## **President's Corner**

I hope you all are doing your rain dances and will continue dancing through next March. We can use all the rain and snow that we can produce. I'm hoping for a precipitation year almost as big as 1862, which history says was a whopper rain year, over three times average. I am too young to remember that year but I play golf with guys that do, just kidding.

On a no less serious note your board is in the middle stages of establishing a budget for 2015. This of course will set the assessment level for the year. We have reviewed the amenities fee schedule and have made some adjustments as is done each year. We have reviewed in detail each department's forecasted year-end performance, and have analyzed their 2015 proposed budget for staffing, labor hours, insurance, utilities, and a lot of other things. Adjustments have been made to ensure we maintain an acceptable level of service and maintenance, while considering the overall cost to the membership.


We will interview each manager at the October board meeting before agreeing to their 2015 budget proposals. Next we have reviewed the reserve funded proposed items and have removed or delayed some items for future years. Reserves are used to repair or replace the depreciable assets of the Association, like roofs, water toys, roads, and rolling stock. The next category is New Capital. This list is relatively small, but in 2014 we set aside some money for a modern surveillance system which we may add to for 2015. We are currently evaluating the appropriate timing of this

project as we wish to dove- tail it into the existing communication network within PML through AT&T or the developing fiber optic network. The next budget item the board has made decisions on is salaries and raises. Enough said there, but no less critical to the operation of the Association.

Let me talk a little more about Reserves as it is one of the larger contributors to our assessments. A past board passed a resolution setting a goal to reach a reserve funding level of 65% of all our depreciable items within the next 20 years. Ken Spencer, our Controller, has used his predicting skills to determine how much unspent money there will be from each year that will build to the resolution goal in 20 years. Obviously this is not an exact science but it is in everyone's interest to have a healthy reserve account as prospective buyers into our HOA should be asking their realtor what the reserve percentage is at PML. A healthy Reserve account also is the board's insurance that we don't have to impose any special assessments for something out of the ordinary. I personally believe the entire board agrees that special assessments are something to avoid.

As you can see from this short article your board has been hard at work this fall and we will be happy to have a preliminary budget complete at our October meeting. The final approval will be at the November meeting after we have had a month of thoughtful review and another month of actuals in the books. After that we will all get a mailing from the Association with the 2015 assessment.

Remember, keep dancing but pace yourself!

#### **PML Shooting Range Update**

At the June 21st Board meeting the Board of Directors responded to formal complaints by three members and placed a temporary restriction on shooting louder caliber guns. The Board asked the Shooting Club and staff to conduct additional sound testing and to employ sound mitigation methods to reduce the level of sound coming from the Range. The testing and mitigation activities were conducted for two months.

The results of the testing and mitigation efforts were presented to the Board at the September 20th Board meeting. The results showed a marked decrease in the sound level coming from the Range. As a result, the Board lifted the temporary restriction contingent upon the construction of the sound buffer fence and material. The Association will continue to monitor the situation. In the meantime, if you are a shooter or would like further information on the PML Shooting Range, check out the PML Website. We have a lot of information posted as well as links to the PML Shooting Club website.

## GOT YOUR PIN?

Since PML is a private gated community, we want to offer our property owners a secure way to call in quests. When you become a member of PML you are assigned a Personal Identification Number (PIN) to utilize either when calling in a guest pass or using the Gate Access Internet program. This PIN identifies you to staff without you having to be present. This is a confidential number and should *not be shared*. When you call the Main Gate to authorize a guest or vendor access into PML, you will be asked for your PIN. The staff will look up the number in the computer and use it to confirm your identity before entering the guest information. You must have this number to utilize the Gate Access Internet program as well. If you do not know your PIN or have any questions, please contact the Administration Office at: (209) 962-8600 Monday through Friday, from 8 am to 4:30 pm. and we will gladly supply this information to you.

## **BEFORE YOU BEGIN CONSTRUCTION ON YOUR LOT**

The Declaration of Restrictions (CC&Rs) states that no construction of any type (new construction, driveways, grading, lot clearing, etc.) can be performed without prior approval from the Environmental Control Committee (ECC). Failure to obtain approval could result in the stoppage of work or even fines, and nobody wants that to happen. Inspections are made every Tuesday and reviewed by the Committee every other Thursday, so we can accommodate our members.

Does this make the feelings and opinions of this so-called silent majority any less valid than those of the more vocal minority? Somehow I think most of us would say no. However those that express their opinions openly and repeatedly tend to get more attention than those that are satisfied and don't feel the need to question the way things are going. Once again we are dealing with human nature.

What is the point of all this and how does it pertain to PML Money Matters? The fact is that budget season is upon us. The Board and Management Team needs to hear from ALL PML members, not just the vocal minority who have their often valid concerns, but also from those that like the way things are going, that approve of the way things are being handled and understand that the expectation of a high level of service comes with the reality that these expectations tend to cost more.

Which side of this discussion do you fall on? It really doesn't matter. What matters is that you express those opinions and concerns, both the positive and the not so positive. Only by having an open and honest discussion and debate on these issues, with input from all sides, can the Board make the decisions that are in the best interests of the Association as a whole, including the vocal minority and the silent majority.

#### **RESTAURANT/BAR COMBINED FINANCIALS**

For some reason, in the newsletter we combine the financials of the restaurant and bar into one revenue source. Because the bar generates a profit this type of presentation misrepresents the losses generated by the restaurant alone.

The bar amenity is showing a profit of \$29,000 YTD June on sales of \$203,000. The restaurant is showing losses of \$237,000 YTD on sales of \$428,000 for the same period. By combining the two the newsletter financials show losses at \$207,000. This is a very deceptive accounting presentation for both amenities.

The Snack Shack shows as a single accounting line and it generates \$17,000 in losses YTD June, much less than either the bar or restaurant results. For consistency we should have an accounting line for each of these two amenities in the newsletter so that members can evaluate them separately. We do separate them in the financials available to members online so doing the same in the newsletter should be no problem.

Hopefully our Board of Directors will undertake a detailed financial analysis of the restaurant losses prior to 2015 budgeting instead of simply rubber stamping as they have done in previous years. In my opinion \$4 million in losses decade after decade is intolerable. Failing to address the source of the losses in a meaningful way is ridiculous.

We are paying a very, very significant amount of our annual dues for people, both public and members, to eat food. Why?

#### **Rules Class**

We have received many questions about how to properly take relief from an immovable obstruction (cart path, sprinkler head, etc.) Rule 24-2. The following is a step by step procedure for taking proper relief: (Stay with me on this process it is more detailed than most people think)

- 1. Determine if in fact the obstruction interferes with your stance, lie of ball or intended swing, if so you are entitled to one club length relief from the "nearest point of relief".
- 2. Mark the position of the ball before lifting, this is critical to the process. Note: it is a good idea to leave the ball in its position until you see if you want to take relief. (Example: If

your ball comes to rest on a cart path and it is determined that your "nearest point of relief" puts you behind a tree with no shot, you may elect not to take relief and hit your shot from off the cart path but if you have lifted the ball after marking its position, you would not be allowed to replace the ball, you would have to play from the "nearest point of relief").

3. Using the club you would most likely play the shot with, take your stance in a position as near as possible to the obstruction but where the obstruction would not be an interference and no nearer to the hole. Put a tee in the ground where the club head was resting. If you are taking relief from a large obstruction, like a cart path, you will need to repeat the process of taking your stance on the other side of the obstruction to properly determine your "nearest point of relief". After you have put 2 tees in the ground, determine which tee is

nearest to the position of your ball, that is your "nearest point of relief" and where you must proceed from if you want to take relief, you do not have a choice of the 2 positions. Relief must be taken from the "nearest point of relief".

4. After determining your "nearest point of relief", take a club (any club in your bag) lay it on the ground with one end at the "nearest point of relief", put a tee in the ground at the other end of the club, no nearer to the hole. When you drop your ball it must strike the ground between the 2 tees. After the ball strikes the ground it can roll up to 2 club lengths and still be in play as long as it did not go closer to the hole than the original balls position, go into a hazard or back into the obstruction. Read the entire Rule 24-2 as other situations may come into play.

Now your ball is back in play. "There will be a test, when you least expect it"

# Coming and Going at the Stables BY LESTER SCOFIELD, STABLES MANAGER UNTIL SEPTEMBER 26, 2014



## **Shades of Green**

Welcome to October. Enjoy the cooler weather and the colors of fall.

In addition to our daily routine - what are some of our projects we will be working on heading into the fall and winter?

We have started to level the area to the left of #4 tee. This will allow a different angle for the tee shot. We hope to have this completed during October.

We have seen how the course has responded to less irrigation this year. Many fairway areas are fine, other areas are extremely thin. We are going to be as active as time and weather will permit to improve these areas. They need the profile changed, the soil that the roots are living in is too hard and compacted. These conditions limit air and water and to the root zone. We will do this through additional aeration and vertical- cutting, followed with seed and top-dressing. This needs to be done as much as possible and over time these spots will gradually improve.

Soon we will be removing the back bunker at the chipping green and improving the front bunker located there. The improvement will be an enlarged and newly defined bunker.

Due to the condition of the driving range, there is a need to extend the net to ground level to prevent the balls from rolling out into the 10th hole. We will do this over the winter.

Leveling some collars that have built up

over time and raising sprinkler heads are also on the agenda.

Removing and cleaning up hazardous trees are always part of our winter projects. The street crew removed a couple of hazardous digger pines on number nine a while back. They have assisted with many projects this year and are always there to lend a hand when needed that allows us more time to maintain the course for your playing pleasure. Team work goes along way, and our crew appreciates their assistance. They have many talented crew members on their staff.

Many of you have ideas or suggestions for improvements of the operation of the course. If you would like to share them, please do so through the member of your group that attends quarterly meetings with Mike and Alan to discuss the golf operations. Different ideas are always appreciated. Your representative will also bring back to your group our planned projects and improvements.

This year has been a challenge and educational for us. Your golf maintenance staff is dependable and has worked hard to keep the course playable during this dry year. We have many talented staff members. {Eddie can always improve his golf game!} Appreciate them as I do, give them a smile of appreciation.

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## On the Lake: Weeds and Needs

The summer season on the Lake is winding down, facilities are closing, and unless you have a boat you can carry, you are SOL... Short On Lake. But it really isn't as bleak as it seems. Yes, we are in a drought. Yes, the lake is at one of its lowest levels since it was first filled, and yes, there are a lot of "dry docks" out there. On the bright side, our Lake is still over 80% full. That's a strong "B" in my book. All we need is a relatively "normal" wet season. A couple of consecutive storms or one big gully-washer would do the trick. Let's all remain hopeful.

I was out on the Lake on September 5 to do routine water quality measurements, plant surveys, and algae counts. The water from the surface down to 20 feet was about 75 degrees. Below that it quickly drops into the mid-forties. If you remember your lake basics, that temperature difference (the thermocline) prevents oxygen from mixing down into the lower layers. The lack of oxygen below 30 feet is more pronounced this year, probably

as a result of the lower water level going into spring. That is a situation that keeps a lot of limnologists busy. Fortunately, we have not seen any ill effects and we continue to monitor the Lake for any changes.

We also saw differences in the plants around and within the Lake. Around the shoreline we saw a lot of a creeping plant with beautiful yellow flowers. The plant, "creeping waterprimrose" is kind of interesting. Even though it is probably native to California, it is classified as "invasive" in many references. I guess if it grows in a canal and slows water delivery, it's an invader. Whether it's creepy or invasive, I like it. It is more abundant this year due to amount of gooey muck just below the water level. Another plant growing more profusely around the shoreline is the California arrowhead. From the name, you will recognize it if you see it. And yes, you guessed it; even though this one bares California's name, it too is considered invasive by some. If it grows in rice fields, it's another

invader. Again, I like them and apparently so do the geese. Quite a few of them have been nibbled on. Below the surface, Elodea (a submersed aquatic vegetation) is rebounding in areas that were dredged. Same goes for pondweed which is rooted on the bottom with leaves that reach the surface.

One last plant (or category of plants) that grows around the Lake are the cattails and tules (bulrush). I like these plants because of the habitat they provide for birds and fish, and for the water quality and shoreline protection they provide. However, they do occasionally cause management problems. The California Dam Safety inspector just advised us to remove these plants from around the spillway so they don't interfere with water going over the spillway. You have to embrace his optimism about spilling! Some folks living on lake front lots also seem to have problems with these plants encroaching on their docks and lake views. I've seen a couple of attempts to prevent their growth by placing tarps on the bottom of the Lake. Typically, this doesn't work because gas bubbles that rise naturally from the bottom sediments lift the tarps to the surface where they then becoming swimming and boating hazards. There are specially made fabrics that will work, but as a reminder, anything you do below the high water level needs to be coordinated through PML admin.

Shortly after I finish this article, I'll be heading to Scotland and Ireland where I hope to find time to visit Britain's largest lake (by surface area), Lough Neagh. When I return from that trip, I'll be doing a quick turnaround to make it to the North American Lake Management Society's (NALMS) conference in Florida. If I haven't plugged this organization lately, check them out. Not only do they provide a great place for lake professionals to swap the latest research and tools for lake management, they also provide great information and cater to the needs of less technical people. If you have any interest in lakes or water (and I know you do), check them out at - www.nalms.org. For a nominal fee you can become a member and have access to a lot of good literature on lake management including their quarterly magazine LakeLine. The last issue was devoted entirely to lake associations.

Think wet, and until next time... SPLASH!

## AMENDMENT TO ECC RULES AND GUIDELINES BOOK

The following is a proposed amendment to the PML Environmental Control Committee Rules, Guidelines and Constructions Standards book. The purpose of the amendment is to update the ECC rules to reflect current practice, clarify standards, and changes to Tuolumne County department descriptions.

The effect of the amendment impacts the improvement of property within PML and provides further clarification of the rules and standards. This draft was discussed at the September 20, 2014 monthly Board meeting. Given the size of the ECC booklet, the Association chooses to publish a summary of the specific paragraphs that are proposed for change. The purpose of this is to save money on publication costs.

To ensure that all members have an opportunity to review the ECC book in its entirety, it was posted on the PML Website for easy access. Members who wish to have a hard copy mailed to them can make a request in writing to the Administration Office. Copies of the draft are available at the Administration Office for pick up as well.

This published draft will also be discussed and considered for adoption at the November 8th monthly Board meeting at the PML Lake Lodge. The meeting starts at 9 a.m. and all PMLA members are welcome to attend.

#### II. REQUIREMENTS FOR BUILDING AT PINE MOUNTAIN LAKE

#### **A. PLAN SUBMITTAL:**

- 1. Two sets of proposed construction plans must be submitted to the ECC prior to any construction. This includes additions and or modifications to previously built structures. All submittals must include the owners name, unit, lot number, parcel number and street address. (See Construction Plan Requirements and Plot Plan Example in this guideline).
- 2. All Contractors must provide the following information: a. Proof of a valid California state contractor's license.
- 3. Escrow must be closed and the Deed recorded. If the Association does not have a copy of the recorded Deed on file, one will be required at the time of submittal.
- 4. Association dues must be current for the property at the time of submittal.
- 5. Any required county building permits and Groveland Community Service District (GCSD) approval must be submitted prior to ECC approval.
- 6. County information and building permits may be obtained from the Tuolumne County Building Department at (209) 533-5633.
- 7. Water and sewer connection permits may be obtained from the GCSD (Groveland Community Services District) at (209) 962-7161.
- 8. The County must approve the location of septic tanks, leach fields and associated expansion areas. The County will also determine the need for any additional engineering studies. It is the responsibility of the property owner to obtain approval for, and final inspection of, the installation of any septic system. A county permit for the septic system is required prior to receiving a PMLA authorization to proceed with the planned improvement.
- 9. The Owner or the contractor must pay a Compliance Deposit and Plan Check Fee. The Compliance Deposit will be refunded to the Owner or the party named on the signed waiver after the Final Inspection is completed.
- 10. At the time of Plan Submittal, all property pins must be located, flagged, and property lines strung. The proposed structure outline must also be staked and strung. If necessary, underbrush can be cleared, however, no trees are to be cut prior to approval. Property Pins are defined as visible, metal bars with survey caps attached. If any other method is used to establish the property lines the property owner or contractor must be available during the Field Review by the ECC Inspector. If property pins cannot be located or existing locations are in doubt, it shall be the responsibility of the property owner to enlist the services of a licensed Surveyor to certify the property pins in question. In NO case shall it be the responsibility of Pine Mountain Lake Association or the Environmental Control Committee to locate or certify location of property pins. The stringing of the property to establish the acceptable location of the Improvement will be verified as part of the First Inspection.
- 11. A property identity sign indicating the unit/lot number, and street address must be posted where it can be seen from the road before the first inspection. For placement and size of sign see Page 21, Construction Signs.
- 12. All changes, modifications, or deviations from the originally submitted and approved plans shall be resubmitted to the ECC for approval before actual changes, modifications or deviations are made on the site. County Building Department approval (if necessary) is also required.
- 13. When a proposed work of Improvement is submitted to the Environmental Control Committee for review, the Committee shall grant the requested approval only if the Committee, in its sole discretion, finds that all of the following provisions have been satisfied:
  - The Owner's plans and specifications: (i) conform to the PMLA Declaration and the ECC Rules in effect at the time such plans are submitted to the Committee; (ii) will result in the construction of an Improvement that is in harmony with the external design of other structures and/or landscaping within the Properties and (iii) will not interfere with the reasonable enjoyment of any other Lot Owner of his or her property, including, without limitation, the other Owner's rights to scenic and solar access free of unreasonable obstructions; and
  - The proposed Improvement(s), if approved, will otherwise be consistent with the architectural and aesthetic standards prevailing within the Properties and with the overall plan and scheme of development of the Properties and the purposes of this Declaration.
  - If a property improvement is determined to cause a material adverse impact on the view from any adjoining lot, the ECC may condition its approval on a different position or location for the structure so long as topography, set backs, tree preservation, and other factors are reasonably acceptable.

14. For additional information, see Article VIII of the PMLA Declaration of Restrictions on the use of Lots.

#### PLAN SUBMITTAL:

- 1 The following steps should be followed for a quickest review and approval:
- Submit drawings for conceptual approval to PMLA. Setbacks, appearance, square footage and the field check will be made at this time, with approval. Partial fees shall be paid and required paperwork will be completed at this time.
- Submit plans to Tuolumne County and obtain a building permit.
- Tuolumne County Community Resources Agency information and building permit information may be obtained at (209) 533-5633.
- After receiving the County permit, resubmit plans to PMLA with a copy
  of the building permit and approved drawings, pay remainder of fees –
  the plans with the County approval will be checked against the plans at
  PMLA and, if matching, immediately approved.
- A Tuolumne County building permit is required prior to final approval by ECC. GCSD water and sewer information may be obtained by calling (209) 962-7161.
- 2 Two sets of proposed construction plans must be submitted to the ECC for review. This includes additions and or modifications to previously built structures. All submittals must include the owners name, unit, lot number, parcel number and street address.
- 3 At the time of Plan Submittal, all property pins must be located, flagged, and property lines strung. The proposed structure outline must also be staked and strung. If necessary, underbrush can be cleared, however, no trees are to be cut prior to approval. In NO case shall it be the responsibility of Pine Mountain Lake Association or the Environmental Control Committee to locate or certify location of property pins. The stringing of the property to establish the acceptable location of the Improvement will be verified as part of the first inspection.
- 4 A property sign indicating the unit/lot number must be posted where it can be seen from the road before the first inspection. The sign cannot be posted on a tree but should be mounted on wood or steel posts. Signs shall be on permanent material (not cardboard) not larger than 216 square inches.
- 5 Tuolumne Count approves the specifications of septic tanks, leach fields and associated expansion areas. The County will also determine the need for any additional engineering studies.
- 6 The Owner or the contractor will pay a Compliance Deposit and Plan Check Fee. The Compliance Deposit will be refunded to the party who paid the deposit.
- 7 Escrow must be closed and the deed recorded. If the Association does not have a copy of the recorded deed on file, one will be required at the time of plan submittal.
- 8 Association dues must be current for the property at the time of submittal.
- 9 All changes, modifications, or deviations from the originally submitted and approved plans shall be resubmitted to ECC for approval before actual changes, modifications or deviations are made.
- 10 When a project is submitted to the Environmental Control Committee for review, the Committee shall grant the approval only if the Committee, in its sole discretion, finds that all of the following provisions have been satisfied:
  - The Owner's plans and specifications: (i) conform to the PMLA Declaration and the ECC Rules in effect at the time such plans are submitted to the Committee; (ii) will result in the construction of an Improvement that is in harmony with the external design of other structures and/or landscaping within the Properties and (iii) will not interfere with the reasonable enjoyment of any other Lot Owner of his or her property, including, without limitation, the other Owner's rights to scenic and solar access free of unreasonable obstructions; and
  - The proposed Improvement(s), if approved, will otherwise be consistent with the architectural and aesthetic standards prevailing within the Properties and with the overall plan and scheme of development of the Properties and the purposes of the Declaration or Restrictions.
  - If a property improvement is determined to cause a material adverse impact on the view from any adjoining lot, the ECC may condition its approval on a different position or location for the structure so long as topography, setbacks, tree preservation, and other factors are reasonably acceptable.

#### **B. CONSTRUCTION PLAN REQUIREMENTS:**

9. No Owner or resident shall alter or obstruct a natural drainage course, or materially add to the natural water volume of said drainage course without making adequate provisions with respect to neighboring Lots and the Common Area. Any such alterations, obstructions, or additions to water volume shall be considered a work of improvement that is subject to prior review and approval by the ECC & Tuolumne County Community Resource Agency.

#### C. PLOT PLAN REQUIREMENTS:

7. Show layout of dwelling and or other construction with the set back dimensions indicated. Set backs on a standard lot are: six (6) feet on the sidelines, fifteen (15) feet in the rear and twenty (20) feet in the front. On corner lots the two (2) street frontages both have a twenty (20) foot set back and the remaining sides that run with another lot are six (6) feet. Tuolumne Country may require larger setbacks in special circumstances, contact Community Development Department the County Community Resources Agency (209) 533-5633. Lake lot setbacks are located fifty (50) feet from the shoreline at a mean sea level of 2,550 feet (normal lake elevation). For lots located in Unit 5E, contact the ECC Coordinator for detailed information on front setbacks.

## D. ECC CONSTRUCTION RULES.

- 1). Proof of valid California State Contractors License and Bond. Inform ECC who the contractor or foreman is on the job.
- 2). Gate passes may be obtained from PML Administration or called in to PML Safety Department *at* (209) 962-8615 by the owner of record or his agent.
- 11). All signs must comply with Pine Mountain Lake Guidelines. Only one General Contractor Sign and one Lender Sign are subcontractor sign are permitted. Maximum size of sign is 12" x 18".

Conceptual review:

## F. MISCELLANEOUS INFORMATION:

#### Greenhouses

Submittal requirements include: Two (2) sets of illustrations or photos (as available), specifications, plot plan, detailed set of building plan to scale (as needed), and any other documentation required by the Declaration of Restrictions for Home Building in Pine Mountain Lake.

Greenhouses shall be a permanent structure with a foundation and shall meet the Tuolumne County building requirements and specifications. Greenhouses may stand-alone or be added to the existing house or other out building. The size shall be a minimum of one hundred (100) square feet with a maximum of two hundred (200) square feet. The maximum height of the greenhouse shall not exceed twelve (12) feet, with a minimum roof pitch of 2" rise per 12" run. The material used in the construction may be of wood and/or metal frame with glass, fiberglass and/or plastic windows. The color of the Greenhouse frame shall match the existing house. The windows shall be clear or white opaque.

Greenhouses shall be a permanent structure with a foundation and shall meet all Tuolumne County building requirements and specifications. Greenhouses may stand-alone or be added to the existing house or other out building. The maximum size shall be one hundred twenty (120) square feet. The maximum height of the greenhouse shall not exceed twelve (12) feet eight (8) feet., with a minimum roof pitch of 2" rise per 12" run. The material used in the construction may be of wood and/or metal frame with glass, fiberglass and/or plastic windows.

#### ADDRESS AND PROPERTY IDENTIFICATION

All residences in Pine Mountain Lake are required to have an Address, Unit and Lot identification number displayed. (Sec. 12.12.080 Tuolumne Co. "Display of Numbers") The minimum size of the numbers shall be three (3) four (4) inches high with a 3/8 ½ inch stroke. The maximum size of sign shall not exceed 720 square inches and be constructed of a permanent type of material. Total height of sign shall be a maximum of 72 inches. The sign must be visible from the street from both directions. Do not place the sign on a tree.

#### Changes to page 18

#### **DOCKS**

Dock shall not extend into lake more than twenty (20) feet from shoreline. *The high water line*. (Shoreline *High water line* is defined as 2,550 feet Mean Sea Level) Material shall be of a non-corrosive material or treated wood.

#### **DOG RUNS**

Maximum size permitted is 180 square feet and perimeters may be determined by necessity. The square footage of dog runs will be reviewed on an individual basis, recommended size is 180 square feet.

## **DRIVEWAY REQUIREMENTS**

If there is an existing dike, it may be cut down by half and used instead of dip. C.M.P. (corrugated metal pipe) will be a minimum of 12" (ideally 15") in diameter. sized to meet engineering specifications for water runoff.

#### **FILL DIRT**

It is the property owners' responsibility to check with the Tuolumne County Community Development Department (209) 533-5633 and/or Tuolumne County Public Works Department (209) 533-5601, if a permit is required. Community Resources Agency (209) 533-5633 if a permit is required.

#### **GRADING**

Permits may be required by the Tuolumne County Community Development Department Community Resources Agency (209) 533-5633 or the Tuolumne County Public Utility Department (209) 533-5601.

#### Changes to Page 21

#### LAKE SHORELINE IMPROVEMENTS

Any shoreline improvements must be approved by ECC and comply with Federal and State regulations and restrictions.

## Changes to page 23

#### SEA WALLS

Sea walls will be permitted for the purpose of controlling erosion problems that may exist between the lake and a lake frontage lot. The construction must comply with Federal and State restrictions and regulations. Written approval must be obtained from the Groveland Community Services District.

Submittals shall include scaled plans of wall with elevations, sections, materials, and dimensions. Plot plan shall include contours, elevations, showing shoreline MWL (mean water level) high water line and all easements, and property lines. Base of sea wall shall be located between the side property lines; the base being no lower then 2548 MSL (mean sea level) and the top no higher than 2,554 MSL. If property pins are missing, a state registered land surveyor shall locate the property corners. 2,551 foot elevation line between the two property lines.

## SIGNS, CONSTRUCTION

When construction has been finalized, by PMLA-ECC, construction sign shall be removed within five (5) days. construction signs shall be removed.

## Changes to page 25-26

#### WELLS

The construction of wells will be permitted subject to Tuolumne County approval for agricultural use only, and not for domestic, industrial, monitoring, observation or other agricultural purposes. "Agricultural Uses" shall be defined consistent with County Ordinance 1472, *Title 13* which defines "Agricultural Wells" as "wells used to supply water only for irrigation or other agricultural purposes".

#### DPA / DE:

The discharge of sanitary effluent into a DPA or changing the natural ingress or egress of flow is not permitted. (Ord. 1562 & 2 (part) 1987)) (Tuolumne Co. Title 13)

#### **DRAINAGE EASEMENT:**

A specific county easement reserved for drainage. The building on Drainage Easements or changing the natural ingress or egress of flow is not permitted. (Ord. 2117 & 1, (1995)) *Tuolumne Co. Title 16*)

## Fire and Wood Cutting Season

Yes, it is here! The firewood cutting season. Seems contradictory? We are in the peak of the fire season, but it is time to prepare for the fire place season. Time to start getting firewood cut and stacked, and still be cautious of the fire danger in the area.

All the tree work we have been doing this past year has made for a huge pile of timber, which is just waiting to be recycled, as firewood. We have a large stockpile of oak, cedar, and pine logs stacked at PML Compost area.

PML members can get a Wood Cutting Permit at the Maintenance Office for \$20. Call Susan at (209) 962-8612, for more information. This will give you permission to cut firewood for your personal use. The permit is not available for commercial use, nor is the firewood for sale or resale. The wood pile is open from 8AM to 4PM daily. Pine is free to the residents who will use it.

The PML Maintenance Staff will be cutting the pine logs into rounds up at the timber site. There is some oak and cedar available, and we will be dragging more timber into the site. The better burning hardwoods go fast, so does the cedar. The oak timber comes from downed trees in the greenbelts, they are not cut and harvested trees, so, the supply will vary through the seasons. The cedar timbers are stressed or dead trees from the greenbelts and road shoulder work in PML.

As we go through the fall and into winter, it is the time to plan on heavy tree work and tree removals in the greenbelts. This is the first of any and every 5-year plan for fire abatement. Remove the heavy branches and dead trees during the safer cooler seasons, when the trees are dormant, and the pests are less active. Private properties should look to the same

order in a fire abatement plan:

- 1) Remove the distressed and dead trees, thin the forest canopy
- 2) Remove the heavy brush by cutting, grinding, and removal
- 3) Remove or mulch the top layer of the forest floor duff of leaves and needles
- 4) Control the weeds and grasses
- 5) Herbicide spraying of trees and brush to control grow back
- 6) Place necessary erosion controls for soil
- 7) Start all over again

Properly clearing land will always save in the long-run when the entire components of the plan are executed well. Avoiding the clearing of the land to the bare dirt, which will correct a soil erosion problem and negate top soil depletion; a mulch layer will help the soils retain water and cool the soil temperatures during the hot and dry periods.

The continuing drought situation has rendered our terrain bone dry, the ground is hard, and the water content is gone. This depletion can be confronted by retaining top soil moisture and preventing soil erosion. Methods of storm water retention are a delicate balance. Drainage ditches can handle the heavy flows collected from hillside runoff, yet water needs to be able to saturate the soils. It will take a very wet rainy season for us to get our area back to normal, and with the drier hard soils, soil erosion will have to be constantly monitored.




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## **Bourbon Tasting at the Grill**

We will be trying a Bourbon tasting this month. In addition we also have a couple other important dates. Mark your calendars, Saturday October 4 the grill

and bar will be CLOSED at 3 pm for a private event. During this time we will not be serving any food after 3 pm. We will be open for regular business Sunday Morning at 8am.

Saturday October 11 we will be hosting a Beer Tasting Lunch from 1 pm until 3 pm. Come join us for a lunch buffet and taste beers from Gordon Biersch Brewery.

Thursday October 16 we will be having a Bourbon Tasting Dinner from 5 pm until 7 pm. I was searching the internet to give you some more information on how to taste bourbon and here is what I found on the Kentucky Distillers Association website:

# HOW TO TASTE KENTUCKY BOURBON - From the Kentucky Distillers Association Website

1 Bourbon has a wide range of aromas

- and flavors. Keep these in mind as you sample:
- Sweet aromatic flavors, such as vanilla, caramel, honey and butterscotch
- Fruit and floral flavors, such as apple, pear, dark fruit (figs, raisins, dates), citrus and rose
- Spice flavors, including black pepper, tobacco leaf, nutmeg, clove and cinnamon
- Wood flavors, such as oak, cedar, pine, almonds and pecans
- Grain flavors, such as corn, malt and rye

No single Bourbon features all of these flavors – so concentrate and see what you can discern.

- 2 Setting up a tasting is easy. All you need is glassware, some pure water and, of course, Bourbon. Try to use tulip-stemmed nosing glasses (if they're available) or a rocks glass. Always have a glass of water and salt-free crackers on hand to refresh your palate between sips. You'll be sampling Bourbon at full-strength, so the last point is important. Fill each glass with one ounce of Bourbon and you're ready to go.
- **3** You'll evaluate each Bourbon on four attributes appearance, aroma, taste and

aftertaste/finish.

- Appearance: The appearance of bourbon can be used to evaluate its level of maturation.
   Color is visible proof that it is matured in new, charred barrels that rest in open-rick warehouses.
- Aroma: Swirl the glass 2 or 3 times and then take 3 short sniffs. (Avoid taking long sniffs as this can be overwhelming.) You should be able to identify a number of different aromas in your glass of Bourbon.
- Taste and Aftertaste: You'll next judge taste and aftertaste (the finish) in a two-step process. First take a small sip, swish it around the mouth for a few seconds and then swallow. How does it affect the palate? Does it explode in a cascade of flavor or does it just affect a limited portion of the palate? Taste again and judge the finish. Is it short or long? Is it dry or oily? Is it warm and pleasant or hot and irritating?
- 4 At this step, the tasting is officially overbut you might find it hard to stop. Always remember to enjoy your Kentucky Bourbon in moderation and responsibly.

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
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



# Southern Tuolumne County Historical Society Museum Happenings

There are two upcoming STCHS events in October you won't want to miss. We invite you to our annual 'Living History Day' on October 4 from 10 am to 2 pm in the Museum parking lot area. This gives kids and adults a chance to learn about pioneer activities by watching and actively participating. Then on Saturday, October 18 at 7 pm in the Community Hall, Harold Basey will be

sharing his vast knowledge about squirrels. It's a free program and everyone is invited.

The deluge of holiday catalogs has begun to hit mailboxes so we'd like to remind all of you cybershoppers how you can support the Museum while doing your holiday gift buying online. If you go to <a href="http://www.ShopForMuseums.com">http://www.ShopForMuseums.com</a> first, STCHS can earn free donations for your purchases from hundreds of retailers like Macy's and KOHL'S and many others.

Last month's historic downtown Groveland building was the Hetch Hetchy Hospital located north of what is now Mary Laveroni Park. It was built by the City and County of San Francisco and opened in December 1918. Doctors were on call 24 hours a day to handle medical emergencies for workers on the Hetch Hetchy project. Tracks ran just below the hospital building and special railroad ambulances traveled to and from the project work camps.

People living in the Groveland and Big Oak Flat area also benefited, no longer needing to make the long trip to Sonora for emergency medical care or hospitalization.

Dr. John P. Degnan, born in Yosemite Valley, was in charge of the Groveland Hetch Hetchy Hospital from April 1921 until 1934. He worked around the clock dealing with everything from worker's injuries to the delivery of babies. His caring manner and



medical expertise led him to be called "one of the finest medical men in California".

Our own noted County Historian, Carlo De Ferrari was born in the Groveland Hetch Hetchy Hospital on June 10, 1923. Doc Degnan however missed the birth, being out on another call.

On July 27, 1922 an early morning fire destroyed the building but all 30 patients had safely been moved. A temporary hospital was set up next door in the Hetch Hetchy Club House while workmen constructed a new one-story 75-bed hospital building.

The Raker Act required the hospital building be dismantled upon completion of the Hetch Hetchy Project. Today you can visit the hospital site by crossing the footbridge over Garrote Creek on the north side of the park.

Although the hospital building is gone, Boise Cascade honored the memory of Doc Degnan by naming a street in the Pine Mountain Lake development Jonny Degnan Court.

I do receive 'thank you' notes from some of them. Some units have their own little distribution center, where they will sort out the incoming products, then soldiers can come and get what they want or need.


Thank you everyone for your support, it is needed and appreciated, keep bringing your items into Helping Hands store and they will keep going to our troops so far away from home.

## VILLAGE PROJECT Community Meeting Date Scheduled



October 13, 2014 to update the community on the "Village" project and to solicit community participation in defining the services that the Village will provide.

## Water, Fire, Trees

When you read this article it will be October and perhaps we will have experienced our first sprinkle of rain. The long, hot dry spell has been on everyone's mind and you can't pick up a newspaper anywhere without finding something about the drought or water use.

Through research and reading, I have come to the conclusion that I am not alone in thinking that there is no easy or quick solution to such a complex and compelling problem. Mother Nature is most certainly in control on this issue.

During the drought in the early seventies, we chose to pretty much turn our backs and ignore the matter. Then in October of 1977 it started raining across most of Tuolumne County and the rain didn't stop until late May 1978. Seven months of rain. As a result, the Groveland area received nearly 70 inches of rain followed by above seasonal rainfall for a number of years.

With what we have learned from this drought, I believe we can do a better job to address the problem. As an example, Southern California, with one of the most diverse water supplies in the nation, has used technology in some of its districts that has allowed them to show little effect of the drought on its customers. Wastewater reuse has created additional storage and work continues on desalination opportunities.

So what can help our part of the woods? We must continue to conserve even when all of our storage systems are full and we must persist in monitoring careful use of what we store knowing that the next drought could be just a year away. We must support our water agencies in developing plans for new storage or in planning, expanding and making improvements to existing storage and conveyance systems. This will help insure that water is there when we turn on the tap. We must understand that there will be a cost to solving the many facets of this water issue. I am not saying that we should take a blank check approach as balance is always needed; just don't lose sight of the goal.

Speaking of water, Tuolumne County's Resource Legacy is co-sponsoring an upcoming conference on various water issues. This conference will be held at the Evergreen Lodge east of Groveland on November 3-6, 2014.

This unique conference will focus on integrated water reuse and low impact development techniques for storm water, grey water and black water, as well as reviewing the California Water Reuse Policy. Water shed management seminars

will cover design and management and will be coupled with the focus on systems under construction. Tours will provide "hands-on" participation. For additional information please contact the Tuolumne County Environmental Health Director, Rob Kostlivey at 209-533-5683.

Last month I mentioned the Record of Decision for the Rim Fire Recovery Project. As was expected, an environmental group called the Center for Biological Diversity, et al. filed a lawsuit against the U.S. Forest Service to stop this recovery project from going forward.

It took the Forest Service a year to come to the decision for the Rim Fire Recovery Project. Sounds like a long time doesn't it? But, considering the complexity of the job, it was very quick in government time. Waiting any longer to start the timber salvage process will result in loss of value in the trees and prevent planned reductions in fire fuels.

On September 9, 2014 the Tuolumne County Board of Supervisors voted to intervene in the lawsuit.

The County joined a coalition formed by the American Forest Resource Council and other parties which include the California Farm Bureau, the California Forestry Association, the Crook Family, Sierra Pacific Industries and Yosemite Stanislaus Solutions. By intervening as defendants, the County seeks to support the Recovery Project in the hope that the Federal Court will allow the project to proceed in its entirety. Waiting will allow the trees to rot on the stump providing little economic value plus increase fire fuels. Blocking the ability to care and maintain this natural resource will come at great cost to the mountain and foothill communities.

In closing, I want all to be assured that Tuolumne County has taken an active, aggressive role on the drought and Rim Fire. Without a positive and forwarding moving plan on both issues we invite the potential for disastrous results for our residents.

Support the efforts of those who are working to better our communities during these difficult times. Contribute your thoughts and views that will help us improve the quality of life that our residents enjoy.


Lt.Cmdr. Michael Scuro is no stranger to many of us here in PML. Now that he is retired he and his wife Judy spend the summer here and then return to their home in Palm Springs.

His introduction to aviation came through building model airplanes with the guidance of his father. He became involved in model airplane competitions around the country that led him to several National awards.

During his college days he was in the Naval ROTC and

upon graduation he received his commission as Ensign, UNSR and then went on to flight school in Pennsicola, Florida. He received his wings in 1968 flying helicopters. He was then assigned to Helicopter Anti Submarine Squadron 6 in San Diego, CA. flying the Sykorski SH-3B missions. From San Diego the squadron was sent to the Western Pacific in 1969 to conduct search and rescue missions. From there the squadron was diverted to Yankee Station off the coast of Vietnam to perform the same type missions. The squadron received numerous awards for the missions.

In Dec. of 1970 LCDR Scuro was selected to be part of the Recovery Team for the Apollo 14 Mission headed by Alan Sheppard.

While co-piloting NW492, also known as Swim 1, they deployed members of the Navy Seals to attach the flotation devices and other apparatus to secure the Command Module and extract the Astronauts. During his presentation he gave many details that occurred during the recovery mission. If there is ever a time that you hear LCDR Scuro is going to speak make time to go hear his presentation. You will get all the inside information on the Apollo 14 mission.

LCDR. Scuro left active duty in 1971 after serving for 23 years in the Navy. After leaving the Navy he worked in the education field. He received his Masters Degree in Education and taught in several high schools in California.

### **Emergency Notification System**

We are formally announcing Everbridge, our new Emergency Notification Software. This new system offers much more than our previous system in abilities and redundancy. With that said, we are working on getting the word out with hopes that individuals will self-register. Voluntary registration into the system allows the user to offer personal information such as their cell phone numbers and email as well as choose the priority in which the notifications will be delivered to them. The system allows for up to 25 different modes of communication. The system even allows for an individual to list several locations in which they can receive notifications (ie. home, daycare, schools, work, etc.). It is very important that each data field is filled out when registering,

and that the address is verified during the process.

Additionally, you do not have to be a resident to register. The system allows for those who live outside the area but have family or own property in Tuolumne County. The system allows registrants to enter an address in the system so that they can be notified if that address falls within a designated area of a notification.

With that said, we are hoping that you will share this information with family, friends, and neighbors.

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### Suicide - NOT THE ONLY OPTION

On August 12, 2014 the world received a News Bulletin, "Robin Williams was found dead at his home." Later it was revealed that he had committed suicide. It became the talk of the country; "Why would he do such a thing? He had everything, fame, money, family and a world of friends." What would prompt a man to take his life when it appeared he had everything that many people wish they had.

During previous interviews with Oprah Winfrey and other talk show hosts and reporters Mr. Williams reported that he has had a long bout with alcohol, drugs and depression. His genius wit and frantic comedy style masked his anxiety, feelings of insecurity and his mental illness.

Suicide has been used since the beginning of recorded time, as we know it. Approximately 1,000,000 people world wide commit suicide each year. Ten to 20 million attempt it each year. Suicide is the 8th leading cause of death in the United States. For every 2 people killed by homicide, 3 people die of suicide.

Depression is thought to be the major risk factor for most suicide deaths. Suicide rates tend to reflect economic conditions. They appear to decrease in times of prosperity but increase during economic depression. Many other circumstances can trigger suicide thoughts and actions such as: breakup of a romantic relationship, loss of a loved one, isolation, abandonment or rejection, major physical injury or disease, etc. Many famous, talented people have committed suicide: Sigmund Freud, Vincent van Gogh, Jack London, Ernest Hemmingway, Phillip

Seymour Hoffman, to name a few.

Many people have admitted to having suicidal thoughts. In an effort to cope with these thoughts is to TALK to someone, be it a doctor, a counselor/therapist, or a spiritual advisor, a person you feel comfortable telling or call the 24 hour mental –health crisis center. TALKING ABOUT YOUR FEELINGS REALLY HELPS.

Some factors that may increase suicide risk are: 1. Gender – more women attempt suicide but more men complete suicide. 2. Age – Previously the elderly and the young were the highest, but now 85+ is highest and between 45 – 64 years old is 2nd highest group. 3. Race – suicide is the 2nd leading cause of death among whites. 4. Mental Illness – depression, eating disorders, bipolar, schizophrenia, anxiety and Post Traumatic Stress Disorder. 5. Chronic Health Problems – terminal illness. 6. Sleep problems - older adults 75+.

When asked, "Do you really want to end your life or do you just want to end the pain you are feeling?" The answer is almost always, "I want to end the pain." When that is the answer there is hope because there are other options that can be explored to resolve the issues that are causing the person to think that suicide is the only solution.

#### Gut Health & Your Immune System

There is a lot in the media promoting probiotics for gut health. Is it real or hype, as usual it's a bit of both. The big message is that our gut health is super important and effects not only how we digest food but how we are able to defend our systems against the world around us.

70% of our immune system is found in our gut. What does this mean? Our large intestines are inhabited by trillions of bacteria referred to as probiotics (pro=encouraging, biotic=life). These probiotics are introduced into our systems during the birth process and play a crucial role in our health. Without probiotics, humans would be extremely vulnerable to food borne illnesses, deficient to key nutrients and vitamins and have a weaker immune system.

Our gut flora (probiotic) is like the gatekeeper. It communicates with our immune system to take action when bad bacteria tries to cross its boarders. When there is a deficiency in our good intestinal flora there are gaps in our defenses resulting in a cascade of events that effect our whole being. Diseases associated with inflammation, allergies, fatigue, bowel irritability, insulin sensitivity, and poor absorption of nutrients to name a few.

Our diet affects how well we can support this healthy gut flora. A diet high in sugar, fat and processed foods prevents them from growing and thriving. And no surprise, consuming a diet high in fiber and whole foods creates an environment that promotes the growth of probiotics.

Beyond a diet high in fiber and whole foods we must also listen to our own gut to know what foods we are "happy" with. You can be your own investigator by cutting food groups out of your diet and see how you feel. Your gut will let you know, pay attention. Also, antibiotics kill off the bad bacteria along with the good bacteria. Supplemental probiotics become important when on antibiotics or if we need a boost in our natural gut health.

We can reinforce our defenses by supplementing our diet with probiotics. Commercial yogurts and kefers boast high levels of probiotics. Unfortunately consumer groups show much lower levels than advertised once the product sits on the stores shelves. For this reason, taking a high quality probiotic supplement is the best way to guarantee maximum health benefits.

Another great option for supporting probiotic levels is to learn to make your own yogurt, kefir, sauerkraut and other fermented vegetables. Interestingly most cultures have some form of fermented vegetable in their daily diet, except Americans. (There is usually a good reason for the development of traditions.)

So, whether you decide to take a daily probiotic or learn to make sauerkraut, along with cleaning up your diet, your gut and your immune system will thank you.



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
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### Pine Needlers Quilt Guild

### **GCSD Promotes Water Conservation**

Once again the leaky faucet display was the most popular activity at the GCSD Water Conservation Booth. One young lady suggested she had seen the likes of a leaky faucet demonstration at the California State Fair. When I asked whose display was better, she contemplated for a moment. I further inquired, "Did theirs work; was it operating with a real dripping leak?" She replied, "No, it didn't, so....that makes yours better." From that testimony I proclaim, here and now, that GCSD's water conservation effort is more impressive than that of the entire California State Fair!

Passerby's got a chance to win a free low-flow showerhead. First they observed how much water had leaked from the dripping faucet into a large jar. Then we told them how long the faucet had been dripping for. The challenge was to ascertain how many gallons this tiny leak wastes in a year. Rather than just guess, most contestants did the arithmetic. A most charming young girl came to play and thoughtfully devised her mathematical computation. She was a master of multiplication but still learning long division. She kept going back and forth to her parents, as well as inquiring with us as to whether or not her procedure was correct. After some time and quite a few round trips to her parents' picnic table, she had arrived at a reasonable estimate. She came close to winning the competition.

About 20 people entered the raffle. At the end of the BBQ, 2 highly distinguished scientists determined the official annual water loss from the barely leaking faucet. After 4 1/2 hours had elapsed, a little over 1 gallon had leaked into the glass jar. The annual volume came out to 2137 gallons! Remarkably, most contestants got pretty close to the right answer. Coincidentally, Benjamin, Pat, and Bruce all guessed 2190 gallons, for a 3-way tie for the prize.

After some debate, GCSD Board President Bob Swan convinced the Board quorum that all three winners should be individually awarded a low-flow showerhead, rather than try to convince these perfect strangers to share a single low-flow shower together. GCSD does, however, encourage those more intimate with each other to share a shower.

At the booth, we also promoted the Rebates, where customers can get a \$100 rebate after the




Directors Bruce Carter and Bob Swan at GCSD's Water Conservation Booth

purchase of a low-flow toilet (1.6 gallons per flush or less) or \$20 after buying a low-flow showerhead (1.5 gallons per minute or less). We found several visitors to the booth had already taken advantage of the program. However, we also had some new takers.

GCSD is disseminating mounds of advice and know-how from experts on how to conserve water. We organized this information in pamphlet handouts that were available at the booth. The same information is also available on our website, GCSD. org. It's about how to conserve water inside homes and on landscaping outside. We have information on:

• Rebates on Toilets and Showerheads, sponsored by GCSD



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- Greywater Re-use (from clothes washing machines & other fixtures)
- How to read your Water Meter (Illustrated)

GCSD's water conservation committee has adopted a slogan suggested by Bob Asquith – "Every Drop Counts, Can We Count on You?" Once you put your mind to it, you will find both simple and clever ways to save water. Even more so, you can have abundance by using water efficiently, by re-using it through greywater irrigation, and by catching and storing rainwater. However you do it, we appreciate helping GCSD live up to our slogan because our community is under California State mandate to permanently reduce water consumption by 20%.



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### PML ACTION HEROES: Jerry & Paula Baker

The perfect secluded lake front home came on the market in 1998; Jerry and Paula Baker bought it with plans to retire. Three years, business travel and many renovations later, concept became reality and they moved from San Jose to Pine Mountain Lake. PML was a favorite get away for years with friends and rented homes on the lake. The beautiful vistas, diversity of the area and the people kept them coming back. These Bay Area California natives love the Sierras, honeymooning in Yosemite.

Jerry worked in the semiconductor industry, which gave the Bay Area its Silicon Valley nickname. Jerry loves technology and launched his career at National Semiconductor. At the time the industry was in its infancy. By today's standards NSC was a little company but was doubling in revenue every year. Jerry began creating test programs for digital semiconductors and later moved into product management. He soon became known at NSC as a turnaround artist bringing failing businesses back to life. In 1997 Jerry participated in the managementled buyout of a portion of NSC that led to the rebirth of Fairchild Semiconductor.

Paula's career started in Silicon Valley's tech business later moving to a more important full-time job with no days off and no vacations, as a stay-at-home mom. With two sons, her role at home was vital when their youngest son was diagnosed with a brain tumor. Five surgeries over five years. Many nights sleeping in the hospital bed

Jerry didn't think of himself as a workaholic; he was just busy. On the phone with Europe at 7:00am and with Asia at 7:00pm; going full speed in between "you either go 100mph or you get out." He traveled extensively managing semiconductor operations around the globe. In 2000 one of their best friends was diagnosed with terminal cancer. Decision point. Time to execute those retirement plans. In 2001, Jerry and Paula were making their farewell tour of all the factories in Asia. On 9/11 they struggled to get on a flight back home; it was the second international flight to land in the U.S. Home at PML was more inviting than ever.

They had a lot of energy left, retiring at 50. There was money in the bank from savings and success of Fairchild Semiconductor. First thought was to help people in Asia but distance made it difficult. Doing something for the



special needs community seemed like a great use of their energy.

A fully-accessible family camp in the woods began to blossom when they found a great piece of property in

Long Gulch. In 2002, they started making plans, sketches and county design reviews. This was all new to them; their plans went to the Land Use Committee and was REJECTED! Now what?

Even more determined, they found another piece of property, wrapped by National Forest. It took two more years of permits, land use battles, elderberry beetle reports, bureaucracy, analysis, Native American history, accessibility, great grey owl studies, fire safety, plans and more plans. Tuolumne Trails finally broke ground in the fall of 2005!

This was to be a camp for kids with special medical needs. It provides the simple pleases of camping for special people; swimming, roasting marshmallows, fishing, star gazing, hiking and all the things camp is about. It accommodates all kinds of special needs, fully accessible and didn't look or feel like a hospital.

There was a large dose of faith involved.

"Will they come?" The county kept throwing out hurdles, "will they ever approve it?" June 2008 was the final show down. Families were on their way and with a bit of negotiating and a few last minute changes, it finally all came together.

Today, there are hundreds of wonderful camp stories of special families with Cerebral Palsy, Muscular Dystrophy, Downs Syndrome or other medical conditions. Heidi, a mom wanted to go camping with her kids but couldn't find a place to accommodate their family. One of their children, Noah has Cerebral Palsy. Cerebral Palsy can affect "output", among other things. On-the-outside kids maybe twisted-up and non-verbal but on-the-inside they are very aware of what's going on. Heidi, Noah and the family joined the 2008 opening along with other families; they had the time of their lives and have returned every year since.

Tuolumne Trails was built for special kids. It has grown to support other special needs, physical or mental, child or adult, afflicted or supporting family, civilian or veteran. The special needs community deals with extreme challenges every day. As a society we have become better at dealing with people's medical needs; Tuolumne Trails is different, supporting social needs of those with disabilities, their families and caregivers.

Paula and Jerry Baker are Tuolumne Trails Action Heroes helping over 1000 special campers enjoy simple Sierra pleasure every year.

- ☐ Did you contact the Contractors State License Board (CSLB) to check the status of the contractor's license? Contact the CSLB at 1-800-321-CSLB (2752) or visit their Web site: www.cslb.ca.gov.
- ☐ Did you get at least three local references from the contractors you are considering?
- Did you call them and see the work the contractor completed?

#### **CHECK OUT THE CONTRACT**

- Did you read and do you understand your contract?
- □ Does the 3-day right to cancel a contract apply to you?
- work will start and end?
- Does the contract include a detailed description of the work to be done, the material to be used, and equipment to

- be installed? This description should include a plan and scale drawing showing the shape, size, dimensions and specifications. It should include brand names, model numbers, quantities and colors. Specific descriptions now will prevent disputes later.
- ☐ Are you required to pay a down payment? If you are, the down payment should never be more than 10% of the contract price or \$1,000, whichever is less.
- ☐ Is there a schedule of payments? If there is, you should pay only as work is completed and not before.
- ☐ Did your contractor give you a "Notice to Owner," a warning notice describing liens and ways to prevent them? Even if you pay your contractor, a lien can be placed on your home by unpaid laborers, subcontractors, or material suppliers. A lien can result in you paying twice or, in some cases, losing your home in a foreclosure. Also check the "Notice to Owner" for ways to protect yourself.
- □ Does the contract tell you when □ Did you know changes or additions to your contract must all be in writing?
  - Putting changes in writing reduces the possibility of a later dispute.
