RESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Several months ago we dedicated a major portion of our November Board Meeting to discuss the Sheriff's Department coverage in our area along with the security of Pine Mountain Lake and the overall Groveland area. Since that time, the Sheriff's Department has designated full time deputy coverage in this portion of the County. However, that alone does not solve our problems. The Deputies serving our County are paid considerably less than the Police Officers of Sonora and other law enforcement agencies in our area. As a result, the Sheriffs Department has experienced a high turn over rate. It is up to our County Supervisors to insure that these Deputies are compensated adequately so the Sheriff's Department is not continually understaffed. We all need to keep the pressure on our local officials to make sure that this happens. In addition, we need to do some things for ourselves, so we are in the process of implementing a Crime Stopper Program with other local interested individuals.

As we enter the early stages of the year, I ask all of you to support our amenities. They are there for your enjoyment.

## **GENERAL MANAGER'S REPORT**

### **Sheriff Deputy Coverage and Crime Stoppers**

In 2005 Tuolumne County, Groveland and PMLA experienced an increase in the number of residential burglaries. The PMLA Board and I worked directly with County Supervisor Mark Thornton and the Tuolumne Country Sheriff in an effort to bring our Deputy Sheriff patrol back up to the normal coverage. It is my understanding that we are now back to full coverage. However, this is not the end of the issue. Crime is still a problem and we are all looking for ways to fight crime and increase the safety and security of PMLA residents and property. As part of this effort, we are very supportive of the Tuolumne County Sheriff, CSU, CHP and Supervisor Thornton. It is important to note that Tuolumne County is currently in union contract negotiations with the Sheriffs union. We believe it is imperative that our County Board of Supervisors and County Administrative Manager do everything in their power to bring the Sheriffs Deputies salaries and benefits up to a competitive level so that we do not continue to lose trained personnel. When I heard what these Deputies make in wages and benefits, I was appalled. They risk their lives every day just going to work. I think the County can do better.


On January 5th President Scott, Assistant to the General Manager, Rick Whybra and I met with the Tuolumne County Sheriff's Community Service Unit, Neighborhood Watch, Sheriff Deputies Huffman, Cotrell and Director of the San Jose Crime Stoppers Organization, Ben Angileri. Mr. Angileri was very helpful and provided us with a lot of information. Also in attendance were several property owners and concerned citizens. The goal of the meeting was researching effective ways that ordinary citizens and groups fight crime in their communities. The Neighborhood Watch and Crime Stoppers programs were the topics of discussion.

Crime Stoppers is an international program that is very successful in fighting crime. There are many chapters in California and we plan to start one in PML. New Mexico in September 1976 and is a partnership of the community, the media and law enforcement designed to combat crime and keep our streets safe.

Crime Stoppers programs are operated as not-for-profit charities and are managed by a volunteer board of directors who take responsibility fundraising and paying rewards to individuals who anonymous call with information that helps solve crime. According to the information we received, it is an extremely effective crime fighting concept and we are very optimistic that this type of program will help reduce crime in PML. Watch for updates on this and other crime fighting programs in future issues of the PML News and on the PMLA Website.

# Director's Corner by Rita Hart, Director at Large

This is my first Director's Corner. It does not directly relate to PMLA business, but is somewhat topical given the current high level of interest in the reduced sheriff's patrols.

I have sent off the form to register to vote in Tuolumne County so that I can vote in local elections involving PML. Even though I reside full time in Walnut Creek, my future is here and I feel that



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my vote will have greater impact here as well.

Those of you who live "off the hill" who are disappointed with the level of service that we are getting from the sheriff's department might want to consider registering in time for the next election of a sheriff. Similarly, if vou are concerned about your sewer and water bills, you might want to have a voice in GCSD elections. We at PML have far fewer voters than we have tax payers, and I don't think that fact is lost on our elected officials.

I have done some research to be sure that this is legal, and I also have received confirmation from Mark Thornton, our representative on the board of supervisors, that off the hill property owners can register to vote here. There are basic requirements that you be a U.S. citizen and a resident of California, plus some other technicalities that have nothing to do with residency.

Living here full time is not required. In fact, you can change your registration back and forth should something important come up concerning an election in your current district. The only catch is that you may not be registered to vote in two districts at the same time.

If this idea appeals to you, go to the website of the Secretary of State: www.ss.ca.gov. That website is well laid out for simplicity and ease of use. On the home page under "Elections and Voter Information" click on "Register to Vote." There you will find a form that you can download and mail in. On the left side of that page is an address directory of county election officials in alphabetical order by county name.

Your address would be the one in Groveland, and your mailing address the one elsewhere in California. When my first ballot arrives. I will then request an absentee ballot so that I can vote at home at my leisure with my cup of coffee. If you have questions about this, I can be contacted at ritahart@pmlvoice.com. 8

# OPINION EDITORIAL: Whatever Happened to Common Courtesy?

Taving grown up in a small mountain community, I learned Lto drive where other drivers were courteous and, dare I say it, even friendly. Slower drivers used turnouts, unless they were tourists, and you were more apt to receive a wave and smile than a finger and a shout. Now I am not sure when it happened, but so many drivers seem to feel that anyone else on

"their" road is an inconvenience, if not a downright threat.

An example of what I mean is illustrated by a recent event that took place on Ferretti Road. I actually had a gentleman (I use the term very loosely) in a pick up come around a corner on my side of the road leaving me no where to go. When I honked to get his attention to let him know he was in my lane, I got the international symbol letting me know that I am number one. He scowled and glared cursing something in my direction that I was glad I didn't hear, and left me wondering what else would he have wanted me to do?

I am sure that I was an inconvenience to his intended route, even if he was in the wrong.

Or the countless times that I have had the oncoming car turn its high beams on me because my headlights are too bright. Yes, I drive one of those cars with the really bright white headlights. Rush hour means there were three people ahead of you at the stop sign, there is no smog, and for better or worse, you know most everyone in town, at least by sight. The tourists love our town and supply much needed money for our economy. Wouldn't it be great if they went home and told their friends, "The people in Groveland are so nice." Wouldn't you feel good having everyone you see smile and wave and say hello? Today I am succeeding at practicing what I preach, I'm still working on the perfect part, I'm being nice, so consider this a smile and a wave.

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

# Stagecoach History by Linda Hopson, STCHS

n Saturday, February 18th, two local boys, Wally Anker and Jim Phillips, will tell us all about the days of the stagecoach in our area. Jim's family came here in 1849 and Wally's family came in 1853. Both of them grew up listening to lots of hand-me-down stories they'd like to share with us about the life and times of the local stagecoaches. Seven stagecoach stops were between Big Oak Flat and Yosemite and Wally and Jim will focus on Priest Station and Crocker Station.

Where exactly was Crocker Station? Where are the other five stagecoach stops? Where did the stagecoach stop in Groveland? What kind of hold-up stories did they hear about? What kinds of famous people rode through our town? Find out the answer to these questions and bring yours. Also, the museum just purchased some old stagecoach maps and we will get our first look at them.

Wally's family is long associated with Priest Station, Big Oak Flat, the Tioga Pass Road and Yosemite. Wally was the first President of STCHS. Jim's family had a significant impact on our area. Jim is full of our history and folklore. Jim is related to the Ferrettis and the Boitanos. His family has extensive connections to Yosemite. He remembers his great great aunt knowing and talking about John Muir. His family owned the White Wolf Lodge, had the 4-mile trail built from the valley floor to Glacier Point in 1872, and built the old Glacier Point Hotel. His family also owned Gin Flat in Yosemite as

t the December 28th special meeting of the Groveland Community Services District (GCSD) Board of Directors, after some discussion regarding the appropriateness of the building of a skate park in the lower portion of the Mary Laveroni Community Park ("Mary's park"), the Board voted in favor of Director Dick Lennen's motion to allocate the necessary space for the construction of the skate park, to be completed with donated ramps. Other action taken by the GCSD board included: (1) Approved Notice of Intention to prepare a Negative Declaration, (2) Approved Initial Study and proposed form of Negative Declaration, and (3) Authorized Posting with the County Clerk.

The Staff presented the First Reading of a Draft Skate Park Ordinance. At a future meeting of the board a second reading will be scheduled and at that time the board will conduct a Public Hearing. Following the public hearing the ordinance can then be adopted at a regular meeting, provided all proper posting and notification requirements are met as required by law. The general public will be kept informed throughout this legal process.

Dave "Stilts" Volponi has been the Design Chairperson for the skate park. He is a very experienced and avid skate boarder. Every year he travels with the circus, and while doing so, he investigates other parks and talks to the skate boarders. He listens to their input and asks what they like and do not like about their skate park and returns to Groveland with pictures and insight. He also talks to the skate boarders about proper usage of the park and about those activities that should not be allowed or condoned.

Steel coated modules have been ordered for the initial phase of the skate park with more modules to be ordered if the first phase proves to be trouble free. The new Tuolumne County Youth and Recreation Center will be moved to "Mary's Park" in early spring 2006. It will feature a triple wide manufactured building with games, a basketball court,

and other amenities; construction of the skate park will be coordinated with the County plans for the youth center. GCSD is donating playground equipment to the Youth Center as well as allocating land for the facilities.

For over five years, the Groveland Skate Park Committee, consisting of Frank Oyung, Merle Heath, Rolene Kiesling, Rick Schone and Dave Volponi has worked to raise funds for the construction of a skate park. The Committee has a host of donors to thank for their generosity which enabled them to raise over \$60,000. Between December 12, 2001 and July 13, 2005, Charlie the can man collected over \$25,000 from aluminum can recycling, before retiring on November 14, 2005 to Skyline Place. Commencing July of this year, Mark Watts, Groveland County Youth Director and the Recreation Center participants took over the recycling task from Charlie. Other individuals in the community have been generous. Ray Connelly and David Lint donated substantial sums in memory of their wives, Cherie Connelly and Shirley Lint. Funds were also raised by raffle sales at Rebecca Breakfasts, car washes and the sale of glo-rings. The Committee also thanks Peter Barsotti of the Iron Door Saloon, The Hetch Hetchy Board of Realtors, the Bill Graham Foundation, the Classic Car Show for their support and Sandy Bradley, principal of Tioga High School, and students who assisted with car washes from Tioga High and Tenaya Elementary Schools. And a special thanks to the anonymous donor for his/her donations through paycheck



# **Mountain Tunnel Inspected**

Hetch Hetchy Reservoir by way of the Mountain Tunnel, which passes beneath the Groveland area on its way to Moccasin. In fact, we are the City & County of San Francisco's first water customer. In mid-January, the tunnel was shut down for inspection needed to design some heavy-duty

maintenance that will probably take place in 2008 and beyond. I want to thank our water customers for heeding the signs around the community to conserve water. We have about a 10-day supply of water in storage tanks... unless, of course, there is a fire, then all bets are off. Your efforts to conserve during this brief shut down are much appreciated.

In preparing for the longer shut down in 2008 (as much as 60 days), GCSD is working with the Hetch Hetchy engineers to design a portable, trailer-mounted water treatment system that can be used during water interruptions. This "emergency" treatment system will take water from Pine Mountain Lake, filter and disinfect it, and then deliver it to our storage tanks. Because this would happen in the wintertime when flow into the lake from First and Second Garrote Creeks and Big Creek are at their maximum, no change in water level in the lake is expected. By comparison, if for some reason this water were to be pumped in the summertime, then Pine Mountain Lake level would drop about 7 inches in that 60-day period. These prolonged winter maintenance shutdowns of the Mountain Tunnel by Hetch Hetchy will continue for up to 10 years, beginning in 2008.

The water treatment plant will be placed on two to three large box trailers, similar to tractor-trailer rigs you see down on the flat land. These trailers will be linked to

each other and to the influent and discharge points by large hoses. After the water interruption, the treatment plant would be disconnected and moved back into storage at GCSD.

We have been looking around PML with PML staff for convenient places to put these trailers. One suggestion is near the PML Maintenance Yard. The advantage to this location is that it is near both a large GCSD water main and it is near the discharge end of the pipeline that brings lake water to irrigate the golf course. We would have to run long power and sewer lines to this area to accommodate the needs of the treatment plant—a big expense. An alternative location is Dunn Court, which is the origin of the golf course irrigation water pipeline. The advantage of this location is that water mains, sewer lines and power are immediately available. The downside is that the plant is more visible to the public for the 60 or so days that it would be operating each year. At this point, no decisions have been made on location, but we will keep you posted.

One of the issues that remains unresolved is who would pay for this expensive treatment plant that is only used occasionally. GCSD staff will be writing grant proposals and will also be asking for some financial help from the City/County of San Francisco. In the end, we will probably have to pay some amount for this system, with the actual amount to be the subject of future negotiations. But, this system will give our customers the security that we will always have a source of water in case of an emergency.



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










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
