


ebruary is upon us and I still haven't thawed out but it's just about time for us to emerge from hibernation.

First of all from the inquiring minds department, a number of people have approached me with questions about the pending repair shut down of the Hetch Hetchy water tunnel. Here are the true facts on this project.

Beginning in January or February of next year, Hetch Hetchy plans to shut down the water tunnel for 45 to 60 days. They plan to repeat this repair work each year through 2015 (or 2025 if they decide to do it every other year). During the shut down period an additional source of water must be available to supply PML, Groveland and Big Oak Flat customers. That source will be Pine Mountain Lake.

Now before everyone gets panicky with visions of our lake becoming a vast mud hole, let me give you're a few facts and figures. Our lake when full holds about 2.5 billion gallons of water. In an average year, Big Creek supplies about 2.2 billion gallons, most of which flows over the spillway. GCSD will require a maximum of 864,000 gal./day or a total of 51.8 mil gal./ shut down period. Assuming no rain at all during that time, this represents about 2% of our lake's total volume causing the level to drop approximately 8 inches. This is truly a worst-case scenario since it's unlikely that we will not receive rain during January and February. In reality, there would be little or no change in the lake level.

Joe, Ron and myself met with GCSD to



at this month's Board meeting.

On the financial front, we finished 2006 without having to tap into any of the 2007 revenue. This is the first in many years that your Association has been able to accomplish this (no more robbing Peter to Pay Paul). In addition, even though the final numbers are not yet in, it appears that we completed 2006 within our budget. A big "hats off" to Ken Spenser, the Accounting staff, and all our managers for making this happen.

Now looking at the legal situation, the Plaintiffs in the Lett -Kauffman lawsuit filed a motion to disqualify our Association Counsel from defending the individual director defendants as a supposed conflict of interests. The court granted this motion forcing us to select alternate legal representation for these individuals. This in effect increases the cost of our legal defense. Since the Association is bound to indemnify each named individual, this increased expense will fall directly on the Association. What is wrong with this picture? This is starting to appear that this lawsuit is nothing more than a vindictive attempt to try and punish certain volunteers that willing gave up their time to run your Association. However, there could be a silver lining in here though. In a civil suit, a wrongly accused defendant may be granted the right to sue for legal fees and costs. I wonder if those chickens might just come home to roost.

Since all the legal filings are public information, we will be posting them to the

Pine Mountain Lake website as soon as it completes it's facelift. This way you can monitor the progress of each case in real time and form your own opinions.



GENERAL MANAGER'S MESSAGE

PMLA v. Huey Lawsuit

As most of you know, PMLA was forced to file a lawsuit against a homeowner in an effort to compel him to comply with the CC&R's. On Friday, January 12th the Association prevailed at a hearing in Sonora. We had filed for a motion for summary judgment in the PMLA v. Huey lawsuit. A permanent injunction was granted against the member and the Association was awarded all attorney's fees and costs to litigate the matter. To date the cost to litigate this matter is nearly \$60K. Once the final paperwork is completed we will be taking steps to collect this money as expeditiously as possible. As an Association, we do every thing we can to get members to comply with the CC&R's and lawsuits are filed only as a means of last resort.

Association Website

The new PML Website is up and running and if you have not had an opportunity to visit us, you should do so. We are updating the site daily with new information, links and pictures. I would like to thank my Assistant, Rick Whybra and Nancy Perry in member services for all their hard work on this project.

Safety Barriers in front of mailhouses

Over the past two years, PML has experienced a rash of vehicles crashing into our mailhouses causing extensive damage and threatening the safety of Postal and Maintenance personnel. We believe one incident was an attempt to break in and steal mail. In response to this we have coordinated our efforts with the USPS and installed safety barriers at most of our mailhouses. We are also working on bringing electricity to the mailhouses so that our members can safely access their mail at night and the project is progressing. Most of the lighting fixtures are installed and we are waiting for PG&E to attach the power to the buildings.

Administration

We recently installed "no parking signs" at the Administration parking lot for the hours between 6 p.m. and 6 a.m. This was in response to the multiple occasions that non-members have left broken-down vehicles in the parking lot for days at a time. In accordance with County and State vehicle code, we were forced to post the signs so that we could legally have the vehicles towed. In the off chance that a member may need to use the lot in overnight, they should make arrangements with the Department of Safety ahead of time and we will take the necessary steps to accommodate them.

Accounting software go-live

Our new accounting software project was completed with a go-live date of January 1st, 2007. We are conducting staff training in the use of the new software and everything is progressing according to plan. Due to Association Controller, Ken Spencer's experience we were able to save a considerable amount of money during the transfer and installation. Thank vou Ken!

AARP Drivers Safety Course

I have received several calls from members requesting a revival of the AARP Drivers Safety Course. Most seniors that take this course can get a discount and save some money on their insurance. We are checking with local and county instructors to see if we can host some classes for our members. Keep checking the PML News and Website and we will keep you posted.

Lake Dredging Project

As I have reported in previous articles, after meetings and comprehensive review by Tuolumne County, the Regional Water Quality Control Board, the Department of Fish and Game and the Army Corps of Engineers, we have received the supplemental requirements that must be met prior to approval of the permits for our project.

Several environmental and biological concerns were brought into consideration by all of the governmental agencies including several negative comments listed as responses to the Tuolumne County survey sent out to property owners. Negative comments reported in an article in the local Sonora newspaper were also considered detrimental to the permit process and may have contributed to the delay.

The cost of all these extra environmental impact studies is approximately \$60K. The supplemental cost was approved by the Board and the Lake Dredging permit process is moving forward.

On Friday, January 19, 2007, Dr. Napton, a retired professor, conducted archeological surveys, reviewed cultural resources and inspected three areas of concern for the project. Association Limnologist, Mike Horvath also conducted a survey. Other studies will be conducted by wildlife experts to survey the impact on plants and birds, and a marine biologist will be studying the fish and amphibians. We are confident these studies will culminate in the granting of permits by all of the agencies involved so that we can start dredging.

Hetch Hetchy Tunnel Shutdown

PMLA receives water from GCSD, provided by the Hetch Hetchy Tunnel. This tunnel is scheduled to be shut down for 45 to 60 days starting around February of 2008. The tunnel repair is estimated to take over 10 years and the plan is to shut down at the start of every year for a couple of months until the project is completed. Over the last two years, we have met with representatives from GCSD to conduct site inspections for possible portable water treatment sites. We recently met with GCSD management and board members to address the concerns PMLA has with drawing water from the Lake for this purpose and to select a final site for the equipment.

We have asked GCSD General Manager, Jim Goodrich, and District Engineer, Randy Klaahsen, to give a presentation to our Board and membership at the February 17th Board meeting. If you are interested in the impact of the Hetch Hetchy Tunnel shut down and the plans to supply water to PML residents, I encourage you to attend.

Burning in PML

We ask that all members utilize the Compost Area near the PML Campgrounds to dispose of limbs, leaves, brush and clippings. Household garbage, stumps and construction debris are not permitted. For those that choose to burn, please be polite to your neighbors and make sure that you do not burn green or wet vegetation. We have received complaints of smoke caused by the burning of wet leaves. It is also important that you monitor the fire and not leave it unattended.

If you have any questions, feel free to call our Fire Safety Coordinator, Larry Wooduff at (209) 962-8616. It is also important to check with the Department of Safety to determine if it is a permissible burn day. The Department of Safety checks with the County Air Quality Control Department every day and will be happy to give you the information. You can reach them at (209) 962-8615.



PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO

PMLA BOATING AND LAKE RULES

RESOLUTION 05.01

For your safety, California Boating Laws prevail. For your convenience, copies of the pamphlet "ABC's of California Boating Laws," published by the California Harbors and Watercraft are available at the Marina Store.

Listed below are further regulations that apply to Pine Mountain Lake boating usage. Failure to comply with them shall be grounds for termination of your privileges. Violations are subject to citation. All boats are subject to inspection to determine compliance with State Law and Association requirements. If you have any questions on the safety requirements of your boat, contact a Lake Patrol Officer or the Marina Store.

GENERAL BOATING RULES

Know our rules and abide by them for your enjoyment and safety.

All boats on Pine Mountain Lake must meet both State of California and Pine Mountain Lake registration requirements. Only property owners in good standing may register their boats.

E REGISTRATION: Requirements for registration include: current liability insurance with a minimum of \$300,000, proof of PML residency, proof that the

boat meets California Boating Law safety requirements, compliance with PML non-wake enhancing requirements, and agreement to abide by lake rules.

PML non-wake enhancing regulations restrict the use of internal ballast tanks, external fins, foils, panels, or boat hulls specifically designed to increase wakes. Any boats incorporating these devices, registered at PML must adhere to PML's restrictions on not utilizing these devices.

All boats are limited to 5 M.P.H. except during water skiing hours, where the speed limit is 40 M.P.H. in the ski area only. All boats, except those signed up for skiing, must stay out of the ski area while skiing is in progress.

Open stack boats and others with a decibel level exceeding 82 db are prohibited.

Note that areas marked "no wake" mean no wake. These areas are marked with white buoys that say No Wake. Boats may have to go less than 5 MPH in order not to create any wake.

No "Jet Skis," "Waverunners" or other similar variations of personal watercraft are allowed on Pine Mountain Lake (except authorized emergency or law enforcement equipment.)

Only skippers (16 years and older with a valid drivers license) designated by a boat owner may operate a powerboat, provided that they know the lake and marina rules.

Boat owners are responsible for informing their operators of all lake and marina rules.

Boat owners are responsible for the operation of their boats and the wakes they create regardless of who may be operating the boat.

Reckless operation and disregard for others may result in citation and forfeiture of lake boating privileges.

Boaters must stay inside the passenger/ operator areas of the boat. Riding outside of the railing or gate is prohibited.

Powerboat operators may not tow or pull rafts, paddleboats, kayaks, canoes or similar craft.

In case of an accident, give any necessary assistance, then immediately contact the Lake Safety Patrol (based at the Marina).

Sufficient life preservers must be aboard for each passenger. All boaters less than 12 years of age and non-swimmers must wear properly tied life jackets.

Give a wide berth to sail and manually operated boats, as they have the right of way.

No powerboats may be operated within 50 feet of a swimming area.

When meeting another boat, keep to the right.

Individuals wishing to blow out their motors may do so during ski hours *only*. They must register, as if they were skiing and check-in with the boat patrol. (Up to 4 boats maximum are allowed in the ski pattern with skiers/boarders given priority over boats wishing to blow it out). "Blowing out" is limited to two times around the ski pattern.

Every effort shall be made to minimize wakes, especially those affecting shoreline properties.

All lake activity is suspended, when CDF helicopters perform firefighting procedures or other emergencies that require use of lake water.

Lake patrol will be in effect daily. Citations may be given for PML rule infractions. Two citations will constitute action for removing your boat from Pine Mountain Lake.

BOAT LAUNCHING & REMOVAL DATES

NO BOAT MAY BE LAUNCHED without current Pine Mountain Lake registration.

BOAT LAUNCHING AND REMOVAL is allowed only at the Marina boat ramp.

ALL BOATS NOT REMOVED from Dunn Court and the Marina area by October 31st of each year will be removed and stored AT THE OWNERS EXPENSE.

NO TRAILER PARKING permitted except for daily use, and only in designated areas. No trailer parking will be permitted the date of the Independence Day fireworks celebration.

DUNN COURT SAILBOAT OWN-

ERS: Please relocate your sailboat the day before the annual fireworks display. This date may vary from year to year.

WATER SKIING AND WAKEBOARDING RULES

Homeowners wishing to register a ski or wake boat for the first time on PML will be given a tour of the lake and have

these regulations and the PML Waterski and Wakeboard Club's Good Neighbor Rules explained. This tour will be conducted monthly by the PML Lake Patrol, assisted by the PML WWC and must by completed before the homeowner may sign up for ski/wakeboard times at PML. Copies of the Good Neighbor Rules will be available to all boaters at the Marina.

Skiing and wakeboarding will be on a scheduled basis. Skiing hours are generally as follows:

Day Morning hours Evening hours Tuesday and Thursday

9:00-12:00 noon No Ski Hours Wednesday

9:00-12:00 noon No Ski Hours Friday, Saturday, Sunday, Monday 9:00-12:00 noon 5:00-8:00pm

DELETE THIS PARAGRAPH:

In addition to the above, on the 3-day holiday weekends during ski season, Memorial Day, 4th of July, and Labor Day, morning ski times will run from 8:00 am until 12:00 noon.

Skiing and wakeboarding are prohibited November 1 through April 30.

Reservations will be taken at the Marina Store (962-8631). You may call or walk-in (walk-in's have first priority). Reservations will only be taken from one hour prior to the morning time and 4:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. If twelve people are in line prior to this time, the sign up sheet will be completed. When time slots become full, a stand-by list will be taken. Skiing time will be limited to one (1) hour initially, and modified by the Lake Patrol and Marina Manager depending on the stand-by list. Skiers must checkin with the boat patrol upon arrival in the ski area.

A maximum of four (4) boats will be allowed to ski at any one time. A distance of 100 feet shall be maintained between boats.

A counter-clockwise ski pattern shall be maintained.

To minimize shoreline wakes on the North shore, powerboats shall stay as close as possible to the main beach buoys when traveling from the dam toward Big Creek. When traveling Big Creek toward the dam, powerboats should stay as close as possible to the center of the ski pattern as safety permits. Always pass an approaching powerboat on the right.

All boats being used on PML waters must be operated in a manner to minimize the size of the wake produced by

the boat. With the exception of pontoon boats and those boats traveling less than 5 mph, all powerboat operators shall operate at planing speeds as soon as practical when in the ski pattern.

Wake Enhancement: The use of devices, equipment, or placement of passengers on boats for the purpose of creating an enlarged wake is prohibited. Further, no such devices or equipment may be used on any boat in PML. Such devices and equipment include, but are not limited to: exterior panels or wings deployed underwater; rubberized, plastic or metal tanks or bags filled with any material; crowding of passengers to the rear; inside-the-hull water tanks or boat hulls designed specifically to enhance the wake. Additionally, the operator of an outboard or I/O drive boat must keep the out-drive down to optimally trim the boat to minimize the size of the boat's wake at all times.

Any boat that produces excessive wakes may be cited. Two citations result in eviction from the lake for the remainder of the calendar year.

Staging area for skiers is the White SKI BUOY outside the Marina. No other area! There is a voluntary drop area outside the 5 M.P.H. buoys at Fisherman's Cove. See Marina Store and Good Neighbor Rules

Ski course is marked with red buoys. Stay inside of red buoys. These buoys are not a SLALOM COURSE.

Ski boats must have a red or orange flag and an observer at least 12 years of age.

Ski boats returning to a fallen skier must make a starboard (right) turn to return to the skier while raising the red or orange warning flag. The boat operator shall make the 'turn-around' at a slow speed to minimize his wake. Obviously, safety is a concern, but anything a boat operator can do to minimize wake size is required.

The driver of any boat approaching a boat displaying a red or orange flag must acknowledge the downed skiers presence by raising their hand for the skiers tow boat to see and take appropriate evasive action to ensure the safety of the downed

Skier must raise one (1) ski (or wakeboard or kneeboard) when in water with slack towline to warn other boats in the area.

All skiers must wear proper Coast Guard approved life preservers.

Number of water skiers per boat: 2 maximum at a time. When one skier drops, the second skier must drop immediately.

Use of discs, inner tubes, surfboards, water toys and non-approved devices are prohibited.

WATER SKIS, KNEEBOARDS & WAKEBOARDS ONLY.

An area for beginning water ski instruction is available. Contact the Lake Patrol Officer or Marina Manager for details.

Water skiing may be limited on holidays, fishing derbies and sailing regatta

LAKE PATROL will be in effect 7 days per week. Citations will be given for PML rule infractions. Two citations will constitute action for removing your boat from Pine Mountain Lake for the remainder of the calendar year.

KNOW OUR RULES AND ABIDE BY THEM FOR YOUR ENJOYMENT AND SAFETY.

FISHING RULES

California State Fishing License required and to be displayed at all times while fishing. Fish limits are governed by California Fish & Game laws. NO LIVE BAIT other than worms.

Fishing off water taxi docks during water taxi operating hours is prohibited. Trespassing on private property is not allowed.

No fishing within 25 feet of designated swim areas.

SAILING RULES

Sailing Hours: Anytime

SAILBOAT LAUNCHING is allowed only at the Marina boat ramp.

Sailboats and all others must stay out of the skiing area during skiing hours.

The ski area is outlined with red buoys. Stay out of the ski area while skiing is in progress. Be aware of skiing hours to protect yourself. Avoid the east end of the lake (Lake Lodge and Big Creek entrance) during skiing hours.

Sailing of rental boats in Big Creek is not allowed.

No windsurf boards without a sail are allowed on the lake.

PARKING, BEACH & SWIMMING RULES

Swimming:

SWIM AT YOUR OWN RISK. NO LIFEGUARDS ON DUTY.

Swimming is only allowed within the designated swim areas.

No float tubes, surfboards, lounge rafts, etc., allowed on the lake other than within 30 feet from your own private dock. (Tubes and "soft" float toys are allowed in the swim areas). Inflatable boats, canoes and kayaks that are used on Pine Mountain Lake must be registered in the same manner as hard-bottom boats.

Do not venture more than 30 feet from your own private dock. DO NOT swim across or in open lake area.

Follow all posted beach and marina rules and regulations. Note: The beaches are non-smoking areas.

No glass containers, loud music, hardballs, profane language or drinking of alcoholic beverages by anyone under the age of 21 are allowed on any Pine Mountain Lake beach area.

Bicycles and skateboards must be walked through all amenity-parking areas. No riding.

Dogs are restricted from PML Marina, Dunn Court, and Lake Lodge beaches,

Parking:

If the marina parking lot is full, please park at Dunn Court, the Lake Lodge, or Fisherman's Cove and ride the water taxi to the Marina. Water taxi operating schedule is available upon request.

FAILURE TO COMPLY MAY RE-SULT IN FINES OR LOSS OF LAKE PRIVILEGES.

Additional rules and regulations may apply. Rules are subject to change without

ONLY property owners and PMLA employees on duty will be allowed N to park at the Marina parking area on weekends and holidays from Memorial Day Weekend through Labor Day Weekend. Property owners will be required to provide a valid parking sticker or hanging tag.



n 2005, only 5% of the high schools in the entire state of Cali-I fornia were awarded the Distinguished High School honor. Tioga was one of these high schools. We were the only school in the tri-county area that received this award. The closest high school to us that received the same honor was Grace Davis High School in Modesto. No other school in Tuolumne, Calaveras, Mariposa or Amador Counties was awarded this

respect in 2005. The teachers and students at Tioga are very proud of this and we would like to share what it took to get to this point in our school's long struggle to be acknowledged as a top notch high school. Eleven years ago when Mrs. Bradley took over the principalship, Tioga High School did not have a good reputation. In fact, it had a very poor reputation as the

new local high school. Many people in the community chose to send their children to Sonora High or made other choices rather than send their children to Tioga. There were a few dedicated locals however who had worked hard to form Tioga and had the confidence in the school to keep the faith and send their children to Tioga. Over the course of many years, the atmosphere at the high school improved. Students were not allowed to come and go from the campus as they pleased and students were expected to take classes that were "college prep" level rather than just general classes that were actually remedial level where the expectations were low. In 2005, the state of California sent an invitation to Tioga High School to apply for a Distinguished High School Award. This invitation was only sent to schools that qualified based on their ability to meet a certain precise criteria set by the federal government and the state based on "No Child Left Behind (NCLB) and the Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP) and the Academic Performance Index (API) requirements. Both the deferral government and the state requirements are tough and difficult to meet. The CLB requires that all teachers must be credentialed in their area of major teaching, for example a math teacher must be credentialed in the area of math, and a history teacher must be credentialed in the are of history and so on and so on. The AYP and API are based on high schools on the STAR testing for the entire school and the High School Exit Exam results for the students who took the tests that particular year. This is no easy task to achieve. Many, many schools in California have very low scores on both of these tests and don't have teachers that are specialized in the subject matters that they teach. Tioga's scores were very, very good, especially in 2004 and 2006.

Every other year, a small number of California high schools and middle schools area invited to apply for the award. In the even years it is elementary schools that apply. The award is good for four years after it is given. The application process is another area in which many schools cannot or do not wish to take the time and energy to do the work to prove that their school is doing "above and beyond" in their commitment to students, parents and community in the area of educating the children. Fortunately for Tioga High School, we were willing to go the

extra mile and work on an application that was given an "A" by the panel of educators who graded us. They came to visit the high school and decided whether we truly were as good as we said we were. The school is gradeD on "7" different areas. These areas included the following subject matters that affect what goes on at Tioga High School. 1) Vision, Leadership and Standards, 2) student assessment, 3) academic excellence, 4) professional development (training of teachers and staff), 5) Curricular paths and academic guidance, 6) student supports services and 7) school culture and engaging the school community. The people who wrote our application, which is similar to writing a 30-page term paper with no mistakes, were Mrs. Emily Hanchett, Mr. Gordon Giedt and Mr. Robert Wilson. We are very happy that they took the time to do this extra work. They volunteered to do the many hours of thinking and writing, and the entire faculty and staff, as well as the students, parents and community of Groveland and Big Oak Flat, are very proud that our local high school is recognized for the great job that it is doing in educating the kids of BOFGUSD. After we were awarded the honor of "A California Distin-

guished High School", Mrs. Hanchett and Mrs. Bradley were invited to travel to Disneyland to celebrate with the other schools in the state that also were given this award. One of our students from Tioga, Amber Brooks, was also invited to go to Disneyland and perform at the celebration dinner at the Disneyland Hotel. Mrs. Bradley and Mrs. Hanchett enjoyed the festivities and were very proud to represent all of the people from Timberwolf country. They even got to have their pictures taken with the State Superintendent of Schools, Mr. Jack O'Connell. Mrs. Gempler (our journalism teacher) is hoping that we apply again in 2009 so that she can be the one to go to Disneyland and celebrate, because next to Tioga High School, her favorite place on earth is Disneyland.


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STCHS' Wine Tasting Cruise On PML!




Great progress continues at Camp Tuolumne Trails.

"There are a lot of new faces as well as some SRT favorites and the abundance of talent that's on our stage is amazing."



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Senior Peer Service and Counseling Program is **Excellent Opportunity for Volunteer Service**

enior Peer Service and Counseling Program was conceived by senior citizens as a service to adults, 55 or older, who are experiencing the needs relating to their changing situations. As we cross into the period of life we call our senior years, we find many changes taking place, often loss of health, dexterity, friends and family, and especially a spouse. This, coupled with the possible loss of driving privilege, and the possibility of no longer being able to live alone, causes stress, depression and grief. These are the areas Senior Peer Program is able to help with, as well as other problems. Referrals are received

from health facilities, senior service agencies, Visiting Nurses, care facilities, family members and other individuals, as well as those who contact the service on their own behalf.

The counseling program is made up of seniors who take a carefully designed 5-week training course. This, coupled with the fact that they are peer to their clients and have experienced many of the same situations, enables them to be effective counselors. Since the counselors are volunteers, this service is offered, usually in the person's home or care facility, free of charge to the client.

New classes will be held starting January 3, 2007. The training works toward the following goals: enhancement of personal qualities essential to persons working with older adults, increasing the trainees' skills of active listening and effective communication, promoting the trainees' self-development, educating about health and aging, preparing the trainees to participate in supportive mental health counseling and education about maintaining good health.

Applicants for the training must be 55 years or older and warm, caring people who are able to talk without judging. Confidentiality is of utmost importance.

After completing training, counselors

are asked to commit to al least a year of service to the community's older adults, which includes time with clients. We meet the second and fourth Tuesdays for case discussion.

Counselors in the program find they are not only able to perform an important service to the seniors of the county, but being involved in the program is wonderful for their own feelings of selfworth and well-being.

If you find the thought of being a Senior Peer Counselor an interesting, exciting and important one, and are over the age of 55, please come to the program's offices in the Tuolumne County Behavioral Health and Recovery, 197 Mono Way, or you may write: "Senior Peer Service and Counseling Program, 197 Mono Way, Sonora, CA 95370 and an application will be mailed to you. You may also phone the program's offices at (209) 588-9528.

The Senior Peer Counseling Program is a part of the Older Adult System of Care, which also provides other programs to help the seniors of Tuolumne County, and is a part of Tuolumne County's Behavioral Health and Recovery Service, a program of Kings View Health Services.


In those times, alcohol was shipped in barrels to the merchants who then bottled it. And, of course, in those days the local saloons were the main customers. Many towns and hamlets, however small, had a saloon where the locals spent their leisure hours. It can be assumed that many, many bottles were emptied (and reused). A fun touch is a bottle that carried beer from Scotland that was served at Priest Station

about 1870!!! There are pictures of a Beer & Wine Picnic in the 1890's and The Boys Enjoying a Beer in the 1900's. They all looked pleased to be there, even as we today enjoy such events.

With the advent of prohibition the liquor business was out of legal operation until its repeal in 1933.



listoric Iron Door

he historic Iron Door saloon and restaurant in Groveland is the latest old building in Tuolumne County to be classified as historical by the Tuolumne County Planning Commission.

Built in 1852, the Iron Door is probably the second oldest structure in Groveland and one of the oldest buildings in Tuolumne County.

The building was built in 1851-52 by James Tannahill and for years was known as the Granite Store. The name comes from the front and back walls made of solid granite. The sidewalls are solid rock

and mortar and a three-foot thick, sod roof is covered with tin.

The building has always been a bar, but in the early days, it also housed a grocery store and post office.

The walls of the Iron Door are covered with pictures and other memorabilia from the days of the 49er gold miners and Hetch Hetchy.

The late George Laveroni purchased the property around 1937 and it was his idea to name it the "Iron Door" after the giant iron doors on the building.

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


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Summerville High, food bank and more win year-end grants

Food Bank with a new van were among projects to receive major year-end grants from the Sonora Area Foundation, the Irving J. Symons Foundation.

Directors approved the awards just before Christmas:

- •\$200,000 in matching funds to the Summerville High School Foundation for new tennis courts, parking lot, and other improvements
- •\$13,500 to the Tuolumne General Hospital Foundation for new hospital beds or lifts for the Hospital's long-term care unit
- •\$35,000 in matching funds to help community efforts to relocate the historic Jamestown jail back to Jamestown, after decades in a Lodi amusement park now slated for demolition
- •\$26,500 to the Amador-Tuolumne Community Action Agency to purchase a new food delivery van for the Jamestown Food Bank

These major grants were among a dozen approved in the fourth quarter of this year, and bring the Sonora Area Foundation's giving for the year to \$924,813 in grants, awards and scholarships.

Brad Young, President of the Summerville High School Foundation, said the large matching grant gives a huge boost to on-going community efforts to complete major athletic improvements at the Tuolumne campus.

"It's an amazing gift," Young said.
"We're trying to complete serious athletic infrastructure and that takes a lot of money. This is going to help us accomplish the next step."

The school supporters raised funds from several major donors and events last year to install an all-weather girls' softball field, and to grade for the tennis courts and parking areas.

Eric Carlson, the Summerville High Foundation's treasurer, said this new gift will keep that momentum going for the next phase – completing four tennis courts, restrooms, parking area and bleachers. The matching funds will be provided in \$25,000 increments so work can be done as fundraising continues.

"We have some commitments in place already," Carlson said, "and this gives the board a big incentive to go out and raise the rest of the match. This is important to the school and the students." He hopes work on the tennis courts can begin in the spring.

The hospital, Jamestown jail and food bank grants were surprise awards, made in honor of Sonora native and Sonora Area Foundation founder, Irving J. Symons.

Additional fourth quarter awards include the following:

Mother Lode Fair lighting – Outdoor lighting upgrades will be completed at the Mother Lode Fairgrounds, with help from a \$26,000 Sonora Area Foundation grant. Fair staff will provide labor and tools for the improvements and the grant will pay for more than 50 lighting fixtures, bulbs, concrete and other materials. More than 274,000 visitors attend fair events each year, and many activities extend into evening hours. Fair directors said the current lighting system is decades old, provides inadequate lighting, is time-consuming and costly to repair and maintain.

Tuolumne Museum school program – Museum field trips, town walking tours and other activities will give students an in-depth look at local history, thanks to a new program planned by Tuolumne Museum volunteers and local educators. The Foundation has contributed \$4,000 to purchase a video projector, camcorder, display boards and a computer for the project. Museum volunteers will offer a series of activities to third graders at Summerville Elementary and Mother Lode Christian School this year, then expand the program to fourth and fifth graders in the future.

Tioga High School Fire Science Program – Tioga High will purchase uniforms for students enrolled in the school's popular fire science program with the help of a \$3,000 Foundation grant. Students meet at the Groveland Fire House providing an opportunity to learn from professional fire fighters.

Volunteer Awards – Outstanding volunteers will be honored at the fifth annual "Heart of Tuolumne County" event in April. Sonora Area Foundation will again sponsor the event's Lifetime Achievement Award which allows the winner to select a charity of their choice to receive a \$1,000 grant.

Other fourth quarter awards included two which were previously announced: the \$10,000 Elaine Symons Baker Community

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
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Unbelievable Christmas Decorations Take Down

Expanded Medical Services to be Available in Groveland

Tew and expanded mental health services will soon be available throughout Tuolumne County thanks to funding from the Mental Health Services Act (MHSA). Initial funds are targeted for outreach and engagement services, expanded mobile crisis services and community education.

Groveland resident and health and safety advocate, Morris Gaede, is a member of the MHSA Access Committee and has been active in representing the Groveland area's needs. Services supported by MHSA funds are similar to some of the health care needs identified in the report of the Greater Groveland Area Strategic Planning Committee. This committee (composed of community representatives Jim Goodrich, Gloria Marler, Liz Mattingly, Katherine Newcomb, M.D. and Karen Serrett, Ph.D) was created to study local health care needs and recommend ways and means of securing the vitally needed services and facilities. This project culminated in the formation of the Groveland Area Health Advisory Council. The Groveland Council will be interfacing with the MHSA Leadership Council in the planning process through Mr. Gaede's participation and on-going consultation with the County Behavioral Health Department.

Information about mental health issues and concerns is gathered from across the county and presented to the MHSA Leadership Council. The Council makes decisions about what issues will be targeted based on this community input, following the guidelines of the MHSA. The Council will work with its subcommittees and community members to make recommendations on how best to roll out the new programs and services. A contracting process will determine which community based organizations will be providing some of the services.

The first phase of MHSA funding will support developing services and resources in the areas of: 1) outreach services for all age groups at multiple sites all over the county, 2) mobile crisis services, 3) development of needed services for mentally ill persons, such as housing, transportation, peer programs and 4) related community education. These are some of the key focus areas for new and expanded mental health services.

The funds provided by the MHSA will allow our county to address the key areas of concern identified as well as adopt programs that seek to provide prevention and early intervention services. Education of community members and agency personnel can help with early identification of potential problems and help prevent or reduce expensive crisis management.

Continued participation by community members is important for the MHSA and the Groveland Area Health Advisory Council. The Advisory Council needs additional health care professionals of all disciplines and specialties to serve on the council. This group will be actively meeting and conferring with potential providers such as Sonora Regional Medical Center, VNA/Hospice, Tuolumne General Hospital, and Tuolumne County Behavioral Health to advocate for the needed services and promote the establishment of a full service Rural Health Care Clinic in Groveland to compliment the one being established in Greely Hill by John C Freemont Hospital in Mariposa. The Advisory Council will also consult and collaborate with other agencies and consumer groups that comprise "The Consortium." that will work toward establishing new and innovative services in the community.

Locally, individuals or groups who are interested in becoming an approved and funded MHSA venue site for new mental health services that are focused on "intervention or prevention" are encouraged to contact Morris Gaede or the Behavioral Health office now for more information. The RFP or RFQ (requests for proposals or qualifications) process required by Proposition 63 is being initiated for the first phase of funding. The time to begin planning for the next phase is now. This is an ideal opportunity for retired Behavioral Health Care providers to provide their services on an independent, part time basis to supplement their incomes and meet a vital community need at the same time.

Rescue the 1897 Jamestown Jail

In 1897, Tuolumne County constructed a Jamestown Branch Jail with two cells and a deputy's office, to be used as a temporary detention facility for the County jail. For the next fifty years, the jail stood near the rear of what is now Rocca Park in Jamestown.

In the 1950s, the jail was retired and sold to the Pollard family at public auction. It was dismantled and moved 83 miles northwest to the Pollardville theme park near Lodi.

Neil Pollard recently contacted Jamestown merchants Steve Willey and Donn Blount, offering to give the 400 square foot single-story brick and wood jail back to Jamestown at no cost. However, the jail has to be moved before April 2007 since the land has been sold to developers for new housing and a small mall. The jail lies in the "path of destruction" by bulldozers. THE JAIL HAS TO BE RESCUED.

Ad Hoc Committee Formed

An ad hoc committee was formed to Rescue the 1897 Jamestown Jail consisting of members of the Jamestown Promotion Club, Tuolumne County District 5 Supervisor's Office and Administration Office, Tuolumne County Historical Society, and the Sonora Area Foundation. Their goal is to return the jail, a piece of Tuolumne County history, to its original home.

Initial research at the Carlo M. De Ferrari Archive produced the original building specifications, construction drawings, and contract to build the jail in 1897. Jamestown merchants have visited the Pollardville, taking measurements and photos of the jail. Interested contractors have come forward to help determine costs and volunteer skills needed to rescue the iail and reconstruct it in Jamestown. The County has agreed to place the jail near its original site, which is to the front of the current Rebekah Hall (circa 1938) and rear of the present Jamestown Rocca Park. Rocca Park was built by the county in the 1980 after a 1966 fire destroyed the Rocca Building Complex (circa 1897.)

Fund Raising

The positive excitement in the historical community has been overwhelming but money is needed to relocate the jail in short notice. The Sonora Area Foundation, along with the Irving J. Symons Foundation has agreed to match up to \$35,000 on a dollar-for-dollar basis. The ad hoc committee is gearing up to approach major

donors and the general public.

Individuals can "adopt" a square foot of original jail brick wall for \$25, or as many squares as they wish. They will receive an official "Certificate of Adoption," and will be able to claim they are saving history by rescuing an authentic piece of our historic Tuolumne County. The big push is to fund

the relocation.



Skate Park Construction Underway by Jim Goodrich, GCSD General Manager

fter many years of fundraising, the Groveland Skate Park is about to become a reality. GCSD recently installed a storm drain beneath the east end of Lower Mary's Park. With this work completed, we are now underway with construction of the concrete pads for the skate park and the new basketball court. The concrete is courtesy of a \$25,000 Sonora Area Foundation grant. Many of the local contractors have joined together to volunteer their time and skills to prepare the concrete form work, install the rebar and do the finish work on the concrete

The Skate Park Committee has been busy with last-minute fundraising. They have raised over \$100,000. We were notified that American Ramp Company has completed the fabrication of the skate ramps and is awaiting our signal to ship them. With luck, the skate park will be open for business in the spring. Big kudos go to Dave "Stilts" Volponi, Frank Oyung, Merle and Charlie Heath, Rick Shone, Mark Watts, and Rolene Kiesling for their tenacity to undertake such a large fundraising project.

The basketball court is part of the new county Youth Center. With a \$225,000 federal grant to the county, the Youth Center will have a new home at the Park, overlooking the basketball court and skate park. The Youth Center will consist of a 1,300 square foot building that will have activity areas, study areas, and an office for the Youth Coordinator. This project should be completed by summer.

GCSD is providing new playground equipment in the Lower Park, which was donated to GCSD by the City of San Jose Camp. This equipment will become part of the overall Youth Center facility.

GAINs has made the Youth Center one of their major projects for 2007. They are looking for ways to enhance the youth experience at the center (computers, homework help, mentoring, etc.). The proximity of the Museum and Library may open other unique opportunities for our youth.

By this summer, Mary's Park will be a center of activity for area youth. Our thanks to all those volunteers and contributors who made this dream a reality.

NYCPI Focus on Economic Vitality

he Northern Yosemite Corridor Partners, Inc (NYCPI) is a local, grassroots organization that was created in 2005 to explore and document the visions of our Groveland and Big Oak Flat communities. After conducting two town hall meetings in January and April 2005, NYCPI published the visioning Source Document. This document is available on the NYCPI web site (www.nycpi. org/vision) or the GCSD web site (www. gcsd.org). It documented the thoughts and visions of community members, including topics such as education, culture, transportation, healthcare, economic vitality, downtown beautification, livable communities, open space and the natural environment, and others.

In the coming months, NYCPI will be showcasing the progress made on some of these topics. This month, the topic is economic vitality.

To achieve economic vitality in our rural community, we need a viable working middle class that works and lives in our community. Our demographics now are dominated by an active retired community and an economically depressed community. A substantial working middle class is the missing element needed for economic vitality.

NYCPI has been working with the county in developing an Area Plan Amendment to the Tuolumne County General Plan. The economic survey has been completed and the consultant who will prepare the Area Plan is in the process of being selected by the county. NYCPI hopes this plan will consider additional zoning areas for light industry and other commerce, which in turn will provide living wage job opportunities in our community. The Yosemite Chamber of Commerce could

be an instrumental player in reaching this goal.

The other part of this equation is the development of affordable housing in which our new middle class work force can live. The Tuolumne County Planning Committee has drafted an Inclusionary Housing Ordinance which targets new subdivisions to address this urgent need. It will be reviewed at public hearings by the four county planning commissions and by the Board of Supervisors prior to its adoption. In addition, GCSD has been hosting a task force to explore affordable housing in our community. We are exploring ways in which federal subsidizes can be used by an interested developer to reduce the cost of new housing. We are also looking at ways in which the county and GCSD can reduce or eliminate planning and infrastructure costs for affordable housing. We are hopeful that an affordable housing project will be underway by 2008-09.

Finally, we are exploring ways to entice technical industries to relocate from urban/suburban areas to the Groveland/Big Oak Flat communities. Internetbased enterprises are one type that would consider relocation. For an Internet-based company to be successful, high-speed (or broadband), affordable, communication must be available throughout our communities. Currently, only downtown Groveland, Big Oak Flat and parts of Pine Mountain Lake have broadband access and it is expensive. A small group of us is exploring an easy-to-implement, low cost, wireless broadband infrastructure. We are planning a proof of concept demonstration by mid-2007. If it lives up to our expectations, we could have the service available in about a year.

Next month, NYCPI will write about

the development of the Area Plan Amendment to the County's General Plan. In coming months we will present some of our activities related to livable communities and downtown beautification.

Mother Lode Memories By Nancy Perry & Debra Durai

This is the second in a series researched & written by Jean Mc-Clish called "Wandering Along Highway 120". This article was published in the January 30, 1975, edition of the Pine Mountain Lake News and is being reprinted in its original format. This article tours us through Deer Flat Valley.

WANDERING THOUGH DEER FLAT VALLEY

By Jean McClish

Leaving Groveland behind, we turn right onto the Groveland-Deer Flat Road. Within two-tenths of a mile we can begin to see into the Deer Flat Valley.

As the road turns left here, the old De Ferrari ranch is to the right out Degnan Road. It was inhabited by generations of the Deer Flat De Ferrari's until 1941. The ranch house was subsequently the retirement home (until his death in 1973) of Dr. John Degnan, physician in Groveland during and after the Hetch Hetchy heydays.

As we proceed along the Groveland-Deer Flat Road the hills and gullies to our left conceal gold mines and shafts, some sealed off, other not. Jeep trails traverse the area. We bounced along on several in a Volkswagon adroitly and efficiently maneuvered.

The Groveland-Deer Flat Road deadends into Wards Ferry Road in about one mile. We will turn left, traveling back towards Big Oak Flat. However, we pause for a moment to consider what lies beyond a turn to the right, a trip we will probably make with you in the spring. (Four of us with four small children in two Volkswagens made the trip to Sonora via this route late in November and found the road adequately passable, breath taking to be sure.

We suggest that winter is not the ideal time to go this way).

A short side trip of a half-mile or so, however, would include a number of barns and the old Deer Flat schoolhouse. If time is not too short, a drive as far as Thiel Road and back would add enjoyment to the trip.

Just south of the intersection of Wards Ferry Road and Groveland-Deer Flat Road are the homes of the Kembles, Mudersback and Gustafsons. There are sheep grazing here and a horse wandering near the old barn. This was the Longfellow Ranch where Dearborn Longfellow raised cattle and racehorses in the late 1800's. The trees of the ranch's orchard still stand, but their productive years have passed. Longfellow, a native of Maine, married 14-year old Louisa Wootten when he was 29. They had five children, losing two to the 1879 influenza epidemic. After the death of Longfellow in 1898, the ranch passed to Lulu Longfellow Cassaretto and her husband Frank who ran the freight line from Chinese Camp to Groveland in the says of six- and ten-horse teams required to carry loads up Priest Hill, and later was proprietor of Cassaretto Store.

Southward on Wards Ferry Road is the O'Neil home, boarded up and overgrown, uninhabited. The orchard in the back yard still bears fruit, which, unpicked, has fallen to the ground. At the front corner of the house a rosebush blooms valiantly with huge rose hips and overblown pink roses.

The Corcoran-Gray road leads off to the right here, and we will take it to the end (approximately five miles round trip.) Several families live along this road and cattle graze on either side. Cattle guards contain the stock and not all ranges are fenced. We passed one young cow standing on the shoulder of the road, and when we returned along the same track she hadn't moved a muscle except her ruminating jaw, absently unresponsive to our passing.

There is a muddy yard full of growing young pigs. The barn on the far side of the pen says, appropriately, SWINE. In the yard of this small ranch is an old spring wagon, probably originally from the Gray ranch towards which we are traveling.

Soon we can see out across the valley and several mountain ranges beyond. A smoke plume reveals a distant sawmill.

The road separates at Dopple Meyer Road, and we continue along the Corcoran Gray road to the end at the Gray ranch house. From there a dirt track disappears off into the rangeland. No one lives at the ranch anymore, although farm machinery lying about the place and the water dripping into the cistern mistakenly indicate that the rancher might return at any mo-


The house is boarded up with sheets of corrugated metal and the big barn is empty. Storage buildings and the outhouse are behind the locked fence and we do not enter. The ranch has been in the continual ownership of the Gray family since the first John Gray moved there with his bride before 1875.

Now it is used only as a hunting reserve by members of the Gray family and is posted against intruders.

Heading back towards Wards Ferry Road, shortly after crossing the cattle guard, the old Corcoran ranch house and barns come into view. The house was built by John Corcoran. He and his wife

Catherine raised their family here, and two of the sons followed in the ranching tradition. One son, Daniel, left home to work at Priest Hotel when he was sixteen. In later years he married Mrs. Priest's niece, Jessie Carlaw who had come from Scotland.

Following Mrs. Priest's death in 1905, he became proprietor if Priest Hotel.

The Corcoran ranch was purchased in 1942 by Dopple Meyer, who is remembered as tramping about in high rubber boots, summer and winter. The ranch now belongs to the Otto Gislers who occupy the attractive home high on the hill to the left of the ranch buildings. Dopple Myer Road dead-ends at the old barn. Cattle graze on the hills and around the pond beside the lower barn.

As we continue on the return trip we see the snow peaks of the Sierra as our road crests here and there. When we pass the cattle shutes and the pig ranch we can see mine tailings on the left of the road.

After we pass the O'Neil house the road begins to climb back over the ridge to Big Oak Flat. When we get to the crest and begin the descent into the settlement we are surprised there are so many homes.

Wards Ferry Road turns right at the Baptist Church. At the Y we take the left

fork onto Scofield Road, which brings us to Highway 120.

We jog to the left on 120 and enter Black Street, passing the crumbling roofless brick building with the iron doors. This was originally a general merchandise store owned by Michael Nozelia but was later converted to a smithy by James Mecartea, who worked hard to fashion enough implements and ox shoes to support his family of 13 children. One of the youngest sons, Austin, continued the business in 1889 when his father died and maintained it until the automobile replaced horse-drawn vehicles.

Within one-tenth of a mile we turn left onto Harper Road. We pass several old homes and buildings, then gradually climb over the ridge to the south side into a one-time productive mining area. More than \$25 million in gold was mined in the Big Oak Flat-Groveland district in earlier years. Mines near the road we are now traveling included the Mohrman, Cline & Jackson, Bourne, Cosmopolite, Violet, Big Oak Flat No. 1 and Bicknell. We can see evidences of mine structures on our left.

On the right, shortly after passing the large Turner house and swimming pool we see the remains of a rock fireplace, only partially still standing.





Several 8x8 footings, cut off at ground level, indicate the dimensions of the home that enclosed the fireplace. Inquiry has not elicited the origin on this dwelling, only that this was Harper property and the house burned down long ago.

We are approaching Yosemite Highlands

and find ourselves on Merrill Road, named for Millard C. Merrill, Justice of the Peace of Groveland in 1925 and later Tuolumne County supervisor. We now drop down to Highway 120, passing several homes and the State Forestry Division property.

Our adventure is over.



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
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FISH & WILDLIFE

Stanislaus National Forest

The Stanislaus National Forest is home for approximately 23 fish, 13 amphibians, 17 reptiles, 76 mammals and 225 birds.

Forest Service objectives are to give special attention and protection to threatened and endangered species, and manage all wildlife habitats in a pattern that will best meet the needs of people now and in the future.

Wildlife provides an important but hardto-measure element for all outdoor nature activities. Some of wildlife's present values include hunting and fishing, nature study, birdwatching and photography.

Forest wildlife species live on 898,343 acres of national forest land on the west slopes of the central Sierra Nevada Mountains. Elevations range from 2,500 feet in the foothills to 11,000 feet on the Sierra crest, with large canyons dividing the land from east to west.

Wildlife need certain kinds of living areas to fulfill their food, water and cover requirements, and their needs will vary with time of year and stages in their life cycle (nesting, hibernation, etc.). Some species are highly restricted to certain habitats while others are successful in a wide range of conditions. Those that do not tolerate habitat changes or envi-

ronmental pollution include threatened, endangered and sensitive species.

The area's annual precipitation ranges from 30 inches in the foothills to 50 inches in the high country, so it provides a wide diversity of ecological habitat types.

Vegetation is broadly classified into five main zones, which closely follow elevations:

- 1) Foothills woodland-chaparral, up to 4,000 feet:
- 2) Yellow pine-mixed conifer 3,000 7,000 feet:
- 3) Lodgepole pine-red fir, 6,500 8,000 feet:
- 4) Sub-alpine, 7,500 10,000 feet and
- 5) Alpine, 9,500 11,000 feet.

These vegetation zones provide year-round and seasonal habitat.

A wildlife list with codes indicating their location, habitat type and abundance is available at the U.S. Forest Service station in Buck Meadows.

They can provide you with a map and legends. See how many species you can identify on your Forest outing! Several good identification guides also exist on the market to help you identify species.

Hetch Hetchy's Mountain Tunnel Shutdown

The Hetch Hetchy Mountain Tunnel will be shutdown for inspection for 10 days between February 5th and February 15th. The tunnel is Groveland Community Services District's only source of drinking water. Since GCSD only has about 12 days of water in storage, custom-

ers are asked to conserve water during the shutdown period. Signs will be posted around the community prior to and during the shutdown reminding customers to conserve and to provide status of the shutdown. If you have any questions regarding the shutdown, please call GCSD at 962-7161.
