ow that the Holidays have come and gone and a New Year is upon us, this is an ideal time to reflect on 2006. To quote Dickens "It was the best of times, it was the worst of times."

On the upside, we accomplished numerous tasks to improve our infrastructure and refurbish our amenities. We tried our best to reach out to all of the different areas

In Tennis, we resurfaced courts 3 and 4; we repaired courts 5 and 6, and installed a much needed sun awning to protect our players during the hot summer months.

In the Equestrian Center, we completed phase 1 of the fencing project, repaired the barn paddock area, rebuilt the stage and installed a new fire alarm system to more adequately safeguard our boarders and protect the property.

For the Swim Center, we repaired the concrete decking and repainted the pool itself. We also commissioned a study to develop plans for the long awaited ADA ramp that is slated to be complete in 2007.

In Golf Operations, the pro shop got new display racks; Maintenance got an infusion of much needed equipment to increase productivity and rid us of the high maintenance items. We also replaced 20 golf carts and kept them dry by redoing the cart-shed roof.

We repaired the significant termite damage in the Lake Lodge along with the replacement of the flooring in both bathrooms and the kitchen. The major effort was the replacement of the failing deck



with a new concrete structure that should outlast most of us.

For Administration, we repaired the failing rain gutters and installed new flooring on the entryway. We also patched up the parking area that was showing signs of its age.

For the infrastructure, we hired a new controller and maintenance manager. We purchased and installed an ATM system for the Country Club, and most of all, we procured and installed the new accounting system.

Looking at the downside, not all was sunshine and roses. Mother Nature slapped us upside the head with an extended rainy period in the spring and blistering heat in the peak season. These both had an impact on our revenue but we survived with a mild fall.

The bureaucracy whipsawed us on the Lake dredging permitting process by imposing the requirement to do an impact study. This caused us to miss our window for implementation and delay the project by a year and increase our cost by \$60,000.

Another disappointment was the failure to get our road maintenance contract completed and scheduled. The work for this year will be combined with the 2006 work to give us more leverage in negotiations. This work should be completed in the early spring.

Finally, legal costs continue to plague us. Our former GM and a former director filed the Lett-Kauffman lawsuit accusing the Association of malfeasance and fraud. While it is our contention and that of legal counsel that all of these charges are unfounded, we are still forced to defend ourselves. Also driving the legal costs is the Lett Arbitration that just seems to be dragging on with the meter running. Another contributor to our increasing legal fees are those residual cases that are still active but currently in legal stagnation. But as they say, with all this manure, there has

to be a pony in there somewhere.

Not wanting to end on a negative note, when weighed on the grand scale of things, it was a pretty good year. As you can see, all of our staff were busy little campers and we owe them a hearty thank you for a job well done. Without their efforts, PML would not be the wonderful place that it is. And personally, I want to wish each and every one of you a Happy and Prosperous New Year.

GENERAL MANAGER'S MESSAGE

Administration

The 2007 Annual Assessment books were mailed to all PML members, if you did not receive one or you lost yours, please contact my Administrative Assistant, Debra Durai at (209) 962-8627. Please note that the prepayment discount will only apply when the Annual Assessment is paid in full by January 31st, 2007.

Lot Merger Issue

In 2005 the Association engaged in mediation with a property owner regarding his demand that the Association allow the de-merger of his lots in a conflict with the CC&R's. At the end of 2005 the Association resolved the issue with the property owner. After the resolution of this matter, the issue of lot merging causing a reduction in the assessment base of the Association became a policy consideration by the Board.

The Board enacted a moratorium on merging and placed the issue on multiple Board meeting agendas in an effort to elicit member opinion and discussion. After multiple meetings the Board asked Association Counsel to prepare a Board resolution. The resolution was published for over thirty days for member notice and comment in accordance with California Civil Code. Notices were also posted in multiple locations in the common areas in an effort to compel member comment and attendance at Board meetings to speak on the subject.

After eight months of published notices and meetings, the draft Board resolution was brought forward for Board action at the October 21st Board meeting. Due to complaints that the meeting was not noticed properly, the Board gave members another chance to speak at the October 21st meeting and subsequently postponed Board action on this draft resolution until the November 18th Board meeting to ensure all members had an opportunity to evaluate the impact of the resolution and voice their opinion on the matter.

At the November 18th Board meeting, the Board decided to rescind the moratorium on mergers and table the draft resolution until August of 2007. At that time an advisory measure will be included on the Annual Election ballot so that PMLA members could be

surveyed to determine if there is enough member interest to prompt the Board to move forward with a change to our current merger policy.

The Board has already announced at several Board meetings that "de-mergers" which are more appropriately referred to as minor subdivisions will not be considered in the future. The number of lots that the County would consider for a minor subdivision are negligible and the legal ramifications could be significant to PML. As a result of lengthy review, advice of Counsel and consideration, the Board decided to terminate any further effort to change this policy.

Department of Safety

On December 7th PML Director of Safety, John Edner and PML Safety Officer Bonnie Langfeldt joined Tuolumne County employees for a disaster training program. The program, known as the National Incident Management System was held by the Tuolumne County's Office of Emergency Services and will benefit PML residents in the event there is an emergency. This type of training is part of our on-going efforts to support the County in providing Public Safety services for our members. We would like to thank Steve Boyack, Tuolumne County's Emergency Services Coordinator for working with us and we look forward to better communication and agency response in the event there is an emergency in our area. I would also like to thank John and Bonnie for taking the time to participate in this critical training.

Golf Course Rating

Once again the Pine Mountain Lake Golf Course has received a 4.5 star rating out of 5 for the Golf Digest – Places to Play. This rating is based on reader comments to Golf Digest. This year's Best Places to Play rated more than 4000 courses in North America and the Islands. The courses were evaluated by approximately 20,000 Golf Digest readers. As always the courses were rated on the overall golf experience, value for the money, standard of service, conditioning of the course and normal pace of play for 18 holes. Special thanks and recognition go to PML Head Golf Professional, Chris Borrego and his staff and Golf Course Superintendent, Alan MacDonald and his staff for their combined efforts operating and maintaining our championship facility.

Unit and Lot Identification Signs

In 2004 in response to requests by local emergency response agencies, the Board of Directors enacted a resolution that requires all members to post a sign that identified the members Unit, Lot and Street address. Lots without an assigned

address were only required to post the Unit and Lot designation. Members are encouraged to post the appropriate identification signs on their lots. Our staff continues to inspect lots and we will be sending out letters to owners that have not complied. Help your emergency services by posting your signs.

Burning in PML

We ask that all members utilize the Compost Area near the PML Campgrounds to dispose of limbs, leaves, brush and clippings. Household garbage, stumps and construction debris are not permitted. For those that choose to burn please be polite to your neighbors and make sure that you do not burn green or wet vegetation. We have received complaints of smoke caused by the burning of wet leaves. It is also important that you monitor the fire and not leave it unattended.

If you have any questions, feel free to call our Fire Safety Coordinator, Larry Wooduff at (209) 962-8616. It is also important to check with the Department of Safety to determine if it is a permissible burn day. The Department of Safety checks with the County Air Quality Control Department every day and will be happy to give you the information. You can reach them at (209) 962-8615.

Some of you have a barometer and a few will get one for Christmas—and wonder why it doesn't agree with the weather guy. Do what he did, set it to sea level—29.92 in. Hg. on a nice average day (or to his reading on a normal day).

Actually the true pressure is about 1-in. Hg. lower for each 1,000 ft of altitude.* My garage floor is at the 2800 foot contour line, which means the true pressure is about 27 1/8 in. Hg., or 13.3 Psi. That 747 at 33,000 feet has only 3.8 Psi. Makes you short of breath!




Easing some of the difficulties involved in being a full-time poker player is one of the goals of the World Poker Association, a Las Vegas-based group.

Golf rules auiz

(answers at the bottom of article)

- 1. Q. May a player play a left handed stroke with the back of a head of a right handed club?
- 2 Q. A player playing in the rain holds an umbrella over his head with one hand while holing a very short putt, gripping the club with the other hand. Is this permissible?

Answers to golf rules quiz:

- 1. Yes. A player may play a stroke with any part of the clubhead, provided the ball is fairly struck at and the club conforms with rule 4-1.
- 2. Yes. Rule 14-2 prohibits a player while making a stroke, from accepting protection from the elements from someone other than himself. The rule does not prohibit him from protecting himself.



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

Q. What is Assisted Living?

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Common Questions about Social Security and Medicare

To build a secure retirement, you will likely take advantage of multiple building blocks to establish your overall plan. Two of the important pieces people most often take advantage of are Social Security and Medicare. Unfortunately, while many will eventually rely on these programs to assist in their retirement funding, relatively few have a good understanding of how these programs work. Following are the answers to a few commonly asked questions, to help educate you a little more on the subject. We'll also provide you with sources you can turn to for more information about these programs.

Q: What is the minimum age for Social Security retirement benefits?

A: You can begin receiving "early" Social Security retirement benefits at age 62. However, if you retire at 62, your monthly benefits will be permanently reduced. Under the current system, which includes varying rates based upon your birth year, that reduction starts at 20 percent for those born in 1937 or before and climbs to as high as 30 percent for those born in 1960 or later. In addition, the full-retirement age - the age when you can claim your full benefits – is actually increasing. Previously, retirees who waited until age 65 to apply would receive full benefits. Now, however, the full-retirement age is gradually increasing to age 67. Your fullretirement age is a combination of years and months, and again depends on the year of your birth.

Q: How much can I work and still receive my Social Security benefits?

A: No matter how much you earn from your job, you can receive all of

your benefits, provided you are fullretirement age or older. However, if you're younger than full-retirement age, you must limit your on-the-job earnings to avoid losing benefits. The earnings limit for most workers is \$12,480 in 2006. If you exceed the limit, \$1 will be withheld from your benefits for every \$2 earned in excess of the limit. Keep in mind, only employment earnings count against the limit. Pensions, interest, dividends, capital gains and other investment income do not count nor does money distributed from IRAs or from 401(k), 403(b) or other deferred-compensation plans.

Q: When can I qualify for Medicare?

A: Medicare coverage does not begin until age 65 for most individuals, even if they start receiving Social Security benefits at age 62. Three groups that can receive Medicare coverage before age 65 include: people who receive Social Security disability benefits because they have amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (Lou Gehrig's disease); other disabled people who have received Social Security disability benefits for at least two years; and patients of all ages who need kidney dialysis or a kidney transplant because of end-stage renal failure.

Q: What does Medicare cover?

A: Medicare consists of Hospital Insurance (Part A), Medical Insurance (Part B) and Medicare Prescription Drug Coverage (Part D). More specifically, Part A helps pay for inpatient hospital care, hospice care and skilled home health services for homebound patients. It also helps with short-term inpatient

care in Medicare-certified skilled nursing facilities if the patient is there for rehabilitation. Part B helps pay for doctors' services, outpatient hospital care, and some medical equipment and supplies.

While these are just a few of the many questions you may have about Social Security and Medicare, the idea is to get you thinking about how these programs will fit into your retirement plan. Remember, these certainly won't be able to cover all your retirement expenses but they can be an important part of your overall strategy. 

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

Working toward Better Healthcare on the Hill

ivable Communities is one of five goals identified by the Northern Yosemite Corridor Partners, Inc., derived from the Community Visioning Town Meeting of January 15th, 2005. Improved healthcare is an important component of Livable Communities and update on the formation of a rural Health Advisory Council is this month's focus.

The formation of the Rural Health Advisory Council, one of the projects sponsored by Northern Yosemite Corridor Partners, Inc., is currently underway in our community.

Better healthcare has been a consistent focus and request according to several locally conducted research efforts in the Groveland area. An initial survey by GAINs in 2001 showed an interest on better healthcare. Five focus groups and a Community Visioning meeting conducted by Southside Senior Services, Inc. dba The Gathering Place in 2002, showed citizen concern for healthcare along many dimensions, including, for example, access on evenings and weekends. A more recent survey by GAINs, in 2004, again showed many areas in which residents identified unmet healthcare needs. The Community Visions meeting of January 2005, which resulted in the formation of NYCPI, also identified many dimensions of their desire for improved healthcare. The Groveland Citizens' survey in 2006 identified the need for 24-hour emergency medical care as their top concern. Taken together, these concerns have been addressed by the Strategic Plan Committee for Rural Healthcare in the Greater Groveland area. The first organization to take the baton in addressing healthcare needs was GAINs, who then passed the baton to the Strategic Plan Committee. The Strategic Plan Committee will then pass the baton to the Health Advisory Council as soon as it is firmly established. The Final Report of the Strategic Plan Committee, "Meeting the Healthcare Needs of the Greater Groveland Area," can be viewed at the gcsd.org website. It contains the history of the effort, its mission and visions to improve healthcare in our area, as well as recommendations for future action. Its

mission is: "To create and maintain a locally determined collaborative alliance for comprehensive, high-quality healthcare and health education, supplemented with acts of kindness, for people of all ages and incomes, in the rural mountain communities of southern Tuolumne and northern Mariposa counties." Its visions are primarily based on Patient-Centered Care.

One of its recommendations was the formation of a Health Advisory Council consisting primarily of local health professionals who will continue dialogue with the senior management teams of 3 major hospitals serving our area: Sonora Regional Medical Center, Tuolumne General Hospital, and John C. Fremont Hospital. The first meeting of the senior management teams and the Strategic Plan Committee was conducted in Groveland in January 2006. Its focus was to find collaborative, winning solutions to better meet the healthcare needs in our communities on the hill. The Strategic Plan Committee conducted another meeting in March 2006 in Sonora. Strategic Plan Committee members have also met individually with the 3 hospitals' senior teams to share and discuss its Final Report.

The recommendation for the formation of the Groveland area's rural Health Advisory Council was taken on as one of the Livable Communities projects by NYCPI. Four meetings have taken place with new Council members to further define the work of the rural Health Advisory Council. Later will come the formation of a Consortium of service organizations who, among other roles, can identify ongoing and emerging health needs to the Council.

The next meeting between the 3 hospitals' senior management teams and our local representatives on the Strategic Plan Committee and the new members of the Health Advisory Council will take place in Groveland on January 19th, 2007. We will be introducing new Health Advisory Council members, and will be engaging in further creative thinking on meeting the healthcare needs of our area. 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

Think Twice Before Cashing Out Your Retirement Savings

ot that long ago, a good number of workers in this country would spend an entire career with one employer, and retire with a company pension plan. In many respects, that scenario is a thing of the past. Not only are traditional pension plans disappearing, chances are you may end up changing careers – not just jobs – at least once or twice before you're ready to retire.

When you switch jobs, one of the most important financial decisions you may be faced with is what to do with the money in your company 401(k) plan. While it may be tempting to withdraw that money and use it to cover other expenses, doing so could have very detrimental effects on your overall finances. Unfortunately, studies have shown that nearly half of workers do cash out of their 401(k) plans when they leave a job. 1

In addition to depriving yourself of valuable retirement savings, early cashouts can subject you to hefty state and federal income taxes. You may also face an early withdrawal penalty of ten percent, reducing the value of your hard-earned savings even more. So, if you find yourself in the position of changing jobs, you may be wondering what your options are for your retirement plan funds.

Generally, you have four alternatives for handling the assets in your former employer's retirement plan. Your options include: rolling them into an IRA; taking a cash distribution; leaving the assets in the plan; or moving them to a new employer's plan. We'll take a brief look at each of these strategies.

If you're changing jobs or retiring, your best bet is usually to roll your 401(k) assets over into an IRA. By doing so, you retain the tax-deferred growth potential of your investments. What's more, you can maintain all of your IRAs in the same place, making it easier to manage your retirement assets and analyze your overall asset allocation.

An IRA also offers the additional ben-

efit of giving you access to your money when you need it.* For example, if you lose a job due to downsizing or some other reason, you might not be able to draw an income stream from retirement plan assets left with a former employer. With an IRA, you have the flexibility to determine how much income you need, and you can take withdrawals when you want (taxes and IRS penalties may apply).

Cashing out should generally be considered a last resort. If you withdraw all your funds each time you change jobs, you'll systematically erode one of your principal sources of retirement income. To illustrate, with lump sum distribution, on top of income taxes and IRS penalties you may be subject to, your employer will also be required to withhold 20 percent of the taxable amount of your distribution and send it to the IRS as a prepayment of the taxes that will be due. As you can see, cashing out is not the most desirable option.

Leaving your assets in your former employer's plan may be an option that's available to you, but doing so could create complexities in managing your investments. Keep in mind you will be limited to the plan's investment alternatives, and your employer will also control when and how you access your retirement savings in the future. Leaving the assets where they are requires no action on your part, but it may not be worth the potential hassles it could create.

Finally, you may be able to move your retirement plan savings into a new employer's plan when you change jobs. However, doing so may involve many of the same benefits and drawbacks of leaving your money in a former employer's retirement plan. You'll need to make sure your new employer's plan permits transfers or rollovers from other types of plans before you decide to go that route.

Tuolumne County Residents Encouraged To Recycle Christmas Trees

uolumne County's Solid Waste Division is encouraging Tuolumne County residents to once again plan on recycling their Christmas trees. Christmas trees can be chipped, shredded and used as: mulch for water conservation and weed control; erosion and lor dust control on hiking trails and bridle paths; additives in composting operations; and alternative fuel in co-generation or biomass plants.

Reminders for Tuolumne County residents:

- · Christmas trees become a fire hazard when kept too long.
- Burning Christmas trees in the fireplace is extremely dangerous.
- Burning trees in the open creates air pollution.
- · Recycled trees have many beneficial

Christmas trees should NOT be mixed with other trash for disposal or recycling. Residents may wish to chip their Christmas trees and use them at home as mulch or compost or take advantage of one of the following opportunities to recycle Christmas



rations, tinsel, metal tree stands and nails. Also, some trees may have a metal supporting rod in the trunk that must be removed. Please do not bring any Christmas wrapping paper or trash.

Big Oak Flat/Groveland Transfer Station at the end of Merrell Road will accept clean cut and bundled trees AT NO CHARGE. The minimum gate fee of \$14.70 will be charged for any flocked trees. Drop off during regular business hours, 8:00 am to 3:45 pm, Wednesday and Saturday only, through the month of January.

Cal Sierra Earth Resource Facility (ERF) on Camage Avenue, off of Tuolumne Road, near Standard will accept clean, whole trees AT NO CHARGE during regular business hours, 9:00 am to 4:00 pm, closed 12:00 pm - 1:00 pm, Tuesday thru Saturday, through the month of January. NO FLOCKED TREES.

Cal Sierra Material Recovery Facility Transfer Station (MRF) on Industrial Drive in East Sonora will accept ONLY FLOCKED TREES AT NO CHARGE during regular business hours, 8:00 am to 4:45 pm, seven days a week, through the month of January. Closed New Years Day. MRF does charge the regular \$12.60 for all other trees as they can be recycled at the ERF.

CURBSIDE COLLECTION

Local solid waste collection companies will provide limited curbside collection of Christmas trees in their respective collection areas along their regular collection routes. They ask that the trees:

Be cut 4 feet or less in length Bundled and tied Weigh a total of 60 pounds or less

Burns Refuse Service will pick up trees in their collection area including East Sonora, Tuolumne and Standard beginning Monday, January 8, through Friday, January 12,2007 on regular trash collection days. NO FLOCKED TREES.

Cal Sierra Disposal will pick up trees in its collection area, including Columbia, Sonora, Jamestown and Highway 108 corridor (Twain Harte, Pinecrest) areas beginning Tuesday, January 2, through Wednesday, January 31, 2007. NO FLOCKED TREES.

Moore Bros Scavenger will pick up trees in their collection area one day only on Thursday, January 11, 2007. NO

Leonardo Da Vinci

eonardo Da Vinci was born in the renaissance, in April 1452. Leonardo was born in a farmhouse in Anchiano, 3 km away from Vinci. The family of Leonardo "Ser Piero" was 25 when Leonardo was born in 1452. The actual mother of Leonardo is named Catarina. He didn't marry this woman until later because she was a farmers daughter, and was not wealthy or in Ser Piero's prospective worthy. Leonardo was christened from the parson Piero Da Bartolomeo to the name Lionardo and not Leonardo. With the age of 14 Leonardo moved to Florence where he began an apprenticeship in the workshop of Verrocchio. Leonardo developed his skills from an artist by the name of Verrocchio, a very famous and well-known artist at this time. Leonardo's first ink and lead drawing was later called "The Perspective of Disappearance". This drawing was depicted from a river named "Arno". His next drawing was a drawing of an angel. This drawing surpassed his teacher. Leonardo had his own workshop between 1476 and 1478. In this

time period he drew a picture that amazed all with the name "Baptism Of Christ", another picture of an angel. Something different or out of the ordinary happened on April 8, 1476. An anonymous man accused Leonardo of having a homosexual affair with Jacopo Saltarelli, who was a model. This eventually led to the homosexuality of Leonardo Da Vinci. King Francis invited Leonardo to spend the last span of his life in Amboise at the court of France. In the autumn of 1516 Leonardo Da Vinci arrived in Amboise. In his bag was the most famous painting yet the "Mono Lisa". To this day the "Mono Lisa" is still one of the most famous pictures ever painted. Leonardo never drew or painted in France, but made hydrological studies of what he wanted to present. Leonardo died May 2, 1519. At this time Leonardo was 67 years of age. Leonardo had a paralysis on the right side of his body since 1517 and Vasari told about an illness a few weeks before Leonardo died. On April 23, 1519, Leonardo wrote his last will.

1/4 cup all-fruit seedless raspberry spread

1/2 teaspoon balsamic vindgar

1/8 teaspoon ground cinnamon

1/8 teaspoon crushed red pepper flakes

4 oz. fat-free or light cream cheese

24 fat-free or low-fat, low-sodium crackers or 3 medium red apples or red-skinned pears, each cut into 8 slices.

In a small mirowaveable bowl, stir together first 4 ingredients. Microwave on high for 15 seconds or until melted. Stir and cool completely.

Put cream cheese on a plate. Spoon the raspberry mixture on top. Serve with crackers or fruit.

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Keeping Things Humming

If you are a hummingbird lover, please take note that hummingbirds migrate from this area in early October. If you have a hummingbird feeder, it should remain outside for the birds through this winter, however next October they should be removed. The reasoning for this is due to lack of natural food which the birds need to survive – the sugar water mixture is fine for a supplemental, but in the winter time with the lack of natural food, the birds resistance can break down easily leaving the hummingbirds wide open for diseases.

During the summer months the feeder should be changed every week; during the winter months every two weeks. For best results, place the feeder in a partially shaded area since direct sunlight will cause discoloration and stagnation of the sugar water mixture.

Hummingbirds are interesting creatures with over 750 species in their family. They have brilliant plumage with a metallic sheen, long, slender and sometimes-curved beaks. Their legs are stiff and straight with no movable joints. Their feet do have a clasping ability for support on branches and bushes. Capable of flying both vertically and diagonally, this small creature is often referred to as a helicopter.

Mother Lode Memories

his next series of articles by Jean McClish is a very interesting and informative group entitled "Wandering Along Highway 120." The articles began with the December 1974 issue of the PML News and ran for quite a few months. When reading these articles, please keep in mind they were written in 1974-75. Businesses change hands, some close, and some of the information has changed. We will present the articles as they were written.

Several years ago the new Highway 120 bypassed a section of old Highway 120. It's now called Old Highway 120 Road, which is found just past Tenaya Grammar School on the right. This is where you will find "Hangman's Tree."

Did you know?

The Groveland Jail located on Ponderosa Lane, contains two jail cells.

The structure has a rock pier and post foundation, "V" groove siding and a simple gable roof. Without research it's impossible to give an exact date for the construction of this building. It was not on the 1877 Groveland townsite map but does appear on the "Common Lands" locations map of 1903.

Because of the materials used and the fact that Groveland was experiencing a population increase at the turn of the century, (due to the hard rock mining boom), it is assumed that the jail was constructed some time between 1895 and 1903.



WANDERING ALONG HIGHWAY 120 By Jean McClish

Turn south from the Big Oak Flat Road just east of the 3,000-foot elevation signpost between Big Oak Flat and Groveland.

The road wanders several hundred yards to a rock-pillared gate, which stands open.

This is the Oak Grove Cemetery, resting place for inhabitants of Groveland and Big Oak Flat and surrounding area since the 1880's. Generations of local families lay here - Reid, Gray, Scofield. Familiar names of bygone years - Mueller, Tannahill. Priest, mark marble or granite headstones.



Some of the earliest marble slabs lean into the years, the carved legend difficult to decipher.

Poignant moments in the life of a family is revealed - carved forever in marble epitaph:

CHARLES L. HARPER Died Jan 23, 1891 Aged 68 years

Loved one we have laid thee in the quiet graves embrace.

Thy memory will be cherished until we see thy heavenly face.

Four Drew children who died in the 1879 diphtheria epidemic lie together, the obelisk gravestone reading: Earth counts 4 mortals 1's Heaven 4 angels more

Ornate wrought iron fences surround graves of generations of a family.

Others are bound together by cement curbings. An occasional single grave is outlined by a wrought iron or a wooden post fence. Some are marked by quartz or their rock, head and foot - no headstone to tell the passerby who lies here.

The remote grounds are oak studded. The crunch of acorns underfoot and the shuffling of oak leaves as one passes from grave to grave break the quiet dignity and the birds scold.

Memorial Drive was named Graveyard Road for a time. The residents objected to that designation. The road had been referred to simply as "the cemetery road" for many years and no signpost marked the turnoff - everyone knew where the cemetery was.

Back towards Big Oak Flat and on the opposite side of Highway 120 is the Catholic cemetery flanking the hill in front of Mt. Carmel Church. We will visit here another day.

The Big Oak flat Road (Highway 120) from Pine Mountain Lake to Yosemite traverses scenic countryside. Vistas range from quaint to spectacular.

It passes landmarks of the southern mines of the Mother Lode and the ranches, mills, and hostelries of Tuolumne County's earlier days.

The drive from Groveland to the Big Oak Flat Entrance to Yosemite National Park is twenty-six miles and can be made in little more than half an hour.

If getting to Yosemite is the traveler's only goal, then God's speed.

However, a leisurely investigative trip can fill pleasurable hours. It is those who ride with a spirit of adventure that we set forth the following:

Leaving Groveland, the road quickly passes the Tenaya School and in less than two miles comes to the site of Second Garrotte, (Old Hwy 120 Road) marked by a plaque reading, "Sizeable settlement established at this rich placer location in 1849 by miners spreading eastward from Big Oak Flat and Groveland....". At this location only ashes remain where once notorious Hangman's Tree stood.

Nearby is the Bret Harte cabin, a house within a house, reasonable preserved but seldom visited in its out-of-the-way seclusion.

The gold mines of Second Garrotte, the eastern most along the Big Oak Flat Road, were not as prosperous as those in many other areas, but the settlement was the home for a small community of settlers for many years with almost none remaining today. There had been homes, gardens, a flour mill, store, barns and in the earliest lusty days, the inevitable fandango houses.

Eastward, the road climbs abruptly for a mile or so and emerges into a wider valley. On the left is the Sugar Pine Ranch. The first settler here built a cabin in 1860's. The present white house was built shortly after the turn of the century. In 1946 the Wesley Osborne's bought the property, added cabins and operated a ranch-motel. They run the motel to this day, but no longer serve the meals for which they enjoyed a wide reputation for excellence

A mile further is the first turn off to Shanahan Flat and Hells Hollow

Less than a dozen families live along this intriguing byway. A second turn off in two miles is a more direct route, and is the one recommended for an easier investigation.

Smith Station, just ahead, was a change station for horses pulling the stage and freight wagons and a stopping place for passengers and drivers.

John B. Smith came to California from Maine in 1854 and homesteaded the meadow, first known as Sprague's Ranch. Smith provided overnight lodgings for stage passengers and hostlers and served meals, family style, which included venison or mountain trout or beef which Smith butchered himself.

Vegetables came from the garden planted beside the two-story house. Meals cost 25 cents and a bed could be had for 75 cents to \$1.00.

The first tollgate of the Big Oak Flat Road Company was temporarily located here.

Smith Station Road turns south, heading toward Wagner Valley and connecting with other roads going to Greeley Hill, Coulterville or Bower Cave.

Continuing along the Big Oak Flat Road, Casa Loma passes by on the left near where Ferretti Road joins the highway. The Groveland Ranger Station is next, and then the road passes into Mariposa County for several miles.

Within this Mariposa County stretch the road reaches Buck Meadows.

Turning off here to the right, a narrow road wanders back to the old cabins and an operating sand and gravel quarry.

In the early days Buck Meadows was known as Hamilton's. Alva Hamilton and his wife, Johannah, built their farmhouse here and ran a hotel for travelers. It was a favorite stopping place for cattlemen herding cattle up country to pasture or back down again. The Hamilton's remained open all year around, although there was little business in the winter.

They farmed here, raising their own beef and pork. They planted orchards of apples, peaches and Bartlett pears, which thrived, protected from the wind. In the valley over the hill they grew again.

On the other side of the highway beyond Buck Meadows is Yosemite Meadows, offering gasoline, groceries, and a bar and restaurant serving Italian food all year around.

Rim of the World Vista Point is ahead with a splendid panoramic view of Jawbone Ridge and the Tuolumne River Canyon.

Two miles further is the bridge crossing the South Fork of the Tuolumne

River. Until 1870 the crossing here was made over logs felled across the river. The Big Oak Flat-Yosemite Road Company built a covered bridge and this became the toll gate sometime after 1894. John Cox, the toll collector, built his cabin on a rock overlooking the pool. The Cliff House later occupied this site.

A road turns off at the near end of the bridge and leads to a waterfall and Rainbow Pool. This is an excellent picnic and swimming spot. The old road continues past the pool, crosses lower bridge and rejoins Highway 120 several hundred yards to the east.

Almost immediately a road turns off to the left to San Jose Camp. The roof tops can be seen from the highway. The road leads to Early Intake and Cherry Lake and is the long way to Mather

Within five miles there is a turn off to Hardin Flat leading to Yosemite Lakes and Berkeley Camp. The road is a section of Old Big Oak Flat Road

Yosemite Lakes is a private picnic and camping park with accommodations for over 300 vacationers. There is trout fishing in the lake, a swimming beach and playground. The old Harry Guinn Bridge, now closed to vehicles, crosses the river into Ponderosa Campground.

The old road continues onto the Berkeley Camp. Another connects with Highway 120.

Hardin Flat was the site of James Hardin's sawmill. Hardin's was a stopping place for tourists, and for a time was as far as travelers could go by stage. The rest of the trip into the Yosemite Valley was accomplished on horseback down precarious zig-zag trails. In 1855 a traveler could ride by stage from Chinese Camp to Hardin's for \$13.00 with no extra charge for the horseback trip to the valley.

The present highway to Yosemite bypasses Crocker Station, once one of the most important stopping places for stages, and later for horseless carriages, on the Big Oak Flat Road. Henry

Crocker and his wife Ellen served family style meals on tables with white cloths and featured roasts of venison or mutton or beef, trout or chicken. There were fifteen buildings: a hotel, cottages and housekeeping cabins made out of logs, finished inside with lumber.

The Big Oak Flat Entrance to Yosemite Park is five miles from Yosemite

Lakes.

The road began as a trail to the mines in 1849 and became a full-fledged

highway in 1874 when it was opened all the way to the valley floor.

The advent of the automobile in the Park in 1913 signaled the beginning of

the end of the stage stations. They played a vital role in the early

days, and they lived until they died. *

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Earthfill Dam

hose Pine Mountain Lakers who are interested in the history, present, and future of Pine Mountain Lake will find this bit of information interesting since it contains the nucleus of Pine Mountain Lake itself, THE DAM.

The Pine Mountain Lake Dam is a homogeneous earth filled dam with an

internal granular chimney drain, down stream drainage system and clay core.

The dam has a reinforced concrete spillway. The height of the dam is 120 feet; the crest width of the dam is 555 feet. It has the capacity to release 28,000 cubic feet of water per second.

The Pine Mountain Lake Dam is under

the jurisdiction of the Division of Safety of Dams and the Department of Water Resources in the State of California.

Construction of the Dam cost in excess of \$1.8 million. On November 20, 1969 the dam was completed. Water began to run over the spillway on March 1, 1970.





I LOOK TO THE FUTURE BECAUSE...

...that's where I'm going to spend the rest of my life (George Burns). And so we did, about 60 of us, look to the future of our Tuolumne County Library system. On November 30th, the meeting room at the Sonora library bulged and bustled with library stakeholders: Friends, library staff, community and county leaders, students and school faculty representatives. Connie Corcoran, County Librarian, convened and steered us, while international consultant, Ray Rood, set the stage for the day's work. Actually, it felt more like...well...serious play. You see, we were to be inventive, creative, free to envision grandly what our ideal library would look like, feel like and what services would be in place in the year 2020. And further we were to treat our vision as fact, reality, not merely as hope. Tables of working groups began somewhat timidly (after all, we aren't often granted this much fanciful freedom), but soon the room buzzed with chatter and rang out with an occasional whoop or explosion of laughter. The day progressed through several versions of envisioning tasks, priority settings, decision activities - all culminating in the crafting of a vision statement. The charge was to look for common ground among the variety of participants present.

Amazingly, when the groups presented their ideas, we found we were, on the whole, saying the same things. We looked around the room in awe at each other, smiling and nodding in recognition of our shared vision. At that moment, excitement and enthusiasm were palpable in the room.

What was this common vision we all generated? Unpredictably, technology (although certainly recognized and provided for) was not the main thrust of our visionary ideal. Rather, we all saw a change in our image: we became, not just a library, but a community center, a hub of activity for all ages in our communities. One group even suggested renaming it the "Community Engagement Center". This center would be, first of all, comfortable and inviting: couches, comfy chairs, lamps; would include a coffee and food cafe; reading, study, technology, research, literacy and group activitity areas; community meeting rooms; arts and culture venues, and outdoor spaces. Outreach to the community would be key: full integration with the schools; increased mobile library units, complete with computer check-out; partnering with youth and senior centers, hospitals and businesses. Cool, huh?

Oh sure, we know the hard work is ahead, but the "who wants to help" list, posted by Connie at the end of the day, was filling up when I signed my name and floated out the door on a cloud of optimism.

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

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The High Cost to Process Sewage

kay, this is another one of those articles that isn't very glamorous, except, perhaps to a few odd engineers and treatment plant operators. But, it is a subject that each of you has at best wondered about and at worst railed about because of the high cost of sewage collection, treatment and disposal.

Granted, most of us don't think twice about turning on the faucet and letting water run down the drain. I suppose this is a case of "out of sight, out of mind." That is, until you open your GCSD utility bill and see what might be considered to be high rates. But, these costs are the result of a fairly complex process that ultimately sends your sewage to an environmentally benign resting place.

Collecting, treating and disposing of wastewater is a process that is the reverse of getting the water to your tap, except that the process is far more complex. And, as a result, it is more costly. And, new regulations are driving the cost of this already expensive process even higher.

Let's review the technical process that takes wastewater from your home and delivers it ultimately to a disposal point. First, wastewater flows from your home to a collector pipeline that is usually located downhill from your home, either in the street in front of your home or along your back property line. It continues to flow until it hits a topographic low point, at which time it is pumped uphill using a sewage lift station (we have 16 lift stations in our system). We are in the process of upgrading our lift stations so that they meet state regulations. This is a \$4 million set of projects that must be paid for by our 1,485 sewer customers (do the math and you will realize what the impact is on your monthly bill).

The collection system must be maintained on a regular basis, a process that is stipulated by state and federal law. To maintain our sewage collection system requires operators who are state certified. To reach a certification grade level 3 takes several years of experience.

Next, after flowing through up to 35 miles of sewer pipeline (which also must be maintained), the sewage reaches the treatment plant located at GCSD's administrative offices. Here, the sewage goes through a biological process that is overseen by certified wastewater treatment operators. Like the collection system operators, the treatment operators must pass a series of tests and have progressively more years of experience as they

climb through the certification levels. Our system requires grade 3 certification by at least some of our operators. Grade 3 operators are not common and therefore command high salaries.

The treatment process results in reclaimed wastewater that is treated to a "secondary" level. Our secondary treated wastewater can only be disposed of in a limited number of ways. In our case, we dispose of our reclaimed water on spray fields located on District property near the Evangelical Free Church and Leon Rose Ball Field. We also dispose of our wastewater on the Pine Mountain Lake Golf Course. The golf course irrigation water is a blend of about 20 percent reclaimed wastewater and 80 percent lake water.

We are fully expecting the California Regional Water Quality Control Board to make the District upgrade our process to "tertiary" treatment, which adds a final polishing filtration and disinfection process. Tertiary treated wastewater will meet drinking water standards. However, we would dispose of this higher grade wastewater in the same way as we dispose of our current reclaimed wastewater. This upgrade could cost several million dollars, which again is the responsibility of our customers to pay without much hope of subsidy from state or federal grants.

Regulations governing the collection, treatment and disposal of wastewater have changed dramatically over the past 10 years. In the "old days," we could get by using an un-certified workforce. Today, our workforce must be certified for both sewage collection and sewage treatment. Our collection system must meet much higher construction and operating standards. For example, the system must be more fully automated to guard against accidental spills. Today, regulators have zero tolerance for sewage spills, unlike the old days when we could occasionally spill sewage during a rain storm or power outage without too many repercussions.

What does all this mean to our customers: significantly higher sewer rates. And, they will grow higher as we sell bonds to pay for the system upgrades required by state and federal regulations. Some people think we can "opt out" of complying with these regulations. The short answer is we can't. And, those same state and federal regulators don't give us any money to comply with the regulations.

I suppose the good news, if you can



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call it good, is that our rates are much lower than some sewer districts in the state, which have rates that are approaching \$150 to \$200 per month per customer. GCSD is doing everything it can to moderate our rates while meeting regulatory requirements, including upgraded systems and maintaining a qualified (certified) workforce.

The District is conducting water and sewer rate studies now and will be holding public hearings in the near future to review our rate structures. We invite you to attend and be part of the process that establishes of th the rates that are appropriate for our water and sewage systems.
