

## GENERAL MANAGER'S MESSAGE

#### **Fire Abatement and 911**

The PML Fire Abatement Program continues to be a hot topic (no pun intended) due to the hot and dry weather conditions. The recent Lake Tahoe Angora Fire serves as a perfect example of the danger of fire in our area. We have experienced several close calls by folks that are not paying attention and doing things that create a fire hazard. Everything from throwing cigarette butts out of a car window to leaving BBQ coals in a metal canister under a wood deck. Violation of local fire safety ordinances carries a hefty penalty and some of our members have already paid the price.

I recently met with our local Fire Chief, Shane Warner regarding the 911 response for PML. Apparently, some members have been calling the PML Main Gate with emergency issues, asking our staff to call 911 for them. It is important that all members call 911 when there is an emergency. Calling our staff slows down emergency services response time and puts lives in danger.

#### **Lake Dredging Project**

Permit applications and copies of the CEQA environmental report have been submitted to the Department of Fish and Game, Regional Water Quality Control and the Army Corps of Engineers. So far we have only received a response from the Department of Fish and Game. They had some concerns and our consultants at Moffat and Nichol are working with them to address their issues. The County passed the document around to the different departments for review and we are waiting for their response. So far, we are still on schedule on this process.

#### **Tennis Courts**

The resurfacing of Tennis Courts 5 & 6 was recently completed. This project was budgeted under amenity refurbishments for 2007. Tennis Court number 4 experienced some cracking during the cold snap over the winter and this was also repaired by the vendor. Since this was a warranty repair, the work was performed free of charge.

#### **Independence Day Weekend Activities**

The Annual PML Fireworks Display was held on June 30th at dusk. While we had a large crowd, our estimated attendance was lower by almost 1,000 people. We had few incidents including one arrest and three vehicles were towed. I would like to thank my our Marina, Safety and

Maintenance staff, my assistant Rick Whybra, CHP Officer Foote and his fellow officers and the Tuolumne County Sheriffs Department for their assistance in keeping this event fun and safe and making it a success.

#### **Swimming Pool ADA Ramp Project**

We have received the permit for the ramp and our architect is putting the finishing touches on the plans for the ADA accessible restroom and shower. Our Maintenance Manager, Tom Moffitt is meeting with contractors going over their bid submissions for the project.

#### PMLA BOATING AND LAKE RULES

Tor your safety, California Boating Laws prevail. For your convenience, copies of the pamphlet "ABC's of California Boating Laws," published by the California Harbors and Watercraft are available at the Marina Store.

Listed below are further regulations that apply to Pine Mountain Lake boating usage. Failure to comply with them shall be grounds for termination of your privileges. Violations are subject to citation. All boats are subject to inspection to determine compliance with State Law and Association requirements. If you have any questions on the safety requirements of your boat, contact a Boat Patrol Officer or the Marina Store staff.

#### **GENERAL BOATING RULES**

Know our rules and abide by them for your enjoyment and safety.

All boats on Pine Mountain Lake must meet both State of California and Pine Mountain Lake registration requirements. Only property owners in good standing may register their boats.

REGISTRATION: Requirements for registration include: current liability insurance with a minimum of \$300,000, proof of PML residency, proof that the boat meets California Boating Law safety requirements, compliance with PML nonwake enhancing requirements, and agreement to abide by lake rules.

PML non-wake enhancing regulations restrict the use of internal ballast tanks, external fins, foils, panels, or boat hulls specifically designed to increase wakes. Any boats incorporating these devices, registered at PML must adhere to PML's restrictions on not utilizing these devices.

All boats are limited to 5 mph except during water skiing hours, where the speed limit is 40 mph in the ski area only. All boats, except those signed up for skiing, must stay out of the ski area while skiing is in progress. Skiing or other high-speed boating activity is permitted during designated hours from May 1 thru October 31 only.

Open stack boats and others with a decibel level exceeding 82 db are prohibited. Likewise, radios or stereos may not be played at high volume.

Note that areas marked "no wake" mean no wake. These areas are marked with white buoys that say "No Wake". Boats may have to go slower than 5 mph in order not to create any wake.

No "Jet Skis," "Waverunners" or other similar variations of personal watercraft are allowed on Pine Mountain Lake (except authorized emergency or law enforcement equipment).

Only skippers (16 years and older with a valid driver's license) designated by a boat owner may operate a powerboat, provided that they know the lake and marina rules. Boat owners are responsible for informing their operators of all lake and marina rules.

Boat owners are responsible for the operation of their boats and the wakes they create regardless of who may be operating the boat.

Reckless operation and disregard for others may result in citation and forfeiture of lake boating privileges.

Boaters must stay inside the passenger/ operator areas of the boat. Riding outside of the railing or gate is prohibited.

Powerboat operators may not tow or pull rafts, tubes, paddleboats, kayaks, canoes or similar craft.

In case of an accident, give any necessary assistance, then immediately contact the Boat Patrol (based at the Marina).

Sufficient life preservers must be aboard for each passenger. All boaters less than 12 years of age and non-swimmers must wear properly tied life jackets.

Give a wide berth to sail and manually operated boats, as they have the right of way.

Powerboats may not be operated within 50 feet of a swimming area.

When meeting another boat, keep to the right.

Individuals wishing to blow out their motors may do so during high-speed boating hours and must first check-in

with the Boat Patrol. Blow-outs will be limited to two (2) times around the ski pattern and must adhere to all high-speed boating rules. A maximum of 4 boats are allowed in the high-speed boating lane with skiers/boarders given priority over boats wishing to blow out their motor. No engine blowouts will be allowed between 6:00 pm and 8:00 pm.

Every effort shall be made to minimize wakes, especially those affecting shoreline properties.

All lake activity is suspended when CDF helicopters perform firefighting procedures or during other emergencies that require use of lake water.

The Boat Patrol will be in effect daily. Citations may be given for PML rule infractions. Two citations will constitute action for removing your boat from Pine Mountain Lake for the remainder of the season. Any boating or swimming rule may be changed in an emergency based on input from PML Management, Safety Dept, Sheriff's Dept, or other appropriate agency.

BOAT LAUNCHING & REMOVAL DATES

NO BOAT MAY BE LAUNCHED without current Pine Mountain Lake registration.

BOAT LAUNCHING AND REMOV-AL is allowed only at the Marina boat ramp.

ALL BOATS NOT REMOVED from Dunn Court and the Marina area by October 31st of each year will be removed and stored AT THE OWNER'S EXPENSE.

NO TRAILER PARKING permitted, except for daily use, and only in designated areas. No trailer parking will be permitted the date of the Independence Day fireworks celebration.

DUNN COURT SAILBOAT OWN-ERS: Please relocate your sailboat the day before the annual fireworks display. This date may vary from year to year.

#### WATER SKIING AND WAKE-BOARDING RULES

Homeowners wishing to register a ski or wake boat for the first time on PML will be given a tour of the lake and have these regulations and the PML Water-ski and Wakeboard Club's Good Neighbor Rules explained. This tour will be conducted monthly by the PML Boat Patrol, assisted by the PML WWC and must be completed before the homeowner may sign up for ski/wakeboard times at PML. Copies of the Good Neighbor Rules will be available to all boaters at the Marina.

Skiing and wakeboarding will be on a one-hour session, reservation basis. High-speed boating hours are generally as follows:

On the Monday associated with the 3 three-day holiday weekends, wakeboarding will start at 4:00 P.M.

High-speed boating activities, wakeboarding or skiing, in the 9 am to 12 pm hours are not defined and will be worked out between the Marina Manager and the PML WWC.

Skiing and wakeboarding are prohibited November 1 through April 30. The speed limit for all boats during this time is 5 mph.

Reservations will be taken at the Marina Store (962-8631) up to 24 hours in advance and will be limited to one hour per day. Additional hours may be reserved on the day of interest. You may call or walk-in for reservations. When time slots become full, a stand-by list will be taken.

All users of the fast boat lane must checkin with the Boat Patrol prior to commencing their activity. The Boat Patrol will wait 10 minutes for a user with a reservation. After that, the time slot will be opened to the next fast boat user requesting time. If there are no reservations or ad hoc fast boat users in line, the fast boat lane will be closed to fast boat activities for the rest of the hour.

A ski-flag or light system is located at the Marina point. The flag or light indicates whether high-speed boating activity is or is not occurring. The ski flag will be dynamically raised and lowered based on whether the fast boat lane is open or closed on an hour-by-hour basis during reservation hours. Boaters can also call the Marina Store for ski-flag or light status.

A maximum of four (4) boats will be allowed to ski at any one time. A distance of 100 feet shall be maintained between boats.

A counter-clockwise ski pattern shall

be maintained.

To minimize shoreline wakes on the North shore, high-speed boaters shall stay as close as possible to the main beach buoys when traveling from the dam toward Big Creek. When traveling Big Creek toward the dam, high-speed boaters should stay as close as possible to the center of the ski pattern as safety permits. Always pass an approaching powerboat on the right.

All boats being used on PML waters must be operated in a manner to minimize the size of the wake produced by the boat. With the exception of pontoon boats and those boats traveling less than 5 mph, all powerboat operators shall operate at planing speeds as soon as practical when in the ski pattern.

Wake Enhancement: The use of devices, equipment, or placement of passengers on boats for the purpose of creating an enlarged wake is prohibited. Further, no such devices or equipment may be used on any boat in PML. Such devices and equipment include, but are not limited to; exterior panels or wings deployed underwater; rubberized, plastic or metal tanks or bags filled with any material; crowding of passengers to the rear; inside-the-hull water tanks or boat hulls designed specifically to enhance the wake. Additionally, the operator of an outboard or I/O drive boat must keep the out-drive down to optimally trim the boat to minimize the size of the boat's wake at all times.

Any boat that produces excessive wakes may be cited. Two citations result in eviction from the lake for the remainder of the calendar year.

Staging area for skiers is the White SKI BUOY outside the Marina. No other area! There is a voluntary drop area outside the 5 mph buoys at Fisherman's Cove. See Marina Store and Good Neighbor Rules for details.

Ski course is marked with red buoys. Stay inside of the red buoys. These buoys are not a SLALOM COURSE.

Ski boats must have a red or orange flag and an observer at least 12 years of age.

Ski boats returning to a fallen skier must make a starboard (right) turn to return to the skier while raising the red or orange warning flag. The boat operator shall make the 'turn-around' at a slow speed to minimize the wake. Obviously, safety is a concern, but anything a boat operator can do to minimize wake size is required.

The driver of any boat approaching a boat displaying a red or orange flag must acknowledge the downed skier's presence by raising their hand for the skier's tow boat to see and take appropriate evasive action to ensure the safety of the downed skier.

Skier must raise one (1) ski (or wakeboard or kneeboard) when in water with slack tow-line to warn other boats in the area.

All skiers must wear proper Coast Guard approved life preservers.

The word Puttanesca translates roughly into the phrase "of the whore." 'nuff said.

Traditionally this dish was a pasta dish but over the years chefs have personalized it in as many ways as there are chefs. So here is P.M.L.C.C. swordfish **puttensca** recipe for home;

1\4 cup extra virgin olive oil 1\4 cup Anchovies filet 1\4 cup minced Garlic 1 cup Diced tomatoes 1\2 cup Capers

1 tsp Chili flake

2 cups Tomato sauce

1 tbs Fresh basil

1 tsp Fresh oregano

Black pepper to taste

- 1. In a hot saucepot add oil until starting to smoke.
- 2. Add anchovies and sear on high heat until anchovies start to dissolve.
- 3. Add garlic until slightly roasted.
- 4. Add all tomato products, capers and bring to a boil.
- 5. Simmer for 30 minutes.
- 6. Add herbs and stir, simmer for 5 minutes
- 7. Season with black pepper, caper, and anchovies (have salt added to them), I do not recommend adding more. But if you do, please taste the finished sauce first then add kosher are sea salt as they are milder if flavor.
- 8. Add to your favorite pasta. Good eats and enjoy until next time.


They dribbled in slowly at first, but before long, torrents of patriotic patrons filled the empty seats and lined up for the tasty barbecue.

### **Golf Maintenance**

very year for the past 30 years or so, ◀ Pine Mountain Lake has scheduled **⊿** a site visit from the U.S.G.A. This year they were here July 2nd and we did a tour of the course.

Matt Nelson from the U.S.G.A. covered many different areas of golf maintenance. We discussed tree maintenance and the effects of trees on the health of the turf. One of our major assets is our oaks and pines and we try to include some maintenance on a yearly basis. In early 2007 Costa's Tree Service did some maintenance to the large oak on 18 fairway. While in the tree he found decay and rot. With this knowledge we can plant around this tree and have something there when it does fail.

We went to the tee on hole #5 and showed him the new path there. We discussed other areas where we could improve playability and safety by routing the existing path another direction.

Last year we discussed fairway and approach topdressing. It is well documented the benefits received from the procedure and we have begun a topdressing pro-

We also will receive a report from his visit and should anyone be interested in reading it, give us a call at 962-8610.

Now that summer is in full swing, we are also. Through the fall months we will be topdressing greens, approaches and fairway (selected areas) on a regular schedule as events allow. There will be some days when the light sand application will be more evident. Please be patient, we are only trying to improve the playing conditions for the long haul.

### **Have you ever Wondered What Happened to** the Men Who Signed **Our Declaration of** Independence?

(Freedom is never free.)

- Five signers were captured by the British as traitors and were tortured to death.
- Twelve had their homes ransacked and burned.
- Two lost their sons who served in the Revolutionary Army. Another two had sons who were captured.
- Nine of the 56 fought and died from wounds or hardships of the Revolutionary War. They pledged their lives, their fortunes and their sacred honor.

#### What kind of men were they?

- Twenty-four were lawyers and jurists.
- Eleven were merchants.
- Nine were farmers and plantation own-
- All were men of means and well-educated but they signed the Declaration of Independence knowing that the penalty would be death if they were captured.

Carter Braxton of Virginia, a wealthy planter and trader, saw his ships swept from the seas by the British Navy. He sold his home and properties to pay his debts and died in rags.

Thomas McKean was so hounded by the British that he was forced to move his family constantly. He served in the Congress without pay and his family was kept in hiding. His possessions were taken and poverty was his reward.

Vandals or soldiers looted the properties of Ellery, Hall, Clymer, Walton, Gwinnet, Heyward, Rutledge and Middleton.

At the Battle of Yorktown, Thomas Nelson, Jr. noted that the British General Cornwallis had taken over the Nelson home for his headquarters. He quietly

urged General Washington to open fire. The home was destroyed and Nelson died bankrupt. The home of Francis Lewis was destroyed. The enemy jailed his wife and she died within a few months.

John Hart was driven from the bedside of his dying wife. Their 13 children fled for their lives. His fields and gristmill were laid to waste. For more than one year, he lived in forests and caves, returning home to find his wife dead and children gone. He died shortly thereafter, heartbroken. Morris and Livingston suffered similar fates.

Such were the stories and scarifices of the American Revolution. These were not wide-eyed, rabble-rousing ruffians. They were soft spoken men of means and education. They had security but they valued liberty more.

Standing tall, straight and unwavering, they pledged:

"For the support of this Declaration, with a firm Reliance on the Protection of Divine Providence, we mutually pledge to each other our lives, fortunes and our sacred honor."

These men gave us a free independent America. The history books never tell us much of what happened in the Revolutionary War. We were British subjects at that time and we fought against our own government. Too often we now take these liberties for granted.

So while taking part in the activities of our daily lives, take a few minutes and silently thank these patriots for their heroic contributions. It is not too much to ask for the price they had to pay. Freedom is never free.

### **Bytes & Bits From John**

Built in wireless capabilities are becoming almost standard equipment on most laptop and home computers these days for a couple of reasons. One of the primary reasons is cost. Adding wireless capacity is so inexpensive that it would be silly for the manufacturers not to add it. The perceived value of any machine with wireless capacity far exceeds the cost to add it. Wireless is the wave of the future, so if the manufacturers want to stay ahead of the technology curve they need to add it to all but there most basic models.

However, if you're like most people you probably can't even check how much memory your computer has, let-alone if your computer is wireless enabled. Throw in the fact that you may not even know what wireless networking is and it's easy to ignore even trying to determine if your computer has that capacity. As a result, having ever taken the time to set it up is clearly out of the question.

However, since you bought your computer you've probably heard more and more about "going wireless" because it's becoming the thing to do. If that's the case, there are some things you can to do to check if your computer has wireless capabilities.

Laptops—Intel Centrino Mobile Technology Computer manufacturers do less than a perfect job at explaining what this means but if your laptop came with this built in then that's good news for you! In a nutshell, it means that your laptop has wireless networking built right in and you don't have to do a thing. Intel Centrino Mobile Technology is a marketing name for a combination of the Intel Pentium M processor and Intel's' Pro Wireless card.

If you have Intel Centrino Mobile Technology, then your computer should have a "Centrino" sticker on it somewhere. If you can't find a sticker but you suspect you had one at one time, then simply do the following. Right click on your "My Computer" icon. It's probably on your desktop but if not then go to your Start Menu, find My Computer, right-click and select Properties. When the menu opens, look at what it says after or under the word Computer.

On a side note, Intel Centrino Mobile Technology also increases battery life and allows manufacturers to build computers smaller. If you can't find anything referring to Intel Centrino Mobile Technology under the word Computer -- don't worry because as long as your laptop has a free card slot, installing wireless is a piece of cake.

**Desktop Computers**—If you're not sure whether or not your desktop computer

has a wireless connection, the easiest thing to do is to simply turn it around and look for a small aerial sticking out the back towards the bottom. If it's there then you are wireless enabled. On the other hand, if there's nothing then it's still possible that you have a wireless device in the computer, especially if you purchased anytime in 2005 or beyond. However, because it's not the best idea (unless you've done it before) to try and open up your computer to check something, I'll show you a way to check if your wireless enabled using Windows.

Using Windows to Check Wireless Capacity Rather than messing with your computers hardware to verify what you've got installed, you can just as easily check using your Windows' Device Manager. To use it, right click My Computer / Choose Manage / and then click Device Manager.

After you click Device Manager a list of everything you can install will appear on the right half of the screen. Take a look under Network adapters and ignore anything that says 10/100 or Ethernet because they are simply normal network connections—not wireless ones. If there's anything else there, it could be a wireless device.

If you think you have a wireless device, but it has a yellow warning sign alongside its name in the Device Manager, you should take a look at it to see what's wrong by double clicking on it. Windows should then tell you why the device is not working at the moment and may even suggest that you go through its trouble-shooter program. Do that before you do anything else.

If it turns out to be a driver problem, you should insert the driver CD that came with your computer. If you can't find the driver CD that came with your computer - don't worry because you should be able to find and then download the appropriate driver online. The first step would be to go to website of your computers manufacturer and do a search for the name of the wireless device that showed up in your Device Manager. Once you find the correct driver, simply download it and follow the instructions.

After all this (actually about 5 minutes) you may discover that you don't have a wireless enabled computer—oh well, those are the breaks. However, it's clearly better to find out your computers wireless capacity now—before you go out and buy some wireless equipment and then realize that you didn't even need it.


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### **Canada Geese Facts Identification**

The Canada goose is one of the most widely distributed waterbirds in North America. Geese can range in size from 22 to 48 inches from beak to feet and can weigh from three to 24 pounds. Large geese can have a wingspan of six feet. The most identifying mark on Canada geese the white cheek patch. Male (gander) and female (goose) look similar, however, the male is slightly larger.

Canada geese are known for their V-shaped flying patterns and honking sound. The migratory (moving from one place to another) flight of these birds signals the beginning of fall.

### PML GOOSE ABATEMENT PROGRAM

Over the last 10 years we have experienced an increase in the number of Canada Geese who have taken up residence within PML and it has been most dramatic within the last three years. The geese feed on the lawns at the Marina, Lake Lodge, Dunn Ct. and the turf at the Golf Course and leave behind pounds of feces. The cost to cleanup all of these areas and the damage to our amenities is significant. The situation has become unacceptable and we are taking steps to mitigate the problem.

As part of our on-going Goose Abatement Program, we will be employing the use of dogs and noise techniques designed to scare the geese from our property. Parts of our noise techniques include the use of pyrotechnic pistols. These are non-lethal devices that give off a loud noise but pose no harm to the geese. It encourages them to take up residence elsewhere. Use of these devices with other varied actions has been successful in the past and we anticipate success in the future. Since we may need to fire off these devices in the morning hours, we are notifying all members in the affected areas so that they do not become alarmed and call law enforcement. Please feel free to pass this information on to your friends and neighbors.

We ask that members do not attack or hurt the geese as Federal law protects them. Also, it is important that no one feed the geese. It is illegal to do so and compounds the problem.

We will continue to provide information on the situation and encourage all of our members to follow the rules and guidelines so that we can reduce the number of geese to a manageable level.

We appreciate your anticipated support to solve this problem and look forward to cleaner beaches and golfing in the future.

Canada geese develop strong bonds with mates and are very protective of their family group. Families migrate together. They stay together in the winter and return to the same nesting area each year. Yearlings (one year old) join other yearlings and move to new areas. Young geese will not find mates and nest until they are three years old.

#### **Habitat & Habits**

Canada geese build nests of twigs, grasses, bark, leaves and mosses on the ground near water. Five to six cream colored eggs are laid in March or later in cooler regions. Young geese, called goslings, weigh three to four ounces when they hatch. Within 24 hours they are swimming. Geese are precocial which means they are born with their eyes open, down covered and able to move about freely. Altricial birds like robins are born helpless and need parental support.

Canada geese communicate by using body language and a variety of calls and honking sounds.

Canada geese are herbivores. They feed most often during early morning and late afternoon. They are grazers, which means they eat grasses. They eat a variety of terrestrial plants. They also eat aquatic (water) plants – that is what they are doing when you see them with their heads down in the water.

#### **Living in Harmony**

Most of the time Canada geese and humans live in harmony.

- Canada geese are popular waterfowl to hunt and provide a flavorful source of protein
- People enjoy watching geese in parks and refuges
- The song or honk of the Canada goose is heard during the annual fall and spring migrations of these birds.

#### **Living in Conflict**

- Canada geese eat crops like wheat, corn, rice, turf grasses (grasses grown for lawns and golf courses) and alfalfa
- Canada geese can collide with aircraft causing fatal results
- Droppings from Canada geese can pollute municipal water supplies and cause

health problems for humans and other animals on golf courses, in parks and residential areas

- Droppings from Canada geese can carry E-coli into swimming areas
- Canada geese can damage landscaping

#### Preventing Damage Done by Canada Geese

Some methods to prevent damage done by Canada geese include:

- Stop feeding the geese!
- Prevent reproduction this can be done by egg addling or shaking the eggs.
- Put up physical barriers like fencing. Geese will walk into an area and fencing will keep them out. Grid wires strung across ponds will keep geese from landing.
- Alter habitat keep the environment unattractive to geese. Allow grass to grow. Geese like short grass where they can "look out" for predators.
- Harassment by:
  - using dogs to chase geese;
  - using specialized fireworks (pyrotechnics) shot out of a pistol to scare geese;
- hanging mylar tape which is shiny on one side and colored on the other side, may temporarily keep geese away.
- Hunting is the most efficient way to remove geese and make them wary.
- Repellents The chemical methyl anthranilate, which historically has been used as the flavoring in grape soda, is now also used as a repellent for Canada geese on lawns and in small pools of water.

#### **Economics of Damage**

Between 1991 and 1997, 16,949 civilian aircraft-wildlife strikes were reported to the Federal Aviation Administration. This is less than 20% of the number of strikes that actually occurred. The Air Force reports it has 3,000 bird strikes each year. About 90% of the strikes on aircraft occur on or near airfields when aircraft are below 2,000 feet. Strikes at this altitude are dangerous because aircraft are close to the ground and flight crews are occupied with complex take-off or landing procedures.

The most significant military

aircraft disaster caused by birds occurred at Elmendorf Air Force Base on September 22, 1995. An E-3 Sentry Airborne Warning and Control System aircraft struck several Canada geese on take-off and crashed, killing 24 people. Gulls (32%), waterfowl (31%) and raptors (17%) have been increasing in numbers and are involved in 80% of the reported bird strikes where damage to airplanes occurred.

#### History

When European settlers came to the New World, they brought with them knowledge of both tame and wild geese from their native lands. It was natural for them to add North American geese to their food supply.

In addition to providing food, goose feathers were used to make beds and goose grease was a valuable substance. It was used for both cooking and medical uses. For example, it was blended with turpentine and rubbed on the chest to ease coughs and colds. It was also thought that it helped relieve earaches and soothe rheumatism.

Folklore tells us that when the meat on the goose's breastbone was thick, it meant a cold winter was on the way. The saying "All is well and the goose hangs high," meant when the geese were flying high in the sky the weather would be good. The Native Americans thought that a harsh winter would be coming if the geese flew south in early August.

Habitat destruction reduced Canada goose populations to a low of

a 1.1 million birds in the late 1940's. Today there are more than three times that number (3.7 million). Over \$250 million is raised each year from the sale of "Duck Stamps" (required for all waterfowl hunters) which are used by the government to buy wetland habitat for ducks, geese and hundreds of nongame wildlife species.

Number of water skiers per boat: 2 maximum at a time. When one skier drops, the second skier must drop immediately.

Use of discs, inner tubes, surfboards,



water toys and non-approved devices are prohibited. Water skis, kneeboards and wakeboards are the only devices permitted to be used in the high-speed boating lane.

An area for beginning water ski instruction is available. Contact the Boat Patrol Officer or Marina Manager for details.

Water skiing may be limited on certain days such as, but not limited to holidays, fishing derbies and sailing regatta days.

KNOW OUR RULES AND ABIDE BY THEM FOR YOUR ENJOYMENT AND SAFETY.

#### **FISHING RULES**

A California State Fishing License is required and is to be displayed at all times while fishing. Fish limits are governed by California Fish & Game laws. NO LIVE BAIT is permitted other than worms.

Fishing off water taxi docks during water taxi operating hours is prohibited. Trespassing on private property is not allowed.

No fishing within 25 feet of designated swim areas.

#### **SAILING RULES**

Sailing Hours: Anytime

SAILBOAT LAUNCHING is allowed only at the Marina boat ramp.

Sailboats and all others must stay out of the skiing area during skiing hours.

The high-speed boating lane is out-

lined with red buoys. Stay out of this area while high-speed boating is in progress. Be aware of high-speed boating hours for your own protection. Avoid the east end of the lake (Lake Lodge and Big Creek entrance) during high-speed boating hours.

Sailing of rental boats in Big Creek is not allowed.

No windsurf boards without a sail are allowed on the lake.

#### **PARKING, BEACH & SWIMMING RULES**

SWIM AT YOUR OWN RISK. NO LIFEGUARDS ARE ON DUTY.

Follow all posted beach and marina rules and regulations. Note: The beaches and lawns are designated non-smoking areas.

Swimming is only allowed within the designated swim areas.

No float tubes, surfboards, "noodles," lounge rafts, etc., are allowed on the lake other than within 30 feet from your own private dock. (Tubes, noodles and "soft" float toys are allowed in the swim areas).

Inflatable boats, canoes and kayaks that are used on Pine Mountain Lake must be registered in the same manner as hard-bottom boats.

Do not venture more than 30 feet from your own private dock. DO NOT swim across or in the open lake area.

No glass containers, loud music, hardballs, profane language or drinking of alcoholic beverages by anyone under the age of 21 are allowed on any Pine Mountain Lake beach area.

Bicycles and skateboards must be walked through all amenity-parking areas. No riding is permitted.

Dogs are prohibited from the entire PML Marina, Dunn Court, and Lake Lodge amenities except authorized PML utility dogs in the performance of their duties or service animals assisting the blind or deaf.

If the marina parking lot is full, please park at Dunn Court, the Lake Lodge, or Fisherman's Cove and ride the water taxi to the Marina. Water taxi operating schedule is available upon request.

### FAILURE TO COMPLY MAY RESULT IN FINES OR LOSS OF LAKE PRIVILEGES.

Additional rules and regulations may apply. Rules are subject to change without notice.

ONLY property owners and PMLA employees on duty will be allowed to park at the Marina parking area on weekends and holidays from Memorial Day Weekend through Labor Day Weekend. Property owners will be required to provide a valid parking sticker or hanging tag.

# C.A.R. Forecasts 14% Sales Decline, Modest Increase in Median Home Price for State

Midyear Housing Market Forecast presented at California REALTOR® Showcase in Sacramento

LOS ANGELES (June 7) – The CALI-FORNIA ASSOCIATION OF REAL-TORS® (C.A.R.) today projected a 14 percent decline in single-family home sales this year, and forecast a 1.8 percent increase in the median price of a home. C.A.R. Executive Vice President Joel Singer delivered the Association's 2007 Midyear Housing Market Forecast as part of the California REALTOR® Showcase and C.A.R.'s Legislative Day activities this week in Sacramento.

The 2007 Midyear Housing Market Forecast PowerPoint presentation is available at http://www.car.org/library/media/papers/pdf/2007%20Midyear%20Forecast.pdf.

Sales are expected to fall to 410,500 units in 2007, a 14 percent decline from the 477,460 pace recorded in 2006, according to the forecast. The median price of a home will reach \$566,500 this year, a 1.8 percent increase from the \$556,640 median for 2006.

"Sales have declined in all areas of the state, but higher-end markets have experienced somewhat smaller declines," said C.A.R. Vice President and Chief Economist Leslie Appleton-Young. "Sales are weakest in areas that had a lot of new home building in recent years or those areas that had been popular for second home purchases.

"Prices tend to be softer in those areas as well," she said. "This pattern is likely to continue throughout the rest of the year, particularly in areas that were popular among first-time home buyers, which experienced the greatest run-up in prices. Similarly, higher-end markets have seen greater price stability, with the median price of a home declining slightly, if at all. The sales mix, with slower sales in the entry and lower-end of the market and relatively stronger sales in the high end, has helped stabilize the median price."

According to the C.A.R. forecast, the Central Valley region has experienced a greater decline in sales compared with the state as a whole, and a succession of year-to-year declines in the median price. This trend is likely to continue, due in part to excess inventory of new homes for sale.

The San Francisco Bay Area and moderately priced to higher-priced areas of Southern California have seen

a somewhat better sales picture, with small or nonexistent median price declines. These areas should continue to fare better than lower-priced inland markets in the San Bernardino and Riverside areas, according to Appleton-Young. Sales in those areas remain significantly below the record levels of the peak years, she said.

1/4 teaspoon salt


1/8 teaspoon pepper







## THAI Royal Princess Visits Yosemite & Groveland

er Royal Highness Maha Chakri Sirindhorn, Crown Princess of Thailand visited Yosemite National Park and Groveland, California on Sunday, June 10, 2007.

Yosemite National Park's Superintendent Tollefson and ranger staff were honored to provide a guided tour for Her Highness and entourage through the newly refurbished Yosemite Valley Visitor Center, Ahwahnee Indian Village/Museum and the Chiura Obata Exhibit, "The Art of a Peaceful Man." A walking tour to Yosemite Falls and Cook's Meadow followed via the Cook's Meadow board walk.

Lunch at the Ahwahnee Hotel included the Grand Buffet in the dining room,



where Her Highness was seated with her entourage of six in the Queen's Alcove. After lunch, the group visited Glacier Point, with stops at El Capitan, Bridal Veil Falls and Tunnel View.

Her Highness' entourage departed Yosemite for Groveland and dinner in the Groveland Hotel's Victorian Room Restaurant. Owners Peggy and Grover Mosley welcomed the Crown Princess to The Groveland Hotel and the historic town of Groveland. Peggy and Grover were delighted to present Her Highness with historic photos of Yosemite Valley, information on Groveland's history and the hotel's 1849 adobe structure.

Executive Chef Gregory Lutes prepared a special menu for the Crown Princess, which included a salad, his signature dish of Indiana Duck Breast, and at Her Highness request, vanilla ice cream with fresh strawberries

HRH Princess Maha Chakri Sirindhorn is third child of King Bhumibol and Queen Sirikit of Thailand and is third in line to the throne. Her Highness was invested with the title "Somdech Phra Debaratana Rajasuda Chao Fah Maha Chakri Sirindhorn Rathasimakunakornpiyajat Sayam Boroma Rajakumari" on December 5, 1977. The English form of this title is "princess maha chakri."

Her Highness is unofficially referred to as "crown princess" because her title in Thai is the female equivalent of the title held by her brother Crown Prince Vajiralongkorn. Because the king has only one son, the Thai constitution was altered in 1974 to allow for female succession.

Easily the most beloved member of the royal family, after the king and queen, she enjoys the widespread admiration of the Thai people and is considered her father's intellectual successor. She spends much of her time helping her father with his various projects and has never married. Thais commonly refer to her as Phra Thep, meaning "princess angel."

# The Milky Way—Home of Our Solar System

This is a picture taken from my new property in Big Oak Flat. I'm sure you'll recognize it as a wide-field view of the Milky Way. It wasn't a very difficult image to capture. I just waited for the moon to set (at about 11:15PM) and the Milky Way just "jumps out" at you. We have a great 360 degree view of the sky from the new property, which we call Longfellow because it's 11+ acres of the Old Longfellow Mine. The most difficult part was setting everything up (we don't have any utilities

there yet) and framing the image.




Here's some info about our home galaxy:

The Milky Way is the galaxy which is the home of our Solar System together with at least 200 billion other stars (more recent

estimates have given numbers around 400 billion) and their planets, and thousands of clusters and nebulae. As a galaxy, the Milky Way is actually a giant, as its mass is probably between 750 billion and one trillion solar masses, and its diameter is about 100,000 light years. The Milky Way Galaxy belongs to the Local Group, a smaller group of 3 large and over 30 small galaxies, and is the second largest (after the Andromeda Galaxy M31). The spiral arms of our Milky Way contain interstellar matter, diffuse nebulae, and young stars and open star clusters emerging from this matter. Our solar system is thus situated within the outer regions of this galaxy, well within the disk and only about 20 light years "above" the equatorial symmetry plane (to the direction of the Galactic North Pole), but about 28,000 light years from the Galactic Center. Therefore, the Milky Way shows up as luminous band spanning all around the sky along this symmetry plane, which is also called the "Galactic Equator".







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# Land Use Study Finds Possible Home for the Gathering Place & Dog Park

CSD owns about 200 acres of land that stretches from Highway 120 on the south (at Mary's Park and the Fire Station) to Leon Rose Ball Field on the north. About half of this land is currently developed with community assets such as the Fire Station, Mary's Park, our wastewater treatment plant, GCSD operations and administration buildings, two recycled water reservoirs, Leon Rose Ball Field and about fifteen acres of spray fields (used for disposing of recycled water). The remainder of the land is undeveloped.

To help the District determine possible community uses for the land and to mitigate any conflicts with land use, former Board Member Craig Maxwell urged the District to conduct a formal land use study. This study was started in 2006 and was presented to the Board on July 9th. This study was for the sole purpose of providing the District with guidance for future use of the property.

Many projects have been suggested by our community over the years that might enhance the quality of life in Groveland. These included a community pool, a dog park, a skate park, the County Youth Center, basketball court, trails, and certainly not least, the Gathering Place. Some of these projects have been completed or are nearing completion, including the skate park, the County Youth Center, and the basketball court (all in Mary's Park).

The location of other projects needed to be evaluated based on topography, access, and conflicts with existing District activities (such as the spray fields and sewage treatment plant). The land use study conducted these evaluations.

Based on these evaluations, the dog park, the Gathering Place, and municipal

pool were sited near Leon Rose Ball Field. The plan even stretched as far as suggesting an RV park on the western side of the property. I think it's safe to say that we are quite a ways from seeing RVs parked on District property...but who knows?

The dog park would go north of the ball field. The Gathering Place would go east of the ball field parking lot, with access from Flint Court. The municipal pool would go in the spray field south of the Evangelical Free Church. With the exception of the pool, none of these projects impact the District's existing spray fields.

Some of these projects might take very little investment by the District or the community, such as the dog park. Others, like the Gathering Place and pool would be expensive. Together, they may cost over \$10 million. Because of its limited revenue generation capabilities for parks and recreation, the District would be unable to fund much in the way of capital or long-term operational expenses for these major projects. To raise this amount of money would require the community's best efforts at fundraising and grant writing, like was done for the Museum/ Library and skate park.

Even with funding issues addressed, the District must comply with environmental documentation laws, as well as develop construction designs and operational plans before it can move ahead with any of these projects. But this study should be good news for the Southside Senior Services, as they continue to plan for the Gathering Place, and for dog lovers for the dog park.
