President's Corner

November is here and the transition from fall to winter is beautiful at PML. I love this time of year with our crisp evenings and warm days. For those of you who are runners and bikers, the weather could not be better. If you enjoy the winter sports, winter is fast approaching. I am praying for a good season as the last two years have been challenging. Soon all our first winter storm will arrive and the leaves will be gone, and the regrowth will begin. Change is the only constant.

With winter coming, this is the time of year to start raking those leaves and getting the house ready for the wind and rain. The boats are leaving the lake as the water level continues to drop. The maintenance crews have already moved the sand back up the beaches and the play toys are off the lake and in safe storage. The change in seasons is in high gear.

While the change in seasons is just getting started, the budget season coming to an end.

With the budget comes the questions: What is happening to the assessments this year, and why do they keep going up? Projecting needs for the next year can be difficult and the choices are often hard. There is no such thing as a free lunch. As our association ages, more of the amenities we have enjoyed for years start to wear out. This year the Marina is getting some much needed attention with the rebuilding of the Jetty already underway and the Marina Store/Café slated for rebuilding this winter.

Excessive delays of projects often comes

at a higher cost. The lake dredging project is a perfect example. The involuntary permitting delays substantially increased the costs of that project. If you combine voluntary delay with a lack of adequate reserve funding then you create selfinflicted, longer term problems. The odds will increase the need for a special assessment, if there is no funding available to maintain our amenities. Fortunately, Pine Mountain Lake has been funding its reserves and has not had to do any special assessments since. That said, we need to keep systematically building the reserves with a mindful eye towards the anticipated impacts of time.

So while there is an argument to delay the expenses now during hard economic times, the association also recognizes that delay often comes with a hidden wave of future costs. This Board and management is mindful of the delicate balancing act that is needed to keep expenses under control while not causing foreseeable problems in the future.

Finally, as budget season comes to a close, the plans for the year are being set and decisions made. The final tweaks and formal adoption of the budget plan is made at the November meeting. At that point, goals and objectives will have been set and from there on it is execution.

There is always more work to be done and the policies and procedures become more of the focus as we prepare for our peak season starting in spring. Keeping our amenities running with a high level of quality and service requires constant



vigilance and hard work. Pine Mountain Lake runs so well because of the team work of its staff and volunteers. I would like to thank each and every one who plays a part in the organization. Your efforts are noticed and appreciated.

Aside from all the work needed to keep this association running well, and the nature of our busy lives. We should remember that Pine Mountain Lake is a fabulous launching point to see some of the most beautiful places on earth.

The weather is fantastic, so get outside and enjoy the beauty of nature. Yosemite is open for visitors and if you don't like crowds, now is the time to go. Our local businesses need your support.

Year around, Pine Mountain Lake is a great place to visit and live. Come and enjoy!

General Manager's Message

2014 BUDGET AND ASSESSMENT!

Well another annual October budget meeting has come and gone, and I am never disappointed by the predictability of the process. Whenever the topic of assessments comes up, the discussion can get emotional, because any additional cost hits home with every member.

The Board and management worked hard to prepare a budget that allows us to properly maintain the facilities, operate the Association and provide the service our members have come to expect. In recent years, we have been able to reduce labor costs through reductions in headcount. Nevertheless, other factors contribute to overall increases, such as lot mergers and rising costs in utilities and fuel. We will continue to find savings where we can and implement new methods of efficiency so that we can provide the same level of service to our members going forward.

I would like to thank our Budget and Finance Committee for their diligent review and assistance during this process. I know that the Board took their recommendations seriously as did I. Having multiple reviews of the proposed budget, only serves to improve it with each iteration.

The final draft of the 2014 Budget is scheduled for approval at the November monthly Board meeting. The assessment and budget package will be finalized and mailed out to the membership at the end of this month.

RIM FIRE POST-INCIDENT MEETINGS

After any emergency, we conduct a post-incident meeting to review what went well and what can be improved. Last month we met with local emergency services to discuss the Rim Fire and what we can do to improve coordination and communication. We held a follow-up meeting with our PML Fire Abatement Team to work on planning and strategic budgeting based on the conclusions reached at our post-incident meeting.

The main focus of the Fire Abatement Team will be:

- Upgrading our communication systems so that we can reach more of our members during an emergency.
- Focusing more fire safety attention on neighboring properties that surround PML.
- Scheduling time with the County Office of Emergency Services to assist with improving dissemination of their public information, so that we can better educate our members.

We found that given the size, speed and scope of the fire, there was a delay in getting real-time information from Incident Command to the Tuolumne County Sheriff's Department. There were several technological challenges that caused problems including cellphone reception in remote areas. Nevertheless, we quickly adapted and utilized every tool we had to get the word out.

PML will continue to work on improving

our operational response internally and seek to assist the County and State in improving their operations. I am pleased to announce that your PML Board has already taken steps to improve communication in our area, by approving the installation of a cell tower in PML. It will take some time to get the tower approved by the County and installed, but once it is, we anticipate much better cellular coverage.

MARINA JETTY PROJECT UPDATE

The Marina Jetty Project continues to progress and we anticipate completion of the main structure before the end of the month. The Marina Jetty is an outcropping that extends out from the end of the Marina near the boat ramp. The purpose of the Jetty is to provide a barrier to limit the impact of wave action on our boat slip area.

Unfortunately, the project was delayed due to manufacturing issues with the blocks that provide the foundation and outside wall. The vendor quickly moved the processing system to a local provider and we were soon back underway.

MARINA STORE/CAFÉ PROJECT

As I mentioned in last month's article, the Marina Store/Café building was funded for replacement this year. The project has been deferred for several years, and our maintenance staff did a great job keeping the building repaired, but it is time for an upgrade.

The final floor plan for the Marina Store/ Café design will be submitted to the Board of Directors for approval at the November Board meeting. Once the final plan is prepared and receives Board approval, we will move to secure the appropriate permits and put the project out to bid. If everything goes as planned, we should be able to secure the permits and bids by January 2014.

PMLA Money Matters

By the time you read this the Rim Fire will be fully contained and probably on its way to extinction. Unfortunately the same cannot be said about its impact on the individuals, businesses, wildlife and forestland that were its victims. Some lost their homes or other buildings. Some lost the gorgeous scenery that used to surround them. Others suffered both short and long term financial impacts. Fortunately there was no loss of life, although some would argue that a large portion of our wildlife population did indeed suffer such a loss

So what does all this have to do with our financial situation here at PML? After all we did not suffer any damage as a result of the fire, thanks to the efforts of the thousands of firefighters on scene during this crisis. However while no obvious physical damage occurred, there was a financial cost to PML from this fire.

During the period in which evacuation warnings were in place all of the amenities within the Association were closed as a precautionary measure. With the amenities closed we saw a marked decrease in our revenues from all of these facilities. In addition for several weeks after the evacuation warnings were lifted the impact of the fire's smoke continued to take its toll as conditions were not conducive to outdoor activities. This included the Labor Day holiday weekend, which is generally one of our highest revenue periods of the entire year.

The primary areas of impact were the Restaurant, Golf Course, Marina, Stables and Pool. The Grill saw sales drop about \$8,000 below last year, while the Marina lost approximately \$15,000 in product sales and \$6,000 rental revenue. The Golf course took the biggest hit with over \$8,000 less product sales and \$42,000 lost golf play revenue. Smaller impacts were felt at the Stables with revenue off by a little over \$5,000 and the pool which saw its sales decline by \$2,000 as compared to last year.

The combined total of lost revenue for these amenities was approximately \$86,000. That is a fairly good sized number. Now several factors tend to mitigate the negative

impact of such a loss. For example the cost of sales on the product sales revenue reduces the negative impact of this loss. In addition staffing adjustments were made in several areas to reduce the labor cost during this time.

A dramatic loss of revenue such as this could prove troubling for the financial health of any organization. Fortunately for PML we have seen the operating results for the first half of 2013 coming in less than our budgeted level. This means we were able to absorb these losses without a major impact on our financial health. While some of our amenities and departments are showing operating results that are not up to our budgetary expectations we have been able to offset this with positive performances in other areas.

I encourage each of you to review the financial results published here in the PML news and for a more detailed look at our situation go to the PML website (www. pinemountainlake.com) and click on the financial statement information which contains a complete set of our financial statements each month.

As always your Board and management team will continue to monitor this situation and take any steps necessary to control and mitigate any potential negative impact on our financial situation going forward. For now we remain in good shape and I anticipate we will remain that way through the end of 2013.

On the Lake

ON THE SHED?

I can't remember if I ever talked about the "watershed," but even if I did, this would be a good time to talk about its importance. Basically, a watershed is the area of land that drains into another body of water. Of interest to us, is the area that drains into our Lake. We are part of the "bigger" Big Creek watershed, but not all of that watershed drains into the lake. There is a large portion of the Big Creek watershed that drains the area downstream of the dam and eventually into the Mighty Tuolumne. On the map, the entire Big Creek watershed is outlined in blue. The blue line that extends to either side of the dam delineates the upper part of the watershed that does drain into our Lake, from the lower part.

So why is this important? Well, without a watershed, we wouldn't have a lake. More seriously, it determines how much water flows into the lake and what is in that water. A poorly managed watershed can cause serious problems for a lake. In a watershed with heavy agriculture, excess nutrients from overuse of fertilizers can cause serious algae problems. Likewise, toxic chemicals end excessive amounts of sediment can be a problem from poorly managed lands.

In our case, we are pretty lucky to live in a relatively undeveloped watershed. Not to say that we don't have potential threats. If you look at the map, you can see that the lake gets water that flows in from the Garrotte Creeks. I always get First and Second Garrotte mixed up, but one flows in from the "downtown" Groveland and the other from near Tenaya School. Of course the biggest contributor of water is Big Creek which starts pretty close to the fire lookout on Smith Peak. So, if you care about the health of the lake (and I know you do), pay attention to what goes on in the watershed.

The reason I chose this topic, was because I was "sort of" paying attention. I was certain the Rim Fire didn't burn into our watershed and we wouldn't have any serious impacts from rain on bare, burned slopes causing ash and sediment to flow into the lake. Then I saw a document from the county that estimated how much road and culvert work needed to be done due to the fire. It included an estimate for work near Kassabaum Meadow (which does drain into our Lake). It turns out that they included damage to the meadow that may have been caused by staging that took place there.

So, pay attention to what goes on in the watershed and drop me a line if you have any concerns. Over the past couple of years, we had reports of someone building an illegal dam on Big Creek upstream of Pine Mountain Lake. It was true and was quickly resolved by California Department of Fish and Game (now Fish and Wildlife).

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Our Changing Forest and Woodlands – Part Four


This is the forth article, in a series of six, which are intended to provide introductory information for the very noticeable tree problems here in our rural forest. With even casual attention, we are seeing the evidences of an ever changing environment within our forests and woodlands. These evidences are occurring throughout the foothill regions, throughout the state of California, and most mountainous regions of the Western United States. I had omitted publishing of the fourth article in face of the Rim Fire, since so many of the pertinent variables conjoined in bringing the wildfire, and the inherent tree problems, right to our doorstep.

An excerpt from the Part Three article: We have had dry seasons and drought conditions during our cyclical weather periods over these current decades. The long range climate periods have seen alpine glacial ice fields and subalpine climates give way to a

warmer climate; with noticeable adjustments in the snow and water shed patterns. Plants and trees are adjusting to both climate extremes; a harsh winter followed by a mild winter, back and forth. The affects will always support the hardiness of the healthier foliage, and decimate the weaker

growth. This die-off will create spaces in the forest canopy, a chance for new growth, and the forest cycle is repeated.

When the conditions are right, the trees are vulnerable to destruction. The elements of pests, disease, damage, weather cycles, and terrain, all culminate for dramatic hardships

for the forest trees. High fire danger declarations are directly associated with these elements. As we come out of the dry months, and into the wet season, the trees will molt and drop their leaves and needles. This is the natural cycle in preparation for winter snow and winds. Nature's husbandry will

prune and thin the forest with broken limbs and downed trees during wintry storms. Areas which have had the trees thinned will see more damage, as the fewer trees are exposed to the snow and wind, especially the live oaks. Winter snows will load the trees with added weight, and over time, the tree will strengthen and endure.

This fall season is unpredictable at best, continued low rainfall, cold nights, the trees are changing leaf colors sooner than usual, and the pines are dropping their older needles. At first glance, many are drawn to believe the pines are in a stressed condition, with large groups of needles turning brown. This is the natural cycle of the pines, shedding the older needles and replacing them with new needle

growth. As the season progresses, the pines and firs will green again. If not, then the tree is in serious danger. Hopefully, with good rainfall and healthy soil, the trees will survive the climate impacts and revive.

Creating a healthier soil and increased water retention is crucial to the health of the trees. Leaving a bed of leaves and pine needles on the forests floor is a valuable mulching. Though many of us have our properties treated and reduced to bare soil for fire abatement, this may not prove satisfactory to the health of the trees. Bare soils will not retain moisture, and will only increase the chance for erosion. There is a balance between fire safe ground and healthy soils. Adapt the soils to the terrain in the fall, knowing that a mixture of this season's falling leaves, some rain, and healthy topsoil, will build a mulch layer for better water retention in the following summer.

Following the age old knowledge of annual pruning during the winter months, will prove a trusted friend. The sap is low in the trees, the leaves are off, and the wood is dormant. Insects and pests are hidden away in the dark, and are less active. Trimming lower branches, sculpting and balancing the trees, removing dead growth, will all provide a healthier foothill forest and urban landscape.

Canada Goose Problem WINTERIZE YOUR PROPERTY AGAINST THE GEESE

18,900 . . . that's the approximate number of pounds of goose poop picked up this season from Lake Lodge, Dunn Court and Marina beaches. Last year it was approximately 21,000 pounds. This slight drop can be attributed to the bald eagles that were on the lake in July and to the Deputy Dogs chasing the geese off the beaches.

If your property is affected by the geese, here are some ideas to keep the geese off your property this winter:

You can install a rope fence along your shoreline. String a 3/16" nylon rope at a height of about 6-8". In wooden stakes, drill a hole large enough to string the rope through and then put the stakes in the ground every few feet. If you decide to leave the rope fence up year round, it is high enough to prevent the geese keep from coming in from the lake but low enough for you to step over and still be able to enjoy the lake. You will have to adjust the placement of the stakes as the lake rises and lowers throughout the year. These rope fences were very successful last winter in keeping the geese off the beaches.

There is also something called a Goose D-Fence System. It is a retractable fencing

system which their website says can be installed or removed in less than 10 minutes. If you're not handy with a drill to make the rope fence above, this may be an alternative for you. We have not personally tried this here yet. Their website is http://www.lakerestoration.com/p-32-goose-d-fence-system.aspx.

If you have a dock, you might want to try a "bird spider". This device has arms that move in the wind and make it difficult for the geese to get on your dock. They were used this season on the swim docks at Lake Lodge and Dunn Court and they were very effective at keeping the geese off. Lots of property owners are also using these devices with great success. One website you can get more information at is http://www.goodlifecompany.com/shopexd.asp?id=3794&storeid=bcp.

The best deterrent to keep the geese away is a dog. Whether the dog is small or large, the geese do not like them. If you don't have a dog, you might want to consider letting a neighbor or friend let their dog on your property to chase the geese away.

FALL/SPRING 2013/14 FUEL REDUCTION PROGRAM

We have developed this program to identify Lots which require additional fuel reduction in order to reduce the risk of a wild fire in light of the recent RIM fire. The reason the Rim fire was so catastrophic is the forest was left unattended for the last 25 years and the fuel load became excessive.

We will be inspecting each Lot between October 1, 2013 and May 31, 2014. We are primarily looking for too many trees/brush for the area occupied, removal of dead limbs and tree pruning/limbing, and removal of fallen limbs and dead vegetation.

OUR INSPECTION SCHEDULE IS AS FOLLOWS:

October - Unit 1 November - Unit 2 December - Unit 3 January - Unit 4 February - Units 5, 6 March - Units 7, 8 April - Units 9 - 12 May - Units 13, 15

At the time of this writing, having completed about half of the Unit 1 inspections, here are a few observations:

Many members have done an awesome job of complying with the PML fire safety guidelines.

Some members have done a good job in the 100 foot defensive space around their house but the rest of the Lot needs work.

Some members require improvement throughout their Lot.

If improvement is needed we will be communicating these requirements via an inspection report with the areas of improvement to be completed by July 1, 2014.

Several questions have come up so far: why are we doing fire safety inspections in the winter months?

We want to give members more options for completing this type of work. The removal/limbing of trees/brush lends itself for burning if the member so chooses, instead of hauling it to the compost pile. In addition, the member will have a longer timeframe to complete this work.

Also, why do we have to reduce the number of trees and ruin my forest atmosphere?

In the areas where tree removal is required, too many trees prevents a healthy existence. Our water and mineral resources cannot support excessive vegetation. Thinning out the number of trees improves the health of the remaining trees and allows them to grow faster with a stronger root structure.

In some cases we are identifying problem areas with ribbons attached to trees/brush. If the ribbon is tied to the trunk of the tree, the tree should be removed. If the ribbon is tied to a branch of the tree, the tree needs limbing or branch removal only. These ribbons are used to aid the member in identifying areas for fuel reduction. If the Lot has many trees with dead limbs, only a few trees will have ribbons. The intent of the ribbon is to provide an example for what needs to be done on the entire Lot. The same holds true for tree removal. If you have a lot of tree startups or many trees in a small area, a few trees may be marked as an example for the rest of the Lot.

Shades of Green

It is early October and it has been a couple of weeks since greens aeration. They are healing nice, the weather has been good. We are in the process of aerating all of the fairways and roughs now.

Why do we aerate? Aeration has many benefits and they are; reduces thatch or organic buildup, reduces soil compaction, increases oxygen to the soil and roots, and stimulates root growth. If you have been rolled or mowed almost daily for the last five months and had thousands of golfers parade on your back, you too would like to take a deep breath. We do appreciate your patience during these projects.

Our annual U.S.G.A. visit was on the first of October. Some of the suggestions that came out of this report after evaluating our turf and playing conditions were; increase light sand topdressing and additional vertical cutting to the greens, 8-10 times a year to solid tine the greens, 3-5 fairway aerations a year, 6-8 green surrounds aeration a year. The goal with this kind of program is to improve drainage and soil structure in all areas of the course.

If you happen to be playing during the transition from summer to winter, then you can see the need for improved soil structure. If you hit it in the shade of a large oak or pine, the turf can feel like a sponge, if you hit it on a south facing slope it will appear as though we don't even irrigate, this is one of the reasons why we need to change our soil structure through aeration and topdressing. Playing conditions would also improve if we had just one type of turf instead of the many varieties that we now have. I will thank you now for your patience when you are playing and when are performing different methods to improve our nearly 45 year old course. Due to a variety of conditions, we will never be as aggressive as this report suggests, we do have a limited crew, other projects and daily course maintenance to perform.

In addition to our daily routines this fall, we are repairing the course each morning from all of the raccoon and skunk damage, along with cleaning up after the geese have been around. It has been a long time since we have seen this amount of turf damage from the skunks and raccoons. I kind of think that the fire and all that goes with it has changed their feeding habit some. They are after the European Chafer for the most part, but will feed on anything they can. Many of the sections they are scouting for grubs has no grub activity, they are just hungry and destructive.

Thanksgiving is just around the corner. We have many things to be thankful for. As destructive as the fire was, we were fortunate that there wasn't additional damage or injuries. Uncle Milt and his lovely wife survived the oak tree that fell on their home. All of the folks living around the course have survived {I think} all of our own Eddie's tee shots to date.

Come on out, enjoy your course, and most of all, have a safe and happy Thanksgiving.

PML Action Hero: Paul Weaver

WWII PURPLE HEART - PUBLISHER - OCEAN SAILOR - RESORT OWNER

For some people life is well organized, like a classical music concert. For others, like Paul Weaver, life is more like a jam session. He characterizes it as "life by accident" but downplays the talent and attention he brings to both work and play. Most importantly, it does not honor his high-spirit, feisty-nature and mischievousness!

As a college freshman Paul got caught in WWII hysteria. He quit school, enlisted in the US Army Infantry and found himself in basic training in Arkansas. Paul's feisty side led to the "thrill" of digging a 6-by-6-foot hole and refilling it! At the end of training he qualified for officer training but chose the Army Specialized Training Corps which promised an engineering degree and officer rank. Sounded good! Months later the program was cancelled, Paul was shipped to the 96th Infantry Division, became a BAR rifleman and sent overseas. Ugh, not good.

Paul's combat experience started in an amphibious tank landing with the first assault wave retaking the Philippines on Leyte Island,

October-1944, just ahead of General McArthur. "It's a dramatic war memory – rockets firing, dense smoke from chemical mortar shells, the roar of planes overhead, bombs sounding like freight trains and people shooting at us."

A few weeks later, advancing against heavy enemy fire while digging a foxhole, Paul was hit in the left shoulder and arm by machine-gun fire. As he was crawling to the rear, he was hit in the right shoulder by a sniper. He and a medic decided it was time to get the hell out of there and headed in a dead run to the rear.

After full recovery a year later, he returned to University of Nevada-Reno and finished his journalism degree. He worked for his father briefly but got a spark to break-out on his own. He started a weekly newspaper in Pacific Palisades, California. It was an exciting success. After four years of hard work he sold the paper (which is still publishing today) and bought a one-way ticket to Paris.

Traveling in Mallorca, Spain, Paul bought a small sailboat, became captivated by sailing and sailed the Mediterranean for a year. He and a friend had a boat built and sailed across the Atlantic. Fabulous days: no motor, no electronics, just a good sextant and the trade winds – destination Barbados.

Back to reality, next stop: Flagstaff, Arizona, where Paul bought a small printing business. Teaming up with a fine book designer, Paul "accidentally" got into book publishing. Publishing became a passion, capturing the vibrant beauty and art of the Southwest in print: "from the first glimpse of an illustration the romance begins and doesn't end until the book is complete." Every book has a personality of its own from paper to final binding. His work at

Northland Press won great acclaim, national awards and today collectors treasure his books.

The sea called again. After 25 years in Arizona high country, Paul was asked by a friend from Spain to sail the 1976 China Sea Race. He loved it, deciding to enter the race himself in 1978. He had a boat built in Newport Beach and sailed the Pacific to Hong Kong to enter the race to Manila. Paul damn-near sailed around the world - in sections.

British Columbia held the next adventure. Paul bought a small island that faced the inside passage to Alaska. The next 25 years were spent designing, building and operating Farewell Harbor, a fly-in fishing destination. Operating from June to September, the waters brought Chinook, Coho, halibut and Dungeness crab to the table for the guests of the resort. Ask Paul for some great recipes.

PML has been home for Paul since he sold the resort four years ago. He was introduced to Groveland by a regular guest at Farewell Harbour. PML offered great climate, people, tennis, stables, swimming and more. The grandkids love it too. You can find Paul most mornings at the Cross Country Café for breakfast. As an action hero or "accidental" hero, Paul knows when things are right; there is a spark that says, "Hell yes, gotta do it."

Air racing is the world's fastest motor sport. It is electrifying! Speeds start at 200 mph and accelerate from there to beyond 500 mph in Jet and Unlimited Class races! For spectators it is exciting to watch a race in three dimensions and hear the sounds of those powerful engines roar by.

September marked the 50th anniversary of the National Championship Air Races in Reno, Nevada. Pine Mountain Lake was well represented in the races, spectators and air show performance.

PML Aviation Association air race pilots Lee Behel, Vicky Benzing, Colleen Keller and Shane Margraves raced in the Sport Class. Lee is the President of the Sport Class Air Racing Association and one of its founders. He is an innovator that brought modern high performance kit-built aircraft into the air race arena. At the PML airport you might catch a glimpse of "Breathless" or "Poncho" the Lancair Legacy's flown by Lee and Colleen, or the Glasair "Cruse Missile" Vicky flew or Shane's Zlin Z50 "Czechster". Look sharp, they are fast! Racing at speeds up to 324 mph!

Lee and Vicky also raced in the Jet Class. The Jet Class is new to air racing and began in 2002 by invitation only. This year Lee and Vicky were racing in Czech-built L-39 jets. Lee raced "Miss Independence". Vicky raced "Reality Czech" placing first in a Silver race, moving up to Gold and hitting lap speeds of 425 mph!

Lots of other PML residents were at this



year's Reno Air Races. Some were working as part of air race crews like Geoff Benzing and Jim Thomas, our PML Airport Manager. Many others were spectators with heads tipped skyward and cameras clicking electrifying races and sensational air show performances. One other, Clay Lacy thrilled the air races with an aero-performance in his Lear 25 business jet.

The Air Races take place at Reno-Stead Airport every September. The race course is defined by pylons which are 50' telephone poles with specially-made drums mounted atop and painted with bright orange-red panels. There are four oval courses that vary in circumference from 3-mile to 8.4-miles based on the speed or class of racing airplane: formula-one, bi-plane, sport, jet, AT-6 or unlimited. 

Odds Are, It If Sounds To Good To Be....It's A Scam

Many scammers these days are specifically targeting the senior citizen population. The Better Business Bureau (BBB) and FBI have released a list of scams and fraud schemes seniors should be aware of. They are:

HEALTH CARE/INSURANCE

FRAUD: Scammers may pose as a Medicare representative to get seniors to give them their personal or financial information. This is especially prevalent during open enrollment times.

DOOR TO DOOR SALES/REPAIRS:

Scammers will often go door-to-door offering repair services or equipment sales.

FUNERAL/CEMETERY FRAUD:

Scammers will attend the funeral service of a stranger to take advantage of the widower or other family member, claiming the deceased had an outstanding debt with them.

COUNTERFEIT PRESCRIPTION

DRUGS: Consumers can now refill prescriptions online, but an unauthorized site with the best price may send ineffective or harmful drugs.

TELEMARKETING FRAUD:

Telemarketing scams often involve calls and email offers of free prizes, low-cost vitamins or health care products. You should never need to mail or wire a "small amount" to claim your prize.

FRAUDULENT "ANTI-AGING"

PRODUCTS: Scammer-distributors will suggest bogus homeopathic remedies that do nothing or will use renegade labs to create versions of products which can have health consequences.

INTERNET FRAUD: Pop-up browser windows simulating virus-scanning software will fool victims into downloading a fake program. In some cases a virus will be downloaded allowing scammers to steal personal and financial information.

GRANDPARENT SCHEME: Scammers

will place a call to a senior posing as their grandchild or a relative in need of help or trapped in a foreign country. They will usually ask for cash to solve the problem and ask for payment through a money wiring service.

INVESTMENT SCHEMES: Because many seniors find themselves planning for retirement and managing their savings, investment schemes have been a successful way for scammers to take advantage of them.

REVERSE MORTGAGE SCAMS:

Scammers like to take advantage of the fact that many seniors own their homes and will send fraudulent letters on behalf of the county's assessor's office offering the homeowner to arrange a reassessment of their property for a fee.

Act cautiously when dealing with offers that sound too good to be true. Be aware of high pressure sales tactics. Avoid the pressure to act "right away". You should be wary of any unsolicited correspondence this can include anything from government agencies, credit card companies and banks. And don't be afraid to hang up if you suspect a scam.

Never send money via wire transfer and do not share any personal information this includes social security number, bank account information, birth date or address to anyone over the telephone.

Distinctive Christmas décor items, Yosemite memories, jewelry, books, and children's toys offer something for everyone.

Last month's historic archive photo was one of the most recognizable structures in Big Oak Flat known as the Gamble Block or the Wells Fargo Building. Probably erected between 1849 and 1852, Wells Fargo & Co. was continuously located in the eastern suite from 1850 to 1893. The meat market was established about 1923 in



the same suite by Benjamin Weast.

The building is constructed primarily of slate rock and brick and has three paired heavy iron fire doors which served as front entries for three separate businesses.

Besides the Well Fargo & Co. Express Office, a tinsmith, post office, cobbler shop, grocery store, and a saloon have been historic tenants. Also known as the Gamble Block in the 1850s and '60s, the building was originally constructed for Alexander Gamble, a successful Gold Rush merchant.

The Cobden Family donated the building to the Southern Tuolumne County Historical Society in 2007 with the goal of preserving it for future generations.

Helping Hands Troop Program



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

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Healthy Habits FROM PINE MOUNTAIN THERAPY

No Winter Hibernation for Humans

Our tendency as cold weather blows in, is to gradually move away from our summer fitness routine and become more sedentary. It's so tempting to stay inside and replace our walks outside with reading a good book by the fire. But keeping in the fitness habit will payoff in chasing away the winter blues and when you want to start up your outdoor activities in the spring.

Start by replacing outdoor activity with indoor options. Your motto is to "do something everyday". Here are some simple, but effective, in-home exercises:

• Sit to stand to sit from a chair

Sit at the edge of a firm chair, stand without using your arms if you can. The goal is to stand 10 times in a row without using your hands. This strengthens the front of the thighs, quad muscles and helps with climbing stairs, squatting and standing up.

• Chair push-ups

Sitting in a firm chair with arms, place your hands on the arms of the chair, lift your bottom off of the seat by pushing on your arms. Repeat x 10. Build up to 3 sets.

• Step ups

Use the bottom step of stairs to step up and down. 10 times with the right foot first, 10 times with the left foot first.

Sink exercises

Stand at the sink so you can hold onto the edge. Toe raises and heel raises for ankle strengthening. These go a long way for balance and ankle stability

And, here is the big one, move the laundry off of the stationary bike or treadmill. I can't count the number of homes I've been in to do rehab and discover there is an unused piece of exercise equipment buried under the laundry.

If you've got it, use it.

These are just a few ideas to keep you moving. Set up a 20-30 min routine you can do daily. When you can't get outside you'll have an option. Stay warm and keep moving!



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Self Harm - Emotional Cutting

What is cutting and why would a person cut on themselves?

When someone has experienced a psychological trauma, such as long term childhood sexual abuse, family or school problems, the emotional pain is very intense and overwhelming. Not being able to tell anybody or ask for help they find a way of coping with the secret they are forced to keep sometimes by cutting their skin, usually on their arms or legs.

As reported by a former client, "When the emotional pain is too much I use cutting as a distraction. It's a way to feel control over my body because I can't control anything else in my life."


Ieri, an adult female came to see me and reported that she had been cutting herself with a razor during her adolescence and has continued intermittently afterwards. It started shortly after her stepfather had been sexually abusing her. Her mother had married and moved him into their home after only knowing him for 3 months. Jeri was unsure about the new arrangement until her stepfather took advantage of her mom's night shift work. He slowly seduced her and told her that he loved her. Jeri was confused and frightened as she was warned not to tell her mom because it would break up the family. While she was shaving her legs she started to cut on them. She explained that she could concentrate on the physical pain which was far less than the emotional pain and it provided a temporary sense of emotional relief. "I didn't want to kill myself, just shut off the feeling of pain in my chest." This impulsive behavior became an addictive one and she used it whenever she felt she couldn't cope with the stress in her life.

When she came into therapy she explained that she could conceal the scars from the cuts and slashes by wearing long sleeve shirts and long pants. She had a fear of detection and being criticized, rejected and punished by being isolated. It is therefore difficult to discover, especially with the styles of the day.

Parents, teachers, friends may become suspicious if a child is wearing clothing that is not appropriate with the weather. If the victim is willing to acknowledge the abuse and self harm, legal and professional help are essential. Individual/group therapy to learn more appropriate coping skills, medication and having a safe, supportive environment would provide relief from fear. Cutting is diagnosed by the mental health experts as an impulse control disorder not a disease. It is not cured. It is finding more appropriate options to deal with mental and emotional pain.

It must be mentioned that emotional cutting is not exclusive to girls. It has only been reported with mostly adolescent girls. Reports have increased in the past 20 years in the U.S. However, due to the problem of secrecy, there may be many more unreported cases.

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
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
