It's April and that means spring time in the mountains. Spring in the mountains is probably the most beautiful the mountains can be considering the colorful flowers, green fields and perhaps a little bit of snow remaining on the mountains. A number of important issues will come to head this spring. In the next few months we should have some final answers for a number of very important and very time consuming problems.

The current status of the two actions brought against the Association by our former General Manager, namely the arbitration of his termination and the lawsuit brought against the Association and directors are both nearing completion. It is inappropriate to discuss these matters in detail until they are completed and we are nearing that completion. Let it just be said that we have always maintained that these actions are based on complaints which are unfounded and we are just as confident now as we have been in the past that they will conclude in favor of the Association and the Directors.

We have just recently received information which is very promising regarding dredging. Hopefully by the time you read RESIDENT'S MESSAGE

this the Department of Fish and Game will have approved our request to dredge and it will move forward to the County for consideration in the permit process. We had no idea that this simple project could be held up for so long and involve two years worth of (red tape) delays. We had started developing an alternative plan which would not be quite as good but now it seems we will move forward with the original plan. And yes, it has become more expensive. Delays nearly always increase the overall cost, but in this case, the need to dredge is painfully obvious and must be done.

For about ten years wake-boarding and knee-boarding have been allowed on Pine Mountain Lake. This is in addition to waterskiing, which has been allowed since the Lake was filled. For nearly as long as wake-boarding and knee-boarding have been allowed, complaints about the large wakes they produce have followed. As the popularity of wake-boarding and knee-boarding has increased, so have the complaints. Many meetings have been held between various user groups and also between the groups and Board Members without much progress being made in finding a solution. Many efforts have been discussed and some implemented which would reduce the size of the wakes but, in spite of those efforts, complaints continue to increase. The problem has finally reached the point at which a petition has been presented to the board to eliminate wake boarding and knee boarding. This is a very emotional issue as it affects some of the very reasons folks have invested in this community. There is no question

that wake-boarding and knee-boarding are very enjoyable and an activity which is super for youngsters. On the other hand, should nearly all other users of the Lake be frustrated in their use of the Lake by large wakes? The Lake is just too small for the large wakes produced by such an activity.

The current Board as well as previous Boards spent enormous amounts of time dealing with the problem. It is the conclusion of this Board that the original concept of allowing water skiing only should continue and that activities which produce large wakes should not be allowed. The current proposed amendment to the Lake rules is printed in this issue. Our Bylaws and State law require the current proposal to be published no less than 30 days before being voted on by the Board. This means it cannot be voted on until the May meeting. We expect whichever way the rules may change, the rules will be challenged. Our Bylaws and State law allow such a challenge and they both contain specific requirements which must be followed. If a proper challenge occurs, one option is to poll the membership by mailed ballot and the Board has already agreed that a mailed ballot will be utilized. It is very likely that this issue will ultimately be decided by a vote of the entire membership.

In closing, it's time to do your spring cleaning, get rid of all that stuff that has been collecting all winter, break out the fishing poles, golf clubs, tennis racquets, sun tan lotion, etc. etc. and enjoy the warmer weather which is just around the corner.

Administration Office Tree Removal

You may notice some areas are a little more bare than usual around the Administration Office and parking lot. We were concerned with the health of the trees and brought in our arborist to inspect them. Based on the advice of our professional we removed three Monterey pines due to bark beetle infestation. It looks like we were able to catch the infestation before neighboring trees were impacted. We are reviewing appropriate trees for replacement and anticipate replacing them within the next two months.

Record Monthly Financial Close

I would like to congratulate our Controller, Ken Spencer, and his staff for completing the monthly financials within six days this month. I believe this is an Association record. Well done!

Annual Report

The annual report has been reviewed by the Audit Committee. Final revisions are being prepared by Gary Porter of Porter & Company, our CPA Auditing firm. We plan on publishing the report and distributing it to property owners in the April edition of the PML News and on the PML Website.

Point of Sale Software Update

The first update to the Country Club and Pro Shop software program was updated on Tuesday March 11 and the final update to the latest version is scheduled for May 12.

New Computers Installed

All of the new computers that were budgeted and funded for 2008 have been purchased and installed. The older usable

with new software and placed in other PML departments. We have seen a noticeable improvement in speed and service in all areas due to the purchase.

Fence Replacement

The split-rail fence located at the entrance to PML all the way to the Administration parking lot is in a state of deterioration and is budgeted for replacement this year. Our Maintenance Department plans to start the fence replacement in April and we anticipate the project only taking one week to complete.

Big Creek Bridge Inspection

There was some concern regarding the structural integrity of the Big Creek Bridge on PML Drive due to its age. On March 5th we had it inspected by a licensed civil engineer and his report indicated that it is in excellent condition and substantially the same as it was in 1971. They also made some recommendations on continued maintenance for our roads crew that will be implemented to ensure the on-going lifespan of the structure.

Street Light at the Intersection of Ferretti and PML Drive

We received a request from a property owner to install a street light at the intersection of Ferretti Road and Pine Mountain Drive near Gate # 8. We are working with the County and PG&E to determine easement ownership and possible placement of a light. We may be required to petition the County for the placement of the light, they would then ask PG&E to place and maintain the street light. Once we have made a determination as to responsibility, ownership and cost, we will make a recommendation to the Board.

PML Restaurant Survey

We continue to receive positive responses to our Restaurant Survey. For those members that have not taken the survey, we encourage you to do so as soon as possible. The survey is available online at the PML Website at www. pinemountainlake.com and we have provided a computer for our members at the Country Club so that they can conveniently access the survey there. 

OPPOSITION TO NEW BOATING REGS

e are opposing the new boating regulations for water-skiing and now the banning of wakeboards. We are non residents primarily at PML on weekends. We are bothered by the reduced times for waterskiing especially on the weekends. Our family is on the beaches every weekend in the summer supporting all PML amenities and local businesses.

The non residents contribute to the community and are usually younger families who enjoy water sports and other amenities. We pay the same amount of homeowners' fees but get no extra benefits. Why can't the hours for waterskiing be extended on the weekends and reduced on weekdays?

We also feel the banning of wakeboard and knee boarding without a vote from all property owners is unfair. For property owners complaining of the damage of their property from the wakes, they knew fast boat activity was allowed when they bought their property. If we ban a popular activity for a few homeowners who are complaining about the damage does that mean that we should ban other activities? Should we reduce the hours of golfing so golf course homes have less of a risk of property damage from stray golf balls? Or ban the 4th of July fireworks because it's too loud for some?

I hope the Board comes to the realization that the more amenities offered for everyone makes PML a more desirable place which is beneficial to maintaining our home values in this slumping market.

SINGLING OUT WAKEBOARDERS

I have the following concerns:

1) The proposal singles out wakeboarding and knee-boarding. If the proposal eliminated all motor boats, I could understand it. I wouldn't agree with it, but if that is what the majority of people wanted, than I could accept it. But this is not the case; it is specifically singling out wakeboarding and knee-boarding. When waterskiing there are circumstances that create large wakes (pulling a child or beginner, picking up a fallen skier, etc). I am NOT in favor of banning waterskiing. However, I don't agree with selectively limiting activities.

2) Motorized boats already have limited times. In addition wakeboarding is only a percentage of this time. Shouldn't this be a compromise in itself? I'm sure there are folks that would appreciate wakeboarding all day. In addition, is there more room for compromise? Changing the amount of boats to 3 instead of 4 during a time slot? This is not my preference, but I want to leave room for other options.

3) Property values will drop if wake boarding is eliminated. I read that over 50% of people between the ages of 25-40 wakeboard, when given the choice between skiing or boarding. Additionally, the number is closer to 75% for individuals 25 and younger. These individuals will have the purchasing power soon. If PML is known as a non-boarding lake, it will eventually affect the buying decisions & in tern our property values.

My family and I are against selectively choosing who can enjoy the lake.

Notice to all PMLA Members

The following proposed Board resolution is an amendment to Resolution # 05.01 PMLA Boating and Lake Rules. The purpose of the rules change is to update the text of the previous rules for grammar and clarification of safety issues, to increase the use time for water skiers and to mitigate the impact of large, destructive wakes. The effect of the rules changes impact hours of use of the Lake, what can be used on the Lake and other policy changes. The main effect and change in this draft is the discontinuation of wakeboard and kneeboard devices on the Lake and the increase of use time for water skiing in the evening. This draft was discussed at the January, February and March monthly Board meetings. This published draft will also be discussed at the April 19, 2008 monthly Board meeting at the PML Lake Lodge. The meeting starts at 9 a.m. and all members are welcome to attend.

Resolution 05.01 April 16, 2005 Amended: July 21, 2007

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PMLA BOATING AND LAKE RULES Draft March 15, 2008

For your safety, California Boating Laws prevail. For your convenience, copies of the pamphlet "ABC's of California Boating Laws", published by the California Harbors and Watercraft are available at the Marina Store.

Listed below are further regulations that apply to Pine Mountain Lake boating usage. Failure to comply with them shall be grounds for termination of your privileges. Violations are subject to citation. All boats are subject to inspection to determine compliance with State Law and Association requirements. If you have any questions on the safety requirements of your boat, contact a Boat Patrol Officer or the Marina Store staff.

GENERAL BOATING RULES

Know our rules and abide by them for your enjoyment and safety.

All boats on Pine Mountain Lake must meet both State of California and Pine Mountain Lake registration requirements. Only property owners in good standing may register their boats.

REGISTRATION: Requirements for registration include: current liability insurance with a minimum of \$300,000, proof of PML residency, proof that the boat meets California Boating Law safety requirements, compliance with PML non-wake enhancing requirements, and agreement to abide by lake rules.

PML non-wake enhancing regulations restrict the use of internal ballast tanks, external fins, foils, panels, or boat hulls specifically designed to increase wakes. Any boats incorporating these devices, registered at PML must adhere to PML's restrictions on not utilizing these devices. All boats are limited to 5 mph except during water skiing hours, where the speed limit is 40 mph in the ski area only. All boats, except those signed up for skiing, must stay out of the ski area while skiing is in progress. Skiing or other high-speed boating activity is permitted during designated hours from May 1 thru October 31 only.

Open stack boats and others with a decibel level exceeding 82 db are prohibited. Likewise, radios or stereos may not be played at high volume.

Note that areas marked "no wake" mean <u>no wake</u>. These areas are marked with white buoys that say "No Wake". Boats may have to go slower than 5 mph in order not to create any wake.

NO "Jet Skis", "Wave runners" or other similar variations of personal watercraft are allowed on Pine Mountain Lake (except authorized emergency or law enforcement equipment).

Only skippers (16 years and older with a valid driver's license) designated by a boat owner may operate a powerboat, provided that they know the lake and marina rules. Boat owners are responsible for informing their operators of all lake and marina rules.

Boat owners are responsible for the operation of their boats and the wakes they create regardless of who may be operating the boat.

Reckless operation and disregard for others may result in citation and forfeiture of lake boating privileges.

Boaters must stay inside the passenger/ operator areas of the boat. Riding outside of the railing or gate is prohibited.

Powerboat operators may not tow or pull rafts, tubes, *wakeboards, knee boards,* paddleboats, kayaks, canoes or similar craft. In case of an accident, give any necessary assistance, then immediately contact the Boat Patrol (based at the Marina).

Sufficient life preservers must be aboard for each passenger. All boaters less than 12 years of age and non-swimmers must wear properly tied life jackets.

Give a wide berth to sail and manually operated boats, as they have the right of way.

Powerboats may not be operated within 50 feet of a swimming area.

When meeting another boat, keep to the right.

Individuals wishing to blow out their motors may do so during high-speed boating hours and must first check-in with the Boat Patrol. Blow-outs will be limited to two (2) times around the ski pattern and must adhere to all high-speed boating rules. A maximum of 4 boats are allowed in the highspeed lane with skiers/boarders given priority over boats wishing to blow out their motor. No engine blowouts will be allowed between 6:00 PM and 8:00 PM.

Every effort shall be made to **minimize wakes**, especially those affecting shoreline properties.

All lake activity is suspended when CDF helicopters perform firefighting procedures or during other emergencies that require use of lake water.

The Boat Patrol will be in effect daily. Citations may be given for PML rule infractions. Two citations will constitute action for removing your boat from Pine Mountain Lake for the remainder of the season. Any boating or swimming rule may be changed in an emergency based on input from PML management, Safety Dept., Sheriff's Dept. or other appropriate agency. BOAT LAUNCHING & REMOVAL DATES

NO BOAT MAY BE LAUNCHED without current Pine Mountain Lake registration.

BOAT LAUNCHING AND REMOVAL is allowed only at the Marina boat ramp.

ALL BOATS NOT REMOVED from Dunn Court and the Marina area by October 31st of each year will be removed and stored AT THE OWNER'S EXPENSE.

NO TRAILER PARKING permitted, except for daily use, and only in designated areas. No trailer parking will be permitted the date of the Independence Day fireworks celebration.

DUNN COURT SAILBOAT OWNERS: Please relocate your sailboat the day before the annual fireworks display. This date may vary from year to year.

WATER SKIING AND WAKEBOARDING RULES

Homeowners wishing to register a ski or wake boat for the first time on PML will be given a tour of the lake and have these regulations and the PML Water-ski and Wakeboard Club's Good Neighbor Rules explained. This tour will be conducted monthly by the PML Boat Patrol, assisted by the PML WWC and must be completed before the homeowner may sign up for ski/wakeboard times at PML. Copies of the *Lake and Boating Rules* and the Good Neighbor Rules will be available to all boaters at the Marina. Wakeboarding and kneeboarding are not permitted. Marina staff are the final authority on other activities that are not permitted.

Skiing and wakeboarding will be on a one-hour session, reservation basis. High-speed boating hours are generally as follows:

On the Monday associated with the 3 three-day holiday weekends, wakeboarding will start at 4:00 PM. High-speed boating activities, wakeboarding or skiing, in the 9 AM to 12PM hours are not defined and will be worked out between the Marina Manager and the PML WWC.

<u>State law prohibits the towing of water</u> <u>skiers from sunset to sunrise.</u>

<u>Water</u> skiing and wakeboarding are <u>is</u> prohibited November 1 through April 30. The speed limit for all boats during

this time is 5 mph.

Reservations will be taken at the Marina Store (962-8631) up to 24 hours in advance and will be limited to one hour per day. Additional hours may be reserved on the day of interest. You may call or walk-in for reservations. When time slots become full, a stand-by list will be taken.

Reservations for skiing will be taken at the Marina Store (962-8631). You may call or walk-in (walk-ins have first priority). Reservations will be taken starting one hour prior to the morning ski time, one day in advance of skiing. Reservations will be limited to one (1) hour, morning or afternoon, 1 day prior to skiing. Those wishing to ski in both the morning and afternoon may reserve a second hour the day of skiing starting one (1) hour prior to the morning ski time. When time slots become full, a stand-by list will be taken. Skiing time will be limited to one (1) hour per reservation initially, and modified by the Lake Patrol and Marina Manager depending on de-<u>mand.</u>

All users of the fast boat lane must check-in with the Boat Patrol prior to commencing their activity. The Boat Patrol will wait 10 minutes for a user with a reservation. After that, the time slot will be opened to the next fast boat user requesting time. If there are no reservations or ad hoc fast boat users in line, the fast boat lane will be closed to fast boat activities for the rest of the hour.

A ski-flag or light system is located at the Marina Point. The flag or light indicates whether high-speed boating activity is or is not occurring. The ski flag will be dynamically raised and lowered based on whether the fast boat lane is open or closed on an hour-by-hour basis during reservation hours. Boaters can also call the Marina Store for ski-flag or light status.

A maximum of four (4) boats will be allowed to ski at any one time. A distance of 100 feet shall be maintained between boats.

A counter-clockwise ski pattern shall be maintained.

To minimize shoreline wakes on the North shore, high-speed boaters shall stay as close as possible to the main

beach buoys when traveling from the dam toward Big Creek. When traveling Big Creek toward the dam, high-speed boaters should stay as close as possible to the center of the ski pattern as safety permits. Always pass an approaching powerboat on the right.

All boats being used on PML waters must be operated in a manner to minimize the size of the wake produced by the boat. With the exception of pontoon boats and those boats traveling less than 5 mph, all powerboat operators shall operate at planning speeds as soon as practical when in the ski pattern.

Wake Enhancement: The use of devices, equipment, or placement of passengers on boats for the purpose of creating an enlarged wake is prohibited. Further, no such devices or equipment may be used on any boat in PML. Such devices and equipment include, but are not limited to; exterior panels or wings deployed underwater; rubberized, plastic or metal tanks or bags filled with any material; crowding of passengers to the rear; insidethe-hull water tanks or boat hulls designed specifically to enhance the wake. Additionally, the operator of an outboard or I/O drive boat must keep the out-drive down to optimally trim the boat to minimize the size of the boat's wake at all times.

Any boat that produces excessive wakes may be cited. Two citations result in eviction from the lake for the remainder of the calendar year. Staging area for skiers is the White SKI BUOY outside the Marina. No other area! There is a voluntary drop area outside the 5 mph buoys at Fisherman's Cove. See Marina Store and Good Neighbor Rules for details.

Ski course is marked with red buoys. Stay inside of the red buoys. These buoys are not a SLALOM COURSE.

Ski boats must have a red or orange flag and an observer at least 12 years of age.

Ski boats returning to a fallen skier must make a starboard (right) turn to return to the skier while raising the red or orange warning flag. The boat operator shall make the 'turn-around' at a slow speed to minimize the wake. Obviously, safety is a concern, but anything a boat operator can do to minimize wake size is required.

The driver of any boat approaching a boat displaying a red or orange flag must acknowledge the downed skier's presence by raising their hand for the skier's towboat to see and take appropriate evasive action to ensure the safety of the downed skier.

Skier must raise one (1) ski (or wakeboard or kneeboard) when in water with slack towline to warn other boats in the area.

All skiers must wear proper Coast Guard approved life preservers.

Number of water skiers per boat: 2 maximum at a time. When one skier drops, the second skier must drop immediately.

Use of *wakeboards*, *kneeboards*, discs, inner tubes, surfboards, water toys and non-approved devices are prohibited. Water skis, *kneeboards* and wakeboards are the only devices permitted to be used in the high-speed boating lane. *The Boat Patrol and Marina Staff have the final authority to decide what is a water ski and what is a non-approved device*.

An area for beginning water ski instruction is available. Contact the Boat Patrol Officer or Marina Manager for details.

Water skiing may be limited on certain days such as, but not limited to holidays, fishing derbies and sailing regatta days.

KNOW OUR RULES AND ABIDE BY THEM FOR YOUR ENJOYMENT AND SAFETY.

FISHING RULES

A California State Fishing License is required and is to be displayed at all times while fishing. Fish limits are governed by California Fish & Game laws. NO LIVE BAIT is permitted other than worms.

Fishing off water taxi docks during water taxi operating hours is prohibited. Trespassing on private property is not allowed.

No fishing within 25 feet of designated swim areas.

SAILING RULES

Sailing Hours: Anytime

SAILBOAT LAUNCHING is allowed only at the Marina boat ramp.

Sailboats and all others must stay out of the skiing area during skiing hours.

The high-speed boating lane is outlined with red buoys. Stay out of this area while high-speed boating is in progress. Be aware of high-speed boating hours for your own protection. Avoid the east end of the lake (Lake Lodge and Big Creek entrance) during high-speed boating hours.

Sailing of rental boats in Big Creek is not allowed.

No windsurf boards without a sail are allowed on the lake.

PARKING, BEACH & SWIMMING RULES

SWIM AT YOUR OWN RISK. NO LIFEGUARDS ARE ON DUTY.

Follow all posted beach and marina rules and regulations. <u>Note:</u> The beaches and lawns are designated non-smoking areas.

Swimming is only allowed within the designated swim areas.

No float tubes, surfboards, "noodles", lounge rafts, etc., are allowed on the lake other than within 30 feet from your own private dock. (Tubes, noodles and "soft" float toys are allowed in the swim areas.)

Inflatable boats, canoes and kayaks that are used on Pine Mountain Lake must be registered in the same manner as hardbottom boats. Do not venture more than 30 feet from your own private dock. DO NOT swim across or in the open lake area.

No glass containers, loud music, hardballs, profane language <u>are allowed</u> <u>on any Pine Mountain Lake beach</u> <u>area.</u> Drinking of alcoholic beverages by anyone under the age of 21 <u>is not</u> allowed on any Pine Mountain Lake beach area.

Bicycles and skateboards must be walked through all amenity-parking areas. No riding is permitted.

Dogs are prohibited from the entire PML Marina, Dunn Court, and Lake Lodge amenities; except authorized PML utility dogs in the performance of their duties or-service animals assisting the blind or deaf. *Dogs should not be left in cars parked in these areas.*

If the marina parking lot is full, please park at Dunn court, the Lake Lodge, or Fisherman's Cove and ride the water taxi to the Marina. Water taxi operating schedule is available upon request.

FAILURE TO COMPLY MAY RE-SULT IN FINES OR LOSS OF LAKE PRIVILEGES.

Additional rules and regulations may apply. Rules are subject to change without notice.

ONLY property owners and PMLA employees on duty will be allowed to park at the Marina parking area on weekends and holidays from Memorial Day Weekend through Labor Day Weekend. Property owners will be required to provide a valid parking sticker or hang tag.

Shades of Green

ccasionally I will hear some of our members or guests compare our greens speed and playing conditions in general to other local golf courses. One reason our greens are the way they are is due to their construction. They retain moisture longer after storms or irrigation. So not only are they slower, but a little bumpier due to softness and foot traffic. A way to neutralize or firm ours up is more topdressings between aerations, which we did last season and will continue this year. Light topdressing will firm and smooth the surface for a better ball roll. The purchase of the Deep Tine Aerator in 2003 has improved drainage as evidenced by the back to back wet years a couple of vears ago and we never closed a green which used to occur.

As we move towards summer, our irrigation season will be here so let's all remember that our water is blended with effluent from G.C.S.D. and the ratio is roughly 75% lake and 25% effluent. During an average year our usage takes about 18 inches off of the lake surface. Our cost for water is the electricity to pump it. I recently read where Angel Park Golf Course in Las Vegas is reducing their irrigated turf by 30 acres and will save \$200,000 dollars on their water bill annually. If they are saving that much I wonder what they pay annually.

The new sod installed on #5 tee late last fall is being mowed and topdressed every couple of days as weather permits and we hope to have it in use in late March or early April.

Our tree program evolves as we get new ideas or gather more information. I recently met with a representative from a company that can relocate large trees. We are hoping to be able to use their service and relocate some smaller ones ourselves to more desirable locations. We will continue with our plans to create a tree nursery behind the Driving Range in order to have trees available to transplant in the future. As always, your support will be very much appreciated.

The Mother Lode Tournament committee has purchased two complete sets of flags with the association's logo and the words Pine Mountain Lake on them. They are also contributing to the tree program. Many thanks for their contributions.

2. play by the rules...take penalty strokes honestly


3. bring any disputes to the rules committee

Please feel free to encourage your friends who may not have received the hard copy to participate as well. The greater the participation, the better sense we all will have about the true opinions of the association and the ability to bring closure to the debate."

The Association has been debating the issue of Lake Use Rules for over 4 years now and we are no closer to having a solution that the majority of lake users can support than we were 4 years ago. Given the passion on both sides of the argument, it's unlikely to subside any time soon without more data and rationale to support the changes. There are clearly other issues the community needs to spend time on and as long at this debate rages, it detracts from the ability to move the community forward on other issues.

The Waterski and Wakeboard Club would like to see this resolved amicably with some hard data that supports the proposed changes. To that end, the WWC is gathering survey data by mail and online which will be provided to the PML Board. The goal of the survey is to help guide the Board in their decisions and to start building a broad consensus of support for this years Lake Rules prior to their expected adoption in April.

Enclosed you will find a survey to collect input on how members use the lake and gather your opinions on some of the key issues raised as a rationale for making changes. Regardless of "whose side you're on", we'd appreciate your prompt response to the short survey included.

You have received this survey because you own lakefront property or you registered a boat at PML and therefore are most impacted by changes in the lake rules. You can respond to the survey by completing the enclosed hard copy and mailing it back or by going to the Waterski and Wakeboard Club website at www. pmlwwc.com and clicking on either the Lake Use survey tab just underneath the club logo at the top right or in the main body of the home page. All association members are encouraged to participate but we are targeting the primary lake users in this mailing due to the short timeframe that we have to collect the information before the Board is proposing to approve the additional changes in April.

Please feel free to encourage your friends who may not have received this hard copy to participate as well. The greater the participation, the better sense we all will have about the true opinions of the association and the ability to bring closure to the debate. If you have more than one property, feel free to fill out one survey for each property but please only submit one survey per property.

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



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

LIBRARY-A-GO-GO

Self-service takes on new meaning with the nation's first Library-a-Go-Go machine, installed in April in a Bay Area Rapid Transit location, thanks to the Contra Costa Library in Pleasant Hill. Planning is under way for four of these units to be installed around the county, part of a model program partially funded by the state library system. The units, which cost about \$100,000 each, come from the Swedish company Distec and can hold 270 - 400 books. Patrons touch a screen similar to a bank ATM to choose from a list of genres. Once a library card is authenticated, a robotic arm delivers the book, which is encased in a hard plastic cover. Books can be returned to

the same machine and each transaction generates a receipt. While the BART location will be stocked with adult and young adult fiction and non-fiction titles, a Library-a-Go-Go to be placed in a shopping center will also include children's materials.







Lou Ann and her family moved from Dixon, CA to Big Oak Flat in 1929 because her mother, Rose Moynihan, got a job as the school teacher in Big Oak Flat's one room school. We will learn first hand from a student and the daughter of the teacher what it was like to attend a "One Room School," and how a teacher was able to teach 1st through 8th grades in the same classroom, especially during the Depression with skimpy budgets.

There were many one room schools in Southern Tuolumne County-Groveland, Big Oak Flat, Moccasin, Jacksonville, Elmore, Buck Meadows, and Deer Flat, to name a few. These schools provided a very substantial educational foundation for many bright students to go on to higher educational achievements and successful lives. Those students included Wally Anker, Mary Alice (James) Capsan, Don Harris, Carlo De Ferrari (Carlo's mother was a teacher in Groveland and Deer Flat), Fred Conwell, and my father, James H. Phillips.

Lou Ann is very bright, articulate and has been participating with Yosemite's retired historian Jim Snyder in authoring a book about Yosemite history. Her grandparents came to our area during the Gold Rush and she has a wonderful insight about historical people, events and education related to our part of the world.

Lou Ann encourages questions which will help make this a very interesting program by a former local woman.



The STCHS 2008 Wine Tasting Cruise is scheduled for June 14th. This fun event will sell out fast, so do get your reservations in soon.



Day Hike

April 5, Saturday - Day Hike (2A) - Hites Cove, South Fork of Merced River.

This is an annual wildflower hike led by the Tuolumne Group, Sierra Club, to visit a splendid display of spring wildflowers and the flowering Redbud trees found alongside the river banks. The trail is steep and narrow in places, so a sturdy hiking staff is recommended. Hike distance is 9 miles, round trip, terminating at a long abandoned hard rock mine developed in the 1860s and operated through the late 1880s. In its heyday the mine had an array of 40 stamps in operation, and total production was reported to be 2.5 to 3 million dollars. Improvements on the site included a hotel, built in 1879, two residences,

built in early 70s, many shacks, and a suspension bridge. Now only remnants of milling equipment, rusted cables, and crumbling stone foundation exist. Hike takes place rain or shine. Meet 10:00 a.m. at Savages Trading Post on Highway 140, which is about midway between El Portal and Briceburg, and is the confluence of South Fork and main Merced rivers. HOMES ON THE HILL **VITA Tax Volunteers Remind Residents About Economic Stimulus Payments**

embers of the Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) group want to remind local residents about taking advantage of the government's economic stimulus payments. Starting in May, payments of up to \$600 for individuals, or \$1,200 for married couples will be issued by the IRS based on 2007 tax returns. Parents can also get \$300 for each eligible child.

To receive the payments this year, people must file a 2007 tax return. That's it. The IRS will determine eligibility, figure the amount, and send the payment. This payment will be in addition to taxpayers' refunds.

VITA volunteers are available to help with income tax preparation through Apr. 15 at two Sonora locations – at no charge. Appointments are not required and all

service is on a walk-in basis.

Tax preparation volunteers will be onhand in the Columbia College Rotunda, located on the second floor of the Manzanita Building on the following days. Check with the campus toll booth for parking instructions.

• Tuesdays through Apr. 15 from 1:00 to 6:00 p.m.

• Wednesdays through Apr. 9 from 3:00

to 6:30 p.m.

• Thursdays through Apr. 10 from 1:00 to 6:00 p.m.




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

C.A.R. reports sales decrease 29.8 percent, median home price falls 21.9 percent

LOS ANGELES (Feb. 25) – Home sales decreased 29.8 percent in January in California compared with the same period a year ago, while the median price of an existing home fell 21.9 percent, the CALIFORNIA ASSOCIATION OF RE-ALTORS® (C.A.R.) reported today.

"This most recent decrease in the median price is yet another result of the liquidity crunch, which has choked off sales in recent months for nearly half of California's housing market," said C.A.R. President William E. Brown. "Sales do appear to be edging up, but recent declines in the median price have been due to a lack of sales in the over \$500,000 range, where funds are extremely scarce and jumbo loan rates are at near-record margins compared to conforming loan rates."

Closed escrow sales of existing, singlefamily detached homes in California totaled 313,580 in January at a seasonally adjusted annualized rate, according to information collected by C.A.R. from more than 90 local REALTOR® associations statewide. Statewide home resale activity decreased 29.8 percent from the 446,820 sales pace recorded in January 2007.

The statewide sales figure represents what the total number of homes sold during 2008 would be if sales maintained the January pace throughout the year. It is adjusted to account for seasonal factors that typically influence home sales.

The median price of an existing, singlefamily detached home in California during January 2008 was \$430,370, a 21.9 percent decrease from the \$551,220 median for January 2007, C.A.R. reported. The January 2008 median price fell 9.7 percent compared with December's revised \$476,380 median price.

"The slight increase in sales predates the president's signing of an economic stimulus package including a temporary increase in the conforming loan limit, but that much needed reform could give the market some momentum," said C.A.R. Vice President and Chief Economist Leslie Appleton-Young. "Let's hope congress and the president see fit to make the higher loan limit permanent."

Highlights of C.A.R.'s resale housing figures for January 2008:

C.A.R.'s Unsold Inventory Index for existing, single-family detached homes in January 2008 was 16.8 months, compared with 7.6 months for the same period a year ago. The index indicates the number of months needed to deplete the supply of homes on the market at the current sales rate.

Thirty-year fixed-mortgage interest rates averaged 5.76 percent during January 2008, compared with 6.22 percent in Janu-

ary 2007, according to Freddie Mac. Adjustable-mortgage interest rates averaged 5.23 percent in January 2008, compared with 5.47 percent in January 2007.

The median number of days it took to sell a single-family home was 71.6 days in January 2008, compared with 68.7 for the same period a year ago.

Regional MLS sales and price information is contained in the tables that accompany this press release. Regional sales data are not adjusted to account for seasonal factors that can influence home sales. The MLS median price and sales data for detached homes are generated from a survey of more than 90 associations of REALTORS® throughout the state. MLS median price and sales data for condominiums are based on a survey of more than 60 associations. The median price for both detached homes

and condominiums represents closed escrow sales.

HOMES ON THE HILL

In a separate report covering more localized statistics generated by C.A.R. and Data-Quick Information Systems, 6.3 percent, or 16 out of 253 cities and communities, showed an increase in their respective median home prices from a year ago. DataQuick statistics are based on county records data rather than MLS information. DataQuick Information Systems is a subsidiary of Vancouver-based MacDonald Dettwiler and Associates. (The top 10 lists are generated for incorporated cities with a minimum of 30 recorded sales in the month.)

Note: Large changes in local median home prices typically indicate both local home price appreciation, and often, large shifts in the composition of housing market activity. Some of the variations in median home prices for January may be

exaggerated due to compositional changes in housing demand. The DataQuick tables listing median home prices in California cities and counties are accessible through C.A.R. Online at http://www.car.org/index.php?id=MzgyOTM=.

The Sonora Area Foundation and its two supporting organizations, The Irving J. Symons Foundation and the Symons Family Fund, now share a common group of Directors for their Boards.

The organizations remain independent charitable corporations, but all three will be governed by the same 12 directors. This will provide efficiency and continuity to the administration and organization of their philanthropic services.

Now, all three organizations can address the grant applications together."

The Boards will now hold their meetings on the same date each month, the fourth Tuesday, and they will continue to review competitive grant requests at those meetings every other month. Assistance to donors and grant seekers continues to be handled by Sonora Area Foundation at its offices.

The Sonora Area Foundation was established in 1990, and is a Community Foundation that channels donors' charitable contributions to worthy projects in Tuolumne County. Its mission is to strengthen its community by promoting philanthropy through assisting donors, making grants and providing leadership.

STAND DOWN FOR HOMELESS VETERANS

eterans make up about 25% of the homeless population in the US according to reports from the Veterans Administration (VA) and Housing and Urban Development (HUD).

In an effort to help this element of society to regain their place in mainstream American society, Chapter 391, Vietnam Veterans of America of Tuolumne County will hold a Stand Down for homeless veterans. Homeless veterans from Amador, Calaveras, Tuolumne and Mariposa counties will be invited to participate in the 2 1/2 day event scheduled for Friday, Saturday and Sunday, Oct. 3rd, 4th and 5th.

The event will start with registration at 7 am on Friday and end at noon on Sunday with about 100 veterans expected to participate.

The term 'Stand Down', according to project chairman, Frank M. Smart, is a military term widely used in Vietnam when combat units were pulled from the field and given some time off to rest up, repair equipment and arms, treat minor ailments and in general rejuvenate body and soul before returning to combat missions.

Now, Stand Downs are typically one to three day events providing services to homeless veterans such as food, shelter, clothing, health screenings and referrals to a variety of other necessary services, such as housing, employment and substance abuse treatment. Accommodations for women veterans and the dependents of veterans are being planned.

"The VA will be here in force to offer all services available to veterans," Smart said.

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The event is being called "Veterans to Veterans Outreach, 2008", according to Smart. "As Vietnam veterans we are reaching out to our brothers and sisters and trying to help them overcome the problems which have caused them to be homeless."

Hank Medina, a Groveland mortgage broker has been named as Co-Chairman for Logistics for the event. Medina is a Vietnam veteran and retired from active and reserve duty with the Army. He has been involved with the East Bay Stand Down in Dixon for the past several years.

Chapter 391, VVA in Tuolumne County was officially started by Smart and other Vietnam veterans in September, 1988 and will soon celebrate its 20th anniversary.

"We need help from the community to put this event on," he continued, "and anyone wishing to help can contact me. We need sleeping bags, coats, clothing, shoes foodstuffs and many other things to make this Stand Down meaningful and helpful to our homeless veterans."

There will also be a Veterans Information Fair and a Job Fair open to the general veterans population that weekend.

The first Stand Down was organized in 1988 by Vietnam veterans in San Diego. They have been an effective tool in reaching out to homeless veterans and their families.

Honey Pecans

6 Oz Raw Pecans (about 1/2 Cup) 1/8 Cup Honey 1/8 Cup Sugar 1/8 Cup Water 1/4 tsp Kosher Salt 1/8 tsp Chipotle or Red Pepper Flakes

Preheat Oven to 325 degrees. Bring 1 quart of water to boil in a saucepan, add pecans and boil for 2 minutes; then remove, rinse and drain nuts. Place a sauté pan over medium high heat and add all remaining ingredients. Mix and then add Pecans, stir and cook until all

liquid disappears. Distribute pecans on foil covered pan. Bake for 15-20 minutes until nuts are fragrant and browned (but not over-browned/burned). Immediately scatter pecans on a silicon baking mat or parchment paper to cool - otherwise they will stick to the foil after 30 seconds.

Prawns

1 lb Uncooked Prawns (21-25 Count per lb is ideal), deveined and shelled

Batter

1/2 Cup Egg whites (3 Large)

thawed with juice reserved 12 oz. fat-free or light whipped topping, thawed

3 tablespoons sweetened flaked coconut

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Spray two 9-inch round cake pans with vegetable oil spray.

In a large mixing bowl, combine cake mix, water, pears, egg whites and 1/2 teaspoon coconut extract. Using an electric mixer, beat according to the directions on the package. Pour the batter into each cake pan, smoothing the surface.

Bake for 25 minutes. Transfer to cooling rack for 1 hour 30 minutes before removing from pans.

In a medium saucepan, stir together the sugar, cornstarch and reserved strawberry juice until the cornstarch is dissolved. Add the strawberries. Bring to a boil over medium-high heat. Boil for 2 minutes, or

1/2 Cup Cornstarch

Beat egg whites till foamy, then slowly add Cornstarch while still beating to create batter.

Sauce

- 6 Tbsp Mayonnaise
- 4 Tbsp Sweetened Condensed Milk
- 2 Tbsp Lemon Juice
- 1 Tbsp Honey

Mix all in double boiler till just warmed. Taste and adjust to your desired taste (sweet or lemony) by adding either more lemon juice or more honey.

RECIPE SEQUENCE/DIRECTIONS

1) Prepare pecans ahead of time per recipe above.

2) Shell, de-vein, rinse, and pat dry prawns (can do this while roasting pecans).

3) Prepare prawn batter and then submerge/toss shrimp in it.

4) Add all Sauce ingredients to upper pan of a double boiler.

4) Pour frying oil 2 inches deep in pan and heat to 325-350 degrees.

5) Place double boiler bottom pan on oven to boil water (without upper



until thickened, stirring frequently with rubber scraper. Remove from heat. Let cool for 30 minutes. Fold the remaining 1/2 teaspoon coconut extract into the whipped topping. Refrigerate, covered, until needed.

To assemble: place one cake layer on a cake plate. Spread with 3/4 cup whipped topping mixture. Carefully spoon 1 cup strawberry mixture on top, to about 1 inch from the edge. Top with remaining cake layer. Spread remaining whipped topping over the top and sides. Sprinkle with the coconut. Spoon dollops of the remaining strawberry mixture around the base of the cake. Cover and refrigerate until serving time.

7) After frying all prawns, place upper double boiler pan (which contains sauce mixture) on top of bottom (which now should contain boiling water) and heat till just warmed through. Add and toss prawns in sauce just before serving.

8) Plate prawns and pour any excess sauce over. You can serve over a lettuce bed and/or garnish with toasted sesame seeds if desired. Then top prawns with prepared pecans.

The Planet Saturn

arch is a great month to write about the planet Saturn because it shines prominently in our night time sky. Saturn is easily visible to the unaided eye. It's slightly orange in color and is easy to identify as a planet because it doesn't "twinkle" like the stars do. The Sun, moon, and naked eye visible planets all travel approximately the same ecliptic path in the sky from our point of view on Earth. Because our solar system is almost flat, it forms a plane. This plane is called the ecliptic of our solar system. Look for Saturn, as well as other bright planets like Jupiter and Mars, to travel the ecliptic of our solar system throughout the year. Just remember the path that the sun and moon travels in the sky as a guide to look for planets, like Saturn. During the month of March, Saturn appears high in the night sky crossing the meridian at about 10:45 PM. The meridian is the imaginary line that connects the North Pole, passing overhead, to the South Pole. There are several Web sites that show the current position of Saturn (and the other planets) in the sky.

Saturn is the sixth planet from the Sun and the second largest planet in the Solar System, after Jupiter. Along with the planets Jupiter, Uranus, and Neptune, it is classified as a gas giant planet which means it is comprised mostly of Hydrogen. It is believed that a small core of rock and ice lies at the center of the planet. In diameter, Saturn is almost 10 times the size of Earth. In Roman mythology, Saturn is the god of agriculture and is the root of the English word "Saturday".

Saturn's system of rings, consisting mostly of ice particles with a smaller amount of rocky debris and dust, are visible with a small telescope. These rings are huge, they would cover two-thirds the distance from the earth to the moon. Its atmosphere consists of bands, similar to the planet Jupiter, that can be seen on a clear night with a reasonable (6 inch aperture or more) size telescope. One interesting thing about Saturn is that it is less dense than water – this means it would float on top of a very large body of water.

Saturn is so great to observe because its rings make it so recognizable - it is probably one of the most photographed planets in our solar system. This image was taken a few years ago from Pine Mountain Lake when my wife, Lisa, and I were visited by our good friends Mike & Tina along with their 2 young boys – Connor and Ryan. Almost without exception, a first time viewer exclaims "wow - I can really see the rings".

As described in previous articles, most images that I take are long exposures. Imaging bright planets like Jupiter or Saturn is an exception. Because these planets are so bright, long exposure times are not needed. What is needed are clear skies with minimal atmospheric turbulence (for a clear, crisp image) and high magnification. This can be accomplished with the use of a webcam that has been modified to replace the eyepiece of a telescope. The advantage of shooting video with a webcam, instead of still images with a camera, is that you can capture many (often 10 to 30) frames per second. Because our atmosphere is constantly changing, that is the air that you look through when you view with a telescope, brief periods of exceptionally calm conditions can be captured with this webcam video technique. Then, using computer software, the best (most sharp) frames from the video can be stacked to form still images that rival the best images taken from professional telescopes and camera equipment only a decade ago.

The image shown here is an "aligned and stacked" image from the best 67 of 445 frames of video. Very little other post-processing was done to this image other than some sharpening. Several of Saturn's atmospheric bands are clearly visible as well as, of course, those magnificent rings.

WHAT IS A STAND DOWN?

This term was widely used in Vietnam to describe the actions of a combat unit that was brought in from the field and 'stood down' from combat operations.

The unit was brought into a Landing Zone (LZ) or a Fire Support Base (FSB) which was relatively secure. These bases were usually artillery bases and the unit provided perimeter security while repairing equipment and arms, tending to minor ailments, training new personnel, getting hot showers, hot food, new clothing and a few beers/sodas before returning to combat operations in the field.

The troops would do light duty, i.e. filling sandbags, building new berms and possibly some light patrolling outside the perimeter.

In essence, this exercise would allow the combat troops to rest up and rejuvenate body and soul for a week or two.

BACK IN THE REAL WORLD

Back in the real world the term Stand Down is applied to events aimed at helping homeless veterans.

A 'base camp' (in our case a portion of the Mother Lode Fairgrounds in Sonora) is established and the homeless are invited to spend 2 1/2 days away from the rigors of survival in the homeless environment.

They are housed in tents (with a Tent Captain) on cots with sleeping bags and are well-fed three meals a day and very little is required of them during this time.

The VA will be on hand in force to offer medical exams, educational opportunities and everything the VA has to offer a veteran and there will also be a Job Fair ("Hire a Hero–Hire a Veteran") and a VA Information Fair which will be open to the general veterans population.

The homeless veterans will be offered showers, clothing, toiletries, shoes, haircuts and other amenities they would ordinarily not have access to on a regular basis.

In general, it is an opportunity to have a good, three-day rest and recuperation period and give us (the organizers, veteran activists) a chance to get these men and women plugged into the VA system for benefits.

Hopefully, this event will be the first step in getting this segment of the homeless population off the streets and on the path to life in mainstream America.

This Stand Down will encompass Amador, Calaveras, Tuolumne and Mariposa counties.

WHAT WE NEED FROM THE OUTLYING COUNTIES

First, we could use some financial help. This event could cost upwards of \$12-\$14,000. WE will attempt to mitigate most of this cost through grants from HUD, VA, CDVA and Help America Foundation. But, we will still need help from other veterans, civic and social organizations.

Your role in this event will be to locate and identify your county's homeless veterans and transport them to and from the Sonora event.



ΡM To win a player must make a continuous connection from one side of the board to the other in the long direction for his color of dots. For the white dot player in CA the example this is from left to right; the black dot player is trying to connect top to bottom. The white dot player wins the example game.



Pipelayer Game

ipelayer is a game played with two grids of dots that are slightly offset from one another, as shown in the animation at the right. We will call them white and black dots. This examples has 6x7 and 7x6 grids of dots, but you can use more or less as long as they leave each player with one longer dimension. The long dimension should be one

longer than the short dimension.

The rules are as follows:

The players take turns moving by connecting two dots.

A player can only connect dots that are adjacent horizontally or vertically and also only dots of his own color. In the example the one player owns the white dots and another player owns the black dots.

No move may draw across another move.

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
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


