A few weeks ago we received the new weed harvester which was ordered during the off season. It is a replica of the one used by Fish & Game and is a no nonsense machine. This machine will enable our staff to keep various plants from taking over the shallow areas of the lake. It replaces an old and tired machine which was rapidly becoming unsafe to use. We should see a significant improvement in our efforts to control waterborne weeds this year.

The new ADA ramp at the swimming pool is complete. You will notice that entry to the swimming pool has changed and that a new ADA restroom has been added to enable our disabled members to enjoy this amenity. It's been a long time coming because ADA rules require all aspects of the amenity to be in compliance. The swimming pool was a difficult and expensive changeover. It is now done and ready to use.

We have a new Country Club Man-

ager. He is Jay Reis and is a welcome addition to our staff. Jay has been working with Bambi, Janet and Charlie to continue the progress we have been making in improving the quality of food and service at the Country Club. Drop by and introduce yourself to Jay. I am sure you will be as pleased with Jay as we have been.

Our financials for last month and the year to date have been mixed. We have been doing well up until the terrible weather for Memorial Day. The bad weather set us back, but in spite of the sluggish economy, we have been holding our own and expect to continue to do well as the summer progresses. The sluggish economy has also had an effect on late payment of assessments. We have seen an increase in late payments and an increase in delinquent payments. This is forcing us to send more delinquencies into collection this year than we have needed to in recent years. It is our policy to try to find a plan to avoid sending delinquent payments to collection but cooperation is necessary. If you have received notice of late or delinquent payment, please contact our administration office.

The legal action against current and former directors initiated by our former General Manager has been dismissed as I reported in last month's PML News. However, the actions brought against the Association by him continue to be delayed. We had hoped to have news to report but unfortunately we are still in the process of litigating and cannot discuss the actions until they are settled.

General Manager's Message

New Country Club Manager

We recently hired a new Country Club Manager. His name is Jay Reis and he comes to us from Sunnyvale, California where he was born and raised. Jay has 25+ years as a professional in the restaurant business. He has managed restaurants like El Torito and Armadillo Willy's and loves working with people. We are pleased to have Jay as our Manager and look forward to working with him. Stop by the Club and introduce yourself. Jay would like to meet you.

What are the white markings on PML roads?

The white paint markings on PML streets were put there by our roads engineering consultant. The roads engineering firm is contracted to perform evaluations and onsite work for our roads refurbishment and asphalt overlay projects. The work they just performed is for the 2008/2009 Roads Rehabilitation Project which is tentatively scheduled for spring of 2009. PMLA has moved to a biannual roads program. Combining two years gives us more bang for our buck. We estimate saving between \$60K to \$100K by combining 2008 and 2009 work. The markings you see on the roads are declinations and marked areas for cutouts for this project.

No Illegal Personal Fireworks!

We are in the heart of the fire season and we are notifying all members, guests and renters that fireworks are illegal in Tuolumne County and Pine Mountain Lake. All members are encouraged to be on the lookout for any unsafe fire practices, especially illegal fireworks use. Report all incidents immediately to the Main Gate, Department of Safety at 962-8615.

Fire Abatement Project and Future Policy

The Fire Abatement Project continues with fire abatement work by our contractor. 60% of the fire abatement work in the treatment area three green belt between Units 8 and 13 has been completed. We are preparing to perform handwork and cleanup of these areas sometime this month.

Members of the Fire Abatement Task Force, the Board and management met last month to work on updating our current Fire Safety Policy. As the threat of fire damage increases with drought conditions, we are taking steps to adopt more stringent policies. We should have a solid draft recommendation to the Board within the next two months.

Fire Safety Inspections

Our Fire Safety Coordinator, Larry Woodruff has performed inspections of member lots and sent out notices to members that need to have their lots cleared for the fire season. The deadline for compliance was June 15th and members that have lots out of compliance will be receiving notices in the mail. We encourage all members to bring their property into compliance to keep PML safe from fire.

Fire Prevention Guidebook

The PML Fire Prevention Guidebook is in this July issue of the PML News and posted to the PML Website for easy member access. Members can also pick up a copy at the Administration Office. All members should take the time to review the Guidebook as it contains a lot of great information on how to make their property fire safe. Members that have questions can also contact

our Fire Safety Coordinator, Larry Woodruff at 962-8616.

Dam Inspection

The annual Dam inspection was conducted and we came through again with flying colors. Engineers and inspectors from the State Division of Dam Safety performed an onsite inspection and made recommendations to staff for some minor repairs. This work combined with the annual Dam survey and diver inspection will culminate in a report from the State agency indicating satisfactory compliance.

Lake Dredging Project

The final environmental document went to the County and the State to be sent out for the 30 day public review period. The project's progress remains on track for this year and our consultant is staying on the County and other agencies to push this through. PML members that receive their public comment input form from the County are asked to provide a positive response so that we can finalize the permit and get moving on the actual project.

Town Hall Meeting July 19: Property Owner Comments Solicited

he PML Long Range Planning Committee (LRPC) would like to invite any and all property owners to a town hall meeting on Saturday July 19, 2008, at the Lake Lodge. The meeting will occur immediately after the regularly scheduled monthly PMLA Board of Directors meeting, which starts at 9:00am. The start time for the town hall meeting is expected to be approximately 10:30am.

The primary purpose of the meeting is to give property owners the opportunity to share verbal comments on the two recently conducted member surveys. The overall association/amenity survey was conducted in late 2007 and received 600+ responses while the PML Country Club restaurant survey just ended in May 2008 and received 250+ responses.

The LRPC will review the findings

and recommendations it has reached using the survey results. If you did (or did not!) take the time to complete the survey, this town hall meeting will give you a chance to share your opinions and comments on the state of PML operations, current amenity status, and suggested plans for future improvements.

The input received at this meeting will be a factor in determining the budget for 2009 as well as setting priorities for actions in the following 3-5 years.

At the meeting the committee will also give an update on the "fire abatement program" that was started this year. This is a multi-year program that will dramatically help protect and preserve our community if a major fire threatens us.

Please plan to attend and provide your perspective on making PML even better in the years ahead.





We are continuing to use our cart path edger. This is a slow process with all of our other priorities and the need to go very slow while operating the edger. We have made some in-house repairs to the cart paths and will continue this project as time permits. There are some areas that are quite bumpy and we are repairing those first to prevent any damage to golf carts.

With the way fuel prices have risen, it has an impact on all of us. As a unit we are always trying to find new ways to do the same job while conserving fuel. Later in the summer, as the grass slows down it's growth, we might try to do a

little less mowing of the lower priority areas to conserve.

It was another dry late winter and spring. Our irrigation season started earlier than normal. We must be aware of water conservation, so any time we have the chance (cooler temps) we will use less water in the roughs and perimeters.

As I write this, it is still early June and it appears to me that more players are repairing their ball marks or maybe hitting less greens. Whatever the reason, please keep up the good work and observe the cart rules, such as the 90-degree rule, to eliminate soil compaction.


To watch the parade, mark your calendars for 6:00pm on July 5, come out to the Marina or Lake Lodge beach, and cheer on the boats as they sail by.

Rattlesnake Safety

You may be driving along and all of a sudden there's one in the road. Warmer means rattlesnakes are coming out. They're normally in grass and rocks. But you never know where they could be lurking.

If you happen to come upon a rattlesnake, walk the other way. The best thing to do is always watch your step.

The dos and don'ts in snake country:

Be aware that startled rattlesnakes may not rattle before striking defensively. There are several safety measures that can be taken to reduce the likelihood of startling a rattlesnake.

-Never go barefoot or wear sandals when walking through wild areas. Wear hiking boots.

-When hiking, stick to well-used trails and wear over-the-ankle boots and loose-fitting long pants. Avoid tall grass, weeds and heavy underbrush where snakes may hide during the day.

-Do not step or put your hands where you cannot see, and avoid wandering around in the dark. Step ON logs and rocks, never over them, and be especially careful when climbing rocks or gathering firewood. Check out stumps or logs before sitting down, and shake out sleeping bags before use.

-Never grab "sticks" or "branches" while swimming in lakes and rivers. Rattlesnakes can swim.

-Be careful when stepping over the doorstep as well. Snakes like to crawl along the edge of buildings where they are protected on one side.

-Never hike alone. Always have someone with you who can assist in an emergency.

-Do not handle a freshly killed snake, it can still inject venom.

-Teach children to respect snakes and leave them alone. Children are naturally curious and will pick up snakes.

If you get bit, the California Poison **Control Center advises:**

- 1. Stav Calm
- 2. Wash bite area gently with soap and
- 3. Remove watch, rings, etc. that may constrict swelling
- 4. Immobilize the affected area
- 5. Transport safely to nearest medical facility.

Quagga/Zebra Mussel Risk to Pine Mountain Lake

ue to the extreme potential danger of the Quagga/Zebra Mussel entering our Lake, we are forced to take direct measures to mitigate the risk of its impact. The Quagga/Zebra Mussel is an invasive species that propagates quickly and causes a lot of damage to boats, engines and property. The mussel is carried and transported easily from boat to lake every time a boat is moved

from one location to another. Southern California lakes like Lake Mead, Lake Havasu and some Bay Area waterways have already been infected. This risk has forced us to adopt a new emergency policy for the launching of watercraft onto Pine Mountain Lake.


All watercraft will be subject to an inspection by PML staff prior to launching into Pine Mountain Lake. During the inspection we will be asking boat owners where their watercraft was stored or used during the off-season and we have a form to be completed by the owner that will be used to help us track and identify risk. PML staff will be available 9:00 am through 8:00 pm, seven days a week at the boat launch area to assist boat owners. There will be a physical inspection of your watercraft and trailer (Main Marina and Dunn Court slips) before it can be admitted onto Pine Mountain Lake. This is intended for power boats, fishing boats, pontoon boats, sailboats, kayaks, canoes, row boats, paddle boats or any other device that is capable of retaining water and transporting mussels.

Our staff will do everything they can to make the process as smooth as possible, but there will be times when multiple boats will be lined up for inspection and we appreciate your anticipated support. We recommend calling the Marina Store ahead of time to get an indication of the number of members preparing to launch and we will do what we can to get members launched as quickly as possible.

Also, we ask that any watercraft that have been docked on private docks year round be entered into our system. Please stop by and see our Marina Manager, Ron Prieto or his staff to complete this process. For more information please call 962-8631.

What boaters can do to stem the spread of invasive quagga/zebra mussels

- Be aware that transferring a boat that has been in infested waters will allow the spread of quagga mussels, or the closely related zebra mussels.
- Thoroughly wash the hull of each fishing boat, sailboat, or personal watercraft once it leaves the water. This is especially important if the vessel has been moored for more than a day.
- Use hot water from a high-pressure hose when possible during all cleaning operations. The use of chlorine in the cleaning process is also recommended.
- Thoroughly wash any watercraft trailer used to remove a boat from a lake, river or waterway. Use hot water from a high-pressure hose when possible, or use chlorine in the cleaning process.
- Physically inspect all exposed surfaces. The presence of guagga mussels will feel like sandpaper to the touch.
- Remove aquatic plants from boat, motor and trailer. Check all underwater fittings and equipment, such as rollers, axle, bilge and trailer, and above water equipment, such as anchors, live wells, and docks. Place aquatic plants in trash if possible.
- Drain any lake or river water from equipment including the motor, bilges, live wells, bait buckets, and coolers. Ensure all drained areas are dry.
- Ensure the watercraft's lower outboard unit is drained and dry.
- Dispose of unwanted live bait on shore or in trash.
- Any vessel traveling from Lake Mead, Lake Mohave, Lake Havasu, the Colorado River, or lakes that receive water from the Colorado Aqueduct, including: Lake Skinner (Riverside County), Lake Mathews (Riverside County), San Vicente Reservoir (San Diego County), Dixon Lake (San Diego County), Lower Otay Reservoir (San Diego County), and Lake Murray (San Diego County) should remain dry and out of water for five days.
- For personal watercraft, impeller areas can contain quagga and zebra mussels and aquatic plants. Once upon the trailer, run the engine for five to 10 seconds to blow out excess water, mussels and plants. Before leaving water access, inspect and remove any mussels or plants from intake, steering nozzle, hull, and trailer.
- Exercise patience at Department of Fish and Game vehicle checkpoints and Department of Food and Agriculture border inspection stations.

Assistant to the General Manager, Rick Whybra, and Marina Manager, Ron Prieto, attended invasive species workshops at the Stockton Yacht Club and Don Pedro Marina. They brought back a lot of great information on the impact and mitigation of the quagga/ zebra mussel.


As PML members continue to launch their boats in Pine Mountain Lake, we are taking steps to fight the transportation of invasive species. Part of the process is signage and education. It is important that Lake Users become informed and take precautions to keep our lake healthy. We will continue to post the latest information to the PML Website and publish articles in the PML News. All PML boaters are asked to be aware of this potential danger to PML and take the necessary precautions. 

By contaminating recreational watercraft and commercial haulers from infested waters:

- **Many Southern California freshwaters**
- Most waters east of the Continental Divide
- Waters along the Colorado River drainage
- All of the Great Lakes and their tributaries
- Lake Mead, NV/AZ and waters it feeds

Don't let them ruin your boat or California's waters!

When leaving the water:


- Inspect all exposed surfaces small mussels feel like sandpaper to the touch.
- Wash the hull of each watercraft thoroughly.
- Remove all plants and animal material.
- Drain all water and dry all areas.
- Drain and dry the lower outboard unit.
- Clean and dry all live-wells.
- Empty and dry any buckets.
- Dispose of all bait in the trash.
- Wait 5 days and keep watercraft dry between launches into different fresh waters.



QUAGGA/ZEBRA MUSSEL FACT SHEET

State and federal agencies have initiated a unified response to the quagga mussel invasion in California. The involved agencies include the Departments of Fish and Game (DFG), Water Resources, Food and Agriculture, Boating and Waterways, Parks and Recreation; U.S. Fish and Wildlife, National Park Service, and Bureau of Reclamation; Metropolitan Water District and the City of San Diego Water Department; and multiple local authorities.

History of quagga mussels in North America

- Arrived from Europe in the 1980s
- Spread to many eastern waterways, rivers and lakes
- Found in Lake Mead in Arizona on Jan. 6, 2007, and later throughout Lake Mead's lower basin
- Found in Lakes Mojave and Havasu in the Colorado River Jan. 17
- Summer 2007 in the Colorado River Aqueduct System
- Recently found in San Diego County in San Vicente Reservoir, Lake Murray Reservoir, Lower Otay Reservoir, and Lake Dixon and in Riverside County in Lake Skinner and Lake Mathews.

Economic impact

U.S. Congressional researchers estimated that an infestation of the closely-related zebra mussel in the Great Lakes area cost the power industry \$3.1 billion in the 1993-1999 period, with an economic impact on industries, businesses, and communities of more than \$5 billion.

In California, spread of the mussel threatens water delivery systems, hydroelectric facilities, agriculture, recreational boating and fishing, and the environment in general.

Quagga:

- Typically the same size as a fingernail but can grow up to about 2 inches long.
- Common color patterns vary wildly with black, cream, or white bands
- Habitat varies they can colonize both hard and soft surfaces in freshwater, from the surface to more than 400 feet in depth.
- Arrived in the U.S. from the Ukraine in 1989

Zebra:

- Typically the same size as a fingernail but can grow up to about 2 inches long
- Commonly have alternating dark and light stripes
- Inhabit fresh water at depths from 4 to 180 feet (most commonly 6-12 feet) and prefer hard surfaces
- Arrived in the U.S. in 1988 from Europe

Both mussels:

- Produce young (larva) that are too small to see with the naked eye, but newly settled young feel like sandpaper on smooth surfaces
- May release over 40,000 eggs in a reproductive cycle and up to 1 million in a spawning season
- Attach to aquatic plants, boats, motors, trailers, and recreation equipment or can be present in water (in addition to substrates, docks, piers, anchors, etc)
- As they grow, can be seen on boat hulls, especially around trim tabs, transducers, along keels, and on lower units and propellers
- Can be found in bilges, live wells and motors
- · Can survive three to five days out of water depending upon temperature and humidity





"Angels in the Wilderness"

The True Story of One Woman's Survival Against All Odds

This first-person account tells how author Amy Racina survived for four days and nights, both legs badly broken, in a remote valley in California's Sierra Nevada mountains after a sixtyfoot fall during a solo hiking trip. Battling pain, fear and exhaustion, she pulled herself along with her hands, and refused to give up even when her chances of salvation were remote. The book chronicles her miraculous rescue, and describes her dramatic airlift out of the canyon, swinging helplessly from two straps, dangling fearfully beneath a helicopter high above the ravine where she had lain.

The book recounts her struggles with multiple surgeries and extensive physical rehabilitation as she fought to walk again despite her severe injuries. It also encompasses the deeper reflections that shaped the authors' life after the fall and concludes with her triumphant return to the wilderness.

It is an amazing tale of despair and courage and hope. It speaks of incred-

ible strength and heartbreaking weakness as it details what one woman believed might be the last days of her life. It is a memory of the darkest of times and an affirmation of miracles. It is a celebration of a life almost snatched away, of survival against the odds.

Amy Racina was born in 1956 in Baltimore, Maryland. She now lives in Healdsburg, California with two cats and her teenage son, Sam.

After working as a freelance graphic artist for two decades, with a specialty in package design, she then became a writer and entrepreneur and currently runs three small businesses.

Her writing has been featured in such diverse publications as Wee Wisdom, Loving More Magazine, 52 Best and SAW Mail 5020.

Rarely is she without a cause to support, a group to organize, an enthusiasm to pursue. Active in local organizations of various sorts, she leads hikes and women's groups, organizes community events, and participates in a women's writing group.

An eager traveler, she has journeyed all over the world by herself. She especially loves camping, hiking, and backpacking.

Introduced to backpacking at 16, Amy began soloing in her early twenties. She has trekked hundreds of miles through the wilderness that she loves, especially in the high country of the Sierra Nevada Mountain Range and particularly in Kings Canyon/Sequoia National Parks.

Just nine months after the near-fatal fall chronicled in Angels in the Wilderness, Amy headed again for the wilderness with her pack, backpacking once again. The medical professionals who had treated her were amazed but people who knew her were not. They had no doubt that she would defy the odds and hike once again in the wilderness she loves.



10 oz Spinach (or Mixed Greens) 3/4 Pint Strawberries, sliced 1/4" thick 1/2 Cup Red Onions, very thinly sliced 3/4 lb Bacon

1/2 Cup Pine Nuts or Slivered Almonds, toasted

1 Cup Olive or Peanut Oil

2 Tbsp Cider Vinegar

1/2 tsp Celery Seeds

1/2 tsp Mustard, dry

2-1/2 Tbsp Sugar

1/2 tsp Salt

1/4 tsp White or Black Pepper (freshly ground)

Slice bacon slices 1/2 inch wide, sauté until browned and crisp; drain on paper towels. Pine nuts may be toasted in a sauté pan over medium high heat with a teaspoon of olive oil; toss frequently until lightly browned; allow to cool on a paper towel.

Just before serving time, toss 1/2 of the bacon, 1/2 of the pine nuts, spinach, straw-





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


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Governor Declares **Drought**By Jim Goodrich, GCSD General Manager

n early June, Governor Schwarzenegger declared that California is officially in a drought. We are in our second year of below average rainfall, snowmelt runoff, and court-ordered restrictions to water transfers. The action being taken this year is to ask our customers to voluntarily conserve water. Our target at GCSD is a 10% voluntary reduction in water use.

GCSD has some helpful tips for you to use in saving water. You can go to the District's website (www.gcsd.org/water. htm and click on Conserving Water) or come into the office to get a flyer with these tips. Most of these tips are common sense, like only using your washing machine or dishwasher with full loads and not over-watering your landscaping.

The last time we called for voluntary 10% conservation, the community responded with a 25% reduction in water use. So, I'm confident you can do your part in conserving water in this time of

Droughts are nothing new to California. And despite the recent media hype, this is by no means our worst drought on record. To place our current situation in perspective, I've clipped the following short article from the California Department of Water Resources' website (for the complete article and other related links, go to http://watersupplyconditions.water.ca.gov/background.cfm).

Defining Drought

One dry year does not normally constitute a drought in California, but serves as a reminder of the need to plan for droughts. California's extensive system of water supply infrastructure - its reservoirs, groundwater basins, and interregional conveyance facilities - mitigates the effect of short-term dry periods for most water users. Defining when a drought begins is a function of drought impacts to water users. Hydrologic conditions constituting a drought for water users in one location may not constitute a drought for water users elsewhere, or for water users having a different water supply. Individual water suppliers may use criteria such as rainfall/runoff, amount of water in storage, or expected supply from a water wholesaler to define their water supply conditions.

The graphic below illustrates several indicators commonly used to evaluate California water conditions. The percent of average values are determined for measurement sites and reservoirs in each of the State's ten major hydrologic regions. Snowpack is an important indicator of runoff from Sierra Nevada watersheds, the source of much of California's developed water supply.

Drought is a gradual phenomenon. Although droughts are sometimes characterized as emergencies, they differ from typical emergency events. Most natural disasters, such as floods or forest fires, occur relatively rapidly and afford little time for preparing for disaster response. Droughts occur slowly, over a multi-year period. There is no universal definition of when a drought begins or ends. Impacts of drought are typically felt first by those most reliant on annual rainfall -- ranchers engaged in dryland grazing, rural residents relying on wells in low-yield rock formations, or small water systems lacking a reliable source. Criteria used to identify statewide drought conditions do not address these localized impacts. Drought impacts in-



crease with the length of a drought, as carry-over supplies in reservoirs are depleted and water levels in groundwater basins decline.

Past California Droughts:

Droughts exceeding three years are relatively rare in Northern California, the source of much of the State's developed water supply. The 1929-34 drought established the criteria commonly used in designing storage capacity and yield of large Northern California reservoirs. The table below compares the 1929-34 drought in the Sacramento and San Joaquin Valleys to the 1976-77 and 1987-92 droughts. The driest single year of California's

measured hydrologic record was 1977. California's most recent multi-year statewide drought was 1987-92.

Severity of Extreme Droughts in the Sacramento and San Joaquin Valleys



Measured hydrologic data for droughts prior to 1900 are minimal. Multi-year dry periods in the second half of the 19th century can be qualitatively identified from the limited records available combined with historical accounts, as illustrated in the figure below, but the severity of the dry periods cannot be directly quantified.



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The Dumbbell Nebula

he Dumbbell Nebula was the first planetary nebula ever discovered. A planetary nebula is a glowing shell of gas formed by certain types of stars at the end of their lives. They are relatively short-lived, lasting a few tens of thousands of years, compared to a typical stellar lifetime of several billion years.

Like most planetary nebulae, the distance of the Dumbbell Nebula is not very well known – most scientists have adopted a value of 1,200 light years. Recent Hubble Space Telescope images have revealed that many planetary nebulae have extremely complex shapes and exhibit vibrant colors. About one in five are roughly spherical, but the majority are not spherically symmetric.

Stars that often become planetary nebulae spend most of their lifetime shining as a result of nuclear fusion reactions converting hydrogen to helium in its core. The energy released in the fusion reactions prevents the star from collapsing under its own gravity, and the star is stable. After several billion years, the star runs out of hydrogen, and there is no longer enough energy flowing out from the core to support the outer layers of the star. The core thus contracts and heats up. Then, the outer layers of the star expand enormously because of the very high temperature of the core, and become much cooler. Eventually huge pulsations build up, which become large enough to throw off the outer gases of the star into space. These ejected gases form a cloud of material around the

exposed core of the star. As more and more of the atmosphere moves away from the star, deeper and deeper layers at higher and higher temperatures of the star's core are exposed. When the exposed core reaches a high enough temperature the outer gases that have been ejected begin to ionize and glow. Thus a planetary nebula is born.

Our Sun will probably produce a planetary nebula in about 5 billion years. These nebulae have nothing at all to do with planets; the terminology was invented because they often look a little like planets in small telescopes. Typical planetary nebulas are less than one light-year across and are generally faint objects; none are visible to the naked eye. Long-exposure time astrophotography is used to reveal what the human eye can't see. Today's digital camera sensors have the benefit of acting like a bucket that collect photons (light) - the longer the exposure, the more light (color and details) that's captured and displayed in the photograph.

Taking a photograph of the detail shown in this image of the Dumbbell Nebula requires a telescope mount that can accurately track the sky over long periods of time and very long exposure time with a camera. This was one of the astro-photographs where I manually "hand-guided" the telescope while the photographs were taken. I use two telescopes when taking my astro-photographs. The "image scope", in this case an Orion ED 80 Refractor, has the camera attached to it - and the second



is a "guide scope" that I use to keep the camera perfectly aligned on the object that I'm photographing. Hand-guided means that I control the movement of the telescope mount to make any adjustments while the camera shutter is open. Photographs that I don't "hand-guide" are often "auto-guided" with a separate camera that controls the movement of the telescope mount via a computer. Precise tracking of the "image scope" is critical as tracking errors quickly elongate stars in a photograph, and then they look oblong or like streaks.

To create this final image of the Dumbbell Nebula, several separate photographs were taken with exposure times of about 10 to 15 minutes each. Then, the individual photographs are digitally "stacked" one on top of another to create the final image. In the case

of this image of the Dumbbell Nebula, there is a total exposure time of 44 minutes. When looking at this image, one can imagine it's formation from a centrally located star whose outer gasses have been thrown out into space and have formed this expanding and glowing planetary nebula.

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

Forget Me Not

In 1999 Jennifer Lowe's husband, Alex Lowe, died tragically in an avalanche on the Himalayan mountain Shishapangma, leaving her alone to raise three sons. Alex was widely considered one of the greatest modern climbers and the world mourned his loss – Tom Brokaw did a one-hour special for Dateline, and Sting narrated and composed music for a tribute film, The Endless Knot.

While Jenni and her sons faced the absence of a husband and father, Alex's longtime climbing partner, Conrad Anker, who survived the accident that killed Lowe, faced his own grief and survivor's guilt. Jenni and Conrad gradually, and unexpectedly, found solace in each other, fell in love, and were married in Italy in 2001. Conrad is now the adoptive father of the three Lowe children, Max, Sam and Isaac.

Through letters and expedition notes from Alex, Forget Me Not spans continents and tells the story of three people whose lives intertwine to a degree they could never have imagined. Jenni's account takes readers inside a woman's heart and mind as she navigates her shattered life and survives, ultimately finding transformative love through loss. From the valleys of Montana to the peaks of the Himalayas, this is the story of growing up, falling in love, finding adventure, rejoicing in parenthood, living through heartbreak, and believing in possibility.

Jennifer Lowe-Anker is a world traveler, artist, author, mother, and foundation president. outhside Senior Service Inc., Little House face-lifting project led by SSSI Board Director and Groveland Rotarian, Ron Michaelis, made significant progress in the month of June. Thanks to the many Rotary and community volunteers who have given their time, labor and expertise to complete painting, installation of lighting fixtures, and preparation for floor covering. New flooring was also installed in the main

Little House building.

An important question was raised recently that bears answering immediately as we progress with this project. The question raised is "Why is SSSI launching the Little House project when many individuals in our community have been working to obtain land and raise the necessary funds to build the GATHER-ING PLACE?" In other words, are we wasting valuable time and resources on

this smaller project?

The answer to this important question is that after long and careful consideration, the SSSI Board of Directors decided to take the opportunity offered to us by Tuolumne County, (up to 10 year lease option of the Little House at \$1.00 a year!).

The board's goal is to see how we can make our Mission work: "to create a lifelong learning environment for active adults that encourages social interaction, activities, education and provides services, nutrition and health services and legal support in a friendly atmosphere...where no one is a stranger".

The board decided in 2007 that this was a great opportunity to test our skills in the design and delivery of programs and services on a smaller scale before embarking on the full operation and management of a much larger facility. It also provided us with the opportunity to promote and increase our community volunteer participation in a much higher level of planning, designing and delivering of all these activities.

After inspection of the land and facilities at the 11699 Merrell Road site, the board agreed that the 'pilot' project' was do-able and the facilities and grounds needed considerable attention to turn the site into an attractive, safe, warm and welcoming venue for our active adult community.

Many are already aware a Little House Team worked hard to seek funding to pay for essential face-lifting and necessary equipment and furnishings. We were successful and, as previously reported in this publication, received a \$50,000. allocation from the Irving J. Symons and Sonora Area Foundations.

Please note: The equipment and furnishings will later be moved to the newly constructed GATHERING PLACE when the facility is built.

Groveland Rotary and other community supporters are lending their creative talents, labor and resources to make our 'short term' project successful.

We have also launched two fund raising projects to pay for operational costs for maintaining the facility and support program delivery. The first was a successful holiday sale of poinsettias during the 2007 season.

Presently we are selling, for only \$20.00, the emergency strobe light "Life Locators" with pre-order forms and ready supplies now available at the desk at Coldwell Banker. Liz Mattingly is available to make the sales and answer your questions and can be reached at 962-7648.

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

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
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
