The budget process that began in August has finally been completed. I want to thank Joe, Ken, our amenity managers and all the staff for the hard work and many hours they put into making the 2007 budget a reality. I would also like to thank all my fellow Board members for their efforts getting this job done. To all I say, Good Show!

A major focus of this year's budget was the repair and refurbishment of our aging amenities. We added monies to repair the Marina docks, repair the Marina Store and Grill building and add new carpeting to both the Lake Lodge and the Administration buildings. Included in the budget are funds to complete the fencing project for the Equestrian Center and maintenance and improvement of the tennis courts 5 and 6. We also committed to repair the Country Club Kitchen flooring and install the ADA ramp for the pool. These are all ambitious projects but they have been put off too long and now need to be completed.

Another big change this year is the cancellation of the Restaurant voucher program. This program was originally designed as a marketing program to stimulate traffic in the Country Club. An analysis of the program indicated that the program was not meeting its original objectives. Our members did not use approximately 50% of the vouchers and those that were used did not create new business but actually cannibalized some of the business that we already had. Since results did not meet our expectations, the Board decided to drop the program.



Looking to the future, the Board has established a Long Range Planning Committee under the guidance of our Treasurer Mike Gustafson and Director Rita Hart. The committee will also include property owners and will be chartered to develop short and long-term plans for your Association. To assist in this effort, the 2007 budget includes monies to hire a restaurant consultant to work with our Club Manager on improving the operation. We also added funds to hire a marketing consultant to work with our Golf Professional and our Club Manager to develop new programs to enhance the revenue for both of these areas. Finally, we added funds to develop new ideas for the future layout of the Marina.

Mike and Rita have a tough job ahead of them so please give them your fullest cooperation.

Now here's a word from our bits and pieces file. The Lake Dredging project remains mired down in the permit process. We are rapidly being pushed into doing a full-blown Environmental Impact Report, which will also increase the cost by about \$60,000. Since the dredging must be done when the lake is at its fullest, we missed the window of opportunity for this year so this has caused the project to be delayed by a year. We will provide you with a full status update at the January Board meeting.

The new accounting package has been purchased and is currently being installed. It is scheduled to go live on January 1, 2007. We will be procuring the new point of sales (POS) software in early 2007 with a target of being fully operational prior to the peak season. The 2006 budget included \$100,000 for both packages and the accompanying hardware but that turned out to be about \$30,000 short of what is required. We have added the additional funds to the 2007 budget.

On the legal front, the court approved our motion to indemnify the existing directors in the Lett-Kauffman vs. Pine Mountain Lake suit. Other than that there has been no further progress on any of the legal matters.

GENERAL MANAGER'S MESSAGE

Administration

The 2007 Budget was completed and approved by the Board of Directors on Saturday, November 4th. Copies of the 2007 Pro Forma Budget Summary are already being mailed to members. If you do not receive a copy, please contact my Administrative Assistant, Debra Durai, at (209) 962-8627 and she will get a copy to you. I would like to thank Association Controller Ken Spencer and our staff for making this year's budget process easy and expeditious for our Board, managers and the Budget and Finance Committee.

Main Gate Entrance and Swimming Pool ADA Ramp Projects

On Friday, November 10th we met with our architect to go over preliminary plans for the Main Gate Entrance and Swimming Pool ADA Ramp Projects. We asked him to prepare additional designs and create some color conceptual drawings for the Main Gate Project. We are also gathering the necessary topographical maps and information for the Swimming Pool ADA Ramp. As these projects progress, we will continue to provide updated information in future issues of the PML News.

Long Range Planning Committee

At the October monthly Board meeting, the Board of Directors created a new Long Range Planning Committee. The Board is looking for applicants and PML members interested in helping plan for the future of PML are encouraged to apply. The Board is scheduled to select and appoint new committee members at the January 20th Board meeting. A copy of the Committee's mission statement is available at the Administration Office and will be published in the PML News.

Tennis Courts

Recently our Maintenance Department performed crack repair and painting at Tennis Courts 5 & 6 near the Country Club entrance and they look great. We plan to finish painting the outside court area when weather permits. Special thanks to Racquet Club President, Mark Noullian, and PML Board Vice President, Ron Maguire, for their input and support on this project.

Roads Asphalt Overlay

We experienced some real scheduling, bidding and logistical issues with the asphalt contractors this year and we will be forced to move this work until the spring of 2007. Currently we are looking at combining the \$400K budgeted in 2006 with the \$600K in the 2007 budget year to get it all done when the contractor starts back up in the spring. A benefit will be better bargaining power to get more roadwork done for the money. We are very unhappy with the delay of the project this year and will be meeting with our contracted engineering firm to determine why this happened. For those members whose streets were scheduled for repair, we apologize for the delay.

Country Club 2-Hour Parking

The Department of Safety has stepped up their enforcement of the parking rules in front of the Country Club and will be issuing \$25 tickets to those that violate the rules. All members are asked to observe the parking rules and help support patronage at our Club.

Donations and Fundraisers

Every year we receive many requests for donations from different local charities and groups, we also receive requests for assistance with fund-raisers. Often we get the requests by telephone and it makes it difficult to monitor and track. We are asking all groups and individuals that are requesting donations and help to put their requests in writing to the Board of Directors and mark the envelope with my name on it so that I can ensure the request is considered in a timely manner.

Lake Dredging Project

In my report last month I mentioned the Lake Dredging Project was delayed due to the permitting process and detailed the variables that caused this to happen.

In an effort to push this project forward, we met with Moffit and Nichol, the contractor heading up our project ,and determined what reports and studies would be necessary to comply with the agencies' environmental and permitting requirements.

We are required to conduct an environmental impact survey, biological and fisheries survey, CEQA document preparation and review of previous archaeological reports and surveys. All of these additional surveys and reports are estimated to add an additional \$60K to our project cost.

Annual Dam Gate Exercise and Water Release

On November 10th and 11th our Maintenance Department released water from Pine Mountain Lake. This is done annually to exercise the dam release gates in accordance with monitoring by the Division of Dam Safety, Fish and Game and our Limnologist. The goal is to release the lower layer of lake water that contains concentrations of naturally occurring hydrogen sulfide. Releasing the lower layers of water helps keep our lake healthy and clean.

We time the release before the change in water temperature and rainfall because both are factors that cause the lower water levels to mix with the upper water levels. This would negate our ability to release the hydrogen sulfide laden water.

Notices were posted so that lakefront homeowners affected by the release and lower water level could take the necessary precautions by moving or removing their boats, boat engines and marina equipment.

Food and Beverage Vouchers

As the end of the year draws near, members are encouraged to use their \$50 in food and beverage vouchers and patronize the Country Club. We recommend that you do not wait until the last week of 2006. Last December we were inundated by members trying to use their vouchers the last few days of the year and it caused a lot of difficulties for the Country Club staff as well as inconvenience for the members. If you have not had the opportunity to patronize the Country Club recently, we encourage you to redeem your vouchers and give the Club a try. Our staff looks forward to serving you.

Unit and Lot Identification Signs

In 2004 in response to requests by local emergency response agencies, the Board of Directors enacted a resolution that requires all members to post a sign that identified the members Unit, Lot and Street address. Lots without an assigned address were only required to post the Unit and Lot designation. Members are encouraged to post the appropriate identification signs on their lots. Our staff continues to inspect lots and we will be sending out letters to owners that have not complied. Help your emergency services by posting your signs.





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

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Step Up to a Healthier Lifestyle!

Time to pump that heart and juice those joints! Quite a few of us know we need to get more exercise in our daily lives! You're in luck! The Gathering Place is sponsoring a community walking group program that gives you a lot of freedom to walk at all times of the day wherever you may be. The Gathering Place is expanding its programs promoting healthy lifestyles for active adults. We are urging people to join us in walking together, at least with one walking buddy, and consider becoming more motivated by using a structured program to keep track of how you are doing. We are calling it a walking group you can join so we can keep track and people can know who potential walking buddies might be and gain access to the Leon Rose Ball Field.

Why bother with a structured program? It's an optional choice but research shows that goal setting and structure work well, especially with people who have various chronic conditions. These programs achieve a better level of success than just resolving to go out walking. But that part of the choice is up to you.

Two research-based programs use goalsetting where you log the number of steps you take daily. Wearing a pedometer, you track the number of steps you take each day. There are two online programs that will assist you in keeping track.

Stanford University's "Stepping Out with Stanford" program is a 10-week online program that can be extended for six months. Each week you increase the number of steps daily by 10% until you reach your goal, or 10,000 steps per day. You log in at their online site and get coaching, get your questions and concerns answered, and use a nifty logbook that encourages you to work the program. It costs \$25, which includes the pedometer, log book, and other materials. Their online program graphs your weekly progress in the steps taken daily and weekly and offers advice on your progress. Without the online program, the cost for pedometer and logbook is \$15. Check it out at steppingout.stanford.edu.

Another online program is the feder-

ally-sponsored President's Challenge. They sell pedometers for \$12 or \$15 and have an online daily log for the time put in daily at different activities but they do not log or graph the steps as the Stepping Out with Stanford site does. Visit their website at presidentschallenge.org.

The research keeps pouring in citing the benefits for all kinds of chronic conditions, such as arthritis, heart conditions, depression, diabetes, and cancer, to name a few. We know it's good for us but many of us have to admit to not doing enough. We know who we are!

Where to walk in Groveland? This is an especially important question if we are out of shape or have mobility challenges. Many of us, having had knee or heart conditions or surgery, have been told to walk post-rehab. What are our choices for good places to walk? Walking in our neighborhoods (if they are level), at the airport area, or even up and down Main Street are options.

The best accessible walking area found in town is at the Leon Rose Ball Field at the end of Flint Court off Ferretti Road, right past the Evangelical Free Church. There is parking on site, and above all, the ground around the perimeter of the baseball field is level and soft (no jarring joints on asphalt or concrete surfaces!). The pathway is wide enough for 3 or more people to walk together. The area is pretty and is perfect for good fall, winter, and spring days. One can rest by sitting on the bleachers when necessary. We will go during daytime sunlight hours, which changes by the month. From November through February it would probably be anywhere from 9AM to 4PM. We'll try to let group members know when most others will be walking.

For access to the ball field and becoming a free member of the walking group, and for information generally, call Karen Serrett at 962-5579 or Sharon Hunt at 962-7707 (The Gathering Place). We'd like to know who will be joining us! The result can be a healthier you for much, much longer.







A thick, flawless slab of roasted wild salmon is paired with a "risotto" cake that's actually sushi rice with sesame; I like the cake, but frankly I'd put up with packing foam if it came with salmon this good. Delicate sea scallops in a fragrant shellfishsaffron with the inclusion of wonton-wrapper ravioli stuffed with potato, lobster, basil and three cheeses.

And you can't go wrong with Lutes' occasional game inclusions, such as a duo of bison and quail (the latter stuffed with venison sausage and truffle) or roasted pheasant breast with pearl pasta and a buttery red-pepper coulis."

And, in spite of such a lofty recognition, Chef Greg is about as down to earth as you can get. His food philosophy for The Groveland Hotel is to create California, Mountain Seasonal cuisine, rooted in French classics. Chef Lutes utilizes organic and naturally raised and grown products. His emphasis is on simplicity to allow the quality of the ingredients to speak of the season and their freshness. HEALTHY HEART RECIPE

he holidays seem to take a toll on our "healthy" eating habits. Perhaps we can all get some help from new research that suggests that virgin olive oil may be particularly effective at lowering heart disease risk because of its high level of antioxidant plant compounds (polyphenols). According to the study, besides being a source of heart-healthy monounsaturated fat, polyphenols in virgin olive oil may account for higher levels of "good" HDL cholesterol and a greater decline in markers of so-called oxidative stress...a process that helps deposit particles of "bad" LDL cholesterol on the artery walls. So, let's love our hearts a little more this holiday season and try a new recipe for turkey using virgin olive oil:

ROASTED TURKEY BREAST WITH LIME AND HERBS

(serves 8; 3 oz. turkey per serving)

Olive oil spray 1 3 1/2 lb. turkey breast half with skin 3 tablespoons fresh lime juice 2 tablespoons virgin olive oil 4 medium garlic cloves, minced 1 teaspoon crumbled dry oregano 1/2 teaspoon crumbled dried tarragon
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon hot pepper sauce
1/4 teaspoon pepper
1/4 cup finely minced fresh parsley

Lightly spray large glass baking dish with olive oil spray. Put turkey brest in baking dish. In small bowl stir together all the remaining ingredients. Stir parsley in last. Using a tablespoon or your fingers, gently loosen the skin from the breast meat, creating a pocket. Being careful not to break the skin, spread the parsley mixture as evenly as possible under the skin. Gently pull skin over any exposed turkey meat. Cover with plastic wrap and refrigerate for 8-12 hours.

Preheat oven to 325 degrees F. Remove plastic wrap from turkey and roast with skin side up for 1 hr. 30 min. or until a meat thermometer registers 170 degrees F. and the juices run clear. Let stand for 15 min. for easier slicing. Discard skin before serving turkey.

GCSD Hires District Engineer

CSD is pleased to announce that we have, after over a year of searching, filled the position of District Engineer. Randy Klaahsen joined us in October. He and his wife, Amanda, and daughter, Kelsey, come to us from San Diego. Randy and his family have jumped right into the myriad of activities available to Grovelanders.

Randy has over 20 years of experience in municipal water and wastewater planning, design and construction. His addition to the GCSD team comes as the District is grappling with the construction of mandated water treatment plant upgrades and sewage lift station upgrades. His expertise will be critical to the District's design and construction of wastewater treatment plant upgrades and other capital projects scheduled for the next five to ten years.

Randy joins us just in time to help us review the Preliminary Design Report for the proposed development of Long Gulch Ranch. Randy has considerable planning experience dealing with developers and making sure that they pay their fair share of capital improvements as well as longterm operational costs associated with utility services. I am sure that you will help us welcome Randy and his family to Groveland.

Speaking of Long Gulch Ranch, the GCSD Board of Directors held a Study Session on Saturday, November 11th, at Tenaya School Gym. It was attended by about 60 people and many good questions were raised.

The GCSD Board of Directors and staff recognize that this project needs public review and comment before the Board makes its decision to support or not support annexation. The Board is committed to the notion that existing customers will not subsidize the Long Gulch Ranch development or any other development for that matter.

Determining if annexation of Long Gulch Ranch is appropriate will be an important part of the Board's agenda over the next several months. In December and January, the Board will oversee the development and public review of a Developer Agreement. The Board will hold a public hearing on Saturday, January 13th from 1 to 4 pm at Tenaya School Gym. The Board will likely hold a second public hearing in late January or February but it has vet to be scheduled.

If the Board members feel that they have the assurances that they need contained in the Developer Agreement, then they will consider annexation. If the Board supports annexation, then the next step in the process is for the Tuolumne County Local Agency Formation Commission (LAFCO) to consider the final determination on annexation.

Facts will be important to the process. GCSD staff is attempting to address all the issues relative to the development's impacts on GCSD's infrastructure. If you have questions that you would like to see addressed, please email them to us at info@gcsd.org, or drop us a letter.

As we go through this process, please know that anyone, such as a developer, who makes a request of GCSD for service must be given the right of due process. Please be patient with our process. Also we respectfully request that you be cautious of those who attack people instead of addressing the issues whether you are for or against the project. Remember the words of Plato, "Be kind, because everyone you meet is fighting a hard battle."

TURKEY TIPS FROM PML NEWS NOVEMBER 1975 The Secret of a Good Turkey: Moisture by Bob Stahl

In passing some helpful hints on how to treat your holiday turkey, let's keep in mind that most fowl do not contain sufficient body fats to keep the meat moist. Many methods have been applied to maintain or supplement moisture. Paper bags, foil coverings, damp towels, milk or cream, and various stuffing mixes are the most popular.

Temperature abuse and extended cooking time also takes its toll as regards moisture loss. In addition, white meat finishes dryer than dark meat.

These four factors must be taken into account as you devise a method to roast your turkey. I suggest you apply the following techniques so as to insure more success:

1) Let cleaned turkey stand at room temperature three hours before placing in oven. This equalizes temperature throughout the turkey and will cook more evenly.

2) Dampen turkey before salting or peppering it. The moisture makes these seasonings adhere to the surface.

3) Heat oven to 375 degrees and place turkey upside down in roasting pan with the breast placed in a glass pie plate or on a wire rack that is sold for this purpose.

4) For the first hour let heat remain at 375 degrees. For the balance of your cooking time, reduce heat to 275 degrees.

5) The upside down position allows natural moisture from the dark meat to drip or puddle into the breast cavity, keeping the white meat moist.

Daylight Saving Time

With our clocks having been turned back an hour in October we would like to share an article for future knowledge on Daylight Saving Time—PML News

Carlos Says...

Having lived in Arizona for almost 15 years, this concept somewhat escapes me, but it is time to "fall back." At 2 a.m., Sunday, Oct. 29, Daylight Saving Time will end. Actually, at 1:59 a.m., clocks fall back to 1 a.m., and will spring forward from 1:59 a.m. to 3 a.m. in spring. (Arizona does not save daylight, as there is more than enough.)

This time was originally chosen in the U.S. as the changeover time because it was practical and minimized disruption, as most people were home and fewest trains were running. It also prevents the day from switching to yesterday, which would be confusing. It is early enough that the entire continental U.S. switches by daybreak, and the changeover occurs before most early shift workers and early churchgoers—particularly on Easter—are affected.

President George W. Bush, Aug. 8, 2005 signed the Energy Policy Act of 2005. This Act changed the time change dates for Daylight Saving Time in the U.S. **Beginning in 2007, DST will begin on the second Sunday of March and end the first Sunday of November.** The Secretary of Energy will report the impact of this change to Congress. Congress retains the right to revert the Daylight Saving Time back to the 2005 time schedule once the Department of Energy study is complete.

The official spelling is Daylight Saving Time, not Daylight SavingS Time.

Saving is used here as a verbal adjective (a participle). It modifies time and tells us more about its nature; namely, that it is characterized by the activity of saving daylight.

It is a saving daylight kind of time. Similar examples would be dog walking time or book reading time. Since saving is a verb describing a single type of activity, the form is singular.

Nevertheless, many people feel the word savings (with an 's') flows more gently off the tongue. Daylight Savings Time is also in common usage, and can be found in dictionaries.

Adding to the confusion is that the phrase Daylight Saving Time is inaccurate, since no daylight is actually saved. Daylight Shifting Time would be better, but it is not as politically desirable.

Many fire departments encourage people to change the battery in the smoke detector when they change their clocks because it provides for a convenient reminder. More than 90 percent of homes in the United States have smoke detectors, but one-third are estimated to have dead or missing batteries.



Groveland Bird Information (Provided by Groveland Forest Service Station - Roy Bridgman 962-7825)

Ver 200 species of birds occur in the Sierras, many of which reside in or move through the Groveland area. Birds are some of the easier wildlife to watch and enjoy because they have bright markings, they are active during the day, and they sing! Many are easy to identify, others may take some concentration, good binoculars, some study of a good bird book, or asking an expert. You can find bird guides in most bookstores or the Groveland Forest Service Station in Buck Meadows. Some of the well-known residents include:

Dark-eyed Junco - tsking small, dark-hooded sparrow

Spotted Towhee - beautiful bird with a shrill whiny call from schrubs, common in winter

Scrub Jay - ever present in shrubby areas and prodigious oak planters

Red-Shouldered Hawk - a noisy, very attractively marked bird

Western Screech Owl - actually gives a sweet, whistled trill

White-breasted nuthatch - tin horn call; feeds on insects in the crevices of oak bark **Red-breasted nuthatch** - a higher tin horn call; feeds on insects in the crevices of conifer bark

Some common birds in winter that are long distance or higher elevation migrants include:

More spotted towhees and juncos!

Cedar waxwings - boisterous flocks; with delicate markings best seen through binoculars

Gold-crowned sparrows - sweet thin call like the chickadee's "cheeseburger call"

White-crowned sparrow - large, unmistakable markings, with a long single note in their call

Varied thrush - large attractive blue and orange visitor from the North

Bufflehead - attractive little duck and common visitor

Hooded Merganser - strange, beautiful duck and uncommon visitor

Many winter birds appreciate supplemental food, especially mixes with large nutritious sunflower seeds. In the cold of winter they may also appreciate fatty suet, which you can buy or make at home. Bird feeders need to be away from windows, cats, and may attract predators, such as Coopers hawks, so should be monitored.

Birdhouses substitute for natural dead trees (snags) that woodpeckers make into homes. While dead trees are important in the landscape, if you don't have any or don't want them near your house, birdhouses can make a good substitute. They can attract pest species such as starlings, which are not native and compete with native birds such as bluebirds. You can also build houses for owls and other species, but they require periodic cleaning and maintenance to provide healthy homes.

Cats kill a lot of birds and most bird organizations and ornithologists recommend keeping them indoors. Cats indoors are also generally safer from injuries, dogs, and coyotes. More info at www.abcbirds.org/cats/

If window strikes are a problem, reducing the reflection of surrounding vegetation, putting something partially in front of it, or closing shades so birds don't think they can fly through it may help.

Although woodpeckers are nice in the woods, they can do serious damage to homes which act as nice sounding boards and, really, are made of dead wood, which are their natural homes. Problems with woodpecker's eating your house? Go to www.ipm.ucdavis. edu/PMG/PESTNOTES/pn74124.html.

There are volunteer opportunities to learn about and contribute to bird studies. The local Audubon Chapter puts on free bird hikes providing opportunities to go out with expert local birders and learn. They also host the Christmas Bird Count, and may pair a begin-

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Another fun bird count for those who want to list the birds in their backyard is the Great Backyard Bird Count www.audubon. org/gbbc/index.shtml.

The Groveland Forest Service and the Bureau of Reclamation monitor bald eagles

at reservoirs every year, as well as many other species, and may have opportunities for interested volunteers - call the local Audubon Chapter or the Groveland Ranger Station 209-962-7825 - Roy Bridgman. Even if you don't want to volunteer, the continued recovery of the bald eagle population is something every American should be proud of, and are not too hard to find with a little time at Lake Don Pedro, New Melones Reservoir, or Cherry Lake.



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

COMMUNITY CORNER Mother Lode Memories by Nancy Perry & Debra Durai

This is a wonderful article by Jean McClish published in the April 1975 issue of the PML News. This article represents a "snap-shot" of time in Groveland's colorful history. Up until a few years ago Groveland celebrated it's history on Father's Day weekend with OLD WEST DAYS, which I'm sure many of you had the pleasure of attending.

At the end of this article is a reference to Sal Ferretti's new butcher shop, now occupied by Mel Lutt's Pharmacy. For those of you who don't remember Mel Lutt's Pharmacy, Custom Realty now occupies this corner building in the center of town next door to the veterinary office.

Did vou know?

Groveland's first school building was constructed by 1897 at the current site of Yosemite Bank. While the hard rock mining boom of 1895-1914 necessitated a new schoolhouse for Big Oak Flat by 1899, it wasn't until the Hetch Hetchy days project that Groveland needed a replacement building. A bond measure was passed circa 1914 and the structure subsequently erected, completed in 1916. The Spanish treatments on the building were replaced in the 1950's. With the opening of Tenaya School, the old Groveland Schoolhouse was sold into private ownership. The building was renovated in 1970 and served as headquarters for the Boise Cascade - Pine Mountain Lake subdivision sales and promotion.

CENTENNIAL YEAR FOR GROVELAND CHRISTENING

roveland celebrates the centennial of its name at OLD WEST DAY, June 15, 1975. It was in 1875 that the township citizens rejected the early gold camp name and chose one more fitting for the community.

group for the community.
Groveland lived out its first quarter of a century under the colorful, if somewhat repulsive, name of Garrote.
Names of gold mining camps were inclined toward the descriptive picturesque, Swift Justice at the end of a rope, punishment for a Mexican miner who stole a compatriot's horse, was reason enough, so the story goes, to establish the name

By 1875 the settlement had a perma-nent, stable population of about 100, and together with Big Oak Flat was the hub of activity for surrounding ranchers in Moc-" ∠ casin Creek, Deer Flat, Spring Gulch, Big Creek and Second Garrote.

These two sister communities supplied 52

goods and services to south-of-the-river inhabitants.

Despite the county's financial panic of 1873 and the depression that followed, responsible businessmen of Garrote optimistically looked forward to a long and fruitful future.

In casting about for a more propitious name for the community, Benjamin Savory, proprietor of the Savory Hotel, offered that of his hometown, Groveland, Mass., and his suggestion was adopted.

The UNION DEMOCRAT of January 23, 1875 reported, "Among recent postal changes made is the name of Garrote post office to Groveland. Garrote is not a handsome name, besides it has unpleasant association, yet for all that, the pioneers of Tuolumne will stick to it and still call Jim Tannahill's post office Garrote."

In 1875, business establishments in Groveland included Matt Foot's Garrote Hotel (Groveland Hotel), the Savory, (torn down years ago, earlier called the Washington, stood where the Charlotte Hotel is today), Tannahill's store and saloon (Iron Door Expresso), and the Cassaretto store (originally Reboul's trading post now Groveland Community Hall building), all built in the early 1850's. Mullen's blacksmith shop was on the west of Cassaretto's store and Shoup's Livery stable was on the east. Allen's saloon (Garrotte Saloon which burnt down 1990's) was across the street, east of Hammond's blacksmith shop. Homes were strung out up and down the road. One, at least, still stands - the red bungalow flanked by the colorful garden tended by Bernice Laveroni Workman. It was built over 100 years ago.

Mines were flourishing throughout the area. These were what sustained the economy. Woodcutters were kept busy supplying the cordwood needed to fuel the steam engines that supplied the power to work the machinery.

The Big Oak Flat Road had been completed all the way to Yosemite in 1874, and more traffic was finding its way along the dirt track through town. To be sure, the road was usually impassable in the winter and during spring rains - even after the turn of the century.

Loaded wagons pulled by as many as 14 or 16 mules, if the load was heavy, passed through town. Four-horse 12-passanger stages made regularly scheduled trips from Groveland to Chinese Camp. Herds of cattle going up country for summer range or back down in the fall were driven into town, bypassing the "downtown' area by following the creek behind the Cassaretto store and coming back out to the road beyond the Groveland Hotel.

Although an early automobile came

up the hill as early as 1901, four-footed horsepower was the preferred mode of locomotion into the 1920's.

Condition of the road was a constant source of irritation and occasionally made news in the local paper, the TUOLUMNE PROSPECTOR:

"A force of men are engaged this week in repairing the road between Big Oak Flat and Groveland, especially the "whirlpool" which was a very bad mud hole." (March 2, 1901)

"The road crew has at last reached Groveland and a new culvert put in above the Mt. Jefferson office. A spring-rocking, profanity-breeding hole has been wiped out, and the traveling public is duly grateful." (April 13, 1901) 1901 found Groveland booming. A resurgence of mining activity throughout the Mother Lode was prompted in part by new money from eastern investors and local stock companies, and partly from the development of more sophisticated mining methods. The Mt. Jefferson, mainstay of local mining activity, was building a new sulpheret house and a structure to house an assay office.

Older buildings were being refurbished and new ones built. H.M. Stanley erected a new blacksmith and woodworking shop. the Buckhorn, in the east end of town and "engaged competent mechanics to do blacksmithing, horseshoeing, and build wagons."

W.A. Forbes occupied a newly constructed building and advertised flour for \$4.80 a barrel, sugar at 13-1/2 lbs. for \$1.

There was a new barbershop in the Gem Saloon.

T.C. Reid was proprietor of Tannahill's old store with the iron doors. His post office store stocked stationery, pens, pencils, mourning notepaper, cigars and men's furnishings. It boasted a new coat of paint.

W.A. Smith's new cash store business opened in December 1900 offering choice groceries and provisions.

Miss Fannie Blackwell, a graduate of McDowell's dressmaking school in San Francisco, announced she would do dressmaking at the McSwain residence.

The Sierra Gorda Union No. 39 WFM was organized in 1900 and by 1901 had 135 members that met alternatively in Big Oak Flat in the Odd Fellows Hall and in Groveland at the Foresters' Hall every Thursday evening.

Oro Fino Hive No. 49 and Oro Grande Tent, Knights and Ladies of the Maccabees met at the Maccabees' Hall in Big Oak Flat across the street from the Big Oak marker.

Court Mt. Jefferson No. 8239 AOF, organized in 1894, had 55 members in 1901 and met weekly in Groveland.

Yosemite Lodge No. 97 I.O.O.F. was constituted in 1860 and the Rebekah Lodge No. 259 was established in 1901.

Much of the social life of the two communities was generated by these groups. Grand Balls were popular at the turn of the century, and nearly every week one of the organizations sponsored a ball. The Opera Hall in Groveland, across the Main street from the Groveland Hotel was decorated to depict the theme, musicians hired - usually Vic Repetto and McCarthy or Prof. Steele's orchestra from Sonora, and a gala evening ensued.

At midnight, following the "supper dance," the revelers adjourned to the Groveland Hotel and Schroeders for a midnight supper and then returned to the hall to dance until dawn.

In the early 1910's when Charlie Baird was running the Groveland Hotel, he once put up 54 head of horses one snowy night. "I put the rigs outside, the horses tied heads together so they couldn't get to kicking one another.

That's the kind of crowd we had: "When there was a dance at Coulterville Charlie Baird would "take a 6-horse stage, everybody free. And they'd all come when we had a dance."

But it was during the Hetch Hetchy days of 1915 to 1925 that Groveland had her heyday. Headquarters for the railroad operation during the building of the railroad and construction of O'Shaughnessy Dam and the mountain tunnels was in Groveland. This occasioned a sudden influx of a great number of men, some with their families.

The City of San Francisco built a hospital, office building, bachelor quarters, and homes for upper-echelon employees.

Once again old buildings were refurbished and new ones constructed: the Charlotte Hotel; Sal Ferretti's new butcher shop, now occupied by Mel Lutt's Pharmacy; the Cassaretto Mercantile, today's Community Hall; Charlie Baird's Hotel, dismantled in the slack years after the mountain division of the Hetch Hetchy project was finished and the facilities and personnel moved to Livermore.

Those were the days. There is a significant number of old timers who can remember the Groveland and Big Oak Flat of 1901. Even more recall those Hetch Hetchy days. They retain a fierce pride in the heritage of Groveland.

We salute them. We celebrate with them the centennial of the name of Groveland and the town's beginning 125 years ago as a camp of gold seekers. June 15, 1975 is Old West Days.

In Brazil, Papa Noel arrives in a helicopter while in Costa Rica, Del Nino - the Christ child is the gift bringer, although lately Santa Claus has been seen there too. The Littlest Camel brings gifts to Christian Arab children.

Speaking of Christmas greenery - there are numerous old wives' tales about the medicinal properties of mistletoe, but don't try it... it's poisonous.


In fact, many houseplants are poisonous and the lovely Christmas poinsettia is one of them. Don't let the children or pets munch on the decorations.






