

May is typically the precursor to the peak summer season and we often see a lot of members up for the weekend enjoying the weather and working on spring cleaning of their lots.

There is a lot of activity around PML in the spring and one of the most important items is the start of the campaigns for the Annual Board of Directors Election. As I mentioned last month, it's that time of year again and PML is calling for candidates for the Board of Directors. PML will have three open positions on the Board in August. Two are three-year terms and one is the remainder of the term that was originally held by our good friend Ron Maguire.

This year, May 20th is the deadline for candidates to get their nominating papers (petitions with member signatures) in. There are three positions coming available in August. Another important item on the ballot will be the CC&R merger provision. We need to stop the financial bleeding and

The ballots will be out in July and members will be able to make the final decision on this at that time. Please remember that your vote counts and it is important! The text for the provision is as follows:

PINE MOUNTAIN LAKE GOVERNING DOCUMENT REVISION AMENDMENT TO FIRST RESTATED DECLARATION OF RESTRICTIONS


"LOT MERGERS - The merger of contiguous Lots within Pine Mountain Lake is permitted, subject to the following conditions: (a) any proposed merger of contiguous Lots must be approved by the Association pursuant to Article V, above, and must conform to all County and State requirements; (b) for purposes of assessment calculation and payment, any Lot(s) merged after January 1, 2014 shall retain their premerger configuration and be liable for assessment payments as if they were not merged (i.e. two Lots merged into one would be responsible for two assessment payments; three Lots merged into one would remain liable for three assessment payments, etc.)."

The PML Long Range Planning Committee has taken on the task of implementing the 2013 member survey. The LRPC is made up of volunteer members who have an interest in improving member services, amenities and the quality of life here at PML. Every few years, the LRPC prepares an online member survey to gauge member input on the common areas and services. The results of the survey are presented to the Board in an open meeting and this information is used to determine funding and decisions on future expenditures during the budget process.

TUOLUMNE COUNTY PUBLIC MEETINGS ON ZONING CHANGES

Recently, some PML members received a notice from the County that they are considering rezoning property as part of

an update to their general plan. When the County updates its General Plan, changes are made to zoning with regard to public transportation routes and impacts.

Before the County makes any changes to the plan, they allow for public comment, especially when the changes could have an impact to individual properties. The way we read the current analysis by the outside consultants the County is using, this is a plan for expansion in 30 or 40 years to take in consideration the increase in population and traffic flow near areas within PML.

A member of PML management will attend one of the meetings as there are several unresolved questions. PML has not taken a position on this as we do not have all of the information. Once we have more information, we will communicate it through the usual Association channels, in a future article of the PML News and our website so that members will have an idea what is going on.

In the summer of 2012, I had a heart attack and was airlifted to Doctors Medical Center in Modesto. The entire bill for the helicopter ambulance was about \$35,000.

However, it was deemed "medically necessary" by MediCare and both MediCare and my supplemental health insurance paid; I was left with a copayment of about \$167.00.

We knew nothing about helicopter insurance until after the event. Various people then started telling us that MediCare would not pay, etc. as represented in Dottie's article; it almost gave me another heart attack just worrying about it.

Think how happy we were when we learned that MediCare and our supplemental did pay the bill.

PMLA Money Matters

By the time you read this we will be less than three weeks away from the filing deadline for candidates for the Association's Board of Directors election. This critically important process helps determine our direction for the next year and beyond.

This year's election is more important than usual for two very different reasons. Both of these reasons will impact your assessment dollars and how they are spent. This makes it doubly important that all eligible members exercise their right and opportunity to vote prior to the Annual Meeting in August.

First, unlike in most years, we have not one but three positions open on the Board. Under normal circumstances we have either one or two spots to fill. However due to the sad passing of Board member Ron Maguire we must choose three Board members at this year's election. Two positions will be for the standard three year term while the third position will be to fill the remaining two years of Ron's term.

One of the Board's primary functions is to review and approve the annual

budget for all of our operations. This critical task determines how and where your assessment dollars are spent each year. Each of you has the power to help determine the direction the Board as a whole will take. Please review each candidate's position and approach carefully before you vote. In any case please be sure to vote for the candidates of your choice.

A second, and equally important decision that will be presented for your consideration is a one item modification to the Association's CC&R's. This amendment addresses how the Association treats the merger of any contiguous lots within PML. As those of you who read my articles on a regular basis know the impact of mergers on the level of assessment over the years has been significant and eye opening.

Under our current guidelines any time a lot is merged with a neighboring lot it is treated as one lot instead of two (or three) for all purposes including voting, property lines and most importantly from a financial standpoint, the amount of assessment owed each year. Each time a lot is merged it reduces the number of properties within the Association over which the entire approved assessment must be allocated. This means that the assessment of every other property owner is increased whenever a merger occurs.

The most recent example of the impact of this process is the 2013 Budget and related Assessment. Had there been no mergers in 2012 your assessment would have actually decreased by \$1/month as opposed to the \$1/month increase that was necessary and approved. Now a \$12 annual increase (or decrease) may not seem like much but in the current economic climate any increase is viewed with concern. In addition this takes the focus away from the fact that the total dollars needed for 2013 was less than the requirement for 2012.

Looking back over the history of the Association the impact of mergers on the per property owner assessment has been much more significant. Had there been no mergers your assessment for 2013 would have been over \$220 less per year than the actual approved budget. Now that is a number most people can relate to.

How can you stop this trend? The second item on this year's ballot addresses this issue. Simply put the change to the CC&R's that requires your approval

does not prevent properties from being merged, but it does mitigate the financial impact on the rest of the membership. This modification states that mergers are still permitted however for purposes of assessment calculation the owner will still be liable for each lot as if they were not merged. Very straight forward and direct. This does not prevent owners from merging but it does guarantee the Association of a constant and predictable assessment base. By doing so we make the budgeting process and assessment allocation procedure more uniform and predicable while saving all other property owners from an assessment increase based solely on the decrease in the number of assessable lots.

From a financial perspective I would recommend that you seriously consider voting to approve this modification to the CC&R's. In the long run this will prove to be a financially sound decision for the vast majority of owners here at PML.

30' DEFENSIVE SPACE: A FIRE SAFETY REQUIREMENT

The one area of fire safety cleanup where we need some improvement is in the 30' defensive space. The general rule is: 30' around every structure should be clean or green from June through October. Most Lots don't have irrigated grass or green vegetation around the house. And most Lots won't have 30' on each side of the house because of the property line. But front and back there will be.

From a practical standpoint, the needles and leaves that fall in abundance each year around the house need to be raked up and hauled to the compost dump. I say compost dump because needles and leaves don't burn very well. In fact, they are the number one cause of smoke complaints.

The controversy that inevitably comes up is," what about the erosion on bare dirt issue?" A valid point except there is very little bare dirt around here. Needles and leaves tend to decompose into the soil, so each year there is a certain amount that blends into the soil. This is called duff. The duff layer provides stability to the soil. We don't want members to rake this part up. We want just the loose needles and leaves

to be removed. And besides, how much rain do we get in the summer months to make erosion an issue?

This next fire season starting June 1, 2013 we will be inspecting this 30' defensive space as a necessary requirement. CalFire inspections rely heavily on this requirement because they experience the reality that during a wildfire, the members who have done a good job here, chances are their house will survive a wildfire. It's the same as a fire break. It prevents a fire from getting to a structure because the fire runs out of fuel.

So take a look around the house. How much fuel in the form of needles and leaves have built up around the house in this 30' area? This will be the focus for our June 2013 Fire Safety inspections.

Now, in the rainy winter months we want to leave those needles and leaves around the house. They are good for the soil and contribute to that duff layer. In the winter months the needles and leaves seldom dry out so the fire risk is minimal.

So, from June through October keep the 30' defensive space clean of needles and leaves. The rest of the year, allow them to stay.

Not So Doggie Daycare NATALIE TRUJILLO, DIRECTOR OF SAFETY

If any of you members out there happened to peruse the last few editions of the Pine Mountain Lake Newspaper you may have noticed that Resolution 98.01 was up for a few (necessary) revisions. With these long awaited revisions came some adjustments to the 2013 Fee Schedule as well. The cost of kenneling your pet is now \$30.00, up from \$25.00, plus \$10.00 for each additional day the pet spends in "doggie jail." Kenneling fees are due and payable by the owner when retrieving their dog from Safety. Furthermore, it is now officially within our jurisdiction to remand your pet, so to speak, to Tuolumne County Animal Control. While this method was seldom used in the past, the necessity of Department of Safety Officers to turn over a lost pet to Animal Control has become more and more common. If we find it necessary to transport your pet to Tuolumne County Animal Control in Jamestown you will be charged a \$75.00 transportation fee.

First and foremost, we always strive to return a pet back to its rightful owner. It is never our intention to catch a stray dog just for the heck of it or even just to collect a fee. We are here to provide a service to all property owners. At the very least, a lost pet in a controlled environment, such as a kennel, is still much safer than a pet with free reign of the entire community. We make sure the pet is fed, watered and comfortable depending on the ferocity of weather.

Safety Officers have had to contend many times with property owners who have found a loose dog and desired to keep it until the "proper" owner was located. This, however, is against the Safety Department's policy on several fronts. For starters,

although many begin with the best of intentions, residents that temporarily adopt lost pets often become very attached to them and much less willing to turn them over. I cannot even begin to impart how many times we have had to make a case with a property owner over the right of the actual pet owner to have their dog returned to them. In other instances, residents refused to believe that the owner had been located and were convinced that we just wanted to take the dog from them and hand it over to Tuolumne County Animal Control, which is false on both counts. If it was our intent to catch animals just to turn them over to Tuolumne County Animal control, well then having a kennel facility would be a moot point. If a dog becomes lost and we happen to locate it, we will do everything we can to return it to its rightful owner.

In order for Safety to quickly notify you that your lost pet has been found, it is important that all property owners distinguish their pets with some kind of identifying marking, be it a collar with a phone number or a tag with a name and address. There should be something on your pet to identify it as a pet that belongs to you. Dogs that are impounded without any identifying tags or information are the most likely to be turned over to Tuolumne County Animal Control. Pine Mountain Lake even offers a free dog registration service for all property owners. You can come down to the Main Gate, fill out a registration card and we will give you a dog tag and add your pet to our database. It's simple and free of charge.

As always, please remember to keep an eye on your pet at all times and to always adhere to the leash laws here in Pine Mountain Lake.

Fellow PMLA Members,

Each year, our Association experiences a decrease in the number of assessable lots through mergers. This means there is less money that comes in, and the rest of the membership has to pay for this in increased assessments. In the last 10 years, we averaged 18 lot mergers per year. This year we are projected to lose at least \$41,000 in assessment income, due to mergers.

This year's ballot will include a new CC&R provision that will effectively eliminate this problem. If the provision is approved by the membership, lot mergers will still be allowed, but the owner of the properties will be required to continue paying the annual assessments on each lot.

Help us end the loss of our assessment base by voting "YES" on this provision. We are unanimous as a Board that this provision is in the best interest of the Association and the membership. We need an affirmative vote of at least 51% of the voting power of the membership to make this happen. Please help us keep our assessment payments reasonable and vote "YES" for the merger provision.



ON THE LAKE: Temperature Profiles

I received a couple of questions in the past few weeks about our Lake, so I'm delighted that I don't have to choose a topic this month. And considering that I'm writing this from Idaho where I'm attending a meeting of the American Fisheries Society (AFS), the first question about



fish is quite timely. If you've never heard about the AFS, it's the oldest professional organization in the United States and they do amazing good work on all sorts of fisheries issues.

The first question was about Brown Trout. A lucky angler caught a two foot long "German" brown trout near Big Creek and wanted to know how it got here. I had to ask him how he knew it was German... did it have an accent or was it really well engineered? Kidding aside, it's a name that has stuck with some anglers, but the truth is, brown trout that were introduced into the United States (they are not native) came from two places; Scotland and Germany. And, there are differences in the two strains.

A couple of years ago, I made a pilgrimage to Loch Leven in Scotland where the Scottish strain came from. The brown trout that came from Scotland only have black spots whereas the German strain has black and red spots. Virtually all of the browns that I have seen in California have at least a few red spots indicating that yes, they do have some German ancestry. How the brown trout got into our Lake is a bit of a mystery. The lake is stocked a couple of times a year (legally) with rainbow trout, so it might have inadvertently been included with those. However it got here, it must have been an exciting catch. Congrats!!

The other question was about water temperatures at different times of the year. That's an easy one for me to answer... it's always 45 degrees (F°). Oh, oh, oh... you meant at the surface where people swim! So it's not really that easy. Fortunately for all swimmers, warm water is lighter than cold water. So, it stays right on top of all the 45°F water that lies below 30 feet deep in the lake. And that 45° water is there all vear round even when the lake surface gets to its warmest in August. The rest of the year the temperature at the surface varies with the length of daylight, sun angle and of course air temperature. Starting in January, here are the typical temperatures at the surface; Jan - 42, Feb – 47, Mar – 53, Apr – 55, May – 65, Jun - 73, Jul - 78, Aug - 79, Sep - 77, Oct -62, Nov – 60, Dec – 50. The warmest I've ever measured was just over 80 degrees. That is quite pleasant. So, with the exception of some of our hardy Russia friends, I'd say the ideal swimming time is June through September.

I've included a graph that shows the water temperature from top to bottom for August 2010. It's pretty easy to read; the left axis shows the depth and the upper access shows the temperature.

As always, enjoy Your Lake.

But I think I'll wait until May or June for my first dip.

Those property owners wishing to register their boats for 2013, please remember to bring the following information:


- 1 Proof of property ownership for PML (gate card.)

Here are a couple of my most requested recipes:

CARRIE'S CORN SOUFFLÉ Serves 12-15

This recipe can be made a day ahead and brought to room temperature before baking.

INGREDIENTS

- 1/2 loaf of Texan Toast Bread or any firm white or egg bread cut into small chunks
- 2 cups fresh corn or 1 bag frozen corn 6 eggs beaten
- 1 pint sour cream
- 2 qt heavy cream or 1/2 & 1/2 (for a healthier casserole use whole milk)
- 2 sticks butter melted and cooled
- 2 cups Cheddar cheese shredded

Mix sour cream, eggs and cream together. Put bread chunks in egg mixture drizzle butter over bread and add corn, Stir until combined Put mixture in a buttered 9"x 13" and top with cheddar cheese. Bake in a 325 degree oven until fluffy and brown approximately 45 minutes.

I did this salad last summer and got lots of requests for the recipe. By the time it was printed watermelon was out of season. So here you go for this season!

WATERMELON SALAD

6 cups diced seedless watermelon 3 cucumbers peeled, seeded, and diced 1 cup crumbled feta cheese 1/2 cup julienne mint 3 limes

Mix all together and squeeze lime juice over salad. Depending on the sweetness of the melon you might want to add a little sugar and only use two limes.

The Grill FAQ

A lot of members have been asking me about coupons. The fact is that we did a lot of coupons after we rebranded the Country Club to The Grill. One of the reasons for that

coupon blitz was to just get people to come and try us again. We had to really work hard to break the bad reputation and stigma that the restaurant had developed. From the start members were very skeptical whether we could keep the food and the service consistent because of past experiences. My team and I continue to try to deliver great food at an affordable price with friendly service. I have scaled back on the coupons recently. We still have our \$5 off the purchase of two entrees if you fill out our Grill Survey.

Deals are no longer driving restaurant traffic, according to a recent report from the Chicago-based NPD Group. In fact, customers perceive discounted meals offered over a prolonged time period as regular pricing—not a bargain.

- Restaurant visits on a deal were down 3% in the year ending December 2012 compared to the same period the year before.
- Combo meals and value menu item

offers, two of the most frequently offered deals, are largely responsible for the decrease in deal traffic.

- Visits that included coupons, buy one-get-one, and discounted price were up.
- Younger consumers, in particular, are rejecting all types of "deal" visits to restaurants, especially combo meals and value menus.

At the height of the recession, when industry traffic was down, deals and special offers drove industry restaurant visits. In 2008, for instance, visits on a deal were up 5% and non-deal traffic was down 1%; 2009 deal traffic was up 3% and non-deal traffic down 4%. While consumers are still being frugal, "deals that have historically appealed to restaurant customers need to be re-engineered and the next generation of deals introduced," said NPD's Bonnie Riggs.

Aaron and I (and the servers) are asked a lot of questions about our wines. Whether it's what wine would pair well with their meal or what wine would we recommend? I don't think that we can go wrong recommending anything on our wine list but of course I am biased. I think that Doug Frost, Co-founder and

Master Sommelier, Beverage Alcohol Resource (BAR) says it best; one of the most important skills for any restaurateur to have is an understanding of how wines interact with food. Shades of Green

It seems Mother Nature has remembered us and provided us with some additional rain in early April. We need and will accept all she can give us. Spring rains reduce our need to irrigate early in the season, saving us water and the electricity needed to power our irrigation pumps.

During April we had our controls and pumps for our irrigation system checked out. It was good to get them out here prior to our daily need to irrigate. A couple of problems were found and corrected. The most important correction was to replace a part that had failed that controls our operating pressure. It was giving some false pressure readings that translated to reduced pressure out on the course. Reduced pressure reduces the efficiency of each sprinkler.

With spring comes the flowering or producing of a seed head by poa annua. Poa annua is an annual blue grass, which is undesirable and located throughout the course, including the greens. There are many varieties that have different characteristics that will impact how the ball rolls on the greens. The seed head produced makes the greens bumpy as does the different growth pattern of the various varieties. This grass is very hard to control. It has a way of beating almost everything thrown at it. Both chemical and cultural techniques prove to be ineffective as this plant usually finds a way to survive no matter what we do to control or kill it.

What have we tried to do to control the poa? Currently we use a couple of different growth regulators, one that has proven effective in suppressing the seed head produced. It seems as though the varieties we have has become resistant to this product. Two years ago I asked the representative from Bayer that produces the herbicide to come on out and give us his perspective. He had no suggestions to improve the performance and agreed that a resistance had probably been built up by the plant. We are thankful that the conditions we experience are short lived and that the greens will be a little more "normal "after aeration. Prior to aeration we will reduce our mowing height a little to mow off the seed head and try to improve the putting conditions.

Other projects we will be completing in April and May are rough and green surrounds aeration. We will be pulling a core in these areas so you will see many small aeration plugs that will dry out and get mowed to break back down into the soil. The tees have been aerated and we are going to vertical cut them a time or two before the heat returns. We already have completed one application of a preemergent to prevent some summer weeds like crabgrass or goose grass. We will spray to eliminate some clover and other broadleaf weeds that love the warmer soil temperatures.

An update on Dan Gray who has worked for P.M.L. golf maintenance for close to fifteen years; Dan is recovering from a couple of health issues and has informed me that he will not be returning to work for us. He wishes all those he worked with and all of our membership the best. He did say that he would drop by every now and then to say hello. Dan, we wish you a long and happy retirement




Then had the long trip to Sonora High School for four years to attend class... I am glad the Tioga students do not have to go all the way to Sonora.



Let's Make It Clear

The late spring and summer months bring an energetic time for construction, fire abatement, and property improvements. Each and every time that protected top soils and forested land is excavated or laid bare; storm water erosion can take place. Removing the top layer of organic materials, the organic mat layer which protects the top soil layer, we create an avenue for erosion during storm



water run-off. We all know that storms can slide into the Sierra foothills and drop rain in buckets, sometimes an inch or rain in a single hour. A single storm can pour four inches of rain in a few hours, and the water run-off is damaging. When the soils are properly protected, the storm water run-off will be clear water, with very little debris, and will not be a stream of mud and silt.

Our community has its many ups and downs, hills and dells, slopes and creeks. Sooner or later, mud and water reach the lower levels and become deposited soils. These soils can fill our drainage ditches; clog the drainage inlets and roadway conduits, impacting the storm water run-off system. Yes, eventually, the sediments and soils will reach the lake, streams, and rivers.



PML Shooting Club News

The shooting range operations to date have been very successful, and more PML residents are coming up to take advantage of this beautiful outdoor amenity. Our membership in the Shooting Club is also growing; we now have 88 family memberships with new members coming in on a regular basis. We've had a lot of requests from PML residents and club members for additional activities and permission to shoot additional handguns and rifles. Handguns in 22 to 45 cal and rifles in 22 cal are permitted on the range, but this excludes a number of common rifles and handguns. In response to member requests, we presented a proposal to the PMLA Board at their March meeting to allow the Shooting Club to conduct controlled testing of some additional handguns and rifles to

determine their sound levels relative to those we are already shooting at the range. We are grateful to the Board for approving our proposal so we can obtain actual data upon which the Board can base future decisions. We will be measuring sound levels both at the range and at various locations within PML in carefully controlled and limited test firing. Our aim is to expand the usability of the range for PML members without disturbing other activities within the community. We are working closely with PML Staff for the testing and will be reporting results to the PML Board in the coming months. Meanwhile the Women and Handguns class on 7 May is filling up fast. Do you know the rules of Golf?

Q #1. A players ball come to rest in front of a divot which is folded over but not completely detached. The divot interferes with his backswing. May he replace or remove the divot before playing?

Q #2. A player is required to drop a ball. However, it is obvious that the ball when dropped will roll into a hazard more than two club-lengths, etc., in which case it must be re-dropped and then placed under rule 20-2c. In such a case, is it permissible to waive the dropping requirement and allow the player initially to place the ball?

A #1. No. A divot which is not completely detached is not a lose impediment. It is something fixed and therefore its removal would be a breach of rule 13-2 as the lie and area of swing would be improved

A #2. NO. Dropping and then redropping are necessary to resolve any doubt as to whether the ball will roll into a hazard, and to establish to spot at which the ball must be placed, if necessary.

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PML Action Hero: Dick Chilingarian

Life is a bold and daring adventure for Dick "Chili" Chilingarian. Chili is a very fitting name for someone with a spicy sense of humor and hot sense of adventure.







Chili's first quest started in high

school when he joined the Navy to "see the world" as the advertising touted. It was 2 years after the bombing of Pearl Harbor and Chili may have thought it was to help "change" the world for the better.

Chili was assigned to the USS San Diego CL53, a light cruiser. "Light cruiser" may evoke images of a small craft but this was a serious anti-aircraft (AA) ship armed with 16 (5 inch / 127 mm) 38 caliber AA guns and 16 Bofors 40 mm AA guns. That's a lot of fire power!

The USS San Diego is the second most decorated ship. Of the 21 major naval engagements in the Pacific theater, The San Diego was awarded 18 battle stars for its role and a proud boast of no loss of life. Chili participated in 14 of those engagements. It was "the unbeatable ship that nobody ever heard of" as one of Chili's shipmates, Fred Whitmore wrote in his memoirs.

Chili worked on the bridge as a signalman. It was a critical role relaying messages for ship commanders at the front line. This was a world of visual communications, not electronics, voice and data. It was a "quiet" world of flags & lights positioned prominently to see and be seen, in communication and action.

The San Diego with Chili on board was the first major Allied warship to enter Tokyo Bay after the surrender of Japan. It was big enough to be impressive and provide a show of strength. The bombing of Hiroshima had occurred only 24 days prior and Allied Forces were not sure of Japan's sincerity in the surrender. Unknown to Chili and the crew, USS San Diego was also considered small enough to lose if Japan was planning a surprise attack.

It was a tense time. The San Diego had been sitting about 100 miles off the coast of Japan for two weeks. Waiting. Wondering. The decision was made to send USS San Diego as the flagship. They proceeded warily toward Tokyo Bay, picking up two Japanese harbor pilots to help guide them in. There are mountains on both sides of

the Bay and they could see white flags along each. They docked port side, tied up and waited out the night, not sure if they were sitting ducks or proud eagles.

Japan was honorable. The next day USS Missouri arrived and all the dignitaries were transferred to Japanese soil through The San Diego. With everything safe and secure USS San Diego pulled out allowing USS Missouri to dock for the signing of the surrender agreement the following day. The Missouri was selected because it was the namesake of President Truman's home state. On Sept 2, 1945 General Douglas MacArthur, Admiral Chester Nimitz and eight Allies accepted and signed the surrender agreement. The USS San Diego was proud for its role and was on its way home.

Chili didn't recognize that he was part of history but the world was waiting for them when they pulled into San Francisco Bay under the Golden Gate Bridge. What a glorious sight that bridge was! They were home! Chili swore "I'll never go back out under that bridge again."

Four years in the Navy was enough. Chili was ready to embark on life's next chapter. He was born in San Francisco and decided to settle in the Bay Area after leaving the Navy. He landed a job as an apprentice printer and in six years earned his journeyman card.

Chili used the GI Bill to learn to fly and at age 25 he bought his first airplane, a Taylorcraft tail dragger, for a mere \$500! His second airplane was a Piper Cherokee that flew him & Ellie to Reno to get married. Airplane #3 was a Mooney, which Carol Simpson now owns. Ellie says she was "a nervous flier" and was happy to be on the ground but she took companion flying lessons and would go anywhere with Chili.

The joy of acceleration extended into automobiles. Chili owned numerous great cars including a Hudson, Jaguar, Triumphs and the rumor is true that his first visit to PML was in a Ferrari! His love

of automobiles started with doing turn control at the local raceways, Laguna Seca & Sears Point (now Infineon). That evolved into getting behind the wheel and racing Triumphs, writing a column for the San Mateo Times on racing and later to selling sports cars. It is true that if you do what you love, it's not work!

A theme in his career was connecting people with things they needed or wanted. Chili was a talented sales professional, working in high end auto sales, insurance and the title business. He liked people and thought that he could sell anything. He met the love of his life, Ellie, while selling life insurance. Never did sell her that life insurance policy but did sell her on 42+ great years of marriage.

Airplanes, automobiles and Ellie were a great theme. They moved to Pine Mountain Lake in 1982 realizing the dream that you can actually live at an airport! Back then E45, Pine Mountain Lake Airport looked like a barren table top but they saw the beauty beyond. It has been 30 great years at Pine Mountain Lake. At first they thought the move was for retirement but soon found retirement to be elusive. They jumped back into the Title and escrow business. Chili and Ellie both got involved in numerous community activities and found retirement to be an enjoyably busy chapter in life. They love the Pine Mountain Lake community and the people. "The big plus is the people; they are a cut above the level of what you find elsewhere."

You can find Ellie working in the garden and Chili at "the Boys Club" most mornings. Part of PML today and part of World War II history is a PML Action Hero: Dick "Chili" Chilingarian.





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Developmental Stages Of Children From 0 – 18 Years Of Age

Rule #1 – A parent's job is to help their child learn to become an independent, self-sufficient, productive member of society.

A new born child is totally dependent upon parents to get life sustaining needs met. The child cries to have these basic needs consistently satisfied, such as food, sleep, care of body, holding and hugging. He/she cannot purposefully disobey or willfully misbehave and is mostly happy or mostly upset most of the time. If the child cries excessively, has trouble sleeping or eating it is showing signs of stress. This may indicate a need for consultation with a pediatrician. It is the parents' task to establish trust in the child that these basic needs will be satisfied.

At around 6-9 months old a child normally shows separation anxiety and stranger anxiety (which are healthy signs of attachment). The child may show distress in leaving the primary care giver to go with any other person (including the other

parent). He/she may show signs of distress by crying, clinging, and fear of being away from the primary parent. Here the parent may practice leaving and returning for very short intervals to show the child that the parent will return. It will establish the attachment bond with the parent and the trust that the parent does return.

From 10 months to 3 years the child "tests the limits?" constantly in true "terrible twos" fashion. It is normal to be non-compliant, uncooperative and self centered. It is the time to test out personal power and separateness. Signs of stress can be seen when the child is irritable and has anxiety, excessive fears and worry. He/she may have fear of separation, clinginess and asking for the absent parent. At this age the child needs a predictable and safe environment; clearly defined and enforced limits (which helps the child feel safe and secure). Parents need to develop a sense of independence, autonomy and a sense of self as separate from parents by being firm, fair and having a consistent and predictable schedule.

Parents of pre-schoolers from 3-6 years help them to learn initiative, control impulsiveness and interact and play cooperatively with peers and begin socialization. These children focus on social roles and mimicking adult behaviors. It is the stage of nightmares, invented monsters, vivid fantasies and magical thinking which can create anxiety. They have acute sensitivity to parental conflicts and parents moods and feelings. They have a very limited concept of time, 2-3 days. When they are under stress they may have excessive fears and anxieties, including fears of abandonment. They might blame themselves for adult actions (including fighting or even divorce). They may show regressive behaviors, e.g. thumb-sucking, bed wetting, tantrums, clinginess, and resistance to going with someone other than the primary parent. Parents need to provide reassurance with hugs and holding and words like, "I love you", "You'll be okay", "We will make sure you will be taken care of." Consistent and predictable routine is important.

Elementary school age children from 6-10 years old learn skills to be competent, industrious and productive. They focus

on school, outside activities and peer relationships. It can be the first time the child can begin to think logically, take the role of another person and slowly show true empathy. They are no longer self-centered. They have a larger concept of time and can make friends with peers. Signs of stress can show by problems in school performance and conflict with peers. Parents can consult with the teacher for help with solving the school problems. Discussing the peer conflicts with the child can allow the child to express his/her feelings regarding the relationship and how to resolve the problems.

The pre-teen or pre-adolescent years, from 11 - 12 years is a time of intense feelings and conflicts. It is the time a child achieves the development of true abstract and creative thinking. For the first time, the child is able to think about hypothetical ideas in an "adult-like" fashion. They can understand what time and space look like without having to experience them. They can learn to gain a sense of control over their behaviors and their relationships. They may show signs of confusion about who they are, for instance, they are no longer the little child who needs parents' constant direction, but they are not yet the teenager who has more freedom than they may long to have. This may result in conflicts with parents concerning limits and boundaries which should lead to lots of discussions and negotiations.

The child normally pulls gradually away from family, physically, socially and emotionally during the 12 - 18 years of adolescence. The child develops interests apart from the parents and resists family activities. It is the time when the child challenges adults' ideas and asserts independence. It is the parents' task to help the adolescent to develop a separate identity from the parents. In a safe environment, clearly defined and enforced limits, firm, fair and consistent parenting, the child will have developed enough self confidence to take on the responsibility for him/herself. The path ahead may provide many challenges for the young adult but knowing that the parents are there for support and encouragement. Parents must always keep in mind Rule #1:

A parent's job is to help their child to learn to become an independent, self-sufficient, productive member of society.

Pine Needlers' Quilt Stroll Coming to Downtown Groveland



RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Thai-Style Black Bean Salad

Golden kernels of corn contrast with earthy black beans, red pepper, red onion, and cilantro. The rice vinegar, sesame oil and ginger give it a terrific Asian flare. A very nutritious dish, perfect for pot luck, and you can make it a day or two ahead of time!



INGREDIENTS

- 1 Cup Fresh or Frozen Corn
- 1 15 oz can Black Beans, well rinsed and drained
- 1 small Red Onion, chopped
- 1 Celery Rib, chopped
- 1 small Sweet Red Pepper, chopped
- 1/4 Cup Fresh Cilantro, finely chopped
- 1 Jalapeño (or 1-1/2 to 2 Serrano Peppers), seeded & finely chopped
- 2 Tbsp Sesame Oil
- 1 Tbsp Rice Vinegar
- 1 Tbsp Lime Juice
- 2 cloves Garlic, finely chopped
- 1 tsp Ginger Root, finely grated 1/2 tsp Salt

DIRECTIONS

Cook corn according to package directions. Transfer to a bowl; add beans, onion, celery, red pepper, cilantro and jalapeno. In a different bowl, combine the oil, vinegar, lime juice, garlic, ginger and salt. Pour the mixture over the bean mixture in the other bowl and toss it. Let it sit in the refrigerator for at least one hour before serving, check seasonings and add salt and/or pepper if desired.

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From Your Tuolumne County District Supervisor

Rain rain go away and come again another day? This old nursery Rhyme certainly doesn't ring true with us today. In fact we've been hoping for quite the opposite. While warm spring-like weather, flowering trees and warming temperatures are attractive, we need a bit more of the wet stuff.

There has been a lot of news lately about "water". We have experienced back to back dry years that have left the Central Sierra with as little as 50 per cent of its normal snow pack. This is grim news for an economy that is struggling to climb out of the doldrums. Despite rumors to the contrary, during even these financially challenging times, the population of California is increasing. With this growth, the need for water also increases. Water is needed for personal and recreational uses and for our agricultural elements to thrive and prosper.

Governor Brown has proposed a Twin Tunnel solution to our water woes. The cost estimates, depending upon who delivers the message, is between \$11Billion and \$20Billion. It is interesting to note that a similar proposal was defeated by the voters in 1982. That project was presented to the voters and soundly defeated due to the projected costs and the threat of environmental damage.

The design now under consideration is more conservative in size than the previous

What is the biggest difference between the two? This time, the tax payer will not have a vote! Regulatory agencies will decide whether to build tunnels to move water away from Northern California (that's us) instead of using water from the Delta and its current pumping station.

Why not use the Delta pumping stations? The strongest objection to the current system is that the pumps are regularly shut down because they might pose a threat to designated species...like the Delta Smelt.

The legislature has passed a series of bills approved in 2009 that reaffirm that a public vote is not needed in order to proceed with the plan. As a Supervisor, I respect the representative form of government that we have in place. However, I don't agree that elected officials are *all-knowing* and that we always produce bills, ordinances and laws perfectly in the assumption that we know what's best for you.

There are no easy answers to the Bay Delta problem. Yet, with a project of this magnitude, it would seem that we should have a vote just to make sure that the public is informed on what the intended solutions might be and what the repercussions may be as a result of the plan moving ahead.

Watch the progress of this project and make sure that you let your elected officials know what you think. This will go forward without a vote but that does not mean that we must remain silent.

As you may recall from previous writings, I, along with County Staff, have been working with Cal Trans concerning

safety issues on Old Priest Grade and State Route 120. As a result, Cal Trans has agreed to do a study to determine if truck climbing lanes are warranted on New Priest Grade. A traffic count will be conducted during the peak summer months from June through August to assess the need. This extra lane would allow trucks to pull out and allow backed up traffic to pass avoiding excessive traffic delays. At the same time, we have asked that a study be made and consideration given to widening the existing paved turn-outs. Additional signage and other improvements are also on the review list.

One such improvement that we will see soon addresses "sight distance" at the big curve where State Highway 120 and Old Priest Grade meet. There will be a change in the striping here with the proposal to extend the existing double line 25 feet at the east side of the intersection and to remove approximately 15 feet of the existing center double yellow line from the west side of the intersection. This revision would coincide with the current westbound behavior of those making a left turn.

I had initially proposed a left turn pocket but Cal Trans engineers felt that this plan would effectively assist in extending the line of sight. Projects like this take time. We will continue to work with Cal Trans until we can accomplish other needed improvements.

On April 16th, I attended the swearing in ceremony at the Groveland Community Services District Fire Station for the firefighters that have transferred to Cal Fire. As of April 1, this station has been and will continue to be manned by Cal Fire Personnel. As we all know, the procedure in administering the change has been contentious, at best. At this time, I would ask that we do our best to put personal feelings aside and help for the sake of the community and for public safety to make this transition as seamless as possible. The firefighters are there to serve the community. Let's make it work!

With the advent of the spring and early summer, in my opinion-the best time in the foothills-take the time to look around so that you can truly appreciate what can so easily be taken for granted in our everyday lives. We are exceptionally blessed to live in these wonderful communities.

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

Friends of Groveland Fire Dept The Tragedy of the Groveland FD - Part 3

2013 - In April I began relating the options considered by GCSD for funding the Groveland Fire Department. There were four major issues: 1) whether to renew the tax at all or try to restructure the GFD to fit within just the revenue provided by County property tax; 2) if the tax were to be renewed, which form to use - benefit assessment, a Mello-Roos tax under the Community Facilities Act of 1982 as amended in 1994, or a flat parcel tax; 3) if the tax were to be renewed, what should be the revenue per year - \$300,000 or \$400,000, even \$500,000; and 4) if the tax were renewed, how should the tax amounts be apportioned to different types and sizes of properties. The GCSD Board sought community input by holding a series of town hall meetings, the first of these on 15 December at the Pine Mountain Lake Association Lake Lodge.

According to the meeting minutes, Fire Chief Shane Warner gave a presentation on the Fire Department's history, formation, structure, call volume, and current problems with obtaining volunteers. He also presented a draft contingency operational budget illustrating how the department would operate if it were not to receive supplemental funding. Cuts would include the reserve program, the three full-time fire engineers, the administrative assistant, and the ROP program. There would be one fire captain on duty per shift - dependent on volunteers for responses to fires and medical emergencies. [For a variety of reasons] volunteers are not always available (see Part 1, YHH, Jan 2013). Having only one firefighter per shift could also hamper our ability to give and receive mutual aid to other departments. He said GCSD had just signed a mutual aid agreement with Tuolumne and Mariposa Counties.

General Manager Gary Mello explained why the contingency budget projected a decrease of \$400,000. "... it's basically comprised of two components. One is the special district assessment [for the Fire Department]...that number in this fiscal year budget is \$297,000. The balance ... is a little over \$100,000." He said that GCSD during the past four

Continued from PML News, April years had used some of the property tax money normally allocated to the Parks Department to supplement the Fire Department (FD). "Therefore, we need to add to the fire department budget, so the amount that would need to be supplemented is basically \$400,000." In other words, the GM proposed that the FD, in addition to potentially losing the approximately \$297,000 revenue from the expiring fire district assessment would also be required to give up another \$100,000 of property tax revenue to "pay back the Parks Department".

> Public comment was divided on whether to proceed with a supplemental tax. Craig Maxwell recommended approving the contingency budget, cutting costs first, then seeking added revenue if necessary. Leah Stafford, a previous Sonora Regional staff member providing home care for many in the community, observed "just how much GCSD and the fire department help us beyond fire services; beyond first responder. If we did not have them here and did not have the AED on their fire engine or knew how to operate them at the local public facilities, you have a very grim chance to need someone in home care afterwards. ... If you want to be taken care of, take care of our own now." John Lloyd stated "I guess my view is for \$100 or \$150 a year; are you kidding me? ... We are blessed to have the fire department that we have and I hope we fund adequately." Becky Novak expressed appreciation for emergency calls but called for further investigation, "I'm not sure from the way this budget money is being moved around that we don't have the money to keep them on their jobs and to support them." Jim Goodrich raised the concern the property owners might have difficulty obtaining fire insurance if the FD level of service were diminished. "I have a feeling of the unintended consequence of saving \$150 a year may be costing a lot more than that in the ability to get fire insurance"

> Directors Armstrong, Schaap, Conley, and Riley stated support for putting a supplemental tax to a vote by the community. Director Perreira gave a presentation of methods to cut costs and urged the Board try first to cut

A. No, PST's are not licensed mental health professionals; however, they do undergo training and

certification and are supervised by a licensed mental health professional. They are integrated into the VA mental health care teams all over the country.

O. Will my Pension and Benefit be effected in anyway by enrolling in this program, or if I decided to quit?

A. No, your VA benefits and pensions are in no way effected by enrolling in this program, and you may stop going to groups at anytime.

costs. Director Conley observed that "The person during [the previous GCSD] election who was the most vocal and passionate in supporting the fire department was Director Armstrong; he got the most votes and that tells me something." The Board voted 4/1 to Initiate a Special Fire Tax Process.

The tax amount and type of tax -Mello-Roos or parcel tax remained to be determined. Interestingly, no one questioned the additional \$100,000 component of the potential tax. This would become a poorly understood yet critical issue as the pro and con sides took their stands.



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Getting Strong And Staying Fit with PMT SUPERVISED MAINTENANCE PROGRAM

People come to therapy with a specific problem that they want fixed. Weather it is a deficit or pain that has developed over time or post surgical rehabilitation. Once we have helped them achieve their goals of improved function and decreased pain our patients are ready for discharge. The discharge plan always includes continuing



with an exercise program specific to their needs. The improvements gained in therapy need to be maintained by continuing to do the program developed. The old saying of "use it or lose it" is so true!

We all know what we should do but most of us have trouble following through on our own. Providing an environment that has the equipment and allows you to focus on your exercise increases the likelihood you will continue with your program 10 fold. At PMT we have created the "Supervised Maintenance Program". This program is available to all patients who have completed a therapy program with us.

It is also available if you haven't completed a full program. We do require a prescription from your physician. Once we have the prescription we set you up for an evaluation. During the evaluation with a therapist we discuss your needs and assess your level of function and deficits. Kerrie or Julie will set up a program specific to your needs and a flow sheet with our exercise program is put in your chart. After that it's up to you to come in whenever we are open, pick up your chart, and do your program. We do keep an eye on you, that's the supervised part. We're there to answer your questions, we will give you suggestions, and correct you as needed. There is a monthly fee of \$30.

We have a group of regular "exercises" who tell us how great it is to get in and go through their program. They comment that it's motivating to come in and interact

with the therapists and regular Maintenance participants. We all know it feels better when we exercise regularly, it's just tough to stay motivated. That's why we have a job! Give the clinic a call so we can answer your questions. 209-962-4035.
