ooking at the calendar I see that my time is rapidly winding down. It's time for my penultimate (next to last) message to you. I've enjoyed putting my musing to paper and I hope you have found them both humorous and informative. So with that said, we go once more into the breech.

The bad guys have been at it again. Recently, we have experienced break-ins at both the Lake Lodge and the Marina along with some associated vandalism. It's time to get tough. Along these lines, your Board and Management have taken the following steps to improve our security at all the amenities. First, we installed new and improved alarm systems that connect to both Safety and the Sheriff's department. We have increased our Safety staffing to beef-up our nighttime patrols. Next, we made some effective adjustments to the lighting at the Marina and installed a new infrared camera system that can be monitored over the Internet. Finally, we are working on securing a security consultant to do a top to bottom review of all areas of the Association to determine risk and make recommendations for the future.

There is a bright spot though. One of the alleged perpetrators was caught red handed and has been arrested by the Sheriff. Since this is an on-going investigation, we can't reveal any more about it but hopefully this is going to send a strong

message to all those that think we are an easy mark. Like everyone else we're mad as hell and just aren't going to put up with it anymore.

Speaking of other unwanted visitors, you have to bear with me on this next item. It seems that several Brown Bears have moved down from the high country to check us out. They are rummaging through unsecured garbage bins, chowing down on food left outside for pets and one even broke into one residence to raid the pantry. All these sightings appear to be in those areas that backup to the undeveloped areas (Units 14 and 16), the campground, and the property edges close to the forest service lands. You have to remember, we encroached on their historic habitat so it is not unusual to see one every now and then. If you happen to sight one, stay safely away and report the sighting to Safety, this is not Yogi Bear and if they feel threatened they will defend themselves. This has been a very dry year. The snow pack in the high country is gone and the reservoirs are way down. We're not in a severe drought situation yet but we're getting close. Word on the grapevine is that due to the low water levels, Hetch Hetchy will not implement the planned prolonged maintenance shut down this coming year but will opt for the normal two to three week maintenance cycle. All the local water agencies are now urging us to conserve so the problem doesn't get any worse. We all have to do our part so let's all shower with a friend.

The planned road maintenance for this year is now complete. I know it was a pain for some of us that live in the affected areas but you have to admit they did a bang-up job. I want to thank everyone for their patience, cooperation and understanding during this period. The really good news is that we got more done than originally planned and it came in slightly under budget. Murphy must have been on holiday that week.

Finally, in the bits and pieces file, this month's Board meeting will feature our second quarterly manager's review. They will present their second quarter accomplishments, budget performance, their goals for the third quarter and give you some insight to the challenges that they face. It should be very informative and allow you to get up close and personal to those behind the scenes that make it happen. Also, if you're looking for a ballot this year, don't hold your breath, we had two candidates for the two open Director positions so the Board proclaimed them elected in accordance with our Bylaws. Congratulations to both Rita Hart and Larry Santa Maria, your two new directors (actually your one new director, Rita is currently serving on the Board and ran for reelection). As a good note in closing, not having to hold the election saves the Association about \$20,000.

Surveillance Cameras at the Marina

In response to repeated vandalism and theft at the Marina we have purchased and installed a multi-camera surveillance system. The system is infra-red capable for nighttime coverage and has significant range and recording capability. This system is monitored by our Marina and Dept. of Safety staff and PML members can also monitor the system over the Internet by visiting the PML Website. We have also increased posted and roving patrols to provide redundant coverage. So far, the cameras and patrols have been an effective crime deterrent and we plan to use these programs and systems in other areas in the near future.

Fire Abatement and the Fire Prevention Guide

Over the past three years the PML Fire Abatement Program has resulted in significant progress towards keeping PML fire safe. We are documenting a dramatic increase in fire compliance in all Units of our Association each consecutive year and I would like to congratulate our Fire Safety Coordinator, Larry Woodruff for the fine job he is doing. Property owners have commented on his friendly, professional demeanor in gaining compliance and they welcome

the positive approach. We have included a copy of the PML Fire Prevention Guide in the July edition of the PML News to provide members with detailed information to help keep their property and surrounding properties safe from the threat of fire. The deadline for fire safety compliance was June 15, 2007. If you are having trouble getting your lot cleared or have any questions, feel free to call Larry at (209) 962-8616.

Lake Dredging Project

The copy of the CEQA environmental report is complete. Our contracting company, Condor will now send the report to the County. The County will pass it around to the different departments for review. This takes about three weeks. After the review and any required corrections, the County puts the document out for 30-day public review and comment period. After 30 days if there are any comments, Condor will prepare answers and solutions to each concern and then the document goes to the County Board of Supervisors for approval. During this timeframe the same draft will be sent to the Department of Fish and Game, Regional Water Quality Control and the Army Corps of Engineers along with the applications for their individual permits. All of these actions should culminate in a completed permit process within 2 ¹/₂ months.

Carpet Installation

The second phase of the Administration Office carpet replacement project was completed on schedule. This was a big project that required the coordinated efforts of the Maintenance Department and my Office staff. I commend them all for their hard work. We literally moved all equipment and furniture from one side of the building to the other, replaced it after the carpet was installed over the weekend and then repeated this task on the other side of the building the next week. After experiencing the multiple moves over to weekends, I hope the new carpet last for 20 years.

Swimming Pool ADA Ramp Project

The original ADA Ramp Project engineered drawings were produced back in 2002. Due to new changes in ADA law, the County sent our plans back for reengineering. The new plans are complete and due to the significant changes required updated quotes from competing contractors and a delay in the County permit. We anticipate getting the permit within the next week. We have worked very hard to push this long-awaited project forward and it is nice to see some light at the end of the tunnel.

The purpose and effect of these changes to the PMLA Lake Rules is to improve the current rules to provide equal opportunities for all boaters on Pine Mountain Lake, especially during desirable evening hours.

PMLA **BOATING AND LAKE RULES** Draft A

or your safety, California Boating Laws prevail. For your convenience, copies of the pamphlet "ABC's of California Boating Laws," published by the California Harbors and Watercraft are available at the Marina Store

Listed below are further regulations that apply to Pine Mountain Lake boating usage. Failure to comply with them shall be grounds for termination of your privileges. Violations are subject to citation. All boats are subject to inspection to determine compliance with State Law and Association requirements. If you have any questions on the safety requirements of your boat, contact a Boat Patrol Officer or the Marina Store staff.

GENERAL BOATING RULES

Know our rules and abide by them for your enjoyment and safety.

All boats on Pine Mountain Lake must meet both State of California and Pine Mountain Lake registration requirements. Only property owners in good standing may register their boats.

REGISTRATION: Requirements for registration include: current liability insurance with a minimum of \$300,000, proof of PML residency, proof that the

boat meets California Boating Law safety requirements, compliance with PML nonwake enhancing requirements, and agreement to abide by lake rules.

PML non-wake enhancing regulations restrict the use of internal ballast tanks, external fins, foils, panels, or boat hulls specifically designed to increase wakes. Any boats incorporating these devices, registered at PML must adhere to PML's restrictions on not utilizing these devices.

All boats are limited to 5 mph except during water skiing hours, where the speed limit is 40 mph in the ski area only. All boats, except those signed up for skiing, must stay out of the ski area while skiing is in progress. Skiing or other high-speed boating activity is permitted during designated hours from May 1 thru October 31 only.

Open stack boats and others with a decibel level exceeding 82 db are prohibited. Likewise, radios or stereos may not be played at high volume.

Note that areas marked "no wake" mean no wake. These areas are marked with white buoys that say "No Wake". Boats may have to go slower than 5 mph in order not to create any wake.

No "Jet Skis," "Waverunners" or other similar variations of personal watercraft are allowed on Pine Mountain Lake (except authorized emergency or law enforcement equipment).

Only skippers (16 years and older with a valid driver's license) designated by a boat owner may operate a powerboat, provided that they know the lake and marina rules. Boat owners are responsible for informing their operators of all lake and marina rules.

Boat owners are responsible for the operation of their boats and the wakes they create regardless of who may be operating the boat.

Reckless operation and disregard for others may result in citation and forfeiture of lake boating privileges.

Boaters must stay inside the passenger/ operator areas of the boat. Riding outside of the railing or gate is prohibited.

Powerboat operators may not tow or pull rafts, tubes, paddleboats, kayaks, canoes or similar craft.

In case of an accident, give any necessary assistance, then immediately contact the Boat Patrol (based at the Marina).

Sufficient life preservers must be aboard for each passenger. All boaters less than 12 years of age and non-swimmers must wear properly tied life jackets.

Give a wide berth to sail and manually operated boats, as they have the right of way.

Powerboats may not be operated within 50 feet of a swimming area.

When meeting another boat, keep to the right.

Individuals wishing to blow out their motors may do so during high-speed boating hours and must first check-in with the Boat Patrol. Blow-outs will be limited to two (2) times around the ski pattern and must adhere to all high-speed boating rules. A maximum of 4 boats are allowed in the high-speed boating lane with skiers/boarders given priority over boats wishing to blow out their motor. No engine blowouts will be allowed between 6:00 pm and 8:00 pm.

Every effort shall be made to minimize wakes, especially those affecting shoreline properties.

All lake activity is suspended when CDF helicopters perform firefighting procedures or during other emergencies that require use of lake water.

The Boat Patrol will be in effect daily. Citations may be given for PML rule infractions. Two citations will constitute action for removing your boat from Pine Mountain Lake for the remainder of the season. Any boating or swimming rule may be changed in an emergency based on input from PML Management, Safety Dept, Sheriff's Dept, or other appropriate agency.

BOAT LAUNCHING & REMOVAL DATES

NO BOAT MAY BE LAUNCHED without current Pine Mountain Lake registration.

BOAT LAUNCHING AND REMOV-AL is allowed only at the Marina boat ramp.

ALL BOATS NOT REMOVED from Dunn Court and the Marina area by October 31st of each year will be removed and stored AT THE OWNER'S EXPENSE.

NO TRAILER PARKING permitted, except for daily use, and only in designated areas. No trailer parking will be permitted the date of the Independence Day fireworks celebration.

On the Monday associated with the 3 three-day holiday weekends, wakeboarding will start at 4:00 P.M.

High-speed boating activities, wakeboarding or skiing, in the 9 am to 12 pm hours are not defined and will be worked out between the Marina Manager and the PML WWC.

Skiing and wakeboarding are prohibited November 1 through April 30. The speed limit for all boats during this time is 5 mph.

Reservations will be taken at the Marina Store (962-8631) up to 24 hours in advance and will be limited to one hour per day. Additional hours may be reserved on the day of interest. You may call or walk-in for reservations. When time slots become full, a stand-by list will be taken.

All users of the fast boat lane must checkin with the Boat Patrol prior to commencing their activity. The Boat Patrol will wait 10 minutes for a user with a reservation. After that, the time slot will be opened to the next fast boat user requesting time. If there are no reservations or ad hoc fast boat users in line. the fast boat lane will be closed to fast boat activities for the rest of the hour.

A ski-flag or light system is located at the Marina point. The flag or light indicates whether high-speed boating activity is or is not occurring. The ski flag will be dynamically raised and lowered based on whether the fast boat lane is open or closed on an hour-by-hour basis during reservation hours. Boaters can also call the Marina Store for ski-flag or light status.

A maximum of four (4) boats will be allowed to ski at any one time. A distance

of 100 feet shall be maintained between boats.

A counter-clockwise ski pattern shall be maintained.

To minimize shoreline wakes on the North shore, high-speed boaters shall stay as close as possible to the main beach buoys when traveling from the dam toward Big Creek. When traveling Big Creek toward the dam, high-speed boaters should stay as close as possible to the center of the ski pattern as safety permits. Always pass an approaching powerboat on the right.

All boats being used on PML waters must be operated in a manner to minimize the size of the wake produced by the boat. With the exception of pontoon boats and those boats traveling less than 5 mph, all powerboat operators shall operate at planing speeds as soon as practical when in the ski pattern.

Wake Enhancement: The use of devices, equipment, or placement of passengers on boats for the purpose of creating an enlarged wake is prohibited. Further, no such devices or equipment may be used on any boat in PML. Such devices and equipment include, but are not limited to; exterior panels or wings deployed underwater; rubberized, plastic or metal tanks or bags filled with any material; crowding of passengers to the rear; inside-the-hull water tanks or boat hulls designed specifically to enhance the wake. Additionally, the operator of an outboard or I/O drive boat must keep the out-drive down to optimally trim the boat to minimize the size of the boat's wake at all times.

Any boat that produces excessive wakes may be cited. Two citations result in eviction from the lake for the remainder of the calendar year.

Staging area for skiers is the White SKI BUOY outside the Marina. No other area! There is a voluntary drop area outside the 5 mph buoys at Fisherman's Cove. See Marina Store and Good Neighbor Rules for details.

Ski course is marked with red buoys. Stay inside of the red buoys. These buoys are not a SLALOM COURSE.

Ski boats must have a red or orange flag and an observer at least 12 years of age.

Ski boats returning to a fallen skier must make a starboard (right) turn to return to the skier while raising the red or orange warning flag. The boat operator shall make the 'turn-around' at a slow speed to minimize the wake. Obviously, safety is a concern, but anything a boat operator can do to minimize wake size is required.

The driver of any boat approaching a boat displaying a red or orange flag must acknowledge the downed skier's presence by raising their hand for the skier's tow boat to see and take appropriate evasive action to ensure the safety of the downed skier.

Skier must raise one (1) ski (or wakeboard or kneeboard) when in water with slack tow-

lot of members and guests are under a misconception that the PML Pool staff members are lifeguards. A "Pool Attendant" monitors the maintenance surrounding the pool and takes the action necessary to keep the pool facility operational and open for member use during established hours. The Pool Attendant shares their attention with determining who is authorized to enter the Pool, tracking usage of the pool, servicing a small snack bar on the premises, maintaining cleanliness of the rest rooms and other light administrative duties. An important part of the Pool Attendants duties include enforcing pool rules set by the Association. Safety is a high priority at all of our amenities and the Pool is no different.

We do our best to make our members feel welcome and have a fun time but unfortunately some members and their guests choose to violate the safety rules and we are forced to remind them to play safe. It is really difficult when a parent ignores a problem with their children. It puts us in an awkward position of having to correct their child and this is a position that no employee should be put in. We ask that all parents and grandparents monitor their children and grandchildren as their safety is most important to us. Most members are happy to comply but sometimes we are pushed into a situation where we have to ask the person to leave.

So what is a lifeguard? A lifeguard is defined by the American Red Cross as a "professional rescuer" that has been trained to respond to an aquatic emergency. Our Pool Attendants are not trained as Lifeguards but they have been instructed on how to initiate the emergency response system should an emergency occur at the pool.

We hope this clarifies the difference between a Pool Attendant and a Life Guard and we would like to remind all members and guests that use the pool to use it with caution and remember that you are using it at own risk. There is No Lifeguard on duty. Children under 14 must be accompanied by an adult (18 years or older) who is responsible for the supervision and safety of those children in their care. Have a safe and fun summer! 🕅

Golf Maintenance

he cart path project up and around #5 tee is scheduled for June 11th and 12th. It will take off from the existing cart path above the restrooms at #4 green and go behind the back tees along the upper tee and join in near the forward tee. Players will have the choice of parking directly in back or along side the tees.

After this is completed we will add one railroad tie to the existing ties and level the existing tee surfaces. Also, along the bank will be a two foot high retaining wall that we can backfill, landscape and improve the surroundings there.

We have received some comments regarding the duckweed in our irrigation pond on hole #9. This has been an on-going issue and we have sprayed it twice during the spring with little success. Now that we irrigate daily, we can not spray the duckweed because that water would not be

safe for the turf. Soon we are going to try some mechanical removal by using some netting designed for aquatic weeds. We are very optimistic based on reports of this method being used at other golf courses.

In late May, we had some temperatures that were in the high 80's. By early June, we had a high of 58 degrees on June 5th and a low of 40 degrees on #1 green on June 6th. These temperatures determine the water needs of the turf. When you come out and play and conditions are wet or a little soft, remember that in a few days it could be 90 degrees again. We have 1,730 sprinkler heads on the course and well over on half of these are adjusted weekly to try and control wet and dry spots.

Have a good round of golf and please do your part to take care of the golf course. Please observe the 90-degree rule.

he season is off to a great start here at the Golf Shop. Superintendent Alan MacDonald and his crack staff of greens keepers have waved their magic wands (and mowers, blowers and weed whackers) and created a masterpiece of turf and trees. Our new POS (Point of Sale) system is paying dividends by allowing us to accurately and quickly check in our Members and their guests. The system also allows the Association Office to electronically update our Member files.

We would like to clear up some customer concerns regarding Member golf rates, Guest and Public rates and determining which rate is applicable. According to the Second Restated Bylaws of Pine Mountain Lake Association, Article III, Section 3.01, "Every Owner of a Lot within the Properties (PML) is a member of the Association." Further, under Section 3.04, "A person shall not be entitled to exercise the rights of a Member until such person has advised the Association's secretary in writing that he or she is qualified to be a Member...and has provided the secretary with evidence of such qualification in the form of a certified

copy of a recorded grant deed or a currently effective policy of title insurance." In short, you must be listed on the deed to the property to be considered a Member. One of the rights and privileges of a Member is to pay Member/Property Owner rates to play golf. For the purposes of the use of the Golf Course and all fees associated with use of the Golf Course a Member is defined as someone whose name is listed on the deed of the property and their dependants under the age of 18. Any one that is not specifically listed on the deed is not considered to be a Member and is therefore subject to nonproperty owner rates.

Guest rates are charged for all sponsored guests of a Property Owner. The Property Owner must call to set up the tee time for their guests or be playing with them.

Non-Property Owners who are not sponsored are charged Public Golf rates.

Community Education Classes Conducted

The staff of Columbia College's **Community Education Department** is promoting two classes, which will be held this summer at the High Sierra Institute at Baker Station. Located at the 6,200 ft. elevation across from Kennedy Meadows on Highway 108, the institute is a partnership between the Yosemite Community College District and the U.S. Forest Service. Under special use permit from the Stanislaus National Forest, a number of Columbia College credit courses and community education classes are conducted at the historic field station, an important staging area in a natural, forested backcountry setting.

"Elements of Design: Photographic Scavenger Hunt" will be taught by Laurie Sylwester on Wednesday, July 18, in two sections. Section 9480 will be from 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. and Section 9481 will be from 3:00 to 7:00 p.m. You can sign up for one or both and each section costs \$25. Registration deadline is July 12.

Participants are encouraged to bring any type of camera for the class, which starts at Kennedy Meadows in the morning and heads toward Sonora Pass by the evening. Each session will cover different material and territory with different photographic assignments.

Students can stay overnight at the station at no charge. Kitchen facilities are available and rooms with beds are on a first come, first served basis. If you prefer, tents can also be pitched on the grounds.

If writing is an interest of yours, try "Nature Poetry Writing" (Sec. 9488), which will be taught by Ingrid Keriotis on Wednesday, July 11, from 10:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. She will lead the class through various exercises to connect you to nature through the surrounding environment. Keriotis will help you find your own poetic voice, inspired by the beauty of the Sierra. Registration is due by July 5 and the fee is \$30.

COMMUNITY CORNER **History Makers at the Divide Cemetery**

o far, over 1000 people have been buried at the Historic Divide Cemetery which is located on Memorial Drive between Big Oak Flat and Groveland. On Memorial Day Weekend a large crowd gathered at the cemetery to hear stories and learn about some of the folks who helped shape the community South of the Tuolumne River and who are now buried at the Divide.

Storytellers were Wally Anker, Denise Henderson, Mary Laveroni and her daughter, Mary Jr., Bonnie Stevens and Mary Alice (James) Capson.

We heard about early day pioneers such as:

- George Sprague, Director of the Big Oak Flat-Yosemite Turnpike Road Company – the first wagon road into Yosemite Valley.

- Daniel Newhall, also a Director of the Big Oak Flat-Yosemite Turnpike Road Company. He lived in Moccasin where he had a vineyard and produced excellent brandy which in 1871 took first prize in the state.

- The Elwells, who were tollkeepers at Colfax Springs near Rainbow Pools.

- The Muellers, owners and operators of a popular brewery located on Old Highway 120.

And we learned about more recent pioneers like Casey Eisenhauer, who during her lifetime was a tireless advocate for the then fledgling Southern Tuolumne County Historical Society. She felt so strongly that a local historical society, vested in collecting and preserving the history of the lives of the people "on the hill" was needed, that every month she set aside a portion of her modest social security check to be donated toward that purpose. The historical society now has over 300 members and operates the Groveland-Yosemite Gateway Museum. None of which would have been possible without people like Casey or the many others who may not have been able to donate any money at all but offered freely countless hours of their time and skills. They were worth their weight in gold.

We learned about the Mecartea family and their blacksmith shop that once stood near the corner of Highway 120 and Black Road in Big Oak Flat. The unwarranted demolishment of the landmark in the 1980's, the removal of its stone walls and iron doors sparked the formation of what would become the Southern Tuolumne County Historical Society, established to protect, preserve, collect, and share the history of the people and places South of the Tuolumne River.

We visited the family plot of the Mc-Cready Boys, who'll be the subjects of a future exhibit at the Groveland-Yosemite Gateway Museum. They were gold miners, musicians, and talented manzanita carvers who were very dear to the hearts of the children of Big Oak Flat.

Subjects of another future museum exhibit were life-long Big Oak Flatian brothers Charlie and Ed Harper who had a gold mine down New Priest Grade and due to lack of parking space on the road for their Model T, built a garage that hung out precipitously over Grizzly Gulch held up by stilts. Many alive today still remember the odd and slightly un-nerving sight.

We learned about ranchers, judges, constables, civil war veterans and many others.

Most of the information shared on the walk was compiled by History Resource Center (HRC) volunteers. The HRC is located on the top floor of the Groveland-Yosemite Gateway Museum. It is a place where everyone can go to research the history of the area from Jacksonville to Yosemite, South of the Tuolumne River and North of the Mariposa County line. The collection of research materials continues to grow thanks to volunteers who enjoy nothing more than hunting for clues to the past. If you'd like to use the research facilities or if you'd like to share information about your local family history, please contact the HRC to make an appointment (email: grovelandmuseum@ mlode.com or call: 209-962-4408) and someone will be happy to meet you there and show you around.

The walk was jointly sponsored by the Oak Grove Cemetery District and the Southern Tuolumne County Historical Society's History Resource Center. The Divide Cemetery resides within the Oak Grove Cemetery District. (The District is also responsible for upkeep of the small and yet equally historic "Citizens Cemetery" located on Henderson Street in Big Oak Flat.) Although the cemeteries date back to the mid-1800's, the Oak Grove Cemetery District wasn't officially formed until 1920, allowing for a small amount of tax revenue to be used towards maintaining the cemeteries. District business is conducted by a Board of Trustees appointed by the Tuolumne County Board of Supervisors. Two of the original Trustees. Joseph C. DeFerrari and Victor J. Repetto are buried at the Divide Cemetery.

The current Oak Grove Cemetery District Trustees recently had more public benches installed in the Divide Cemetery and are asking community members to help with the cost by "adopting" a bench. The benches cost the District \$200 each, but thanks to the offer of an anonymous donor to match funds, the cost to adopt a bench is only \$100. Donations are tax deductible and for an additional \$160.

"Donated by ____ Family" or "Donated in the Memory of ____" can be engraved on the seat of the bench.

It has also been brought to the attention of the Trustees that the Divide Cemetery lacks a Memorial Wall. A Memorial Wall would offer an alternative to the growing number of people who are opting to be cremated and may not need the use of a plot in their local cemetery but would still like an economical way to mark the passing of their lives.

Thanks to the interest shown by the large number in attendance at this year's History Walk at the Divide Cemetery, plans are already in the works to hold a similar history walk next year at Our Lady of Mount Carmel Catholic Cemetery in Big Oak Flat. So mark your calendars for Memorial Day Weekend 2008.

(Note: The Catholic Cemetery maintenance and operation is overseen by the Archdiocese of Stockton and is not a part of the Oak Grove Cemetery District.)

Bytes & Bits From John By John Sponseller

S pam is more than just canned meat. It's the deluge of unwelcome garbage from telemarketers we find in our mail boxes every day. Many are fraudulent and illegal. However, there are some ways to help reduce the amount of spam you receive.

Here are some ideas you might keep in mind to help

You should be very selective in giving out your e-mail address. If you have to give your email address in order to get something from a website, give an email address that you have set up specifically to receive junk. You can also set up a fake email address at such places as hotmail.com or yahoo.com; these email accounts are free. Also, look for the options to opt out of promotional type mailings when you have to give your address.

Read the subject lines before opening mail. If you have an email program, like Outlook, use the "View" menu to set the "Layout" to show only the subject lines, so you can select what you want to delete without opening the mail. Treat every email you preview as suspect. Harmless looking emails with attachments can contain viruses. When you receive a forwarded email from someone you don't know, and they want you to forward it, don't do it! It's probably a scam and another way for a spammer to get your e-mail address. Many virus warning emails are also bogus.. When you get one of these, does some independent checking before you react to the message. When forwarding emails to groups of people, send them via the BCC field; this shields their address from others. Ask others to send emails to you this way, too.

Use the filters function, if your email program or service provides them, to filter out unwanted emails that do or do not meet certain criteria.

Keep your name off mailing lists. If you have to, use an incorrect address. Only sign up if you know the company is reputable and will maintain your information as "confidential". If your email address is on a website, your web designer can transform it in to a picture or change the @ sign to @ so it's not recognized and can't be stolen for mailing lists.

A lot of spam messages have instructions at the bottom of the message asking you to reply to the message if you want to be removed from their mailing list. If you reply, it will only validate your address as active and you'll get even more spam.

Check the email address of the sender: Do you recognize it? Watch out for fake headers. These are in the subject line and are commonly "Your Account" or "I miss you" or ""You've won!"

Never buy anything from a spammer's email, even if it is something you want, as it is likely to be fraudulent.

You can complain to the spammer's internet service provider by sending an email to abuse@ [the domain] or postmaster@ [the domain]. Don't reply to contests in your email or offers of free websites, nor send money to anti-spam organizations, as they are most likely hoaxes.

Don't submit your address to Opt-out or removal lists, as these are a hoax and you will end up getting more spam.

Be sure to have antivirus software installed on your computer. While you may be able to recognize an email with a strange attachment without opening it, a picture or Word document may harbor also a virus.

As you have probably realized at this point, Spammers create their mailing lists in a number of ways. They also hack into computers and steal lists of web addresses. These lists can be found on consumer sites that you shop on, or membership sites that you have registered with. More seriously, spam is used in online fraud where the sender may pose as someone else like a reputable organization wanting donations.

I've come across one that particularly disturbed me. It was from a reputable bank, telling me that my internet banking was temporarily suspended until I updated my personal banking information on their website. No bank ever asks for this information in this manner. I immediately called my internet banking service and my suspicions were confirmed. I forwarded the e-mail to "abuse @-----"I must say, I was really impressed at the legitimate looking page, complete with the identical bank logo. Pretty scary too. Responding to these types of things can get you into real problems.

I think most of us are getting a lot smarter about spam and don't even bother opening it, or have it filtered ahead of time. The group that concerns me the most, has to be the spammers who send worms and viruses. They try to trick you into opening files that will infect your computer. Virus designers create "worms" that infect you computer and the worm could actually be using your e-mail account to send itself to all of your contacts. Another slimy trick is to imbed the virus in a type of chain mail, then intentionally forwarded from person to person spreading the virus. Lately, this "chain spam" has gotten popular with younger generations. Heads up parents, you may want to inform your kids about these dangers.

How do you know if your incoming email, and especially spam have a virus or a worm? It's virtually impossible. The best suggestion to protect your self, again, is good virus protection software that scans and isolates e-mail threats. Unwanted stuff is filtered from your in-box stopping the threat ahead of time.

All skiers must wear proper Coast Guard approved life preservers.

Number of water skiers per boat: 2



every step of the way We'll be with you maximum at a time. When one skier drops, the second skier must drop immediately.

Use of discs, inner tubes, surfboards, water toys and non-approved devices are prohibited. Water skis, kneeboards and wakeboards are the only devices permitted to be used in the high-speed boating lane.

An area for beginning water ski instruction is available. Contact the Boat Patrol Officer or Marina Manager for details.

Water skiing may be limited on certain days such as, but not limited to holidays, fishing derbies and sailing regatta days.

KNOW OUR RULES AND ABIDE BY THEM FOR YOUR ENJOYMENT AND SAFETY.

FISHING RULES

A California State Fishing License is required and is to be displayed at all times while fishing. Fish limits are governed by California Fish & Game laws. NO LIVE BAIT is permitted other than worms.

Fishing off water taxi docks during water taxi operating hours is prohibited. Trespassing on private property is not allowed.

No fishing within 25 feet of designated swim areas.

SAILING RULES

Sailing Hours: Anytime

SAILBOAT LAUNCHING is allowed only at the Marina boat ramp.

Sailboats and all others must stay out of



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the skiing area during skiing hours.

The high-speed boating lane is outlined with red buoys. Stay out of this area while high-speed boating is in progress. Be aware of high-speed boating hours for your own protection. Avoid the east end of the lake (Lake Lodge and Big Creek entrance) during high-speed boating hours. Sailing of rental boats in Big Creek is

not allowed.

No windsurf boards without a sail are allowed on the lake.

PARKING, BEACH & SWIMMING RULES

SWIM AT YOUR OWN RISK. NO LIFEGUARDS ARE ON DUTY.

Follow all posted beach and marina rules and regulations. Note: The beaches and lawns are designated non-smoking areas. Swimming is only allowed within the

designated swim areas.

No float tubes, surfboards, "noodles," lounge rafts, etc., are allowed on the lake other than within 30 feet from your own private dock. (Tubes, noodles and "soft" float toys are allowed in the swim areas).

Inflatable boats, canoes and kayaks that are used on Pine Mountain Lake must be registered in the same manner as hardbottom boats.

Do not venture more than 30 feet from your own private dock. DO NOT swim across or in the open lake area.

Bicycles and skateboards must be walked through all amenity-parking areas. No riding is permitted.

Dogs are prohibited from the entire PML Marina, Dunn Court, and Lake Lodge amenities except authorized PML utility dogs in the performance of their duties or service animals assisting the blind or deaf.

If the marina parking lot is full, please park at Dunn Court, the Lake Lodge, or Fisherman's Cove and ride the water taxi to the Marina. Water taxi operating schedule is available upon request.

FAILURE TO COMPLY MAY RESULT IN FINES OR LOSS OF LAKE PRIVILEGES.

Additional rules and regulations may apply. Rules are subject to change without notice.

ONLY property owners and PMLA employees on duty will be allowed to park at the Marina parking area on weekends and holidays from Memorial Day Weekend through Labor Day Weekend. Property owners will be required to provide a valid parking sticker or hanging tag.

GCSD Insight By Gus Allegri

Nollowing a cordial and informative discussion with PML President Steve Margossian, in reference to his June article in the PML News. I came to the conclusion that a Board member's perspective of current issues surrounding GCSD operations are long overdue. Like newspapers and the PML Voice, bad news is far more interesting and attention gathering than good news. The notion that the GCSD violated the Brown Act has greater appeal than someone selling a bedroom set at a great bargain. By the way, GCSD has not once been officially found guilty of violating the Brown Act.

And now the hot button in our community, the Long Gulch Ranch development. First of all, "the GCSD Board has made no decision on the annexation of this project to date". Mr. Levin and company have more to do. Until the improvements to the District provided by LGR reach an acceptable level, this Director will not support annexation. At the expense of the Long Gulch Project, the District commissioned City Gate to provide the District with a professional opinion on the impact the above project would have on our fire protection. First of all, this project, when and if completed, would increase our fire protection area by approximately ten percent. It is not, as was suggested, the tipping point requiring massive capital expenditures in the Department. The GCSD Board considered the notion of a \$3,000,000 fire station with an annual operating budget of approximately \$750,000 adjacent to the airport for about as long as it took to read the first sentence. The Groveland, Big Oak Flat, Pine Mountain Lake areas are not currently up to the standards implied by this report. Later this summer it is our intention to conduct a public forum on our community's fire protection. In attendance at this meeting, along with City Gate, will be representatives of the fire and insurance industries. It is the intention of this Board, along with the community and attending professionals, to determine what level of fire protection is necessary, what we can afford and are willing to pay. The Board will make every effort to determine what the public wants and to provide the same. The subject of an alternative fire protection plan was also mentioned. This plan would include the contracting of fire services from Cal Fire. This option has been considered with mixed results. Their labor rates are approximately 30% higher than ours. If, while under contract with our community, an emergency occurs elsewhere, they can be called away. Once the State takes control of our fire department there is no turning back. Cost, standard operating procedures, etc. can be modified and set in place at our expense with little or no recourse. It is an option but one I personally do not support at this time. The alleged \$150,000 operating deficit in the fire Department's 06/07 budget is actually \$44,850. This occurred due to the untimely departure of two employees and the cost of overtime to fill the vacant shifts. Had this exodus not occurred, the Department would have had a balanced budget.

I would like to suggest that prior to posting allegations or concerns about GCSD on the Voice or elsewhere, please express those matters with our General Manager, Jim Goodrich. His office door is always open and he is ready and willing to respond to your questions. From time to time Jim posts very informative articles in the PML News and the Highway Herald. Please take a moment to read them.

Finally, the recent allegations leveled at the District for Long Gulch activity, Brown Act violations, excessive expenditures, and intolerance to the community, etc. do not assist the District or the self-esteem of its employees. Please note on the front page of your PML News, four of the new volunteer firefighters are employees of GCSD. In addition to seeing that you are furnished with safe, State compliant water, your poop disappears each morning, these individuals attended 200 hours of fire science classes in order to further serve your needs. The Board and I are very proud of them. They are entitled to

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your respect and gratitude. Our CFO, John Barnhart is leaving the District for greener pastures. He will, however, continue, on a part time basis, to serve the District. The monumental effort this man put forth in the interest of restructuring GCSD's accounts, bringing three years of audits up to date, arranging capital project financing, etc. is phenomenal. His efforts in arranging current project financing alone saved the District approximately three million dollars. We are loosing yet another exemplary employee, Mr. Jon Sterling. His efforts in operations, staff training, assisting contractors and handling difficult situations has been remarkable. The District will miss him. Like John Barnhart, Jon Sterling will make himself available to the District on an advisory basis. Since coming to this Board I am continually impressed with the professionalism of General Manager, Jim Goodrich, and the performance of the entire staff, its commitment to improve and dedication to the service of this District. You and I are fortunate to have this caliber of a team in place.

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A Day in the Life of a Groveland Firefighter by Fire Chief Shane Warner

by Fire Chief Shane Warner ou would expect the Groveland Fire Department to respond to structure fire calls. But did you know that they also respond to wildland fires, vehicle fires and accidents, including extrications, medical aids, rescues and public service assists?

Last year 55% of the Fire Department's 510 calls were for medical aids. All full-time Fire Department personnel are also EMT's



(Emergency Medical Technicians) that provide basic life support, which is good to have around in a medical emergency, especially if the ambulance is off the hill. When there is a medical emergency, the ambulance and Fire Department respond and are trained to work together to help assure a successful medical outcome.

The fire station is open 24 hours, 7 days a week, working three shifts with, at the very least, an engineer and a firefighter on duty at all times. (Log on to www.grovelandfire. com for more statistics on the Groveland Fire Department.)

Groveland Fire Department personnel don't just hang around the station waiting for 911 calls. There is station maintenance, pre-fire planning with local businesses, daily & weekly apparatus and equipment checks, fire prevention activities, assisting with the fire cadet program and a minimum of two hours of training per shift. Of course, a call for assistance is given priority and is the reason emergency personnel are ready at all times. But our firefighters are also on a tight daily schedule.

They wake-up at 6:00am to be prepared for the shift change of the engineer and firefighter at 7:00. After a quick breakfast, they do daily and more comprehensive weekly engine checks and station maintenance. From 10:00 until the noon lunch break, daily shift training is scheduled. From 13:00 to 16:00, firefighters are required to do special projects, computer work and report writing. This is followed by an hour of physical training before dinner.

This daily training is crucial for firefighters who must be ready to assist the public in physically demanding ways like climbing up ladders and onto roofs, carrying the injured and dragging hose into and around a fire.

But their work is still not done. After dinner the firehouse is cleaned to be ready for the next shift. Typically, the scheduled work day ends around 17:00 but often there are still reports to write and entries in the log book to complete during the evening hours. With 49% of the emergency calls, so far this year, coming in after regular business hours, often the evenings and early mornings are used assisting the public.

Midlife! Musical Delivers Great Laugh Lines

No matter what your age, Midlife! The Crisis Musical gives everyone a reason to laugh. June 29 to August 26 at East Sonora Theatre, Midlife! is sure to make audiences take a second look at growing older. And with Sierra Rep's fast-paced, lively revue, who knew aging could be so, well... funny?

"It's unapologetic," says director-choreographer Scott Viets. "It's not escapism or fantasy. It magnifies real life 200% while putting a 'Saturday Night Live' kind of spin on it, making what could otherwise be a sensitive subject into a hilarious comedy."

Sketch comedy set to a fresh musical score, Midlife takes a comic look at "age old conditions" -- from reading glasses to mammograms, from memory loss to hair loss. No subject is taboo and that makes for many funny moments.

While it focuses on midlife and everything that entails, Viets said, what it really examines is life, not just with humor but also with sentimentality and some truly beautiful moments. "It's not just geared towards older people," he said. "Anyone who's been to the doctor or who can't understand what their mate really means, can identify with what's happening on stage no matter what their age. Everyone can have a good laugh at it because it represents true slices of every day living."

Broadway veterans (and brothers) Bob and Jim Walton wrote the book, music and lyrics for Midlife! and Sierra Rep was lucky enough to get a perusal CD last summer before it was released to regional theatres. Viets and Producing Director Dennis Jones fell in love with it on first listening. "I'm usually skeptical of musical revues," starts Viets. "Often they're nothing more than old songs tied together with a paper thin plot. But the Walton brothers have created an entirely original show with a brand new score that is fresh, witty, intelligent and fun."

The show premiered at one of the country's largest dinner theatres, Chanhassen, and was extended for more than a year. SRT's production will be the Northern California premiere.

Viets considers directing Midlife! a great opportunity for him and for Sierra Rep audiences. "It's rare to get a show that's so brand new that most people haven't even heard of it yet. It feels like a blank slate with no restrictions or blue print for it. And it's always an exciting challenge for a director, actors and other collaborators to work on a show that has no preconceived audience expectations."

Though the show may be light and fun, it requires tremendous skill from its six performers, who not only perform multicharacter roles but also must be strong singers, movers and experts with comedy. The search to find the right actors was a very challenging part of the process, says Viets. "It wasn't easy finding six people of a "certain age" who can carry the complex demands this show requires," explains Viets. "They need to be terrific comedians, able to take on different characters, be fun, engag-

ing, likeable and then sing like Broadway vets. It's a tall order but we found them and I couldn't be more excited. We truly have the cream of the crop."

Viets will be reuniting with three actors he has worked with before at Sierra Rep: Laura Hanna (nee Goodman), from State Fair, Daraj Maxfield (Hello, Dolly!, CATS, Moonlight and Magnolias) and Freddy Geils (The Full Monty and Charley's Aunt).

"We're also very excited to get Leslie Alexander on our stage," Viets said.

"She was in the original Broadway casts of Mamma Mia and The Boy from Oz. I'm also pleased to announce the SRT debuts of Craig L. Davis, who just finished a run of Midlife! in Florida, directed by the original creators, and Jennylind Parris who has performed regionally in such shows as Beehive and I Love You, You're Perfect, Now Change.

Viets is also eager to work with set designer Randall A. Enlow again, who designed the superb set for SRT's The Full Monty two years ago. "He's incredibly imaginative and creative. He called me months ago to tell me his concept for this show and I got chills the moment I heard it. His set design for Midlife! is going to be a visually exciting element unlike anything seen on most stages before and is going to give me as a director many more avenues and possibilities to work with than imagined. It's brilliant -- you'll just have to come see the show to see what I mean!"

The original score of Midlife! calls for live music--a single piano on stage, with musical direction by John C. Brown. "John C. Brown (Thoroughly Modern Millie) is our musical director, a real cracker jack," says Viets. "This show has some really complex harmonies and John does a great job finding a good blend with the actors."

There's also a potential opportunity to work with the original creators of Midlife. "We're working with Bob and Jim Walton to try their new orchestrations that includes bass and drums, in addition to the piano. They're interested in coming out here so we'll see what happens."

Joining set designer Randall A. Enlow is lighting designer Christopher Van Tuyl, costume designer Laury Conley, property manager Jen Fletcher and SRT resident stage manager Ben Loverin.

arlier this year the private owners of the 1852 stone-construction Wells Fargo Building aka Gamble Building in Big Oak Flat offered the property to the Southern Tuolumne County Historical Society (STCHS), along with \$10,000 in cash at the transfer of title. A committee consisting of four STCHS board members was formed to explore this opportunity. The committee has added additional members from county, state and federal agencies that have experience and expertise in such endeavors. The committee has prepared and published a 12 page prospectus describing the property being offered to STCHS as well as additional properties in the immediate vicinity that could be incorporated into a larger park-like setting for tourism and historical displays. Approximately 100 of the prospectus were mailed to viable organizations throughout the country that may find this project of

interest. Response has been good as well as offers of support and assistance. A copy of the prospectus can be viewed at the STCHS web site; www.grovelandmuseum.org. The ultimate goal of this project, a Historic District featuring the two 1850's gold rush era stone buildings, the "hardrock" era Longfellow Gold Stamp Mill and the Hetch Hetchy water and electric project's rail bed, all in a park-like setting could become a catalyst for economic rehabilitation of Big Oak Flat. A project of this magnitude could make Big Oak Flat and Groveland a primary destination for tourists and visitors throughout the world. On June 25th, 2007 the STCHS board of directors will call for a vote as to whether the historic society will accept ownership of the Wells Fargo Building, or turn down the offer. I shall report on the outcome in the next edition of this newsletter.

Te have had a lot of activity around GCSD over the last month or two, from water treatment and skate parks to, certainly not least, Long Gulch Ranch.

After nearly 4 years of planning, design and construction, the water treatment plants have been upgraded and are working far better than we expected. Many thanks are due to the GCSD Operations and Engineering staff for putting together a great project.

We will be starting construction in July or August on the Alternative Water Supply Treatment Plant. The plant, which will be located in the PMLA corporation yard, will pull water from Pine Mountain Lake in the winter months when the Hetch Hetchy Mountain Tunnel is shutdown for repairs. The construction that you will see will be near the corner of Tannahill Drive and Mueller Drive.

As I type this article, skate park ramps are being unloaded at Mary's Park. District Engineer Randy Klaahsen is overseeing the volunteer effort to assemble the ramps, which will take about 4 days to complete.

At the June 11th Board Meeting, the Board passed a resolution honoring Merle and Charlie "The Can Man" Heath for their extraordinary efforts in seeing the Skate Park dream come true. The Skate Park will be named in their honor. A formal dedication ceremony will be (was)

held on Saturday, June 16th by the GCSD Board.

GCSD would also like to extend its sincerest thanks to the Skate Park Committee (Frank Oyung, Rolene Kiesling, David Volponi, Merle Heath, and Rick Schone), the Sonora Area Foundation, and the multitude of volunteers who have made the Skate Park a reality.

The Long Gulch Ranch development has been a long and contentious issue for many in our community. With emotions running in high gear, many people have said disparaging things that under normal circumstances perhaps would not have been stated. The Board wanted me to pass on to you their many thanks for your patience as they deliberate over this complex and emotional issue. At the end of the Board meeting on June 11th, they issued the following statement:

"The Board, after weighing all information and testimony received to date, remains concerned about the Long Gulch Ranch project. Furthermore, the Board has not made any decision on annexation. The Board has always been committed to following the law and remains concerned about the Long Gulch Ranch development's compliance with environmental laws, including CEQA. The Board has not and will not make any decision regarding annexation until these issues have been resolved to the Board's satisfaction.'
