President's Corner

Welcome to Spring. The weather has been very nice, except that we really need the rain. The lake may not fill this year if we don't get more. The good news is that we may not have as many mosquitoes this year.

It is time to get the fire abatement/fitness work done. Spring cleaning on the outside, and heart healthy on the inside! This summer will be very dry so we all need to do our best to prevent a wild-fire. Be very cautious when using mowers, one spark is all that is needed to cause a big problem. The grass is green now but will dry out really fast this year.

The preparations for the summer season are underway, and if you have not been to the Marina you will be surprised at the changes.

With the very mild winter that we have had it seems that Pine Mountain Lake has not had a slow season. The Grill has been very busy so please call ahead and make a reservation. The food and the service is great and with the warming temperatures, dinner on the deck is not far away. The Pool is getting some love and attention with new deck furniture which will be a nice addition to the views and friendly staff.

The Marina refurbishment project is looking fantastic with big changes to the Marina Store & Cafe and the surrounding areas. There will be a new patio adjacent to the Cafe with some nice shade where patrons can sit and enjoy some good food while enjoying the beautiful surroundings. The lawn area above the sand is being completely redone with new sprinklers and grass. Inside the Marina Store & Cafe there are big improvements. The Cafe has a great layout inside with better food preparation, storage and food service areas. The Store has more room for merchandise and is more inviting for patrons with lots of windows. In addition

to the Marina Store & Cafe, the jetty, which was falling apart, has been rebuilt to last and replanted. It will look good once the plantings spread out. The boat dock next to the launching ramp has also been redone. A big thanks for the great team work between the Maintenance department and other PML staff for helping push this project along. This is a project that has been in the works for years and was long overdue to be done. As our busiest amenity during the summer season, these improvements should positively impact the service to our members and sales of food and merchandise.

To address the geese problem at the Marina and other locations in PML we have implemented a new plan. We aim to make PML a place where geese will not have a safe place to rest. To that end, our newest tool is called a Goosenator which is like a RC plane without the wings and is operated by a part-time employee. It can be operated on land and water. The operator makes the rounds of known geese hangouts and when the geese are located, he uses the Goosenator to scare the geese away. So far it seems effective, time will tell.

At our last Board meeting we agreed to start the planning process for the development of mountain biking, hiking and running trails here at Pine Mountain Lake. We are going to do some conceptual planning of where trails could be built behind the Campgrounds and also behind the Stables. This is all part of a larger planning process to create a network of trails both within PML and in the surrounding forests. Other communities who have built trail systems have had great results bringing in new visitors who support their local economies. This is another effort to build a low cost amenity that will attract new



homeowners to the area. We will be working with Groveland Trail Heads, a local chapter of IMBA, to start the design process for building low cost sustainable trails for multiple use.

We are also planning on having a 5K run/walk at the Stables on July 4th.

Pine Mountain Lake is a great community!



General Manager's Message

PML Pet Policies

In response to recent member complaints, we are reviewing our policies with regard to the control of pets, specifically, complaints regarding barking dogs, loose animals, aggressive animals, pet access to amenities, damage caused by pets, and owners who fail to clean up after their pets.

We work with the County regarding some of these issues, but the response has been less than satisfactory due to the lack of resources. While I do not like to propose additional rules, we will need to come up with a more effective way to handle the long list of pet issues that continue to plague our Association. To that end, we will be proposing new rules that govern these issues at a Board meeting in the near future. The goal is to improve our pet policies and work to resolve these issues for our members.

Water Conservation/Drought Mitigation

I recently held a planning session with our managers and key staff to discuss the development of a formal plan that covers all aspects of water conservation both for PML operations and our membership. We will present this report at a future Board meeting and will provide information and tips for the membership. We have also been in contact with the State, County and local agencies to gather information and work together on this issue. We

have also been working on a new page on the PML Website that will provide information and resources for members to review. Please do your part and reduce your water usage.

Marina Store/Café Project Update

I am pleased to report that Marina Project remains ahead of schedule. Most of the Cafe equipment was delivered and is ready to be installed. The sheet rock work is completed and concrete work continues. The weather in February put a damper on painting, but this is back on track. Staff is working on the new menu and some of the old equipment was sold and the proceeds will be used to off-set costs.

The rental boat storage huts have been swallow-proofed. We are using a new method to deter the birds from building nests under the eaves. The benches and planters have been ordered for the new Jetty and the Dam survey was completed and no issues were found.

Radar Speed Signs

In response to member complaints regarding drivers who exceed the speed limit, the Board authorized the purchase of two radar speed signs the end of last year. The signs indicate the speed limit and then track the speed of oncoming vehicles. We have evaluated the effectiveness of the radar speed signs that were purchased last year, and I am happy to report that they do cause drivers to

reduce their speed. Some members have questioned the location of the signs. The initial placement of the signs was determined by available sunlight as they are solar-powered and amount of vehicle traffic. We evaluated these locations and we will be relocating the signs in the near future to increase effectiveness.

Swimming Pool Preparation

Work continues on the pool area to get it in shape for the summer season. Recently new doors were installed for the office and Maintenance is repairing and replacing fixtures as needed. As per Board direction, we will be taking steps to improve the Swimming Pool area for our members. The new chair and lounge cushions have been delivered and stored until we open for the season. The new planters should be delivered before the end of the month. The Pool should have a nice, new, "cozy" look and feel in time for the start of the season.

Waterfowl Management

Earlier in the year, we hired a parttime employee for waterfowl control and purchased the Goosinator, goose hazing device. So far, the efforts have been effective in reducing the number of Canada geese at our amenities. We will continue to monitor and evaluate the program for effectiveness and provide a detailed report in a couple of months.

Marina Closed for Construction until May

The Marina will be closed for maintenance and construction until May so that we can complete the Marina Store/Cafe building, Jetty refurbishment, lawn replacement and irrigation projects. We kept some areas of the Marina open during the construction as long as possible, but we are now replacing the lawn and irrigation system. We must now shut down access to mitigate damage to these projects and reduce possible safety/ security problems. We apologize for any inconvenience. We know that the weather has been nice, but need to keep the area closed for now to ensure the successful completion of these projects in time for the Summer season. Members and guests may still access the Lake from the Lake Lodge beach, Dunn Court and Fisherman's Cove as usual.





Pine Mountain Lake Department of Safety

The Safety Department is housed in two separate buildings, the old Pine Mountain Lake Firehouse and the Main Gate. The Main Gate operates the guest lane window, the pedestrian window and provides continuous observation of the property owner lane should ever a problem arise. The original Firehouse was converted to house the Director and Sergeant's offices along with a storage area.

The Pine Mountain Lake Campground is also managed by the Department of Safety. We are responsible for answering questions regarding the Campground and booking reservations for property owners and the public. Safety Officers also patrol the Campground, post and remove reservation signs, operate the dumpstation and assist campers as needed.

Although we are not members of law enforcement, Safety Officers do practice repressive patrol techniques which aim to deter such crimes as burglary, theft and vandalism. We staff the Main Gate 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, all year round. At one time the Department used the title of 'Security' instead of 'Safety.' A change in title was enacted in order to reflect the public safety focus of the Department. We are committed to providing members and guests of Pine Mountain Lake with excellent service of many varieties. Some

of the services we currently provide are:

- Operating the dispatch command center and Main Gate
- Greeting and screening incoming traffic
- Assisting members with a variety of questions, including requests for service and/or assistance
- Verifying property owner information and issuing guest passes
- Providing courtesy calls for property owner's guests that do not have passes
- Maintaining records of all incidents reported to the Safety Department
- Booking found property and releasing to verifiable owners
- Regulating temporary resident registration and associated fees
- Notification of special circumstances to non-resident property owners, i.e. water breaks, tree hazards, etc.
- Notifying agencies of emergency situations requiring their response
- Responding to emergency situations and providing secondary support to emergency agencies

Although we encounter a wide spectrum of questions from property owners, there are several specific questions that seem to come up more often than others. I will attempt to broadly paraphrase and answer a few of those pointed questions below.

Why do I need a PIN number? Don't you know I am who I say I am?

The Main Gate receives hundreds of calls per day from property owners all over the state of California and other areas of the country. Properties within Pine Mountain Lake also change ownership from time to time over the years. It would be a very daunting task for officers to learn to recognize every individual property owner's voice. Therefore, your pin number authenticates that it is in fact, you, who is calling and not a person without property owner rights or worse, an imposter. We operate using a process similar to that of a utility company or credit card company. Pieces of information, including your unit, lot, last name and PIN number, are used in conjunction to confirm your identity which allows us to quickly and efficiently assist you.

My neighbor's dog barks constantly and every time I call the Main Gate to report it nothing seems to get done.

Investigating a barking dog complaint is a process in which several steps are involved. A Safety Officer, upon receiving your complaint, will respond to the known area or suspected area if an exact location is not provided. The officer will then listen for the barking dog and confirm the exact unit and lot the dog is barking at. If the officer is unable to hear a barking dog within a reasonable period of time he or she will have to depart the area. If the dog is located, an Officer will need to complete a fixed post for a continuous thirty minute period, as defined by Tuolumne County Ordinance 6.04.365. Once we confirm a barking dog violation, an officer has several options. The Officer can make contact with the property owner and issue them a verbal warning, especially if problems with their barking dog have not occurred in the recent past. The officer can make contact with the owner and issue them a Courtesy Notice of Violation, thereby notifying the property owner that their barking dog has become a nuisance. The officer can also issue a Courtesy Notice of Violation if the property owner is unavailable. A barking dog cannot be quieted if the owner is not home at the time of the violation, but compliance, in writing, can still be requested. In many instances, the Community Standards Director, Dennis Pipal, will take over enforcement proceedings in order to secure compliance from members with barking dogs.

Why are my guests being asked to show identification at the Main Gate?

Any person entering Pine Mountain Lake through the Main Gate guest lane without

a pass will be asked to show identification, such as a California driver's license, to the Safety Officer at the window. This provides Safety Officers with the opportunity to quickly look up the guest's entry pass using the correct name and spelling of each and to quickly confirm their status as a guest permitted to visit your residence. Asking for photo identification further prevents solicitors and unannounced guests from just showing up on your doorstep. It is not meant to harass or challenge the legitimacy of any guest arriving at Pine Mountain Lake, but instead enables us to quickly and accurately check guests in.

I have a complaint about my neighbor. Are you going to reveal my identity to them?

When a property owner calls the Main Gate to report a violation of any variety, they will be asked for their unit and lot, last name or another type of identifying information. This is recorded along with the details surrounding the complaint. We use this information to better assist the member, whether it means contacting them in the future with further details or at the very least making a record that such an incident occurred and what the outcome may have been. Although the Covenants Committee may formally request this information, we do not informally disclose reporting party information to anyone.

I just called the Main Gate about the power outage/water break/ phone line disruption and they did not have any new details to give me. Why is this?

It is always recommended that members contact the service source first before contacting the Main Gate. Although we do try to stay abreast of developing situations, there are times when we are unable to gather any specific information beyond what is available to property owners. There are also occasions, during severe weather storms for example, that the Main Gate is so inundated by phone calls that we are unable to call the service provider for the most up-todate information. Sometimes the outage or disruption is localized to one residence, in which case the member needs to contact the service provider directly for assistance. For reference purposes: PG&E's main number is 1-800-743-5000, Groveland Community Services District can be reached at (209) 962-7161 and AT&T's customer service number is 1-800-332-1321.

The role of a Safety Officer can oftentimes be a thankless one. We are the resource that is called out to ask parties to cease, dogs to remain off the golf course and generally to enforce the CC&Rs and resolutions adopted by the Association. We never aim to ruin anyone's fun; we're just here to maintain Pine Mountain Lake law and order.

DID YOU KNOW? IN 1973:

Off the Lake

OK. I changed the title for this month's article. "Off the Lake" is what I muttered to the geese we encountered on our first round of nest and egg patrols. If you haven't heard of the program, here's a quick recap. We have a Federal permit to go around the lake looking for nests and eggs. Once we find them, we can benignly and humanely treat them with an oil that prevents them from developing into more grass and deck fouling adult geese. It appears that the effort is cutting down the number of geese that chose to build nests on the shoreline and in the total number of geese on the lake this time of year. But that's only part of the goose problem. There are still way too many geese that come to the lake around June to molt. We are exploring options to deal with those geese and hope to obtain help from the Federal agencies that regulate those programs. A pleasant chap and property owner in Unit 4 conveyed to me, "I don't think people who live away from the lake can appreciate the mess these things leave behind." Probably true, but I'm sure beachgoers and golfers also appreciate the problems caused by the geese. And speaking of the golf course, let me mention one last thing about geese before moving on. I'm working with my collie pup (Dana) to safely chase geese off of the golf course. For a pup, she's doing a really good job with the geese, but there are a few areas needing improvement. One is chasing deer. I keep telling her that I'm going to get a shocker collar, but for now, I'm hoping voice commands will take hold. The other problem is the sand traps... she just loves to frolic in the sand. I'm doing my best to keep her out and rake the paw prints, but I'm totally inexperienced with sand. So, if your ball "accidentally" ends up in a paw print, I think you can safely do a "Dana drop" to get a better lie (not USGA approved). It's a small price to pay for clean cleats.

And now a little good news bad news. The lake is really clear for this time of year. The bad news is; that's because we haven't had any substantial flow from Big Creek. It's looking more like the lake isn't going to fill and spill

this year. Even in my inflatable dingy, I had to be careful not to drag and damage the prop. All I can say is keep up the rain dance and be really careful operating your boats. I found a lot of stumps and rocks that were a little too close to the surface... cha-ching! Another bit of good new is that we saw a lot of bass in the shallows getting ready to build their nests. This is the time of year when anglers need to be really considerate when casting for bass in the shallows. The bass are aggressive defenders of their nests and will often strike at a lure even if they aren't hungry. It's always a good practice to release them as gently as possible.

There are a couple other topics that I wish I had more time to discuss this month, but in the interest of brevity, I'll just mention them here. One is the increasingly hot topic of mercury contamination in fish tissue. I spent all day in a meeting in Sacramento discussing ways to reduce mercury in fish. It's a statewide problem that has more in and outs than a Sherlock Holmes story. The bottom line is that anyone who chooses to eat fish from lakes and reservoirs should check the State Water Quality Control Board website to see if fish from that water body are safe to eat. Pine Mountain Lake is not on the list of problem reservoirs, but Don Pedro and some other Tuolumne County waters are. The other problem is sediment runoff and erosion. The Association is putting a lot of work into reducing sediment runoff from community property, but individuals have a responsibility too. The good news is that most lots have healthy landscaping and good ground cover. Not so good is that some lots still have no ground cover. I've watched muddy water run off of these lots even during moderate rain fall. Hopefully we can work together to come up with solutions to reduce the runoff, but are also easy to maintain and aesthetically pleasing.

We live in a marvelous community.

SPLASH. I hope that's the sound of Canadian Geese leaving our Lake as we encourage them to go back to the land of maple syrup and hockey... Aye!

PMLA Money Matters

What does \$163 a month buy? I thought I would take a different approach this month in talking about the monthly assessment that all property owners are responsible for during 2014. Let's take a look at where this money goes each month.

The single largest chunk of your monthly payment (\$47.65) goes towards funding our Reserves and New Capital expenditures. As I have discussed before this critical aspect of our financial plan affects our future and the ability to maintain the various amenities and common areas with the Association. With PML getting older each year we need to be sure we have the funds available to repair (our 52 miles of roads for example) and replace these various facilities (think Marina Store/Café). We are well on our way to achieving this goal.

As you would expect the next three largest areas that we fund each month are support functions that do not generate revenue. They are – Maintenance (\$38.21); Administration (\$29.42) and the Department of Safety (\$19.85). These operations are important to insure the continuing level of service that all property owners have come to expect. It is a complex process to coordinate all of the activities necessary to keep a community like PML humming along. From staffing the main gate on a 24/7 basis, to patrolling the entire Association, to assisting property owners as needed the Department of Safety is a

visible and important part of what we do.

From paying the bills, to collecting all that assessment, to insuring the entire operation runs smoothly, the Administration department is the leadership aspect of the Association. This department includes our ECC efforts to maintain the look and feel of PML. Such necessary functions as Human Resources and Personnel matters are also handled here. Administration is also the first area that most new property owners interface with, from getting gate cards and clickers to answering a multitude of questions, the Admin. office is always humming.

As with any large organization there is a continuing, ongoing need for maintenance. Think of your own home multiplied many times over. This group takes care of making sure all the facilities, amenities and green belts are in tip top shape, that things work properly and reflect the level of care that all property owners deserve.

The next two areas of cost are located in the same building. The Grill & Bar operation (\$9.61) and the Golf Course operation (\$9.27) are remarkably close in their required funding level. The surprisingly low level of support required from your assessment is a reflection of the revenue generated by these operations to help offset the costs involved. These amenities are available not only to all property owners but the public as well and they provide a high level of service to

all customers.

The Stables operation has one of the lowest contribution requirements of all our amenities at \$3.16 per month. Two areas actually use less than \$2 per month of your assessment. The Marina & Lake operation at \$1.69 and the Recreation group (Tennis, Pool) comes in at only \$1.85 per month. These all represent a very reasonable cost for the services they provide.

While this does not encompass all of the monthly assessment it does address the vast majority of your payment. In addition to the items above there are allocations for such things as the Golf Snack Shack (\$.64) and what we call Assessment Related costs (\$1.66) which covers such things as our Bad Debt Reserve and our costs of collecting the assessment.

I hope this brief explanation gives you a bit of insight into how your money is spent each month. If you want further details on this subject I encourage you to read through the annual budget package you received in December. If you have any questions on this please feel free to contact me.

Community Standards

GONE TO THE DOGS

Death and Taxes have long been considered life's twin inevitabilities. But for community associations there may be a third: pets.

In 2012, there were 83.3 million dogs owned in the United States. According to the American Pet Products Manufacturing Association, almost 50% of American households counted a four-legged friend among the family with many households having multiple four-leggers.

Dogs represent about 50% in total pet numbers nationwide but many times I feel it is much higher here in PML. Most of the complaints I receive involve dogs. Dogs pooping, dogs barking and dogs running loose. I'd like to take each of these violations and expand on them here.

UNSCOOPED POOP (CC&R's, Article VIII, Section 4 – Prohibition of Noxious Activities)

Unscooped poop is an enforcement headache because it's impossible to know who isn't scooping. Even if you see a resident walk away without picking up, they claim they went home to get a bag or they cleaned it up later. No one is ever responsible, yet the Common Areas are littered with land mines.

Uncollected pet waste is going to become more than an enforcement headache for community associations, which increasingly are coming under the watchful gaze of the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), especially in states like California.

Stepped-up monitoring by the EPA of compliance with the Federal Water Pollution Prevention and Control Act is mandating that associations take responsibility for removing pet waste from their Common Areas. Recently, an association in California was fined \$100,000 for failing to report what actions it was taking to comply with the Clean Water Act. A wallop like this is telling associations that pet waste is no longer merely a nuisance, but a serious problem that boards must resolve. If you are not scooping, please get on the program.

BARKING BAXTER (CC&R's, Article VIII, Section 4 – Prohibition of Noxious Activities)

Next to uncollected pet waste, barking is probably the most frustrating pet problem faced by associations. Dogs left alone all day get bored and restless, and many find relief in barking. Nothing is as annoying as incessant barking - even for dog owners. So, if Baxter is barking all

day, his owners might not realize he leads a double life when he's alone. Once notified, most owners will respond with compassion and fix the problem. Some mistakenly believe there's nothing they can do about it, but actually there are a few suggestions:

Training - Always the first recommendation for any behavioral problem. Help is as close as the yellow pages.

Citronella collars – A humane alternative to the electric-shock, anti-barking variety that costs about the same. Available on the web and in pet stores.

Confinement – Sometimes simply bringing an outspoken dog indoors or confining it to a crate can cut down on the disturbance to neighbors.

Reduced stimulus – Close the drapes to help muffle street noise, or leave a radio on to mask it. Disconnect telephones and doorbells if they cause Baxter to holler.

Companionship – Dogs are pack animals; they need companionship – a cat, a bird or other dog. Consider a mid-day visit from a pet-sitting-service, or send Baxter to daycare once or twice a week.

ROAMING ROVER (CC&R's, Article VIII, Section 6 (b) – Household Pets

Our local leash law coincides with the Tuolumne County leash law. Dogs roaming our neighborhoods is a safety issue. Also, if your dog causes bodily injury or property damage while running at large the owner is guilty of a misdemeanor and on conviction thereof shall be punishable as set forth in Tuolumne County Ordinance Code #1.08.010. And yet, many owners have no idea where their dog is on a daily basis.

PMLA is committed to enforcing the leash law on association property so that all residents may enjoy our community. But, we're also concerned about the health and safety of Rover. Did you know that an unleashed dog has an average life span of less than four years? Allowing Rover to run free not only imposes on the neighbors, but also threatens Rover's health and welfare, and the happiness he/she brings.

Shades of Green

Maybe the title should read; Shades of Brown. Let's discuss water or lack of, how we use it, and what is the source of our irrigation water.

Even though we have received over ten inches of rain from late January through early March, our totals for the year are still well below average. It seems like we go from one extreme to another. Remember back just a few years ago when parts of the course were difficult to play, due to all of the rain. Number eleven fairway was so wet that it was difficult to walk on. During the wet years the lake will spill until summer appears on the calendar, other years we are fortunate if it fills at all.

We do all we can in wet or dry years to conserve water. There are many benefits that occur when we use less water. We save energy and playing conditions improve. Wouldn't it be nice to have the firm playing conditions during the summer like we experienced this past January? Unfortunately, the temperatures associated with summer demand water to keep the grass alive.

We are all asked to reduce the amount of water we use at home.

What will we be doing to reduce the usage for the course and landscaped areas?

The plants that were chosen for the landscapes require very little water and are watered with

drip irrigation. The areas around the pool and the restaurant use the blended water that we use for the course. The blended water is roughly 75% lake water and 25% effluent. This ratio is based on water testing and quality. Depending on the year and circumstances, this is about all of the effluent that is available for us to use.

Last year we used roughly 12 inches or one foot of water from the lake. Evaporation is about twice this much. Our goal for 2014 is to improve or use less of the lake water than we did during 2013. We have not used any water out of the lake since last October. This year we will perform various tasks to improve water infiltration. Surfactants or wetting agents will be used as well as additional aerations to get the water into the soil and root zone. While we won't completely eliminate areas of irrigated turf, we will reduce irrigation throughout the course and more in the out of play areas. Remember, brown is not always bad.

Let's hope by next month that March was again a miracle as it was in 1991. Do your best to conserve water at home. If you are interested in a list of drought tolerant landscape plants, you may call Susan at 962-8612 and she will give you a list of the types we have used over the years.

Horsing Around at the Stables

As you read this, we have already started springtime here. Now that the light rain season for the year is winding down, we will be looking at how to conserve water here at the Stables. The only thing that we use water from GCSD for is horses in the barn and the restrooms. All other water here comes from the wells on the stables property.

The water troughs that are out in the pastures are set up with automatic floats so the horses always have plenty of fresh water to drink. As these become dirty, they are scrubbed out. We do use some water treatments so we do not have to clean this as often as we use to.

We have very little landscaping here so we do not use much water for it. What we do have is a nice green lawn around our BBQ area but it only gets well water and only enough to keep it somewhat green.

The horses here will be getting their springtime shots to help keep them healthy. We have two different Vets that come by PML Stables and some of the other local ranches to give the shots. The most important one is the rabies shot. The reason horses get rabies shots is that they are very curious animals and will put their noses down on the ground where small animals can bite them.

We are waiting for the building dept to get our permit to build our new tack room. We should have it by the time you read this paper. The new building will be a great addition to the stables grounds.

In addition, we will have our new flatbed dump truck for all of our hauling needs here at the stables. The old dump truck was a hand me down from the PML maintance dept and was totally worn out.

We are looking forward to a busy spring, summer, and fall here. As the weather warms up and people are out and about we will be happy to get them out on our great trail for horseback riding. Also, we have many events coming up here so keep reading the paper for dates and times.

Let's Make Something Clear

Keeping the storm water run-off flowing clear is important during the rainy seasons. Keeping our waste water effluence running clear is absolutely important all the yearround. The questionable health of each and every on-site sewage disposal system, that is, your home's septic system, can go unnoticed for years. Though many homes are connected to the GCSD sewer system, water going down the drains is still the largest use of our domestic water supply. The septic system relies on the healthy inflow of water and wastes to allow the system to operate properly.

A basic rule of household solid wastes which are being sent down the waste drain system is – if you haven't chewed it, then it shouldn't be going down the waste lines. Toilets have a specific use, but, kitchen garbage disposals do not belong in a kitchen which is connected to a septic system. Be cautious about sending raw foods down the garbage disposal and into the septic tank. These wastes may just sit there, building into a sludge in the tank, and will not be readily broken down. An absolute no-no is pouring grease down the drains; the fats, grease and oils will rise to the surface and build a cap which will cause the septic system to malfunction. Dispose of foods, fats, grease, and oils properly. Avoid sending these materials into the sinks and drains.

Over use of the domestic waste water system can cause a septic system to fail. When the leach field is overwhelmed, the septic system will begin releasing waste water into the storm water system. When your home is operating with a dishwasher, clothes washer, multiple showers, sinks, and toilets, the system can be overwhelmed by the sheer volume of waste water. Most homes are three bedrooms, able to handle four persons reasonably, and built to dispose the waste water efficiently over time. Multiply the occupancy, have the water use appliances working at high use, and viola, the waste water system will overflow the drainfield and begin leaching into the storm psft/V-991455608/Homeowners_Guide.pdf

water run-off system. The proper cautious attitude should be to limit the amounts of water going down the system, especially in these drought years, without starving the septic system of water to process wastes.

It is the property owner's responsibility to insure the system is operating properly. Using a bona fide specialist is the first step to insure your systems is operating properly. Periodical inspections of your septic system are your responsibility as a homeowner. The top four things you can do to protect your septic system are:

Have your system Inspected every 3 years, and have the tank pumped every 3 to 5 years as necessary.

> Use your household water efficiently and wisely.

Do not dispose of pharmaceutical drugs, hazardous wastes or chemicals into the sinks or toilets.

Take special care to protect your drainfield and leach lines

The Tuolumne County Environmental Health Division oversees the construction and operation of both septic systems and alternative waste water systems (ASTI). The primary objective of proper wastewater disposal is to reduce and/or eliminate the potential contamination of groundwater, surface water, or the environment and its inhabitants. Tuolumne County Environmental Management is responsible for all onsite sewage disposal systems in the county. Sewer connections within Pine Mountain Lake Association are served by our utilities district, Groveland Community Services District, GCSD.

Exterior Lighting

Some like it bright, some like it dark; we need to think of our neighborhood when placing exterior lighting. The decision of installing lighting could be for safety or accenting our wonderful surroundings - usually not considering the impact on our neighbors.

PML / ECC has guidelines for exterior lighting, these are found in the ECC Rules, Guidelines and Construction Standards booklet (available in the Administration Office and on-line).

Exterior lighting must be shielded or hooded and placed not to create a nuisance or hazard. The lighting footprint must project downward and not project beyond the property boundaries. Motion detectors or timers are a good idea to lessen the impact on the neighbors. Look outside the next beautiful dark night and see how your lighting affects the neighborhood.

It's officially Spring and the rains have greened up our beautiful community. Can the Rim Fire wildflowers be far behind? We also have an interactive wildflower display on the touchscreen computer in the museum that lets you search for flowers by color. The photography is spectacular and the descriptions are informative.

This is also a great time to enjoy the Yosemite waterfalls. Pick up a map in the museum to all the waterfalls in the park and take a drive. Don't forget your camera!

We'd love to help you fill those Easter baskets for Sunday, April 20. The gift shop has a great variety of children's books, puppets, vintage toys, rock collections, and so much more. Our extended daily hours are until 4:30 for your shopping convenience.

This month you are invited into the museum to see the enlarged and updated Foreign Flag and Currency display. This is an especially popular presentation with our many international visitors and we always welcome new coins or bills that may be lacking from our display. So all you world travelers, check your bottom drawers, nooks and crannies to see if you can help us with currency from a country you may have visited that is missing from our display.

Last month's historical photograph was of the building known as the Gilliam House. It is located on the south side of Highway 120 as you enter Groveland from Big Oak Flat. Daniel Gilliam had the Queen Anne house constructed in 1903.

It has always been one of the most



attractive historic homes in Groveland, with its front bay gable and decorative brackets and fish scale shingles. The house was extensively remodeled in 1976 and much of the original detailing was retained or replicated.

But the truly unique aspect of the Gilliam House was the enclosed lower level room. Through the rock wall ran a spring year round. It would flow to a concrete lined cistern and also filled a water trough for animals. The overflow then watered the extensive garden in the back of the house. The thick rock walls enclosing the lower room made it a perfect cool storage area for vegetables and perishable food.

Undertaking The Teenagers Years BY ETTY GARBER, PHD, LICENSED MARRIAGE, FAMILY THERAPIST

Most of us think of our teen age years as being full of fun and excitement. We were no longer children but almost adults. We had more freedom but with that came more responsibility and higher expectations. We may have forgotten that with the onset of puberty we had to cope with considerable emotional, mental and physical changes and that wasn't always so easy. Today teens face the same needs to adapt to a changing body, handle intensified feelings, deal with sexual relations and forge an identity that is separate from their parents and be approved of by their peers. Additionally, they worry about their friendships, compare themselves to their peers and to the "ideal" teen that is unrealistically portrayed on tv, movies, and commercials. This causes feelings of self- doubt, fluctuating mood swings, anger, anxiety, depression and fear. "I can't measure up to what I am supposed to be like," reported Steve.

These feelings are overwhelming and they will act out their distress by constantly testing parental limits, arguing over nothing, losing interest in prior activities and dependence on peers.

Teenagers are constantly trying to discover who they are, who they will become and where they belong. To find out they experiment with clothing, personalities and behaviors. Their emerging sexuality has them interested in dating. Having a boyfriend/girlfriend can be very important in high school. "I feel lucky that I have a boyfriend because I always have someone to talk to and I don't feel alone," boasted Stephanie.

In Stephanie's case this may be beneficial but in too many cases the relationships are not very healthy. One or the other of the couple may be demanding, manipulative, threatening or even physically violent to keep the pair together. This creates even greater stress and fear that produces low self-esteem and self-confidence. The progression can lead to use or abuse of alcohol/drugs. If left unchecked, to the possibility of suicide.

There are some warning signs of dating violence that teenagers and parents should be aware of: 1. blames you for his/ her anger 2. history of violent behavior 3. insults you or calls you names 4. tells you what to wear, what to do or how to act 5.prevents you from spending time with your friends or family.

As a parent, you are certain to have many mixed feelings when seeing your teen turn toward peers for support and advice. Teens alternate between wanting to lean on their parents and pulling away from them. It is important to let your teen know that you are available to listen whenever he/she is ready to talk. You should let her/him know that you will not criticize but will attempt to understand and support him/her.

Tracking Your Walking

Last month our article discussed the merits of walking. A question came up about the popularity of devices to track our steps. Are they helpful? Are they accurate?

The answers are, yes, and yes! Pedometers were popular decades ago. They were not very accurate or fun to use. With the age of computer and smart phone gadgets, pedometers have surged back into popularity. They are much more accurate and give you more information, if you want it.

First, how many steps should we be walking? The Harvard Alumni Study showed that walking even one mile a day reduced death rates. The most benefit came at 6000 steps per day. For most, that is equivalent of walking for an hour a day. The steps can be accumulated throughout the day. To burn calories for weight loss you need to up that number to 10,000 steps.


There are a number of activity monitoring devices on the market. Some, like the FitBit series, sync with your computer or smart phone. They can be worn on your wrist or clipped on your clothing. They show you the numbers of steps, calories burned, active minutes, and equivalent stairs climbed. (Fun fact: My regular route in Pine Mountain Lake is equivalent to 30 flights of stairs!) You can see that information on some of the devices, others send the information to your computer or phone through a bluetooth connection. By syncing it with your computer you can track your history and progress, set goals, and network with other FitBit users.

Simpler, but equally as effective, are the basic pedometers. The Walk4Life MVP Pedometer won the 2013 Readers Choice award on About. com. You clip it on your belt and it monitors your steps, walking time, calculates distance and intensity of exercises. The read out is on the unit. It does not estimate calories or keep a record. Yamax Digi-Walker is also a very basic step counter. Sometimes basic is good! Too many bells and whistles can be daunting.

Wearing an activity monitor or pedometer really helps you be realistic about your activity level. It is motivating to do a little bit more to hit

that goal. You will find that you start parking further from your destination, taking the stairs rather than the elevator, adding a stroll on your breaks, and taking a walk in the evening.

I am pro these devices because I am pro consistent activity. And after years as a therapist I know that having a "toy" really helps compliance with exercise. I get a big kick out of the vibration and flash of lights on my wristband when I hit 10,000 steps!




First Wednesday Bird Walk

Genealogy Workshop

Research Logs

This month I would like to talk about the importance of citing sources and keeping a research log. Though very important, these two steps are not nearly as fun and exciting as doing the actual research.

Hopefully, if you have been researching your family for some time, you have found a least a few family members and have added them to your Family Group Sheet. But where did you find your grandmother's birth date? Did you have a birth certificate, a Family Bible or find it on *Ancestry.com*?

The most important reason for keeping track of where you find information is to verify your data and to double check information in case conflicts are found later in your research. In genealogy research, any statement of fact (birth or death date, maiden name, etc.) must have its own source or sources.

Properly citing your sources leaves a map for you and others to follow and, along with research logs, makes it easier to pick up where you left off if you have been focusing on other projects for sometime.

Research logs will save you time in at least two ways: 1) they tell you where you have been looking and 2) what you found or didn't find.

I cannot tell you how many times I've found information on my family that I couldn't find again and how many times I went back to sites that I had already checked. Keep a research log, you will be glad you did.

Next month I will cover the different types of sources

There are two types of sources Original and Derivative Sources.

Original and with those sources are Primary and Secondary sources. A primary source is an original document or record and secondary sources are documents created a significant amount of time after an even occurred. From Your Supervisor

Rafts, Wilderness, Frogs

Your Tuolumne County Board of Supervisors has been busy keeping an eye on other Governmental Agencies on their actions and how these actions affect our County.

As many of you know, Lake Don Pedro is in the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) relicensing process.

During the process FERC requests that affected parties provide input to help formulate the various studies that are required for licensing.

After reviewing the Whitewater Lake Act Study report for the Wards Ferry Bridge Area, the Board of Supervisors offered the following recommendations to the relicensing committee that were reviewed in the study:

Improve parking closer to the Wards Ferry Bridge

Improve the take out facility by improving the ramps. Currently a crane is used

3 Improve the walking path and toilet facilities

4 Coordinating public safety patrol and better management of the site for cleanliness and user safety

5 Improve communication systems due to the remote location

Coordinate and improving the access road to Groveland to provide for safe passage.

Our letter stated that the County looks forward to meeting with all parties involved to explore that suggested solutions.

The goal of the recommendations is to enhance the user experience and expand economic development. The FERC relicensing process is an opportunity to make long term improvements to the popular recreational location. There are no guarantees that these recommendations will be accepted, but if we don't ask, nothing will change.

On another matter, Congressman Tom McClintock has proposed a Bill Entitled HR3606: Emigrant Wilderness Historical Use Preservation Act of 2013. The Board of Supervisors has written a letter of support for this Bill.

This Bill Introduction states its purpose is "to ensure that future generations of America continue to have the opportunity for a true wilderness experience when using the Emigrant Wilderness Area." As it pertains to horseback riding, parking, hunting, fishing and camping. It is my opinion that these historic uses should be allowed to continue. It is a part of our local heritage and should not be limited any more than what was occurring prior to when the area was designated as wilderness in 1975. If you agree, please offer your support for the Bill.

Some months ago I addressed the Yellow Legged Frog and the Yosemite Toad in one of my articles. As you may recall, the United States Fish and Wildlife Service is proposing to list these two amphibians on the Endangered Species List.

The Board of Supervisors has sent a comment letter to the United States Fish and Wildlife Service pertaining to the most recent economic analysis. With 2,077,825 acres included to be set aside for frogs and toads it leaves little else available for other recreation and economic uses.

We have asked the services to perform a true economic analysis that not only addresses the cost of implementing the habitat set aside but also addresses the entire economic effect on all use activities.

Our forest, parks and wilderness were set aside for the benefit of the people to use them. We have to be good stewards of the land and the environment, but we also must be realistic with restrictions in order to be able to use and enjoy what we are protecting.

Recently, I received correspondence concerning the way the new Highway J59 and Highway 108 intersection were constructed, as well as correspondence concerning one of the crosswalks on Highway 120 in Groveland.

I am happy to report that we have received a reply from CalTrans that they will conduct an onsite field analysis to evaluate the safety concerns within the next two (2) or three (3) months. I will report back as to the outcome of those studies.

In closing, I ask that we take the recent State of Emergency that has been declared by the Tuolumne County Board of Supervisors due to the severe drought conditions seriously. The lack of water is real. We need to do our best to conserve what we have, whether you are on a well or public water, please do your best to reduce consumption. We have not experienced a four-year drought in any of our lifetimes, but it could happen.




