### President's Message

Easter came and went at the tail end of March and lots of members, families, and friends had a great time at the annual buffet at the Grill. I always enjoy spending time with my family and setting up the Easter egg hunt for the grandkids.

It is easy to tell that spring is here as there is a lot of outside activity around PML, especially on the Golf Course. Speaking of the Golf Course, PML was impacted by the economy just like the rest of the nation and we are always looking for ways to increase play. Golf play is down nation-wide and we hope to see a recovery soon.

Recently the Board of Directors asked the Budget and Finance Committee to help out on a couple of projects. One is to evaluate play on the Golf Course to determine usage and how we can improve our bottom line. The other project is the formalization of the asset acquisition process. We have some very experienced individuals on our committees and appreciate the efforts of these volunteers.

A copy of the new Bylaws was mailed out to the membership along with the new Schedule of Monetary Penalties. These are two important documents that are used in the governance of PML, and I recommend that all members take the time to read them.

Well, it's that time of year again and PML is calling for candidates for the Board of Directors. PML will have three open positions on the Board in August. Two are three-year terms and one is the remainder of the term that was originally held by our good friend Ron Maguire. PML member Dana Chavarria was appointed to serve in this position until the election in August, and we really appreciate her service. Dana is currently serving as our Board Treasurer and brings a fresh perspective to the Board with the knowledge and professionalism as a full-time CPA.

At the March Board meeting, the PML Shooting Club presented a proposal to the Board. The Shooting Club requested authorization to test larger caliber guns. The stated goal of the Shooting Club is to allow a wider variety of weapons, without causing any noise issues for our members. I expressed a great deal of concern because I felt that it was not necessary to test shoot the big guns like magnum hunting rifles etc. because we already know that they are noisy.

There was a great deal of debate and discussion amongst the Board members and the Shooting Club. PMLA members in the audience were allowed to offer comment for the Board to consider and we also received some letters that the Board took into consideration. In the



end, the Board voted to approve the test, with very controlled parameters. As Board members, we always consider all the other data and information available so that we can make good, informed decisions on behalf of our members. Our governing documents state that PML will work to enhance the use and enjoyment of our amenities by our membership. To ensure that there is little or no impact to our membership, we will be keeping a close eye on the tests and the Shooting Club has agreed to provide a quarterly report and update on the progress of the tests.

### General Manager's Message

#### **Spring is Here!**

Spring has sprung and our staff is working diligently to get our amenities ready for the busy summer season. A lot of work goes into preparing our seasonal amenities for opening in May, and this year is no different. I am pleased to announce that our Assistant Marina Manager, Jim Dahms is coming back this year as our Marina Manager. Jim has worked at the Marina for many years, and brings his knowledge and experience to the helm. We are very happy to have him taking the lead, and look forward to a fun, busy season at the Marina.

#### **PML Parking Stickers**

Stickers not sticking? Many of the 2013 parking stickers that were distributed to the membership were defective and did not cling to vehicle windshields. We contacted our vendor and they sent us new replacements that are made of a different material. We have been replacing them on an on-going basis. Our vendor apologized for the inconvenience and provided the replacements at no charge. Members with defective parking stickers are welcome to stop by the Administration Office to pick up a new set at no charge.

#### **Stables Tack Room**

The Stables Tack Room replacement project is in the final design stages and the management team will be soliciting bids for this project from contractors this month. Our goal is to have the building up and ready for the summer season. The design of the building will be similar to the western town theme used in previous building designs at the Stables. We received a lot of positive comments as the design is very popular with members and guests.

#### **Tennis Courts 3 & 4**

As most members know, the PML tennis courts are all uncovered and subjected to various weather conditions. As a result, our courts are impacted by extreme heat and cold and this takes a toll on the surface conditions. Usually cracks begin to form and it is difficult to fill them and keep the surface clean and flat over time. Once the courts become too beat up to repair, we bring in an outside contractor to resurface the courts and get more life out of them. The Tennis Courts 3 & 4 resurfacing project is in the bid process. We have vendors scheduled to inspect the project site this month. We are moving quickly and anticipate completion of the project before the start of the summer season.

#### **Marina Boat Slip Expansion**

The Marina pontoon boat slip expansion project is in the bid process. The pontoon area of the Marina boat slips is tight and it is difficult to safely maneuver boats in and out. In an effort to reduce safety issues and to make it easier for our members to get in and out of the pontoon slip area, we are expanding the width between the boat slip areas in this section. Our goal is to have this project completed before we open the Marina in May.

#### **Workers Comp Coverage**

PML has a very comprehensive safety and risk management program. Our efforts and employee safety program have resulted in a significantly reduced experience modification. An experience modification is a calculation that provides information on how well we control workplace accidents and injuries. Insurance companies use this calculation to determine how much they will charge for coverage. Nevertheless, our workers comp coverage premiums have skyrocketed as many companies are leaving California or simply refusing to even provide us with a quote. As a result, we have been forced to use State Fund as our provider for now. We have been investigating alternative coverage plans and met with several other companies to discuss options. We plan to present a report on our findings and recommendations for alternatives for the Board to consider within a month and we are cautiously optimistic that we can get the cost of this insurance coverage reduced.

### **PMLA Money Matters**

I recently read that the US Postal Service is planning to end Saturday mail delivery this summer. Another supposed cost savings step that may or may not work. This brought to mind the fact that I have not answered any of the myriad questions I receive in the mail from property owners. Admittedly a weak segue but the best I could come up with.

I'm working on my tax return and with April 15 almost here I wondered what the Association does as far as taxes go and how much of my assessment dollar goes to Uncle Sam? - I.R. Sampson

Well I.R. I am pleased to tell you that the Federal Government gets virtually none of your assessment dollar. PMLA is recognized as a tax exempt organization by the IRS under section 501(c)(4) of the Internal Revenue Code. We achieved this status back in 2008 with retroactivity back to 2004. This designation saves us around \$25,000 per year.

I have heard a lot of talk about "cash flow". The only cash flow I am familiar with is the cash flowing out of my wallet

every day. Can you explain this as it relates to PMLA? – I.M. Broke

Well I.M. I certainly understand your situation and hope I can clarify our position for you. Cash flow is very simply the movement of money (cash) in and out of the Association's bank accounts. Cash flows in when we receive assessment payments and when goods or services are purchased at our amenities. Cash flows out when we pay our bills. Positive cash flow occurs when you have more coming in than going out. The Association experiences positive cash flow early in the year when many property owners pay their annual assessment in full. This positive flow is also impacted when we have a high volume of sales activity. Our cash flow turns negative in the fall when assessment collection and other revenue is at its lowest point. Fortunately for us over the past several years we have not experienced a situation where the negative flows have outweighed the positive flows.

I know we receive the annual budget every December that tells us what the

financial plan is for the next year but when do we find out how we actually did in the previous year? - Anne R. Port

The timing of your question could not be more perfect. Included in this month's issue of the PML News is a copy of the 2012 Annual Report. This important document contains a full, detailed (and audited) report on the financial results for 2012 as well as a great deal of explanation and analysis of our position at the end of 2012. I encourage all property owners to review this insert.

With Congress and the President unable to find a way to control the national deficit and come up with a balanced budget how does the Association manage to do this and avoid going into debt? – Bud Jett

Compromise. That one word sums up the approach that the Management team and your Board of Directors takes each year when we work to prepare the Association's financial plan for the coming year. We seek to find a middle ground between cutting costs at the expense of member service and increasing the assessment at an unacceptable rate. Not always a perfect solution but one that we seem to be able to make work.

Groveland/Big Oak Flat is a small community and I enjoy that aspect of living here but some essential services are lacking and I hate driving to Sonora if I don't have to. Getting a document notarized is one of those annoying things I have to do occasionally. Any advice on how to deal with this? – Dot D. Line

Another perfectly timed question. One of the many services offered by PMLA is our own in-house Notary Public. Michelle Ronning is an Accounting staff member who also serves this important function. Best of all this service is available at a nominal charge to property owners. You can have documents notarized for a small fee of \$5. This is half the usual rate and our location is convenient for all PML residents. Non-property owners pay \$10. Just call Michelle at 962-8626 to set up an appointment.

### **Shades of Green**

Each year we allocate funds to contract out for tree care. Our goal is to perform maintenance on selected trees each year. The selected trees are picked for various reasons. Some are hazardous or others need their canopy reduced for better air movement and sunlight. If they are near a green and impacting the morning sunlight, they need thinning to allow that morning sun shine into the green.

Trees that were worked on in March were located near the 15th green, along the 16th fairway, and a couple near our practice putting green. A hazardous and dead digger pine was removed from the 7th hole.

While in the tree the health of the tree is inspected. This is one of the reasons that we planted trees around many of our oaks a few years ago. The tree approaching #2 green, the tree located at the dogleg on #18 are both showing signs of decline. We didn't want these trees to fail and not be prepared for it as was the case with the oaks we lost to snow on holes 4 and 6 a few years back.

It is also interesting to identify the many trees that are located around the course. We have various types of pines and oaks, some native, some not. The ponderosa is our dominant native pine; we also have the Jeffery pine and Monterey pine that are not native. The Jeffery pine looks so much like the ponderosa that if you don't look closely you won't even notice. The Monterey's seem to live in this climate, but don't do very well. Then there is the Sugar

pine, we have one left on #12. We only know this tree is part of the sugar pine family by its cone. It certainly doesn't have the shape or height of our native sugar pines. One of our least popular pines is the Digger pine. It is messy and has huge cones with nuts that the tree squirrels love to eat.

If Mother Nature agrees by the time you read this we hope to have the few forward tees we are expanding to be grassed. You can see the need for sod instead of seeding because of all the deer damage that would be done to a seed bed.

We are fortunate to replace some equipment this year. Our new sand rake has been delivered and on order is a fairway mower, tractor, and turf vehicle. The last fairway mower purchase was in 2003 and the one being purchased is replacing a mower bought in 1998. Our turf vehicle being replaced was purchased in 1992 and the new tractor will replace one purchased used in 1996. We appreciate the opportunity to have this new equipment and hope to get the longevity out of it that we have experienced with the previous equipment.

With the new equipment to cut the grass, the trees trimmed, those scores should be lower than ever!

Help us take care of your course by filling those divots, especially on the three pars, as there has been many divots taken this cold winter, and the grass won't fill in until the warmer soil temperatures arrive.

### **Community Standards**

#### **Long/Short Term Rentals**

With the economic downturn and the decline in sales associated with the housing market came an increase in the number of houses being rented on both a long term and short term basis. We now have about 423 houses which are on the rental market. Some are managed by professional property managers and others are self managed by the member/landlord.

This development of increased rentals has resulted in a spike in complaints about the conduct of some renters. There are many members that take the time to screen renter applicants properly and follow up to make sure the renter knows and understands our rules. If the renter violates the rules, the Owner or property manager quickly resolves the situation. Unfortunately, we still have member/landlords that are ignoring this responsibility.

Enforcing the rules with tenants can be difficult at times for PML staff. In fact, many renters feel our rules and regulations don't apply to them. It is up to the member/landlord to resolve these situations.

Our Governing Documents are very clear as it pertains to the Owner's responsibility for the violations of their tenant. Section 6.02 of the restated Bylaws states..."at all times the Owner shall remain responsible for compliance by the Owner's lessee or tenant with the provisions of the Governing Documents."

Our CC&R's, Article II, Section 3 (b) states..."in the event that any tenant or

lessee fails to honor the provisions of any Governing Document, the Association shall be entitled to take such corrective action as it deems necessary which may include...the imposition of fines and penalties against Owner or tenant.

Member/landlords are expected to handle the responsibility of ensuring their tenants follow the rules. Landlords have more leverage, as there is normally a contractual agreement with their tenant. The landlord can and should make compliance with PMLA rules and regulations part of the rental contract.

On our website www. pinemountainlake.com under the Community Standards tab we have created a list of the most common violations. This list is in a printable one page version and can be used to provide the tenant a copy for them to keep. Some landlords have the tenant sign a copy for the landlord's records. (a great idea!)

As we move closer to the summer weather season when the rental activity picks up, if you rent your home or use a rental management company, please make sure you communicate the importance of making PMLA rules and regulations part of your tenant orientation. The next step is to include language in the rental contract that reinforces the tenant's responsibility to comply with the governing documents.

The quality of life in our community is influenced greatly by how well we live together. Complaints about rules violations are frustrations we can all avoid with a little communication.

### On the Lake: Cruising the Shoreline

This time of year, I'm lucky enough to enjoy several hours each week cruising the entire shoreline of our Lake. I'm looking for goose nests, but it gives me a lot of time to reflect on the beauty of our shared resource. Those that are lucky enough to have a lakefront home must appreciate the Lake immensely. But, as an owner of a shoreline property, I hope you can accept the added reasonability of being a steward of our shared resource.

A healthy shoreline is essential for a healthy lake. I keep saying that I'm going to write an article on why seawalls aren't good for a lake, but I don't feel like getting all "lake, geeky, technical" right now. Instead, let's just keep it simple. Poop isn't good for a lake. We can all agree on that. So, why did I see someone with a garden  $hose \, washing \, goose \, poop \, off \, of \, their \, dock \,$ right into the Lake? Well, I've never had to deal with it, so I shouldn't be too critical.

All I can say is that it's not a good


idea. I wasn't going to get geeky, but I am including a graph of another lake that had a problem with waterfowl. In this case, the lake was used primarily as a source of drinking water. Because of that, it was tested daily for bacteria. The bacteria levels were generally very low, but when ducks started to take up residence, the bacteria levels started to increase dramatically. And that includes fecal coliforms. It doesn't take much imagination to guess where those bacteria come from. So, if you do any swimming near your dock, that's at least one reason to find another method to dispose of the goose mess. Another reason to keep the droppings out of the water is the fact that goose doodle is the aquatic version of Miracle-Gro®. If you keep fertilizing around your dock, sooner or later you'll have a fine green mess of gooey algae to dive in to.

Something else that I noticed as I

cruised the shoreline was the number if innovative barriers people are putting up to keep the geese of their docks. I saw the "spiders" that are designed to twirl and keep the geese off. On several docks I saw barrier wires and rope that seemed to be working. On another there were a couple of pieces of chicken wire that kept the geese from

getting comfortable. If you don't want to deploy some sort of barrier, I urge you to please consider scooping it up and burying it by a needy plant.

And speaking of plants, I'm going to end with one more piece of advice for all property owners, but particularly those with lake front properties. Take care of your precious landscape. There are some really well designed and attractive properties with terracing, lots of soil-stabilizing vegetation and good drainage. On the darker side, there are



a few with bare soil and erosion gullies that keep carrying more and more of your property into the Lake. A couple of years ago, I saw one property get the entire lot sprayed with herbicide. For the same price, you can probably get it weed-whacked and hauled away. It will still look barren and won't get you on the cover of Sunset's best gardens, but at least the roots will still be there to hold the soil in place.

Sorry for the soap box preaching. Until next time... Enjoy Your Lake.

### Attack of the Snow

This February brought some extreme weather for the residents of most elevations in Tuolumne County. After seemingly months of meteorologists and weather experts predicting this storm and that storm, Groveland finally got hit with some actual winter weather. This constant barrage of inaccurate predictions made many of us unbelievers, doubting that any of the promised snow would even show up. Well show up it did, and how.

Many, many residents were caught unprepared when the snow began to come down on Tuesday, February 19, 2013. There was so much snow coming down at one point even the plows could not keep up with it. During a weather incident, like the one in mention, the Department of Safety and the Maintenance Department work in tandem on storm-duty. The Department of Safety coordinates traffic control and the transport of stranded motorists. We also patrol Pine Mountain Lake seeking potential hazards, such as downed trees, and emergency situations, power lines in the roadway for example, during a storm.

The majority of the hazards we encountered however, were motorists that were either a) not equipped for the severe weather conditions or b) not experienced at driving in severe weather conditions and in some cases a combination of both. These issues can make a motorist a dangerous hazard on the road. We responded to numerous calls for assistance during this storm, with many drivers realizing too late that they would not be able to make it to their destination. The Department of Safety will provide transportation for any Pine Mountain Lake resident back to their home within the development. We would much rather provide this service before your car becomes stuck in the snow in the middle of Pine Mountain Drive. As long as you are somewhere safe, warm and dry, waiting out the worst of the storm out is always your best option. This is especially true for those who are not well versed or comfortable in regards to driving in

severe weather.

Also, in the off-chance that you become stranded in your car during a winter storm please make sure you have some provisions on hand. A cell phone for starters in the event you need to contact a friend or family member for assistance, need medical attention or, God forbid, are stuck somewhere off the beaten path. A blanket, water and some nonperishable food items would also be other beneficial items to carry with you. You never know when you may need them. I would also recommend storing a flashlight and a collapsible shovel or spade in your car just in case you need them while chaining up.

If you are going to travel in the snow please make sure that you carry chains that you know how to install, are in good condition and actually fit your vehicle's tires. If you are not accustomed to driving in heavy snowfall or severe winter weather, please do not chance it. Vehicles often become stuck in areas where travel is already hindered by blind curves or steep hills. This in turn prevents the snow plows from plowing and drivers from driving safely. Maneuvering around another vehicle in such a situation always increases the chances of an accident during a snow storm. It is much safer for motorists to wait out the heaviest part of the snow instead of risking life and limb trying to make it home or some other destination. If you absolutely must get home, park your car in a safe location, off the roadway, and contact the Main Gate at (209) 962-8615 in order to arrange transport.

On a personal note: I purchased Spikes-Spiders when I moved to Tuolumne County several years ago in preparation for my car to meet the snow. They are quick and easy to install and work miracles in winter weather even on my front wheel drive car, although it is still equipped with performance snow tires. I would highly recommend them to anyone who has the means to purchase this type of traction device in lieu of cables or chains.

### **April Fire Abatement Work**

The Pine Mountain Lake Maintenance Department will be performing major fire abatement work in these next spring months. Much of the work will be in the larger greenbelts on the south side of the PML Association. The Maintenance Department is also making improvements to the Pine Mountain Lake Slash and Compost Site

April and May are the months for herbicide treatment on selected plants. Maintenance employees will be spot spraying on selected plants in designated areas. These greenbelt areas are the previously mastication treatment portions of our greenbelts. After the thick brush and trees have been reduced in these areas, the fast growing shrubs will grow back in abundance. The followup maintenance work is to treat these plants, and reduce the new growth. The selective spraying is done with backpack sprayers, with each individual plant being treated. When the plant is killed into the rootstalk, the dead growth will be eliminated, reducing the fire risks for the area, and maintaining erosion control. Selected plant species are toyon, yerba santa, manzanita, and poison oak.

Targeted areas for selective spraying are the upper portions of Unit 16, from the Shooting Range and Archery Range to the boundary fences. Greenbelt Treatment Areas 1 and 3, which border on the Highway 120 corridor will receive herbicide treatment. Spraying in these greenbelts will be along a 300 foot wide area which borders on the southern boundary. These are shaded fuel breaks which help protect Pine

Mountain Lake from wildfire, which would be traveling north from the Highway 120 corridor.

Selective herbicides, such as Garlon 4, are safe to use and apply to these plants. The maintenance employees are trained and certified for these applications. Spraying is performed when the safe conditions are met, such as reduced wind and drift. The project will not be close to homes or persons in these greenbelt areas. The spraying will not be performed in stream and wildlife habitat areas.

Herbicide spraying is also being applied to treat grasses and weeds in sensitive areas. Spraying of our road shoulders is an annual procedure, with diligent care being taken to preserve ornamental plants and trees. Reducing these grasses and weeds will reduce the fire risks and enhance the appearance of the roads. Some plants and trees must remain to control erosion and increase the stability of the road embankments.

Among the improvements to the Pine Mountain Lake Slash and Compost Site will be the construction of materials storage bins, and equipment storage pads. The work will improve the uses of the site, and help contain the more volatile materials.

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### **Going Mobile**

We've been tossing the idea of going mobile and how to use social media around for a couple of years now. A lot of people have asked why we don't do social media.

The simple answer is there is not enough time in the day. The better answer is that your kids and grand kids are probably better suited to do it than me.

Critics are calling the changes "invasive". Good or bad, these changes put a lot of pressure on restaurants to provide engaging, valuable content, or risk being "un-liked." You'll need to be nimble and mindful of your audience and messages now more than ever.

I found the following article in Restaurant Business Magazine that I thought I would share with our members this month:

If you took a recent United or Delta flight in March to Scottsdale, Arizona, you had the option to forego a printed boarding pass, using a QR code sent to your smartphone instead. In a world where 80 percent of the population owns a mobile device (and only 47 percent own a toothbrush), cellphones and tablets are replacing pagers, wallets, credit cards and even keys. Here's a round-up of mobile solutions from the

Restaurant Leadership Conference to keep an eye on.

#### **SMS/Text messaging**

The most basic level of phone interaction is text messaging, which has the bonus of not being limited to smartphones. Every day 4.1 billion text messages go out, and anybody with a cellular phone and a messaging plan (and who doesn't have one these days?) can send and receive text messages. The simple immediacy of a text-based promotion has its perks, too. Using a system like Frextr, your guests opt-in to your list by sending a text message, then you can turn around and text them back with offers and event notifications.

Another plus--you're not tied to immediate messaging. Scheduling software for texting systems allows you to set up timed campaigns that send out messages weeks and months into the future, or 20 minutes from now. You can also review reports for which messages were opened, redeemed and even forwarded on to friends, and tailor future messages according to the success of similar campaigns.

Another usage of text messaging is loyalty programs. The Paytronix "Text to Check In" system allows guests to send a text message to join your loyalty

program and fill out the forms on their own. Once in the system, they can send a text message directly to the POS, letting you know they're in the restaurant. Servers then link the guest's transaction information with their loyalty account at the register.

Instead of spending time and money on data entry, the guests take care of it on their own, and their phone has replaced the membership card.

#### Site-specific data

If you've ever spent time trying to figure out which of your stores need new fryers, which ones have drivethroughs, or trying to remember which ones have removable letter boards versus LED signs, you understand the need for up-to-date site audits. Keeping managers and franchisees accountable for maintaining those records can be an even bigger challenge.

GSP has created a mobile app to enhance its site survey management system, allowing auditors to automatically geo-locate to the site they are visiting, check-in and upload photos and notes directly into that store's profile.

The app's functionality also allows you to tap on neighboring sites from a map, compare notes, make profile changes and check when the last audit was performed.

#### **Social Media**

Engaging customers via social media can be as simple as asking, "What's your favorite coffee flavor?" Managing that engagement, especially across multiple platforms and locations, can be a nightmare. As organizations find new and increasingly sophisticated ways to use social media, they are finding that they need a way to manage their efforts and measure the outcomes.

Enter social media management systems (SMMSs), which enable organizations to do things like publish on multiple social media platforms such as Facebook, Twitter, LinkedIn, and Pinterest; schedule and stage posts; apply rights management schemes; aggregate feedback; measure effectiveness across channels and report results in ways that are meaningful to specific groups and locations.

There are many SMMS companies to choose from. Some offer stand-alone products; others are part of bigger customer relationship management and content management systems.

Expion, one of the larger systems, also allows owner/operators to manage their local social media presence across platforms and locations. The new mobile-alert system sends a message to their phone anytime there's an action requiring their attention. The alert sends them directly to the post, whether it's a photo upload needing approval, or a comment with questionable language.

Managing social media presence is becoming more critical as the mobile advertising opportunities increase. Mobile advertising revenue reached a new high of \$1.6 billion last year, according to data from the Interactive Advertising Bureau.

Facebook's new mobile advertising opportunities were the talk of every tech vendor at RLC.

Pushing into the mobile advertising market, Facebook is challenging Google, which is the leading seller of ad space on mobile devices. Now, brands that people "like" can send messages and ads to those users' mobile news feeds. If the user then makes a comment on one of the items or "likes" it, the person's friends get those promotions on their own phones and tablets as well.

- Popular news updates with high levels of engagement can be marked as "Sponsored Stories" that appear on Facebook's website and mobile apps. Rather than hitting the viewer over the head with outright advertising, these stories have a similar status to updates from friends and family members.

The PMLA Schedule of Monetary Penalties had not been updated since 1995. The purpose and intent of the approved amendment is to increase the fine amounts to levels that will provide deterrence to violations and gain voluntary compliance with the rules.

The effect of the approved amendment is that it will increase the amount of each listed fine.

The amendment was considered, approved and adopted by the Board of Directors at the March 16, 2012 Board meeting.

### 2013 SCHEDULE OF MONETARY PENALTIES

Amended March 16, 2013

Civil Code 1363(g)

The Board of Directors is authorized to adopt and publish a schedule of reasonable fines and penalties for common or recurring violations of the Governing Documents. The following schedule of fines will serve as a guideline for the imposition of appropriate penalties in the context of member enforcement proceedings. The Board may also, by resolution, authorize and empower the Association's General Manager to issue notices of fines in appropriate circumstances involving commonly recurring violations.

#### 8.1. Traffic Violations

Within the boundaries of the Association, all traffic violations fall under provisions of the California State Vehicle Code.

- 8.2. Fines for Violation of Declaration of CC&R's, the Association Bylaws, or the ECC Design Guidelines (the Governing Documents):
  - A. Property Use Restriction Violations

Uncorrected violations of the Governing Documents pertaining to property use restrictions or property maintenance (CC&R's, Articles VII, and VIII):

- 1. First violation: Up to a maximum of \$250.00.
- 2. Each month, or portion thereof, a continuing violation remains uncorrected, an additional fine of up to \$250 per month may be levied.
- 3. Each subsequent violation within one year of the preceding violation shall be \$250.00.
- B. Environmental Regulation Violations

Uncorrected violations of any matters that are under the jurisdiction of the Association's Environmental Control Committee (see primarily Articles V and VI of the CC&R's):


- 1. Unauthorized Earth Work and Site Alteration
  - a. Grading of lot/putting in trenches without a permit (fine to be determined by the severity of the action): \$100.00 \$1,000.00.
- 2. Construction Violations
  - a. Initiating new construction without ECC approval.
    - (i) House, garage, additions, multiple commercial projects: \$500.00 \$1,500.00.
    - (ii) Sheds, decks and minor alterations: \$100.00 \$500.00.
  - b. Failure to pick up permit prior to commencing approved construction: \$100.00 \$500.00.
  - Failure to clean up construction debris: \$50.00 \$200.00.
  - d. Failure to obtain extension prior to expiration of permit: \$50.00 \$250.00. Additional deposit may be required.
  - e. Failure to complete project within allotted time frame: Up to \$500.00 per month.
  - f. Failure to schedule final inspection within time required by CC&R's: \$50.00 \$250.00.
- 3. Deviations from Approved Plans
  - a. Major deviations without prior approval (i.e., changes from approved design, color, and/or materials): \$100.00 \$1,500.00.
  - b Minor deviations and changes without prior approval (i.e., window changes on side/rear elevations, minor changes to front elevation): \$50.00 \$500.00.

Note: Any changes in plans, which are made without prior approval from the ECC, shall be subject to a minimum fine of \$50.00 and may be subject to an order requiring corrective action.

- 4. Unauthorized Tree and Brush Removal and Limbing
  - a. Tree removal, per tree: \$100.00 \$2,500.00.
  - b. Tree removal from common area or from property owned by others, per tree: \$100.00 \$2,500.00.
  - c. Failure to properly dispose of tree removal debris: \$100.00 \$1,000.00.

The fine for unauthorized tree removal shall be at the discretion of the Association. The fine shall be based on such factors as the severity of the violation; size and density of trees per Schedule A; and the adverse impacts on views or other aesthetic considerations of neighboring property owners.

Under no circumstances shall trees be removed or limbed, or brush removed from the common area. Any violation of this could result in a maximum fine of \$2,500.00 per tree and replacement of said tree(s).



NOTE: Dead or hazardous trees or brush in the common area should be reported to the Association.

- 5. Miscellaneous Items
  - a. Exterior alteration to existing structures without ECC approval (i.e., changes on roof material or color, changes to exterior surfaces, color or material, addition of windows and/or doors, etc.): \$50.00 \$500.00.
  - b. Exterior lighting fails to meet acceptable standards, per fixture: \$25.00 \$100.00.
  - c. Violation of sign ordinance: \$50.00 \$250.00.
- d. Installation of fence without prior approval: \$100.00 \$500.00.

Other violations not listed may also be subject to a fine by the Association. (The above fines could be assessed per day, week, or month until corrected.)

The fine policy and schedule of fines may be amended and modified from time to time by the Association after proper notification and Board approval. Such changes will be posted in the ECC office and published to the Association website. FINES MAY BE ASSESSED ON A DAILY, WEEKLY, OR MONTHLY SCHEDULE, ACCORDING TO THE INFRACTION AND AT THE DISCRETION OF THE ASSOCIATION. Multiple violations may result in multiple fines.

- C. Delinquent Assessments Civil Code 1365(d) Uncorrected violations of any of the Governing Documents pertaining to the payment of assessments as levied by the Board of Directors (CC&R's, Article IV):
  - 1. Assessments are due on the first day of the month and are delinquent if not paid by the fifteenth (15th) day of the month. If an assessment becomes delinquent, the owner shall incur a late charge not exceeding 10 percent of the delinquent assessment.
  - If delinquent assessments and late charges remain unpaid thirty (30) days following the due date, the delinquent
    amounts, reasonable costs of collection, and late charges shall begin to bear interest at the rate of 12 percent per
    annum until paid.
  - 3. If assessments remain unpaid for a period of seventy-five (75) days or more, the owner's account may be referred to legal counsel to initiate the lien and foreclosure proceedings.
  - 4. In lieu of pursuing its lien and foreclosure remedies, the Association may initiate a small claims court action against a delinquent owner to recover any delinquent assessments, fines and other reasonable costs of collection imposed by the Association.

In accordance with California law, each year when the Association distributes its annual budget, the members shall also receive a schedule of the monetary penalties, which may be imposed for violations.

- 8.3 Fines for Violation of the Rules and Regulations
  - A. First violation: up to a maximum of \$250.00.
  - B. Each month, or portion thereof, a continuing violation remains uncorrected, an additional fine of up to \$250 per month may be levied.
  - Each subsequent violation within one year of the preceding violation shall be \$250.00.
  - D. In addition to fines levied in accordance with the above schedule, any owner who is determined to have violated the Declaration of Restrictions may be ordered by the Association to restore any damaged, destroyed, or altered plant materials, flora, or structural improvements to their pre-existing condition. In the case of any violation, which constitutes a breach of the rights of quiet enjoyment of any other property owner or resident, the violator may be ordered to cease or discontinue the offensive action or activity.


#### Further Legal Action

- 1. In any case where a property owner fails to pay levied fines or take corrective action as detailed in any Committee decision, the Board of Directors may pursue collection of fines or enforcement of the Committee's decision in any manner permitted by law. In the event the property owner fails to complete whatever corrective action the Committee specifies in its final decision, the Committee may reconvene to assess a monetary fine, within the guidelines of the above schedule, as a penalty for the owner's failure to act. The Committee shall notify the Board of the owner's continued noncompliance in order to enable the Board to consider the propriety of further legal action.
- 2. As more particularly described in Article XIV of the Declaration of Restrictions, in the event that formal legal action becomes necessary, the prevailing party shall be entitled to recover his/her/it's costs of suit, including reasonable attorneys' fees.

The following Board resolution is an amendment to Resolution # 98.01, Dog Licensing and Control. The purpose of the amendment is to update the resolution for current operational procedure and to allow for the transportation of captured dogs to County Animal Control.

The effect of the amendment is that it will allow PMLA staff to transport captured dogs to the County Animal Control facility and wording is changed in the document that eliminates reference to a specific fee amount, and instead refers to the current fee schedule. This eliminates the need for a resolution amendment every time the fees change.

This draft was discussed at the January 19, 2013 monthly Board meeting and published for member comment. The amendment was considered, approved and adopted by the Board of Directors at the Board meeting on Saturday, March 16, 2013.

### DOG LICENSING AND CONTROL

All Pine Mountain Lake resident dog owners are required to have a Tuolumne County dog license and a PML dog tag. It is the dog owners' responsibility to protect their dog.

If a stray dog is picked up by our Safety personnel:

- Safety will attempt to notify the owner (if known) by telephone. A kenneling fee, per dog, per day, will be assessed to the dog's owner for the first and any subsequent impound occurrences, in accordance with the current fee schedule.
- The Association reserves the right to turn over impounded dogs to Tuolumne County Animal Control (TCAC) if not retrieved by the owner within 24 hours. The dog owner shall be responsible for any and all fees assessed by TCAC for dog retrieval.
- On the third occurrence, the Association reserves the right to turn the dog over immediately to TCAC for impound. The dog owner shall be responsible for any and all fees assessed by TCAC for dog retrieval.
- Any costs incurred by PMLA in the transport of the dog(s) will be assessed to the dog's owner.
- Fines, in accordance with the current schedule of monetary penalties, and fees incurred by dog owners are due and payable upon retrieval of their dog. If not paid at retrieval the fines and fees will be added to the member's PML account. If the dog owner is a tenant, the Association reserves the right to require the member Owner to pay the unpaid fines and fees of their tenant in accordance with PMLA CC&Rs.

All dog owners must comply with the Tuolumne County Leash Law as well as the PMLA CC&R's rules and regulations regarding Household Pets.

The following is the approved amendment to the 2013 PMLA Amenity and Services Fee Schedule. The purpose and intent of the amendment is to increase the amount charged for golf club rentals and dog kenneling fee. An additional new fee will be added for dog transportation. The Golf Pro Shop purchased new rental clubs and proposed a slightly higher fee to coincide with this purchase.

The Department of Safety recommended increasing the kenneling fee to cover the cost of kenneling dogs that are captured and housed in our kennel until the owner picks them up. The new dog transportation fee was proposed to cover the cost of transporting dogs to the County Animal Control Facility.

The effect of the amendment is that it will increase the fees charged for rental clubs and dog kenneling and create a new fee for dog transportation.

The amendment was considered, approved and adopted by the Board of Directors at the Board meeting held on March 16, 2013.

### **PML Action Hero: Wayne Handley**

Flying has always been the main theme of Wayne Handley's life. As a boy, he was fascinated with flying and would chase the crop dusters on his bicycle. Wayne's Dad forbade him to fly.

It wasn't until Wayne went off to Hartnell College in Salinas, CA that he was able to join a flying club and get his first flight in an Aeronca Champ. College kids have very little money and flying is expensive. Aircraft rental at \$2.50 per hour and fuel at 37¢ per gallon was a lot out of pocket but to make it even worse, instructors were twice the cost at a whopping \$5.00 per hour! Yikes!

Next to learning to fly, the best thing about college was that Wayne met Karen. As graduation neared he set his sights on a military flying career. Wayne (with his great dry sense of humor) says the Navy "lowered their standards" which allowed him to join the Navy flight program. Wayne and Karen were separated 22 months, saw each other 4 times, and "got married as total strangers" according to Karen. Wayne nearly didn't make the wedding. He drove 36 hours straight in his Triumph TR3 to get to the church on time. He tried everything to stay awake ... coffee, singing, windows open, windows closed, flight helmet on and 15 minutes from home fell asleep at the wheel. He ran off the road, woke up and 52 years later Karen & Wayne laugh about it.

In the Navy, Wayne had his sights set on a fighter unit and flying the F4 Phantom. Wayne did his due diligence. He weighed the options of good pay in crop dusting against the "opportunity" to go to Vietnam ... and crop dusting won the toss. So, after 5 1/2 years in the Navy, Wayne launched a 25-year career that started as a crop duster, turned into a business with a fleet of airplanes, owned its own airport and resulted in the National Agricultural Aviation Hall of Fame award.

All work and no play is just not Wayne Handley. Some of his friends were flying in aerobatic competitions and encouraged him to try it. Wayne sold some helicopter parts and used the money to buy a Pitts Special. Those helicopters weren't money makers in the crop dusting business anyway.

This aerobatic stuff sounded like fun and Wayne thought "this can't be that difficult;" he had 17,000 hours! Crop dusting he dodged telephone lines, scared cars on the adjacent road and

did steep turns back to the field. If his wheels weren't green, flying 1 foot off the ground, the farmers thought he wasn't flying low enough. Aerobatics couldn't be that difficult! In his first competition there were 21 competitors. Wayne finished 19th. Some kid with 200 hours came in 4th. What the \*&%\$@!!!

Wayne marked out an aerobatic competition box on the ground and practiced EVERY day. Most competitors got to practice twice a week, at best. You have to get to know Wayne; his real competition is himself. It's all about doing his personal best. It wasn't so much about

beating the other guy. He got good at it. Really good! He won a lot of competitions; paid to enter, got lots of nice plaques and had to endure the judge's critiques.


Wayne started doing some local air shows along the way. Those were really fun. No judges, but no plaque. He got paid and everyone smiled, cheered and patted him on the back. Hmmm, that's pretty good! "Pay to be criticized versus they pay me and I get compliments!" What's not to love about that? This launched Wayne's aerobatic career.

Karen didn't mind the competitions. The IAC focused on safety. Air shows were different, however. Spectators love the wild and crazy stuff. Karen was not as enthusiastic about the air shows but she had to admit "damn it, he's really good at this". Thus, a new career began. Wayne did some two plane acts but his airshows were predominantly solo which resulted in the International Council of Airshows Hall of Fame award. Wayne Handley twotime Hall of Famer!

Wayne teaches aerobatics now. People come from all over the world to learn from him. Unusual attitude recognition and recovery are his specialties.

In 1999 Wayne was in an aviation accident. He spent 9 days in the hospital, 6 days of that in ICU. He received so many get well cards that he knew if there was a picture of a dog on the front, that the inside would say "heal". He wanted to get back in an airplane right away and within 3 weeks took his first flight, with a back brace and 3 inches shorter.

Wayne and Karen love PML. They have been full timers for 6 years. Their first introduction was sometime back in the 70's when PML was brand new. The



move toward PML started 8-9 years ago when they stopped at the airport for fuel. Someone came up and told them there was a \$25 landing fee, but that it would be waived if he would make a low and fast pass (to clear deer off the runway). That bit of fun and great attitude sold them on the community.

Timing was perfect. They sold the crop dusting business and the airport it resided on. Wayne wanted to be near water. Karen loves the sunshine. They wanted a one level home, but settled for four stories and a great view. They had always flown into PML so the first drive up Priest Grade when they were moving in was quite a shock.

What they like best about PML is the people and the four seasons. Wayne likes that PML is below the snow and above the fog! Karen doesn't mind the 45 minute drive to shopping, this was similar to life in the Salinas Valley, but Salinas Valley is flat and Priest Grade is certainly not!

WHOOEE! that was fun getting to know Wayne and Karen. WHOOEE is an acronym for Wayne Handley's Ostentatious Order of Enormous Egos. Getting to know Wayne you will find an understated pride in his accomplishments and no big ego. He is a great PML Action Hero!

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# Friends of Groveland Fire Dept The Tragedy of the Groveland FD - Part 2

Continued from PML News, Feb 2013 - In February I reviewed the 2002-2012 fire assessment and the survey commissioned by GCSD to assess community preferences regarding the assessment - whether to renew it and the amount if renewed. Property owners and registered voters both overwhelmingly supported renewal at the existing rate of \$83.64. Resistance to the tax was voiced by some commercial property owners who had been surveyed regarding much higher tax rates. Some, including GCSD Director Steve Perreira, had for some time been urging a return to a volunteer fire department or a mix with fewer full time firefighters and more volunteers. Over the summer of 2011 this group put up large signs opposing the fire tax on a few commercial properties in Groveland and Big Oak Flat. The signs claimed the community had voted "NO" to the fire tax and called for the Firefighters to "tighten their belts". Letters to the editor in Yosemite Highway Herald focused on claims of excessive pay and raises for GCSD employees with no one standing up for the firefighters. Firefighter morale was low according to firemen I interviewed during that period; the signs and letters seemed an insult to their dedication and service. In fact the GFD had been recently cited for excellent performance. "The workhorse stations of the [Tuolumne County] system are Mono Village, Sonora, Jamestown and Groveland." Tuolumne County Fire & First Responder Study - 2011, p 30. "Groveland Community Service District [Fire Department] has a successful responder program. Elements of its staffing, training, volunteer recruitment and community appreciation programs would be useful models to review for initial centralized management policy." Tuolumne County, California 2010-2011 Grand Jury Report, Recommendation R7, p. 88.

The fire survey had found the community would support a tax at or near the current rate. In 2011 the tax provided \$298K for the FD budget. The Fire Chief notes he recommended in October 2011 to the General Manager that the replacement tax target \$300K in revenue. He said he also recommended

against using a Mello-Roos tax due to earlier community protest over a Mello-Roos tax for the Long Gulch development. The 1 December 2011 GCSD Regular Meeting saw renewed Board and Public discussion. Heated and controversial discussion continued into 2012. According to the meeting minutes, on 1 December Member of the Public Kay Crowe asked for public disclosure of Fire Department expenses. The General Manager proposed a 1982 Mello-Roos Community Facilities District to initiate a special fire tax process. He also proposed spending up to \$38,000 on consultants to assist with this process. He suggested the previous form of the tax as a benefit assessment voted by the property owners was high risk due to recent legal challenges to benefit assessments. He further said the tax amounts presented to commercial property owners via the survey were "unbelievably distorted". The Board did not question The GCSD General Manager's assertion that assessments would be struck down. They went along with his proposal that there were only two methods of taxation, both involving a 2/3 majority vote of registered voters, not the 50% majority vote of the property owners. Members of the Public expressed serious concern about a Mello-Roos tax. Nancy Jones, a realtor, commented, "Mr. Mello is asking us to ignore these two words, ... but the very fact that it is done under Mello-Roos, the stigma alone is so negative...and what it will do to further diminish the value of this community. ...we are doing ourselves in if we do anything under the auspices of Mello-Roos." 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## **Did You Know ... Groveland Library**

We hope you know all about the Groveland Library and that you visit often!

If you don't, here is some of what you're missing:

The Groveland Library has almost 8,600 items on the shelves. These include books for adults and children, including lots of large print books. The total also includes lots of books on tape (or CD), movies on DVDs and videos, and current magazines and newspapers.

And, did you know, not all our books are made of paper? We have hundreds of eBooks available too. Using your library card, you just log-in to the library website (wwwtuolcolib.org) from your e-reader and "check-out" a book. It's easy and it's free.

Currently, 1800 patrons (people with library cards) in Groveland check out about 15,000 items a year. Tuolumne County library, as a whole, owns about 90,000 items. If the item you want is not in Groveland, you can request it and, in most cases, you'll have it in under a week.

People come into the library every day for all kinds of reasons - not just to check-out books. Last year, we had 12,000 visitors and our librarians answered over 1900 questions – everything from "do you have a book on sharks?" to "how do I get to Yosemite?"

People also come to use our four computers and free Internet connections. They may be researching colleges, applying for jobs, looking for love, filing taxes, or staying in touch with friends and family. We also have free Wi-Fi if you prefer to bring your own computer.

Downstairs in the meeting room, a myriad of community organizations and non-profits benefit from a well-equipped, no-charge meeting room. Some of these organizations include STCHS, Soroptimists, Pine Needlers Quilt Guild, the Unitarian Church, homeschoolers, and Friends of the Groveland Library. On Saturdays, the meeting room is converted to a shop with our weekly book sales, conducted by Friends of the Groveland Library. The funds raised help purchase books for our library and keep our library open five days a week.

Finally, did you know the Groveland Library and our friendly librarians and volunteers welcome you Tuesday -Thursday from 1:00-6:00pm and Friday - Saturday from 10:00am-2:00pm. Come in soon and see all the library has to offer.

### From Your Tuolumne County **District Supervisor**

JOHN GRAY, TUOLUMNE COUNTY 4TH DISTRICT SUPERVISOR

If you had told me 5 years ago that we would still be facing critical funding levels to operate county government today, I would have agreed strongly that we would be in a better position to balance the county budget and improve upon services to the tax payer. Unfortunately that was a flawed assumption on my part.

Preliminary analysis by the COA officer tells us that we are looking at closing a \$3 million gap in order to have a balanced budget. As I have said before, counties do not have the luxury of operating with an unbalanced budget. Unlike State or Federal Government budgets...ours must be balanced.

The Board has given staff direction to come up with cuts following the Board's 10 budget policies as closely as possible. Those policies can be found on the County's web page.

There is no "magic formula" to find the \$3 million needed from our already severely reduced budget and staffing. There are few options available to us at this point; 1) Reduce labor; 2) reduce the budget; or 3) some combination of the two. I believe that the equitable way and the right path is with a combination. Only a short period of time remains before existing labor agreements end. A preliminary budget must be adopted and action should be taken as soon as possible.

Whatever we do will be difficult and it will be painful. However, we will get there. Our County is fortunate in that we have many dedicated and hard working employees. They have contributed greatly over the past four years in finding ways to help solve our on-going budget deficits.

More on this topic next month.

I attended a dinner the other night and was criticized by a friend regarding the "Board Position Letter" on the State's high speed rail project. I do believe that public transportation is an important element in our society. The more cars that we can take off the road, the better we will be in the future.

But while recognizing this, it's important to understand that we must deal with other needs first. The most recent studies conducted by the State on our road system, the "2012 California Local Streets and Roads Needs Assessment", states that there is a short fall of about \$82.2 billion required to bring local road systems into good condition. This is an increase of about \$10 billion from 2010.

No rail system will ever be successful, in my opinion, if we do not have the present and necessary road system in good condition first.

The most recent estimate for the High Speed Rail is \$68 billion to contract. It does not estimate the cost to run the system, only to build it. For those that believe the construction of the high speed rail system will create jobs, I argue that spending \$80 billion on our roads will create even more.

The bottom line is that local streets and roads are underfunded. The ramifications of a neglected system will affect us all including transit riders, cyclists, pedestrians, school children and the elderly. We need to combine our efforts to find purposeful and productive ways to fund local streets and roads first. The \$68 billion planned for High speed rail could go a long way to establish revenues for the repairs.

In a previous article, I touched on the subject of what you get for your tax dollar. One of the readers of the article got my point. We may not like government but it is necessary. He sent me a note after hearing my discussion with a county resident. The president's position was that every form of government should be eliminated. My short answer was "maybe if everyone were angels."

My friend's note started, "the next time someone says they get nothing for their tax dollar and we need to get rid of government, refer them to this book. ""Water Management in Ancient Greek Cities". The book illustrates that for a citizen to obtain municipal water as well as other government services, the citizenry must accept the social concept of maintaining a form of governance to receive the benefits provided by urban civilization. In short, citizens have to give something to get something (e.g. police/ fire/ and other government services). These things do not merely fall out of the sky.

My friend is a retired attorney and had worked for many years as a government counsel and in private practice. I believe that he is right but there is always the question "at what cost and how will the money be spent"? The only way that this can be controlled is by us. Try to put the best people at the reins. Party lines are not the answer. We need balance and we need to work together. After reviewing the referenced book on-line, I plan to put in my order. I'll let you know what I think in a future article.

# **RECIPE OF THE MONTH**

# **Chicken Milanese**

Chicken Milanese (or Milanesa) is a breaded cutlet dish which is very popular in most South American countries. It was brought to that region by Central European Immigrants. Wiener Schnitzel is the Austrian version of this dish. Beef, Veal, or Pork can be used, but we are particularly fond of Chicken Milanese. If the recipe sounds good but you don't feel like cooking, you can order Milanese at Cocina Michoacana!

#### **INGREDIENTS**

- 4 Boneless, skinless chicken breasts, cut in half
- 1 Cup Parmigiano Reggiano, freshly grated
- 1 cup soft sourdough breadcrumbs Ground black pepper, to taste Chipotle Pepper Flakes (optional)
- 1 Egg
- 1/2 cup milk, half & half, or heavy cream Vegetable or olive oil
- 3 TBS butter, melted
- 3 TBS fresh lemon juice
- 2 TBS red or white wine (optional, but better!)

Parsley, chopped

### **DIRECTIONS**

Using a mallet, flatten chicken breasts in a gallon plastic storage bag to a thickness of to 1/2 inch (Pound with bottom of heavy pan or tenderizer hammer (flat side). Larger chicken breasts



may be sliced in half laterally before pounding. Season the chicken with salt and pepper.

Combine cheese, breadcrumbs and pepper(s) to taste on a separate sheet of waxed paper. In medium bowl, whisk together egg and milk/cream until blended. Dip chicken into egg mixture, then into breadcrumb mixture. Chicken should be thoroughly, but lightly coated. Shake off any excess crumbs. The recipe can be done ahead to this point and refrigerated for up to one hour.

In a large skillet, heat oil (enough to cover pan with 1/4 inch oil) to mediumhigh. Add chicken (several pieces at a time) and sauté until cooked through and golden brown (about 4-5 minutes per side). Transfer to paper towels and drain. When all of the chicken is cooked, place on a warm platter. Heat melted butter and lemon juice (optionally add wine and/or cream) and pour over chicken. Garnish with chopped parsley. Alternatively, you can serve Milanese over salad.

Makes 6 servings.

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


### Sierra Professional Artists at the Groveland Library

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

# **Self Esteem**

How many times have you heard, "He/ she has no self esteem?" You may even have heard someone say that to you. What do they mean, what is SELF ESTEEM? The dictionary says, "Having a good opinion of oneself." That's not the whole story. It includes being aware of one's strengths and talents, and having the confidence to acknowledge the areas that may need improvement. It means being decisive and able to stand up for oneself and for what one believes in. It is a positive regard of one's self and the future; knowing that no one is perfect but you are the best human being you can be. It is being genuine and true to who you really are. It is the part of you that is not defined by your job, or your function or your role. It is the combination of all your unique gifts, skills, abilities, interests, talents, insights and wisdom. It is the you before you were scarred in childhood by some authority figures' behavior or wounded when you were criticized and belittled. Ten year old Joey reported, "My coach said I was too clumsy to play ball and made me sit on the bench for the rest of the season." And eight year old Suzy whispered through her tears, "I was told I had a pretty face but I was just too fat and nobody wanted to play with me."

To a child this is devastating. It will be remembered for life and will have a negative influence on their future. These painful experiences changed and eroded their self esteem. Sadly, these are the people who think so little of themselves and who are seldom successful and are usually very unhappy. Depending on the severity of their abuse, they often feel worthless, hopeless, angry and have difficulty fitting into society.

Not living up to your true self creates a void, a feeling that you are incomplete. You may try to fill that void with unhealthy behavior like smoking, drinking, doing drugs, overeating, having an affair, getting a divorce, over involvement with your kids, your job or anything else that will distract you from your feelings. If this continues long enough you are drained of life energy and fulfillment. You may feel very lonely and burdened to live up to the roles others have placed on you.

So – how do you change that for yourself? In a quote from Cher (of all people), "The only thing in the world you can change is yourself and that makes all the difference in the world."

**First**: decide that you want to improve your "self" and live the life that will include your passion and provide fulfillment.

**Second**: take inventory of your strengths and abilities and develop them by finding ways to express them.

**Third**: decide which areas of your life are worth keeping and dispose of the ones that are not healthy or productive.

**Fourth**: seek the positive people and resources that will help you achieve sustainable positive self esteem.

You can help others to improve their self esteem by accepting them for who they are. Compliment rather than critize them. Let them know you value them. This will help your self esteem as well.

# Healthy Habits from Pine Mountain Therapy

#### HABITS FOR HEALTHY HIPS

Staying current with what is new in physical therapy is part of our goal to bring quality care to the residents of Groveland and the surrounding communities. In February Kerrie and I attended a two day Hip Symposium in San Francisco presented by therapists and physicians from the Hip Preservation Center in Chicago, Illinois.


In the early days as a therapist our job was to help the patient as best we could until they were ready for a hip replacement. Now more is known about the mechanics of the hip and how we can improve the function and strength to maximize activity, decrease pain, and preserve the joint.

The hip is a ball and socket joint, like the shoulder, and like the shoulders the muscles around the joint make up a rotator cuff. This rotator cuff needs to be balanced to allow proper rotation and weight bearing through the hip. Visualize a pin wheel. At the center of the pin wheel is the hip joint. Each of the spokes of the pin wheel need to be balanced or the joint is pulled out of alignment. When the hip rotator cuff is out of alignment there are uneven forces on the joint causing uneven wear and tear, which we feel as pain and restrictions in motion. You may notice these restrictions in standing up out of a chair after sitting for awhile, lifting your foot to put on your pant leg, the action required to lift your foot to tie your shoe, or a decrease in your ability to get your full golf swing.

One of the first things you can do is look at what activities you do habitually on one side of your body: crossing your legs, one leg forward when vacuuming, sporting activities... think of how you can balance out these activities by doing equal motions on the other side. A very common imbalance is in the hip flexors and extensors. When we sit the muscles on the front of the thigh, the hip flexors, shorten.

The muscles on the back of the hip, the extensors, lengthen and get weak. To help balance this we need to strengthen our extensors, the muscles of the buttocks. Here's an easy and effective exercise: lying in bed or on the floor, tighten your buttocks, hold for 10 seconds, repeat 20 times. Gradually increase to 30 second holds. Little exercise with big results!

Healthy hint for the month: Think Balance. Need more help, we are here to help you out!
