

As I mentioned in previous articles, the Board of Directors and management team have been working on the preparation of the 2013 Budget. In October, we held our annual budget draft review at the Lake Lodge and made significant progress. We had to weigh member service, maintenance standards and member expectations against cost to the membership and made some tough choices. There was a lot of healthy debate, and in the end, I believe we came up with the best budget possible.


The approval of the budget will be made by the Board of Directors at the November 10th Board meeting. The meeting will be held at the Lake Lodge and start at 9 a.m. I would like to thank the Budget and Finance Committee for reviewing the budget draft and providing useful input and recommendations to the Board.

A few months ago, we received input from members about communication and access to the Board members. Directors email address (pmlaboard@ pinemountainlake.com). This email address allows members to express their concerns or opinions directly to the entire Board at one time. We have already received several emails from members regarding mergers and the status of the CC&R revision. As most of you know, we revised and updated our CC&R's and included a provision for mergers. The provision allows members to merge their lots, but would still require payment of the assessments on both lots. We have lost a ton of assessment income due to mergers over the years and this provision will stop the reduction of our assessment base.

The Board is asking all members to vote yes for the new CC&R revision. The overall financial impact to the membership has increased every year and we need to make this happen.

Planning has begun on the replacement of the Marina Store/Café building. This is a building that has long outlived its usefulness and we

> are wasting money making repairs every year just to keep it going. Members of the Long Range Planning Committee and the Board are working with management to




come up with the best plan for the replacement of this building.

Once we have a planning concept finalized, we will inform the membership and get input so that we can consider all of the information before proceeding with this project. We want a building that is efficient, built within our budget and something our members can be proud of.

It has been a tough year and the state of our nation's economy is troubling, but I just want to let you know that your Board and management team are on the job and working hard to make sure that PML is a fun, safe, affordable, great place to live and visit.

General Manager's Message

CC&R's Revision Status Update

As I mentioned in my October article, the Bylaws revision passed by a high margin of those members who voted during the election. Unfortunately, the proposed Declaration (CC&R's) revision did not receive the quorum necessary to pass. The ratio of approval was high, but we did not receive the necessary amount of ballots from voting members to achieve the 51% quorum necessary for approval.

Given the high rate of approval of members who did vote, Association Counsel recommended proceeding with a re-ballot process. The Board of Directors agreed and decided to send out a second balloting to those members who did not vote during the first round. A few members questioned the validity of the re-balloting process and we responded to their concerns. The balloting and re-balloting was conducted in accordance with Association Bylaws, the Civil Code and advice of Association Counsel. In fact, our attorney provided the step-bystep process for us to follow.

As of the date of this writing, we achieved a quorum. The final CC&R ballot count will be held at the November 10th Board meeting at the Lake Lodge. The meeting starts at 9 a.m. and all members are welcome to attend. For those members who cannot attend, we will provide the final vote count on the PML website and publish it in the December issue of the PML News.

2012 Goals and Objectives Status Update

Each year the Board meets with management to set the goals and objectives for the next year. Most of the 2012 goals and objectives have been completed. We have a few remaining and we anticipate completion in the fourth quarter. The list of completed goals will be published in the PML News in January as usual.

Rock Canyon Pedestrian Bridge

The replacement of the Rock Canyon Pedestrian Bridge is completed. The bride is located between the Rock Canyon mailhouse and tennis courts and was in a poor location and in need of replacement. Maintenance installed new concrete footings and span timbers, and finished it up with a new coat of paint. The new bridge was placed in a better position for water drainage and use by those members who like to walk on our trails.

PML Financial Webpage

The PML Website contains a lot of useful information for our members. One of the pages provides detailed financial information such as the fee schedule, annual report, pro-forma budget, collection policy, house charge and automatic debit and credit payment authorization. We used to include a summarized version of the monthly financials. We changed this to include

a detailed version of the monthly financials so that members have easy access 24-hours a day. This will save our members and staff time, and PMLA money in printing and mailing costs.

2013 Budget Meetings

The annual budget review and preparation meeting was held on Saturday, October 27th at the Lake Lodge. The meeting started promptly at 8 a.m. and several interested members were in attendance. The final approval of the Budget is made by the Board of Directors at the November Board meeting, which is scheduled for Saturday, November 10th. This meeting will also be held at the Lake Lodge and begins at 9 a.m.

Long Range Planning

I recently attended the LRPC meeting and the committee asked me to inform the Board that they are seeking members who are interested in joining this committee. The committee will be working on a new member survey and they are looking for active participants. We will be posting notices and publishing the information in the November edition of the PML News.

YEAR ROUND SWIMMING FACILITY

I would like to comment on PML Board President, Brian Sweeney's comments about a new indoor year-round swimming facility being characterized as a "new amenity". Yes, that is technically correct because a new year-round swimming facility would be a totally new construction in a different location to better meet the needs of PML members. The present pool is over 40 years old and simply does not meet the needs of PML. If PML is to attract new members the present pool is simply outdated. PML members who use the pool regularly are well aware of all the issues with this pool. As an example, the ramp leading down to the pool from the parking lot is somewhat of a hazard to some members; the pool is too deep for small children even using

life vests; the dressing rooms are in serious need of updating, the pool heater consistently breaks down..... When the Board considers whether to allot money in the budget to replace the present pool, one must weigh the costs of updating and repair of this 40+ year old facility and decide if the money might be better spent on a new updated facility. PML members are asking that money be budgeted to develop a design and prepare the costs associated with building a new year round swimming facility. Once the plans and costs are obtained, they can be presented to all PML members who will ultimately decide if they wish to proceed.

PMLA Money Matters

This month I thought I would attempt to answer some of the more common questions we get at this time of the year. With the new budget just about complete and the annual mailing of the assessment and budget for 2013, this is an important time of year and some helpful information seemed in order.

Q - When does the budget and assessment for next year get approved?

A-Each year the budget and resulting assessment is reviewed by the Board of Directors at the regularly scheduled October meeting and approved at the November meeting. This year the November meeting occurs on the 10th at the Lake Lodge.

Q – When does the assessment for next year get mailed out to all property owners?

A – Once the budget and assessment is approved by the Board we prepare

all of the required documents and disclosures for distribution. This comprehensive and informative package is then mailed out prior to the end of November.

Q - When should I expect to receive my package?

A – If you do not receive the budget and assessment package by the middle of December you should contact the Administration office so we can get a replacement set out to you quickly.

Q - How do you determine the amount of the assessment each year?

A – The short answer is that we take the total amount required by the next year's budget and divide it by the number of assessable lots within the Association. The budget preparation process is very lengthy and involves a great deal of review and scrutiny. A major factor influencing the assessment level is the declining number of lots over which we can spread the costs. Every year we lose a significant number of lots to mergers. This impacts all property owners and is especially relevant for 2013.

Q - Does the current state of the overall economy play a part in the budget and resulting assessment level?

A – Of course we try and take all factors into account when preparing the budget. Just as with individual property owners the economy has an impact on the financial condition of the Association as a whole. Our primary responsibility is to maintain all of the common areas and to provide the level of service that all property owners expect and deserve. We believe this year's budget accomplishes both of these goals.

Q - Is it possible to "withdraw" from the Association?

A - The governing documents of Pine Mountain Lake state that all properties located within the Association are automatically considered members and must share equally in the payment of the assessment necessary to run the community. No provision exists for leaving the Association short of selling the lot.

Q - How can I pay for the assessment?

A – Assessments can be paid either in full or on a monthly basis. Payments in full that are received prior to January 31 are entitled to a \$60 discount off of the total assessment amount. Payments can be made by check, credit card, or cash. We also have automatic payment plans available that charge your credit card or checking account each month.

Shades of Green

Now that it is early November I am hoping we are on our way to a fall, winter, and spring that produces large quantities of rain and snow in the mountains to fill our lakes and reservoirs. This past summer saw us use about 25% more irrigation than during 2011, due to a reduced winter of rain and a HOT August. With additional irrigation, comes an additional cost due to pumping charges. There is a cost related to pumping the water from the lake to the mixing pond and then out onto the golf course. Depending on the amounts of rain and the timing of the storms the irrigation for the course will remove around 12-18 inches of water from the lake to the course. More water will evaporate from the lake than we will use.

The September greens aeration went well, and as I write this we are preparing to aerate the rest of the course along with a fall fertilizer application.

Some of our scheduled projects for fall and winter on the course are: continue our culvert improvement projects because of their failure due to age: fall leaf removal and clean up: tree maintenance and care: improve the edges around a few bunkers that are thin due to a buildup of sand over the years: irrigation sprinkler head maintenance. As the weather permits we will tackle our "hardpan spots" to improve them with

additional aeration and vertical cutting.

It is also the time of year we work on the budget for next year. Our labor for 2013 will remain the same as 2012. Our full time staff equals 11.7 and has remained the same over the past few years since we realized a reduction years ago due to the new irrigation system and the reduction in maintenance required to keep the old one up and running.

We plan to ask the Board to consider purchasing some new equipment in 2013 to replace old equipment that has reached the end of its useful life. This equipment has high hours and sometimes parts are hard to get. We try to research equipment that best fits our application, at times we will put off some purchases in a given year to put together a large package deal the next year so we can realize a 15-20% savings in doing so.

I would like to thank all the volunteers that came out when we were closed for aeration and filled divots throughout the course. If Mother Nature would cooperate and give us some natural irrigation we would reap the benefits of your efforts even more. Did Uncle Milt ever get out of the cart?

Shotgun season is near, remember to be aware of the winter conditions on the course when walking on the slopes or driving the carts off of the paths.

Smoky Neighborhoods?

Yeah! Fall is here. And what comes with fall? The risk of smoke filling our neighborhoods. Now, I'm not talking about people who use wood to heat their homes. Those folks use dry wood, and the wood stoves keep the fire pretty hot. So the result is a pretty clean burn without a lot of smoke produced.

What I worry about are those folks who feel the need to burn pine needles and leaves. When they are wet, you get the kind of smoke shown in the photo. And that's not good.

What the experts suggest we do is change our habits. We should NOT rake up those leaves and pine needles in the fall, but leave them on the ground all winter long and well into the spring. That way, they act as a deterrent to soil erosion, which is a big problem for our lake. When the weather dries in late spring, then it's time to rake them up and take them to the compost pile.

Another important tip from the experts is to NOT rake up all debris so aggressively to the point where all you see is "bare mineral soil". This deprives your bushes and trees of

needed nutrients that come from the decay of dead vegetation.

What works best is raking up the big stuff on top, but leave the "duff" (partially decayed plant matter) underneath where it is. This gives the perfect balance of reducing the threat of wildfire, and feeding the trees the nutrients they need to be healthy.

Burn Season

By the time you receive the November issue of PMLNews, CalFire may have lifted the No-Burn restrictions of the fire season. Check with the main gate to be sure. In any event, if you have a PML burn permit from a prior year you are all set. PML burn permits are good for 5 years from the issue date.

The process for burning remains the same: First, call the main gate to see if it's a burn day (as determined by Tuolumne County Air Quality Control), the main gate will ask you for your burn permit #. You are now ready to burn safe and burn clean. It wouldn't hurt to take a refresher course on burning by watching the 23 minute fire safety video "Be Ready, Be Safe" posted on the PML website, www.pinemountainlake/firesafety.com.

Smoke from burning is always going to be an issue every year. We have found that too much smoke is usually caused by trying to burn wet needles and leaves or trying to burn after a rain storm and your pile was left uncovered. We prefer you take needles and leaves to the compost dump. When these are raked into piles they never seem to dry out and typically will create a smoke complaint from someone in your neighborhood. If we find that you are burning improperly our safety personnel

will ask you to put the fire out.

Winter Brush Work

The winter season is an excellent time to do your brush thinning. Removing unwanted tree startups, brush that has died and the dead branches on live brush is a job best suited for the winter time when it's cooler, you can stack it up and burn it, and you have your summer free to have fun. Plus, the vendors who do this kind of work have more time available and are eager to bid new work.

Auto-Clean Up Program

And if you've had enough of the fire safety cleanup that is required every year, let PML do it for you. We will put your Lot out to bid in late May, pick the best bid, send you a bid authorization form to accept this bid and we take care of the rest and add the bid amount to your member account. Last year was the first year of this new program. It is particularly attractive to Lots without homes. These members may not get up here very often and it's an inconvenience to set aside a weekend or two to clean their Lot. You can sign up on the PMLA website under the fire safety tab or we will fax or mail the signup form. We had 50 members sign up the first year and we are looking for more participation each year.

Horsing Around at the Stables

Traffic Calming Measures

As many of you may have noticed, the Main Gate exit lane has several new additions: a "Bactrian" speed hump system and improvements to the pedestrian window. How exciting! For several years we at the Department of Safety have noticed an increase in the speed of traffic exiting Pine Mountain Lake. The exit lane consistently has a lot of pedestrian traffic, comprised of both Pine Mountain Lake employees and those wanting to utilize the pedestrian walk up window. Although we have had mixed reviews regarding the two speed humps, their construction is both an important concept and achievement. The single speed hump we previously had was deteriorating in many places and had not been constructed wide enough for the entire lane. Many drivers would simply go around it on the far right side so that only the driver side of the vehicle was impacted by the speed hump. A cross walk had also been painted on the roadway from the curb to the rear door at the Main Gate. While some drivers would yield for pedestrians, many would not even slow down. This, of course, created a traffic hazard for pedestrians. The speed humps so far have shown excellent results in slowing traffic down to a more reasonable and safe speed.

The yellow bollards and a larger concrete pad have also been installed to protect pedestrians at the Main Gate walk up window from vehicle traffic.

The bollards and concrete pad make the lane somewhat narrower, further hindering drivers from pulling to the side and stopping traffic so that they can ask questions from their vehicles. We always encourage drivers to either park and walk up to the pedestrian window, or to simply pull around to the drive up window so that we may help them. Stopping in the middle of the lane is just not safe or practical.

The concerns we have encountered at the Main Gate are one in the same with the type of complaints the Department of Safety receives regarding speeding within Pine Mountain Lake. While occasionally the speeders are guests or temporary renters, more often than not it is a property owner or long term renter driving over the speed limit. Residents are frequently out walking for their health, walking to enjoy nature, walking their pets, riding bicycles, etc. Most of us are aware that there is not any asphalt walking path, concrete sidewalk, bike lane, etc. for pedestrian traffic in this community. It is for that reason that maintaining the 25 mile per hour speed limit is so important. Please continue to watch your speed as you drive through Pine Mountain Lake.

Restaurants Now Face Competition from Nontraditional Competitors

Restaurants including the Grill are facing more and more competition these days. Gas stations, Convenience stores like 7-Eleven, and

Grocery chains like Save Mart and Safeway have always seen made to order grab and go as a way to boost sales. Whole Foods Market and Sprouts saw an opportunity to eat healthier in their in store Deli's. I was in the Bay Area recently and noticed a new chain of stores starting to pop up. It is called Fresh & Easy. I was amazed at the variety of readymade meals there was to choose from. I thought to myself how hard it is for restaurants to survive these days. But in this same shopping center there was a Five Guys Burgers and Fries, a Panera Bread and a Grand opening for Chick-fil-A with a line out the door. Research shows that baby boomers buy prepared food from such nontraditional outlets nine times a month; 34- to 54-yearold consumers buy food from them four times a month; 18- to 34-yearold consumers buy food there at least eight times a month; and all consumers shop there at least three times a month.

Surveys show that convenience is a chief motivating factor for consumers to visit a grocery, convenience or drug store for a meal option instead of stopping at a restaurant. "We have some valuable real estate," said Louie Sheetz, executive vice president of the 430-unit convenience store chain, Sheetz. "We're strategically placed when the customer is out for the day," he continued. "And we're an opportunity for today's multitasking consumer to do more than one thing with that stop."

To lure the mobile, multitasking customer, such nontraditional competitors are offering a wider range of food items, like freshly made sandwiches, wraps, salads, fresh fruit, beverages, heat-and-eat dishes and even specialty items like sushi — which is in test at about 10

Walgreen's locations in major urban

The nontraditional competitors are well financed and pervasive as well. Restaurants see new startups with two or four or six units coming after our business. Now you've got Walgreen's and Duane Reade, with 7,500 [units], as a true threat to restaurants. Walgreen's also has over \$78 billion in sales.

Another study shows that low prices are the most important factor — more so than convenient location, fast service, and order accuracy — when it comes to deciding which limited-service, dine-in restaurants to patronize, wrote Technomic, Inc. Editor Aimee Harvey in a blog post Thursday.

The blog post was based Technomic's "The Influence of Income Consumer Trend Report," which examined 2,000 consumers from four economic groups — working, lower middle, upper middle, and affluent — and analyzed their attitudes about dining out. The study showed that middle-income consumers, which made up 50 percent of the 2,000 individuals surveyed, are sometimes still clutching their pocketbooks despite the softening recession.

The report also found that more traditional health claims, such as low calorie or fat free, were appealing to upper-middle consumers, Harvey wrote

There is a third threat to restaurants and that is the price of gas and the fact that people have less to spend. Many studies show that when people have less disposable income they cut back on dining out. And now with gas in California rising faster than I write this article we at the Grill are finding ways to keep prices affordable and the dining experience special and service at a high level that will keep you coming back for more. Of course you can't get a better view anywhere especially at those nontraditional competitors. Nor do your suggestions count at the competition as it does at the Grill. 



PML Air Racers

Imagine 8 airplanes flying in close proximity 50 feet above the ground at greater than 300 mph. The pilot of each plane carefully divides attention between terrain avoidance, collision avoidance, and picking the fastest route around a barrel affixed to the top of a telephone pole. Such is Sport Class Air Racing at Reno Nevada: exciting to watch, but even more exciting to experience from the cockpit.

Two of our PML residents participate in this annual event. Lee Behel, a recent addition to the PML aviation community is a 13-year veteran of Sport Class Air Racing. Vicky Benzing, a long-time resident of PML, and a very active member of the PML aviation community is a 3-year veteran of Sport Class Air Racing.

The Reno-Stead Airport is host to the National Championship Air Races that are held annually in mid-September. There are 6 classes of aircraft that compete: Formula One, Biplanes, T-6, Sport Class, Unlimited and now Jets. Each class has specific rules of competition and allowable aircraft modification. The Sport Class, in which Lee and Vicky compete, is comprised of amateur-built airplanes most built from production kits.

Vicky and Lee are each very competitive air racers, but they arrived at the sport from different directions. Vicky says that she has loved flying for as long as she can remember and her love has never wavered. She still owns the very first airplane she learned in and thinks of it fondly. She and her pilot husband Jeff now own several airplanes. They range from a WW II Vintage Biplane to a King Air to a helicopter and a backcountry Bush Plane. Vicky flies them all with equal enthusiasm (and expertise). She seems to possess an insatiable desire to be in the air. The day she was interviewed for this article, she had just completed a 6-hour flight from Texas back to PML yet she couldn't wait to jump back into the airplane to go formation flying. Her Husband Jeff reports that when flying cross-country VFR to and from

Airshows, she frequently flies out of her way to go sightseeing.

Vicky's aerobatic flying started at Reid-Hillview Airport in San Jose where she took lessons from the iconic Amelia Reid, but it was an aerobatic flight with another PML resident, Wayne Handley, which solidified her love of aerobatics. Seeing her enthusiastic response to their first flight together, Wayne said, "Oh, this is going to be a really expensive flight for you". He was right. She wound up acquiring not one but hours of instruction and years of dedicated Missile" practice, Vicky is in high demand on the airshow circuit.

Lee jokes that he came to flying trying to dodge the draft. This is true only to the point that he had a low draft number (they used a lottery back then) that motivated Lee to become a military pilot. Lee learned to fly in college, and applied to Air Force Pilot Training at his first opportunity. That led to a 24 year career flying F-101 Voodoos and F-4 Phantoms for the Nevada Air National Guard.

As a member of the Nevada Air Guard. Lee worked as a volunteer in Operations at the Reno Air Races. After retiring from the Guard. Lee moved from Air Race. Operations to Air Race Pilot. He owned an amateur built Questair Venture that was reasonably fast, but it didn't fit into any of the existing race classes. He solved that problem with the help of some squadron mates by forming the new Sport Class.

Lee has served as the President of the Sport Class since its inception in 1998. He recruited Vicky with a personal invitation to attend Pylon Race School (PRS). PRS teaches pylon racing and provides refresher training at Stead Field every June. Lee presents it as a unique flying experience that's fun whether one ever intended to race or not. Vicky took the bait, attended the school and is now hooked on racing. She won her very first race 3 years ago and has gotten faster every year. This year she finished an impressive 3rd in



two aerobatic Extra 300 airplanes. After Lee Behel & Vicky Benzing with the "Cruse

the Silver Championship Race.

Vicky races Lee's Glasair III, "The Cruse Missile". The airplane previously belonged to Vicki Cruse. Vicki Cruse was Lee's girlfriend and a close friend of Vicky Benzing. She was known and loved in the Aerobatic Community worldwide before she was involved in a fatal accident. A dedication to Vicki Cruse is displayed on the side of the airplane and serves to keep her memory alive.

Lee has raced a Lancair named "Breathless" (for its lack of a turbo-charger) in the Sport Class, but this year had a new mount, "Sweet Dreams". The airplane is a one-of-a-kind prototype powered by a Chevy V-8 engine and built entirely of wood. Lee inherited the name with the airplane but the airplane presented so many problems that "nightmare" might have been more appropriate. All's well that ends well, however, and Lee was pleased with his 4th place finish in the Gold Championship race.

Lee may have recruited Vicky to Sport Class Air Racing, but Vicky and her husband Jeff recruited Lee to PML. They invited Lee up to several PML aviation association meetings (even convincing him to speak at one), hosting him in their house enough to get him hooked on PML. He wound up buying the Blankenberg's place on the airport. One good turn deserves another.

Our present pool has cost a lot of money over the years and it is time to make a change. We need a swimming pool that uses the latest technology, which reduce operating costs. We have an opportunity to create an amenity that can be financially self sufficient in five years, instead of the current financial drain on PML each year.

Second, this present pool does not meet the needs of diversified groups. Serious swimmers need some lap lanes in which to accomplish their goals. Small children need space to keep safe and not be in a traffic area such is the case now. We have a handicap ramp but there is no provision for users to get into the pool as the more modern pools have. A swimming pool is an excellent place for those that are rehabbing from an operation or injury. And a new pool would open new possibilities for use such a high school swim team.

Third, if PML is a vacation destination for many, and, if we want to attract future homebuyers, then a more suitable up-to-date swim center makes sense. I have talked to numerous "off the hill" homeowners and they definitely feel that the present pool is inadequate. Because the marina is so crowed they prefer to use the pool but find it crowded much of the time, also.

We need to look to the future of PML and we need to start planning for a new swim center now. The project will take a few years and we need to be ready to step forward. Our group hopes to communicate with all the different groups at PML and keep people informed about this project so that they can make an informed decision when it comes time to vote.

From Your Tuolumne County District Supervisor

JOHN GRAY, TUOLUMNE COUNTY 4TH DISTRICT SUPERVISOR

I have received a number of questions recently concerning the newly completed study, (yes another study) by the Tuolumne County Transportation Council (TCTC). The study is called Tuolumne Tomorrow.

Tuolumne Tomorrow is a study that deals with the planning process for directing future growth and enhancing the quality of life in Tuolumne County across the next few decades. Tuolumne Tomorrow is a coordinated effort between the City of Sonora, Tuolumne County, Tuolumne County Transportation Council and local residents who participated to develop a longrange vision for growth and development and environmental protection. The growth scenario adopted by the Tuolumne County Board of Supervisors is titled Distinctive Communities Alternative.

For those of you that worry that a study like this is part of a detailed plot by the United Nations to implement Agenda 21...it is not. It is merely a tool to help assist the County and its residents to plan for future growth. The Blue Print process began in late 2007. The work has been funded by a grant from Cal Trans. Having this document in place will help the County secure funding for future infrastructure improvements.

Often in my articles I write about first time achievements for the County. One of the newest first timers has been the establishment of a business plan for Tuolumne County's two airports. Some argue that Government is not a business but no one can argue that you should not use good business practices to help run government. Developing a business plan is a good practice.

The two airports operate as an enterprise fund. Meaning, as a business, they should at least pay for themselves and as a primary goal not be subsidized by the general fund.

We are not achieving that goal at this time. The purpose of the business plan is to quantify and qualify how the airports can fulfill their potential and at the same time achieve the financial goal of at least breaking even.

The County operates two distinct airports. One airport is in Columbia, the other at Pine Mountain Lake in Groveland, each serving a different population and purpose. I mention that there are two because I was talking to a person the other day that has been a resident of the county for about five years and did not know there was an airport in Groveland

The completed business plan for the two airports shows that if the assumptions made in the plan are correct the airports can be at a "break even point" in combined budgets in 2015-16 budget years. For a

This past month I have had a number of meetings dealing with Old Priest Grade issues. In those meetings we have discussed concerns regarding line of sight safety when traveling west and the need for better signage to discourage motor home and truck and trailer traffic. We have even discussed the famous youtube videos. The Cal Trans representative assured me that he would look into those above-mentioned issues and others concerning the route along the corridor and come back with a plan for improvements. I will continue dialogue with the State Agency to make sure that the deficiencies are corrected.

On October 13th I had the pleasure of speaking at the dedication of the new Don Pedro Fire House. What a great asset to the community. I congratulate all that were involved in bringing this project to completion. Job well done!

As most of you are aware Lyle Turpin will be ending his term as a Mariposa Supervisor this year. Lyle has been a great person to work with on all issues. I wish him the best of luck and look forward hearing more about his continued recovery. (Rumor has it that he was walking in his Mariposa office the other day.)

I want to take one more opportunity to remind all of you about the importance of casting your vote on November 6th. Locally, one of the most important ballot measures is Measure G in the Groveland district. I went into detail in my August and September articles on the importance of passing this ballot measure. Please remember this is not a new tax. It is an extension of an existing tax that helps provide necessary funds for the 24/7 ambulance service in Groveland. It takes a 2/3rds majority vote in order for the measure to pass. It's simple, without the funding from the measure there will not be a 24/7 ambulance on the hill. I should not have to explain to any of you how devastating the loss of this vital service would be to our quality of life. The longer it takes to respond to an emergency the less chance there is for survival.

Because of furlough and the holidays I will not have office hours in Don Pedro and Groveland in November and December. There will not be an article in December. I welcome your comments and invite you to contact me. If needed, I can meet with you in Don Pedro, Groveland or Sonora by appointment.



Bud Ferrante. Bud is a physical therapist in private practice in Carmel, CA. Bud



Victims of Bullying

In my previous column I wrote about bullying. I focused mostly on the people who do the bullying. This time I plan to continue this topic but from the point of view of the victims of bullying.

If a child is bullied in elementary school and nothing is done to stop it, it can set up a chain reaction that can continue throughout a child's school years and influence the rest of his life. Other bullies may see that child as being vulnerable and will join in tormenting the already beaten down child. Life loses its promise of satisfying accomplishment when we lack self confidence and self esteem. We never forget our childhood experiences of being a victim of bullying. We only hope we can overcome it. Unfortunately, we have seen many instances where the hurt turns to rage and it builds up to a point of loss of reason and turns to revenge.

Bullying isn't just kids' play anymore. It has taken a very ugly turn to include people of all ages with often serious consequences. It used to be like this, usually at school; "You're stupid," or "You're weird," or "Do what I say or I'll beat you up." We have become much more sophisticated in our ability to be cruel and reckless.

Nowadays, with the inventions of modern day technology, nasty stories are concocted and spread around not only the school and the community but all over the world with the intent to destroy someone socially, professionally, emotionally and psychologically. The pain that is inflicted on someone often causes physical and/or mental distress. Careers, reputations and relationships can be ruined as a result of lies, distortions and misinformation being sent out to the universe.

The victims of such callous and hostile behavior suffer greatly. Self esteem and self confidence are diminished or eliminated altogether. The question frequently asked is, "Why? Why me? What did I ever do to deserve such cruel treatment?" The bullied person may try to overlook or ignore the source of this treatment. Parents have told their children who complain that someone

is picking on them, "Just ignore them and they will stop." Unfortunately, that doesn't work very often. In fact, it may expand to include other people and other ways to inflict humiliation and pain.

In a recent article in the Union Democrat newspaper a teen ager who had been a victim of bullying, was nominated to be in her high school homecoming court as a prank. She decided to go along with it. She said, "The kids that are bullying, do not let them bring you down. Stand up for what you believe in, and go with your heart and go with your gut. That's what I did, and look at me now, I'm just as happy as can be." The other students cheered and supported her strength and courage.

So what can a child do to deal with this unwarranted and unwanted attention?

First, stand up for yourself if you can unless you are at risk of physical harm. Tell your parents, teachers, someone you trust and know who cares for you. Don't suffer through this alone. Build friendships with those who respect you and who would not want to see you harmed. That will help to remind you that you are a worthwhile person and valued for who you are.

Adult victims of bullying can take some of the same steps the child takes: stand up for yourself, protect yourself from possible physical harm, inform others (family, employers, police). Be careful responding to the source of the hostility as it gives them power and encourages them to continue. They are often looking for a defensive response so they can exercise their control.

Bullying is harassment and this is against the law. You have human rights and civil rights to protect you. If you know who they are, report them to the authorities.

Build a support system that will help to remind you that you are a worthwhile human being and deserve to be treated with respect and kindness. Be active, live without fear or shame, get professional help if you need it. Don't give in and don't give up your "self". You are entitled to be the person you want to be.

The restaurant that originated the recipe, "The Hungry Monk", closed in Jan 2012, but the recipe had already spread to many other restaurants in England, Australia, and the US. This is one of those desert recipes that is nearly impossible to walk away from!

INGREDIENTS

20 Oreo Cookies

1/4 Cup Butter, melted

- 1 Can Sweetened Condensed Milk
- 2 Ripe Bananas, thinly sliced
- 1 Lemon (juice of)
- 2 Cups Heavy Whipping Cream
- 1/4 Cup Powdered Sugar
- 2 Tbsp Espresso or Strong Coffee (liquid form, chilled)

Bittersweet Chocolate Curls (optional)

DIRECTIONS

Preheat the oven to 425 ° F. In a food processor, add the cookies and process until it becomes a crumb-like mixture. Add the butter and process again. Set aside.

Pour one can of sweetened condensed milk (not evaporated milk) into a glass pie plate or shallow baking dish. Cover the pie plate with foil and set within a



larger pan, such as a roasting pan, and add hot water until it reaches halfway up the side of the pie plate. Bake for 1 to 1 1/4 hours (check a few times during baking and add more water to the roasting pan as necessary). Once the Dulce de Leche is nicely browned and caramelized, remove from the oven and let cool. Once cool, whisk until smooth.

In a bowl, mix the bananas with lemon juice. Set aside.

Whip the cream with powdered sugar and coffee in another bowl that has been pre-chilled, until soft peaks form.

For Serving: Using a pie plate, put a layer of the cookie mixture, then the slices of bananas, cover with the baked condensed milk (now toffee) and repeat the layers, then top with cream mixture. Top with shaved chocolate curls, if preferred. Chill for at least one hour before serving.





Pine Cone Players Seek Play Production Manager






