We have been treated to pretty good weather this spring and the forecast is for this summer to be even warmer. Cal Fire is predicting this summer to be a particularly dangerous fire year. They have already banned open fires, so no open burning is allowed in PML. We have begun our Fire Abatement Program to help reduce the fire threat to PML but it is particularly important that each of us to remain diligent when it comes to fire safety. Be sure you have your property fire safe and in compliance with our fire safety rules.

Our April financial statement has been completed and it appears that the

good weather has had a beneficial effect on PML in spite of the sluggish economy. The restaurant, bar and golf course have performed better than budget and appear that they will continue to do so. Recreation has not done well against budget but the season is just starting. With the warm weather just around the corner we expect the Marina, Lake & Beach and the Stables to increase their revenues and catch up to budget. Maintenance has fallen below budget but that is primarily because they have already bought supplies which will be needed in the coming months and we expect they will catch up by the end of summer. Administration is struggling with budget due to the slowdown in building and related fees, late payment of assessments, unpredictable legal fees and various other economy related revenue items. We expect this will also improve in the coming months.

As mentioned last month, the actions brought against the Association, Board Members and former Board members by our former General Manager are moving forward. The suit against Directors and former Directors has been dismissed. The other part of that suit, which is against the Association itself,

is still moving forward but no date has been set for a trial yet. The other action, which is a binding arbitration, brought against the Association regarding the termination of the former General Manager has begun. It started on May 19th, which means it will start after this has been written. Hopefully, the arbitration will have concluded and we should have the decision of the arbitrator by the time we print next month's Pine Mountain Lake News.

At the May Open Board Meeting, the 2008 lake rules will have been voted upon. The issue of large wakes, primarily resulting from wake and knee boarding and the boats currently used for that activity, is the primary change in the rules. This issue may be looked at further to see if there are ways that wake/knee boarding can return to our lake without the large, obnoxious, and damaging wakes currently associated with that activity.

Once again, please be very careful this summer with any source of fire. Even though we are doing all we can to reduce the possibility of a disastrous fire in our area, remember, it is you who can do the most to see that we remain fire safe.

General Manager's Message

Swimming Pool Open for Business

The Pool is now open for business. Our Maintenance Department and Pool staff did a fine job getting the Pool ready for the start of the summer season. The Pool was drained and repainted. Repairs were made to the deck, BBQ, lights and pump. We have moved the Pool entry to our new ADA ramp accessible from the parking lot and the entry doors and signs have been switched. All of the floors in the office and locker areas have been painted with a non-slip coating to increase safety.

Marina

The Marina Store and Grill are now open and ready to serve our members and guests. A lot of work went into preparation including the replacement of weights and buoys, gate and lawn repair, importing sand, rebuilding the volley ball court, replacing the icemaker at the Grill, repairing water leaks and the roof and striping the parking lot.

Fish Planting

Our first fish planting of the year happened on May 15th. One thousand pounds of rainbow trout were planted in time for Memorial Weekend.

Lake Dredging Project

The Lake Dredging Project permit process is currently on track this year and we sent a check to the Department of Fish and Game for the application and permit fee. Tuolumne County finally completed its interdepartmental review of the draft environmental document and only came back with a few anecdotal comments. These comments were submitted to our subcontractor for response.

Department of Safety Vehicle Purchases

Last month the Board approved the purchase of two new vehicles for the Department of Safety. The new Toyota Tacoma pickup was purchased and is now in service. The Toyota Prius hybrid is on order and we anticipate taking delivery in about a week.

Fire Abatement Project

The Fire Abatement Project contract was awarded to Woolery Timber out of Tuolumne and the fire abatement work is on track. Eighteen of the fifty three acres of green belt in treatment area three have been completed and the project is scheduled for completion

by the end of June. Our Maintenance Department worked on refurbishing access entries and roads in greenbelts in preparation for contractors. Roads were constructed for total access to the treatment area three. Some of these roads can be used for evacuation of members during fire emergencies.

Fire Safety Inspections

Our Fire Safety Coordinator, Larry Woodruff, has started performing inspections of member lots and will be sending

notices as needed to remind members to have their lots cleared for the fire season. The deadline for compliance is June 15th.

Activities Guide

The Activities Guide went out with the May edition of the PML News and all members should have received a copy in the mail. Members who did not receive a copy can pick one up at the Administration Office and it is also available online at the PML Website.

Director's Corner

ast month, the PML Waterski and Wakeboarding club presented ■ the results of a mail and on-line survey that they conducted among registered boat owners and lake front homeowners at PML. They used the conclusions to buttress their argument that the board should not discontinue wake boarding and knee boarding on our small lake.

The board is sympathetic to the concerns of this small group of very vocal wakeboarding enthusiasts. We spent months debating this issue because no one wants to deprive any homeowners of a sport they enjoy.

However, it is the board's job to make decisions for the greater good of the community, even if the decision is unpopular with a small group. In this case, it is the board's decision that wakeboarding and knee-boarding cause too much damage to property and too much danger and frustration to other users of the lake.

There is a process by which a board ruling can be challenged involving a vote of the full membership. The WWC has elected not to pursue the normal process and is instead attempting to sway the board with legal threats and a

flawed survey.

We appreciate the WWC's advocacy efforts and the work they put into the survey. Unfortunately, we found the survey to have significant flaws. Most importantly, the majority of the questions are about "fast boating." Since the board has never contemplated curtailing waterskiing, the questions are misleading and the responses simply don't apply to just wake-boarding and knee-boarding. In addition, the survey is addressed to boat owners and lakefront homeowners; however, what happens on the lake affects everyone, including swimmers and people riding the water taxi.

The survey did find that over 40% of respondents said they can't utilize the lake during fast boating. WWC finds this number small but the board feels that it illustrates that a significant number of homeowners are inconvenienced by wake-board activities. The board has done their own research and determined that wakes are a problem to other boaters and to shoreline



homes and that they are caused by wake-boarding and knee-boarding. The board believes it is our responsibility to take action when damage is occurring to members' property and safety.

The WWC also reports that 60% of their respondents believe limiting "fast boating" will reduce property values. Since water skiing is not being affected, this question is inappropriate and misleading. In addition, the board has discussed discontinuing wake-boarding with a number of Groveland's leading realtors, all of whom say it will have no effect at all on property values.

At a broader level, the WWC has suggested imposing strict guidelines on the wake generating behavior of wakeboarders. Sadly, this has been tried for the last several years with minimal success.

This issue is not unique to Pine Mountain Lake. Wake-boarding and knee-boarding are being restricted or discontinued at many lakes around the country for the exact same reason that the board is taking this action at PML: these activities are incompatible with other lake activities; the large wakes produce damage and danger to people and property.

Your board has spent months studying this issue and considering every argument - pro and con. The study was undertaken in response to a homeowner petition to the board asking us to consider appropriate action based on the damage caused by wakeboarding. Your board is confident that the decision to discontinue wake and knee-boarding on PML is in the best interest of the vast majority of homeowners and boat owners. We regret that the decision will inconvenience a small number of avid wake-boarders but fortunately they have many alternative activities to enjoy at PML.

Fire Safety

(GROVELAND, CALIF., MAY 15, 2008) Yosemite Foothills Fire Safe Council Chair Kelly Bearden today announced that on Monday, June 9th, the Fire Safe Council is inviting homeowners along the Highway 120 corridor, Don Pedro and other nearby areas to meet and discuss fire protection, emergency preparedness, and fire prevention measures needed to protect life, property, and resources from wildland fires.

The open public meeting is scheduled to be held at 6:00 p.m. Monday, June 9, 2008, at the Groveland Library Downstairs Meeting Room at 18990 Main Street in Groveland. The purpose of the meeting is to provide private landowners and local fire agency officials the opportunity to discuss, consider, and form a strategic planning link that connects disaster preparedness, fire protection, emergency access routes, defensible space around homes, and additional fire prevention measures to support agency firefighting efforts.

Steve Boyack, Tuolumne County Office of Emergency Services Coordinator, will lead a discussion on pre-disaster planning in advance of large fires or other major incidents. The presentation will feature family disaster planning, emergency go-kit preparation, and the public emergency notification process. The program's focus will include an explanation about the implementation of evacuation advisories, warnings, and mandatory orders when local communities are threatened by wildfires. The program will also cover the County Office of Emergency Services relationship to the Red Cross and the activation of evacuation relief centers and services during disasters. Other topics may include:

- · Fire season overview
- Fuel moisture vs. rain fall comparison to last year
- · Anticipated weather conditions
- · Overview of the recent local fires
- · Refresh on clearing requirements
- · Refresh on evacuation procedures
- · Sheltering/Red Cross programs
- · Disaster planning

At the meeting the Fire Safe Council will be seeking ideas and comments from residents in the community to help fire agencies better identify the existing wildland fire danger present on public lands administered by the U.S. Forest Service (FS), and adjacent private property located within the local, county and state responsibility area protected by the Tuolumne County Fire Department, Groveland Community Services District, California Department of Forestry and Fire Protection, and direct protection area of the Forest Service.

Much of our surrounding area consists of private land located in the wildland-urban interface (WUI), with portions bordering FS land. The area is considered a priority concern due to the level of flammable vegetation, adjacent homes, and the threat to life, property, and other values at risk due to the high potential for large and damaging wildfires. The public is asked to help agency officials identify priority areas for strategic fuel reduction projects, generally located on private land adjacent to federally administered lands and surrounding communities.



On the Green

would like to thank everyone again for their tree contributions and any folks that might like to contribute in the future. We have added 35 trees to the Golf Course to date and purchased some shrubs for the landscape areas.

It has been two weeks since greens aeration and they have healed pretty well. After aeration we apply a preemergence herbicide to the greens and this product must be watered into the soil. The greens become very soft due to the irrigation, so please repair your ball marks.

A new purchase for 2008 was a cart path edger at-

ment for our Sand Pro. We have started to edge our paths and have completed about four holes to date. There are nearly nine miles of path by the time both sides are completed and with warmer soil temperatures the grass needs cutting more often so cart path edging will be a slow process.

The Fairways and Tees were fertilized with a pre-emergence included for crabgrass and goose grass control.

Other projects that are scheduled that are above and beyond our normal maintenance is a small bunker near the chipping green opposite the one there now. We have also done some cutting of cart paths in areas that have bumps or damage over the years for various reasons to make some repairs.

The annual U.S.G.A. visit is scheduled for Thursday May 22nd at 8:00 am. We will discuss various topics including leveling of tee surfaces. The visit is always interesting and educational.

Golf rules quiz:

Q #1 If you stand in a bunker to make a stroke at a ball that lies outside of the bunker, and that stroke results in the ball entering another bunker, (I know this shot well) are you allowed to rake the first bunker before proceeding to your next bunker shot?

Q #2 A player plays a stroke on a putting green. While the ball is in motion, a ball played at another hole strikes the player's ball and knocks it into the bunker. What is the ruling?

A #1 Believe it or not, the answer is NO. Rule 13-4 states in part "before making a stroke at a ball that is in a hazard (either water or bunker), the player must not test the condition of that hazard or any other similar hazard." Stewart Cink recently became very aware of this rule when the exact situation occurred during a tournament. His caddie raked the fairway bunker before he played his greenside bunker shot. The result was a two stroke penalty for testing the condition of a similar bunker which he did not access himself because he was unfamiliar with the rule. This resulted in his disqualification from the tournament for signing a scorecard with a score lower than he actually scored. (Hardly seems fair, huh?)

A #2 Since the player's ball was deflected by a moving outside agency, the player's stroke is canceled and he must replace his ball to the original position and re-stroke the ball.

Once again I would like to point out the fact that there are no formal written complaints on file in the association office to document wake or knee boarding and/or large destructive wakes are a problem.

We have compared the list of signatures on the petition to the list of boat registrations and how many are lakefront homeowners. We were quite surprised at the results, especially given the broad participation of lake users and lakefront homeowners we received in our lake use survey. Below is a table summarizing the participation in the petition to ban wakeboarding and the lake use survey we conducted and reviewed with the board at the last board meeting.

PML Cancer Survivor Scores a Hole-in-One at Pebble Beach!

y good friend and school principal mentor received two free rounds at Pebble from his school staff when he retired two years ago but our planned outing was postponed due to my treatments for cancer.

Just a few months ago I was convinced that I would never be able to swing a golf club the way I used to before the cancer when I was happily re-directed by my swing coach from San Juan Oaks. Lately, I have felt that the golf game was coming back, and TODAY, it really did!

So, here is how the round at Pebble played out: It was a cold, foggy, and windy day at Pebble when we teed off at 11:20 a.m. from the Gold tees, the ones that the amateurs use at the ATT. We went into the clubhouse to sign in for our FREE round at Pebble; gazed at the lockers there belonging to Tiger, Jack, Arnie et al. The skies parted and the sun shone just as we completed the front nine.

Okay, here is where it gets good...#17 at Pebble...Historic #17...World famous #17...Where Tom Watson chips in to win the U. S. Open. Where golf dreams can die and go to golf heaven...

The wind is HOWLING right to left - it's cold. Our caddie (yes, we took a CADDIE!) tells me, hit it 170 yards, and it's in the hole. (Yes, he really DID say that...) My friend Bob tees off, and I take his picture, framed by the ocean right in front of him.

Bob takes the camera, and stands behind me to take MY picture as I tee off.

I choose a 5 iron, I hit it flush to the right of the green, the wind moves it right to left, a beautiful arc, hooking through the Pebble Beach sky, the caddie says it's in the hole (yes, he really does say that) and then...

Nothing...There is a big, stupid mound right in front of the 17th green that hides your shot as it hits the green. I say, "Wow, did that go long? Where did that go?" Caddie Bart says, "It can't be long-I've seen you hit a 5 iron before..." Smart Ass Caddie...

Oh, by the way, Bob snaps my picture as I hit the ball...We walk up to the green. The 17th green...At Pebble...The sun, the sky, the ocean, the sea gulls, the bloody wind...I do not see my ball on the green. I walk to the back of the green. No ball in the sand.

No ball in the rough. I walk to the flag. I peer in. There, in the cup, nestled

next to the flag stick, is my little old NXT Tour, San Juan Oaks logo, golf ball. I yell...I think that I scared some sea gulls...I ask Caddie Bart to come over and witness the miracle. "Tell me that there is REALLY a ball in the cup with my San Juan Oaks logo on it," I tell him. He saunters over (those caddies REALLY saunter, and I'm not even sure what a saunter IS, but he does it...) "Yup, that's it - I TOLD you it was in the hole!"

I never saw it hit the green. I never saw it go into the hole, but that's okay. I have NEVER had a hole-in-one in the 28 years of playing golf, but that's okay, too. Today, I got my ace. At Pebble. At #17. In the cold, hard, unforgiving wind.

After cancer. After thinking that I would never again swing a club the way I used to. Many doubts. Not many, but a few sleepless nights. With the support of my family and friends that NEVER wavered. Pretty darn cool.

Caddie Bart calls the clubhouse - he has NEVER had a hole-in-one in the 8 years that he has been caddying at Pebble.

A gentleman drives up in his golf cart. Shakes my hand. Takes all of my information - That's okay, I'm kinda on Cloud 9...He tells me that there are going to be some gifts for me at the Club House when we get in. Caddie Bart says, "Give me the ball - you are NOT going to use that ball on the next hole..." Smart Caddie.

Pictures with the caddie after the round. Go to the Club house. I never knew this but there is a Hole-in-One Club at Pebble. Ahem...I am now in this club...Cool. If you are ever at Pebble, ask to see the names in the Club – that would be MINE on the 17th hole...

Maybe there is a message here that we should take from all of this...

Against all odds, against the specter of cancer and serious illness, maybe we find a way...Life can throw us curves and challenges, maybe MORE than what we think we can handle; but we find a way...

I don't care if that is the best that I can do for the rest of my golfing career (although the competitive creature inside of me howls for more...), it is good enough for me.

Playing Pebble Beach...Even par on the front 9...Shooting 79...Hole-in-one on 17. Don't tell me that dreams don't come true.

So let's not allow limits to creep in on us. Let's not allow doubts to blind us to our potential.

Quagga/Zebra Mussel Risk to Pine Mountain Lake

ue to the extreme potential danger of the Quagga/Zebra Mussel entering our Lake, we are forced to take direct measures to mitigate the risk of its impact. The Quagga/Zebra Mussel is an invasive species that propagates quickly and causes a lot of damage to boats, engines and property. The mussel is carried and transported easily from boat to lake every time a boat is moved from one location to another. Southern California lakes

like Lake Mead, Lake Havasu and some Bay Area waterways have already been infected. This risk has forced us to adopt a new emergency policy for the launching of watercraft onto Pine Mountain Lake.

All watercraft will be subject to an inspection by PML staff prior to launching into Pine Mountain Lake. During the inspection we will be asking boat owners where their watercraft was stored or used during the off-season

and we have a form to be completed by the owner that will be used to help us track and identify risk. Inspections will began May 1, 2008 and PML staff will be available 9:00 am through 8:00 pm, seven days a week at the boat launch area to assist boat owners. There will be a physical inspection of your watercraft and trailer (Main Marina and Dunn Court slips) before it can be admitted onto Pine Mountain Lake. This


is intended for power boats, fishing boats, pontoon boats, sailboats, kayaks, canoes, row boats, paddle boats or any other device that is capable of retaining water and transporting mussels.

Our staff will do everything they can to make the process as smooth as possible, but there will be times when multiple boats will be lined up for inspection and we appreciate your anticipated support. We recommend calling the Marina Store ahead of time to get an indication of the number of members preparing to launch and we will do what we can to get members launched as quickly as possible.

Also, we ask that any watercraft that have been docked on private docks year round, be entered into our system. Please stop by and see our Marina Manager, Ron Prieto or his staff to complete this process. For more information please call 962-8631.

What boaters can do to stem the spread of invasive quagga/zebra mussels

- Be aware that transferring a boat that has been in infested waters will allow the spread of quagga mussels, or the closely related zebra mussels.
- Thoroughly wash the hull of each fishing boat, sailboat, or personal watercraft once it leaves the water. This is especially important if the vessel has been moored for more than a day.
- Use hot water from a high-pressure hose when possible during all cleaning operations. The use of chlorine in the cleaning process is also recommended.
- Thoroughly wash any watercraft trailer used to remove a boat from a lake, river or waterway. Use
 hot water from a high-pressure hose when possible, or use chlorine in the cleaning process.
- Physically inspect all exposed surfaces. The presence of quagga mussels will feel like sandpaper to the touch.
- Remove aquatic plants from boat, motor and trailer. Check all underwater fittings and equipment, such as rollers, axle, bilge and trailer, and above water equipment, such as anchors, live wells, and docks. Place aquatic plants in trash if possible.
- Drain any lake or river water from equipment including the motor, bilges, live wells, bait buckets, and coolers. Ensure all drained areas are dry.
- Ensure the watercraft's lower outboard unit is drained and dry.
- Dispose of unwanted live bait on shore or in trash.
- Any vessel traveling from Lake Mead, Lake Mohave, Lake Havasu, the Colorado River, or lakes
 that receive water from the Colorado Aqueduct, including: Lake Skinner (Riverside County), Lake
 Mathews (Riverside County), San Vicente Reservoir (San Diego County), Dixon Lake (San Diego
 County), Lower Otay Reservoir (San Diego County), and Lake Murray (San Diego County) should
 remain dry and out of water for five days.
- For personal watercraft, impeller areas can contain quagga and zebra mussels and aquatic plants.
 Once upon the trailer, run the engine for five to 10 seconds to blow out excess water, mussels
 and plants. Before leaving water access, inspect and remove any mussels or plants from intake,
 steering nozzle, hull, and trailer.
- Exercise patience at Department of Fish and Game vehicle checkpoints and Department of Food and Agriculture border inspection stations.



Quagga/Zebra Mussel workshops

Assistant to the General Manager, Rick Whybra and Marina Manager, Ron Prieto attended invasive species workshops at the Stockton Yacht Club and Don Pedro Marina. They brought back a lot of great information on the impact and mitigation of the quagga/zebra mussel.


As PML members start to launch their boats in Pine Mountain Lake, we are taking steps to fight the transportation of invasive species. Part of the process is signage and education. It is important that Lake Users become informed and take precautions to keep our Lake healthy. We will continue to post the latest information to the PML Website and publish articles in the PML News. All PML boaters are asked to be aware of this potential danger to PML and take the necessary precautions. Members can access more information at the Department of Fish and Game website at www.dfg.ca.gov/invasives/quaggamussel.

We held a Special Meeting on May 10, 2008 at the Country Club to discuss the matter and our Limnologist, Mike Horvath gave an excellent presentation and answered questions regarding this important issue and the health of our Lake. We plan to hold the same presentation on June 21, 2008 at the monthly Board meeting. The meeting will be held at the Lake Lodge and start at 9 a.m. All members are encouraged to attend.

Thank you for your support in keeping our lake healthy and free of invasive species.

How do mussels hitch a ride?

By contaminating recreational watercraft and commercial haulers from infested waters:

- Many Southern California freshwaters
- Waters along the Colorado River drainage
- Waters along the Colorado River dramage
 All of the Great Lakes and their tributaries
- Most waters east of the Continental Divide
- Lake Mead, NV/AZ and waters it feeds

Don't let them ruin your boat or California's waters!

When leaving the water:


- Inspect all exposed surfaces small mussels feel like sandpaper to the touch.
- Wash the hull of each watercraft thoroughly.
- Remove all plants and animal material.
- Drain all water and dry all areas.
- Drain and dry the lower outboard unit.
- Clean and dry all live-wells.
- Empty and dry any buckets.
- Dispose of all bait in the trash.
- Wait 5 days and keep watercraft dry between launches into different fresh waters.



QUAGGA/ZEBRA MUSSEL FACT SHEET

State and federal agencies have initiated a unified response to the quagga mussel invasion in California. The involved agencies include the Departments of Fish and Game (DFG), Water Resources, Food and Agriculture, Boating and Waterways, Parks and Recreation; U.S. Fish and Wildlife, National Park Service, and Bureau of Reclamation; Metropolitan Water District and the City of San Diego Water Department; and multiple local authorities.

History of quagga mussels in North America

- Arrived from Europe in the 1980s
- Spread to many eastern waterways, rivers and lakes
- Found in Lake Mead in Arizona on Jan. 6, 2007, and later throughout Lake Mead's lower basin
- Found in Lakes Mojave and Havasu in the Colorado River Jan. 17
- Summer 2007 in the Colorado River Aqueduct System
- Recently found in San Diego County in San Vicente Reservoir, Lake Murray Reservoir, Lower Otay Reservoir, and Lake Dixon and in Riverside County in Lake Skinner and Lake Mathews.

Economic impact

U.S. Congressional researchers estimated that an infestation of the closely-related zebra mussel in the Great Lakes area cost the power industry \$3.1 billion in the 1993-1999 period, with an economic impact on industries, businesses, and communities of more than \$5 billion.

In California, spread of the mussel threatens water delivery systems, hydroelectric facilities, agriculture, recreational boating and fishing, and the environment in general.

Quagga:

- Typically the same size as a fingernail but can grow up to about 2 inches long
- Common color patterns vary wildly with black, cream, or white bands
- Habitat varies they can colonize both hard and soft surfaces in freshwater, from the surface to more than 400 feet in depth.
- Arrived in the U.S. from the Ukraine in 1989

Zebra^{*}

- Typically the same size as a fingernail but can grow up to about 2 inches long
- Commonly have alternating dark and light stripes
- Inhabit fresh water at depths from 4 to 180 feet (most commonly 6-12 feet) and prefer hard surfaces
- Arrived in the U.S. in 1988 from Europe

Both mussels:

- Produce young (larva) that are too small to see with the naked eye, but newly settled young feel like sandpaper on smooth surfaces
- May release over 40,000 eggs in a reproductive cycle and up to 1 million in a spawning season
- Attach to aquatic plants, boats, motors, trailers, and recreation equipment or can be present in water (in addition to substrates, docks, piers, anchors, etc)
- As they grow, can be seen on boat hulls, especially around trim tabs, transducers, along keels, and on lower units and propellers
- Can be found in bilges, live wells and motors
- Can survive three to five days out of water depending upon temperature and humidity







Care and Feeding of Septic Systems by Jim Goodrich, GCSD General Manager

formally GCSD doesn't get involved with septic systems unless your system fails and the County Department of Environmental Health requires you to hook into GCSD's sewer system. However, all of us have a vested interest in the health of your septic system because if it fails, especially if you are not aware of it, the environment could suffer.

Your septic system has two major components: the septic tank and the leach field. Water and waste from the various fixtures in your home travel through pipes to the septic tank, which is buried somewhere in your yard. The septic tank has a volume of around 1,000 to 1,200 gallons and is the first step in the treatment process. These tanks are often chambered to allow oil, grease, and solids to be trapped so that they can't clog the down stream leach field (more about this later).

Notice that I spoke about the "health" of your septic system. Like GCSD's wastewater treatment plant, your septic system is a life form of sorts. Waste is broken down in the septic tank by bacteria that live in it. As waste moves through the tank chambers, it is broken down and any residual solids sink to the bottom of the tank. The bacteria that break down the waste are the vital element that makes the septic system work, thus making your septic system a living organism.

You must do a few things to maintain the septic tank. First, the bacteria need to be replenished periodically. You can buy septic tank enzymes at home improvement centers for this. Adding enzyme twice a year is usually adequate. If you need to pump your septic tank every year or two, then you need to add enzyme more often. Pick two days six months apart that you can remember, like July 4th and New Years Day, to add enzyme.

The second thing you need to do periodically is have your septic tank pumped out to remove the solids that sink to the bottom of the tank during waste treatment. Depending on what you put into your tank, you will need to have it inspected every three to five years, and have the solids pumped out if necessary. During the inspection, look around the tank seal for leaking, which may indicate improper tank installation. You can prolong pumping by not using your garbage disposal. Egg shells, for instance, don't decompose in the septic tank. Also, don't add chlorine (bleach or cleaners) because chlorine will kill the bacteria in your septic tank.

When the waste reaches the final chamber of the septic tank, it is fairly clear though it still probably contains harmful bacteria and viruses. From the tank, the treated waste flows to the leach field, which is a series of perforated pipes that are bedded in sand in your yard. These pipes are above the water table. As the wastewater leaves the leach field pipes through the perforations in the pipes, it flows down through the sand and dirt on its way to the water table, or to be taken up by plant roots. As the waste moves through the ground, harmful bacteria and viruses, as well as nitrates, ammonia, and phosphates are removed from the wastewater.

The leach field is the second component of your septic system. It can fail in four ways. First, someone can run over the pipes and break or crush them. Second, roots can enter the perforations in the leach field pipes or at the distribution box and clog or even break them so that wastewater can't percolate into the ground. Third, if you let your septic tank fill with solids, the solids can be pumped into the leach field where they will clog the sand filter beneath the leach field. Finally, heavy rains or surface water runoff can saturate the soil beneath the leach field, which will slow or stop the flow of wastewater from the pipes. If your leach field fails by any one of these methods, waste will likely back up into your house. In the first or last failure method, wastewater will flow out onto the ground surface, causing a significant health risk and odor nuisance.

You can do several things to help protect and maintain your leach field. First, don't let anyone drive a vehicle over your leach field or allow livestock to graze over the leach field. Second, keep trees and large shrubs away from your leach fields so that roots are less likely to enter your pipes. Third, put septic system root killer into your septic system once a year, usually in spring time to keep the perforations clear of roots.

If properly maintained, your septic system can last 20, 30 or more years. Spending a few dollars a year to maintain your septic system will help you avoid spending tens of thousands of dollars building a new leach field or hooking up to the municipal sewer system. 
Stu Heller, who built our model of the Longfellow Stamp Mill currently exhibited at the Museum, has once again



In a food processor, combine cheese, half-and-half, and vanilla. Cover and process until combined. Add melted chocolate while food processor is running. Process until well combined. Spoon into demitasse cups or small bowls. Serve immediately, or cover and chill for up to 24 hours. If desired, garnish with fresh berries and mint leaves.

HOT AND SOUR SOUP

recipe by Tom Knoth and Paula Martell

2 Quarts chicken Stock (or 5-14 oz cans Swanson's low sodium chicken and 2 chicken bouillon cubes)

8 fresh Shitake or Crimini mushrooms, sliced

2 baby bok choy, thinly sliced or ½head cabbage, shredded

½ pound lean pork, cut into very thin

or 2 (4-ounce) boneless, skinless chicken breasts cut into very thin strips,

or 8 oz uncooked shrimp, peeled and de-veined

1 Tbsp sesame oil

1/4 Cup rice vinegar

1 tsp Sriracha chili paste

1/4 tsp cracked black pepper

8 oz fresh firm tofu, cut into thin strips or small cubes

1 Tbsp cornstarch

2 scallions (green and white parts), thinly slivered

1 egg, lightly beaten

In a large pot, heat chicken stock on high heat (or canned broth + 2 chicken bouillon cubes). Add mushrooms, bok choy, and meat (unless using shrimp), sesame oil, rice vinegar, and Sriracha

paste. Heat to boil, then reduce heat, cover, and simmer for a few minutes; add tofu and shrimp (if using), bring back to boil, and then simmer, covered for 1 minute more.

Stir 2 tablespoons of the hot stock into 1 tablespoon of cornstarch to form paste; add this mixture to the soup. Cook and stir for another 2 minutes.

Stir in scallions. Check seasonings and then adjust with salt or a few drops of Sriracha chili paste. Pour egg into the soup in a steady stream, stirring only a few times to create shreds. Serve immediately.



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The Pinwheel Galaxy

In the March 2008 issue of the PML Newsletter, I discussed the Andromeda Galaxy. The Andromeda Galaxy is our nearest spiral galaxy. Andromeda is very similar in appearance to the Milky Way and is often referred to as our "sister" galaxy. This month we'll cover the Pinwheel Galaxy.

Historically, galaxies have been categorized according to their visual shape. A common shape is the elliptical galaxy, which has an ellipse-shaped profile. Spiral galaxies are disk-shaped with curving, spiral arms. Galaxies with irregular or unusual shapes are known as peculiar galaxies, and typically result from disruption by the gravitational pull of neighboring galaxies. Small galaxies that lack a coherent structure could also be referred to as irregular galaxies. There are probably more than a hundred billion galaxies in the observable universe.

Spiral galaxies are disks with spiral arms that extend from the galactic bulge (large tightly packed group of stars) in the center of the galaxy. The spiral arms are brighter than the surrounding disk because they are sites of ongoing young and hot burning star formation. Many scientists believe that there is a massive black hole in the center of these galaxies.

The Pinwheel galaxy is the brightest of a group of at least 9 galaxies, called the M101 Group. The name "Galaxy" is from the Greek root galaxias meaning

"milky," a reference to the galaxy that we live in – the Milky Way galaxy. Typical galaxies range from dwarfs, with as few as ten million stars, up to giants, with one trillion stars, all orbiting a common center of mass. Galaxies can also contain many multiple star systems, star clusters, and various interstellar clouds. Our Sun is one of the stars in the Milky Way galaxy; our Solar System includes the Earth and all the other objects that orbit the Sun.

The Pinwheel galaxy is a relatively large galaxy. With a diameter of 170 thousand light-years it is nearly twice the size of our Milky Way. Even with its larger size, more than 2.5 times the diameter of the Andromeda galaxy, the Pinwheel galaxy appears almost twice as faint as Andromeda in our sky. This is because while the Andromeda galaxy is about 2.6 million light-years away from Earth, the Pinwheel galaxy is approximately 24 million light-years away.

Another interesting property of the Pinwheel galaxy is that it seems to be asymmetrical on one side. Notice that the spiral arm at the bottom of the image is separated from the center more than the other spiral arms. It is thought that the Pinwheel galaxy underwent a near collision with another galaxy and the associated gravitational tidal forces caused the asymmetry.

Best viewed in the skies above Pine Mountain Lake during the months of March through August, the Pinwheel



is not visible to the naked eye – you'll need a telescope with a reasonable aperture (5" or more is recommended). When viewed through a telescope, the Pinwheel will appear as a faint fuzzy patch of light – in larger telescopes you can make out more of the spiral shape.

Long exposures from today's digital camera sensors can capture light far too faint for our unaided eyes to see. This image of the Pinwheel galaxy has 60 minutes of exposure time and clearly shows off the spiral shape in all its magnificent glory. Given its relative distance from the Earth, 24 million light-years, it's amazing to be looking at "light" that has taken 24 million years to reach our eyes – or in

this case the camera sensor. Just to put that into perspective, many scientists believe that men and women have only walked the earth for the past 20 thousand years.

Crooked Still to Open Music Series

Rock energy coexists with oldtime mountain soul. Spooky backwoods melodies combine with hip hard-hitting beats. Raw, searing blues riffs intermingle with high heavenly vocals. Sound good? Here's the catch: No electricity. No drums.

Meet Crooked Still, the hot young alternative bluegrass group on a mission to bend the boundaries of traditional music. The unlikely combination of banjo, cello, and double-bass drives this low lonesome band, whose captivating vocals and high-wire solos have enraptured audiences all over North America and Ireland since 2001.

Four very unique musical personalities merge to form Crooked Still. Aoife O'Donovan's refined, sultry vocals float over Rushad Eggleston's rumbling cello riffs, Dr. Gregory Liszt's futuristic fourfinger banjo rolls and Corey DiMario's pulsing bass lines. The resulting acoustic fusion can warp a traditional American tune to the brink of unrecognizability without sacrificing the authenticity of the original sources. "It's almost like we're going back and making imaginary history," says Eggleston, whose versatile cello style has already sparked a revolution among young cellists. "What if the 1920s Appalachian musicians could've heard the music we hear now?'

In the spring of 2001, singer O'Donovan and bassist DiMario were classmates at the New England Conservatory of Music in Boston, MA. Unbeknownst to them at the time, just across the river in the laboratories of MIT, a young cellist named Rushad Eggleston from the Berklee College of Music met every night to jam with Greg Liszt, then a graduate student and aspiring banjo player. A serendipitous meeting at a late-night party brought all four of these musicians together for the first time, and

Crooked Still was born in the summer of that year.

As its members finished school, Crooked Still frequently performed around Boston, collecting rave reviews from the local press, notably the Boston Globe, Northeast Performer, and the Boston Herald. The band's fan base grew until it became almost impossible to get into the Cantab Lounge in Cambridge when Crooked Still took the stage. A trip to the North American Folk Alliance in 2004 resulted in invitations to perform at the Falcon Ridge Folk Festival and historic Newport Folk Festival. Hop High, the debut album from Crooked Still, was released at the prestigious Falcon Ridge Folk Festival in July, 2004 and was the top-selling CD at the festival that year.

Following the success of this first festival appearance, Crooked Still has appeared at concert halls, nightclubs, coffeehouses, and festivals in twenty-three states and several different countries. This grassroots endeavor frequently lands Hop High among the top ten best-selling CD's at the online independent megastore CD Baby.

Although being an unsigned band has afforded Crooked Still the maximum creative freedom, when the president of Signature Sounds Recordings came knocking, Crooked Still listened. With a roster that includes such diverse acts as indie-rocker Josh Ritter, contemporary songwriter Lori McKenna, and old-timey folk jammers The Mammals, Signature Sounds was a perfect fit, simultaneously progressive and down-to-earth. Crooked Still's first nationwide release on Signature Sounds, Shaken by a Low Sound, hit stores on August 22.

Crooked Still opens the Summer Concert Series at Mountain Sage in Groveland on Saturday, June 14 at 5:00.

DID YOU KNOW?

AGE-RELATED CHANGES IN THE SENSORY ORGANS Part II

"The information here is generalized and will vary from individual to individual, influenced by lifestyle, genetics and the presence of chronic conditions. However, it offers a valuable platform to caregivers and others in understanding and identifying issues that can come with aging.

TASTE and SMELL: the ability to taste and smell begins to diminsih in our fifties, diminishing the ability to taste sweet and salty. This results in many foods tasting bitter. The ability to smell decreases only slightly, but that small change can make it difficult to notice and identify subtle aromas, as a result foods can taste bland. Often, to compensate for these changes more sugar and salt are added to foods. This is a

problem for those with hypertension or heart disease and, of course, refined sugar is nothing but empty calories, no fiber, nutrients or vitamins. Age brings increased symptoms of dry mouth as less saliva is produced. Not only is dry mouth uncomfortable, but it also impairs the ability to detect the aromas of foods.

SKIN and the Sense of Touch: As the skin ages it becomes thinner, less elastic and nerve endings decrease. The layer of fat under the skin acts as protection and cushions and supports the skin. With age this layer of fat is replaced by a more fibrous tissue which is not as effective in protecting the body or conserving heat, this can lead to increased intolerance to cold. The number of nerve endings decreases and the sensation of, and sensitivity to, pain is reduced, increasing susceptibility to injury. The number of blood

vessels in the deep layers of skin decrease with age. One of the functions of these blood vessels is to move body heat from the inner core to the skin's surface. With fewer vessels there is a decreased blood flow; overheating and

heatstroke become a greater risk for older adults."


