas (the Alamo) had cemented strong sentiment among western immigrant settlers rallying for independence from Mexico. In California, U.S. Army Major John C. Fremont had been regularly fomenting rebellion against Mexico.

Sonoma resident Mexican General Mariano Guadalupe Vallejo had long sensed the inevitability of California's annexation by the United States. In his heart he wanted to be part of America but was nonetheless arrested at gunpoint at his home in Sonoma on June 14, 1846. Vallejo was willing to negotiate only with authorized representatives of legitimate governments and refused to acknowledge or negotiate with the thirty-three Sonoma roughnecks claiming California as republic of their own. He was roughed up and arrested and sent to jail at Sutter's Fort near Sacramento.

The California Republic lasted only 25 days. On July 7, 1847, United States Navy Captain John D. Sloat entered Monterey Bay. Following a minor brief skirmish against the Mexican Presidio and he declared California officially part of the United States.

On the Lake WONDERFUL WONDERFUL WATER

Water. From the moment of our conception, we are bathed in it. It protects us, nourishes us and sustains our life. Is it any wonder that many of the "white noise" machines that are supposed to relax us and help us sleep feature sounds of rainfall, ocean waves and burbling streams. It's featured in many of our great religions and spiritual ceremonies to signify the cleansing, healing and renewing power of a "Higher Being." Throughout our history it has played a prominent part in all forms of art. From Homer's Odyssey to Henry David Thoreau's observations on Walden Pond, it has provided the backdrop for stories of heroism, adventure and reflections on our very lives. It inspired Leonardo da Vinci to refer to it as "vetturale di natura" (the vehicle of nature).

Aside from the natural uniqueness of water, its physical properties are like nothing else on the planet. It is the only natural substance on earth that exists in all three states; solid, liquid and gas. The bond that holds the hydrogen and oxygen atoms together gives water unique properties that allow insects to walk on it and plants to transport it up through their stems and carry nutrients to all its parts. That bond is also responsible for the phenomenon of solid water (ice) being lighter than

the liquid form. Dick Button wouldn't have much to talk about at the Winter Olympics if ice sank to the bottom. OK, that's a bit of a stretch. The fact remains that water is heaviest at about 40 degrees Fahrenheit. On our lake, even in August, all of the water below about 40 or 50 feet is that cold.

When we consider the scarcity of freshwater on our planet, it becomes even more precious. Of all the water on Earth, only 2.5 percent is classified as fresh. Of that, only about 3 tenths of 1 percent is "available". Much of the rest is locked up in glaciers and groundwater. And of that available water, almost 40 percent is located in just two places; Lake Baikal in Siberia, and the Great Lakes. I don't know if you can visualize the scarcity of freshwater available to us, but try this. If all the hair on the average human head represented all the water on the planet, you would only be left with about 10 hairs to represent the available freshwater.

So, here's the take home message. Enjoy your lake, get involved, and do everything you can to protect it and keep it healthy.

LAKE FACT: On April 13th, there was enough water flowing into the lake to fill an olympic sized swimming pool every 4 minutes!

Now for another rules quiz, prompted by bad advice I've been given on the course.

Your ball is on the green on number 3. You make a stroke with your putter, and to the amazement of the rest of your foursome the ball rolls smartly to the cup and drops in. You then lift up your putter and walk to the cup to retrieve your ball, only to find that the head of the putter is now detached from the shaft. What are your options?

Since the club was damaged in the normal course of play, Rule 4-3 allows you to use the club in its damaged state, or repair it or have it repaired, providing that can be done without unduly delaying the round. In this case using the club is not practical, but since it is unfit for play, you also have the option of replacing it, again providing you can do so without unduly delaying play. If you had started the round with fewer than 14 clubs (and had not added enough clubs to reach 14), Rule 4-4 would allow you the right to add additional clubs up to 14 in any case.

Until next month, put your drives in the fairway, your putts in the hole and have fun out there.

From Your Tuolumne County District Supervisor

JOHN GRAY, TUOLUMNE COUNTY 4TH DISTRICT SUPERVISOR

At the April 2nd Board of Supervisors meeting, County Administrator, Craig Pedro, delivered a multiyear forecast in an attempt to indicate what the county might expect by way of the economy and our future financial performance.

Mr. Pedro cited several sources to obtain a general gauge as to the course of the national economy. The bottom line is that economic recovery on the national level is still a ways off. The housing market is showing slight improvement and it may take well into 2013 and perhaps even into 2015 for us to see the signs of recovery.

At the state level, the experts feel that unemployment will remain elevated for the next couple of years. Governor Brown's solution to solve the state's estimated \$9 Billion deficit involves three components:

- Ask the voters to approve a 1/4 percent sales tax increase which would "sunset" after 2016
- Increase the income tax rate on upper income Californians through 2018 (It's worth noting that the top 1% of personal income tax filers currently pay around 40% of the State's total income tax)

(Both #1 and #2 will appear on the November 2012 ballot and would solve approximately \$4.7 Billion of the projected deficit.)

• Make several program cuts, the most significant of which would be CAL Works, a program that provides cash for financial assistance and employment services for low income residents and to subsidize child care programs. This program has been very successful in getting people off welfare and back to work. In my opinion this cut will cost more than it saves.

Over the past four years the community (both the public and private sector) have worked individually and collectively to improve factors to make Tuolumne County a more attractive place in which existing businesses will thrive and new businesses will invest. Evidence of this came in the recent California Association of Local Economic Development (CALED) Professional Advisory Service Report which praised the advances our community and county government have made in this area. There is indeed a sense that the local economy has begun to stabilize. Visit the Tuolumne County web page at www. co.tuolumne.ca.us to review the report in its entirety.

Even with a little light at the end of the tunnel it does not mean that all local economy is healthy but we are going in the right direction. We need to continue to follow the strategies that our combined efforts have outlined and set forth as a plan for the future. The Board of Supervisors has had to make difficult decisions. The hard work and sacrifices made by our managers, employees and other elected officials are paying off. We will be ending this budget cycle with a surplus of approximately \$2.9 M.

It is anticipated that \$514,000 of the "one time" money will be used to do additional road repair. Because of sound fiscal management, the County is facing a relatively small deficit in fiscal year 2012-2013, but, we may have larger problems in following years if the economy does not rebound.

The Board of Supervisors has agreed on the following strategies:

- Redouble our emphasis on a commitment to economic development
- Pursue our legislative platforms and to continue to pursue road funding
- Pursue key elements of the 5 Year Plan
- Continue to follow Board adopted budget policies
- Balance annual operating budgets without use of "one time" money
- Use "one time" money for "one time" things (i.e. debt, reserves, liabilities, equipment, plant infrastructure)
- Maintain non ear marked General Fund Contingencies
- Prioritize public safety and road maintenance services
- Match Federal and State funding reduction with commensurate cuts
- Follow the plan/ strategies that have guided us this far
- Economize wherever possible
- Target reductions where volume dictates

- Eliminate services the private sector can provide
- Streamline and cut costs by reorganization
- Reduce costs of the existing labor force through bargaining
- Program and labor force reductions

We will move forward in all 5 major categories listed above to form the 2012-2013 County Budget. This approach has been successful over the last 3 budget cycles.

There is no easy fix but we are ever aware of the needs of the community and are constantly on the alert in seeking ways to improve our situation. Prior actions have not solved the entire problem and more actions will be needed to ensure that the county budget remains balanced as we move forward. A strong economy will help.

We have been notified by the State Finance Department that the sale of approximately 5 acres of Justice Center property to the State has been approved. The Justice Center and its related activities have been a topic of conversation for many of our County residents over the past several years. It is very important for everyone to understand that the building of the new court house on the Justice Center property IS NOT a County project. The State will own the property and the court house and the State will fund the project and pay all costs for the construction and on-going maintenance elements for this facility. The land, approximately 5 acres in size, will be purchased from the County by the State for approximately \$800,000.

Some recent good news from California Dept of Transportation is that they will be doing about \$10,000,000 in road repair work in Tuolumne County. The following list shows scheduled improvement areas.

- Intersection lighting at the intersection of Chicken Ranch Road and Highway 108
- Intersection lighting at J59 and Highway 108, with an east bound acceleration lane to be added
- Turn out on Highway 49 from Moccasin to Mariposa
- Culvert replacement in Groveland

and Big Oak Flat

• Highway 132 pavement overlay from Stanislaus County Line to Highway 49

We have been working on the intersection lighting for nearly 3 years and are seeing this project agreed to and scheduled on the calendar...We are pleased with the announcement and find that although it seems that requests can fall on deaf ears, there are those behind the scene that have taken our requests to heart and produced positive results...

The State does listen sometimes!

Grandparenting

It is not uncommon in many parts of the world today and in the past for grandparents to raise their grandchildren. Parents facing economic difficulties, job loss, drug or alcohol problems and relationship turmoil can create an unstable and unhealthy home life for their children. It is painful for parents to recognize that their children cannot thrive in that type of atmosphere and often as a last resort go to their parents for help. Sometimes the separation of children and parents can be just temporary depending on the nature of the problems. Unfortunately, sometimes the placement with the grandparents is long term. This may also include very little or no contact between parent and child. In either case, this creates painful separation anxiety and depression for both. Often times children are too young to be told or would not understand what or why this happening. Their emotional responses and behavior reflect their feelings of anger, confusion, resentment and a great deal of fear. Their parents' emotional responses are much the same with the addition of guilt.

The parents are very fortunate if they have parents who are physically, emotionally and financially capable of providing a comfortable home for their grandchildren. Sadly, this may not always be the case, but when there are few or no other acceptable options, grandparents will take the children in anyway. Cynthia and Don loved their grandsons dearly and when their daughter told them that she was homeless and addicted to drugs, their response was, "We will not let our grandsons live on the street with you and your drug friends and we don't want to have them put in foster care with people they don't know, so we will take them home with us."

Their decision is made out of love and self sacrifice. They soon recognize it means starting over raising a child/children when they are not as young as they were the first time around. One grandmother lamented, "Been there, done that and now I have to start all over again. I know that I will have less energy and stamina to deal with all that goes into raising a child. "

They face internal emotional conflict providing full time care for grandkids, between wanting to help their own child in a time of need and their own plans for retirement.

This requires a complete change in thinking, life direction and added responsibilities. The time clock is turned upside down.

They know this is crucial because the child's welfare is at stake and there could be life long negative consequences.

A major adjustment must be made by all parties concerned. It will not be easy or smooth but they are willing and hopefully able to do what needs to be done, even if it is difficult or inconvenient.

Remember you have more wisdom and experience now. You have done it before and you can do it even better now. What can compare to the happiness and love of a child? Ultimately, the rewards may be worth more than the cost.

You are not alone. There are many grandparents in the community who are raising their grandchildren. It may be helpful to form a support group. If you are interested I would be happy to help.

RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Tandoori Chicken

RECIPE PROVIDED BY TOM KNOTH AND PAULA MARTELL OF "TWO LITTLE PIGS BBQ CATERING"

Our latest of many diets that we have been on is the "Dukan Diet", which starts out with an "attack phase" of eating nothing but lean and low fat proteins. We were inspired to try this diet by a couple of gals who work in town (Shari and Nancy) that are both slimming up very quickly. The tough thing about this diet, though, is keeping your meals interesting when you can't cook with fats, oil, sugars, or carbohydrates. But we like a challenge, and we found some great Indian cuisine recipes that work well for this diet; this is one of our favorites.

INGREDIENTS

- 2 Tbsp Canola Oil
- 6 med Garlic Cloves, minced or pressed
- 2 Tbsp Fresh Ginger, grated
- 1 Tbsp Garam Masala (see note)
- 2 tsp Ground Cumin
- 2 tsp Chili Powder

- 1 cup Plain Yogurt
- 4 Tbsp Lime Juice- divided 2 tsp Salt
- 3 pounds Bone-in, Skin-on Chicken Thighs; or Boneless, Skinless **Chicken Breasts**

DIRECTIONS

1 Heat oil in small skillet over L medium heat until shimmering. Add garlic and ginger and cook just until fragrant, about 1 minute. Add garam masala, cumin, and chili powder; continue to cook until fragrant, 30 to 60 seconds longer. Transfer half of garlic spice mixture to medium bowl and stir in the yogurt and 2 TB lime juice and set aside.

 $2^{\mathrm{In}\,\mathrm{a}\,\mathrm{large}\,\mathrm{bowl\,\,combine\,\,remaining}}_{\mathrm{garlic\,\,spice\,\,mixture,\,\,2\,\,\mathrm{TB}\,\,\mathrm{lime}}$ juice, and salt. Using a sharp knife, lightly score skinned side of each piece of chicken, making 2 or 3 shallow cuts about 1 inch apart and about 1/8

inch deep; transfer chicken to large bowl with spices and rub the slat spice mixture evenly on all pieces of chicken. Let sit at room temp for 30 minutes.

3 Adjust oven rack to upper middle position and heat oven to 325 degrees. Pour yogurt mixture over chicken and toss until chicken pieces are coated with thick layer. Arrange chicken pieces, scored side down on wire rack set in foil lined cookie sheet. Discard excess yogurt mixture. Bake chicken until instant -read thermometer inserted into thickest part reads 125 degrees for breast and 130 for thighs, 15 to 25 minutes. Smaller pieces take longer so transfer then to a plate while the other pieces bake to their needed temperature.

After removing the chicken from 4 the oven turn oven to broil and heat 10 minutes. Once broiler is heated



flip chicken pieces over and broil until chicken is lightly charred in spots and the instant-read thermometer registers 158 for breasts and 170 for legs and thighs, 8 to 15 minutes. Remove from oven and light cover chicken with foil and let it rest for five minutes before serving.

Note: If you cant find Garam Masala, substitute with 2 tsp ground coriander, 1/4 tsp ground cardamom, 1/4 tsp ground cinnamon, and 1/2 tsp ground black pepper.

Your Community Fire Department

the great progress our community fire department has made since its inception. From its earliest history, the towns of Groveland and Big Oak Flat were served by an all-volunteer fire department. As the population and needs increased, and through the community's support, we now have a full-time, full-service fire department.

In 1986, a used fire engine was acquired and for the first time a fulltime fire chief was hired to manage the fire department and its volunteers. As money allowed, we began to upgrade the apparatus and equipment. Fire station 1 was constructed in 1988, and the first full-time firefighter was hired. Additional equipment was needed, and in 1989, a used 1969 fire engine was purchased.

A second full-time firefighter joined the ranks in 1990 and both firefighters became qualified as driver/operators to transport the engine and operate the pump on the fire apparatus. The full-time staff set up training standards for the volunteers to be achieved as they had time in their busy lives. The fire department was re-evaluated by the Insurance Service Office (ISO). The ISO rating was protection class 7/9. However, with the full-time personnel and the newer apparatus, the ISO protection class rating was lowered to 5/9. This was great news because of the potential savings for homeowner's insurance rates. ISO assigns public protection class with a numbering system from 1 to 10. Class 1 represents an exemplary fire suppression program (typically, a well-funded urban department) and a Class 10 indicates that the area's fire

Let's reflect back on some of suppression program does not meet during emergency calls. A small rescue ISO's minimum criteria (many rural volunteer fire departments fall into this category).

> The following items are what ISO considers during their evaluation.

• Fire alarm and communication systems, including telephone systems, telephone lines to dispatch, staffing, and

dispatching systems (10% of the score) • The fire department, including equipment, staffing, training, and geographic

distribution of fire companies (50% of the score)

• The water supply system, including condition and maintenance of hydrants, alternative water supply, and a careful evaluation of the amount of available water on hand compared with the amount needed to suppress fires up to 2500 gallons per minute (40% of the score)

In the years between 1990 and 2000, a new engine was purchased to replace one of the engines in the aging fleet of apparatus. Other equipment was found to be a safety issue so new self-contained breathing apparatus and personal protective clothing were purchased in an effort to keep the firefighters safe

squad was purchased to carry special tools, such as the Jaws of Life, low angle rope rescue gear, and swift water rescue equipment. A third full-time engineer was hired based on the increasing call volume and the firefighters began 24/7 coverage with one lone firefighter per shift. This was a huge step for the fire department and the community

> because it enabled the fire personnel to respond more quickly to emergency calls.

In October of 2007, it had been seventeen years since ISO had evaluated the fire department. Even though there were now

stricter guidelines due to state and federal mandates, the

fire department kept its rating of 5/9. This was great news because in a Fire Master Plan performed earlier that year by Citygate Associates they thought we would not keep our ISO rating. However, with dedication and perseverance, the staff improved the fire department programs and staffing between the time the Master Plan was published and ISO did their inspection, enabling the department to keep its current rating.

In late November of 2007, the Fire Department began a reserve firefighter program. These firefighters fill an important role by providing a third, part-time firefighter on each shift. Some reserves come to us highly qualified from CAL Fire, the Forest Service, the City of Sonora, Tuolumne County Fire Department, and other Special Districts or Fire Departments. Others come as recent graduates of fire academies looking for experience to apply what they have learned. This reserve program makes it possible to stay within the budget while maintaining the high level of service attributed to the Groveland Fire Department. Having a third person on duty has broadened the scope of what the fire department can do on initial attack in fire situations, vehicle accidents, medical emergencies, public service assists, and the day-to-day operations of the fire station.

In, March of 2008 the fire department submitted a vehicle acquisition grant request through the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA). We were notified on November 28, 2008 that we were successful in receiving the grant! The fire department then released bid documents to 11 manufacturing companies for bid proposals. Pierce Manufacturing built our engine in 2009 at their Appleton, Wisconsin plant.

Currently, the Groveland Fire Department's full-time staff is assisted by a vital and active volunteer and reserve program. The department covers 14.7 square miles including Groveland, Pine Mountain Lake, and Big Oak Flat. Groveland Fire responds to medical aid calls, vehicle accidents and fires, structure fires, smoke checks, vegetation fires, all other types of fires, and offers public education and assistance. Let's continue to work together for our community.

Photographing the Nighttime Sky – Revisited

Many of the images from the articles that I write in the Pine Mountain Lake Newsletter are taken with the aid of an array of telescopes, telescope mounts, and cameras - but anyone can take beautiful pictures of the evening sky with just about any camera. Taking a photograph after sunset requires some special considerations. First of all, in order to collect enough light, the exposure time will be greater than day-time photographs. Longer exposure times require a very steady camera so the image doesn't come out blurry. The best way to accomplish this is by using a tripod. If a tripod isn't available, try setting your camera on a steady location, like a wall or chair, and use the "countdown timer" feature for your camera shutter. Using the countdown timer on your camera will also minimize the shaking that would normally occur when you press down on the shutter button.

Another challenge when taking photographs in low light conditions is camera focus. The auto-focus feature on your camera requires a minimum level of light to operate properly. One trick that I usually use is to focus on a distant bright object so the camera can focus, and then use that focus setting when taking photographs of dim objects that are a similar distance away. If you happen to be using a camera with a manual focus, you can set the focus to infinity.

I took the photograph that's printed in this newsletter in February 2012 from where my observatory is located in the Groveland area. I used a DSLR digital camera mounted on a tripod. The exposure time was 25 seconds. With this wide field view (24mm focal length, 38mm equivalent on a APS-C sized sensor), 25 seconds is about as long of an exposure that can be used before the stars become elongated. Remember that the sky is in constant motion as the Earth rotates – most



visible as you see the sun move from east to west during the day. This same movement is still happening during the night, it's just a little harder to notice. If you watch a bright star (or planet) you will notice that it's moving at about the same pace that you see the sun move across the sky during the day. The one caveat is that objects in the sky that are near our poles don't move as much as objects that pass overhead. Think about the star Polaris (the North Star), it really doesn't move at all – at least not an amount that can be perceived with the naked eye. This is because the poles of the Earth don't move as fast as the equator. It's similar to spinning a basketball at the end of your finger; the point where your finger contacts the basketball is almost stationary as the rest of the ball rotates around it.

This photograph shows my observatory dome with some very well known nighttime objects in the sky. Directly above the dome is the Orion constellation. Orion, sometimes called "the hunter", is one of the most recognizable constellations in the night sky. Its

name refers to Orion, a hunter in Greek mythology. Some of the most prominent features of Orion are the 3 bright stars in a row that form the "belt" of Orion. Surrounding the belt, at about the same distances forming a rectangle, are four bright stars, which are considered to represent the outline of the hunter's body. The stars in the Orion constellation vary in distance from the Earth. The furthest is about 1,400 light-years away and the closest is about 240 light-years away. Light travels 186,000 miles per second – a light-year is the distance that light travels in one year (about 6 trillion miles).

Also visible, above the dome and to the left, is the star Sirius. Sirius is the brightest star in the night sky. It is almost twice as bright as the next brightest star. The name "Sirius" is derived from an ancient Greek word that means "glowing". It appears so bright because it is both large (about twice as massive as our sun) and relatively close as far as stars go (about 8.5 light-years from Earth).

You can take similar photographs with almost any digital camera that will allow you to control the length of time that the shutter is open – grab a tripod and give it a try!

In groups of two and three, the survivors began the deadly, congested decent down the stairwell. Ling Young, who was amongst the survivors, recalls seeing the man with red handkerchief carrying a woman on his back down 12 floors in order to place her in clearer air. The man with the red handkerchief encouraged the remaining survivors to continue their descent as he turned and went back up the stairs... disappearing into the howling darkness. He was never seen again, as the tower collapsed 24

minutes later.

A quote was made by President George W. Bush that encompasses everything that the man with the red handkerchief stood for and which I believe represents his actions and memory. It is as follows:

"Now, we have inscribed a new memory alongside those others, it is a memory of tragedy and shock, of loss and mourning but not only of loss and mourning it is also a memory of bravery and self sacrifice and the love that lay down its life for a friend- even a friend it never knew."

Humanity comes in many different forms and undoubtedly evolves from the most tragic of times. It can be found all around us, even in our community. The Rotarians are responsible for prompting this speech and are a group which displays a prime example of humanity by helping those in need, or those who are unable to help themselves. They even help students discover humanity and embrace it. I embrace humanity be remembering those who gave their lives to a cause greater than themselves and whose self sacrifice will not be forgotten.

Humanity is not learned from a book, given to you in an e-mail, or randomly posted on Facebook. Humanity is felt, resides within, and exists in all of us no matter what we do or say. People can spend their lifetime trying to tuck it away but it's still there.... between the heart and soul.

He also leaves a great granddaughter, Morgan Buhler and his older sister, Marjorie Timbrook of Denver, CO.

Mr Dickson was preceded in death by his oldest daughter Judith D. Parker.
