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

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President's Corner

As my term on the Board of Directors, year as President and author of this column comes to an end, I would like to thank the membership and my fellow Directors for giving me the opportunity to serve my community. It has been a very fulfilling experience.

I thought I would take this space to explain to the membership what the level of commitment and the type of activities that being a Director entails. The Board of Directors is a five person group that governs the Association and has a single employee. That person is the General Manager who manages the Association as the CEO. Unlike many public corporations the CEO is not a member of the BOD.

The Association and the BOD is governed by a State Law called the Davis-Stirling Act which controls what we must do and can't do in the governance and operation of our Common Interest Development. The Act is very long and I won't go into the particulars. If you have the time and the interest you can find summaries in book stores or online.


The most obvious thing that Directors do is hold business meetings at the Lake Lodge every month except December. These meetings are open to the membership and take about two hours. Some meetings such as those for budget review and approval may last 6 or 7 hours. We also hold Executive Sessions or private meetings to discuss personnel issues, legal matters or member discipline and approve foreclosures. We take legal action and others take legal action against us a number of times a year and with the

As my term on the Board of Directors, advice of our lawyers the BOD decides on our strategy. We hold approximately 15 to lumn comes to an end, I would like 20 of these Executive Sessions per year.

Our biggest job is to establish the budget which we do in September and October and this is adopted in November. The budget is a formal guidance tool that indicates staffing levels which in turn establishes the level of member service for that year. Member service is very important in our operational success. The budget also includes the amenity fee schedule, reserve project spending, and any new capital expenditures. Our reserve funding is for repair, maintenance and replacement of amenities like the Lakeside Café and golf course locker rooms. The New Capital account is for new expenditures such as the recent surveillance system project. This project includes the installation of cameras at the gates and other targeted areas.

There are many other things that the BOD does including appointing committee members, making rules, monitoring the financial performance, approving contracts, authorizing expenditures necessary during the year, setting policy, affirming fines on the members, and adjudicating appeals of potential fines. We also authorize donations to charitable groups when members of PML or greater Groveland are affected and the Association would benefit.

I hope this gives you a better perspective of the effort that each board member has taken on and committed to for the 3 year term. I hope I have also sparked an interest in some of you willing stand up and serve

Surveillance System Project

The surveillance system project is progressing with the installation of many of the core infrastructure components. The Main Gate Department of Safety has initial monitoring capabilities and many of the camera poles have been installed at the individual access gates. This is a comprehensive, multi-year project that will serve to increase our monitoring capability.

Once installed, we believe the system will provide video data to improve our investigative processes and provide an additional resource for law enforcement. Our Director of Safety is scheduled to provide the Board of Directors with a detailed project status update at the September Board meeting. Interested members are welcome to attend to hear the latest information on the project.

July 4th Holiday

My management team and I hold a post event meeting for every big holiday to evaluate what went well, what did not go so well, and to consider ideas for improvement. The July 4th holiday for the most part went off without any major issues. We received many positive comments regarding the fireworks display. We saw the usual illegal parking activity and 24 tickets were issued. The newly installed slides at the Marina swim dock were well received. The new boat rental slip wristbands were a hit. The new bus route reduced the number of unauthorized visitors to our Marina, but we had a few members who complained about a couple of the bus stop locations, so we will be reviewing these.

Lakeside Cafe as we lost a couple of employees right before the holiday. The remaining staff and management stepped up to handle the increased crowds. Member input is being considered such as additional security staff to monitor activity at the Lake Lode and Fisherman's Cove areas.

As usual the GCSD Fire Department and our local emergency services worked with us to make sure that we all remained safe. All in all it was a safe and fun holiday for PML members and guests.

Lake Lodge Upgrades

The Lake Lodge deck awning shade panels had deteriorated to the point that they required replacement. We solicited for bids and the work was performed by a local reputable company. The project is completed and looks great.

The Lake Lodge kitchen freezer that was purchased back in the 90's was repaired over and over and finally reached the point that it could not be refurbished. After soliciting and receiving multiple quotes, we purchased a new unit. The first unit that was shipped was damaged in transit and sent back a new one was delivered and installed in time for the wedding of a members daughter.

The invitation to bid on the project was sent to local qualified contractors. So far we have received one bid and it is more than double what was approved by the Board. We are following up with other

We experienced some issues with the local contractors to see if they are willing to bid and have expanded our contact area. Due to the initial bid received, we are looking at less costly alternative designs. These alternatives are under preliminary evaluation to determine if they will indeed allow for a significant cost savings.

Progress on PML Cell Tower Project

As most of you know, for almost two years, our Association has been working with a cell tower contractor to finalize an agreement to bring a new tower and better service to PML.

We received word this week from the site acquisition manager of a major wireless provider, that the site has been approved by their Engineering and Real Estate departments. The next steps for the contractor will be to perform a site survey, schedule an acquisition and engineering walk, create zoning plans, perform environmental assessments and prepare the necessary permit and zoning application to submit to Tuolumne County.

Our staff will continue to coordinate and provide onsite support as needed. The contractor estimates that the timeframe for completion of the project is 6 to 8 months.

The Dog Days of Summer

I can hardly believe it is August already, summer heat is peaking, and that rolling chariot of fire crosses the sky each day showing no mercy on us here in this northern hemisphere. Life in the foothills can be challenging these days, the days are hot and the nights are hot, the ground is dry and the creeks are dry, the hillside grasses are brown, the trees are suffering immensely, the dust of the dry earth coats the landscape, our buildings, our windshields. We are in the fourth straight year of drought, and water has become an even scarcer resource.

California is taking on the persona of John Steinbeck's 1936 novel *The Grapes of Wrath*, with our terrain becoming more like the dustbowl of the 1930's in Oklahoma. A casual reading of the first chapter transports us to a time of depression and heartache. When the sky gave no rain, the ground became dry and hard, the vegetation dried up, and the earth gave no fruit. These families gathered all they could carry and left their homes for the west coast paradise called California. The fertile valleys irrigated with the plentiful water that just streamed from the snow-capped mountains, gave abundance to all, feeding the nation and the world with its abundance.

The small town of Artesia, just outside of Los Angeles, was known for its natural artesian wells. The water from these wells had to have pressure regulator valves to control the natural water pressure, ditches carried the water to the orchards and dairies, water flow which increased during the day as the ocean's tides came in. Centuries of ground water had percolated into the substrates of the San Gabriel Mountains, streams traveled below the ground, aquifers filled beyond capacity, and the natural artesian springs bubbled up water

oh so many miles from the source.

The well water was always available...until the artesian wells gave no more; the well water became saline from the ocean water that had begun to fill the emptied aquifers, huge storm water runoff projects had concreted the river beds, the raging storm water runoff now rushed to the sea, the aquifers filled no more, and the snow-capped mountains became an old postcard. This is the California water saga...it is in abundance until we have no more.

In times of plenty, we must plan for times of scarcity. This we have done. We are able to endure these dog days of summer, still able to drink water from an ice filled glass, resting in the cool of the shade, hoping for the fall to bring us rain, the winter storms to heaping snow on the peaks, and a return to our normal California climate. Three more months of hot dry weather are still in front of us.

Our PMLA Maintenance Department and Golf Course Maintenance Department have worked hard at creating water conservation methods to get us all through this period of drought. These methods will not be eliminated with the first hint of the end of our drought. Irrigated areas will be converted to pleasing hardscapes, reducing the demand for irrigation water, conserving our water for more vital uses. Alternative sources of irrigation water are being used to sustain vegetation, along with many water storage and delivery methods.

Potable water is being conserved to provide this scarce resources for all of us to use, with savings being implemented wherever and whenever possible. The lake is down nearly seven feet, the beaches are bigger than ever, and the lake bottom is exposed. Lawns that are brown, soon will become a stigma of the past. Ground that is hard, dry and cracked will bloom again.

Enduring these days of an apocalyptic hardship is upon everyone's shoulders, conservation is better than allocation, and a cool drink of water better than going thirsty. The choices are real, and the difficult days are still to come. These dog days of summer are still a huge threat to us all, for as the vegetation gets drier, the risk of wildfire increases, water must be available for any and all emergencies as well as for daily uses. We are all in the balance, enduring the heat, conserving water wherever possible, hoping for the return of the wet weather this fall, and dare I say, a return of the sierra snowpack. California's water scarcity will be with us for decades to come, the solutions are at hand, the water conservation work will be accomplished.

PMLA Money Matters

As promised in last month's article I would like to update you on the Association's efforts to reduce our water usage in light of the severe drought throughout California. I am happy to report that for the first six months of 2015 we have used 30% less water than we did in the same period in 2013. Our efforts in this regard will continue. Hopefully you are all doing your part to conserve water during this challenging time.

As you can see from the financial summary included in every edition of the PML News, the Association is performing extremely well compared to budget for the first half of the year. I know that all of you (OK, some of you) review these figures each month. I thought it might be useful to shed some light on a few of the reasons for this strong performance. Generally speaking significant variances from budget fall into four basic categories, Timing, Actual Savings, Budgeting Anomalies and Uncontrollables. Below are some of the items impacting each of these categories.

TIMING – There are many instances where the timing of a particular expense impacts the financial comparison to budget. Some expenses may occur sooner or later than predicted, thus having a temporary effect on our results. These items generally correct themselves as we move through the year. Here are a few of these areas

along with their impact versus budget for the first half of 2015. Uniforms (-\$3.3K); Contract Services (-\$83.5K); Legal Fees (-\$7.5K); Labor Transfers (\$10.8K); Fire Abatement (-\$23.2K); and Member Communications (-\$8.1K).

ACTUAL SAVINGS – This category represents real savings that are the result of actions taken by the Association to reduce costs. These savings are generally permanent in nature and will not be reversed during future months. Here are a few of these areas along with their impact versus budget for the first half of 2015. Personnel Costs (-\$127.1K); Automotive (-\$6.0K); Gas & Oil (-\$27.1K); and Utilities (-\$22.6K).

BUDGETING ANOMALIES – These types of variances are the result of incorrect assumptions used when preparing the annual budget. They include misjudging the level of certain expenses and unexpected costs that were not anticipated during the budget preparation process. Here are a few of these areas along with their impact versus budget for the first half of 2015. Cost of Sales (-\$6.9K); Janitorial (\$9.7K); and Insurance (\$16.4K).

UNCONTROLLABLES – As the name implies this category includes revenue and expense

variations that are, for the most part, out of our direct control. They may be affected by things such as weather, customer usage patterns, unexpected supplier price changes and unforeseen repair costs. Here are a few of these areas along with their impact versus budget for the first half of 2015. Sales (\$12.6K); Service Based Revenue (-\$9.0K); Fish Planting (-\$3.8K); Credit Card Fees (\$9.6K) and Bank Fees (\$1.1K).

As you can see there are a number of factors that affect our monthly and yearly financial performance. The items listed above are just a few of those factors. The management team and your Board strives to maximize revenue and minimize costs throughout the year. This helps us keep your costs (assessment) at a reasonable level. Remember that any year in which we end up with a surplus, that amount is rolled into next year's budget, thereby effectively reducing the required assessment.

Well that's it for this month. 

I've got the time, energy, interest, experience, judgement, and most of all the temperament to well


represent the PML membership on the Board of Directors. I also enjoy the responsibility. These are the reasons why I choose to run for reelection and ask for your vote.



What came first, the Chicken or the Egg? Well for us when we are talking about the cost of food, it happens to be the Egg. First, we saw a huge price increase in eggs at the beginning of

the year in California. The reason was that farmers are now required to house hens in cages large enough to allow them to move around and stretch their wings. And now the price of chicken has increased but for a much more serious reason, Avian Flu. Don't be alarmed. NO human cases of these HPAI H5 viruses have been detected in the United States, Canada, or internationally. I try to keep you informed of new events in my monthly article, however this month I wanted to assure you that all of our food products are safe and provided by approved suppliers. This is not a food safety issue. The virus is being closely monitored by the USDA. The following is from the USDA website:

"Since December 2014, the USDA has confirmed several cases of highly pathogenic avian influenza (HPAI) H5 in the Pacific, Central, and Mississippi flyways (or migratory

bird paths). The disease has been found in wild birds, as well as in a few backyard and commercial poultry flocks. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) considers the risk to people from these HPAI H5 infections to be low. The USDA has both an international and a domestic role in controlling the spread of avian influenza (AI) and reducing its effects on both agriculture and public health. No human cases of these HPAI H5 viruses have been detected in the United States, Canada, or internationally. The USDA is aware of and prepared for the emergence of new types of AI virus. The nature of the influenza virus is such that mutations occur easily. Therefore, new strains can occur naturally at any time within avian hosts. The concern is whether the changes would impart the potential to cause severe disease or increase transmissibility between birds or mammals. Regardless of these changes, the USDA plans that are currently in place, which include surveillance, reporting, biosecurity, movement control, vaccination and depopulation, can be adjusted and applied to effectively control any new virus outbreak."

Green Camo and Ammo

Every deer season residents bear witness to illegal hunting activities in Pine Mountain Lake and the surrounding area. Regrettably, this appears to be a continuous problem from year to year. Pine Mountain Lake is designated as a "Private Refuge" and no hunting is actually permitted within any of our incorporated areas. Deer hunting presents some obvious hazards to the human residents of this community, although the stakes are most likely higher for the deer. If you have happened to observe any of our local deer you might notice that they are somewhat tamer than their cousins in the higher elevations. Our deer somehow know that Pine Mountain Lake is the safe place to be which makes the hunting here far less than challenging.

Groveland and Pine Mountain Lake are zoned D6, which includes Tuolumne, Mariposa and a portion of several bordering counties. Our archery season begins on August 15, 2015 and lasts until September 6, 2015. The general deer hunting season begins on September 19, 2015 and ends on November 1, 2015. Although the majority of the issues the Department of Safety encounters occur during the archery season, we do from time to time have reports of hunters gathering, no pun intended, during the general deer hunting season.

Please remember to keep your eyes peeled

during the coming months for activity that appears to be related to illegal hunting or even poaching of out-of-season game. The reports we have received in the past included vehicles that were outfitted with more aggressive than usual off-road equipment, groups of primarily men congregated on the roadside, dressed in camouflage or other hunting attire and those with the appearance that they may be stalking game, sometimes with weapons in hand. These were all good indicators that illegal hunting was taking place in Pine Mountain Lake and in many instances were the result of tips we received from members. If you happen to witness a vehicle that may be involved in illegally hunting game, please try to record their license plate number or even snap a picture with your cell phone, if it is safe to do so. Any suspicious activity of this nature should be immediately reported to the Main Gate at (209) 962-8615. We can then work with the Department of Fish and Wildlife in positively identifying the perpetrators.

On the flip side of this article, if you are interested in legally hunting deer or other game during the upcoming seasons, the Main Gate does sell hunting licenses and tags of many varieties. Thank you in advance for all being law-abiding citizens.

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
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BEFORE YOU BEGIN CONSTRUCTION ON YOUR LOT


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On the Lake

WHAT'S UP (AND DOWN) WITH THE WATER?

If by chance you read last month's article, I planned on discussing systems that can increase the amount of oxygen in the water (especially in the deepest parts of the Lake). Instead, I'll share with you the results of the latest survey we did and discuss what they mean. The survey involves lowering an instrument (technically a multiprobe) from the surface all the way to the bottom (at the deepest part of the Lake near the dam). At 5 foot intervals it records some basic parameters like temperature, dissolved oxygen, turbidity and pH. It also measures a few more complicated chemical properties, but for simplicity, I'll skip those.

If you can read the squiggles on the graph, the red line is the temperature in degrees Fahrenheit. It is indexed to the red numbers at the top. On the left of the graph is the corresponding depth. At the surface and down to 15 feet the temperature is about 77°F. Going deeper the temperature drops very quickly into the forties. The zone where the temperature is dropping is called the thermocline. It separates the layer of warmer and lighter water from the colder and heavier water below. In geeky lake terminology the layers are respectively called the epilimnion and hypolimnion. And, absent of any huge waves or artificial circulation, they don't mix. So, although there is ample oxygen in the upper layer, it does not spread into the deeper layer; which brings us to the green squiggle.

The green line is the amount of dissolved oxygen (DO) in the water. It is measured in milligrams per liter (mg/L) and is indexed to the numbers at the bottom of the graph. From the surface to about 30 feet, there is enough oxygen to keep all the fish and little aquatic creatures happy and healthy. Below 30 feet, the DO drops to near zero (not good). You might also notice the big increase near 25 feet. That is caused by the microscopic algae that, like all plants, produce oxygen. That is

"kind of" good because oxygen is good for the water, but just like all plants (especially mine) they either die or get eaten. When they die, they sink to the bottom and start to decompose. And while they are decomposing, they use up a lot of oxygen. If you follow the green line below 35 feet, you'll see that there is zip, zero, no oxygen (a bad thing).

The brown squiggle (that just sounds bad) is the turbidity. Turbidity is a measurement of the amount of particles in the water. The particles scatter the sunlight and prevent it from penetrating deeper into the water. Turbidity is closely related to clarity or how deep you can see into the water. It is a hot topic at Lake Tahoe where the clarity has partly been affected by sand that is spread on the roads in the winter (I know, what's winter). The sand gets pulverized into dust that finds its way into the lake. Even so, you can still see about 75 feet into Tahoe's famous blue water. On Crater Lake, the clarity can be over 100 feet and on Hetch Hetchy it can be about 50 feet. On our Lake, it was just over 10 feet on July 12. Our clarity is affected by algae and to a small extent by sediment resuspended from boat wakes. But if you look at the graph, you see that the biggest increase in turbidity is around 20 feet; the same place that oxygen increases due to the abundance of algae that hang out there.

And just to repeat, a lot of those algae die and sink to the bottom where they decompose and deplete the oxygen. So, with all that water wisdom under your belt, maybe next month we can discuss systems that can replenish the oxygen near the bottom. And remember; air is not the same as oxygen. The air we breathe is only about 21 percent oxygen... fortunately that's enough for most of us.

Sorry for the textbook explanation. Who else could make a wet subject so dry?

The cure for dry is; Enjoy the Lake. SPLASH!!!

Shades of Green

Welcome to the dog days of summer. {At my house the dog days last all year} We think of these dog days as being in July and August, but late June sure seemed to fit as well. With temperatures soaring above normal and limited water for irrigation the course has held up pretty well.

Speaking of water! I believe it to be important for all to know that the golf course was designed to be irrigated with lake water. Then a number of years later the course was approved to use effluent water from GCSD. Due to the quality of the effluent it was determined through water and soil samples that the mixture should be a ratio of 3 to 1 of lake water. If the effluent could be used without blending, there is not enough available for a season of irrigation.

What about water consumption or lake water used during the summer of 2015 and the fourth year of drought for California? Due to the effluent available through early July we have reversed the blending ratio to nearly 3 to 1 with effluent being higher. GCSD has been a good friend and they are sending us everything they have with an expected slowdown of effluent available in mid-July. Our use of lake water has been reduced by over 50% from normal levels. This 50% doesn't reflect an earlier 20% reduction as requested by the state in 2010. That is a lot of numbers! What impact will the course have on the lake in 2015? We expect to remove about 6 inches from the surface this year. We began the season with a

plan and to date have used less lake water than planned.

There is a time when the level of the lake will drop below our ability to pump and we must use a secondary pump to get the water to the primary pump.

How do we reduce water consumption by 50% and keep the course playable and alive? We have eliminated watering many out of play areas and reduced watering times throughout the course. We are using more wetting agents and surfactants to reduce soil tension. We do more hand watering and less mowing compared to normal years. The priorities are greens, tees, and fairways. We are trying to keep our roughs and perimeters alive to eliminate the cost of reclaiming these areas if we truly have a wet El Niño next rainy season.

As you can see it is a balancing act. We do all we can to reduce lake water consumption, yet blend efficiently for turf health. For those of you that share a property line with the golf course and see the turf look different this year than other years, it is drought related. We simply do not have the water to keep these areas looking like they would in a normal, non-drought year.

Have a great month of golf in August. Please remember to dump those ice chests on a dry area.

The golf course will be closed on Monday, September 28 and Tuesday, September 29, 2015 for greens aeration.

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Airport Safety at PML

This message is brought to you by the many pilots who have almost landed on or taxied into cars, animals or pedestrians while operating at Pine Mountain Lake Airport. One of the joys of being at an airpark, like the PML Airport, is the freedom to come and go as you please, no pesky control tower, no TSA. It's a treat to see the occasional high speed low pass, and have the opportunity to wander around in your car, bike, golf cart or walking, checking on the various hangars and interesting airplanes.

If you're not a pilot, you may not understand important "airport etiquette" such as airplanes always have the right-of-way and pedestrians may never ever go onto the runway. Unfortunately, there are increasing numbers of folks who think the airport is a great place to walk or bike ride with the family. This is against the rules and downright dangerous.

The airport is for the safe operation of aircraft. The County has a set of Ordinances that address these same extraneous activities, Section 18.06 and Section 18.08. Section 18.06 speaks to pedestrians on any part of the airport environment and 18.08 speaks to Motor Vehicles on the airport environment. Violation of either Ordinance is a misdemeanor.

Both Sections speak about customary and normal activity that is acceptable at an airport, such as dropping off passengers and crew at their airplane, walking out to view their take-off, etc. Other non-aircraft activity (including going for a walk on the taxiway) requires the express permission of the Airport Manager, and is never allowed.

Please remember that airplanes always have the right-of-way. Airplanes don't have a reverse gear so yes, cars have to back out of their way, and walkers have to get far off the taxiway as the plane, with its long wings, passes.

You must never, never walk a dog, or ride a bike, or drive any motor vehicle across or on the runway itself. It's against the law and it's dangerous.

A car or walker on the runway in front of a landing aircraft would cause a major accident. We have already had a couple of airplane go-arounds as a result of folks walking their dogs the length of the runway!

One of the charms of our airport is in fact wandering around the airport; so how do we do that without creating a hazardous situation? We want local non-pilots to view our airport as a good thing, just not too much of a good thing.

If you are out walking or driving at the airport, you may have a local pilot come up to you and remind you that airplanes have the right-of-way and to avoid the runway. They will be doing it for your safety.

We want everyone, pilots and non-pilots alike to view PML airport as their airport and as the great resource it is, but airport safety must be uppermost in all our minds. Thanks for your cooperation.





On Saturday, August 22nd, there is a Hazard Waste Collection event scheduled for Groveland. There is no charge for this service but there are, of course, guidelines. Pursuant to State Law, toxic items are limited to 15 gallons or 125 pounds. What qualifies as a toxic item"? The list is limited. For details and more information on this event, times and locations, please check out the county website under "solid waste division".

To make your appointment for drop-off or questions please call 1(800) 811-2435 or (209) 533-5588. Why an appointment? This is necessary in order to assure that adequate staffing is available in Groveland during the time you are able to drop off materials. You can also dispose of your waste at the County's permanent hazardous waste facility off High School Road in Jamestown (by appointment). This facility is open 1 day a month for hazardous waste disposal. Please take advantage of this program sponsored by the County's Solid Waste Division.

Tuolumne County Transit (TCTC) Agency recently held a meeting to discuss the Dial-A-Ride program and how it affects Seniors and Veterans. For clarification, the TCTC IS NOT a county run program. It is governed by a separate Joint Powers Association (JPA) whose membership consists of 2 County Supervisors, 2 city Council Members and 1 "at large" member. County and City funds are not used to support this JPA. It is supported by Federal and State funds and by "fare box" recovery. (Fares paid by riders to offset expenses) Each year the JPA asks for input on unmet transit needs and each year the needs for the South County are brought forward and discussed. In order to provide a service for a given route, the fare box recovery rate must provide 10% of the funds required to provide the service. Limited ridership for the Groveland route and lack of participation provided far less than the 10% contribution requirement resulting in discontinuance of the Groveland route.

Because TCTC knows that that we have a large senior population in the South County, the JPA continues to look for ways to provide services. Right now there is a program in place called "Trip" that will provide reimbursement to those that offer ride assistance to individuals in need. For more information please contact the TCTC Agency at (209) 533-5603. It is my goal to reinstate some sort of regular bus service from Groveland to Sonora. As with most programs, there is a funding issue. Public transportation is a highly subsidized program. The only way

If enacted, the Bill could be implemented immediately by the Forest Service and Bureau of Land Management to dramatically improve the health and resiliency of our Federal Forest and Rangelands. It reduces the cost of implementing forest management prospect while still ensuring protection of the environment, simplifies environmental process requirements.

> District 2 Supervisor, Randy Hanvelt, testified before the House Committee on National Resources last month to carry Tuolumne County Support for this bill The Bill number is HR 2647. Please let our representatives know how you feel and ask them to support the position of Tuolumne County.

> Hopefully by the time you read this article we will have been notified as to whether we have been successful in the National Disaster Resiliency Competition. (NDRC). The application process has been a demanding marathon to say the least. I want to thank the many participants that have given their time and energy to help with their input on this tremendous opportunity for our county.

> In closing, I want to continue to offer my assistance in any way possible and to help with any problems that may arise concerning County Government or an unmet need. Don't be bashful or reluctant to call. If you feel that there is a problem or an unanswered question, I can only help if I am aware of the need. Water Saving Tips for the Kitchen

The extended California drought is of great concern. Every little water saving we can do at home, work and play can help. Here are a few reminders, things you know and maybe even a new idea for water savings in the kitchen.

DISH PAN A pan of water in the sink avoids turning on the faucet for all sorts of things. Dip your fingertips in when they need a quick rinse. Drop in silverware or dishes to soak or for a quick rinse before loading the dish washer.

DISPOSAL Stop using the disposal. Toss or compost food scraps. Buy a mesh sink strainer at the Dollar Store and avoid using your disposal. The disposal requires water to operate properly, if your kitchen faucet put out 2.0 gallons-per-minute, there's one gallon of perfectly good water down the drain. If you can't live without the disposal, cut use to every other day (50% reduction) or once a week (85% reduction) or, even better, use dish pan water.

DISHWASHER Scrape don't rinse; rinsing dishes is one of the biggest kitchen water wasters, up to 20 gallons a day. A rubber spatula from the Dollar Store is great for scraping even the most delicate dishware. Stuff the dishwasher full, is good advice for dishwashers purchased before 1994, which use 10 gallons of water or more per load. Energy Star® dishwashers will use 5-6 gallons per load. Ours uses 3 gallons.

HANDWASH You may not have a dishwasher or you may hand wash some dishes but not others. Using a dishpan or partially filling the sink are the most efficient methods for washing and rinsing. Avoid using running water for rinsing if possible. Keep a dishpan under the sink for dirty dishes until you have enough for efficient hand washing. Dishpan wash water with biodegradable soap are safe for plants.

HOLDING BUCKET If it is relatively clean water pour it into a holding bucket in the kitchen. The holding bucket can be used to water plants

FREDERICK JAMES ABBOTT

1945 - 2015

(The following was written by Dean Abbot, Jim's brother.)

It is a tearfully sad day for the Abbott family. Our brother, Jim Abbott has passed and now resting peacefully in the hands of his savior, Jesus Christ.

He was born Frederick James, August 16, 1945, Lawrence, Mass. In early 1952 the family packed up and journeyed into the future, landing in Hermosa Beach. Jim attended all the local schools, South, Valley Vista, Pier Avenue and Mira Costa (1965). His legacy lies with his natural abilities, big heart and swift feet.

Starting early as an outstanding All-Star Little Leaguer, Jr. High track standout, then record holding track star at Mira Costa. After 52 years, he just may still hold at least one school record, in 1965 he held three. He was the ultimate competitor, a magnificent athlete; it seemed so easy for him. People have told me may have been the most incredibly gifted runner they ever saw. As a high school sophomore Jim was offered a full scholarship from the Naval Academy with options to attend any Military Academy of his choice.

For many years Jim, along with all the Abbott's, took part in the family business, Boston Cleaners. From working the register, deliveries, to learning to press garments. This WAS the business that supported our family of 6 kids, and proud of it.

St. Cross church was a family tradition and an inspiration; Jim served the church as an Acolyte for many years, then on to YPF (Young People's Fellowship). A wonderful environment for young adults.

Jim also had a kind of mysterious side, well known for a quiet yet flamboyant personality when moving around a pool table or dealing a deck of cards. Living on Loma Dr., Jim arrived home, like a peacock strutting their feathers, proudly displaying a red 1954 Ford, chrome wheels, and sweet mellow dual exhaust.

In 1967 Jim was drafted into the Army and honorably served in Vietnam. Upon his return, he suffered and struggled to make sense of the world. Vietnam took his soul and hid it in places he had to look hard for.

He struggled for many years, finally landing in the foothills, of the Sierra, Groveland, CA. He found solace here and met the love of his life, Veronica. There happened to be a golf course nearby that captured his interest. Now in his late 30's, Jim Abbott never before picked up a golf club in his life, within four years he acquired his PGA license and became the assistant pro at Pine Mountain Lake Golf Course.

Jim was 50 when he and Veronica moved everything for an extended visit to Mexico, landing just south of Todos Santos, a small camp and surf spot at Pescadero. He developed a wonderful association with his neighbors and lived simply but emphatically insisting on mutual respect. In Pescadero he was known as "James", some called him "James Bond". He would laugh and say, "Right, James Bond."

Local story goes: Jim was invited to play golf in Cabo. After not picking up a golf club in 10 years, turning 60, he arrived to play wearing a button-down shirt, cargo shorts, and sandals. The caddies were quite anxious to watch this rag tag old man actually play with persimmon woods. After some practice, Jim tees up on #1, emphatically hits the ball 350 yards, finishing his round at a dismal +3. He still was that magnificent of an athlete.

In Pescadero, Jim lived out his dream, with his girl by his side, along the beach sands of the Pacific. Jim Abbot was authentic, lived life on his terms, loving most, never offending anyone.

I will miss you, you are my hero.

or to run the disposal. Unused drinking water, ice, rinse water, dish pan water and vegetable steaming water can all go into the holding bucket.

SLOW THE FLOW When running water at the sink, run it slow, not full open. If your faucet runs at 2.0 gallons-per-minute, a slower rate can be 1 gallon per minute (50% reduction) or more.


EYES ALIVE If you are not looking at the water, don't have the faucet running. If you are rinsing, not scraping dishes, turn off the water when your eyes turn away from the sink to put the dish in the dishwasher. If you are NOT looking at the water running, even for 5 seconds, you

are NOT using the water ... turn it off.

HAND SANITIZER Don't turn on the water to wash your hands, use hand sanitizer. Sometimes washing your hands with running water is not necessary. Keep a bottle of hand sanitizer beside the kitchen sink. At the Dollar Store it's only a buck versus three at the pharmacy.

KNOW THE NUMBERS Do you know what the gallon-per-minute output of your kitchen sink is? Do you know how much water your dishwasher uses to run a cycle? Knowing the numbers you can do the math for your use and make better water use decisions. Armed with the make, model and year you can find this information online.


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Sierra EcoSUMMIT & Festival Coming to Groveland

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Gender Identity Disorder

Good-bye Bruce, Hello Caitlyn! The newspapers and TV have been filled with all the details regarding the celebrity who received treatment to change from a man to a woman. This has been a controversial subject and one that has received much derision due to lack of scientific or medical study and the confusion with homosexuality. It has only been in the past few decades that gender identity disorder has been considered a separate official classification by the American Psychiatric Association.

Gender Identity Disorder or Gender Dysphoria is the formal diagnosis used by psychologists and physicians to describe people who experience significant discontent with the sex and gender they were assigned at birth. GID was classified as a medical disorder and was treated to support the individual by physically modifying the body to better match the psychological gender identity, how they felt and saw themselves.

Symptoms of GID include disgust with their genitalia, social isolation, anxiety and

depression. They are more likely to experience harassment, humiliation, rejection and even violence from others.

They are at increased risk for stress, poor self-esteem and suicide. Studies have shown that 41% of transgender people have a high rate of suicide attempts.

Studies have indicated that there are biological causes for GID; genetic variation, hormones and differences in brain functioning and brain structure. In male-to-female transsexuals variations in the individual is less sensitive to male genes. A study (1995) found that in one area of the brain, male-to-female transgender individuals have a typically female structure, and female-to- male transsexuals have a typically male structure.

Western cultures have attached social stigma to deviating from the male/female gender roles. As a result transgender individuals suffered from guilt, insecurity, lack of self-esteem and fear. Since many of these people have had these feelings of dysphoria from the time they were young, their lives have

been clouded with feelings like they never will be accepted, fearful of never developing relationships or the opportunity to make life plans.

Today GID is not only regarded as a medical issue but also a psychological one. The patient is involved in making the sex assignment decisions as well as what the individual needs to gain a positive sense of self and feeling comfortable in his/her own skin. It includes psychological counseling, making life style changes, physical changes, hormone treatment, genital /breast surgery, and hair removal.

In California, assembly Bill (AB) 1266 was passed in May 2013 prohibiting schools from discriminating on the basis of gender, gender identity and gender expression. This bill required that a pupil be permitted to participate in school programs and activities.

Being a transgender human being can be difficult on so many levels and areas of life. As a child growing up knowing something is wrong but not understanding why or what could be done about it, must be painfully confusing. Being different is never easy. Let us remember, "Treat everyone as you would like to be treated".

Healthy Habits FROM PINE MOUNTAIN THERAPY

The Power of Stretching

When treating patients I am repeatedly reminded how powerful a few stretches can be. So many of our aches, pains and injuries come from muscle imbalance. This imbalance happens gradually through habitual movements and postures. There is "controversy" in the

stretching world but the benefits outweigh the critics, and as with everything, moderation.

Stretching for the "regular" person (versus stretching for specific activities) should focus on which muscle are habitually shortened by sitting, slouching, wearing high heels etc.

Stretching improves flexibility, and consequently, range of motion in your joins. Joints that move through their full range of motion enable the muscle to work more effectively.

Our bodies are made up of groups of muscles on either side of the joints. If one side is shorter and one side is longer there is a constant battle against gravity to maintain balance. Stretching evens out to stresses on the joints. Less stress equals less joint wear and tear and less pain.

We spend a lot of time sitting so stretches should focus on lengthening the major muscles groups that are shortened in this posture: front of the hips, chest, calves, neck and shoulders. Stretches should be done slowly, gently



lengthening the muscles, feel the tension and hold x 30 seconds, no bouncing.

Over stretching is possible and can cause injury. Strive for symmetry. Everyone's genetics for flexibility are a bit different, so rather than striving for that yoga master's level of stretch, think symmetry and balance.

Stretching should feel good.

Simple stretching programs are available on the Internet, but her are a few good ones:

LUNGES: step forward placing one foot on a low step, hold your shoulders back (don't lean forward) Feel stretch in the front of the thigh and calf of your back leg.

UPPER BACK EXTENSION: clasp your hands behind your neck. Open your elbow up and gently stretch your upper back pressing forward with your chest.

CHIN TUCKS: look straight forward, pull your chin in, like you're making a double chin, eyes stay level (don't lookup)

The biggest challenge is making stretching a routine. But once you do it's totally worth it. If you need help with specific stretches, we are here for you!

Museum Happenings

The false-fronted structure in this 1988 photograph was built in 1920 as the Tuolumne Meat Market and remodeled and enlarged over the years to accommodate various tenants. In the 1970s and 80s it was a pharmacy and later a stationary store. The distinctive 45 degree angle on this building's northwest corner helps identify the current home of Yosemite Gateway Properties and the Groveland Veterinary Clinic on the south side of Main Street in Groveland.

The original owner was A. Salvadore Ferretti, known as Sal, born in 1871 near Groveland to Giuseppi and Maria (Soleri) Ferretti. He left his hometown in his twenties to work as a San Francisco police officer and in 1896 met and married Irish-born Nona Turley.

Sal and Nona returned to Groveland and in 1898, Sal purchased the 1,400 acre Edmund James Ranch beside Big Creek, much of it now under Pine Mountain Lake. There he had a slaughter house where cattle, hogs, and sheep were killed, skinned, and quartered. Their meat was then trucked to Groveland for further butchering and processing.

The adobe building that now houses Fire Fall Coffee was the site of Sal's first butcher shop around the turn of the century until a 1920 fire destroyed the interior. To the west of the adobe, on the site of the historic Schroeder Hotel, Sal's new Tuolumne Meat Market was built. The meat market's west side featured a loading dock with a grappling hook attached to a track so sides of beef could easily be unloaded from delivery trucks and moved into the meat market's refrigerator. The butcher shop also sold bulk ice since kitchen 'ice boxes' of the day relied on a constant supply of blocks of ice to keep perishable food fresh.

The following year in 1921 Sal had the house just to the east (now Miss Kailey's Boutique) built to serve as his in-town residence. A two-story addition at the rear contained ice making and



refrigeration equipment necessary for the meat processing business next door.

In 1910, California Governor Gillett appointed Sal as the 4th District County Supervisor, filling a vacancy due to the untimely death of Sylvester Carlon. Sal was a Republican and according to the Union Democrat represented Groveland "with strong independent tendencies." He cast the critical vote for funding the New Priest Grade Project and it was for him that Ferretti Road was named. Sal was an avid horseman and marksman well into his old age.

His wife Nona died in 1945 at the age of 70 and is interred at Our Lady of Mount Carmel Catholic Cemetery in Big Oak Flat. Sal died the following year in San Francisco at age 75 and his ashes are buried in Stockton at Casa Bonita Cemetery

You won't want to miss the new museum display which will be unveiled this month all about the Gamble Block Project in Big Oak Flat. The display tells the story of the Miner's Bean Kettle over the decades, the preservation efforts of the Cobden House, and the future plans for the Wells Fargo Building. Like many good things, Mountain Lutheran Church began with a vision in the 1980's when Pastor Harold Petersen of Mi Wuk Village came to Groveland to conduct Bible Studies and to lead prayers. From such humble roots, Mountain Lutheran has grown, nurtured by many able hands and hearts, with God's Spirit leading the way! In the 1990's Wathagene and Elmer Bailey hosted discussions in their home about forming a Lutheran congregation in the Groveland/ PML area.

Mrs. Bailey obtained a list of local Lutherans whom she contacted to inquire of their interest in having a Lutheran congregation in Groveland and whom she invited to an informal worship service in the home of Janet Zierenberg. Pastor Tom Beck of Mt. Calvary Lutheran Church in Mi Wuk Village conducted the service and played his guitar to accompany the singing and provide music. His congregation later sponsored Mountain Lutheran as a Lutheran Mission.

The first actual "Church" Service was held at Our Lady of Mt. Carmel Roman Catholic Church in Big Oak Flat on May 19, 1991. Those attending celebrated with a pot luck meal after the service. From that time on - they continued inviting people to "come & worship"! Eight Lutheran Pastors took turns coming to Big Oak Flat to preach and lead worship services on Sunday afternoons. The Catholic Church was very generous with us allowing us to worship there until our Lutheran congregation built and moved into our own church building in Groveland in July, 2006. Pastors Ralph Herman and John Van Dyck were among the 8 rotating pastors of those early days.

Pastor Ralph Herman was installed as our Pastor on March 22, 1992 with the official incorporation being accepted & confirmed by the State of CA. in March, 2001 with the legal name of Mountain Lutheran Church of Groveland, CA. Pastor Ralph faithfully served our congregation until he retired in June, 2013, after 58 years of ordained ministry - mostly in CA.

Pastor John Van Dyck returned to Mountain Lutheran as our regular, favorite Guest Preacher in the Summer of 2013. Everyone is inspired by his refreshing style and stories and interpretation

of Scripture when he leads worship for us twice each month.

Pastor Ginger DuMars and her husband, Bob, joined Mountain Lutheran Church in 2002, and became more and more involved in church activities - especially the building project. They enjoyed working with Tom Carman, Building Committee Chairman, and many other wonderful volunteers! Pastor Ginger was installed as Associate Pastor on Jan. 14, 2006, and became Sr. Pastor - by Congregational Vote -shortly after Pr. Ralph Herman's retirement. She remains faithful in her many duties as Sr. Pastor & Administrator of Mountain Lutheran Church assisted by many talented and committed officers and other volunteers!

Our congregation is very thankful to God and to the many volunteers and contractors who worked tirelessly and diligently to complete our church building - which was dedicated on the hottest day of the year - in July, 2006. Hosting the Summer 5th Sunday Gospel Sing each year is one way we offer our praises and thanks to God for being part of the Groveland Area's Christian Community and for having a beautiful church building!

GCSD Water Conservation Looking Better BY GCSD WATER CONSERVATION COMMITTEE

By the end of May, water conservation for all GCSD customers combined was a disappointing 12%. The state mandates 24% water conservation compared to 2013. To make up the shortfall, the new goal for our customers is 33%. In June, by happy coincidence, District wide water consumption fell 33%, improving cumulative conservation to 19% - still shy of the 24% state mandate, but looking better.

In the summer season, water consumption increases due to tourists and vacationers. It's now or never for achieving required water conservation.

The stakes are crucial. Failure to meet the state water reduction mandate of 24% means fines of up to \$10,000 per day. In this nightmare scenario, each GCSD customer pays \$1000 more this year. Furthermore, GCSD will not be eligible for valuable State Grants essential for maintaining and repairing our aging infrastructure. These grants reduce customer bills by several hundred dollars per year.

GCSD is impressed with the persistent, innovative ways many customers are saving water. The old-fashioned bucket seems to be a tool of choice. Customers are catching water in their showers, baths, and kitchen sinks and reusing it to water plants. GCSD highly approves of this greywater use - pay once, use twice.

Many folks are worried about their trees, especially the grand old native species. Laundry greywater using liquid soaps without bleach can keep them alive. But don't forget to apply mulch 6 inches deep. Mulch keeps the shallow top soil moist, where most of the roots are. Pine Mountain Lake residents have access to a free, endless supply of quality mulch at the PMLA yard waste site next to the Campground on Ferretti Road just 2.5 miles outside of Groveland.

Our website, GCSD.org, has helpful information on all aspects of water conservation, including generous rebates for water efficient toilets, shower heads, and greywater systems.



Tacos Al Pastor

RECIPE BY TOM KNOTH & PAULA MARTELL OF TWO LITTLE PIGS BBQ CATERING

Tacos al Pastor are my favorite "street tacos" to eat in Mexico, where they are traditionally cooked on a vertical spit, referred to as a "trompo". The meat is stacked on the trompo in layers, with pineapple interlaced. Charred meat is trimmed from the sides for tacos, and they are fantastic!

Many don't realize that most Latin American countries have had many foreign influences on their cuisine, typically from Europe. "Al Pastor" is an adaptation of "Shawarma", spit-grilled meat brought by Lebanese immigrants to Mexico.

We have experimented with many recipes for Al Pastor, but found that this relatively simplified one was a favorite for us. You can find the "Chipotles in Adobo Sauce" in most markets, including Marval. The Achiote Paste, which is essential to this recipe, is found in Mexican markets, including one in Oakdale. Not a pork fan? Try it with chicken breast; that is how we usually make it! Tacos al pastor can also be purchased from the Martinez Food Truck that parks by the hardware store in Big Oak Flat.

INGREDIENTS

- 1 Cup Pineapple Juice
- 1/4 Cup Canola, Vegetable, or Corn Oil, plus more for cooking
- 1 Ounce Achiote Paste
- 2 Tbsp Adobo Sauce (from a can of chipotles in adobo sauce)
- 3-4 Chipotles (from a can of chipotles in adobo sauce)
- 3 cloves Garlic
- 1 tsp Kosher Salt
- 2 lbs Boneless Pork Butt (can substitute Chicken

Breast), sliced into 1/2 inch thick slices, then into 1/2 inch wide strips

- 12 White Corn Tortillas
- 1 Yellow Onion, 1/4-inch dice
- 1/2 Pineapple, peeled, cored, 1/2-inch dice
- 1/4 cup Cilantro Leaves

Jack, Cheddar, or your preferred cheese, for serving

Salsa Verde, for serving

DIRECTIONS

Puree 3/4 Cup of the pineapple juice, the vegetable oil, achiote paste, adobo sauce, chipotles, garlic and salt in a food processor. Mix the pineapple juice mixture with the pork in a freezer bag and move around to coat. Marinate the pork in the fridge, 1 to 2 hours.

Preheat a cast-iron skillet or grill to med-high heat. Lightly oil the skillet and add the tortillas, toasting, about 30 seconds per side. Remove the tortillas and store in a towel to keep warm.

Raise the heat under the skillet to high and add 1 tablespoon vegetable oil. Remove the pork from the bag and wipe off any excess pineapple juice mixture. Cook the pork in batches, until charred and cooked through.

Remove the pork from the skillet. Chop the meat into bite-size pieces. Add the onions and fresh pineapple and quickly cook until lightly browned, about 2 minutes. Add the remaining 1/4 Cup of pineapple juice, cilantro, and the pork to the skillet and cook for a minute more.

Place the pork, pineapple and onion mixture in the tortillas. Top with the cilantro, cheese,

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
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
