am pleased to report that the 2008 budget is final. The budget process begins in late August and is reviewed and amended until final vote in November. A very big thank you to Joe Powell, our General Manager, and Ken Spencer, our Controller, and their staff for the hard work and many hours it takes to formulate the needs of the Association for the coming year. I would also like to thank our two past board Presidents, Steve Margossian and Dennis Scott, and our Budget and Finance committee for their review of the proposed budget. It takes a lot of teamwork to arrive at a balanced budget. Ultimately, the Board of Directors makes the final decision for the 2008 budget. My sincerest thanks to my fellow Board members for the many, many hours they have dedicated to review, revise and complete the budget and have it ready for vote at the November Membership Meeting.

The Property Owner survey, which was advertised in the PML news for the past few months, available at the Administration Office, Main Gate, Country Club and on line at our web site, asked members what increase in assessment they would be willing to accept to either add new amenities or significantly improve existing amenities or services. The response was:

37.5%; no increase is acceptable.

On the Cover

55%; 10% to 20% is acceptable. 7.5% 25% to 50% is acceptable.

There were 520 responses to this question. Statistically this is a large enough percentage of the membership to indicate, plus or minus a few percent, what the membership as a whole would indicate. The survey indicates that two thirds of our membership is interested in improving the amenities and services at Pine Mountain Lake and one third think we should not increase the annual assessment at all. The 2008 budget is a 9.5% increase over 2007. The bulk of this increase is due to increases in union labor wages and benefits, our overdue need to make the green belts areas more fire safe and the need to increase the reserve fund.

The 2008 budget incorporates a change in how we are to deal with reserve funding. State law requires that Home Owner Associations have a plan in place to deal with repair and replacement of existing amenities and facilities. We comply with this requirement by having a study done by an expert in the field. The study identifies the useful life of all of our amenities and equipment and estimates how much it will cost to keep everything in working order. This study also identifies when replacement is likely to be needed. In the past we have funded the reserve fund with a "pay as you go" philosophy. That's fine when the Association is relatively young. Now that PML is nearing forty years old, a change in philosophy is needed. We need to build up the reserve fund to deal with expected expenses that will be significantly higher as some of our amenities and equipment get older. We will gradually raise the level of reserve funding to insure there are funds available when needed in an effort to avoid special assessments.

Another change in the budget for 2008 is to focus more attention to fire



abatement. As you well know, there have been tragic consequences in California this year resulting from wildfires. The fires in Lake Tahoe and Southern California have been a wake-up call for

communities such as ours. We have initiated a five year program to raise the fire safety standards of our green belt areas. We simply cannot allow PML to suffer the tragedy that results from fires that quickly get out of control.

Within the last month, the California Air Resources Board has notified PMLA, as well as other golf facilities in Tuolumne County, that we may no longer purchase new gasoline powered golf carts. This means we will have to convert to battery powered carts. Although there is a small difference in the cost of either gas or electric carts, the facility to maintain electric carts is significantly different from that of gas carts. This item does not directly affect the 2008 budget but will certainly affect future budgets as we will have to replace our current cart facility with one that allows us to charge battery carts. The transition will take several years and our current gas carts will be more than adequate during the transition. This is just another example of State mandated changes which result in significantly higher costs to maintain our community. It's beyond me to understand how the small number of gasoline golf carts in use today, which are not polluters anyway, are a danger to air quality here in the foothills.

As you read this, most members will have received their copy of the 2008 Association Budget Report and the 2008 Assessment booklets. If you have not received this mailing by the end of the third week of December, please contact the Administration Office and our staff will mail these to you.

Aside from budget issues, the Lake Dredging Project is still tied up by

California Fish & Game and will not be accomplished this winter. The two legal issues initiated by our former General Manager are moving toward completion. We expect to have them completed early next year.

I would like to take this opportunity to wish all of our members and our staff a very Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year.

GENERAL MANAGER'S MESSAGE

Main Gate Entrance Project

The concrete and rock work (monuments) portion of this project is well underway. The final phase of the concrete foundation and rock work will be complete within the month (weather permitting). Once completed, we will finish the Main Gate area with new directional signage.

Swimming Pool ADA Ramp and Restroom

This project is also underway. A connection will be made to the nearby sewer hookup for the ADA Restroom prior to preparation for construction of the ramp. Our contractor is doing his best to take up as little parking area as possible but members will need to be aware that some of the parking area may not be available from time to time as the project progresses. So far, everything is right on schedule.

Lake Dredging Project

On November 17th, Tom Rut of Moffat and Nichol, our Lake Dredging consultants, provided an update and presentation on the Lake Dredging Project at the monthly Board meeting. He addressed all issues and concerns regarding our project and provided the membership with all of the facts and planned progress. We encourage all members that are interested in the project to attend.

Based on the information that we have received from Fish and Game, we are confident that we will be able to mitigate all of their concerns with the project soon. After we resolve the issues with Fish and Game we will be able to re-establish contact with the Regional Water Quality Control Board and the Army Corps of Engineers to get their approval.

2008 Budget

On November 17th the Board of Directors approved the 2008 Budget. I would like to thank my managers for all of the time and hard work preparing this important document. Special thanks to our Controller, Ken Spencer, for making the process smooth and seamless as usual. I would also like to thank the Board and Budget and Finance Committee for their input and working together as a team during this process. We had many lively discussions and the Budget went through multiple iterations with close scrutinization by these folks and also some of our past Board Presidents. There were a lot of tough decisions to make but the result is a reasonable, achievable tool for our Association's future.

2007 Audit

In November we met with the Board and Audit Committee to review the yearly proposal and agreement with our CPA auditing firm. Once again we hired the Porter Company. The principal and owner of the company, Gary Porter specializes in homeowner association audits and tax preparation. One important issue that he brought to our attention is a new accounting legal requirement that will be part of this audit. Mr. Porter began the initial audit field work and preparation in November and this will culminate with the comprehensive audit the last week in January, 2008. Based on his work last year and initial work this year, we anticipate no major accounting issues to report.

The fire insurance companies may rethink writing policies for communities like PML because of the wildfires in Southern California? If policies are continued, will the rates go up to respond to the risk and the cost of the houses? Some insurance companies are "redlining" or refusing to write or renew fire insurance policies. Without fire coverage, lenders may not refinance or authorize a new loan of the property and thereby negatively impact property values. I would like to hear more from the Board of Directors regarding their responses to these questions.

Fantasy Writing - Six Cliches to Avoid

Rantasy fiction is doing good business at the moment, but there are certain situations that have been overplayed. So much so, that they have become genre clichÈs, and everybody knows what to expect next. If you're a writer in the fantasy genre, here are 6 clichÈs you should try to avoid in your stories.

1. Receiving tutoring from the old wise man.

The 'Merlin' gambit, as used in Lord of the Rings, Star Wars, Dragonslayer and innumerable King Arthur clones. A stable boy or other similar seemingly low-born type is taken under the wing of the local eccentric. There's usually a beard involved, and a pair of blue eyes piercing from beneath some spectacularly bushy eyebrows. He'll say things like: 'All of nature is one', 'Use the force' and 'You have a great destiny, my boy.' Try not to give him a grey cloak and an elven sword. Maybe you could try having the youth tutoring the old man for a change? Or, more radical, how about having the teacher as an old woman?

2. Learning to fight.

The 'Galahad' gambit. The stable boy gets secret training in weaponry, allowing

him to beat a seasoned warrior in his first fight. People say: 'I've never seen the like before' and 'He is the best swordsman I have ever seen'. Now how realistic is that? A radical idea would be to have the stable boy being completely useless at weapons. How is he going to fulfil his destiny then?

3. The parting from everything you ever knew.

The 'Dick Whittington' gambit. The stable-hand, being under a geas to complete a great quest, must say goodbye to hearth and home. People say: 'I must go and fulfil my destiny' and 'I will return when I have avenged my father'. This is usually done with a great deal of schmaltz and emotion. Sometimes it is done violently, the hero being parted from family by the villain of the piece, who he is destined to kill at the end of the story. Either way, it has been done so often that any tears you are expecting to provoke could well be due to laughter. Try to do something different. Why does the hero have to leave his family? What would happen if he took them with him?

4. Being abducted from earth to a different world.

The 'John Carter' gambit. People say: 'How did I get here" and 'You have been delivered to us in our hour of need'. This one was heavily overused in the early and mid-twentieth century by H Rider Haggard and A E Merritt among others. Usually it is no more than a ploy to get a character the writer is comfortable writing about into a fantasy situation where said character could never otherwise exist. Edgar Rice Burroughs liked it so much he even had it happen to Tarzan on occasion. And it still happens, the most obvious modern examples being Thomas Covenant and the various present day characters that Stephen King has recruited into his Dark Tower series. Maybe your hero could be someone from another dimension who gets transported to Earth? Or maybe he stays where he is, but everything changes around him?

5. The multi-race bar room.

The 'Inn at Bree' gambit. It happens a lot in science fiction a-la Star Wars, but it is just as common in the fantasy genre. After a thirsty day on the road, our heroic stable boy and his companions will visit an inn. Inside, there will be representatives of different races from the world created for the story. The innkeeper will always be fat and jolly, there will always be a silent stranger in a dark corner, and someone will sing a silly song giving the writer his chance to show off his invention of other-worldly lyrics. How about having a human trying to get a drink in a dwarf-only bar, or vice-versa? There should be plenty of opportunity to add tension there.

6. Discovering hidden family truths.

The 'Ugly Duckling' gambit. The stable boy gets to the final climactic battle, only to find that his adversary is his father/mother/brother/sister etc. People say: 'It was kept from you to protect you' and 'You cannot kill me, I'm your father'. This has been so overused, it even turns up across genres: witness Luke Skywalker confronting Darth Vader for example. A variation is to have the hero find that he is suddenly a prince, or even king. This says more about the writer's own desires than it does about the plot. Wishful-thinking fantasies do not usually make strong stories. But what would happen if the hero already knew his background, but his adversary didn't?

The next time you read a fantasy story, count how many of the above are still in use. I think you'll be surprised. It's even worse in film and television, where all of them can occur in any one movie, and often do. Just look at Star Wars - it contained most of them, and still made huge amounts of money.

And that's also why the above should be taken with a pinch of salt. ClichÈs still have their place in popular culture. Just don't take that as an excuse to use them yourself. At least not too often.



Preliminary Results from Property Owner Survey

he PML Long Range Planning Committee thanks the 600+ PML Property Owners who took the time to give us their feedback in the recently concluded Property Owner Survey. The web-based survey was online from July 1 to November 1 and during that time we received ~540 completed surveys with ~510 utilizing the Internet and ~30 completing the paper-based forms that were available from the PMLA office.

This short article will highlight only a few of the results but more communication of the details will be forthcoming over the next few months. The LRPC plans to do a more complete presentation of the survey results at the January 2008 PML Board meeting where we will be conducting the drawing for the THREE winners of \$100 gift certificates for use at PML. There were - 470 people who provided their names in their responses to the last question on the survey and they are eligible for the drawing.

In the "Property Owner Demographics" section of the survey, we received answers to such questions as family size, age of the members in the household, and annual household income. See below for the results to a few of the questions that show the choices that got the largest percentage of responses.

What best describes the current state of your PML property?

- 43% Primary residence
- 42% Second/other home not used as a rental
- What are the primary reasons you purchased property at PML. Check all that apply.
- 80% Mountain/small-town lifestyle and/ or scenery
- 76% Lake/marina/beaches
- 65% Gated community with safety/secu-
- rity services
- 52% Golf course

How long have you been a property owner at PML?

- 36% 0 to 5 years
- 30% 5+ to 10 years
- 21% 10+ to 20 years

In the "Current Amenity/Service Offerings" section of the survey, there was a lot of interesting data about the usage patterns and development needs of each of our major amenities, eg lake/marina/beaches, golf course, country club restaurant/bar, safety, etc. The results from the one overall amenity satisfaction question are shown below.

How satisfied are you with the overall PMLA services based on the assessments/fees you pay?

- 48% Satisfied
- 22% Very Satisfied
- 18% Neutral

There were — 65 (only 12% of the) responders who said they were Dissatisfied or Very Dissatisfied.

Perhaps the most interesting part of the survey is the last section: "Future Amenity/Service Development". Here responders told us which existing amenities/services need the most development, which add the most economic value to their property, and which are most important to their personal quality of life. It should be noted that in this section, the answers to these questions were randomized so no bias based on the ordering of possible selections could be inferred. The results to the one question which asked what new amenity/service should be developed are shown below.

What NEW amenity/service would you like to see at PML? One or more choices are allowed.


- 61% Exercise facility/gym
- 48% Hiking trails and par course
- 36% Indoor swimming pool

Now that we have some idea of the "voice of the customer", the LRPC must now try to draw some conclusions from this data and recommend ideas for future action. This is undoubtedly the most difficult part of the process. We expect to take several months doing this and hope to hold some public/town-hall meetings with property owners in the spring of 2008. So stay tuned for future announcements!! 🕅

we will landscape the hillside above the retaining wall with shrubs similar to the #1 roadside.





Intel recently released their first quad cores and now AMD is competing back at the beginning of 2008 with comparably priced quad cores of their own known as the Phenom line of CPU's.

Motherboards will be very different in 2008. Most motherboards will not have parallel and serial ports and even the PCI slot. That's right, a PCI slot. They are getting rid of them just like the ISA. Currently PCI express is far faster than PCI and smaller cards but in 2008 you will see PCI express 2.0 which doubles the speed of PCI express from 8GB/s to 16GB/s. New motherboards will also be able support up to four graphics cards. This is not important if you are not a gamer but it is a big deal if you are.

USB 3.0 will give a 10X performance gain over USB 2.0 however it will not be available until mid 2008 and probably not built into motherboards until 2009. Transfer speed will be up to 5MB/s. Don't confuse megabytes with megabits. 500 megabits is read as 500Mb/s and 500 megabytes is 500MB/s. Notice the upper and lower case B. Currently USB 2.0 is 480Mb/s which is about half of 1MB.

MWRC provides a 24 hour crisis line, 533-3401, to offer information, emotional

support and referrals for abuse survivors; an emergency shelter, individual and group counseling, some legal assistance, violence prevention workshops (keeping kids safe, bullying prevention, teen violence prevention), community education and transitional shelter (up to one year for women seeking to be self-sufficient). MWRC maintains that "Love Should Not Hurt" and is providing a tremendous service in our community to renew lives and restore futures.

Wildland Fires Continue to Expand in Yosemite National Park

Fires are being managed for resource benefit and community safety

Two fires are continuing to expand in Yosemite National Park. The Devil Wildland Fire Use (WFU) fire, within the wilderness boundary, continues to be managed for resource benefit. It is located north of Yosemite Valley along Cascade Creek. In the southern end of the Park, the Jack Fire continues to burn on the north and south sides of Turner Ridge north of Wawona. The fire behavior of both has slowed due to the weekend precipitation and much cooler temperatures and higher humidity.

Fire managers must balance the use of fire for resource benefits with fire suppression and prescribed fire to maintain healthy ecosystems, the visitor experience, and the protection of life and property. When the fires started by lightning October 29, fire managers considered many factors before deciding to place the fires under a wildland fire use management strategy. Some of these considerations were location of the fires, time of season, available resources, potential smoke impacts, and projected fire behavior and growth. 11 of the 14 total fires started during the lightning event were immediately suppressed.

The Devil Fire (180 acres) is progressing across the landscape nearly uninterrupted as it functions as a natural part of a healthy ecosystem. Some of the benefits of this and other natural fires are improved forest health and enhanced habitat diversity. Due to the recent weather changes, the fire has experienced little recent growth. Personnel assigned to the fire are monitoring fire behavior, weather and smoke. The Jack Fire (300 acres) originally began as a wildland fire use event but expanded outside the fire use management zone on November 8, 2007. At that time, actions were taken to slow the fire's spread south toward Wawona. There is no past fire history in this area of the Park. The north half of the fire remains in wilderness and will be allowed to continue backing slowly off Turner Ridge.

Decades of fire suppression, long term drought, and other factors have created unnaturally heavy fuel loads in some park areas, including the area north of Wawona where the Jack Fire is located. Using fire as an ecological restoration tool as well as to create defensible space around fire prone communities reduces the chance of future catastrophic fires like those seen in many parts of the country this year.

Air quality is closely monitored and information is provided regularly about smoke from the fires. Yosemite National Park fire managers work closely with cooperating air quality regulatory agencies to minimize health impacts to park visitors and nearby communities. Additionally, park managers work closely with communities in and around Yosemite National Park to educate residents and visitors about the benefits of managed fire.

RED RIBBON WEEK CELEBRATED

Drug awareness is designed to encourage the prevention of drug use and was spearheaded by Wynette Hilton and the student body council at Tenaya School. They planned a great week for all the students.

Now for a review of RED RIBBON WEEK: On Thursday, February 7, 1985 ,Enrique "Kiki" Camerena, 37, stashed his badge and service pistol in his desk drawer and headed for lunch with his wife, Mika. Kiki, a U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration Agent had been on the trail of Mexico's marijuana and cocaine barons. He was due to be reassigned in three weeks. He had come dangerously close to unlocking a multibillion dollar drug pipeline which he expected extended into the highest reaches of the Mexican army, police and government.

According to the DEA's reconstruction of events, as he headed to lunch five men appeared at the agents side and shoved him into a waiting car. That was the last time anyone but his kidnappers would see him alive.

Kiki Camerena's body was found one month later in a shallow grave 70 miles from Michoacan, Mexico. He had been tortured, beaten, and brutally murdered. Mika would have to tell her three sons that their daddy would not be coming home again.

As news of the atrocity began to appear in the newspapers, on radio and on television broadcasts, many school parent associations, already angry and sick of the killing and destruction caused by alcohol and other drugs in America, were looking about for some way to proclaim their concerns and make a demand for action in their local communities.

In 1988, with Nancy Reagan as honorary chair, an eight day "RED RIB-BON WEEK" was proclaimed by the Congress of the United States. Each year since 1988 the Red Ribbon campaign has grown and now impacts millions of Americans like no other drug prevention movement in history, in particular in schools when everyone is wearing a red ribbon and this little piece of satin carries the message that it is "OK TO SAY NO TO DRUGS."

Thanks to the efforts of Wynette Hilton and the Student Body Councils, plus the schools, for all the work they put into the Red Ribbon Program. They are a real credit to Groveland. his common sense approach to problem solving. Al promises that he will remain active with the issues in Groveland. Thank you, Al, for your service to the community.

Al's last day as a Board Member is Friday, December 7th. Steve Perreira and John Gray will be sworn into office prior to taking their seats at the regularly scheduled board meeting on December 10th. Their term of office will be four years. The other board members, Dick Lennen, Gus Allegri, and Wes Johnson, have two years remaining on their terms.

Issues that the new board will be addressing in the coming years include

the upgrade to the wastewater treatment plant, as may be required by the state, changes in fire service in response to the availability (or cost) of fire insurance for our high risk fire area, meeting fire flow standards in Big Oak Flat and parts of Pine Mountain Lake, and of course, the Long Gulch Ranch development. These are all contentious issues that may result in positive or negative financial consequences for our existing ratepayers. The board will also be examining the water and sewer rate structure in December and January. Rates not associated with the recent bond sales have not changed for over two years.



Pine Mountain Lake Fire Abatement - A Report Card: Part Two the fuel reduction work. In the fuel reduction work.

I hast month's article I gave a report on the status of our property owner efforts to reduce hazardous fuel loads on their property. The summary was that although many property owners have done a good job, there are a huge number of lots that are totally overgrown. We're looking to see what effect a renewed effort of education among property owners might have as well as strengthening our enforcement procedures. We certainly need to make progress and correct this situation.

Did you know that one of the biggest property owners is the Pine Mountain Lake Association itself? The Association is responsible for 9 separate parcels called "greenbelts", where no homes will ever be built. Our greenbelts total 357 acres. Add to that the two undeveloped parcels called Units 14 and 16, at 412 acres, and you get a grand total of 769 acres. That's roughly equivalent to 2500 private lots. Shouldn't we hold the Association to the same standards as property owners?

To develop a report card for our greenbelts, I toured all 9 parcels in August with Pine Mountain Lake Assistant General Manager, Rick Whybra and Maintenance Manager, Tom Moffitt, along with Glenn Gottschall, a Registered Professional Forrester. The report card grades for each greenbelt varies from "good" to "worse than ugly". We found many areas where too many trees are growing too close together. And tremendous amounts of brush have grown under those trees. It is a serious fire threat.

How Did It Get This Way?

The Pine Mountain Lake maintenance staff does, in fact. have a fuel reduction program in place. Each fall and winter crews from the maintenance staff go out into our greenbelts and clear brush. The problem has been the size of the commitment. The budget commitment for this work has not been sufficient to keep up with vegetation re-growth, much less primary fuel reduction work. And it is we, the property owners, who are to blame. It seems we've been too busy focusing on other issues to make this work a priority.

The good news is that I found Rick, Tom, and our

General Manager, Joe Powell, to be well educated about the need and motivated to make a change. We rolled up our sleeves and evaluated the data we collected about our greenbelts. We documented each area and noted what type of approach would be best. The timing was perfect as the Association was preparing its 2008 budget, so we developed a budget plan for a 5 year fuel reduction effort.

A "Jump Start" Plan for Change

In order to change anything in life, something has to be different. The core of what's different in our greenbelt plan is what I call "Jump Start". The idea is to create a strong push to reduce the fuel loads in our greenbelts over a 5 year period, which then allows us to drop down into a maintenance program our staff can handle year after year.


Something else that's different is the choices we have in the way we can do


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the fuel reduction work. In the past, all we had available were hand crews and a bulldozer, costing about \$3,000 per acre and taking weeks to accomplish. Today we can take advantage of new technology. Using "brush mastication" equipment, we can work from 1 to 3 acres a day, driving down costs to \$780 per acre. A brush masticator is a caterpillar-like tractor called an excavator, with a fixed tooth rotary head attached at the end of the boom. This machine grinds up the brush, leaving the remains on the ground to become mulch. This approach helps with soil erosion and, unlike hand work, does not need to be burned. I'll have more information and photos on this technique in a future article.

In summary, I'm really excited about a solution to reduce fuels in our greenbelts. After observing the wild devastation in the Southern California Fires, we need to make this a top priority. And I need the support of all property owners in this effort as it benefits us all.

Orange-raspberry syrup (recipe follows)

Preheat oven to 400 degrees. Lightly spray a large baking sheet with vegetable oil spray. Put the cereal in a large, airtight plastic bag. Using a rolling pin, crush the cereal until coarse. Transfer to a large plate.

In shallow container such as pie plate, whisk together the remaining ingredients except the bread slices and topping. Dip each piece of bread in the egg substitute mixture, then coat both sides with the cereal crumbs. Arrange the slices on baking sheet (don't overlap) and bake for 7 minutes. Turn the bread over to bake for additional 7 minutes or until golden brown. Serve with topping.

ORANGE-RASPBERRY SYRUP

1/4 teaspoon grated orange zest 1/2 cup fresh orange juice 1 tablespoon plus 1 teaspoon sugar 1 teaspoon cornstarch 1/8 teaspoon ground cinnamon 1/3 cup frozen unsweetened raspberries, thawed and drained

In a small saucepan, stir together all the ingredients except the raspberries. Bring to a boil over medium-high heat, stirring constantly. Reduce heat and simmer for 2 minutes, stirring occasionally. Remove from heat and stir in the raspberries.

Frozen Pipes - Don't Let It Happen to You!

www.veu ould you believe that every year in the wintertime at Pine Mountain Lake, a half dozen or more homes suffer broken water pipes due to the water inside them becoming frozen? How come we let this happen?

It's generally not a problem for folks who live up here full time. Because they live in their homes and have their heaters on, the pipes stay warm along with the house. That is, until they go away for a long weekend and turn the heater off. And if they left the water main turned on, they come home to find not only broken pipes, but the house flooded AND a huge water bill from G.C.S.D.

The problem is more of a concern for those who "live off the hill". Our weekenders might be surprised to learn that it only takes a few days between closing up the cabin and temperatures cold enough to freeze water to burst a pipe.

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class is more like ancient history, let's review. If you let water cool to the freezing point, something amazing happens. At the instant water changes from a liquid to a solid, it expands. It just so happens that ice weighs less than an equal volume of water. That's why ice cubes in your rumand-coke cocktail float. And why lakes that freeze over have ice on top and the little fishies can still swim underneath. Sounds like a great idea. But water that freezes inside a copper pipe expands with such force, it actually causes the pipe to burst open.

So... what to do?

Some people will tell you to leave your heater on when you go away. But that's not really such a good idea. First of all, if there's a power failure, you might lose that heat source and get frozen pipes anyway. Secondly, there's the issue of paying constantly rising prices for electricity or propane to heat a house when there's nobody home. And third, there's increased concern about wasting fossil fuels and the greenhouse gases produced when burning them.

The best approach is to turn off the water supply and drain the house before you leave. Here's how it works. When your house was built, the plumber installed the water pipes in such a way that if you were to open a drain valve at the lowest point in the system, and then open all other faucets and hose bibs around the house, all of the water would drain out of the house. No water in the pipes...it can't freeze.

The trick is to determine the lowest point. Sometimes it's a hose bib. Sometimes it's the drain valve on the water heater tank, which means running a garden hose from the water heater to the outside world. If you can't easily figure it out, invest a few bucks and call a plumber to come out and inspect. And if the low point doesn't empty easily to the outside world, you can have the plumber add some pipe and make it so.

Oh, this is very important. Turn off the gas to your propane water heater, or circuit breaker if it's electric, before you do any draining.

Pop-quiz: What's a "P-Trap"?

Those aspiring plumbers and steam fitters out there are saying "but what about the P-traps"? A P-trap is that curvy pipe under your sink that's shaped like the letter P. It holds a bit of water and that prevents the stink from the sewer from coming into your home. Same thing for your toilets, bathtubs and showers.

To prevent the water in P-traps from freezing, you can buy something called "potable anti-freeze", available from any recreational vehicle supply store. It's different from the anti-freeze you put in your car...much more environmentally friendly. You put about an ounce of potable antifreeze in each sink, tub or shower drain. When it comes to toilets, first flush the toilet but don't let the handle go. Hold onto it until all the toilet tank water is gone. Then put that 1 ounce of potable anti-freeze in the toilet bowl.

When You Return:

When you come back for a visit, the procedure is simple. You reverse the process. Close every valve before you open the main water valve. And make sure you open a hot water faucet and let all the air escape before you turn on the water heater. This is important because if you turn on an electric water heater without water in the tank, the electric element will overheat and burn out.

In Conclusion:

Drain your house, save energy and the planet, and have confidence that although Mother Nature is out to get you, you've outsmarted her once again.

Yeah, I know it sounds like a lot of work. But believe me, it's a lot less work than ripping up your carpets after a flood. If you're too lazy to actually drain the house, at least turn off the water main before you leave. You might suffer broken pipes, but at least you'll forego the flood.



Wade Anderson, hero to some, close companion to many, passed away peacefully on October 30, 2007. During his 90 years he was a loving husband, father, grandfather and kind and generous friend. A skilled craftsman, medaled marksman, noted photographer, golfer and committed to personal fitness, Wade was special.

Wade was born in Rock Springs, Texas on February 14, 1917. He lived in Rock Springs until he was 17, when he left home to join the Army. Called to active duty in 1941 he was assigned to a tank unit in the infantry. Wade demonstrated superior skills as a pistol shooter, represented his unit in competitive matches, and won many. In the fall of 1948 Wade moved to Corvallis, Oregon and enrolled in Oregon State University. He earned a Master's degree in Industrial Arts and went into teaching. He taught woodworking at the high school level for over 30 years and was recognized as an exemplary instructor in his field.

Following his retirement from teaching Wade became a firearms dealer, licensed to sell the high quality pistols used by marksmen in competitive shooting. Business prospered to the pint where it became the largest distributor of Hammerli, the pistols employed by most marksmen in the Olympics, as well as other serious, international competition.

A resident of Pine Mountain Lake in his senior years, Wade kept himself extraordinarily active, playing golf several times per week, crafting art objects from wood, fishing and working in the weight room. He won a national body building competition when he was 88, and shot his age on the golf course twice during the past year.

Wade was preceded in death by his parents, Bud and Rebecca Anderson; his first wife, Jane; two sisters and three brothers. He is survived in life by Hannalore, his wife of 22 years, two sons, three stepsons, and many grandchildren and great grandchildren.

There will be no local services in the Groveland area but next March, a memorial service will be held in Rock Springs where he will be reposed with other members of his family. The memorial will include full military honors with a presentation of the flag, taps and a gun salute.

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
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

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Comet I7P/Holmes

s I write this article in early November, the night sky above Pine Mountain Lake is being visited by an unexpected treat, a relatively unknown comet called 17P/Holmes. Until late October, this comet had been visible only with a telescope, but that changed as it suddenly erupted and expanded. A similar burst in November of 1892 may have led to the comet's original discovery by Edwin Holmes in London England. Based on measurements made by experts, comet Holmes has expanded from a diameter of only 2 miles to a diameter of over 621,000 miles. Nearly 50,000 earth sized planets could fit within the expanded Holmes comet.

A comet is a small body in the solar system that orbits the Sun and occasionally exhibits a coma (or atmosphere) and/or a tail from the effects of solar radiation upon the comet's nucleus, which itself is a body composed of rock, dust, and ice. Both the comet and tail are illuminated by the Sun and may become visible from Earth when it passes through the inner solar system. Most comets are too faint to be visible without the aid of a telescope but a few each decade become bright enough to be visible with the naked eye.

Astronomers measure the brightness of

celestial objects using a scale referred to as "magnitude". The lower the magnitude number, the brighter the object. Comet Holmes is normally a magnitude 17 - that's about 25,000 times fainter than the faintest star that can normally be seen without any optical aid like a telescope. Between October 23rd and 24th, the comet grew much larger and brighter, going from magnitude 17 to about magnitude 3 in just a few hours, while it appeared in the constellation Perseus. This is a change in brightness of nearly 400,000 times in less than 24 hours. Scientists speculate the comet expanded because there are sinkholes in its nucleus, giving it a honeycomb-like structure. When this structure collapses, comet ice is exposed to the sun which transformed the ice into gas. This gas is then illuminated by the sun which makes the comet appear as a fuzzy sphere.

Comet Holmes is not as dramatic as some comets because it lacks the characteristic tail that people usually associate with a "comet". Instead, it appears as a fuzzy, starlike object, but with no noticeable tail. This is because its orbit took it to near opposition with respect to Earth. This means that observers on Earth are looking nearly straight down along its tail, making it appear as a fuzzy sphere, without a tail, about as bright as the stars in the Big Dipper.

This image was created from a series of 11 photographs taken from a digital camera attached to a telescope. The telescope tracks the sky to prevent blurred images. These photographs were 60 second exposures to show the detail of the comet. 60 second exposures reveal much more detail than can be seen with the naked eye. If you look closely at this image, you can make out the comet and the expanding gases that make up this "fuzzy sphere" in the sky. New Christmas Bird Count Planned for South County

The 108th annual Christmas Bird Count, administered by the National Audubon Society, will take place between mid-December 2007 and the first week in January 2008. A new CBC circle is being planned that includes the Moccasin, Big Oak Flat, and Groveland communities in south county.

The 15 mile diameter circle is cen-

tered on Hiway 49, a few miles south of Hiway 120, and covers many different habitats, including a large portion of Lake Don Pedro, dry chaparral, oak and pine forests, and suburban areas with backyard feeders. Altitudes range from 800 ft to 3500 ft.

Over 100 different species can be expected ranging from wintering waterfowl, to Bald Eagles, Hawks, Falcons, Woodpeckers, Finches, Sparrows, and many other colorful birds.

Interested volunteers are needed to cover the 10 different sectors of the circle. You don't need to be an accomplished birder to enjoy this single day devoted to counting every bird that you can find. Experienced birders will be included in each group to help the newest participants to develop their skills and to point out the wide range of birds that are in this area during the winter months. Field trips can be arranged to provide early birding op-

portunities throughout the summer and fall for new birders.

A boat will be available to count birds on Pine Mountain Lake and Lake Don Pedro. Permission has been obtained to bird the Hetch Hetchy Railroad grade all the way from Big Oak Flat to Mocassin.

The date for this count is Saturday,

December 29th. The count day ends with a potluck supper at the Groveland Community Hall where sector counts and exciting finds are discussed and bragging rights are established.

Those in attendance were: Pauline Campbell, Sonora Regional Hospital; Sara Herrin, VNA/Hospice; Colette Such, Groveland Rehab Center; Kathi Bramblett, Tuolumne Co Behavioral Health Dept; Council Members in attendance were: Karen Serrett, Gloria Marler, Etty Garber, Dr. Kate Newcomb M.D., Elsie Stock, Nadine Padrone, Alicia Bergmann and Liz Mattingly.

Supervisor Thornton is our direct contact person to the Board of Supervisors and the Groveland Rehab Center updates. He stated that he will be giving us a continued 30 day update with the Board of Supervisors.

Groveland Rehab Center: Colette Such, AIM Coordinator of Tuolumne County is currently overseeing the Groveland Rehab Center. She has been going through organizing the patients billing information. She is making sure everything is sound, productivity has increased and costs have decreased due to a procedure change. If there are no patients scheduled after 2 pm, the center is closed for the day. January 1, 2008 the Center will be using a different billing system so that all billing is calculated correctly and submitted in a timely fashion to avoid denial or penalties of billing.

Gloria Marler and Alicia Bergmann have been appointed by Supervisor Thornton to work with Colette Such and Debbi Russell, also of Tuolumne County, in helping work out solutions for our Rehab Center.

Another major issue that was brought to our attention is, in 2001 Office of Statewide Health Planning and Development (OSHPD) mandated that out patient clinics be retrofitted with a new "Airflow Requirement" in all County, State, Hospitals, and Health offices. This could possibly add an additional cost to retrofit the Rehab Center to have an enclosed waiting room with "Zero Back Draft". Meaning that the air in the waiting room not be allowed to circulate throughout the office space but must be directly removed from the building.

Negotiations between the Tuolumne County and Sonora Regional Hospital are on going. With this OSHPD information hopefully our County Supervisors and Sonora Regional Hospital can work quickly on a solution to solve the issue to keep the Rehab Center of "The Greater Groveland Area" open! giant gold Nugget will descend from the ceiling as this year's Midnight Surprise unfolds." Community Turns To College For Health And Fitness

For a number of years, foothill residents have gone to Columbia College to maintain their health and fitness, get educated on diabetic management, and participate in exercise therapy for cardiac and pulmonary rehabilitation. The current specialty fitness programs at the college today are:

- Cardiac Rehabilitation III
- Exercise Therapy
- Adaptive Physical Education
- Pulmonary Rehabilitation
- Exercise & Diabetic Management.

In the 1970s, Dr. Bob Gibson, a now retired Columbia College physical education instructor, began the movement to introduce an adult and lifetime fitness program in addition to the college's traditional physical education offerings. His vision was to utilize the institution's resources to implement lifestyle changes for students from ages 16 to 90 and beyond through fitness. The first classes were conducted in the armory at the Columbia Airport.

This program grew and quickly caught the attention of the local medical community. Working in collaboration, a cardiac fitness program was implemented in 1979. The program's function is rehabilitation of heart disease patients through medically supervised exercises and health education. It is intended for those, who have already successfully progressed through the hospital and home recovery phases. Enrollment requires a physician's referral.

In 1981, individuals with hip and knee replacements, survivors of strokes, and those with arm or back problems were the first students in the new adaptive physical education classes. These classes are specifically tailored and designed to give education, exercise and support to people with physical limitations. This was followed by establishment of a pulmonary rehabilitation program. Under medical direction of a physician, the program is for persons with breathing difficulties, including emphysema, chronic bronchitis, bronchiectasis, asthma, and other chronic obstructive pulmonary diseases.

Diabetes (type 2) has been steadily on the rise within the U.S. and approximately 7%, or 1.4 million Americans were diagnosed with it in 2002. The foothill counties reached a high of 6.3% of the adult population in 2001. In view of these statistics, Columbia College introduced a course in exercise and diabetes management. Lectures focus on improving health management, along with addressing specific health issues. Exercise is conducted in a safe, social setting with peer interaction. A community medical advisory board, chaired by Dr. S. Todd Stolp, Tuolumne County Public Health Department director, oversees the program along with other medical professionals.

In one adaptive P.E. class alone, community members attend for a number of different health reasons. Carl Lindheimer, 89 of Columbia has been enrolled faithfully because "it has put five to 10 years on my life." Kay Burns, 91 also of Columbia extols the benefits of exercise to "keep her mind going" and especially enjoys the friendly banter and companionship of those in the class. Quentin Stirtz, 79 of Sonora suffers from arthritis and exercises just to keep moving. June Berg, 85 of Columbia started attending adaptive physical education classes in 1989 and continues to do so in order to "prevent her heart rate from going too high." In addition, she acknowledges that regular exercise has helped her recover faster from surgery in the past. One of the "younger" class members, Ron Hemsworth, 69 of



Jamestown exercises to lose weight and has gone down two pant sizes while in the class.

"We basically have four structures in our present Health and Human Performance Department programs. Traditional courses, athletics, outdoor recreation classes and of course, our specialty fitness classes," said Josh Bigelow, an H-HP instructor. "Through our specialty fitness classes, we feel very fortunate in being able to help individuals achieve their fitness goals and in that way, represent Columbia College in a real positive light."
