# **President's Corner**

Serving on the PML Board has been a rewarding experience for me and we have seen all of our goals achieved and the Association is in solid financial shape. The governance of PML remains in the capable hands of my fellow Board members and I wish them well in carrying on the work. Our operations continue to be managed in an exemplary fashion by our professional, hard-working staff and we appreciate their loyalty and friendliness.

I do not plan to travel far and have applied for the Long Range Planning Committee (if they will have me). The LRPC has been integral in determining the direction and wishes of our membership through member surveys. The Board uses this information to determine strategic and annual goals for our community.

We have already held our 1st Annual 5K run and we are working on plans to create mountain bike trails near the Stables. Mountain biking is a family-fun activity and has turned into a nationwide, billion-dollar business. There are many members who are already taking part and getting some fresh air and exercise.

On a more somber subject, the drought has really wreaked havoc on many of the lakes in the region including ours. I believe our lake level is down twice as far this time last year and we have taken steps to assist our boating members and those who use the lake. To ensure that safety is our fist consideration, our staff has had to remove the water docks and platforms

from the swim areas. The water level is just to low to risk an injury. Hopefully we will get the rainfall from the El Nino effect that the weather experts are predicting for the end of the year. Until then we encourage all members to do their part to conserve water.

On a happy note, the new Pickleball Courts have been installed at Tennis Court #6 near the Country Club Village condos. This new racquet sport has been taking the nation by storm and gained massive popularity. After a massive outpouring of interest that was expressed by the membership, the Board decided to give it a try and install the courts on a little-used tennis court. Only time will tell if it gains even more popularity. If it does, we may see even more Pickleball Courts within PML.

To ensure that our computer systems are secure, the Board recently approved the purchase of 32 new computers to replace the units that ran Windows XP. These units were scheduled for replacement in 2015 and 2016. We bumped up the acquisition as Windows XP is no longer serviced by Microsoft and there are many security risks with running this OS. By the time you read this article, our staff should have the new computers installed and up and running.

Again, I wish the next board all the best and they can count on my continued support.

I encourage all members to get out and enjoy our community. Until then, see you on the trails!

# General Manager's Message BY JOE POWELL, CCAM, CMCA, AMS, GENERAL MANAGER

### Status Update on Annual Election

The Annual Meeting of the Members and Election of Directors will be held on Saturday, August 16th at the Lake Lodge. The meeting starts at 9 am and all members are welcome to attend. As of the end of July, the Inspector of Elections received over 900 valid ballot submissions. We need 34% or 1109 members to vote to reach a quorum to conduct business at the Annual Meeting. In the past we have averaged around 47% return on ballots. Last year it was 49%, so we anticipate having no problem reaching quorum for the election.

### July 4th Holiday a Big Success

After every big holiday, I hold a postevent debrief meeting with our managers. The purpose of these meetings is to discuss what went well, and areas of opportunity and improvement. We made it through July 4th Weekend with some minor issues but nothing major. As usual, the biggest challenges are the crowds and traffic control. We saw a lot of rental business during the week leading up to the weekend as the holiday fell on a Friday. As usual the complaints that came in were barking and loose dogs, people playing Frisbee and football on the Golf Course, vehicles speeding, loud parties late into the evening and early morning etc.

We work with Cal Fire, emergency services and law enforcement to ensure that we mitigate safety issues and everyone has an enjoyable time. Unfortunately we had incidents of illegal fireworks use. We were able to identify at least two individuals who were using illegal fireworks and our Cal Fire

officer issued two \$1,000 citations.

The Saturday of the fireworks display is the busiest day of the week, and we work to mitigate this by planning ahead. We try to encourage members ahead of time to pick up their entry wrist-bands for the event. The Administration staff set up a separate window a day or two before the event as it allows other members to conduct business in the office and speeds up service.

To reduce the impact of the lack of parking spots, we contract with a local transportation company and run shuttle buses from 4 pm until 11 pm. Even so, or Department of Safety issued more than 30 parking tickets over two days. We also encourage members to park at the Lake Lodge and Fisherman's Cove and take the water taxis over to the Marina if possible.

To reduce the number of crowd related incidents, we contract with an outside security company to augment our Dept. of Safety force. The security team is made up of off-duty and retired law enforcement. The company we use also provides security for events like the Oscars in Hollywood. This year we saw an increase in the number of wristbands being sold and the increase in short-term population within the community. We increased the number of security team members to ensure we had enough coverage. All in all the holiday weekend was a fun and safe event for our members and guests.

We received a lot of input and suggestions from our members. Those members who rent boat slips have requested a differentcolored wristband at no charge so that they can access their boats on the day of the

event. The Board will be considering this and other ideas at a future Board meeting.

### 1st Annual July 4th 5K Run

Our 1st Annual 5K run was held at the Stables and it was a big success. This event is in conjunction with one of our annual Goals and that is to provide more family fun activities for our members and guests. We did better than expected with 122 runners and we partnered with the Tioga High School, ROOFBB's and the Groveland Trailheads Mountain Bike group in an effort to raise money for worthy activities. We are considering a Thanksgiving Day run for this year as well. This event was organized and managed by my Assistant Ivonne Deckard, with support and a lot of help from our Board President Ian Morcott.

### Movies at the Marina

In addition to 5K run Ivonne started a new, fun activity for our members. They are now holding outdoor movies at the Marina on Thursday evenings. The goal is to generate additional income for the Marina Cafe and to provide another activity for our members and their families. We have partnered with the Yosemite Chamber of Commerce and they have been very gracious in allowing us to use their equipment. We also partnered with Tioga High School so that the students can raise money for sports and the program provides a business mentoring activity that is positive for the community.

Looks like "Hot August Nights" are here. See you at the Grill!

Another easy one. The answer, of course, is E. These and many other amenities and services are what makes PML a great place to live or vacation.

### True or False - If I want to "withdraw" from the Association and stop paying assessments all I need to do is write a letter to the Board requesting approval.

You might be surprised at the number of property owners who believe this statement is true, when in fact it is completely false. The Association's governing documents (CC&R's) clearly state that ownership of property in PML entails membership in the Association and the liability for all assessments. The only way to withdraw from the Association is to sell the lot involved.

Now that wasn't too painful was it? No need to be scared of pop quizzes.

### **REVENUES AND ASSESSMENTS**

In recent years, multiple board members espoused "adding value" to our PML properties. But value is not added by getting "more" or "improved" that is accompanied with ever increasing dues. Value is added/increased by getting "more" or "improved" amenities/services for the same or a reduced assessment. If member's money wasn't spent so freely and generously in some areas (matching 401k for part-time (20 hr + week) and short-term/summer employees as well as somewhat extravagant costs spent on improving amenities, etc.), perhaps dues could actually be REDUCED sizably. Last year \$4.8 million of assessment revenue was allocated to the operating fund. Salary and benefit expenses amounted to \$4.7 million. Are we paying salaries and benefits comparable to the local area, or much more generous ones comparable to the bay area, etc? In fairness, PML looks to be maintained well and the amenities look good. The board is apparently doing many things well. Any board can ALWAYS find reasons to need to increase our dues. But they can also CHOOSE to keep our dues down, MAINTAIN (not necessarily improve or ADD to) our amenities, and live within our means. PML certainly brings in enough revenue to do that. We

just need the will and restraint to do so. I encourage the board to do just that. If an increase is TRULY necessary, keeping the increase under 4% is at least absorbable for most members. Better yet- how about a PML Prop 13 goal of limiting annual increases to a maximum of 2%?

### Rim Fire Revisited

It has been a year since the devastating Rim Fire invaded our surroundings. The fire that began in the Clavey River and Tuolumne River canyons Wild and Scenic River Area soon became the third largest fire in California history. Discovered August 17 with a hunter's illegal campfire, the escaped fire burned over 257,000 acres of private land, public land, national forest land and a large section of Yosemite National Park.

For days upon days we were engulfed in a dense cloud of smoke. Fire crews were everywhere; air tankers and helicopters flew constant sorties, and every agency worked together as a team to gain an upper hand on the wildfire. The Rim Fire came closer than we wished, with evacuations of many residences and threats that the fire would be rolling into Pine Mountain Lake. Destruction seemed imminent at times.

The Pine Mountain Lake Association staff responded to the situation immediately. News, communications, barricades, road closures, support and a fire break crew went into full response mode. The Safety Department was flooded with calls from residents who were outside the area and, having seen the sensationalized media reports, believed PML was about to be engulfed by the huge forest fire.

Requests were made for the PML bulldozer, water truck, tractors and fire equipment to be moved to the fire attack area near Tuolumne Trails. Social Media was ablaze with incorrect reports and false information. PML management was placed on reconnaissance to gather information on what was actually taking place at the scene, and to report the current status and any changes.

With the facts in hand and the situation coordinated, many fire teams were escorted through Units 14 and 16, moving through the greenbelt to attack the fire on its western boundary. An airattack base was set up at the PML airport and bivouac areas were established for the police, fire teams and city fire units which were pouring into the area.

The PML Maintenance Department responded by moving personnel and equipment out to the Stables site. The crews went to work clearing brush and trees on a fuel break along the Unit 12 boundary; this is the Rim Truck Fuel Break from Ferretti Road through the Graham Ranch. Their efforts were joined by linking with Cal Fire bulldozer crews working the break. This was the area of greatest fire threat to PMLA properties during the Rim Fire. Fire teams and air-attack teams were hard at work along the 300 foot wide SWIFT Rim Truck Fire Break above the Tuolumne River canyon. Bulldozing the borders of the fuel breaks, the air attack laying down fire suppressants on the burn side, and the fire crews working on the ground protected the homes from the encroaching wild fire from across the break. Fire teams were strategically placed to control any embers and wind-spread burns which could have ignited the foliage on the protected side of the break. This was the system utilized to keep the raging wildfire under control.

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What we had learned and practiced regarding fire abatement was put to the test. The Rim Truck Fire Break held the ground during the blaze. Homes that had received basic fire abatement treatment were protected and saved. I watched as the smoke and flames surrounded some homes. The fire fighters kept working, the defenses held and the fire moved on. I saw firsthand how the dry, woody debris on the ground, the thick brush, downed limbs and the dead downed trees, all became fuel for this raging wildfire. Flames from this hot forest underbrush climbed the trees and set the forest ablaze.

PML and the surrounding properties will be working together to build and sustain many more defensible fuel breaks in our community. Areas of concern are Long Gulch, Big Creek, White's Gulch and the Highway 120 corridor. Work has already begun in these areas and will conjoin in the coming years. Reducing the woody debris and ground fuels, thinning the timber, improving the access and constructing the breaks is a clear and common goal each and every year. Even though many fuel sources were reduced this last year, the danger is an ever-present threat. The Rim Fire is now a memory, yet the cycle starts anew. Be safe.

### **Tennis Courts**

Tennis Courts 1, 2, 5 and 6 had a makeover in July. Due to the temperature changes we have up here, Tennis court cracks expand and contract. As a result courts 1 and 2 had 750 lineal feet of crack repairs and 5 and 6 had 400 lineal feet of repairs. To ensure a long-lasting, durable and seamless repair, we chose the RiteWay Crack Repair System. The RiteWay system utilizes a micro-technology that allows the existing cracks in the courts to move without breaking the repair.

### **Pickleball**

We have also added a new activity to Court #6. PICKLEBALL!

Court 6 now has two Pickleball courts that can have up to 8 players.

Pickleball is a racket sport in which two to four players use solid paddles made of wood or composite materials to hit a polymer perforated ball over a net. The sport shares features of other racket sports, the dimensions and layout of a Badminton court, and a net and rules similar to tennis with a few modifications. One of the fastest growing sports in North America, Pickleball was invented in the mid-1960s as a children's backyard pastime but quickly became popular among adults as a fun game for players of all skill levels.

The Pickleball court is similar to a doubles badminton court. The actual size of the court is  $20 \times 44$  feet for both doubles and singles. The net is hung at 36 inches on the ends, and

34 inches in the middle. The court is striped like a tennis court, with no alleys; but the outer courts, and not the inner courts, are divided in half by service lines. The inner courts are non-volley zones and extend 7 feet from the net on either side.

# NOTICE TO ALL BOATING PML MEMBERS

Due to the on-going drought, the water level of our lake is twice as low as this time last year. The water level of the lake has reached a point that it may present a potential safety issue for members who launch and remove their boats at the Marina. Some dock floats are beginning to bottom out and access in some areas is becoming more difficult.

If you have your boat in the lake, the Association recommends that you consider removing your boat now. If you take your boat in and out of the lake on a daily basis, we recommend that you closely monitor the water level so that you can safely access the lake. If your boat is small enough that you do not need to use the launch ramp to access the lake, please be aware of possible underwater and shoreline hazards.

Members who do not heed this safety warning and leave their boats in the lake, run the risk of having no way to remove their boats from the lake. If this happens, these members will be responsible for any and all damage to their property, Association property and any fees or costs for continued boat mooring, or

# Community Standards

At the time of this writing we are winding down the fire safety enforcement process for 2014. The big focus this year was "fuel reduction." In light of last year's RIM fire we asked members to evaluate their Lots in terms of reducing the amount of vegetation as well as the

limbing of trees and removing dead limbs on trees and brush.

If you've been to the Compost Area you can see the fantastic participation we received from our

members. And if you drive around you will notice how much cleaner we look with the reduction in excess startup trees, the removal of tree limbs that were too close to the ground and the removal of dead limbs from trees and brush.

We had a big reduction in the number of Non-Compliance letters we had to send out this year so most of the members are on board and we want to thank you for your support in making PML more fire safe each and every year.

We can still use some improvement in a few areas of our fire safety requirements. First, the 30' defensive space. This rule requires all fallen needles and leaves be removed within 30' of any structure. Our CalFire folks tell us that homes which have this defensive space clean will almost always survive a wildfire.

Second, roofs and gutters must be free of fallen needles, leaves and tree branches. Hot sparks from a forest fire can travel miles and if they land in a gutter full of dried needles/leaves there is a good chance your house may not survive. This is a tough job which can require tall ladders and/or climbing on steep roofs, something many of us should probably not try to tackle. Members can find vendors who will do this kind of work on our Preferred Vendor list under the fire safety tab on our website.

One more area is something we noticed new this year. Weeds were cut on some of the Lot, but not on the entire Lot. The rule is: weeds are required to be cut on the entire Lot. Please know where your property pins are and get all those weeds!

Thanks again for all your support! We have come a long way over the last 5 years and you have a lot to be proud of. Here's to a safe fire season and if we happen to have a fire close by, we know we've accomplished what we need to do to be a survivor.

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# **GOT YOUR PIN?**

Since PML is a private gated community, we want to offer our property owners a secure way to call in guests. When you become a member of PML you are assigned a Personal Identification Number (PIN) to utilize either when calling in a guest pass or using the Gate Access Internet program. This PIN identifies you to staff without you having to be present. This is a confidential number and should *not be shared*. When you call the Main Gate to authorize a guest or vendor access into PML, you will be asked for your PIN. The staff will look up the number in the computer and use it to confirm your identity before entering the guest information. 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

# Shades of Green with a Little Brown

As the title reads, welcome to midsummer, 2014. You will see green and brown turf this summer. Not that you don't each summer, but this is more than just the hard spots that don't accept nightly irrigation. As you can see, there are many areas receiving much less irrigation than is needed to keep them green. The driving range being one of them, looks like it hasn't been irrigated in months, but is still being irrigated 3 times per week. Very few areas have been completely shut off, just very limited irrigation hoping we can keep the roots alive until the rains return. Through early July the golf course has used just a little over 3 inches of lake water for irrigation. Our goal is to keep this total around 12 inches for the entire year. Our crystal ball hasn't informed us as to what amounts of precipitation we will have during the next winter, so we are conserving as much as we can this summer while trying to keep the course fun and playable.

Fall aeration is scheduled for the last Monday and Tuesday in September, the 29th & 30th.

The Wednesday following aeration is October 1st, and our annual visit with the U.S.G.A. is scheduled for 8:00 a.m. This tour of the course is rewarding and educational. Brian Whitlark is the agronomist that will be here. He travels around the western United States and sees over a hundred different courses each year. He is here to assist our maintenance program. He will also answer any questions that you might want to ask, or discuss any ideas for improvements to the course. I encourage you to come on out and meet Brian. The tour will begin near the first tee and will last 3 to 4 hours. You certainly don't have to stay for the entire session, or if you need to come on out a little later, that would be fine.

Remember that the golf maintenance office is always open to you if you have concerns or questions or would like to say hello. Our phone number is 962-8610 if you would like to call. New ideas and suggestions are always welcome.

# On the Lake, River, Reservoir??

Apologies for missing the cut last month: it was a busy time finishing up my full time job with Hetch Hetchy and preparing for a rafting trip down the Grand Canyon. The rafting trip was a first class adventure through millions of years of geology, the history of water development, and the effects on water quality in the Colorado River.

The first thing I noticed about the Colorado water was the high concentration of dissolved salts in the water. After splashing through the many rapids, the water spots that dried on my sunglasses left them almost unusable. The term "salts" refers to the dissolved solids in the water and often includes sodium, chloride, sulfate, calcium, and bicarbonate. When the water dries, it leaves those white rings that are the solid version of the previously dissolved salts. It's fairly well accepted and understood that drinking water with high concentrations of these salts can contribute to kidney and gall stones. The users of Colorado River water and resource agencies worried about the affect on ecosystems are spending a lot of money to reduce the amount of these salts. The problem is somewhat natural, but has been exacerbated by agricultural practices and dams that block the huge flushing flows that used to sweep much of the salt out to sea. Without getting too technical about how much "salt" is in the water, I'll just say that it can get close to 1 gram in each liter of water!

But, "Alas poor Yorick!" It is interesting that the clowns/gravediggers that open that scene in Hamlet have a discussion about water's role in the death of Ophelia. Whatever the concerns might be about drinking water with high salt concentrations, we don't have that problem here. Whether we are drinking the fine Hetch Hetchy water, or water pumped from our Lake during Hetchy shutdowns, we have some very darn good water. When was the last time you saw water spots on your car or windows after using our water? I am not encouraging you to go test this during the current drought, but you get the idea. As a matter of fact, the water from Hetch Hetchy has so little dissolved stuff in it; they have to add calcium to the

water before it enters the transmission and distribution system. Otherwise, it would leach it from the pipes and prematurely corrode them.

So, as enjoyable as the rafting adventure was, it is good to be back to our own clean waters. We arrived back just in time to see the boats assembling for the parade and to enjoy the amazing fireworks display. I really loved the resounding echoes through the canyons. And a week later we were down at the Marina for music and margaritas hosted by Friends of the Lake. What a special evening that was with music provided by the Sierra Mountain Band. It was hot everywhere else, but the breeze off the lake kept it quite cool. And the margaritas added WAY COOL to the event. If you haven't checked out Friends of the Lake, I encourage you to look them up on the PMLA homepage and join their fun and informative programs.

I'm going to run out of room here, but I did have a couple of questions from homeowners about our Lake. One was a concern about a plant growing in the water near someone's dock. I haven't checked it out yet, but it isn't surprising that some of these plants look more prolific given the lower water level. I'll be cruising the entire shoreline in the coming weeks identifying the plants and making sure we don't have any nasty invaders that can cause real problems. Yes, I understand that if it gets wrapped around your prop or tickles you while you swim, it's a weed. But I'd like to remind you that the plants we have in our Lake are doing much more good than harm. Another question was whether a homeowner could do a little digging under their now exposed dock to make it more usable at the current lake level. That's a touchy, touchy question. What I would recommend is to take advantage of this opportunity to work on dry shoreline and make your dock more usable during low water. Check with Sandy in the office to get specifics on the environmental compliance guidelines.

One last thing, be assured that I did decontaminate after being in the mussel infested waters of Lake Mead.





My name is Benjamin Denson. I, like most property owners (both resident and part-time), invested here to enjoy the wonderful lifestyle and amenities available at PML. However, higher and ever-increasing, assessments are putting some retired, association members in a bind; and they can no longer afford the enjoyable activities at PML, which they looked forward to in their senior years. Association members should not be forced into this predicament because of irresponsible financial management. Even those property owners, who can afford the luxury of ever-increasing assessments are alarmed at the seemingly unending cost increases.

It's time for "serious" change. We must do everything reasonably possible to reverse the long-standing practice of simply accepting and budgeting for losses in our revenue-producing amenities. Privately-operated businesses would soon go broke using present PML management practices. There must be a new approach by the PML Board of Directors. I served on a fifteen-member, elected, Board of Directors for the Oakland Police Officers' Association for many years. As you can imagine there were many divergent points of view; but I always gave full consideration to all ideas, helped work out compromises to solve problems and always sought the right course of action.

- Immediately adopt and enforce the recommendations by this firm of qualified experts.

### PML WINDJAMMERS SAILING CLUB KICKS OFF THE JULY 4TH WEEKEND WITH A BANG

No, we didn't have any fireworks. In our case the "bang" came from balloons bursting in air. Capt'n Bob (Haliwell), Commodore of the Windjammers announced to all sailors that we would have a "fun" event to kick off the day on July 4th. Participants got into vessels after about 40 inflated balloons were set afloat in the middle of the lake. About a dozen Windjammers were to simply sail on over and pick up as many as 3 balloons. Each balloon contained a number written on a piece of paper. Whoever had the highest individual number and the highest total number won. As the first boat to arrive at the flotilla of balloons, I just sailed right through them. After having several slip through my hands and even one burst as I picked it up, I had pulled 3 balloons into my boat Over-Easy. I started heading back to Dunn Court beach and looked back to see that the other boats hadn't even reached the balloons yet. I thought it was a pretty easy event until I noticed the balloons were blowing back out of the boat. Everyone discovered that picking up a floating balloon from a moving sailboat and then preventing the wind from blowing it away from you was a lot more difficult than expected! Awards were presented to the winners while everyone laughed over the challenges of simply picking up a few balloons off the water.

The fun event was followed by the competitive race of the day. Capt'n Bob handed out the race course description to all the skippers. In addition to a fast boat, to win a sailboat race requires course knowledge (each race course is made up of a predetermined route around some combination of the floating buoys, referred as "marks", that you see around the lake), skill in reading the wind and navigating, skill in handling the boat, and a bit of luck with favorable winds. I managed to sail very fast on the 1st leg of the race only to realize that I was racing to the wrong



buoy. Great example of poor course knowledge. Then as I was finally catching the rest of the fleet I managed to capsize Over-Easy. So much for boat handling skill ...but what should you expect on a boat named Over-Easy? Fortunately I was able to get the boat back up, crawl back in and get back to racing. After capsizing and being in a distant last place just two marks from the finish line I managed to catch the rest of the boats at the last turn as the wind came up from behind me and the rest of the fleet sailed into a wind lull. Sometimes it's better to be lucky than good. Despite my misadventures along the way I ultimately crossed the start/finish line (created by the imaginary line between the two red buoys in front of Dunn Court Beach) before many of the faster Hobie Cats and came in first among the two mono hauls. Hopefully this gives you a taste of the excitement that's happening on the sailboats you see gliding peacefully across the lake. The Windjammers really enjoy this special gift we share in the mountains called Pine Mountain Lake. If you don't own a sailboat, they are available for rental at the PML Marina. 

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### PML Action Heroes: John & Jackie Baker LIVES INTERWOVEN ON AUGUST 17TH

August 17th is "burned" into all our memories because on that day last year the Rim Fire started. It's a date that also marks two other very important anniversaries for John and Jackie Baker.

North Carolina baseball pitcher meets California beauty queen. John Baker was stationed at Parks Air Force Base in Pleasanton, teaching unarmed self-defense for USAF police forces. His talent as a pitcher also had him playing for the Air Force baseball league where he won all of the service championships and achieved an impressive 18 win – 2 loss record in 3-years of service. Jackie McManamy worked at the Mervyn's store in San Lorenzo when she was chosen to represent the city of Hayward in a beauty pageant.

On Independence Day, John along with buddies from Park AFB went to the Alameda County Fair to watch the horse races. Between races a segment of the Miss California Beauty Contest was held. The girls in the pageant represented northern California communities. Miss Hayward caught John's attention, she was gorgeous! Later that day John and his buddies stopped to get something to eat. The beautiful Miss Hayward walked in along with two girlfriends. The restaurant was jammed so John told the waitress to ask the girls if they wanted to join them. Jackie was smart, funny and independent. It clicked! John and Jackie were inseparable for the next forty-four days and on August 17, 1954 launched a 60-year partnership and love affair.

John wanted to play major league baseball but life had other plans for him. Baseball was a passion for this North Carolina boy playing sand-lot ball. By 16, John had developed a sizzling fast ball which helped his team to the 1948 American Legion Junior World Series semi-finals. At the World Series meeting baseball icon Babe Ruth was inspiring and John treasures the baseball that Babe Ruth signed. On John's 18th birthday, he pitched a perfect game. He graduated from high school with a contract to pitch for the Saint Louis Cardinals. Unfortunately, the US Military had other plans and rather than being drafted, John joined the Air Force, never making it to Saint Louis.

After military service John and Jackie headed to North Carolina, John's childhood home. With one child in arms and one on the way, Jackie ran the home while John split time working in a hardware store and attending N.C. State-Raleigh. After an ownership change at Lowe's, John and Jackie decided to move back to California, Jackie's childhood home. John was innovative and applied his hardware store skills in California creating a new hardware store concept. He opened Big B Lumberteria targeting D.I.Y. cash-and-carry buyers, not contractors. Colleagues said "you'll go broke" but he proved them wrong as he pioneered the home improvement industry and business exploded. John ran the stores while Jackie managed the books and their household which grew to include a third child. They later sold Big B Lumberteria and John applied his professional selling skills to wholesale

hardware. They also owned and managed some mobile home parks.

John and Jackie discovered PML in the early 1970's, moving here full time in 2000. This is their fifth PML home. Some call PML "God's waiting room" but you won't find them idly waiting.

John loves the PML golf course because it always plays differently nearly every day. For the past 14 years John has been taking a large group of players to a select U.S. golf course for the "JB Invitational."

That started a lifesaving chain of events that resulted in a five-way bypass and two valve replacements. She feels wonderful and is ready to celebrate this August 17th the fire that saved her life so she could celebrate her 60th anniversary.

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#### From Your Supervisor

JOHN GRAY, 4TH DISTRICT TUOLUMNE COUNTY SUPERVISOR

In January of this year, The Board of Supervisors Declared a State of Emergency due to our severe drought. At this time conditions remain unchanged and the drought persists. Despite the obstacles, our local water companies continue to do an excellent job in managing the public water system. On July 14th the State of California Drought Task Force conducted a meeting here in Tuolumne County. The Task Force is charged by the Governor to work with all jurisdictions to identify ways to help with minimizing the effects of the drought.

At that meeting, a member of the State Water Board repeatedly asked those in the room if they had taken an opportunity to review the recently approved California Water Action Plan. This plan has been designated by the Governor as the directive to work toward solving California water problems. Details can be found on the State of California website. I would encourage all to take the time to read this plan. The good news is that it is only 25 pages long and only takes a few minutes to read. Whether you agree with all aspects of the plan is not as important as the overall plan itself. It is a defined direction and if followed could help resolve many of the State's water issues. As Governor Brown has stated "it is a tall order but it is what we must do to get through this drought and prepare for the next."

As I stated earlier, water districts and their customers have been doing a great job on the conservation front. We must remember that our other water sources, wells, are also in danger.

Wells in Tuolumne County tap into water in the hard rock fractures. Unlike the Valley, we do not have a water table in the foothills. A good analogy of the fracture system is a bathtub full of water and tightly stacked bricks. Placing a well in a brick filled bathtub will produce water, if and only if the well penetrates a joint between the bricks, the equivalent of fracture in bedrock. This fractured rock system not only limits recharge, or refilling of the well, it also affects the amount of time it will take to complete the recharge. As such, a well that produces a significant amount of water this year may produce very little the very next year due to the slow recharge caused by the drought.

If you are on a well it would be in your best interest to do what you can to conserve today with an eye toward the future. If you do experience a well failure there may be assistance available. For additional information on wells please contact Tuolumne County Environmental Health Director, Rob Kostlivy, at 209 533 5633

Recently I received a call about a situation on Highway120 east of Groveland where a

fatal accident had occurred. The process for addressing state highway begins when I get a complaint regarding issues and highway conditions. The subject is forwarded to Caltrans District 10 Traffic Safety Branch detailing the problems.

The Traffic Safety Branch, when necessary, gathers a team of engineers to conduct a detailed safety investigation to review the matter. The team studies the collision history by reviewing reports, and by gathering collision data. In this particular case they reviewed signage, striping, pavement marking, sight distance, pavement conditions and roadway geometrics to identify potential safety improvements.

In this particular instance, the team identified improvements that will help make this section of road safer. Caltrans has been extremely responsible in addressing safety concerns. If you observe something that you feel may be an unsafe condition please let me know and I will do my best to have it addressed.

On Saturday, July 12th, it was my honor and pleasure to attend an event recognizing 11 new volunteer firefighters that graduated from the fire academy. This accomplishment allows them to work as volunteer firefighters for Tuolumne County. They are to be commended for their hard work and dedication to the protection of the citizens of our county.

As Chief Josh White stated, "Volunteer firefighters are the backbone of fire protection". If anyone is interested in pursuing firefighting as a career or for public service, please go to

Tuolumne County fire webpage and fill out an application. We need many more volunteers to provide better service to our communities. You can be retired and just looking for a way to help your community or you can be looking for a career-filling out an application is the beginning.

Many inquiries have been received concerning high speed internet, cell phone coverage and broadband availability. I want you to know that all providers have been working diligently toward improving coverage. As many of you have heard, our local cell phone company, Golden State Cellular, has been purchased by Verizon. Verizon is already in the process of updating equipment at cell locations to provide a higher level of coverage. It will take some time but the good news is that the work is in progress.

I have also been informed that AT&T has plans for additional cell towers and coverage along the 120 corridor and in the Don Pedro area. This subject has been addressed before and once again I want to assure you that progress is being made. We may never be able to get to the level of a large city such as San Francisco but improvements will be coming forward.

#### **GCSD News**

JON STERLING, GENERAL MANAGER, GCSD

Thanks to all of our customers for supporting our water conservation efforts. We had our typical large surge in consumption over the 4th of July weekend (greater than last year which probably speaks to the resurgence of the economy than efforts to conserve) with our next largest being the Labor Day weekend.

Your conservation efforts have resulted in an 11% reduction from last year through May. We have requested a voluntary 20% reduction. This reduction reflects the Governor's drought emergency mandate as well as the requirement for a statewide 20% reduction by 2020. By the time you read this, GCSD may have implemented Stage 3 drought restrictions that mandate a 20% reduction in concert with rate changes and use restrictions to encourage conservation.

We have been successful in securing grants for the bulk of the \$1.7 million cost of a water filtration plant that will be required by year's end when the City and County of San Francisco begins

blending Hetch Hetchy water with Cherry Lake water. The pristine character of the Hetch Hetchy water has allowed us to avoid filtration and only provide for disinfection. The Cherry Lake water is not as pristine and requires filtration.

Look for our GCSD information booth at events around the area. We will be providing information on how you can reduce consumption, tips for grey water usage, and information on our low-flow shower head and low-flow toilet rebate program. You can also check our website, www.gcsd.org, for additional information. Please fix those leaky faucets and toilets as they can waste thousands of gallons of water per year. This is a good time to plan for winter weather by making sure your shut off valves are working and your water lines are protected against freezing. We lost about \$3 million of gallons of water last winter as a result of frozen pipes at residences.

Thank you again for your support of our conservation efforts.

#### A 125 Year Saga

Nothing could be more remarkable than the astonishing appearance in 2001 of Mark Twain's short story, 125 years after it was first written by him in 1876. The saga of the manuscript's emergence is as interesting as one of his works.

Originally, Twain conceived his story to be a collaboration of short plots by twelve other authors of the time, including himself. The idea failed and the manuscript remained unauthorized.

In 1945, Lew D. Feldman purchased Mark Twain's original manuscript and held that ownership gave him the right to publish. To test this theory, he brought out a limited edition of only 16 copies of the printed story.

The case went all the way to the U.S. Court of Appeals before it was determined that "Ownership of a manuscript does not include the right of publication".

It wasn't until 2001 that rights to publication were settled and Mark Twain's story was finally published in the Atlantic Monthly.

#### **Solving the Mystery**

Filled with heroes, heroines and villains, A Murder, a Mystery, and a Marriage, is Mark Twain's delightful rendition of the lives of fascinating characters, and disturbing death, in the mythical hamlet of Deer Lick, Missouri.

Twain's story chronicles the fortunes of a humble farmer, John Gray, determined

to marry off his daughter to the heir of the town's wealthiest family.

The zany small town of Deer Lick is thrown into a frenzy when a mysterious visitor arrives. A young romance is put to the test and a town patriarch is murdered. Small town antics, homespun humor and Bluegrass melodies build to an adventure of clues.



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#### Rainbow Pool is Now Open

Rainbow Pool is a Northern California iconic swimming hole located just past Buck Meadows on Highway 120. Last year's Rim Fire damage the area sounding the pool and it was closed to the public. However, this past spring a volunteer work party joined with the Groveland District of the U.S. Forest Service to make the site safe again for public access.


Rainbow Pool is a picturesque site with a small waterfall cascading over a rim into a granite bowl edged by short cliffs. In past years, jumping into Rainbow Pool was fun for all; it is one of the most unique swimming holes anywhere. The pool is located on a spur road just off Highway 120, east of Buck Meadows on the way to the Big Oak Flat Yosemite National Park entrance. On a hot summer day, Rain Pool makes a great short side trip.

Before 1870 traveling along the Big Oak Flat road to Yosemite was a challenge. The South Fork of the Tuolumne River could only be crossed during times of low water levels. This all changed in 1870 when a covered bridge was built across the river and later become a toll road. John Cox became the first toll collector and he built a cabin on the rocks overlooking the pool.

In later years, a lodge and restaurant called The Cliff House occupied this site. Today, Rainbow Pool is once again open to the public and back in its original natural state.



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#### **Attention Women 60+ Years**

The Little House (a Project of Southside Senior Services, Inc.) on Merrill Road, is the golden nugget of Groveland. Many helpful services are provided to seniors 60+years of age who may need them. Just to name a few: the WHEELS program provides transportation for those who need a ride to and from medical appointments, post office and local stores; Community Lunch Program which provides healthy lunches twice a week and Meals on Wheels which delivers meals on an individual and as needed basis; Grief Healing for those who have lost a loved one; healthy exercise, stress relief and pain reduction with Yoga, Balance and Core; and other social activities like Needlecraft, Mahjong and Wii Bowling. These and other programs are conducted with the most valuable asset - volunteers. Some require a small fee and others are free of charge.

There is another program that I would like to mention, Life Changes and Challenges for women who are 60 plus years. This is a FREE group that has been meeting weekly at the Little House for almost two years. I have been fortunate to facilitate a group of women who have the courage and willingness to discuss their lives, past, present and future. One of the participants took it upon herself to take a survey as to what the benefits have been to each of the participants. I would like to share some of the results with you. Of course no names will be given due to a contract of confidentiality; "What is

shared here, stays here."

"I was suffering from a lot of physical pain which caused me to feel depressed. Since I have been in the group I have received a great deal of support which improved my attitude and gave me hope."

"I initially joined the group to have the fellowship of women who were going through the some of the same challenges in life that I was and I could discuss things in a safe environment."

"I'm just learning how to better deal with problems that I have."

" My relationships, money issues, work were unsatisfactory. I needed to talk to women who had similar concerns and I didn't want to confide in friends or family."

"We listened, we laughed, we cried, all without judgment. We discussed our lives, where we were heading, where we wanted to go and how to get there."

"I see women in the group moving forward. I too, am making progress with the help and encouragement of the other women."

Our group has decided to take a hiatus during the summer as many go on vacations or have family and friends come to visit. We will start up again in September and I would like to extend an invitation to any woman 60+ who would like to join our group. We meet one time per week on Wednesdays at The Little House. Walking will take you about twice as long to burn the same number of calories as running. But it is gentler on your joints and beneficial in the prevention of osteoporosis.

Walking on level is a very mild form of exercise, throw in some hills and you increase your calorie burning and toning of the calves and buttocks. Walking in Pine Mountain Lake provides lots of opportunity for hill walking!

Metabolic demands differ a bit with walking and running. Walking may burn more fat. This is because when walking the body's metabolism has time to switch from burning carbohydrates to burning fat. To run a mile will burn sugar, or carbs, due to the need for fast energy. This is where "wogging" comes in. A little jogging and a little walking. Adding some intervals of faster pace and slower pace will also help ramp up fat burning, and cardio fitness.

All research agrees that the most important thing is to enjoy what you are doing and to do in consistently. So whether you're a fan of walking running, jogging or wogging, just be sure you get out there and do it. As I've said before, a body in motion stays in motion.

#### The First Road into Yosemite Valley

On Saturday, August 16, at 7 p.m., noted author, hiker and historian, Sharon Giacomazzi will present a very interesting talk on the first road into Yosemite Valley. This program is sponsored by the Southern Tuolumne County Historical Society and will be held at the Groveland Community Hall. Donations are accepted at the door.

For 23 years after the coming of the first sightseers, Yosemite Valley was only accessible by horse trail. These early tourists who frantically clung to their steeds during this period included many Easterners and Europeans not accustomed to rough mountain trails. They left home to see this valley of wonders filled with enthusiasm but arrived exhausted and disappointed in the crudity of the grueling mode of travel and primitive accommodations along the way and in

Merchants along the travel routes and within Yosemite Valley realized the importance of improving accommodations and transportation so that greater visitation would result. The top priority was to get people out of the saddle and into the relative luxury of a stage coach. Obviously, this could only be accomplished by constructing wagon roads. Honors go to Dr. John McLean, president of Coulterville and Yosemite Turnpike Company, who was the first to make the Valley accessible to wheeled vehicles in June 1874. Dr. McLean persuaded the Yosemite Commissioners to allow him to build and maintain a toll road to the floor of the Valley. Furthermore, it was agreed that no other company was to build a road for a period of 10 years.

McLean's road monopoly lasted only one month when the state legislature granted the Big Oak Flat Company permission to complete a wagon road to the Valley floor, and in 1875 the Wawona Road entered the Valley. These two roads functioned to the everlasting detriment of the Coulterville route. Though first, the Coulterville route through the Merced Grove of Big Trees was by no means the most successful. By 1879, BOF and Wawona Roads were transporting more passengers than McLean's road.

In the final analysis, Dr. McLean died a bitter, broken man and \$60,000 in debt.

For 30 years until his death in 1902, he whole heartedly pursued his dream of building the Coulterville Road which depleted his entire personal fortune and entangled him in a prolonged nightmare of political litigation and red tape trying to recoup his losses.

Several years ago I found a Family Bible in an antique shop in Ohio. Tucked among the pages I found newspaper obituaries, funeral cards and wedding announcements and, of course, the names and dates of children's births and family deaths, an almost complete family history. I remembered Ann Johnson telling about finding Family Bibles at flea markets and thrift stores and returning them to the families, so I found the owners and returned it to the grateful family. I can only guess how a treasure like that ended up where it did.

The point of the above story is that information you may already have will save you hours of research on the computer. Before you begin your research, take time to go through what you already have on hand. Obituaries, funeral cards, wedding and birth announcements are a treasure trove of information with the added benefit of learning more about the family.

You may find newspapers articles, letters and stories that make the people come alive and your research more interesting. I have in the past written about talking to your family about your research. If you want to get their attention tell stories about the people, if you want to put them to sleep give them just the facts.

I cannot say it too many times, when you start your research write down everything you know about the family before you go to the computer. You can find free Family Group Sheets on line to help you organize your information and help you find a place to start and it will save you time in the long run.

#### The Groveland - China Connection!

The seeds were planted in 2006 during one of our annual VIP tours of China when local tour leader and retired UAL captain Larry Jobe and Major General JT Whitehead embarked on a plan to save access to the Command Cave used by Gen. Claire Chennault and his Flying Tigers during WW II. Those seeds have now grown into a 16,000 sq. ft. Museum built by the cave which will now be the centerpiece of the Flying Tiger Heritage Park outside exotic Guilin, China.

Larry and Gen. Whitehead formed the Flying Tiger Historical Organization to raise awareness of this remarkable shared history with the Chinese people and to solicit artifacts for the museum as well as seek tax-deductible donations for the retro-fitting of the command cave to its WW II appearance. A visit to their website, www.FlyingTigerHistoricalOrganization. com, will lead you to the history of the famous Flying Tigers packed into their quarterly newsletters as well as original photos and park and museum information plus a video clip of the 2013 flag-raising ceremony held at the site of the museum nearing completion. Their mission is not only to preserve our shared history but also to promote continued friendship between our two peoples built initially by the special bond formed between the Flying Tigers and the Chinese people. The Chinese people have never forgotten what the Flying Tigers did for them in WW II.

The Flying Tiger Historical Organization has held special events including one at the Chinese Embassy in Wash., DC last fall and is hosting another one this fall at the Chinese Consulate in San Francisco. They were special invited guests this May in Beijing at a 4-day conference which included a very special private meeting with Vice Premier Liu Yandong.

To commemorate the new museum, a very special ceremony will occur during our 11th Annual American Aviators VIP Tour of China in March 2015 and our tour group will be treated as a special delegation. A 100-piece band will be flying to China to play at the Grand Opening Ceremonies. There will be some very special people with us for what could be our last tour to China unless we are successful getting some medical issues corrected. 

#### **Museum Happenings**

You can also find a link to the California Association of Museums website and find out how you can get the new "Snoopy" license plate, the proceeds from which help to support museums like ours.



In 1856, Tannahill bought the Winslow Hubbard Ranch (site of today's GCSD) and was part owner of the water rights of the Root and Tannahill Ditch, a significant water source for Groveland.

James was also a founding member and treasurer of the Mt. Jefferson Masonic Lodge formed on May 14, 1857. They met monthly on the second floor in what is now Firefall Coffee.

In 1852 in Garrote, John Watts and Peter King had constructed the stone building we know as The Iron Door Saloon. It housed the general mercantile called 'Watts and Company'. James Tannahill, John Watt's partner, became sole proprietor in 1868 renaming the enterprise 'The Granite Store'. The store, so named because of the solid granite blocks forming the front and back walls, also served as Garrote's post office from 1863 to 1880 while Tannahill was Postmaster. He was also a Justice in Tuolumne County's Fourth Judicial District from 1853 to 1855.

On Christmas day in 1859, James Tannahill married Mary Dexter, formerly



of Providence, Rhode Island. Over the years they had two children, James Alexander and Cordelia Agnes in the home.

Tannahill had large mining interests and actively mined until the early 1880's. He owned a great deal of property in Groveland and the surrounding area. Well known for his benevolent nature, James Tannahill died in 1884, at the age of 60 and is buried in the Divide (Oak Grove) Cemetery.

In 1895 Giacomo (Jake) De Ferrari purchased both the home and store. He turned 'The Granite Store' into a full-fledged saloon known as 'Jake's Place'. After Jake's death in 1926, the saloon passed to his nephews, Frank and Richard De Ferrari. The saloon was renamed 'The Iron Door' in 1937 when bought by George Laveroni.

Carlo De Ferrari, Tuolumne County Historian, lived in the Tannahill home for several years while growing up. In 1927 it became the home of John and Mary (Giacosa) Franco, parents of Groveland's Postmistress Clara Fulton. John and Mary lived in the historic home for 60 years.

- ☐ Did you get at least three local references from the contractors you are considering?
- ☐ Did you call them and see the work the contractor completed?

Even if you pay your contractor, a lien can be placed on your home by unpaid laborers, subcontractors, or material suppliers. A lien can result in you paying twice or, in some cases, losing your home in a | foreclosure. Also check the "Notice to Owner" for ways to protect yourself.
- Did you know changes or additions to your contract must all be in writing?
- Putting changes in writing reduces the possibility of a later dispute.




