Standard Disclaimer: The following comments reflect my personal opinions and do not necessarily represent the views of any other Board member or the management of PML.

Speaking of fire (you like that transition), there is a potential firestorm brewing. GCSD has just commissioned a fire study that recommends that a new firehouse be built out by the airport to the tune of about \$3,000,000 plus operating expenses. To fund this project, it has been proposed that a new Special Fire District be created that would encompass the Long Gulch Ranch and the vacant lots within that service area including the northeast portion of PML. The details are still a little murky but the bottom line sounds like a continuing annual assessment of about \$1050 per lot. Based on what I can glean from the report is that this would apply to approximately 30% of the GCSD ratepayers.

But wait, there's more! The fire district currently has an annual operating deficit of about \$190,000. This has to made-up somehow. Guess where that money coming from? You got it, you! Now I know that the GCSD Board members are doing the best they can but this situation is getting out of hand and has to stop. They need to start looking at controlling expenses and at different solutions to the problems such as contracting it out to California Fire (CDF) and getting the County to pay more of their fair share. A lot of folks stand to be priced out of their homes. It's time to voice your concerns and stand up and be counted. We need to put a stop to these continuing little surprises.

Now from our bits and pieces file, the Club has instituted a completely new menu and from personal experience and the feedback we've had, people really like. You might want to check it out. Also check out the new look at the Stables now that the fencing project is complete. It came in on schedule and under budget. Good work people. Finally, just a reminder, the annual 4th of July fireworks display will be held on Saturday, June 30th so be sure and mark your calendars.

We ask that everyone refrain from drinking heavily until after the meeting. The Club opens for Breakfast at 8 a.m. and Lunch at 11a.m. so it will be very convenient for members to try out the new menu before or after the meeting.

#### **Fire Abatement**

The Fire Abatement Program is in full swing. It is important that all members do everything they can to keep PML Fire Safe. Our Fire Safety Coordinator, Larry Woodruff will be inspecting lots and sending out notices to owners that do no comply with the Fire Safety Program. You will save all of us a lot of time and money by properly clearing your lot by the deadline. Remember, all lots must be in compliance by June 15, 2007. #### WI-FI Access at the Country Club and Marina

The Country Club and Marina now provide free wireless Internet access for members and customers. Members can now work on their laptops and still enjoy the Lake, fresh air and mountain views. #### **Lake Dredging Project**

The secondary environmental impact study is complete and the draft EIS report is being reviewed by our consultants at Moffat and Nichol. It is our hope that these will be the last of the requirements from Tuolumne County so that we can satisfy the concerns of all the other agencies involved and gain the granting of permits so that we can start our dredging project.

#### **Main Gate Entrance Project**

Our engineering firm has surveyed the area and prepared the necessary topographical plot maps for our architect. Once we have the final plans they will be submitted to the County for permit and we will put the project out to bid.

### Roads Repair and Refurbishment Project

The Roads project is nearly complete for this year. Our contractor is scheduled to finish the rest of the designated roads by the end of next week prior to Memorial Day Weekend and the paint striping contractor has already begun his portion of the project. The million dollar project is ahead of schedule and under budget. Once the project is complete our roads engineering firm will prepare the new 5-year roads study. This study is an important and useful tool so that the Association will have good information to plan for the future funding and maintenance of our roads.

#### PMLA BOATING AND LAKE RULES Draft A

or your safety, California Boating Laws prevail. For your convenience, copies of the pamphlet "ABC's of California Boating Laws," published by the California Harbors and Watercraft are available at the Marina Store.

Listed below are further regulations that apply to Pine Mountain Lake boating usage. Failure to comply with them shall be grounds for termination of your privileges. Violations are subject to citation. All boats are subject to inspection to determine compliance with State Law and Association requirements. If you have any questions on the safety requirements of your boat, contact a Boat Patrol Officer or the Marina Store staff.

#### **GENERAL BOATING RULES**

Know our rules and abide by them for your enjoyment and safety.

All boats on Pine Mountain Lake must meet both State of California and Pine Mountain Lake registration requirements. Only property owners in good standing may register their boats.

REGISTRATION: Requirements for registration include: current liability insurance with a minimum of \$300,000, proof of PML residency, proof that the

boat meets California Boating Law safety requirements, compliance with PML nonwake enhancing requirements, and agreement to abide by lake rules.

PML non-wake enhancing regulations restrict the use of internal ballast tanks, external fins, foils, panels, or boat hulls specifically designed to increase wakes. Any boats incorporating these devices, registered at PML must adhere to PML's restrictions on not utilizing these devices.

All boats are limited to 5 mph except during water skiing hours, where the speed limit is 40 mph in the ski area only. All boats, except those signed up for skiing, must stay out of the ski area while skiing is in progress. Skiing or other high-speed boating activity is permitted during designated hours from May 1 thru October 31 only.

Open stack boats and others with a decibel level exceeding 82 db are prohibited. Likewise, radios or stereos may not be played at high volume.

Note that areas marked "no wake" mean no wake. These areas are marked with white buoys that say "No Wake". Boats may have to go slower than 5 mph in order not to create any wake.

No "Jet Skis," "Waverunners" or other similar variations of personal watercraft are allowed on Pine Mountain Lake (except authorized emergency or law enforcement equipment).

Only skippers (16 years and older with a valid driver's license) designated by a boat owner may operate a powerboat, provided that they know the lake and marina rules. Boat owners are responsible for informing their operators of all lake and marina rules.

Boat owners are responsible for the operation of their boats and the wakes they create regardless of who may be operating the boat.

Reckless operation and disregard for others may result in citation and forfeiture of lake boating privileges.

Boaters must stay inside the passenger/ operator areas of the boat. Riding outside of the railing or gate is prohibited.

Powerboat operators may not tow or pull rafts, tubes, paddleboats, kayaks, canoes or similar craft.

In case of an accident, give any necessary assistance, then immediately contact the Boat Patrol (based at the Marina).

Sufficient life preservers must be aboard for each passenger. All boaters less than 12 years of age and non-swimmers must wear properly tied life jackets.

Give a wide berth to sail and manually operated boats, as they have the right of way.

Powerboats may not be operated within 50 feet of a swimming area.

When meeting another boat, keep to

### MORE LARGE INCREASES IN YOUR WATER AND SEWER RATES!

roveland CSD plan to increase your water and sewer rates yet again in May. Go analyze your bill!

We were one of a minority of customers who complained about this proposed increase. (It takes a majority of customers to get their attention). Some customers are suing.

In the April edition of the PML News we wrote the editor a letter pointing out the rapidly increasing costs of managing Pine Mountain Lake and especially the rapidly increasing and already very high costs of water and sewer.

Compare our rates to the Tuolumne Utility District which is based in Sonora. Their board are proposing rates increases to be effective July 07 as follows:

Water - average user - from \$34.80 to \$38.00 per month

Sewer - average user - from \$31.86 to \$33.93 per month

These rates are worlds apart (yet still within Tuolumne County!).

### EXCERPTS FROM THE CITYGATE GCSD/LGR FIRE REPORT

The Long Gulch Ranch development, along with the existing approximately 993 developed and 279 vacant residential parcels outside of the LGR development on the east side of the lake, are all more than 8 minutes travel time from the District's only fire station. If all of the vacant residential parcels in the northern and eastern part PML development and the proposed residential parcels in the Long Gulch Ranch development are voted into a Community Facilities District to fund the third person each shift, it will cost each developed "and" vacant residential parcel about \$1,050 per year to provide this additional service level. If the remaining currently developed residential parcels in that same area agree to this annual special tax as well, the District could open the second fire station near the airport.

An annual CFD special tax of approximately \$1,050 (adjusted to reflect the annual inflationary cost of the fire services) on all Long Gulch Ranch property and vacant PML property north and east of the lake will support a third fire fighter on each shift at the present fire station and a second chief officer.

Of course the District should consider how to fund the cost of constructing the second fire station and purchasing the associated fire engine and other equipment. The estimated cost of this is about \$3,000,000, depending upon the size of the building.

Since the need for this station is being triggered by the LGR development, it is not uncommon to require a developer to provide the station and equipment.

the right.

Individuals wishing to blow out their motors may do so during high-speed boating hours and must first check-in with the Boat Patrol. Blow-outs will be limited to two (2) times around the ski pattern and must adhere to all high-speed boating rules. A maximum of 4 boats are allowed in the high-speed boating lane with skiers/boarders given priority over boats wishing to blow out their motor. No engine blowouts will be allowed between 6:00 pm and 8:00 pm.

Every effort shall be made to minimize wakes, especially those affecting shoreline properties.

All lake activity is suspended when CDF helicopters perform firefighting procedures or during other emergencies that require use of lake water.

The Boat Patrol will be in effect daily. Citations may be given for PML rule infractions. Two citations will constitute action for removing your boat from Pine Mountain Lake for the remainder of the season. Any boating or swimming rule may be changed in an emergency based on input from PML Management, Safety Dept, Sheriff's Dept, or other appropriate agency.

BOAT LAUNCHING & REMOVAL DATES

NO BOAT MAY BE LAUNCHED without current Pine Mountain Lake registration.

BOAT LAUNCHING AND REMOV-AL is allowed only at the Marina boat ramp.

ALL BOATS NOT REMOVED from Dunn Court and the Marina area by October

31st of each year will be removed and stored AT THE OWNER'S EXPENSE.

NO TRAILER PARKING permitted, except for daily use, and only in designated areas. No trailer parking will be permitted the date of the Independence Day fireworks celebration.

DUNN COURT SAILBOAT OWN-ERS: Please relocate your sailboat the day before the annual fireworks display. This date may vary from year to year.

#### WATER SKIING AND WAKE-BOARDING RULES

Homeowners wishing to register a ski or wake boat for the first time on PML will be given a tour of the lake and have these regulations and the PML Water-ski and Wakeboard Club's Good Neighbor Rules explained. This tour will be conducted monthly by the PML Boat Patrol, assisted by the PML WWC and must be completed before the homeowner may sign up for ski/wakeboard times at PML. Copies of the Good Neighbor Rules will be available to all boaters at the Marina.

Skiing and wakeboarding will be on a one-hour session, reservation basis. High-speed boating hours are generally as follows:

On the Monday associated with the 3 three-day holiday weekends, wakeboarding will start at 4:00 P.M.

High-speed boating activities, wake-boarding or skiing, in the 9 am to 12 pm hours are not defined and will be worked out between the Marina Manager and the PML WWC.

Skiing and wakeboarding are prohibited November 1 through April 30. The speed limit for all boats during this time is 5 mph

Reservations will be taken at the Marina Store (962-8631) up to 24 hours in advance and will be limited to one hour per day. Additional hours may be reserved on the day of interest. You may call or walk-in for reservations. When time slots become full, a stand-by list will be taken.

All users of the fast boat lane must check-in with the Boat Patrol prior to commencing their activity. The Boat Patrol will wait 10 minutes for a user with a reservation. After that, the time slot will be opened to the next fast boat user requesting time. If there are no reservations or ad hoc fast boat users in line, the fast boat lane will be closed to fast boat activities for the rest of the hour.

A ski-flag or light system is located at the Marina point. The flag or light indicates whether high-speed boating activity is or is not occurring. The ski flag will be dynamically raised and lowered based on whether the fast boat lane is open or closed on an hour-by-hour basis during reservation hours. Boaters can

also call the Marina Store for ski-flag or light status.

A maximum of four (4) boats will be allowed to ski at any one time. A distance of 100 feet shall be maintained between boats.

A counter-clockwise ski pattern shall be maintained.

To minimize shoreline wakes on the North shore, high-speed boaters shall stay as close as possible to the main beach buoys when traveling from the dam toward Big Creek. When traveling Big Creek toward the dam, high-speed boaters should stay as close as possible to the center of the ski pattern as safety permits. Always pass an approaching powerboat on the right.

All boats being used on PML waters must be operated in a manner to minimize the size of the wake produced by the boat. With the exception of pontoon boats and those boats traveling less than 5 mph, all powerboat operators shall operate at planing speeds as soon as practical when in the ski pattern.

Wake Enhancement: The use of devices, equipment, or placement of passengers on boats for the purpose of creating an enlarged wake is prohibited. Further, no such devices or equipment may be used on any boat in PML. Such devices and equipment include, but are not limited to; exterior panels or wings deployed underwater; rubberized, plastic or metal tanks or bags filled with any material; crowding of passengers to the rear; inside-the-hull water tanks or boat hulls designed specifically to enhance the wake. Additionally, the operator of an outboard or I/O drive boat must keep the out-drive down to optimally trim the boat to minimize the size of the boat's wake at all times.

Any boat that produces excessive wakes may be cited. Two citations result in eviction from the lake for the remainder of the calendar year.

Staging area for skiers is the White SKI BUOY outside the Marina. No other area! There is a voluntary drop area outside the 5 mph buoys at Fisherman's Cove. See Marina Store and Good Neighbor Rules for details.

Ski course is marked with red buoys. Stay inside of the red buoys. These buoys are not a SLALOM COURSE.

Ski boats must have a red or orange flag and an observer at least 12 years of age.

Ski boats returning to a fallen skier must make a starboard (right) turn to return to the skier while raising the red or orange warning flag. The boat operator shall make the 'turn-around' at a slow speed to minimize the wake. Obviously, safety is a concern, but anything a boat operator can do to minimize wake size is required.

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## **Some Golf Article**

n the mid 1990's an old friend, Ray Scofield told me that while building a new Paiute Golf Course in the Las Vegas area a co-worker remembered working on this course during construction. His comment to Ray was they come and left very quickly. They did not bring in any topsoil to the fairways and in some cases removed topsoil to build the greens

With the lack of topsoil and a combination of clay soil and cart traffic permitted year around we have areas of severe soil compaction.

For this year, management has allowed us the funds to begin sand topdressing in problem areas. We will prioritize fairway landing areas and include our approaches to the greens.

What are the benefits? Applications of sand results in improved soil structure over time for better drainage, firmer surfaces, and turf that is more consistent. Application recommendations are 60 tons of sand

Here are some testimonials of golf courses that have done fairway top-

Longview, Washington- The Mint Valley Golf Course has had to cope with a problem of monumental proportions for many years. During most of the year, the water table is very near the playing surface. Superintendent Dave MacDonald decided to address this issue with a fairway topdressing program. Since then, approximately 2 inches of sand has been applied on one fairway, and lesser amounts on several other fairways. Remarkable improvements have been noted. Areas which had been completely unplayable during the winter are back to playability. The fairways are now much drier and firmer than the roughs, and tire marking has been reduced. Although small areas of standing water still occur, these are being systematically eliminated with subsurface drain lines. Budget considerations do not allow for expansion of this program, but the Mint Valley Golf Course is well on it's way to providing the local citizenry extended and improved play.

Victoria, British Columbia- Victoria

Golf Club is one of the oldest courses in the west. For years, several low-lying fairways were virtually unplayable during the winter. Beginning in 1984, superintendent Alex Kazai started topdressing a 10,000- square foot landing zone on one fairway. By putting down ½ inch per application, a total of 1½ inches of accumulated material in this area resulted in improved smoothness and better turf growth. After this success, a far more extensive program was started a year later. From April through September, weekly application of slightly less than ¼ inch of topdressing material were made. Approximately 2 inches of sand was applied per year, and the program was completed in 1988. This 6-inch layer of topdressing has turned three wet and often unplayable fairways into year-round quality fairways. Subsurface drainage is still needed in some areas, but the membership is pleased. These same results could have been achieved through reconstruction, but the cost would have been 8 to 10 times higher, and construction would have taken these holes out of play for a period of time.

Medina, Washington - The Overlake Country Club justifiably carried the nickname "Underlake Country Club" for many years. Miles of drainage tile had been installed, yet the golf course suffered from consistently wet conditions in the fall, winter, and spring. Superintendent Gary Sayre had a plan to topdress all of the par-4 and par-5 fairways over a 3-year period. Applications were begun in 1987 at a rate of about 1/4 inch per application, and as of the end of 1989, 4 to 5 inches of topdressing has been applied. Improvements noted were better mowing under wet conditions, greater turf density, more consistent utilization of irrigation water, fewer weeds, and improved winter playing conditions. In short, another success story!

#### Summarv

One point is certain. Fairway topdressing is a program that is rapidly gaining acceptance. As you contemplate improvements to your course, consider dressing up your fairways for 2000's.





The PML Waterski and Wakeboard Club has been working with the PMLA Board of Directors and the Friends of the Lake on enhancements to the existing Lake Rules. The FOTL would like to have the ability to reserve a slow boat hour up to 14 days in advance and the WWC would like to have the ability to reserve a ski time 24 hours in advance (based upon the recent WWC survey). A simple plan to achieve both desires has been presented to the Board for their consideration. We are committed to working with the Board and other interested parties to find the best solutions for the entire membership. While we don't expect any changes to be in place by the start of this year's ski season, please check our website for the most recent updates.

During our discussions, it was learned that the greatest improvement in wake reduction that came out of our work 2 years ago on the Good Neighbor Rules (GNR) was the reduction of "power turns". A power turn is when a ski boat turns around at full power to return to a fallen or dropped skier. While this procedure is sometimes required where a skier is hurt or another boat is approaching at a rapid pace, it is most often not. The power turn generates a tremendous wake that is thrown directly at the shore of the lake. The PMLWWC recommends that boats pull back power

to idle and then make the turn back to the skier to minimize wakes when no immediate danger exists. This greatly reduces the wake generated and can be clearly seen on the Training DVD (available at the Marina Store for boaters signing up for skiing and wakeboarding).

While we received high marks for reducing the amount of power turns during the first several months of the first year the GNR were available, it was felt that many boaters returned to using the power turn as the season wore on and that some boaters ignored the rule altogether. Reduction of power turns is one of the best ways for the skiing and wakeboarding community to help our lakeshore and boating neighbors. Please only use power turns when absolutely required.

There are several other tips and rules for reducing wakes in our Good Neighbor Guide and Safety Laminate available at the Marina Store or on-line at www.pmlwwc. com . Please take a look!

## **Bytes & Bits From John**

#### How cool is Google?

ve tried different search engines over the years, and I have to say I always find myself coming back to Google. It seem like Google literally has the answer for almost anything. The search box has a tremendous amount of capability that you can discover easily. It can do simple math, convert currency, distance, and weights and if you know how to ask, you can get an answer to almost anything as a result of its vast search library of books. There is an online service package that includes documents and spreadsheets and even allows you to chat with other users in real time while working on your documents. Another nice thing, you can save your work on the website, which allows you to access it from anywhere. I could write a book on Google, but here are some highlights that may peak your interest to explore this application further.

Google Books is a great resource for anyone. It's basically online book content that is searchable. These are books out of copyright and fully viewable. To try this out, go to http://books.google.com and click "Advanced Search". From here you can follow the prompts. If you establish an account with Google, you will be able to access more recent material still under copyright.

Hidden Tools for folks that do a lot of work from different PCs, Google's "Docs and Spreadsheets" has an online office application with a word processor and spreadsheet. You need to have a Google account to use this. Go to http://docs.google.com and log in. After you create your documents, they can be saved to Google's servers as well as your own hard drive. That way, if you are working somewhere else you can log on and access your docs on any PC. This also gives you another backup in case you lose your flash drive or hard drive.

Edit and Organize Photos This is a fun feature I really like. This is a free program you can use to edit and organize your digital photographs. It's called Picasa. (http://picasa.com) A stand alone application you can install and will work off line. You get all the common effects, red eye removal and so on, plus automatic photo find, memory tags with individual sheets you can assemble letting you print a photo up to eight or ten times larger than the original. Not the most powerful program out there, but the price is right and it's a lot of fun.

Calculator and Converter I use this all the time. Can't remember how many ounces to a quart? Pints to a gallon? This feature handles it all, including a currency

converter. Want to know how far your dollars will go in Mexico? Type in "currency of Mexico in U.S. Dollars" or "600 yen in U.S. Dollars" then click search. How about "120 pounds in kilos" It's fast, accurate and more readily available than the time it takes to search another conversion program.

Learning To Search When I first started to search the internet, I really got frustrated. The information is there, but knowing how to ask for it can sometimes be complicated. If you remember a few basic things about how Google looks at you search terms, it will be a lot easier. Google by default, searches for pages containing all the words. Articles, conjunctions and prepositions are generally left out. A plus sign can be placed in front of those words to force them to be included in the search. You can get better results if you use the minus sign to eliminate terms that will appear in irrelevant pages. For example, you might put "-pie" in a search about rhubarb, to get better results about the plant only. Another thing I like, Google isn't case sensitive so you don't have to capitalize.

## Here are some useful modifiers you can try in the search box:

site: www.whereiwanttobe.com (restricts search to that particular site)

define:word

(Brings up a selection of definitions from various sources)

intitle:word

(Searches for pages with your word in the title)

"my phrase"

(Searches for a set phrase. If you don't put a phrase inside quotes, Google will look for pages with the word in any order)

I recommend you try these and play around with them. If you mix, match, and experiment a little you should have better and quicker results with your searches. So how cool is Google? In my opinion, Super Cool!



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

The driver of any boat approaching a boat displaying a red or orange flag must acknowledge the downed skier's presence by raising their hand for the skier's tow boat to see and take appropriate evasive action to ensure the safety of the downed skier.

Skier must raise one (1) ski (or wakeboard or kneeboard) when in water with slack towline to warn other boats in the area.

All skiers must wear proper Coast Guard approved life preservers.

Number of water skiers per boat: 2 maximum at a time. When one skier drops, the second skier must drop immediately.

Use of discs, inner tubes, surfboards, water toys and non-approved devices are prohibited. Water skis, kneeboards and wakeboards are the only devices permitted to be used in the high-speed boating lane.

An area for beginning water ski instruction is available. Contact the Boat Patrol Officer or Marina Manager for details.

Water skiing may be limited on certain days such as, but not limited to holidays, fishing derbies and sailing regatta days.

#### **FISHING RULES**

A California State Fishing License is required and is to be displayed at all times while fishing. Fish limits are governed by California Fish & Game laws. NO LIVE BAIT is permitted other than worms.

Fishing off water taxi docks during water taxi operating hours is prohibited. Trespassing on private property is not allowed.

No fishing within 25 feet of designated swim areas.

#### **SAILING RULES**

Sailing Hours: Anytime

SAILBOAT LAUNCHING is allowed only at the Marina boat ramp.

Sailboats and all others must stay out of the skiing area during skiing hours.

The high-speed boating lane is outlined with red buoys. Stay out of this area while high-speed boating is in progress. Be aware of high-speed boating hours for your own protection. Avoid the east end of the lake (Lake Lodge and Big Creek entrance) during high-speed boating hours.

Sailing of rental boats in Big Creek is not allowed.

No windsurf boards without a sail are allowed on the lake.

#### **PARKING, BEACH & SWIMMING RULES**

SWIM AT YOUR OWN RISK. NO LIFEGUARDS ARE ON DUTY.

Follow all posted beach and marina rules and regulations. Note: The beaches and lawns are designated non-smoking areas

Swimming is only allowed within the designated swim areas.

No float tubes, surfboards, "noodles," lounge rafts, etc., are allowed on the lake

other than within 30 feet from your own private dock. (Tubes, noodles and "soft" float toys are allowed in the swim areas).

Inflatable boats, canoes and kayaks that are used on Pine Mountain Lake must be registered in the same manner as hard-bottom boats.

Do not venture more than 30 feet from your own private dock. DO NOT swim across or in the open lake area.

No glass containers, loud music, hardballs, profane language or drinking of alcoholic beverages by anyone under the age of 21 are allowed on any Pine Mountain Lake beach area.

Bicycles and skateboards must be walked through all amenity-parking areas. No riding is permitted.

Dogs are prohibited from the entire PML Marina, Dunn Court, and Lake Lodge amenities except authorized PML utility dogs in the performance of their duties or service animals assisting the blind or deaf.

If the marina parking lot is full, please park at Dunn Court, the Lake Lodge, or Fisherman's Cove and ride the water taxi to the Marina. Water taxi operating schedule is available upon request.

### FAILURE TO COMPLY MAY RESULT IN FINES OR LOSS OF LAKE PRIVILEGES.

Additional rules and regulations may apply. Rules are subject to change without notice.

ONLY property owners and PMLA employees on duty will be allowed to park at the Marina parking area on weekends and holidays from Memorial Day Weekend through Labor Day Weekend. Property owners will be required to provide a valid parking sticker or hanging tag.

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

## **Medical Center Announces Transition Plans**

SONORA, CA (May 9, 2007) – Most residents of the area are well aware that access to health care services is changing. Based on the vote of the Tuolumne County Board of Supervisors, acute care, ancillary and clinic services at Tuolumne General Hospital are closing as of July 1. Sonora Regional Medical Center today announced further details of the transition of health care services.

"We are doing everything we can to ensure a seamless transition of health services," said Lary Davis, president of Sonora Regional Medical Center. "We share the view that this reduction of services may diminish access to healthcare for our community. However, the Medical Center is working collaboratively with County and TGH leadership to help minimize the impact."

While all the details of the transition are not finalized, a brief update follows.

To minimize wait times in the Emergency Department and provide the appropriate level of care, the Medical Center is opening a second Prompt Care on the West side of Sonora at 193 South Fairview Lane. Prompt Care Forest Road will be open 12 hours a day, 7 days a week. Prompt Care Indian Rock at 14540 Mono Way in East Sonora is open 7 days a week

from 8:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m.

A new rural health clinic, Forest Road Health & Wellness Center, will open at 193 South Fairview Lane. Services to be offered include: primary care, specialty care, dental care and Prompt Care Forest Road.

Another move that will occur during this transition time is the relocation of the Medical Center's Anti-Coag service to the Forest Road Health & Wellness Center. Currently residing near the Cancer Center in the medical office building, this outpatient service will continue at 193 South Fairview Lane.

The Medical Center has been expanding its expertise in cardiology and pulmonology by recruiting new specialists. Providing the full continuum of care from prevention and diagnosis to treatment and recovery is very important. Cardiac Rehab and Pulmonary Rehab services will now be provided at the Forest Road Health & Wellness Center at 193 South Fairview Lane.

Cedar Road Family Medical Center will open at 20044 Cedar Road North in Sonora; replacing Mother Lode Medical Center at the same location. Current patients will be able to continue receiving their primary care there. The Medical Center's Job Care will be relocated to Cedar Road Family Medical Center and combined with TGH's existing occupational medicine practice offering the community's businesses a single location for their health care needs.

To accommodate a large increase in ancillary services volume like laboratory and diagnostic imaging the Medical Center is creating new processes and access points.

New lab draw stations will be available in Angel's Camp and at the Prompt Care Forest Road. Additional phlebotomists (laboratory assistants) are also being hired to serve more patients.

The Sonora Regional Imaging Center will be opening this Fall at 12811 Covey Circle in Sonora, adding digital mammography, 64-slice CT, 1.5T open bore MRI, ultrasound and general x-ray. During the several month transition time, a mobile CT scanner will be added to the Medical Center campus to accommodate a large influx in additional patients.

Other acute services departments like surgery, med/surg and ICU should be able to accommodate the additional patient load with appropriate expansion of staffing. The Medical Center has 172 open positions available. Julie Kline, Medical Center senior vice president for Patient Care said, "We are working very hard to fill all of our open positions for the community. It is encouraging to already have received 319 applications from qualified local candidates. Our goal is to help keep our local health professionals in the community."

Positions are available in almost every department of the hospital including: admitting, nursing, clinics, radiology, cardio-pulmonary, pharmacy, laboratory, rehabilitation therapy and more. Sign-on bonuses are being offered for some key positions.

Tuolumne General Hospital employees will be given priority for available positions, credit for years of service in the community with additional vacation time (up to \$4,250 value) and sign-on bonuses up to \$3,000 for hard-to-fill nursing positions.





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# Service Clubs Unite Once Again

nce again volunteers worked together to really make a difference in the lives of those in need in Mexico. This was accomplished by the combined efforts of doctors, Tom Mihok O.D., Ted Mihok D.P.M., Jose Bustos D.D.S., and Brian Elliott O.D., along with Dr. Nadia Rosales, MD of Mexicali, and a team of volunteers from Americorps, Groveland, Riverbank, San Francisco, and Twain Harte Rotary Clubs, and the Alameda and Oakdale Lions Clubs, and friends and families. The mission included the donation of an ambulance that was procured by the Riverbank and Groveland Rotary Clubs to the Baja Rescue Corporation. The ambulance was transported from Groveland to the border by Walt and Pam Reimers of Groveland. Another aspect of the mission included 624 optical, podiatry, gynecology, dental and general medical examinations and treatments. On April 13 and 14, 27 US citizens worked side by side with members of the Calafia Rotary Club of Mexicali, BC, Mexico, in this goodwill mission. Dental extractions and fillings were performed in a portable 3 chair fully contained 30 foot van that was provided by the University of Baja California. Graduates of the dental school are required to do community work and were present to assist in the dental work. Jim Lima, a lens maker in Modesto, was present to assist both optometrists. Many of the glasses fitted came from Rotary Interact clubs in district 5220. Medical equipment donated by Keckler Medical/Jim

Whitworth an Oakdale Rotarian was donated to the Baja Rescue and the Mexicali General Hospital. Walkers, crutches, and porta-potties were donated by the Groveland Helping Hands. 22 cases of English/Spanish 5th grade books, donated by the Merced Sunrise Rotary and the Oakdale Lions, and paint and spackle from Valley Lumber found their way to the school. Dick and Doty Davis of Groveland donated 6 gross of school-inscribed pencils, sharpeners and inflatable globes to the school where the clinics took place.

While the exams were being performed at the Visita a Escuela Otilia U de Corta school, the interior of Hogar Emmanuel, a home for children whose parents are incarcerated, 8 miles southwest of Mexicali, was completely refurbished with paint, florescent lights, sheetrock, refrigerator, 3 washing machines and cabinetry for the boys' restrooms. 15 cases of food and one of the washers were donated by the Oakdale Lions Club. The total amount of the items donated and services was just over \$78 K, which does not include the value of the medical assistance given to the doctors nor the man hours donated to refurbish the interior of Hogar Emmanuel. It is gratifying to be involved in this type of an international service project. Plans are already underway for the project for next year. # HEALTHY

This summertime recipe has a triple bonus. You've read before, in this column, about the benefits of using olive oil and herbs. You are also familiar with how your heart and your body weight benefit from eating fish several times per week. This Mediterranean Fish recipe uses all three of the above, plus is tasty and so easy to prepare! Perhaps, if you go out to catch a fish yourself - you'll also benefit from the relaxation and exercise as well. Buon Appetito!

Mediterranean Fish (serves 4; 3 oz. fish and 2 tablespoons tomato mixture per serving)

Vegetable oil spray

- 4 dry-packed sun-dried tomato halves, finely chopped
- 2 tablespoons water
- 8 Kalamata olives, finely chopped
- 2 tablespoons finely diced pimiento
- 2 tablespoons finely snipped fresh pars-

1 tablespoon chopped fresh basil leaves 1 teaspoon olive oil

4 mild, thin 4 oz. each, fish fillets (snapper or your favorite)

1/4 teaspoon paprika

1/8 teaspoon cayenne

1/8 teaspoon salt

Preheat oven to 300 degrees. Line a baking sheet with aluminum foil and lightly spray with vegetable oil spray.

In small microwaveable bowl, stir together the tomatoes and water. Cover with plastic wrap. Microwave for 30 seconds (until hot) and let stand for 5 minutes until tomatoes are soft. Drain well. Stir in olives, pimiento, parsley, basil, and oil.

Rinse fish, pat dry and place in single layer on baking sheet. Sprinkle with paprika, cayenne and salt. Bake 10 minutes, or until fish flakes easily when tested with fork. Transfer fish to a seving plate. Microwave tomato mixture for 30 - 60 seconds until warm and spoon on top of fish.

Rudy has chaired many service projects providing Senior Services and led the Groveland Kiwanis Club as Youth Services Chairman. He has led the club with seeming tireless service.



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





## **State Park Becoming a** Reality By Jim Goodrich and Frank Oyung

fter years of fundraising and discussions on its future home, the Groveland Skate Park made a big first step in becoming a reality in May. Over a six-year period, the Groveland Skateboard Park Committee raised over \$100,000 with fundraisers, like car washes run by the kids who will enjoy the new park, and by collecting aluminum cans and California Redemption bottles.

The Sonora Area Foundation granted GCSD \$25,000 to pour the concrete pads for the skate park and a new basketball court. These new facilities will be joined this summer by the County's new 1,400 square-foot Youth Center. The County received a \$220,000 federal grant for the building.

The concrete pad for the skate park was poured on May 12th. Over 8,000 feet of rebar and over 120 cubic yards of concrete were used to construct the slab. According the workers at the pour, this is perhaps the largest single-pour slab ever built in Groveland.

A roller rink will be constructed around the circumference of the skate park in late May. After the rink is constructed, the form boards will be reused and set up for the pouring of the basketball court pad.

To help save costs, contractors and ordinary citizens in our community volunteered their labor to grade the skate park and basketball court sites, prepare all the form work and finish the concrete. Volunteers included Craig Miller, who did the excavation work; Doug Leahy, Dave Danberger, Randy Klaahsen, Dick Lennen, and Bob Lennen prepared the form work and laid the steel rebar; others who helped with either the preparatory work or the concrete pour included Lance Kirk, Mike Hawley, John Matthews, Herman Schaap, Walt Reimers, Rich DeJong, Bobby Wiggs, Tyler Matthews, Ron Dunlap, Pat Leahy, Rick Dielman, Jason Rivera, Joey Rivera, Shane Leahy, Vince Rivera, Jason Mickele, Josh Aguiar, Niki Aguiar, Matt Chapman, Michael, Sebold, Kevin Henley, Mike Mckinnon, Stan Pesicka, Ryan Ahrehs, Rick Schone, Brett Woods, Phil Pritchard, Frank Oyung, Murry Smith, Dusty Miller, Jamison Kraft, Kelsie Klaahsen, and James Fox.

Also, special thanks to Lorna Doll for overseeing all the important logistics, like beverages and food preparation. She was assisted by Alicia McEwan, and Barbara Leahy.

At the concrete pour, pizzas were pro-

vided by Two Guys Pizza and cold drinks were donated by Main Street Market of Groveland. The Fire Department assisted with keeping the concrete pad wet while it set (which helped them with a little hose and water cannon training). They also took to the BBQ and helped make hamburgers for the hungry crew on Saturday. The food prepared by the Fire Department was provided by the Iron Door Saloon.

The ramps for the skate park will be delivered on June 12th, and should take about a week to assemble, depending on the turnout of volunteers. The assembly effort will be supervised by a representative from the factory.

Current members of the Groveland Skateboard Park Committee are Rolene Kiesling, Merle Heath, Dave "Stilts" Volponi, Rick Schone, Mark Watts, and Frank Oyung. On-going fundraising efforts will help pay for other facilities for the park, including a low fence separating the rink from the skateboard area, picnic tables, signs, and grass sod for the perimeter of the park.

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## **THE DEERest Plant Profile** By Mountain Sage

ow really! A plant the deer won't completely devour? Even in Groveland area? Don't believe it? Well deer readers, spring is definitely here and we are sure everyone is wondering what to plant that the deer won't eat during these gracious months of spring and summer. We started to profile plants the deer don't seem to be eating up here on the hill to assist you in your gardening this summer. For copies of the past profiles, come on in to Mountain Sage. Have fun with your garden this spring, and enjoy the rewards all summer. Have questions? Please ask your local nurseryperson, as the deer up on the hill have a different palate then elsewhere. And always remember, deer don't read!

#### **Cleveland Sage**

Cal Academy Photo 1986 Common name: Cleveland Sage Botanical: Salvia clevelandii

Vital Facts: Salvia clevelandii, or as it is known by its common name, Cleveland Sage, is a large graceful evergreen drought tolerant shrub 3 to 5 feet tall and 5 to 8 feet wide with gray green foliage and blue to purplish flowers throughout the summer. This California native sage blooms starting in early summer. Remove spent flowers to have blooms all



summer to fall. This sage stands out from other sages as it is evergreen throughout the winter, making it a great foundation plant the deer won't eat. There are many varieties of this popular sage that vary in hardiness, flower color and height.

Growing conditions: It prefers full sun and fast-draining or sandy soil. Make sure to amend your clay soil and not to plant in an area where water pools in the winter. Like many native sages of California, it is tolerate of dry soils, and seems to thrive on neglect.

A few fun facts: Native to the high mountainous areas of southern California, Cleveland Sage perfumes the air for a distance of as much as 20 feet with an enticing herbal scent. As with the 900 other species of sage worldwide, the seeds are edible. Native Americans would roast the seeds, grind them and mix them with water. The result is a nutritious porridge. Most common uses for the plant are harvesting the flowers for arrangements and salves, and using the leaves for salves, refreshing teas, and smudge sticks. The plethora of uses for this plant are too numerous to mention here. Consult your local herbalist and/or library for information.

Helpful Hints: Cut back in late winter to keep bushy and full for best bloom next summer. To best set off its silver color, use with contrasting colors including other Sages. It looks very nice with not only other sages, but native lupines, native California fuschia, lavenders, and germanders. To prevent deer from munching on this fragrant plant in the mint family, make sure to 'grow it hard', meaning to let it dry out between waterings. This makes any plant in the mint family (Lavender, Sage, Rosemary) increase the amount of fragrant oil as a defense against the sun and predators, such as deer. 
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## KIWANIS MEXICAN DINNER A HUGE SUCCESS
