We would like to thank Dick and Lois Rosenbaum for allowing us to use their property to temporarily house the swans on the Lake.

WILL YOU & I EACH OWE \$2,260+ FOR GCSD?

The new GCSD Board members have uncovered a SHOCKING finding on "GCSD water payer" potential liability. From the CALPERS Annual Report dated June 30, 2011, under "Unfunded liability for Post Retirement Benefits" section, the GCSD section of UNFUNDED LIABILITIES states:

Retirement Medical (GCSD funded) = \$2,202,513 ; CALPERS Pensions (Misc.) = \$3,706,923 ; CALPERS Pensions (Safety) = \$943,118 for TOTAL UNFUNDED Liabilities = \$6,852,554

Community Standards

are active in Pine Mountain Lake. We are experiencing groups of trees being infected in various parts of our community and while we are in no way at an epidemic level we have noticed an increase in their activity. This continues to be a statewide problem.

There are over 20 invasive species of bark beetles of which 10 have been discovered since 2002. The species we see most often in our area attacks our pine trees. The engraver beetle usually attacks trees near the top whereas the red turpentine beetle attacks the lower portion of the trunk. We are seeing activity from both of these species in our area.

So what's up with these beetles and why are they here? More importantly, what can we do to inhibit their destruction?

Without laboring you with a lot of technical jargon, there are a few

If you haven't noticed, Bark Beetles details most of us property owners can understand. First, bark beetles have a keen sense to recognize trees that are stressed or weakened in some fashion. They prey on these weak trees because they are easier to penetrate and more susceptible to attack. The main reasons some trees are in a weakened condition are cultural in nature.

Cultural Control

Recent years of drought have created stress in many trees depending on their location so if you have trees that are not getting enough water, irrigation can help their strength. But far more often it is simply because we have too many trees for the area in which they are growing. Over the years new trees have sprouted up as nature works its wonders and we have allowed them to be packed in close together where

they are all fighting for sunlight and what little water and nutrients are in our soil. The obvious answer is to thin out our vegetation which will leave the trees we decide we want in a healthier condition. I'll bet you never thought that all those little start up trees were affecting the health of your big beautiful pines! Also, effective pruning by removing dead limbs increases their health too. By doing these two things (thinning and pruning) we allow our trees to thrive and have a better chance to ward off insects looking for a weak victim.

Almost without exception, the infestation I am seeing is located in areas where the trees are packed in like sardines. This is not only unhealthy for the trees but a significant fire hazard to boot. We will be looking for these conditions as we begin our inspections on June 1, 2013.

Chemical Control

Unless trees are monitored regularly so that bark beetle attack can be detected early, any chemical spray application made once the beetles have aggregated and penetrated the bark is likely to be too late and ineffective. Treatment must target the adults by spraying the bark so that beetles are killed when they land on trees and attempt to bore into the bark to lay eggs.

High valued, uninfested trees may be protected by spraying their bark with a persistent, registered insecticide labeled as a preventative sprav for bark beetles. Protective spraying for bark beetles must be done by a licensed pesticide applicator. Spraying a persistent insecticide on valuable, uninfested trees near infested trees may be warranted to protect uninfested trees from bark beetles. However, do not substitute preventive sprays for proper cultural care. (see above)

Hazard and Liability Control

Needles to say, a dead 50' to 100' pine tree is a threat to life and property. They are ready to fall down on homes with the next good wind storm or winter snowfall. Foresters are urging people to be alert to signs of beetle activity in their trees and take appropriate action quickly. That is why when we see a dead tree, we ask the owner to react as soon as possible to protect themselves and their neighbors.

This review is not intended as a complete dissertation or an authority on bark beetle infestation, but a simple review for the property owner as a means to start a discussion of this issue and to help you begin to develop a plan for your own investigation and implementation. Also, see your favorite tree expert in our area for an inspection and additional information on this subject. PMLA Money Matters

Did you vote in the last election? No, not the election for president, the last election here at PML. The good news is that over 2,100 of you did vote in either the main election or one of the two extended balloting "windows" approved by the Board. The bad news is that almost 1,200 of you did not vote, despite being given three opportunities to have your voice heard.

The election of 2012 was different than most Association elections. Not only was it your chance to choose two Board members to represent you for the next three years but it was also an opportunity to revise and update the Association's governing documents.

Over the prior 18 months the Administration staff spent a great deal of time combing through the CC&R's as well as the Association Bylaws in an effort to bring them up to date, clarify some contentious issues and bring them into compliance with current law. This process is something that all Associations should go through periodically to keep these important documents relevant to all members. A thorough review was also conducted by our attorney.

Finally these revisions were mailed to all property owners for your review and consideration prior to appearing on the ballot in July. We considered the changes included in these documents to be important for the Association as a whole and to you as an individual property owner. They represent the agreement between you and the Association as to how this community will operate.

One of the major items addressed in the CC&R revision (and the one that most directly affects the financial condition of the Association) was the treatment of merged properties. As I reported in my January article PML has seen a continued erosion of its assessment base over the years due to mergers. Over the past 20 years we have seen our total number of assessable lots decrease by 538 due to mergers. That is an average of almost 27 per year.

What does this mean to you? As

an example had these mergers not occurred your assessment for 2013 would have been \$1,643 per year instead of \$1,896, a savings of over \$250. This continued issue was one we attempted to address in the proposed revision to the CC&R's. Unfortunately we are required to receive approval by 51% of the eligible membership for any change to this governing document.

Despite our best efforts which included three balloting periods, multiple mailings, articles in the PML news, contact via email and even personal phone calls we were unable to obtain the votes necessary for approval. In fact we were only about 200 votes short of achieving the necessary number to approve this important change.

The defeat of this revision is frustrating on several levels. It prevents us from updating this critical document to current standards and does not provide the clarification necessary in several important areas. It indicates a lack of interest by almost 36% of our property owners. Most importantly from my perspective is the potential for continued erosion of our assessment base due to mergers. The hard work of the Board and staff of PML to control costs and keep your assessment at a reasonable level is often undercut by this reduction in assessable lots. As I told you in January this is fully illustrated by the 2013 budget which would have reflected a decrease in assessment (instead of an increase) had we restricted mergers as proposed in the CC&R revision.

What is the fate of this revision going forward? At this point there are no plans to revisit this issue in the short term. Preparing this revision, having it reviewed and communicating it to all members can be expensive and is not a cost we accept lightly. Hopefully all property owners will consider this the next time they review our financial results or annual budget, not to mention if another opportunity arises to close this financial loophole.

Driving Winter Roads

Snow and ice make for some difficult driving and dangerous situations on our roads during the winter. The Maintenance Department has prepared for the winter weather in advance, have you?

Driving in winter conditions demands special attention to the vehicles

readiness, design, tires, traction devices, and controls. When the driving conditions demand tire traction devices, snow chains may be added for even more traction. Keep in mind that studded snow tires are allowed in Tuolumne County, from November 1st to April 1st.

Several of the PML Maintenance vehicles, especially the snow plows, are 4-wheel drive. Most of the trucks are equipped with snow tires, studded snow tires, and are prepared for driving on snow and ice. This allows our workers the ability to travel PML roads under the worst of driving conditions, safely, and securely. The

ability to respond to storm duties, performing emergency situation tasks and keeping the roads cleared, are the Maintenance Department's foremost responsibilities.

Snow plowing within PML is performed by three snow plow units, one of which is also a road sander. The Association is divided into three sections; a single snow plow unit works a section. The sections are Northwest, Northeast, and the Southside of the lake. Ferretti Road and Clements Road are Tuolumne County serviced roads. The snow plow units work the main roads first, then they clear the intersections, they

work the secondary arterial roads next, the short connecting roads are next, then the courts and cul-de-sacs are plowed.

Clearing the roads for emergency vehicle travel is the first objective. An entire section takes about ten hours to complete, sometimes longer due to continuing weather conditions. When the roads are plowed, the sander will distribute sand to areas that are having ice and traction problems. Keep in mind, that the particulars of a storm may change the level of work we perform to keep the roads open and safe. In a winter storm event, the Maintenance Department staff plans for continuous 24-hour duties when the road work is required.

All of us who live here in the beautiful Sierra Foothills know that winter weather can be enjoyable, sometimes brutal, yet manageable. Know the weather conditions before hand, have your vehicle winter

ready, always drive safely, and drive cautiously. Speed in winter driving is a critical factor; 15 to 25 mph is a safe range, sometimes slower, depending on visibility and road conditions.

If your vehicle is not properly equipped for winter weather conditions, please do not risk driving in severe winter road conditions. Winter driving in snow and ice conditions can be dangerous. Many times, the best decision is to just sit home and wait it out. Most of the winter weather events will pass in 24 hours, and the PML roads will be drivable.

Special Residence Watches BY DIRECTOR NATALIE TRUJILLO

In December I presented the membership with a list of services Safety currently provides for their assessment fee. This month I would like to touch on one of those services in particular: special residence watches. This service is provided for residents that will be gone for three days or more with a maximum of three consecutive months. There are a limited number of available openings on our special residence watch service, which operates in tandem with the number of Safety Officers on staff. The three month limit allows the special residence watch program to benefit as many homes as possible in any given year. Safety is unfortunately not staffed to provide each of the 2,814 homes in Pine Mountain Lake with individualized attention, which is why we employ a 24 hour roving patrol instead. On average, we are able to conduct about

350 residence checks per month. Although we strive to offer residence watches to as many property owners as possible, I would like to encourage all permanent Pine Mountain Lake residents to take advantage of this service while they are away. If you are planning to be absent from your home for periods of time longer than three months, you may want to consider installing a more single-minded security measure, such as an alarm system.

Safety Officers will periodically check the perimeter of your home for the duration of your absence. As the officer walks around your house he or she will note the condition of all windows and doors, essentially inspecting your home for signs of an intrusion. The Safety Officer will make an attempt to conceal door tags, packages, etc. in order to preserve the appearance that

the house is still occupied. If a Safety Officer discovers anything on your property that may need your direct attention we will make every effort to contact you or your emergency contact person by telephone.

If you wish to place your house on a special residence watch you can either stop by the Main Gate to pick up a form or go online to *www.pinemountainlake.com* to submit your request electronically. Please make sure that you fill out the form in its entirety. This enhances the effectiveness

of our special residence watches while also limiting the number of times we may have to disturb you during your absence. If you expect to return home earlier than you had originally intended please inform the Main Gate as soon as it is convenient so that we may remove you from our records. We would not want to unintentionally disturb you when you return home.

Shades of Green

As winter heads towards spring, we must not forget to realize how much the elements control our course setup and projects. When the December rains disappeared, the clear skies during the night allowed the cold temperatures to settle in. There were days that some areas never thawed out; at times putting a tee in the ground was difficult. Most of the greens were frozen; the holes had to be changed later in the day, even that was difficult. This is the first year that we have placed a cover over a second hole on a few of the greens that freeze hard, so we can relocate the hole on that green without the need to create a new hole. The bunkers were frozen, some more than others. They are prepared for play as they thaw out. That old guy that rakes our bunkers and rolls our greens was coming to work [can't be Tony coming in when it is cold] one early January morning and it was 24 degrees near #one green and 38 degrees up in unit 13 that morning!

Trees! Trees are very important parts of golf courses. Not all trees are created equal. This is one of the reasons we removed the live oak located near the bunker on hole #5. Because it was trying to survive near a large valley oak, it was growing at an angle and it leaned over the bunker. The leaves and acorns would make a mess in the sand and it also restricted sunlight to the turf and impacted the irrigation there. Another tree that needs removing is near the back

tee on hole #13. It is limiting sunlight to the 12th green on these cold mornings. This tree along with others there that are not on the course have grown a lot over the years and the 12th green is now one of our last to thaw out and be ready for play at 11:00 o'clock. Removing these trees doesn't entirely eliminate all unfavorable conditions in these areas, but it will help. If you are concerned and thinking of protection from errant shots while on #13 tee, we will still have the front cypress tree there.

We do see almost all of the various playing conditions you will find on any golf course, except maybe for many days of windy conditions. During the winter we play on soft wet greens a lot. The rains, frost and older greens that do not drain to well can be damaged by the mower or deer or the incorrectly repaired BALL mark. So, for all of you who play, you should look for the damage your ball created and if you happened to just roll it up there, I am sure there are others to repair.

The first step in repairing ball marks is to take your ball mark repair tool and insert the prongs into the turf at the edge of the depression. Push the edge of the ball mark towards the center in a gentle twisting motion. Once you have worked around the rim of the ball mark, pushing the grass towards the center; then tamp down the repaired mark with your putter or foot to smooth the putting surface.

On the Lake: SpongeBob Lives

This time of year, the lake seems a little dead or neglected. The beaches are usually empty and only a few soles venture out in boats. However, with the lake already full, I'm sure this summer will be another wonderful year for recreating on the lake. And for any of you that are interested in the amazing creatures that live under the surface, I encourage you to get out with a mask and snorkel and check them out.

If you haven't already seen them, you might be surprised to know that we have sponges and jellyfish living in the lake. Yea I know, we usually associate both of them with saltwater. And yes, they are real jellyfish... complete with stinging tentacles. The whole jellyfish is only about the size of a dime and the stinging part of the tentacle is way too small to penetrate human skin. However, just like its big brothers in the sea, it does use its tentacles to capture and subdue tiny "bugs" to eat. They have even been reported to consume small fish eggs. I am not sure how they ended up in our lake, but my top guesses would be migrating waterfowl, aquatic plants, or with an aquarium fish that got released into the lake. They are of course non-native, but probably pose no threat to the lake's food web. So, as the water warms up, look just below the surface and you might be lucky enough to spot one. If you have a clear container or a ziplock bag, it's fascinating to watch them hover up and



down in the water.

As for the sponges, well... they're just kind of slimy; interesting, but slimy. Definitely not the kind you can dry out and use in the shower. I'd make the same guesses regarding how they got here. They produce spiny little reproductive cells that can catch a ride from place to place. As to why they're here, well, no self proclaimed environmentalist can pass up the opportunity to blame another phenomenon on global warming. It has certainly been suggested, but I'm not about to jump on that bandwagon regarding these species. I am more interested in the effect they have on the lake rather than why they grow here. They are filter feeders and there is good evidence that they can make the water more clear. On first thought, that sounds good. On the flip side, clearer water means that sunlight can penetrate deeper into the water and promote excessive plant growth.

So, although they are both non-native to this region, I don't think either one is a serious threat to the quality of our lake experience. It is however, a reminder of just how easy it is for new creatures to be introduced into our lake. As always, my advice is to enjoy the lake, but don't put any living thing into it except yourself. And while you might not want to jump in for a few more months, a stroll on the beach watching snowflakes melt away is always a magical experience.

Friends of Groveland Fire Department THE TRAGEDY OF THE GROVELAND FD - PART 1

Friends of Groveland Fire Department, with contributions over \$11,000 from our GCSD Community, spent the summer of 2012 trying to save our Groveland Fire Department (GFD). We lost our local community GFD and our Fire Chief. Ironically, our dedicated firefighters will be better paid with better benefits under CAL FIRE, still at our expense. Tragically, in the Greek sense, we did not prevail. So, what happened?

Some history: Our 10-year supplemental fire tax, technically a "benefit assessment", on our property tax bills as "Groveland Fire Par Tax", expired in 2012. It was passed in 2002 by a 61% vote of the community property owners (the ones who were to actually pay it) to cover an operating deficit due to decreased property tax revenues, improvements in fire and medical service (See GCSD Fire and Rescue Assessment – Engineer's Report FY09-10), and repayment of Educational Revenue Augmentation Fund (ERAF) monies allocated by State of California to GCSD in error during the 1990s. The tax started at \$60 per year with a cost of living adjustment (COLA). By 2012 it was \$83.64 for most property owners.

In 1990-2000 we still had a mostly volunteer fire department with a core of full-time staff – fire chief plus three fire engineers. Ranchers and self-employed business owners could tolerate a worker as fire volunteer leaving to fight a fire immediately. Over time, our economy changed, as did the demographics, along with the younger residents working off the hill. This left fewer volunteers available to the GFD. See Fire Department Evaluation for the Groveland Community Services District-Final Report, Citigate, 2007, *http://* gcsd.org/reports/fire_master_plan.pdf. We also acquired more retired residents, many of whom gladly participate in our incredible range of volunteer organizations but who cannot pass the rigorous physical requirements for volunteer fire fighting. Our average age is about 55.

In 2004 the State forgave the remainder of the ERAF repayment. However, only 7% of the \$250,574 2004 assessment revenue (\$17,540) was allocated for repayment with 93% needed to cover GFD operations and rebuilding of reserves. A Union Democrat article on 12 August 2004, stated about \$5 of each \$71.73 per single family dwelling of the assessment had been budgeted for ERAF repayment. The property owners passed the assessment mainly to provide funds to improve the response ability of our fire department by hiring more fulltime, immediate-response fire fighters. The funds went to maintain and improve our fire department over the ensuing years. In 2011, our GFD total budget of \$1,220,367 was covered by \$891,581 in property tax revenue, \$297,986 in fire assessment revenue, and \$30,800 in other revenue.

In 2011 the GCSD Board of Directors Joe Riley, Roy Conley, Herman Schaap, John Armstrong, Steve Perreira, and then Acting General Manager Fire Chief Shane Warner, commissioned a survey of the GCSD Community to determine community preferences for a replacement tax to continue to fund the FD. SCI Consulting Group was awarded a contract. They chose a stratified sample survey design that would have been appropriate in a laboratory setting but led to misunderstandings in the community. Residential and commercial property owners were surveyed separately, for a range of possible tax amounts, some relatively low, some relatively high. Each person who got a survey saw only one amount. In discussing the survey, folks were concerned to hear different amounts for properties that seemed similar. Because each person saw only one amount, individuals were led to believe that the Board had already decided the amount of tax to propose. In fact it was just a survey to see which amounts

received greater or lesser approval by the community so as to guide the Board. Had the survey shown all the amounts to each surveyed community member, it would have been clear it was just a survey. Sentiment against the fire tax began to grow. There were even large signs posted stating, essentially, "You asked and we voted No to new fire taxes".

The results were reported at the GCSD Board Meeting on 16 June 2011. In fact, according to the survey results, 88.4%, well over 2/3 of the single family dwelling property owners were willing to pay essentially the same \$83.64 tax as they had been paying for the expiring fire assessment. And, 85.1% of all property owners were willing to pay \$83.64. Registered voter support for \$83.64 was even higher at 91.1%!

In contrast, only 55.2% of the property owners were willing to pay \$150 per year to keep our fire department as is and make some improvements. Only 65.9% of registered voters agreed with the \$150 tax amount. SCI Consulting Group recommended "For the greatest likelihood of success, the special tax or assessment rate should be at or near the District's current rate of \$83.65 for a typical single family home."

So, while the survey actually provided good predictive data, namely that an \$80 tax would be accepted and a \$150 tax would likely fail, it also planted the seeds for an organized opposition to any tax. Please read Part 2 next month

Sheriff's CSU Office Now Open In Groveland

The Groveland branch of the Tuolumne County Sheriff's Community Services Unit is now open in Groveland to serve the needs of the community in the Groveland and Big Oak Flat areas. The office is located at 12720 Par Court in Groveland, adjacent to the Pine Mountain Lake golf course. The phone number is 962-6974. The office is open on Wednesdays, from 10:00 a.m. until 2:00 p.m. During office hours you can order address signs, request vacation checks, special event requests, and get fingerprinted for job applications.

If you're not familiar with the CSU, it is a civilian branch of the Tuolumne County Sheriff's Office. Tuolumne County encompasses more than 2,000 square miles of territory. The ability of the Sheriff's Office to provide law enforcement services over such a wide area is severely limited. The county continues to grow in population and law enforcement needs. The ability of the Sheriff's Office to meet the rising need for service has become more difficult with the current budget limitations. The increased need for services by the Sheriff's Office requires increased personnel and added expenditure of public funds, which are not always available. A partial answer to this problem is the utilization of the volunteer pool of talent and experience in the community. One of the ways this is accomplished is through the Community Assistance Patrol (CAP), which performs a multitude of duties which may include serving subpoenas, vacation checks, handicap parking enforcement, motorist assists, victim witness transport, crime scene security, property bookings, etc. CAP members receive special training in order to drive a CAP patrol car. In addition to the Groveland office, the CSU also

has offices in Sonora, Jamestown, Tuolumne City and Twain Harte. It is the goal of the CSU to work with the Sheriff's Office to help make Tuolumne County a safer and more enjoyable place to live, work and visit. Some of the events that the CSU helps out with locally in our community are the 49er Parade and Chili Cook-Off, Halloween night treat-or-treating in town, and traffic control for the Christmas Basket Project on pick up day.

The Groveland branch of the CSU is greatly understaffed and could really use your help. If you have some free time, won't you please consider volunteering? CSU volunteers are both women and men, and prior law enforcement experience is not necessary. For more information, please contact Mike Cunningham at 962-8955.

Whew!! It's now officially 2013...

The ringing in of the New Year has taken place and the first week of January brought us back into chambers as we welcomed our two new County Supervisors to the Board, Karl Rodefer (district 5) and Sherri Brennan (district 1). Randy Hanvelt, Evan Royce, Karl, Sherri and I will be working together with resolve as we strive to improve conditions in our County and County Government.

Remember that Fiscal Cliff we talked about in last month's article? Well, we haven't fallen off Maybe just "sort of". As anticipated, a "deal" was struck at the 11th hour, but now California Counties are waiting for the other shoe to drop so that we can learn what effect this "deal" will have on our finances.

Congress must still figure out how to cut at least \$85 billion toward the ultimate goal of reducing spending by \$2.1 trillion over the next 10 years. Those are pretty big numbers in anyone's checkbook. The outcome will not be known until March at the earliest.

To help put this in perspective inasmuch as Tuolumne County is concerned, we find that our balanced budget is not based upon the hope that Congress or the State will forward more funds our way. These elusive funds could be used to reinstate service levels up to what they were four years ago but there is no guarantee that we will see them. It has always puzzled me as to why Counties are legally obligated to operate under requirements to balance their budgets but State and Federal Government can work without one at all...or one that doesn't balance.

No matter how we feel about taxes, some are necessary. I have friends that say "we pay too much" and others that say everyone "should pay a little bit more". My position is that whatever we pay in taxes must be spent wisely.

On the County level, these taxes fund law enforcement, road maintenance and County offices-such as Tax Collector, Assessor Department and the Clerk-Auditor Department as well as Health Services, to name a few. You may find it interesting to note that only about 24 cents of every dollar received into the County stays here. Counties suffer financially because as a subdivision of the State we are not "first in line" to decide where our tax dollars should be spent. We are required to spend only what is given back under the rules established by the State or Federal Government and even then it can only be spent in specific categories or upon specific projects.

If you are one that doesn't think that you're getting your 24 cents worth, I'd like to offer a few things for you to consider.

There is a cost to government and government is needed. If everyone was a good guy, respectful of individual rights, worked for the common good and always did the right thing, maybe we could do away with it. Not going to happen! Government rules and regulations are here to stay. It's my job and your job as responsible citizens to make sure that the rules and regulations are fair and reasonable. Public participation in local government is important. You can help by asking questions, voicing your concerns, offering suggestions, showing up at community events, and attending Board of Supervisor meetings... My promise to you is that "I will listen".

Tuolumne River Plan Public Information Meeting Groveland Community Hall-Wednesday, February 20

Yosemite National Park has announced the release of the Draft Tuolumne Wild and Scenic River Comprehensive Management Plan and Environmental Impact Statement (TRP) and invites you to attend an interactive public information session at the Groveland Community Hall on Wednesday, February 20th from 5-8 pm. The meeting will consist of an open house, presentation, and opportunity to discuss the Tuolumne River Plan with park staff members and to provide comment on the plan. The public comment period for the TRP is open through Monday. March 18. 2013 and the document can be viewed by visiting the planning website at http://www. nps.gov/yose/parkmgmt/trp.btm.

The TRP presents the environmental

analysis of four alternatives the National Park Service is considering for the Tuolumne River Wild and Scenic Corridor, including Tuolumne Meadows. The Preferred Alternative seeks to retain a traditional Tuolumne experience while reducing development and making visitor use more sustainable. Specifically, the alternative will allow for the restoration of informal trails, replanting of native vegetation, and the restoration of natural hydrologic conditions; continue to provide visitor access to the Tuolumne River: repair damaged riparian areas near the river and in meadows; maintain the health and integrity of the river system, while still providing access to the river without damaging sensitive areas.



Healthy Habits from Pine Mountain Therapy

YOUR MEDICARE THERAPY BENEFIT FOR 2013

On January 2, 2013 the American Taxpayer Relief Act was signed. This new law prevented a scheduled 26% cut in Medicare reimbursement to physical therapy clinics and physicians. We understand the need to cut spending but that cut would have been devastating to privately owned practices like ours. As it stands, with the changes that are included in the Act we will see about a 2% reduction.

Breaking down your Medicare benefit for rehab services in 2013 is as follows:

\$1900 base benefit for physical and speech therapy, and \$1900 for occupational therapy.

This includes your deductible and coinsurance payments not just what comes out of Medicare's pocket.

Services received at hospital based outpatient (ie Sonora Regional) and clinic outpatient (ie PMT) are combined. \$3700 cap

Therapy can exceed the \$1900 level to the \$3700 cap as long as functional improvement is documented. Medicare is requiring a new "functional limitations reporting system". We are compliant with the new program at PMT.

Once the \$3700 cap is met the records go through a mandatory manual audit process to determine if more therapy is indicated.

What you as the consumer need to know:

You are entitled to physical therapy benefits each year under Medicare.

You can choose where you would like to receive therapy.

Grilled Steak Nachos

Unfortunately, nachos have gotten a bad reputation. Convenience store or ballpark nachos typically are ruined with stale store-bought chips and canned processed cheese sauce. Those served with meat typically have overcooked ground meat, usually with fillers, in a sauce that makes the chips soggy.

Well, this recipe will give you a newfound appreciation for Nachos, and although more time consuming, it is a nice way to fight "cabin fever" on a cold winter day, and the resulting dish is well worth the time invested. This is a great recipe for leftover steak, and don't forget to try this dish on Super Bowl Sunday!

INGREDIENTS

- 1 lb Tri-Tip Roast, Rib-eye Steak, or New York Steak, grilled to medium rare (you can substitute grilled Chicken, if preferred)
- 6 Small Corn Tortillas, quartered Oil for deep frying (Canola, Corn, or
- Vegetable) 2 Cups Grated Monterey Jack and/or Sharp Cheddar Cheese
- 1/4 medium Red or White Onion, thinly sliced or chopped
- 1/4 Cup Black Olives
- 3 Fresh Jalapeno Peppers, sliced into thin rings
- 1/4 Bunch Cilantro
- 1 Roma Tomato, chopped
- 1/2 medium Avocado, chopped
- 1/2 Cup Sour Cream



DIRECTIONS

Use your favorite recipe for grilling steak; we like to use "Santa Maria Valley Style" seasoning for tri-tip roast, and start by searing the roast on high heat, then move to medium heat until internal temperature of the roast is 127 degrees. Rest steak for at least 15 minutes and then slice into bite sized pieces. Sample the steak pieces and season to taste (if needed) with salt and/or pepper (note: you may grill the roast/steak ahead of time or the day before).

Preheat oven to 325 degrees F. Heat an inch of oil in a frying pan to 350-365 F range. Deep fry tortilla quarters to a golden brown, drain on a paper towel, and salt to taste immediately. Arrange the fried tortillas on a baking sheet or oven safe serving pan/dish. Top with cheese, steak, onion, olives, and then jalapeno slices.
