2014 Board Election and Campaians

The Board of Directors has received nomination paperwork from two candidates for the one open director position that will become available in August. Mr. Wayne Augsburger and Mr. Benjamin Denson were determined to be members in good standing in accordance with our governing documents and their nominating papers were verified. Congratulations to both. We are pleased to see that members are interested in making a commitment to volunteer their time in the governance of our community for the benefit of the rest of the membership.

Last year we received a few complaints from members who felt that there were too many campaign signs and these detracted from our environment. Others were under the misconception that campaigns signs were not allowed in our community. Campaign signs are allowed in accordance with our governing documents and State law. Campaign signs are not allowed in the Common areas, but owners of private property may make their own choice to place signs on their lots or not.

Workers Comp Program Returns

I am pleased to report that our decision to move to a new workers comp program should now allow us to see a return of at least \$150K for the 2013 fiscal year. As you recall, we moved to a worker's comp captive program where we partner with other companies that have an as good or better safety track record than we do. 2013 was another good year with very few employee injuries and we should see the return of these funds at the end of the agreed threeyear period. We will know the exact amount of return for 2013 at the end of this year, as there is a one-year waiting period to determine final claims.

Roads Refurbishment Project

The roads refurbishment project was completed within budget. Our contractor ran into a few issues with their scheduling due to weather and one day when the asphalt plant was shut down. They picked right back up and tried their best to notify the affected residents. We would like to thank those residents who have complimented the work and for their patience during the project. We appreciate it.

Swimming Pool Open

The Pool opened on Saturday, May 10th and we are already seeing a lot of use due

to the hot weather. Members have been very complimentary of the refurbishments and furnishings. One of our older pumps experienced a leak initially as Maintenance brought the operation online and this was immediately addressed. We had the new parts in stock and ready for this type of issue.

Marina Projects Completed

The Marina Store/Cafe, irrigation system, and Jetty projects have been completed. The facility looks great and should last another 45 years. Due to the lower water level, Maintenance will be extending the swimming area out a little further. In addition, our staff is monitoring the boat launch area so that we can notify our off-the-hill owners if there is a risk that the water level gets too low to remove boats. Our team is evaluating other alternatives of lake ingress and egress.

I encourage all of our members to get out and use our amenities. Please drive safely and be kind to your neighbors. If you are renting out your home, please be sure to provide your renters with a copy of the guest and renters handbook. The handbook has a lot of useful information and can be found on the PML Website.



My name is Benjamin Denson. I am 66 years old. I am retired. I attained a Bachelor of Arts degree in Political Science from California State University Hayward in 1978. I have been a resident, member of PMLA since 2006. I moved to Pine Mountain Lake following retirement from the Oakland Police Department, after 27 years of service as a Police Officer. I served on the Board of Directors of the Oakland Police Officers Association from 1992 until I retired from the Oakland Police Department in 2005. Since retirement, I have continued to work, intermittently, as an annuitant for the Oakland Police Department, doing background investigations.

Our annual assessments have

increased almost every year during the time I have lived here. In the last eight years the increase was from \$1,309 to \$1,956. Our Board of Directors must stop the practice of accepting and budgeting for huge losses on our revenueproducing amenities.

The annual budget determines the amount of the annual assessment. The only way to reduce assessments is to gradually reduce the amount budgeted to a more realistic figure and require managers to operate within those numbers. The ultimate goal is to eliminate those losses.

If I am elected, I pledge my full-time dedication to finding solutions to these problems.

PMLA Money Matters

How many of you have a budget for your personal income and expenses? Or do you just look at the checkbook and see how much money is left and spend accordingly? As individuals we might have varying degrees of a household budget. Often times this means we get to the end of the month or week and not really know where all the money went. It tends to be the small items that eat up a good portion of our "disposable income" each month.

Unlike an individual an organization as large as PML does not have the luxury of operating without a very detailed budget, including all income and expenses. In the case of the Association a budget is critical in that it determines how much of an assessment is required from property owners in order to match expected revenue with anticipated expenses. Sounds fairly simple however it is anything but.

In most household budgets the monthly income and expenses are fairly predictable. With an operation as diverse and complex as PML the task of estimating these things becomes progressively more difficult. The challenge of preparing a budget like this becomes even more sensitive since the end

result of our budgeting efforts is the monthly assessment each of you is asked to pay.

Budget too much and we have excess funds at the end of the year that you the property owner could have had in your pocket. Budget too little and some critical services or repairs can't be done. Neither situation is desirable however, I think any rational person would agree that the expectation of preparing a perfect budget, whereby we are able to estimate exactly what our income and expense requirements will be is virtually impossible.

The management team at PML puts a great deal of time and effort into crafting a budget that is achievable without being "fat". No one wants to create a large surplus at year's end, however, just as importantly we do not want to create a budget that is unachievable. This would create a situation whereby your expectations as to the quality of life and the maintenance of the entire Association are not met. In the worst case scenario this would require a special assessment, something no one wants.

When you look at our monthly financial reports (which I'm sure you all do religiously) you can see how we are

performing compared to budget. As you will see we are having another excellent year whereby we have (so far) been able to remain below budget. It is always our goal to achieve the highest level of results at the most reasonable cost. Sometimes things cost more than anticipated or situations arise that we did not expect. These all contribute to the end financial result.

No variation from budget is truly acceptable and we strive to achieve all of our goals both from an operational standpoint as well as a financial one. However reality dictates that there will be some difference between budgeted results and actual results. Our goal is always to minimize these variations and, if possible, err on the side of not requiring additional contributions (assessments) from PMLA property owners.

Scotch Broom - Invasive Plant

With a drought year upon us, our concerns can turn to eradicating invasive plants which can rob the soil of valuable water and nutrients for other plant life. These invasive plants and weeds are not indigenous to our environment. Yes, they may look nice in certain times of the year, but are still uninvited harbingers of larger problems yet to be realized.

Most of the Scotch Broom plants line our roads, highways, embankments and drainage ditches. The plants are transported here, comingle with the existing vegetation, and soon take over the area, displacing the welcomed plants, and become the excepted norm. Simply allowing the invasive plant to flourish is a mistake; actions must be implemented to correct the growth and establishment of all invasive plants.

The shrub Scotch Broom (Cytisus scoparius) was introduced into California in the 1850s from its native home in Europe and Africa. The shrub was once a valued landscape ornamental and also used for soil erosion control. The woody shrub grows to a height of 10 feet and quickly out-competes native plant life. Once established, Scotch broom acidifies the surrounding soil,

which makes it difficult for native plants to reestablish themselves in disturbed locations where the shrub takes over. Eradicate Scotch broom before it becomes well-established.

Hand-pull Scotch broom seedlings in the spring. Grasp the plant firmly near the soil's surface and pull upward. Remove as much of the root system as possible. A mechanical puller is best for larger plants. Digging around the plant's base and pulling it directly upward may remove a greater amount of root system for larger seedlings. Scotch Broom seeds can remain in the soil and will survive up to 80 years, and may germinate in the loose soil or be broadcasted to other areas by wind, equipment and transportation. Mow down all Scotch broom plants that have a diameter of over 2 inches in the spring. Rake up and discard the cut top growth. The plants can be burned in approved conditions.

Apply a herbicide to the stump of the Scotch broom after mowing. Use a herbicide that contains triclopyrester, 2, 4-D, glyphosate or triclopyr. Follow the directions on the label for application instructions. Reapply the herbicide





to the plant's stump in the fall to control the re-growth of the plant. When treatment is by cutting, the plant may grow back larger and hardier than before. This is why it is so important to eradicate the plant and its rootstalk.

The Pine Mountain Lake Maintenance Department will be removing the plants from





our road shoulders and ditches. The primary removal method is to use a plant puller while the ground is moist, pile and burn the plants on site. Transporting the plants will help to distribute the seeds, which must be avoided. Seasonal herbicide spraying and removal of the dead plant is the secondary option.

On the LAKE!

I was really looking forward to talking about fishing this month. I've heard several good reports about the fishing, I've seen a lot of nesting bass, and we just had a truckload of trout released into the lake. But as I sit here on the shore, straining to see clear across to the other side, occasionally being distracted by a passing ship, there are BIGGER things to talk about.

No, I'm not going whacky about the ships. I'm actually sitting on the shore of Lake Erie in Ohio where, as a child, I attempted to grow up. As I gaze in the direction of Canada, I wonder if there are any similarities between Erie and our very own Pine Mountain Lake. There are similarities, but size is not one of them.

Lake Erie could hold 52,000 PMLs within it. And the surface area of Erie is 32,000 times larger than PML. Surprisingly however, Erie is only about twice as deep as our Lake. This causes some interesting phenomena with waves. On a moderately breezy day, the elevation of the lake can be 10 feet higher on the end where

the waves pile up. Despite the drastic difference in size, a lot of the processes and problems that lake managers have to deal with are the same. The scale is just a wee bit larger.

Take shoreline management for example. People living along the shoreline aren't too concerned about a few plants obstructing there views. They are more worried about having a place to stand to have any view at all. The lake has gobbled up hundreds of feet of shoreline since I was a kid... houses have been gobbled too. The seawalls, boulders and concrete riprap used to protect against further erosion, are enormous. And while I encourage residents (on an individual basis) to keep goose poo, fertilizer, ash, and, unwanted critters out of our Lake, it takes a massive effort on Erie. And that effort has paid off. In the sixties and seventies, the lake was virtually dead from unregulated industrial pollution and agricultural runoff. Today it's known as the "come back lake." But, just like our own Lake, you can never let your guard down. On Lake Erie, millions of dollars are being spent to combat the effects of invasive species and to prevent the introduction of even more unwanted beasties. On our Lake and many of our nearby reservoirs, boat inspections; whether mandatory, voluntary or as a matter of personal responsibility, are becoming the norm. In addition to boat inspections, we also monitor the chemical and physical attributes of our Lake to help determine our future vulnerability. And getting back to fishing, yes there are some invaders that can cause mysterious fish kills. A species of fish-killing algae that first started causing problems on the

east coast has moved as far west as Texas. And then there is the dreaded V-H-S. Laugh not! This isn't the finger tangling tapes of years past. This is a virus (whose full name would choke my spell-checker) that is being implicated in fish kills that started on the Great Lakes. It has spread as far as Wisconsin already. As with other invaders, the prescription for protection is prevention. Don't put anything into the lake that isn't already there... unless it has been cleaned, drained or dried.

Canada Goose Update

We are pleased to report that the Canada Goose population is less than what it was a year ago at this time. This can be attributed to the Deputy Dog program as well as the new Goosinator, neither of which the geese like. This year there are about half the nests that there were last year. At the time this article is written (the end of April) there are no goslings yet. Time will tell how many of the eggs actually hatch.

If you signed up to be part of the Deputy Dog program and are no longer actively participating, PLEASE return your vest and your dog's vest as soon as possible to either the Administration office or the Department of Safety at the main gate. We have additional property owners and dogs who would like to participate but there are no more vests available to give them. It is important to keep this program going as it is effective against the geese.

If you are a new lakefront property owner, here are some suggestions on how to discourage the geese from hanging out and making a mess on your property:

• If you have a dog you can let it chase the geese as long as it does not harm them (the geese are protected by federal law, so hurting the geese is against the law). If you don't have a dog or are not here fulltime you might want to consider allowing a neighbor to let their dog on your property to chase the geese. The more consistent you are having a dog chase the geese, the more uncomfortable they will be on your property. We are having great success using dogs to chase the geese off our beaches and golf course.

- You can install a temporary fence along your shoreline. String a 3/16" nylon rope at a height of about 6-8". This helps prevent the geese from landing on the water and walking onto your property. The Maintenance Department made temporary fences that we used last year on the beaches that were very successful. They drilled a hole large enough to string the rope through in wooden stakes and then put the stakes in the ground every few feet. It is high enough to prevent the geese keep from coming in from the lake but low enough for you to step over and still be able to enjoy the lake. You will have to adjust the placement of the stakes as the lake lowers and rises throughout the year.
- If you have a dock, chances are you find a lot of droppings left on it. You might want to try something called a "bird spider". This device has arms that move in the wind and make it difficult for the geese to get on your dock. Many property owners use this device on their docks and these docks have no goose poop on them. These devices were also used on the swim docks at Lake Lodge and Dunn Court last summer with great success. RATE OF DUES INCREASES

Dear Editor,

I recently received non-confirmed information that the shooting range that we DIDN'T get to vote on cost us about \$65,000. After seeing it for myself, I can see how that could be very possible.

And now, seeing how much our PML restaurant has been losing money over the last ten years and our other expenditures. I am disgusted in how our association spending is out of control.

We purchased our home here in PML in 2000 and our assoc dues were a little over \$50 a month. Now in 2014 we pay a \$163. This is an increase of a whopping 320%. This is ridiculous. To put it in perspective below is a list of the average inflation of items in the past 13 years.

Gas/gallon \$1.44 to \$3.73 increase of 156%

Beer/16oz \$.99 to \$1.24 increase of 25% Coffee/lb \$2.92 to \$5.98 increase of 90% Milk/gallon \$2.75 to \$3.47 increase of 26% Electricity/kilo \$.09 to \$.13 increase of 55% Houses \$191K to \$281K increase of 55%

Are our dues going to triple again in the next 13 years and be more than \$480 per month? How many of us can afford that? Not only are they pricing a lot of us right out of here, they are drastically reducing the value of our homes.

PML CONTROLLER RESTAURANT AND GOLF COURSE LOSSES COMPARED

In April our PML controller wrote of the costs related to the operations of the golf course and restaurant/bar. He specifically mentioned that the revenues from the two help to offset the costs. While this is true of the golf course, I don't believe it also applies to the restaurant.

Each dollar of restaurant income creates

nearly two dollar in losses. Plainly stated, the more people who eat there the greater the losses will be. It currently has no breakeven point. Almost all costs come from cost of goods related to customer service. In contrast with golf course costs, expenses for a closed restaurant would decrease sharply and immediately. Costs related to maintenance and upkeep would be minimal. Our choices to dine out would simply be reduced by one.

Golf course expenses are largely related to course maintenance. Many of these costs would exist even if the course were closed to play. Simply stated, our losses to maintain the course would not significantly change whether the course is open or closed. Keeping it open makes good business sense. It generates income that significantly reduces losses. The more paying golfers we have the smaller the losses become. With enough play, golf might generate positive income.

With our members always paying half the bill for other people to eat lunch, dinner, snacks, or catered food perhaps we should look at other options.





Water Conservation Tips

- Replace old inefficient toilets (made prior to 1993) with a new high efficiency model.
- Regularly check for and repair toilet and faucet leaks.
- Install a showerhead with on/off switch.
- Take shorter showers most showerheads use 2.5 gallons of water per minute. Reducing your shower by 4 minutes can save 10 gallons of water.
- Installing low-flow faucet aerators on Kitchen and Bathroom sinks is easy, inexpensive, and can save water.
- Do not run faucets unnecessarily. Turn the faucet off while brushing teeth and doing dishes.
- Do not let clean wastewater go down the drain! Collect it in buckets and use to water plants. Do not let this collected water sit uncovered as it is a prime breeding ground for mosquitos.
- Run dishwasher and washing machine only when full.
- Traditional clothes washers use approximately 41 gallons per load. High efficiency machines use only 23 gallons per load.
- The best way to clean outdoors is with a broom. Using the hose to wash down sidewalks, driveways, etc. is wasteful and unnecessary especially during a drought. Your garden hose can use more than 10 gallons of water per minute.



APPROVED, AMENDED RESOLUTION # 05.01

The following is the approved amendment to Board Resolution #05.01, PMLA Boating & Lake Rules. The purpose of the amendment is to move the addendum from June 2013 that allows the use of Stand Up Paddleboards (SUP's) into the regular text of the resolution, to make note of the ski slalom course that was established in the center of the Lake and to change the restriction for non-used ski times to allow others to fill a ski time, if available upon request. Another purpose was to note the change from a flag pole ski lane safety flag to a ski lane safety light at the Marina Jetty.

The proposed amendment was published for member review and comment. This amendment was approved and adopted by the Board of Directors at a duly noticed meeting on May 17, 2014 at the PML Lake Lodge.

PMLA BOATING AND LAKE RULES

For your safety, California Boating Laws prevail. For your convenience, copies of the pamphlet "ABC's of California Boating Laws", published by the California Harbors and Watercraft are available at the Marina Store.

Listed below are further regulations that apply to Pine Mountain Lake boating usage. Failure to comply with them shall be grounds for termination of your privileges. Violations are subject to citation. All boats are subject to inspection to determine compliance with State Law and Association requirements. If you have any questions on the safety requirements of your boat, contact a Boat Patrol Officer or the Marina Store staff.

GENERAL BOATING RULES

Know our rules and abide by them for your enjoyment and safety.

All boats on Pine Mountain Lake must meet both State of California and Pine Mountain Lake registration requirements. Only property owners in good standing may register their boats.

REGISTRATION: Requirements for registration include current liability insurance with a minimum of \$300,000, proof of PML residency, proof that the boat meets California Boating Law safety requirements, compliance with PML non-wake enhancing requirements, and agreement to abide by lake rules.

PML non-wake enhancing regulations restrict the use of internal ballast tanks, external fins, foils, panels, or boat hulls specifically designed to increase wakes. Any boats incorporating these devices, registered at PML must adhere to PML's restrictions on not utilizing these devices.

All boats are limited to 5 mph except during water skiing hours, where the speed limit is 40 mph in the ski area only. All boats, except those signed up for skiing, must stay out of the ski area while skiing is in progress. Skiing or other high-speed boating activity is permitted during designated hours from May 1 thru October 31 only.

Open stack boats and others with a decibel level exceeding 82 db are prohibited. Likewise, radios or stereos may not be played at high volume.

Note that areas marked "no wake" mean no wake. These areas are marked with white buoys that say "No Wake". Boats may have to go slower than 5 mph in order not to create any wake.

NO "Jet Skis", "Wave runners" or other similar variations of personal watercraft are allowed on Pine Mountain Lake (except authorized emergency or law enforcement equipment).

Stand Up Paddle Boards (SUP's) are approved watercraft for use on Pine Mountain Lake. Registration fee will be the same as for other non-motorized watercraft. Please refer to current fee schedule for details.

Only skippers (16 years and older with a valid driver's license) designated by a boat owner may operate a powerboat, provided that they know the lake and marina rules. Boat owners are responsible for informing their operators of all lake and marina rules.

Boat owners are responsible for the operation of their boats and the wakes they create regardless of who may be operating the boat.

Reckless operation and disregard for others may result in citation and forfeiture of lake boating privileges.

Boaters must stay inside the passenger/operator areas of the boat. Riding outside of the railing or gate is prohibited.

Powerboat operators may not tow or pull rafts, tubes, wakeboards, kneeboards, paddleboats, kayaks, canoes, or similar craft.

In case of an accident, give any necessary assistance, then immediately contact the Boat Patrol (based at the Marina).

Sufficient life preservers must be aboard for each passenger. All boaters less than 12 years of age and non-swimmers must wear properly tied life jackets.

Give a wide berth to sail and manually operated boats, as they have the right of way.

Powerboats may not be operated within 50 feet of a swimming area.

When meeting another boat, keep to the right.

Individuals wishing to blow out their motors may do so during high-speed boating hours and must first check-in with the Boat Patrol. Blowouts will be limited to two (2) times around the ski pattern and must adhere to all high-speed boating rules. A maximum of four boats are allowed in the high-speed lane with skiers given priority over boats wishing to blow out their motor. No engine blowouts will be allowed between 6:00 PM and 8:00 PM.

Every effort shall be made to **minimize wakes**, especially those affecting shoreline properties.

All lake activity is suspended when CDF helicopters perform firefighting procedures or during other emergencies that

require use of lake water.

The Boat Patrol will be in effect daily. Citations may be given for PML rule infractions. Two citations will constitute action for removing your boat from Pine Mountain Lake for the remainder of the season. Any boating or swimming rule may be changed in an emergency based on input from PML management, Safety Dept., Sheriff's Dept. or other appropriate agency.

BOAT LAUNCHING & REMOVAL

NO BOAT MAY BE LAUNCHED without current Pine Mountain Lake registration.

BOAT LAUNCHING AND REMOVAL is allowed only at the Marina boat ramp.

ALL BOATS NOT REMOVED from Dunn Court and the Marina area by October 31 of each year will be removed and stored AT THE OWNER'S EXPENSE.

NO TRAILER PARKING permitted, except for daily use, and only in designated areas. No trailer parking will be permitted the date of the Independence Day fireworks celebration.

DUNN COURT SAILBOAT OWNERS: Please relocate your sailboat the day before the annual fireworks display. This date may vary from year to year.

WATER SKIING RULES

Homeowners wishing to register a ski boat for the first time on PML will be given a tour of the lake and have these regulations and the Good Neighbor Rules explained. This tour will be conducted monthly by the PML Boat Patrol, and must be completed before the homeowner may sign up for ski times at PML. Copies of the Lake and Boating Rules and the Good Neighbor Rules will be available at the Marina. Wakeboarding and kneeboarding are not permitted. Marina staff is the final authority on other activities that are not permitted.

Skiing will be on a one-hour session, reservation basis. High-speed boating hours are generally as follows:

Monday	9:00-12:00 noon	5:00-8:00 p.m. Water Skiing
Tuesday	9:00-12:00 noon	5:00-8:00 p.m. Water Skiing
Wednesday	9:00-12:00 noon	5:00-8:00 p.m. Slow Boating
Thursday	9:00-12:00 noon	5:00-8:00 p.m. Water Skiing
Friday	9:00-12:00 noon	5:00-8:00 p.m. Water Skiing
Saturday	9:00-12:00 noon	5:00-8:00 p.m. Water Skiing
Sunday	9:00-12:00 noon	5:00-8:00 p.m. Water Skiing

State law prohibits the towing of water skiers from sunset to sunrise.

Water skiing is prohibited November 1 through April 30. The speed limit for all boats during this time is 5 mph.

Reservations for skiing will be taken at the Marina Store (962-8631). You may call or walk-in (walk-ins have first priority). Reservations will be taken starting one hour prior to the morning ski time, one day in advance of skiing. Reservations will be limited to one (1) hour, morning, or afternoon, 1 day prior to skiing. Those wishing to ski in both the morning and afternoon may reserve a second hour the day of skiing starting one (1) hour prior to the morning ski time. When time slots become full, a stand-by list will be taken. Skiing time will be limited to one (1) hour per reservation initially, and modified by the Lake Patrol and Marina Manager depending on demand.

All users of the fast boat lane must check-in with the Boat Patrol prior to commencing their activity. The Boat Patrol will wait 10 minutes for a user with a reservation. After that, the time slot will be opened to the next fast boat user requesting time. If there are no reservations or ad hoc fast boat users in line, the fast boat lane will be closed to fast boat activities but can be reopened upon request during normal high-speed boating hours.

A ski-light system is located at the Marina Jetty. The illuminated light indicates high-speed boating activity is occurring. The ski-light will be illuminated based on whether the fast boat lane is open or closed during reservation hours. Boaters can also call the Marina Store for ski-light status.

A maximum of four (4) boats will be allowed to ski at any one time. A distance of 100 feet shall be maintained between boats.

A counter-clockwise ski pattern shall be maintained.

To minimize shoreline wakes on the North shore, high-speed boaters shall stay as close as possible to the main beach buoys when traveling from the dam toward Big Creek. When traveling Big Creek toward the dam, high-speed boaters should stay as close as possible to the center of the ski pattern as safety permits. Always pass an approaching powerboat on the right.

All boats being used on PML waters must be operated in a manner to minimize the size of the wake produced by the boat. With the exception of pontoon boats and those boats traveling less than 5 mph, all powerboat operators shall operate at planning speeds as soon as practical when in the ski pattern.

Wake Enhancement: The use of devices, equipment, or placement of passengers on boats for the purpose of creating an enlarged wake is prohibited. Further, no such devices or equipment may be used on any boat in PML. Such devices and equipment include, but are not limited to; exterior panels or wings deployed underwater; rubberized, plastic, or metal tanks or bags filled with any material; crowding of passengers to the rear; inside-the-hull water tanks or boat hulls designed specifically to enhance the wake. Additionally, the operator of an outboard or I/O drive boat must keep the out-drive down to optimally trim the boat to minimize the size of the boat's wake at all times.

Any boat that produces excessive wakes may be cited. Two citations result in eviction from the lake for the remainder of the calendar year. Staging area for skiers is the White SKI BUOY outside the Marina. No other area! There is a voluntary drop area outside the 5 mph buoys at Fisherman's Cove. See Marina Store and Good Neighbor Rules for details.

Ski course is marked with red buoys. Stay inside of the red buoys. These buoys are not a SLALOM COURSE.

A slalom course is available for all skiers' use. Please check in with the Boat Patrol prior to using the slalom course.

Ski boats must have a red or orange flag and an observer at least 12 years of age.

Ski boats returning to a fallen skier must make a starboard (right) turn to return to the skier while raising the red or orange warning flag. The boat operator shall make the 'turn-around' at a slow speed to minimize the wake. Obviously, safety is a concern, but anything a boat operator can do to minimize wake size is required.

The driver of any boat approaching a boat displaying a red or orange flag must acknowledge the downed skier's presence by raising their hand for the skier's towboat to see and take appropriate evasive action to ensure the safety of the downed skier.

Skier must raise one (1) ski when in water with slack towline to warn other boats in the area.

All skiers must wear proper Coast Guard approved life preservers.

Number of water skiers per boat: 2 maximum at a time. When one skier drops, the second skier must drop immediately.

Use of wakeboards, kneeboards, discs, inner tubes, surfboards, water toys, and non-approved devices are prohibited. Water skis are the only devices permitted to be used in the high-speed boating lane. The Boat Patrol and Marina Staff have the final authority to decide what is a water ski and what is a non-approved device.

An area for beginning water ski instruction is available. Contact the Boat Patrol Officer or Marina Manager for details.

Water skiing may be limited on certain days such as, but not limited to holidays, fishing derbies and sailing regatta days.

KNOW OUR RULES AND ABIDE BY THEM FOR YOUR ENJOYMENT AND SAFETY.

FISHING RULES

A California State Fishing License is required and is to be displayed at all times while fishing. Fish limits are governed by California Fish & Game laws. NO LIVE BAIT is permitted other than worms.

Fishing off water taxi docks during water taxi operating hours is prohibited. Trespassing on private property is not allowed.

No fishing within 25 feet of designated swim areas.

SAILING RULES

Sailing Hours: Anytime

SAILBOAT LAUNCHING is allowed only at the Marina boat ramp.

Sailboats and all others must stay out of the skiing area during skiing hours.

The high-speed boating lane is outlined with red buoys. Stay out of this area while high-speed boating is in progress. Be aware of high-speed boating hours for your own protection. Avoid the east end of the lake (Lake Lodge and Big Creek entrance) during high-speed boating hours.

Sailing of rental boats in Big Creek is not allowed.

PARKING, BEACH & SWIMMING RULES

SWIM AT YOUR OWN RISK. NO LIFEGUARDS ARE ON DUTY.

Follow all posted beach and marina rules and regulations. Note: The beaches and lawns are designated non-smoking areas.

Swimming is only allowed within the designated swim areas.

No float tubes, surfboards, "noodles", lounge rafts, etc., are allowed on the lake other than within 30 feet from your own private dock. (Tubes, noodles and "soft" float toys are allowed in the swim areas.)

Inflatable boats, canoes, and kayaks that are used on Pine Mountain Lake must be registered in the same manner as hard-bottom boats.

Do not venture more than 30 feet from your own private dock. DO NOT swim across or in the open lake area.

No glass containers, loud music, hardballs, profane language are allowed on any Pine Mountain Lake beach area. Drinking of alcoholic beverages by anyone under the age of 21 is not allowed on any Pine Mountain Lake beach area.

Bicycles and skateboards must be walked through all amenity-parking areas. No riding is permitted.

Dogs are prohibited from the entire PML Marina, Dunn Court, and Lake Lodge amenities; except authorized PML utility dogs in the performance of their duties or service animals assisting the blind or deaf. Dogs should not be left in cars parked in these areas.

If the marina parking lot is full, please park at Dunn court, the Lake Lodge, or Fisherman's Cove and ride the water taxi to the Marina. Water taxi operating schedule is available upon request.

FAILURE TO COMPLY MAY RESULT IN FINES OR LOSS OF LAKE PRIVILEGES.

Additional rules and regulations may apply. Rules are subject to change without notice.

ONLY property owners and PMLA employees on duty will be allowed to park at the Marina parking area on weekends and holidays from Memorial Day Weekend through Labor Day Weekend. Property owners will be required to provide a valid parking sticker or hanging tag.

Fire Safety

Fire Safety 101

Most of our members are well into the fire safety work to be completed by the July 1 deadline. I'd like to review some areas where we see the most violations. Maybe you can double check these to make sure you are in compliance.

- Roofs and gutters full of leaves and pine needles.
 We live in wonderful tree country and with that goes the responsibility to get rid of the dead stuff that falls from our trees every year. A spark or ember in a gutter full of dead dry needles or leaves and your home becomes an incinerator.
- 30 foot defensive space around all structures. Clean or green that's the CalFire requirement. All leaves, needles, cones must be removed in this defensive space as well as any other dead stuff.
- Stacked firewood covered in needles and/or leaves. Be sure to clean around your stacked firewood even if it is over 30 feet from your structure. A 10 foot clearance around stacked firewood is a CalFire requirement. If you store your firewood up against your house or under your deck, this is not recommended, but if you must, be sure the area around your firewood is super clean.
- Weed control. Your weeds need to be cut to bare dirt in your 30' defensive space around structures (unless you have green grass) and no more than 3 inches high on your entire Lot. Nothing can create the spread of wildfire quicker than dead weeds. Be sure your entire Lot is cut.

- Manzanita and buck brush. Parts of these die each year. Trim out the dead stuff as these are highly flammable. Thin out multiple plants to reduce fuel especially in your 100 foot defensible space.
- Fuel Reduction Inspection. We sent many members a fuel reduction inspection form in October 2013 thru April 2014. We will be inspecting to see that this work was completed. This involved limbing up trees, removing dead limbs and thinning out trees and brush.

We will be touring all Lots in the latter part of June to see who hasn't started their summer cleanup. We will send reminder notices just in case this annual responsibility has slipped your mind. We will begin our formal compliance inspections on your Lot starting July 1 with a 15 day Notice of Non-Compliance. July 1 is still the deadline for compliance. Our inspection schedule is as follows:

Shades of Green

We are extremely fortunate to have the water to irrigate the course this year. There are courses around the state that either have no water source, or it is too expensive to purchase and are closing. Thanks to the spring rains and receiving effluent water from the water district, the course has not used any lake water through April. April is the sixth consecutive month of not using the lake water for irrigating the golf course.

The lack of rain and conserving irrigation water causes other problems for the turf. When you are playing and see that most areas of turf are healthy and green, then right in the middle of healthy turf is a ring of dead or dying grass. This is a fungus called fairy ring. It has white mycelium growing underneath the turf that repels water. The water simply will not get to the roots of the grass and it will also rob the soil of nutrients. There are more of these spots appearing this year. To try and control this disease we apply a fungicide, along with creating

holes to wet the root systems. Extra fertilizer and a wetting agent are also applied. Most of these areas are white lined in the fairways, so you do get relief. [Who plays from the fairways?]

The change in the size of the eighteenth green was done for a variety of reasons. Most of the green that was eliminated was not pinnable; or we couldn't locate a hole there because the front was to steep. There is still a small portion of the green that can be used for fun events that makes it a difficult hole to putt to, just like we have done over the years. This change will also reduce the ball from going all the way down the front approach, slightly assisting in the pace of play. It will also reduce the risks somewhat that come with walking up and down the steep approach there. The changes in the course that we do make are for your enjoyment and safety.

Enjoy the beginning of summer later this month and for those of you that participate in the invitational's, play well and most of all, enjoy your course. Have a great summer!


Free Tennis at PML

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



Drought Related Water Infrastructure Improvements to the GCSD Water Treatment Plant

In March of 2014, the Groveland Community Services District (GCSD) was informed by the San Francisco Public Utilities Commission (SFPUC) that due to current drought conditions, SFPUC may need to introduce water from Cherry Lake into the Mountain Tunnel, from which GCSD pumps its raw water.

Currently, GCSD and SFPUC have filtration avoidance clauses in their water permits due to the pristine nature of the Hetch Hetchy Reservoir watershed. Source water from Cherry Lake will void the filtration avoidance clause in these permits. SFPUC has the capability of filtering Cherry Lake water at its Sunol Water Treatment Plant; GCSD does not have the capability of filtering this water. SFPUC is pursuing an aggressive schedule to complete the Lower Cherry Aqueduct (LCA) Project in 2014 in order to begin introducing Cherry Lake water as soon as January/February 2015. This places GCSD into an emergency situation because GCSD does not

have filtration equipment capable of handling year round demand for water. GCSD is responding by applying for grant funding for the purchase and installation of a Pall Aria Microfiltration (MF) system at its existing Second Garrote water treatment plant.

It is GCSD's intent to have this project completed by late November of 2014 in order to continue providing potable drinking water and fire flow to the communities of Big Oak Flat, Groveland, and Pine Mountain Lake. GCSD has applied for three grants: 1) United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) in the amount of \$500,000; 2) California Department of Public Health (CDPH) in the amount of \$500,000; 3) and from the Tuolumne Stanislaus Regional Water Management Plan (IRWMP) in the amount of \$685,000. The GCSD project cost estimate is \$1.7 million for purchase and installation of the filtration equipment. It is expected for the construction project to begin in August of 2014.

Impulse Control

Sometimes you get an urge or an impulse to do something, whether it is as simple as taking a second piece of cake or taking a risk at doing something that may be harmful, unacceptable or illegal. Most adults are able to think rationally about an impulse and decide not to do it. But others lack the control and end up giving into their wants and desires, even if it means undesirable consequences.

Some people enjoy playing lotto, buying lottery tickets or visiting casinos. This does not necessarily mean you have a gambling disorder. It is when the- desire is so compulsive that you can't stop thinking about it until you can do it, that may indicate a problem. Those who suffer from gambling disorder will continue to gamble despite negative financial, legal and/or social consequences.

It is estimated that gambling disorder/ addiction affects somewhere between 2 and 5 percent of all American adults in some way. Many people affected will do things that they never would do such as stealing money from friends, family or take part in illegal activities in an effort to get more money either to gamble or to pay debts.

John, a patient, had fully intended to return the funds he had taken from his firm after he had a "big win" at gambling which never happened. He gambled on horses, sporting events, politics, Oscar awards, anything he could bet on. As a result, he lost his job, his family and most of his friends after doing some jail time. He was very remorseful and admitted, "I was totally out of control and I couldn't help myself".

You might have a gambling problem if: you feel compelled to bet or bid, you hide it from others, you gamble with money you don't have, steal money to gamble or to pay debts, neglect paying bills, lying or denying about your behavior.

The devastation that gambling addiction can wreak on those who suffer and their families is heart breaking. The National Council on Problem Gambling reports that one in 5 pathological gamblers attempts suicide, a rate higher than for any other addictive disorder.

Compulsive gamblers often need the support of friends, family members and peers in order to help them stop gambling. Gamblers Anonymous groups can provide peer and social support. Most of the time, gambling treatment takes place either through social support groups(GA), outpatient therapy with a counselor or therapist or an inpatient facility.

Other common impulse control disorders are: compulsive buying, hypersexuality, compulsive eating, stealing, setting fires, hair pulling, nail biting, compulsive violent outbursts. Impulse control disorders are typically treated with a combination of psychotherapy and medications.

How can you help someone who is suffering from a gambling disorder: understand the addiction, find support for yourself and treatment for the addicted, manage the money tightly in the present and in the future.

If a relapse happens, don't let it stop you. Do not use it as an excuse to give up on yourself or your recovery.


Keeping Up With Your Exercise Program


My husband had major back surgery in November of last year. He was very compliant with his post surgical rehab. He had no choice with Kerrie and me keeping a close eye on him. He has made a full recovery and is back to work and "regular life". He mentioned recently that he had a little back pain. I asked about his exercise program. My question was met with silence. Then, confirmation that he is walking regularly, which is great, but he had gradually stopped doing the strengthening and stabilization exercises that had been set up for him. He, like most, was hoping that since he was "back to normal" he didn't have to do his exercises anymore.

Rehabilitation is split into two section, post surgical and maintenance. In the initial post surgical period, rehabilitation exercises will be more focused and intense. The patient comes to therapy and we progress the exercises respecting the healing of tissues, pain level, endurance etc. Then the shift will be made to a maintenance level of exercise. This phase is focused on maintaining a balance of strength and flexibility around the surgical site. For example, in a back decompression and fusion surgery like my husband's, the surgical site will be very strong and inflexible. But, the areas around the site now will take up more of the force and become vulnerable to injury. It becomes important to maintain strength in the abdominals and pelvic floor, ie "the core". As well as flexibility of the muscles that attach to the pelvis. This allows a more equal distribution of forces. It's basic physics and engineering. Even out the load and decrease the stress factors.

Unfortunately this does not happen naturally, we have to work at it. Daily demands of life actually create the "imbalances" that can undo the benefits of surgical intervention. So you do have to do exercises for the rest of your life to get the most out of that complex surgery you had. This may sound daunting, but the good news is that it can be quite minimal. When a patient

completes their acute rehab their therapist will set up their maintenance program. This is usually a 20 to 30 minute routine that is to be done "most days". No one can do it but you. No machine, no pill. Like the Nike slogan, Just do it! If you need help getting back on track give us a call. That's what we are here for.

SIGNIFICANCE OF THE YOSEMITE GRANT ACT

On May 17th, 1864, junior senator John Conness of California proposed a bill to Congress that would change the fate of the world forever: a bill to preserve and protect the Yosemite Valley and Mariposa Grove. Then on June 30th, during the Civil War, President

Abraham Lincoln recognized how salient it was to protect the tranquil areas, so he signed the bill, making it law. The law states that "the premises shall be held for public use, resort, and recreation". It also forbids trespassing, the cutting of



trees, settling without authority, and other deleterious acts. The Yosemite Grant Act made Yosemite the first wilderness area to be set aside by the federal government for conservation. It has also proven to be one of the most beneficial and influential pieces of legislation in American history.

With commercial interests becoming a threat to all available land, legislation became requisite to protect places like Yosemite. Just think about what Yosemite would be like today if we hadn't used legislation to preserve it. The plant life would be destroyed, the animals would have no habitat, litter would cover a majority of the land, and pollution levels would increase dramatically. This is why we had to go as far as creating a law to protect the natural beauty of Yosemite and places like it.

Today, Yosemite is a National Park. Even though it didn't start out as one, the Yosemite Grant Act helped it become one by becoming the basis for the National Park Service. National Parks are incredibly important to America for a number of reasons. First, they give millions of people the opportunity to be physically active.

SOUTHERN TUOLUMNE COUNTY HISTORICAL SOCIETY **Museum Happenings**

The new bench near the museum entrance was dedicated to the memory of Ann Wesley during a memorial ceremony in May. Ann passed away in 2012 after a four year battle with cancer but her legacy lives on in her devotion to our community.

She and husband Harold owned and operated the Buck Meadows Lodge and Yosemite Westgate Motel for 20 years. Ann was a member of the Pine Cone Singers for 30 years, active in the Buck Meadows Community Church, Red Hat Society, and Groveland Country Mountain Riders. Despite all that, she still had time over the years to be a Girl Scout leader and docent in our museum.

When you visit the museum or library take a few moments to rest on Ann's bench and smile when you remember and reflect on her tireless service to others.

Last month's historical photograph was of an 1877 Groveland home located on Main Street which now houses Mountain Sage Nursery, Sierra Nevada Gallery, and Mountain Sage Café.

Frank Martin had obtained this land in the early 1870's and had this house built by 1877. George and Alvah Hamilton acquired the land in 1891 and then in 1893 it was purchased for approximately \$900 by Jacob and Jocunda Boitano Laveroni.

Jacob added a kitchen, fireplace, and other improvements. They raised two children, George and Bernice in this historic Groveland home. They also operated a dairy in Groveland from World War I until shortly after the Second World War. The dairy barn constructed in 1923, still stands behind the house.

In the 1840's Jacob's father Giacomo (Jake) Laveroni was touring Europe with small circus troops. He ended up in New York City working for a candle manufacturing company and then joined the Gold Rush to California. Settling in Hornitos, Jake managed a store for his former



New York employer Domenico Ghirardelli, the soon to be famous chocolatier.

Jake met and married Maria Bacigalupi in Hornitos. Maria and her family had come to America some years earlier, walking across the Isthmus of Panama when she was only eleven.

In 1860 Jacob's parents moved to the Moccasin Creek area and then Deer Flat where they farmed and had six children. In 1873 at the age of 38, Jacob's father died of pneumonia leaving Maria with six young children to raise, a hotel to run, and miners to board.

Three years later his mother Maria married Agostino Paolo 'The Boss' De Ferrari and moved to Groveland. Agostino and Maria were blessed with five more children.


The two family patriarchs, Giacomo (Jake) Laveroni and Agostino De Ferrari are buried in Our Lady of Mount Carmel Cemetery. Maria, Jacob, Jocunda, George and Bernice are interred in the Oak Grove (Divide) Cemetery.



Big News from the Little House

THE "VILLAGE" IS A GO!

After many months of study, The Board of Directors of The Little House has approved the development of a "Village" program for



"We are extremely excited about the Board's decision to move forward with the Village program", said Ron Harms, President of the Board of Directors of Southside Senior Services/The Little House. "Based on our discussion with people across the community, the Village program will directly address many of the challenges that seniors encounter as they age in our rural community," remarked Harms.

"A Village is a community-based effort to help seniors in our community age-in-place" explained Luci Tyndall, Administrative Services Coordinator for The Little House. According to Tyndall, "the greatest desire that seniors have as they age is to remain in their homes for as long as possible. That desire is complicated, unfortunately, by the increasing difficulty that seniors have in managing the day-to-day tasks associated with living independently. The Village program is designed to provide affordable assistance in handling those issues, from

things as a ladder bulbs a batteries shopping medical

things as simple as climbing a ladder to changing light bulbs and smoke alarm batteries, to assistance with shopping, transportation for medical services, help with

electronic 'gadgets' and social contacts that keep seniors connected to their friends and neighbors."

"Think about the Village as an organized way for neighbors to help one another, said Harms, and while the ideas behind the Village are not new, the Village represents a unique way of organizing the resources in the community to more consistently serve our neighbors who require a 'helping hand' to live safely and comfortably in their homes".

The Village concept has been adopted in many different forms in over 100 communities across the country. According to Harms, every Village is different. "When you look at the structure, the programs offered and the members who enroll in the Villages across America you see as many differences as you do similarities. Those differences are to be expected since each Village is designed to meet the unique needs of the community that it serves" said Harms. For example, the needs of Village members in a community like Groveland/ Big Oak Flat may be much more oriented to transportation and shopping assistance (as compared to a Village located in an urban area) due to the lack of public

transportation options and home shopping services. "Whatever it takes to make aging in place easier for seniors in our area, our Village will do its best to be of assistance", remarked Tyndall.

HOW WILL IT WORK?

To participate in the Village, an individual or family will have to reside in the greater-Groveland area, be age 50 or older, complete an enrollment application, and pay a monthly membership fee. The membership fee will be adjusted based upon the income level of the member in an effort to make the services of the Village available to everyone who has a need and an interest in participating. Fees collected from Village members will be used to offset the costs of staffing, insurance and other overhead expenses that are incurred by the Village program.

The services provided to Village members will be entirely provided by volunteers. "Our hope is that we can capture a portion of the tremendous volunteer spirit of the community and direct those resources to serve the needs of seniors in our community who elect to become Village members," remarked Harms. "We have confidence that the community will respond to the need for volunteers to provide services to Village members in a similar manner to the fabulous volunteer support we have seen from the community for the WHEELS transportation program."

WHAT HAPPENS NEXT?

Planning for the Groveland/Big Oak Flat area Village will occur over the next 9-10 months, followed by a 2-month pilot program in early 2015 and implementation in April

2015. During that time, the Village Steering Committee will be working with Board members from The Little House and with community members to define the geographic area to be served by the Village, to better describe the types of services that will be provided through the Village, to identify and recruit volunteers, and ultimately, to enroll individuals to become members of the Village.

WHAT CAN YOU DO?

The success of the Village will depend on the willingness of people to volunteer their time and talents to this effort. Over the next few months we need community members who have an interest in this project to help us plan the specific programs and services that will be offered to Village members.

Work groups are now being formed to address the following broad service categories: personal services, health/wellness, transportation, house- hold services, and administration/ operations. If you have an interest in volunteering for any of those work groups, or would like to learn more about any aspect of the Village program, please contact The Little House at 209-962-7303.

Genealogical Research Before the Internet

Back in the "olden days" my research efforts consisted of communicating with relatives, writing a multitude of letters, posting queries in genealogical magazines, contacting various historical societies and genealogy groups, visiting archives, libraries, courthouses and graveyards. I spent hundreds of hours slogging through microfilm, reel after reel, screen after screen looking for an ancestor in a census record because very little was indexed. Yes, each step seemed to take forever but well worth the effort when my ancestor's name was revealed.

I do the same thing today, but much more quickly using the Internet. The Internet brings records of federal, state and local levels of government to my personal computer. Library catalogs, resource files, and sites dedicated to specific records such as birth, death, marriage, land etc. are available 24/7. It simply boggles my mind.

Although there are innumerable genealogy websites out there on the Word Wide Web, not all are easy to use. I (along with a half dozen other local researchers) recently had the good fortune to

attend an all-day seminar held by the Calaveras Genealogical Society on "One-Step Webpages" by Stephen P. Morse, Ph.D. Dr. Morse has developed a means to facilitate doing genealogical research on the Internet and I encourage to you give his website a try at http://stevemorse. org. If you're interested, he'll be speaking in Modesto August 19th (Genealogy Society of Stanislaus County) and in Sonora September 20th (Tuolumne County Genealogical Society.)

Want to learn more? Whether you are a novice or have been researching your family for several years, there is always someone eager to share your enthusiasm for (or addiction to) family research. Feel free to join us at the genealogy workshops held from 1:00-3:00 on the 4th Friday of the month. We meet in the History Resource Center (HRC) housed above the Groveland Yosemite Gateway Museum. Other arrangements can be made if climbing stairs is an issue.

FROM MEMPHIS TO MISSILES TO MUFFINS

They say it doesn't take a rocket scientist to run a hotel. If that was true, then why is Peggy Mosley the Innkeeper of The Groveland Hotel? Okay, so maybe she isn't exactly a rocket scientist but it took 13-years in the US Air Force and 27-years at Lockheed to qualify for her role as Innkeeper.

Peggy grew up in Memphis and yes, she really did go to school with Elvis Presley! Here's the class photo to prove it!

Flowers connected Peggy and Grover in Memphis. Peggy helped in a friends flower shop while going to school. Grover was a floral distributor. A few milkshakes and drive-in movies started a wonderful 55 year partnership.

College was interesting and the Air Force offered both educational and vocational opportunities. Peggy's math skills got her earmarked for IBM's computer programming school and an outstanding career with USAF Logistics Command. Computers were embryonic; a computer room the size of The Groveland Hotel had less computing power than a wrist watch today. Peggy built systems for inventory control and material management that tracked everything from toilet paper to tanks. Grover worked for Sears and as Peggy's orders changed he would get transferred to a nearby Sears Operations Center.

After 13-years of transfers, they decided California was where they wanted to stay. Peggy

left the Air Force and joined Lockheed's Trident Missile Program as a computer programmer and project leader for company financial systems. She was Lockheed's first woman manager, breaking barriers for women and "taking a job away from deserving men." Peggy knew that she had to be twice-as-good and work twice-as-hard to succeed, and succeed she did!

Peggy was involved with Lockheed Management Association, also serving as President for 3-years. She worked with Junior Achievement for 20-years connecting the community with the classroom.

Aviation had been an interest since Peggy was a child. In the mid-1970's she got her pilots license and bought an airplane. Airplanes sit idle while you are at work, so Peggy started a flying club, Aero Systems, at Reid Hillview Airport in San Jose. Peggy flew in the Powder Puff Derby from California to Florida, retracing the original route flown by Jackie Cochran when she started it. This was an amazing memorable experience for Peggy flying alongside 177 lady pilots in 118 planes crossing this great country in just four days.

Peggy and Grover bought their first PML home in 1978. It was a family weekender escape from the Bay Area and demands of work. It was the second house at the airport. Grover was a scratch golfer and they later moved to a home on the golf course. After 27-years with Lockheed,



Peggy retired and they moved to Groveland full-time. As we know, retirement doesn't mean doing nothing, so Peggy got her real estate license. She was sitting in the real estate office, December 1989, and heard about a dilapidated old building coming out of foreclosure that the town wanted torn down. Peggy called Grover, "think outside the box." They bought the derelict building and within 6-months cleaned, fixed, painted, furnished and welcomed in their first guests.

Peggy is passionate about her role as innkeeper. The Groveland Hotel is lovely, lively and relaxing. Peggy is a founder of CABBI (California Association of Bed and Breakfast Inns), past chair of the California Lodging Association, active member of the American Hotel Lodging Association, and actively involved with legislative issues that impact the industry in both Sacramento and Washington DC. She is a member of the Groveland Chamber of Commerce, Tuolumne County Chamber of commerce and the Visitor Bureau. Peggy is passion in action as an inkeeper.

Peggy and Grover were a great team. Grover never knew what wild crazy thing Peggy would do next - from airplanes to Thunderbirds and a hotel! He was an avid golfer and very active in PML's golf community. You could find "Grover of Groveland" many afternoons and





evenings holding court in the bar area of the hotel. Peggy and Grover enjoyed over half a century together. Their combined families – his daughter, Peggy's son and two more sons together – became one. Grover passed away last summer; he is missed.

Many people refer to it as The "Historic" Groveland Hotel because the building with the restaurant, bar and meeting rooms was built in 1849 and is one of the oldest buildings in Tuolumne County. The adjacent building that contains most of the hotel rooms is just a baby by comparison, celebrating its 100th birthday this year! 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
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

Tiki

Shrill screams echo loudly across the 4th fairway, and the 2nd and 3rd fairways, and much of Unit 5. This is followed by a laugh HA HA ...then the first few bars of Beethoven's Fifth symphony. It's Tiki, the Patagonian conure, entertaining the golfers, or terrorizing their swing. She sits in her cage on the deck calling back and forth with the blue jays and Cooper's hawks that have all been raised in the vicinity.

We know she's a she because in May she gets the urge to lay eggs, and we have to remove the toys she's in love with for awhile so she calms down and loses the nesting urge. Tiki was hand-raised from a baby parrot 22 years ago, and has retained the sweet, cuddly, gregarious nature that Patagonians are known for. Although not as gaudily feathered as many parrots, she has a handsome combination of slate gray, blue, olive green, chartreuse, with a bright orange stomach. The eye rings are bright white, the beak is black, and the feet light pink. Total length is 18" with half of this in the blue and green tail. They are the largest conures, and look kind of like a small macaw.

Tiki is fond of crawling under the bed covers or hiding under the sofa, like her wild cousins in Argentina that nest in deep burrows they excavate in high cliffs. The birds are monogamous for life, and each pair has their own burrow, surrounded by hundreds of other burrows (kind of like the suburbs, without the divorce rate). The colony in the beach cliffs of El Condor Reserve is thought to be the largest colony of parrots in the world with about 2500 birds.



In the wild they eat seeds and fruits and are shot by farmers for poaching crops.

Life expectancy is 20 to 30 years. They are very strong flyers, and we have to clip her wings twice a year. Even with clipped wings she has glided down to tall pine trees to spend the day, or landed on the golf course and had to be rescued. So now we are more careful-we don't want one of the hawks to score our "birdie".

Tiki knows several tricks and some words. Her "hello" and her kissing sounds are perfect, but her "love you" and "come in" can be garbled. She adores visitors and swapping shoulders at a party. She can be induced to "whisper" when you whisper, and it sounds like a human whispering in another language. If Patagonians didn't have such an ear-piercing shriek they would be much more popular pets. Importing wild ones is banned now, but they are available from US breeders.

Next time you follow your ball after the 4th tee, give her a whistle.

Farm Tour ticket price is \$8 in advance; \$10 the day of the event. Those under 18 years of age get in free.



From Your Supervisor

First I would like to apologize for not providing an article last month. I have no good excuse other than I just hit a wall when trying to finalize the draft.

The problem that I always have is in deciding on the subject to cover. This is where the readers can be of help. Two items that I would like to begin with are both subjects suggested by readers.

The first subject is broadband availability. Recently I attended a Broadband Summit at the Black Oak Hotel. There were many speakers there that talked on the subject and went over what is available in our region. Not to anyone's surprise was the fact that there simply is not enough coverage. Darrell Slocum, Marketing Director for the Central Sierra Connect, a grant funded organization working through ATCA, is working to help improve broadband in our region. I asked him to provide me with some information that I could pass along to you in order to get us all more involved to help improve broadband availability in our region.

Darrell stated that one way everyone can aid in this effort is to visit the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) Broadband map to see what kind of coverage the State "says" you already have. The map may or may not be correct! Check it out by first running a speed test. Go to www.speedtest.net and follow the instructions. Do this for your residence and again for your business. Once you have your results available, please visit www.broadbandmap.ca.gov and click on the "interactive map" application. There, you can fill in the form with your address and move along the process. Please note that this map is riddled with errors. Why? It is primarily due to the larger internet providers overstating their coverage. Yes, these errors are detrimental to

our region. The mechanism for correcting these errors is literally in your hands? It is essential that you communicate any broadband mapping errors via the CPUC mapping program. If a provider is shown for your home or business and they do not offer service, it is very important to click on the "send feedback" button and share the correct information. Do this as soon as possible. Encourage friends, neighbors, business associates and everyone you know to do the same. The importance of this action cannot be overstated. And best of all, this is something we can do that will positively impact our area. It's within

By the way, running the speed test is fun. However, it can be deflating to learn how poorly your own internet access performs compared to the norm. The CPUC's definition of broadband or "high speed" internet is 6 megabits per second (mbps) for download and 1.5 mbps for upload. Now, go see how you compare and become a part of the solution!

If you have any questions or need additional information, please feel free to contact Darrell Slocum at darrellslocum@gmail.com or (209) 770-5777. He is the expert.

The second subject I was asked to address is to explain what type of emergency notification system Tuolumne County has?

The short answer is a brand new system that is, in my opinion, one of the very best. It should be on line by June 1, 2014. It's called "Everbridge System". It was chosen for mass emergency notification because of its detailed interactive features. It would take an entire page to fully describe everything this system will do. To learn about this system, please go to http://everbridge. com. This website will provide you with all

the information you need. I think you will be impressed. Once launched, the system can be accessed on the Tuolumne County website page at www.tuolumnecounty.ca.gov.

This next topic is one that affects our county on a personal and economic level.

You have probably read in other papers recently that the San Francisco Public Utilities Commission (SFPUC) has denied the request to hold the annual Strawberry Music Festival at Camp Mather citing water supply and safety concerns. The Tuolumne County Board of Supervisors sent a letter to SFPUC requesting they reconsider. The answer was a polite, "No". Everyone that has businesses along the 120 corridor understands what a benefit this event has always been to the economy and to Tuolumne County as a whole.

The United States Forest Service also cited safety concerns originally when receiving the permit request. To their credit, they have in fact reopened the campgrounds on the Highway 120 corridor and Evergreen Road. They looked at the opening as a priority for economic reasons as well as a benefit to the residents of the region.

So, now that we seemed to have addressed the safety concerns that the SFPUC voiced in their denial, the other challenge was not having enough water available for domestic use for a crowd of over 7000 festival attendees. I know a little about the water supply at Camp Mather. I was going over some old family photographs and there was a picture of my father standing next to the water tank at Mather. He was leaning on his 1928 Chevy Convertible. I believe the year was 1930. Why I mention this is that it reminded

me of how far we have come with technology. Not just the car but the redwood tank with its metal strapping.

The City and County of San Francisco, the SFPUC and the Hetch Hetchy systems have access to some of the best engineering minds and advanced technology in the world. Instead of a "NO", maybe they could challenge their teams to find a solution to the water issue. It's not much to ask a City and County that has garnered \$\$ Billions of Dollars\$\$ in revenue from the sale of water from the Tuolumne River. In the big scheme of things, the Strawberry Music Festival is obviously not important to the City and County of San Francisco but it sure is to many people in our County. Just my opinion!

** As I began writing on this topic I was informed that the organizers of this event have entered into an agreement with Nevada County to hold the Strawberry Music Festival for 2014 at the Nevada County Fair Grounds from Sept.11th through Sept 16th. **

The Board of Supervisors fear that once this event is lost, it may be gone forever! The impact of its potential loss would be greatly felt by the county and the Highway 120 businesses.


Tenaya 4th Graders Make Progress in Math

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
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
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CONTRACTOR CHECKLIST FOR HOMEOWNERS

BUILDING PERMITS

- ☐ Will the contractor get any needed permits before the work starts?
- Are the permit fees included in the contract?

CHECK OUT YOUR CONTRACTOR

- □ Did you contact the Contractors State License Board (CSLB) to check the status of the contractor's license?

 Contact the CSLB at 1-800-321-CSLB (2752) or visit their Web site: www.cslb. ca.gov.
- Did you get at least three local references from the contractors you are considering?
- Did you call them and see the work the contractor completed?

CHECK OUT THE CONTRACT

- ☐ Did you read and do you understand your contract?
- ☐ Does the 3-day right to cancel a contract apply to you?
- ☐ Does the contract tell you when work will start and end?
- Does the contract include a detailed description of the work to be done, the material to be used, and equipment to be

- installed? This description should include a plan and scale drawing showing the shape, size, dimensions and specifications. It should include brand names, model numbers, quantities and colors. Specific descriptions now will prevent disputes later.
- Are you required to pay a down payment? If you are, the down payment should never be more than 10% of the contract price or \$1,000, whichever is less.
- ☐ Is there a schedule of payments? If there is, you should pay only as work is completed and not before.
- ☐ Did your contractor give you a "Notice to Owner," a warning notice describing liens and ways to prevent them? Even if you pay your contractor, a lien can be placed on your home by unpaid laborers, subcontractors, or material suppliers. A lien can result in you paying twice or, in some cases, losing your home in a foreclosure. Also check the "Notice to Owner" for ways to protect yourself.
- Did you know changes or additions to your contract must all be in writing?
- ☐ Putting changes in writing reduces the possibility of a later dispute.

BEFORE YOU BEGIN CONSTRUCTION ON YOUR LOT

The Declaration of Restrictions (CC&Rs) states that no construction of any type (new construction, driveways, grading, lot clearing, etc.) can be performed without prior approval from the Environmental Control Committee (ECC).

Failure to obtain approval could result in the stoppage of work or even fines, and nobody wants that to happen.

Inspections are made every Tuesday and reviewed by the Committee every other Thursday, so we can accommodate our members. Please contact ECC before you begin any type of construction at 209-962-8605.

Contractors Performing Work in PML are Required to Follow PMLA Rules & Regulations

The following are some "common violations." Please do your part to maintain a harmonious environment for all to enjoy. Remember: The PML property Owner is held responsible for those they hire.

Vehicle use:

- 1. Exceeding the posted speed limit
- 2. Driving in a reckless manner
- 3. Following another through an access gate or allowing others to follow you through
- 4. Parking on street (road shoulders OK)

Personal Conduct:

- 1. Allowing loud music
- 2. Uttering abusive language or conduct that would be offensive to a reasonable person
- 3. Using the property Owner's gate card or clicker



Work Related Conduct

- 1. Starting work before 7am or continuing after 7pm
- 2. Allowing dogs at construction sites
- 3. Performing work on Sunday
- 4. Cutting down a tree in excess of 5" without PMLA approval
- 5. Trespassing on neighboring property
- 6. Using neighbors water or electricity without written
- 7. Leaving construction signs longer than 5 days after work has been completed
- 8. Nailing signs to trees
- 9. Storing building materials on street or easement
- 10. Beginning exterior construction without PML Association approval


