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

Lake Lodge Deck

The new Lake Lodge Deck replacement project is complete and the deck is ready for use. Our Maintenance crew did a great job and put the final touches on it with a new shade canopy and fresh paint job on the hand-crafted rails. They also re-routed the drainage underground near the Playground and landscaped the area to help keep our kids safe.

Marina Store and Grill

The Marina Store and Grill had a decent Memorial Day Holiday but we did not get the crowds we usually anticipate due to the unusually cool weather. The Marina Grill soft-serve ice cream machine has been down for about three weeks. We scrambled to get it repaired and back online. We found out the machine was unrepairable and the Board made the decision to immediately purchase a new machine. The new machine was ordered quickly, delivered and installed and ready for business.

Saturday, July 1st Holiday Marina Parking and Shuttles

Unfortunately every year we are forced to tow vehicles parked in marked tow away zones. It is costly to the owner and it is an unpleasant ending to a fabulous day at the Marina. To keep the tow zones clear we offer a FREE Marina Shuttle Bus with pick up from three locations. Parking will

be available at the PMLA Administration Office parking lot. Once filled, the next lot parking will be available at the Evangelical Free Church, then at Tioga High School. The shuttle busses will run 4 PM – 8PM. After the Fireworks they will return you to your vehicle.

PLEASE NOTE: PML streets are governed by the California Vehicle Code and the Vehicle Codes are enforced by our local Law Enforcement (CHP and Tuolumne County Sheriff's Department). If there is a vehicle illegally parked in the road, it will be towed. The authority code is SEC. 22651 (k) CVC. The CHP will be enforcing this as well as all Vehicle Codes.

Department of Safety

We continue to receive complaints from members that the property next to our entrance and fountain has become a "car lot" or "flea market" with all the boats, R.V.'s, cars, trucks, fruit stands and wood for sale. These complaints were made directly to PMLA and Tuolumne County. The County is taking action and the County Code Compliance Officer will be making periodic inspections of the area and citing the individuals responsible as appropriate. In an effort to assist the County, our Department of Safety will also monitor the area and turn in violations as needed.



Response to Kathy Miller by the PMLA Board of Directors

Due to the inaccuracies in Ms. Miller's letter, we feel in necessary to respond.

ur management team and the Board all responded to Ms. Miller's calls and numerous emails in a timely manner. In an effort to assist Ms. Miller with her proposal, management took the time to meet with her on their scheduled days off and responded to her calls after office hours and on the weekends. She was also given the opportunity to give input and present ideas on the budget just like every other member. She chose instead to wait until the budget was already presented, approved and mailed to all of the membership before demanding that a Kids Camp program be implemented. At her request, we published her survey in an effort to gauge property owner interest. The survey was also handed out at all of the amenities and posted on all bulletin boards and the website. Out of 3,795 lots, we only received 29 responses and not all of the survey responses were positive. We gave Ms. Miller multiple opportunities to present her proposal at an open Board meeting and it was not until May 20th that she chose to do so. As a Board, we gave careful consideration to her proposal and sent it to our insurance broker for review. Our broker had some concerns with some of the proposed activities and we were concerned that the revenue projection was based on outside revenue from non-members in Groveland and Big Oak Flat. We

felt it was inappropriate for members to foot the bill for outsiders to use our amenities.

It appears by Ms. Miller's letter that she believes the Board and Association Management do not make children a priority or provide fun activities for kids. We strongly disagree and would like to point out the following programs and activities: Little Wrangler Camp, Guided Horse Trail Rides, Kids Fishing Days, Kids Fishing Derby, Swimming Lessons, Sand Castle Contest, Marina Family Fun and Games, special kids rates for Marina Water Taxi rides, Main Marina, Dunn Court and Lake Lodge Swimming areas and swim docks, Pool Socials, Junior Golf Clinics and lessons, Special Tennis Rates for members' kids, hiking trails, Camping, Lake Lodge Playground and Picnic area, Fisherman's Cove Playground and Picnic area. Even with all of these great programs and activities, we feel we can do more and plan to put together a new PMLA Kids Camp Program for the 2007 summer season. Look for it in future issues of the PML News in 2007.

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



No Burn Rule!



HOME TIPS by June Dee

BITE BACK! ENJOY YOUR DECK MORNING, NOON & NIGHT BY CONTROLING MOSQUITOS

- Dispose of discarded tires, cans, plastic containers, ceramic pots or other unused similar water-holding containers that have accumulated on your property. Do not overlook containers that have become overgrown by vegetation.
- Empty standing water from containers on your property, such as tire swings, or bird baths.
- Fill in tree rot holes and hollow stumps that hold water.
- Drill holes in the bottom of recycling containers that are left outdoors. Drainage holes drilled in the sides of containers allow sufficient water to collect in which mosquitoes may breed.
- Clean clogged roof gutters, particularly if the leaves from surrounding trees have

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a tendency to plug up the drains. Flooded roof gutters are easily overlooked but can produce hundreds of mosquitoes each season.

- Turn over plastic wading pools when not in use. A wading pool becomes a mosquito producer if it is not used on a regular basis.
- Turn over wheelbarrows and do not allow water to stagnate in bird baths. Change water in bird baths and wading pools on a weekly basis.
- Store boats covered or upside down, or remove rainwater weekly.
- Keep drains, ditches and culverts free of grass clippings, weeds and trash so water will drain properly.
- Installing bird or bat houses to attract these insect-eating animals has been suggested as a method of mosquito control. However, there is little scientific evidence that this significantly reduces the mosquito population around homes.
- Try using Bounce Fabric Softener Sheets...just wipe on & go
- Take one vitamin B1 tablet a day April thru October, the odor the tablet gives out through your skin repels those nasty pests.
- Plant some marigolds around the deck, the flowers give off a smell that they do not like.

What is a Docent?

That is a docent? According to my Random House dictionary, a "docent: is a person who is a knowledgeable guide, especially one who conducts visitors through a museum and delivers a commentary on the exhibitions.

Well, that's the bare bones of it, anyway. I believe there's a lot more to it than that!

To my mind, a docent is a resource person, a teacher, a friend of the public, and a representative of his or her community.

All of our docents live in the southern Tuolumne Country area and all have a deep interest and pride in what our Museum stands for. Our Museum was built with private funds donated by the community it serves, it pays its own way and is operated by dedicated members of the community at no cost to the public. It is open seven days a week - six days a week in the winter time – four-and-a-half hours in the afternoon, with at least one docent on duty at all times. The building, which also houses a branch of the Tuolumne County Public Library, is owned by the Southern Tuolumne County Historical Society (STCHS).

Displays have featured works from local artisans and historical displays of the early Indians as well as the settlers who displaced them. Here's a sampling of the current displays: artifacts pulled from pioneer attics, photos of life in and around Groveland in the early days, old-fashioned fishing tackle, a gigantic black bear and a great-horned owl, and a pelt-petting display for children (adults can pet them, too). There's a tribute to "Charlie-the-Can-Man" Heath who raised thousands of dollars by collecting and recycling aluminum cans; every penny collected went into the building fund. There's also a small theater where films of Gold County history bring the "olden days" to life.

And just what do our docents do? We greet visitors, of course, and ask them to sign the guest book. (We've had over 20,000 visitors since our opening in February, 2001!). We act as guides; answer questions about the Museum and the community; encourage children to press the button that activates the stamp mill display; sell books, toys and jewelry in the Gift Shop; and we talk with people from all over the world!

A lasting memory: One day, four visitors from Japan came in – a tall young couple and two tiny old folks. The younger pair seemed quite at home, spoke clear, though accented English; the older couple were silent and the lady never raised her eyes. Silently they roamed the Museum and the young man thanked me as they left. The old lady, head down, scuttled to the door and I called "Thank you" in Japanese. She stopped cold, looked directly at me, and SMILED. It made my day!

Our docents are here to greet everyone,

young and old, pioneers and newcomers. It is one of the most rewarding and interesting avocations; people from all over the world come to southern Tuolumne County. Most speak English, all are courteous, appreciative and fun to talk with. Our five year old Museum is a living 150-year record of the Gold Country and the people who have resided in the towns and villages sprinkled through the foothills. I suppose you could call our docents "representative" of our community.

If you enjoy meeting the public and would like to be a part of this dedicated group, please call me (962-7057) or Gordon Jones (962-5693). New docents start out working with an experienced docent partner who know the ropes; some stay partnered, others choose to go solo. Most docents work one afternoon a month, oftener if they choose. Next time you're in town, come in to the Museum and talk with the docent, observe and ask questions – perhaps you'll join us. You would be most welcome!

Meeting the Health Care Needs of the Greater Groveland Area

he Strategic Plan Committee (SPC) is pleased to present to the community its final report, "Meeting the Health Care Needs of the Greater Groveland Area."

There is an understanding that the baton has been passed from GAINs to the Strategic Plan Committee for Rural Healthcare for health planning for our communities, and that further healthcare efforts and planning must be collaboratively done by broader community representation.

As in a relay, the baton or torch is passed between members of a team (in our case, our community) for effectiveness in having a stronger voice to reach our goals of better healthcare for our communities.

The lead in the SPC Final Report and related tasks is being be taken by the SPC, who did the work and authored the Report, until it too is securely passed to the Health Advisory Council and a Consortium of community organizations. Permissions from other nonprofit corporations will be obtained by the SPC in regard to the Health Advisory Council and the Consortium, which is the foundation of further collaborative planning efforts.

These include SSSI (The Gathering Place), NYCPI (Northern Yosemite Corridor Partners, Inc.), Soroptimist Interna-

tional of Groveland (SIG), VNA/Hospice, Rotary of Groveland, Kiwanis of Groveland, Lions of Groveland, etc. as their interest in healthcare determines.

The SPC learned that two Rural Health Clinics were being actively planned for our area. The Groveland Clinic was being converted to Rural Health Clinic status by Sonora Regional Medical Center. The other Rural Health Clinic, to be located in Greeley Hill, was being planned by John C Fremont Hospital of Mariposa. Therefore, a better approach would be to build a collaboration between the three regional hospitals (Tuolumne General, Sonora Regional and John C. Fremont), their associated local clinics, the Visiting Nurses Association/Hospice, and a newly created Health Advisory Council for the greater Groveland area.

In summary, the SPC has made the following recommendations:

1. Create a Health Advisory Council to ensure local, professional determination for our area. The Health Advisory Council would work with a consortium of community organizations with a health focus. The SPC recommends that an autonomous Health Advisory Council be formed in

Groveland that is made up of medical, health and human service professionals, as well as organizational and business experts recruited from our community. The Council would meet periodically to continue our community's relationship with the regional hospitals that was launched by the SPC, engage in joint planning efforts and occasionally perform critical reviews of services provided based on patient-centered benchmarking evaluations. This Council would work with a consortium of local organizations, with a health focus.

- 2. Arrange for Hospital Administrators' and members of the Health Advisory Council visit to Sierra Family Medical Clinic. To maintain the good working relationship that the SPC formed with the three regional hospitals and to share with them the vision of the type of rural healthcare that we would expect from them. We recommend that a visit by the administrators of the hospitals and members of the Health Advisory Council to the Sierra Family Medical Clinic be arranged.
- 3. Create a Health Resources Coordinator position for our area to address service fragmentation. To help our community through the complex issues associated with healthcare in our area,

we recommend that a Health Resources Coordinator position be formed and supported by our community that will be independent of the health providers serving our community. This position would require a professional health provider, under license and housed within a health organization, due to privacy legislation, confidentiality requirements, and liability issues.

I love crazy-patch and its colorful history, don't you?







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More Rumors About Long Gulch Ranch

n early June, I read with interest a letter to the editor by a PML resident regarding Long Gulch Ranch. In that letter, the writer assumed that upon receiving the mandated \$50,000 fee from the Long Gulch Ranch developer, as required by the District's Water Ordinance 2-05, I left for Mexico to enjoy my ill-gotten gains. I'm happy to report that when I returned from Mexico after painting two schools with my Rotary friends, I found the \$50,000 still in GCSD's bank account with a little more interest earned than when I left. However, at this writing, the GCSD Board has yet to give staff the green light to use this money to review the Long Gulch Ranch project, let alone to make any decisions about annexing the development into GCSD.

The author of that letter brought up an interesting issue that should be explored. He asserts that if the Long Gulch Ranch developers connect their development's sewer system to our existing wastewater treatment plant with a pipeline and lift station system that runs in Ferretti Road, then all those folks who live near Ferretti Road will be required to connect to that sewer.

Like all good rumors, this has a grain of truth to it. The truth is that if (note, if) the Long Gulch Ranch project moves forward, and if the developer is required to build the sewer line extension along Ferretti Road, and if someone who lives within 300 feet of that sewer main wants to hook up to the sewer or must hook into it because their septic system has failed, then they will be able to do so at a fraction of the cost had the sewer main not been installed at the developer's expense.

There has been discussions at the state level resulting from a state law passed in year 2000 regarding septic systems that exist within a municipal sewer collection system. This issue is still in the talking stage, and like most government discussions, will take a long time to run its course. However, if (again, if) these discussions grow into actual state regulations that require a septic to sewer system conversion, then the backbone sewer main (by far the most expensive part of the system) will have been installed at someone else's expense, making the conversion much cheaper for the existing ratepayers.


In addition, existing GCSD Board

members have stated in public session that if this widespread conversion is mandated by the state, then the District is committed to making the conversion with the least amount of economic impact to the existing ratepayers. This might mean that the cost of connection fees and the actual hook up to the sewer could be paid by a bond carried by these impacted customers instead of with a cash-up-front payment.

However, please notice the long string of "if" statements that lead up to having someone actually pay for something or being required to hook up to the sewer. Here's a fact: GCSD cannot make someone hook up to the sewer, whether it's in front of their house our not. This regulatory authority lies with Tuolumne County Department of Environmental Health and this authority is only exercised if your septic system fails.

I guess the moral of this story is that if you have a concern about any GCSD

issues, including Long Gulch Ranch, you can either start a good rumor or you can attend GCSD Board meetings and ask questions of the Board and/or GCSD staff. If you are a little shy about speaking in public, my door is always open to answer your questions. You are invited to call me, email me, or come by the office and discuss the issues that concern you over a cup of (governmentissue) coffee.



company's portfolio--more than thirteen national and international companies, with multiple facilities.





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Milestones of GAINs Healthy Community Project Sierra Family Medical Clinic spiring example of rural heal

hree years ago Groveland Area Involved Neighbors, GAINs, took a giant step toward a new project. A series of surveys held in Groveland and outlying communities had indicated that health services in southern Tuolumne and northern Mariposa counties were scant: too many people were not being served or were being served inadequately. And so the GAINs Healthy Community Project was launched. It began in November of 2003 with an expanded Study Group facilitated by Kathy Amos of Tuolumne County Public Health. We needed to know what we were getting into, where the greatest needs lay. And we needed to know what medical and health services were currently available. In February of 2004, Lary Davis, Pauline Campbell, and Gail Witzylsteiner of Sonora Regional Medical Center came here to meet with the leaders to discuss services. We later heard speakers from Tuolumne General and Fremont (Mariposa) Hospitals, as well as representatives of our local ambulance services. In March, speakers from the Visiting Nurses Association, Adult Day Health Care Center, and Long Term Care from Tuolumne General met with us. Through these meetings we began to understand better what medical services were available, as well as the problems involved in receiving them. It was time to hold a town hall meeting. The community needed to be involved. So one was held in May, and we began developing a list of the health care services currently available in our area and other services we need. Barbara Broad, Chairman of the GAINs Board of Directors, applied to and received a grant from a The California Endowment to identify ways of providing more healthcare to all our residents, an 18-month grant of \$45,623. We were on our way!

Community surveys indicated what health and medical services were most needed, as well as what barriers existed to receiving them — transportation, financial impact, old age, and existing illnesses that only specialists could deal with. By October we were meeting frequently. To facilitate meetings and to help us focus on specific issues, GAINs hired a consultant. Representatives from ADHC came to speak with us. A week or so later a GAINs-sponsored bus took south county representatives to the Sonora Health Fair. In December and January a series of field trips to the Sierra Family Medical Clinic near Nevada City and to Golden Valley Health Clinics in Merced and a Central Rural Health Roundtable in Atwater opened our eyes to what we could do in our rural area. At

Sierra Family Medical Clinic we saw an inspiring example of rural healthcare: people treating the whole individual, not just the symptoms. Dr. Peter Van Houten, leader of that clinic, offered to be our mentor as we developed ideas, and he gave us advice for the remainder of the project.

Leaders of the HCP met Pauline Campbell, V.P. of Offsite Services, of SRMC in May to discuss our findings. She announced they were applying for Rural Health Clinic status for the Groveland Clinic but said they would not be increasing services. The project conducted a major community health survey in southern Tuolumne and northern Mariposa counties in May of 2005. From the survey results and an information booth at the Soroptimist Wellness Fair, they gleaned more information as to the needs of the communities. Later in 2005 at Groveland's 49er Festival, the HHAOR parade entry featuring GAINs won the Grand Prize. In September at a community meeting, the project presented ideas for having our own independent community clinic, run by a local board of directors. At that meeting five people volunteered for the Strategic Plan Committee, and the GAINs Board approved their formation as a subcommittee to the Healthy Community Project.

Three HCP representatives attended a Northern Rural Health Roundtable meeting in Fort Bragg to network and learn more about establishing a rural health clinic here. Back in Groveland a 44-page Health Resources Directory was distributed. In December the Strategic Plan Committee visited the Sierra Family Medical Clinic.

Suddenly, as we moved into 2006, things began to change: we learned that Fremont Hospital was planning to open a clinic in Northern Mariposa County, much of their planning mirroring our own concepts for a clinic. The Strategic Plan Committee met with CEOs and top administrators from Sonora Regional Medical Center, Tuolumne General Hospital, and Fremont Hospital in Mariposa to explore ways we could work together as they agreed our area does not have adequate health services. In February the committee made it's Final Report to the Healthy Community Project with three recommendations for action.

At the March meeting of the Healthy Community Project, the group reviewed progress made over the past two years. It was apparent that GAINs' persistence in assessing the health needs of our area and its efforts in seeking solutions resulted in a greater awareness of these needs in Tuolumne and Mariposa counties. It appears

that we will have two Rural Health Clinics within ten miles of each other. GAINs' goals for healthcare remained the same but the delivery of this healthcare will be different from what we had imagined six months earlier.

The Strategic Plan Committee has struck out on its own with the three recommendations for action. With that accomplishment, the GAINs Healthy Community Project has completed its work. All of this was possible because of the involvement of the members of the Healthy Community Project and their eagerness to find out what services we have available and what we are missing and to

research and visit rural health clinics. They are to be congratulated for bringing this all about!

In summary, the California Endowment 2004 grant program description was "The Healthy Community Project will identify best practices for improving and expanding health services access in Groveland Area communities. The project will promote local capacity building and engage advocacy through collaborative community networking." The project team researched possibilities of expanding healthcare and found the well-funded Rural Health Clinics. With the Strategic Plan Committee's plans for action, the project goals have been met.

The gallery features framed and unframed works and sculptures by rotating artists and photographers. Currently featured in the gallery are Michael Carey, wildlife and Americana artist from Sacramento; David Wilkinson, local photographer and automotive artist; the special photography of Terri Metz; prints of Richard Stomp's unique pen & inks complemented by short poems; and Alabaster sculptures of California artist, Milton Eisenhauer.

Beginning July 3rd, the Gallery has an exhibit featuring Terri Metz' photography. Terri is a well-known local photographer and she is always adding new pieces to her already large collection of photos. So come on by and see several of her new photos including the very popular and

beautiful photo of the Historic Groveland School House taken in the snow and appropriately entitled "No School Today." Terri's exhibit shows through July 23rd. Starting July 24th, the Astrophotography of Eddie Pavlu will be featured for a three week exhibit. His photographs of nebulae, faraway galaxies, and other celestial bodies can be admired without having to leave the comforts of earth.

GCSD Starts to Examine Long Gulch Ranch by Ron Rumbaugh

t its June 12th meeting, GCSD voted to start the process of examining how they might provide water and sewer services to Long Gulch Ranch, a 372-home development approved for 1,158 acres on Ferretti Road adjacent to Pine Mountain Lake. Annexation to GCSD is a condition of the County's approvals, originally granted in 1996.

The Board's vote authorized three specific actions. A bank account will be opened for the \$50,000 check the developer delivered to GCSD. The developer will sign an agreement to pay all of GCSD's costs during this review process. Kennedy/Jenks, an engineering consulting firm, will be hired to review the developer's Preliminary Design Report (PDR). The

PDR describes the different ways GCSD could provide water and sewer services to Long Gulch Ranch.

"Pursuant to our policies, the developer will pay all of our costs to undertake this review," said Jim Goodrich, GCSD's General Manager. He added that a copy of the PDR would be posted on GCSD's website.

Dan Levin, a local resident who is a partner in the group that purchased the property in April 2005, was pleased that the formal review process has started. "We have always acknowledged our responsibility to pay all of the costs to bring water and sewer services to Long Gulch Ranch," he stated. "The PDR should reassure all of GCSD's customers that they will not be providing any costs or subsidies

to our development."

The PDR was prepared by RBF Consulting, a firm that specializes in providing consulting services to water and sewer districts in California like GCSD. RBF has previous experience with GCSD, having prepared their Water and Sewer Master Plans in 2001.

Attending his first GCSD meeting, local resident Gordon Stevens was impressed that two sets of experts would be reviewing everything. "The developer is paying for his experts and then giving money to GCSD to pay for their experts," he said. "It made me comfortable that everything would be thoroughly investigated and discussed.






Helping Hands Offers Shopping on Friday Nights






Fall School Information






Tenaya School's Spring Art Show!

Affordable Housing in Groveland

lans have been announced to build 51 units of affordable housing on a 53acre parcel located just off Highway 120 in back of the Scar and surrounding the Divide Cemetery on Memorial Road. Dan Levin is undertaking this project independent of his work on Long Gulch Ranch.

There is an existing Development Agreement with Tuolumne County that allows a total of 171 homes to be constructed on the property. Levin wants to make 30% of these homes affordable for people living or working in Groveland who have been frustrated in their efforts to purchase a home because of the high prices. The other 120 homes would be priced for either entry-level or first-time buyers.

"Every working family in Groveland ought to be given the opportunity to purchase a home here," said Levin, "and I want to help provide that opportunity."

There are various government programs for buyers whose income levels qualify them for this assistance. The State of California sets the income levels based on the local economic conditions. The income levels for a family of four in Tuolumne County range from a Very Low of \$27,100 to a Moderate of \$65,000. The goal of these

programs is to help people at these income levels purchase a home.

Levin is conducting interviews to determine how many local people actually need affordable housing, and what they would like to see in these houses. "I want to make certain the houses meet the needs of the potential purchasers," he said, "and speaking directly to these people seems to be the best way to obtain this information."

Jim Goodrich, General Manager of the Groveland Community Services District, facilitated a series of interviews with GCSD and Fire Department employees in June. The results were so productive that Levin made

similar requests of many other major employers in town, including the Pine Mountain Lake Association, Main Street Market, the Iron Door Saloon and both banks.

Anyone interested is urged to contact Levin at either of his telephone numbers, 209-962-0875 or 650-533-4400, or by email at Affordable120@aol.com.

Levin observed that there are many issues that must be addressed before construction can start. A Site Development Permit must be obtained from the County, and financing must be arranged for the overall development. However, it is possible that the first homes could be available for sale and occupancy by next summer.

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
