Where Water Wars. At the January Board meeting the Board approved the publishing of a draft resolution proposed by The Friends of the Lake modifying the lake usage rules. At the February meeting the Water Ski and Wakeboard group gave their response. Before this turns into a full fledged civil war and everyone gets their knickers in a twist, I want to make it crystal clear that no action on this proposal will be taken until all the facts are in and everyone has had their chance to fully air their opinions.

What we are experiencing is the democratic process in action. Every individual property owner or recognized group has the right to propose changes to the way we do business. It is by no means a "fiat accompli." It does not mandate that the Board has an obligation to accept any ad hoc proposal. The Board can approve, amend or reject any such proposal based on the facts and the desires of the majority of our Membership. This resolution was published primarily as a "straw man" to initiate a meaningful dialog between all the interested parties.

Moving right along. The purchase orders for all the Point of Sale (POS) software and hardware have been let. We should begin the installation and training within the next few weeks. The plan is to have the entire system up and running before May 1. The POS RESIDENT'S MESSAGE

system should allow us to monitor each of the major operations in real time and make corrections as required. It has the added benefit of interfacing directly to the new accounting package so that human intervention in transferring the data is no longer required. This will improve accuracy by eliminating human error, thus increasing our efficiency. A secondary benefit that our membership has been beating us about the head and shoulders for is the reinstitution of the member charge system. Stay tuned for further progress reports.

If you have been to the club lately you will notice the brand new 55" plasma, flat panel HDTV. A big thank you is in order to our friends at the ROOFBB who made it possible by their generous contribution. This is the first step in our evolution towards making the club a general gathering place for our membership. Future plans include a redo of the sound system (almost complete) and the installation of a full WIFI environment. This means that you will be able to come and watch TV, listen to music, or work on your laptop connected to the Internet in a comfortable environment. Welcome to the 21st century.

You will be receiving a copy of the 2006 Annual Report in the April edition of the PML News. We have just completed the closing of the 2006 financials and our annual audit. Our previous auditor could no longer support us due to a loss of personnel to the larger firms so this year we had to contract a new auditor; Porter and Company of Ventura CA. They are a medium sized firm specializing in large mutual benefit corporations such as ours (their website is www.porterandcompany.com.). We passed the audit with flying colors and received an unqualified audit approval letter. And yes, we officially financed 2006 without using 2007 money and within the Operations budget. Thanks to Ken Spencer and his Accounting staff for making this happen.

Here's an update on the legal scene. The big news is that we won the PML versus Huey case and were awarded legal fees and costs associated with that case along with our original claim. The matter will now go to collection to recover these amounts.

The remaining three cases are pretty much stagnated. In the Lett Arbitration, a new arbitrator has been selected but a final arbitration date has yet to be established. We are pushing for a speedy resolution to this issue but there appears to be a bit of foot dragging on part of the other party. The other two cases haven't moved since my last report. The legal wheels surely do grind forward slowly so I guess we all have to be patient.

Finally, we have something new planned for the March Board meeting. At this meeting we plan to have the first of our senior managers' quarterly operations reviews. Each of our senior managers will give a detailed report on their accomplishments for the previous quarter, a presentation of their financial performance, the problems they are encountering and what they are doing about them along with any request for assistance they need from the Board. These meetings will have a threefold purpose: they will keep us informed of the actual operation; they will allow the membership to meet our managers up close and personal and provide us with some insight into how tough their jobs really are, and it will ensure that the Board is aware of any help required. I believe this will be very informative so put the date on your calendar.

## GENERAL MANAGER'S MESSAGE

#### Administration

The Annual Audit and Report is complete and scheduled to be mailed to all members with the April edition of the PML News. I would like to thank our Controller, Ken Spencer, and his staff for all their hard work and hours devoted to getting this done in a timely manner. What is amazing is that they were able to complete the January Financial statements right on schedule in the middle of the Annual Audit. Outstanding job! I am happy to report that the Association was in a favorable financial position at the end of 2006 fiscal year.

On Thursday, February 15th, the Audit Committee met with Ken to review the Audit Report draft and provide us with their recommended changes. The meeting was lengthy and intensive and resulted in a well-written, thoroughly reviewed document. Special thanks to Audit Committee members, Fred Hancock and John Lloyd, for their time and effort on this project.

#### **Marina Grill and Store**

The Marina Store and Grill building repair and upgrade is complete. The building was in a sad state of disrepair due to dry rot, roof leaks and equipment breakdowns. Maintenance has put a significant amount of work into this project and everything is looking great. One of the benefits of this level of repair is that we were able to upgrade the quality of drainage and safety.

#### **Marina Docks**

The Marina Dock repair is complete and the Dunn Court and Lake Lodge dock safety extension fabrications are complete and scheduled to be installed within the next three weeks. These additions will improve safety to members and guests during the loading and off-loading of passengers on our Water Taxi.

#### Marina picnic area and beach

Our Maintenance crews have been performing their annual tree trimming, soil aeration and re-seeding of the grass at the Marina. Everything is on schedule and these efforts should come to fruition prior to the start of the Summer Season.

#### **Marina Fence**

In an effort to keep the Marina mud bank area safe, a brand new wood fence was installed at the top of the slope near the docks. It fits in nicely with the area and provides a safe barrier for our members and staff.

#### Quarterly Senior Management Operational Review

In cooperation with the Board, we will be initiating an Operational Review Program this year. At the March meeting we will hold the first quarterly meeting between senior management and the Board to review the operational performance of each department and status of goals, objectives and projects assigned to each manager. We have scheduled time at each quarterly Board meeting for this purpose. The review meetings will give the management team an opportunity to brief the Board and membership on their individual amenities and, if required, to discuss needs and assignment of resources to improve operations.

#### **Country Club Kitchen Floor Project**

Maintenance Manager, Tom Moffitt has met with multiple contractors and the initial bids for the replacement of the Kitchen Floor are coming in. This project will include three new floor drains and special flooring seams to help eliminate water leaks into the Ladies Locker Room below. Tom is also in communication with Tuolumne County Planning gathering information to help speed the permit process on this project.

#### **ROOFBB** Donation of New 55" Flat screen Plasma HDTV for the Country Club

I would like to thank the ROOFBB Organization for their generous donation of \$2,500 for the purchase of a new 55" Flat screen Plasma HDTV for the Country Club. The TV was purchased and installed just in time for the Super Bowl and is a great addition to our lounge. The ROOFBB's fundraising efforts (like Monday Night Football at the Club) have been a huge benefit to our community and I would like to commend them for their work.

#### **Stables Phase II Fencing Project**

The final bid for Phase II of the Stables Fencing Project was approved and installation of the fencing is scheduled for the middle of March.

#### **Lake Dredging Project**

As part of the supplemental environmental studies required by the County to address environmental and biological concerns by all of the governmental agencies, studies were conducted by wildlife experts to survey the impact on plants, birds, fish and amphibians. The last of these studies and surveys was conducted by a fish and amphibian expert on Monday. We are confident these studies will culminate in the granting of permits by all of the agencies involved so that we can start dredging and we anticipate completion of the supplemental report next month.

#### Annual Dam Survey

Every year we hire an outside engineering firm to conduct a survey of our Dam to determine if there has been any movement or slippage. This survey is incorporated into a report that is sent to the Division of Dam Safety. The firm of Anderson and Associates has performed this work for us for many years and they have done a great job for us at a competitive rate. They will be conducting the survey and preparing the report in March.

#### Mailhouses

We are in the final stages of bringing electricity and lighting to all of our mailhouses. This lighting will improve safety for our members as well as provide an appropriate working environment for Postal Service carriers. We have received final inspection and approval by the County this week. We are working with PG&E to speed up the process and anticipate completion of this project by the end of the month.

#### Main Gate Entrance Project

After comprehensive review of ideas submitted by the membership and site inspections of other Associations, we have worked with our architect to develop two final design concepts for the Main Gate Entrance. We have also scheduled our Maintenance crew to start work on the Main Gate Guard Shack and upgrade this building. There are artist renderings of the two design concepts at the Administration Office for member review. We are very pleased with the final designs and plan to make a final decision before the end of the month.

#### **Point of Sale Hardware and Software**

The hardware for the new POS system for the Club and Golf Pro Shop has arrived and we have already installed and updated the systems with all of the new Windows and antivirus software in preparation for installation at the amenities. The software vendor is scheduled to install and implement the new program and we anticipate a go-live date sometime next month. Ken Spencer and Rick Whybra have taken the lead on this project and it is progressing nicely.

#### **ADA Ramp for the Pool**

We have the preliminary drawings and designs for the new ADA Ramp for the Swimming Pool and have contacted concrete contractors to review the engineered plans and provide bids for this project. Our goal is to have the ramp in place for the Summer Season.

#### Sound System at the Country Club

The new Sound System Project at the Country Club is complete and working great. PML Electrician, Bob LeBarre, and his team put a lot of effort into making sure we ended up with a quality system. Each area and room in the Club is set up as a zone and the system includes wireless microphones and the capability to be tied in with the sound equipment of visiting bands and entertainment. I would like to thank the Men's Club for their generous donation to help us complete this project.

#### **Lake Lodge Carpeting**

We have approved the final quote for replacement of the carpet here in the Lake Lodge. The scheduled replacement dates are March 29, 30 and 31. We are coordinating with all of the groups that use the Lodge to ensure there will be no schedule conflicts. The carpet selected is highly stain resistant and has a pattern that will mitigate appearance effects of wear and stains.



### Draft of PML Boating and Lake Rules with changes as proposed by the PML Water Ski and Wake Board Club

RESOLUTION 05.01 APRIL 16, 2005 UPDATED: 11 FEBRUARY 2007

#### PMLA BOATING AND LAKE RULES

For your safety, California Boating Laws prevail. For your convenience, copies of the pamphlet "ABC's of California Boating Laws," published by the California Harbors and Watercraft are available at the Marina Store.

Listed below are further regulations that apply to Pine Mountain Lake boating usage. Failure to comply with them shall be grounds for termination of your privileges. Violations are subject to citation. All boats are subject to inspection to determine compliance with State Law and Association requirements. If you have any questions on the safety requirements of your boat, contact a Lake Patrol Officer or the Marina Store.

#### **GENERAL BOATING RULES**

Know our rules and abide by them for your enjoyment and safety.

All boats on Pine Mountain Lake must meet both State of California and Pine Mountain Lake registration requirements. Only property owners in good standing may register their boats.

REGISTRATION: Requirements for registration include: current liability insurance with a minimum of \$300,000, proof of PML residency, proof that the boat meets California Boating Law safety requirements, compliance with PML nonwake enhancing requirements, and agreement to abide by lake rules.

PML non-wake enhancing regulations restrict the use of internal ballast tanks, external fins, foils, panels, or boat hulls specifically designed to increase wakes. Any boats incorporating these devices, registered at PML must adhere to PML's restrictions on not utilizing these devices. All boats are limited to 5 M.P.H. except during water skiing hours, where the speed limit is 40 M.P.H. in the ski area only. All boats, except those signed up for skiing, must stay out of the ski area while skiing is in progress.

Open stack boats and others with a decibel level exceeding 82 db are prohibited.

Note that areas marked "no wake" mean no wake. These areas are marked with white buoys that say No Wake. Boats may have to go less than 5 MPH in order not to create any wake.

No "Jet Skis," "Waverunners" or other similar variations of personal watercraft are allowed on Pine Mountain Lake (except authorized emergency or law enforcement equipment.)

Only skippers (16 years and older with a valid drivers license) designated by a boat owner may operate a powerboat, provided that they know the lake and marina rules.

Boat owners are responsible for informing their operators of all lake and marina rules.

Boat owners are responsible for the operation of their boats and the wakes they create regardless of who may be operating the boat.

Reckless operation and disregard for others may result in citation and forfeiture of lake boating privileges.

Boaters must stay inside the passenger/ operator areas of the boat. Riding outside of the railing or gate is prohibited.

Powerboat operators may not tow or pull rafts, paddleboats, kayaks, canoes or similar craft.

In case of an accident, give any necessary assistance, then immediately contact the Lake Safety Patrol (based at the Marina).

Sufficient life preservers must be aboard for each passenger. All boaters less than 12 years of age and non-swimmers must wear properly tied life jackets.

Give a wide berth to sail and manually operated boats, as they have the right of way.

No powerboats may be operated within 50 feet of a swimming area.

When meeting another boat, keep to the right.

Individuals wishing to blow out their motors may do so during ski hours only. (Up to 4 boats maximum are allowed in the ski pattern with skiers/boarders given priority over boats wishing to blow it out). *Blowing out is limited to two (2) times around the ski pattern*.

The recreational use of towables (e.g. inflatable device, inner tube) shall be allowed with a maximum of two (2) riders allowed any one time, observe a maximum 5 mph speed limit at all times, excluding designated No-Wake areas, and must stay out of the ski area during skiing hours.

Every effort shall be made to minimize wakes, especially those affecting shoreline properties.

Lake usage for waterskiing and wakeboarding on weekends may be restricted up to two (2) times a year due to 4th of July fireworks/boat parade, or special events including fishing derbies, sailing regatta days and charity boating events.

All lake activity is suspended, when CDF helicopters perform firefighting procedures or other emergencies that require use of lake water.

Lake patrol will be in effect daily. Citations may be given for PML rule infractions. Two citations will constitute action for removing your boat from Pine Mountain Lake.

#### **BOAT LAUNCHING & REMOVAL DATES**

NO BOAT MAY BE LAUNCHED without current Pine Mountain Lake registration.

BOAT LAUNCHING AND REMOV-AL is allowed only at the Marina boat ramp.

ALL BOATS NOT REMOVED from Dunn Court and the Marina area by October 31st of each year will be removed and stored AT THE OWNERS EXPENSE.

NO TRAILER PARKING permitted except for daily use, and only in designated areas. No trailer parking will be permitted the date of the Independence Day fireworks celebration.

DUNN COURT SAILBOAT OWN-ERS: Please relocate your sailboat the day before the annual fireworks display. This date may vary from year to year.

#### **Thanks To My Neighbors**



Manager along with the PML Waterski and Wakeboard Club and managed by the Marina Manager. Designated skiing and wakeboarding times will be established by the Marina Manager along with the PML Waterski and Wakeboard Club. Skiing time will be limited to one (1) hour initially, and modified by the Lake Patrol and Marina Manager depending on the demand.

A maximum of four (4) boats will be allowed to ski at any one time. A distance of 100 feet shall be maintained between boats.

A counter-clockwise ski pattern shall be maintained.

To minimize shoreline wakes on the North shore, powerboats shall stay as close as possible to the main beach buoys when traveling from the dam toward Big Creek. When traveling Big Creek toward the dam, powerboats should stay as close as possible to the center of the ski pattern as safety permits. Always pass an approaching powerboat on the right.

## **The Cost** to **PMLA Members** for Pending Litigation

n response to property owner concerns and questions regarding pending litigation and the costs to the Association, we have listed the current pending cases by title and the amount the Association has paid so far.

> Ken Lett v. PMLA (Arbitration) \$51,265.62

#### Ken Lett and Mel Kauffman v. PMLA (Member Lawsuit) \$43,005.82

PMLA v. Thomas Huey (CC&R Enforcement Lawsuit) \$64,840.31

Dane Nielsen v. PMLA (Lawsuit - Labor Code 132(a) Claim) \$20,834.50

All boats being used on PML waters must be operated in a manner to minimize the size of the wake produced by the boat. With the exception of pontoon boats and those boats traveling less than 5 mph, all powerboat operators shall operate at planing speeds as soon as practical when in the ski pattern.

Wake Enhancement: The use of devices, equipment, or placement of passengers on boats for the purpose of creating an enlarged wake is prohibited. Further, no such devices or equipment may be used on any boat in PML. Such devices and equipment include, but are not limited to: exterior panels or wings deployed underwater; rubberized, plastic or metal tanks or bags filled with any material; crowding of passengers to the rear; inside-the-hull water tanks or boat hulls designed specifically to enhance the wake. Additionally, the operator of an outboard or I/O drive boat must keep the out-drive down to optimally trim the boat to minimize the size of the boat's wake at all times.

Any boat that produces excessive wakes may be cited. Two citations result in eviction from the lake for the remainder of the calendar year.

Skiers should check-in with the boat patrol upon arrival in the ski area. Skiers should enter the ski course at the White SKI BUOY staging area located outside the Marina. No other area! There is a voluntary drop area outside the 5 M.P.H. buoys at Fisherman's Cove. See Marina Store and Good Neighbor Rules for details.

Ski course is marked with red buoys. Stay inside of red buoys. These buoys are not a SLALOM COURSE.

Ski boats must have a red or orange flag and an observer at least 12 years of age.

Ski boats returning to a fallen skier must make a starboard (right) turn to return to the skier while raising the red or orange warning flag. The boat operator shall make the 'turn-around' at a slow speed to minimize his wake. Obviously, safety is a concern, but anything a boat operator can do to minimize wake size is required.

The driver of any boat approaching a boat displaying a red or orange flag must acknowledge the downed skiers presence by raising their hand for the skiers tow boat to see and take appropriate evasive action to ensure the safety of the downed skier.

Skier must raise one (1) ski (or wakeboard or kneeboard) when in water with slack towline to warn other boats in the **PARKING, BEACH & SWIMMING RULES** area.

All skiers must wear proper Coast Guard approved life preservers.

Number of water skiers per boat: 2 maximum at a time. When one skier drops, the second skier must drop immediately.

During ski hours, the use of discs, inner tubes, surfboards, water toys and non-approved devices are prohibited.

WATER SKIS, KNEEBOARDS & WAKEBOARDS ONLY.

An area for beginning water ski instruction is available. Contact the Lake Patrol Officer or Marina Manager for details.

LAKE PATROL will be in effect 7 days per week. Citations will be given for PML rule infractions. Two citations will constitute action for removing your boat from Pine Mountain Lake for the remainder of the calendar year.

KNOW OUR RULES AND ABIDE BY THEM FOR YOUR ENJOYMENT AND SAFETY.

#### **FISHING RULES**

California State Fishing License required and to be displayed at all times while fishing. Fish limits are governed by California Fish & Game laws. NO LIVE BAIT other than worms.

Fishing off water taxi docks during water taxi operating hours is prohibited. Trespassing on private property is not allowed.

No fishing within 25 feet of designated swim areas.

#### **SAILING RULES**

Sailing Hours: Anytime

SAILBOAT LAUNCHING is allowed only at the Marina boat ramp.

Sailboats and all others must stay out of the skiing area during skiing hours.

The ski area is outlined with red buoys. Stay out of the ski area while skiing is in progress. Be aware of skiing hours to protect yourself. Avoid the east end of the lake (Lake Lodge and Big Creek entrance) during skiing hours.

Sailing of rental boats in Big Creek is not allowed.

No windsurf boards without a sail are allowed on the lake.

#### Swimming:

SWIM AT YOUR OWN RISK. NO LIFEGUARDS ON DUTY.

Swimming is only allowed within the designated swim areas.

No float tubes, surfboards, lounge rafts, etc., allowed on the lake other than within 30 feet from your own private dock. (Tubes and "soft" float toys are allowed in the swim areas). Inflatable boats, canoes and kayaks that are used on Pine Mountain Lake must be registered in the same manner as hard-bottom boats.

Do not venture more than 30 feet from your own private dock. DO NOT swim across or in open lake area.

#### Beaches:

Follow all posted beach and marina rules and regulations. Note: The beaches are non-smoking areas.

No glass containers, loud music, hardballs, profane language or drinking of alcoholic beverages by anyone under the age of 21 are allowed on any Pine Mountain Lake beach area.

Bicycles and skateboards must be walked through all amenity-parking areas. No riding.

Dogs are restricted from PML Marina, Dunn Court, and Lake Lodge beaches,

#### Parking:

If the marina parking lot is full, please park at Dunn Court, the Lake Lodge, or Fisherman's Cove and ride the water taxi to the Marina. Water taxi operating schedule is available upon request.

FAILURE TO COMPLY MAY RE-SULT IN FINES OR LOSS OF LAKE PRIVILEGES.

Additional rules and regulations may apply. Rules are subject to change without notice.

ONLY property owners and PMLA  $\leq$  employees on duty will be allowed  $\geq$ to park at the Marina parking area on New weekends and holidays from Memorial MARCH 2007

# Friends of the Lake Proposes More Equitable Lake Usage by Marilyn Hathaway, President

riends of the Lake has requested that the PMLA Board of Directors consider some changes to the lake rules for the 2007 season.

The purpose of these proposed changes is to achieve a more fair division of time on our lake. Like any community-owned amenity, use of the lake must be governed by what is best for the majority of homeowners. The challenge is to provide the most good to the most people, not just to the loudest people.

There is, of course, vigorous debate on this proposal from the water ski and wakeboard enthusiasts. Unfortunately, there is also a great deal of misinformation and emotional response. In fact, the proposed changes are quite mild and are based on real data obtained from Marina records.

For example, in 2006 there were a total of 775 boats registered at PML. Only about 75, or less than 10%, of the boats were registered to ski or wakeboard. The other 90% is comprised of sailboats, fishing boats, pontoons, canoes, kayaks, and paddle boats - all of which co-exist nicely on the lake.

On our small lake, it is simply not practical for most boats to use the main part of the lake while anyone is skiing or wake-boarding. It is unpleasant and sometimes dangerous for other boats to be in the vicinity of fast boats that are producing wakes. It is even unpleasant and dangerous to be on a dock while these boats are wake-boarding.

The data shows that skiers and wake boarders use only 30-50% of their available time on weekends. During the week, it drops even more, to only 17-22% usage of available time. Meanwhile, there are many other boats (fisherman, kayakers, pleasure boats and pontoons) that would like to use the lake during this time.

Some have suggested that this is an argument between younger, working, part-time homeowners and older, retired, full-time residents. This claim is incendiary and is completely untrue.

Friends of the Lake understands that weekends are prime time for skiing. Our proposal does not change the current weekend schedule. Our proposal continues to have Friday, Saturday, Sunday and Monday mornings and evenings, as well as morning hours during the mid-week, for skiing and wake boarding. We are asking the board to establish Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday evenings as quiet time (no fast boating).

Friends of the Lake sincerely hopes that this proposal can be addressed on the merits (rather than emotions) and that we can work together to achieve a result that is most fair for the majority of boaters. To

One reader ask me if the dry January was an omen of a very dry season. I said that my thought was that a single month probably has little bearing on the whole season.

Later I decided to check whether a very wet (or dry) January may have lead to a coresponding season. First I found 8 Jan's were very dry and 10 were very wet. I took seven of each extreme together with their season and totals, and computed the averages:--

(1) The dry January's averaged 1.12 in. with season average of 27.61 in.

(2) The wet ones averaged 12.38 in. with season at 48.88 in.

Since <u>normal</u> is about midway of these season totals, we may expect a short fall of 6 to 10 inches. (or perhaps only the January norm will be missing.)

#### **Golf rules quiz** (answers below)

1. Q. When marking the position of the ball, must the ball marker be placed behind the ball, or may it be placed to the side of or in front of the ball?

2. Q. Are plugs of compacted soil produced through aeration of the fairway loose impediments? ANSWERS BELOW

#### Answers to golf rules quiz:

There is no restriction as to where the ball must be marked however (isn't there always a however?) placing the ball marker in front of the ball may do something to the green (pressing down a tuft of grass) which could lead to a penalty.

Yes. Loose soil is not a loose impediment. However, (here we go again) such plugs, since they consist of compacted soil, are considered loose impediments.

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## **Tioga Fire Science and Rescue ROP (Regional Occupational Program)**

The fire Science class have spent many hours at the Groveland Fire Department learning everything from chemistry to building construction plus these cadets have gone on some very interesting field trips!

They visited the command center in San Andreas to see how the Tuolumne-Calaveras Unit (TCU) operates. By visiting the center they were able to observe the dispatch process of a 911 call.

Chief Barrows of the Sonora City Fire Department invited the cadets to see the only quint (ladder) truck in the TCU, observe a working arson K-9 (dog) and tour one of the most popular residency programs in Tuolumne County.

The cadets spent a day with Mr. Joe Doherty at the Columbia College Fire Academy where each cadet was paired with a Fire Academy student. They learned about ladder operations and hydrant connections as well as having their first encounter with fire house knots and ropes. They were very impressed with the Academy under Mr. Doherty.

First Responders are people who respond to the scene of an incident and are typically the first to give life saving help. From the very first day of class, the cadets have been learning about human anatomy and medical procedures that when implemented correctly can saves lives. The cadets have responded to calls with on duty fire personnel to experience and observe emergency calls.

Dean Wimberley came up from Tuolumne County Fire to teach a vehicle extrication training. The cadets cut up a car with the Jaws of Life, spread the doors and rolled the dash with the ram and spreaders, just like a real crew.

Most recently the cadets were instructed in 12 hours of Low Angle Rope Rescue (LARR) operations by Columbia College LARR assistant instructor. This training would not have been possible without support from Tuolumne County Fire Dept. who loaned the cadets all the gear.

Upcoming cadet program activities include more first responder instruction, a visit from an arson K-9 handler, resume preparation, job interview skills, more ropes training, search and rescue drills, as well as more field trips.

A big thank you to all who have made this program so successful! Instructors; Jim Burdick, Josh Scheib, Johanna Powers, & the Groveland Fire Dept. staff with cooperation from Cal State Fire (CDF) Dean Wimberley and Sonora City Fire instructor Kurt Rhoades. The calls started coming in with great enthusiasm and a meeting was scheduled to discuss the "What, Who and Whens "of the program.

On January 30th at 9:30 am, the first meeting was held at the Community Hall and what a turn out we had. Those in attendance were: Judy Connery and Rudy Manzo, Kiwanis Club of Groveland; Ken Watts and Peggy Crisp of Tuolumne County; Jim Goodrich, GCSD; Larry Shaw and Herman Schaap, Groveland Rotary; Barb Elliott, Groveland Soroptimist; Al Craig, PML Aviation Assoc.; Barbara Klahn, Pinecone Performers; Roland Elliott, American Legion Post 300: Patti Beaulieu, Helping Hands; Jackie Baker, ROOFBB; Mary Brown, Barbara Broad, GAINS; Tony Flores, Yosemite Chamber of Commerce; Harriett Wallace of PML Ladies Club, and Miguel Maldonado, Friends of Trails.

Judy Connery and Rudy Manzo of the Kiwanis Club presided over the meeting. Judy reviewed the Project Ideas that were listed and asked that as many of these as possible be picked by the various organizations in attendance so we can get started as soon as possible. Rudy then explained the purpose of the meeting and what is trying to be accomplished. He also pointed out that the cost of these projects would not be born totally by the organizations since Tuolumne County will be helping us financially. The meeting was then turned over to Ken Watts and Peggy Crisp so that they could explain how they envision the program working and what their financial assistance will be. The group was advised that since there is a financial crunch in Tuolumne County at this time, some of the work to be done will have to budgeted for the next fiscal year. This means that some of the major projects, such as the kitchen floor, may be at least a year away. This is a major construction project as some of the sub-flooring will have to be replaced and the county will have a licensed contractor do the work.

The meeting was then opened up for discussion and without hesitation some of the projects were spoken for. The Soroptimist will be painting the dinning area on their work day. They will begin cleaning and masking on March 3rd, 2007, and painting will be done on March 4th. The Rotary took on the painting of the Main Hall walls and also the ceiling. Their project will be coordinated with the Soroptimist painting schedule so that it can be done all a one time.

The ROOFBB group and Mary Brown

will be doing the curtains in the Hall. The ROOFBBs will also be redecorating the bathroom with paint and décor.

The Kiwanis Club will be re-working the Bulletin Boards and searching for ways to get a media system for the Hall. They will also be rebuilding the broom storage closet near the restrooms. GAINS will be cleaning and straightening up the storage lockers and will also schedule an inspection by the fire department.

There are still several projects that need to taken over such as lighting in the hall for Pine Cone Performers' melodramas, resurfacing the main floor, cabinets for the kitchen, waste disposal unit for the kitchen area and cleaning of the kitchen area itself prior to painting.

The meeting was concluded by Rudy Manzo at which time he expressed thanks to everyone who attended for their support in this major undertaking. When this is all completed it will once again be a place that residents of Groveland will be pleased to call their "Meeting Place".





### **MOTHER LODE MEMORIES** by Nancy Perry & Debra Durai

n following Jean's trek along the byways this article was published in the February 27, 1975 issue of the PML News.

#### ALONG THE BYWAYS...

by Jean McClish

We turn left at Priest Hotel onto Priest-Coulterville Road, crossing the bridge over Rattlesnake Creek.

In quick succession we pass the turnoff to Priest Reservoir and the gravel quarry. The trackless railroad bed of the Hetch Hetchy Railroad crosses the road about a mile ahead. It was along this right-of-way that the cement-laden trains zig zagged their way up the hill from Moccasin, climbing 2400 feet in twelve miles.

The road is bracketed by old wooden fence posts strung with barbed wire, some standing straight, and some leaning.

We cross Cobbs Creek and note the mine tailings that every water course in the Mother Lode bears as a reminder of the gold seeking years. There were many mines along this area. One branch of the Golden Rock Water Company ditch carried water in a high flume across Cobbs Creek and the road, delivering water to mines here and in Mariposa County.

A grassy meadow slants away from the road on the right, resembling an oak studded lawn. After passing a logged off area and a pond, we come to a barn with a foundation of rock and a green house. The house, recently restored by the Newman's was the Musante ranch house in earlier years.

For the next several miles we will be passing through Spring Gulch, a thriving ranching area since the mid 1850's. Neighbors of the Musantes, families who lived along the road from here to Boneyard, included the Lumsdens, Alexanders, Cuneos, Ferretti's and the Gookins.

Besides ranching, the men of these families prospected, drove stage and freight teams, and constructed trails and roads. The TUOLUMNE PROSPECTOR, Groveland's newspaper from 1901 to 1918, mentioned Spring Gulch activities regularly:

"Dave and John Lumsden are building a bridge over Tamarack Creek on the stage road to the valley.

"S. Alexander and F. Musante finished their wood contract for Mrs. Priest."

"Steve Alexander at work on the county road below Spring Gulch killed a monster rattler: the reptile measured about four feet in length.'

"J.J. Lumsden reports work on trail from Hog Ranch to Hetch Hetchy is completed."

"James J. Musante was awarded contract to build a stretch of road near his home at Spring Gulch for \$1385. Other bids: A.M. Gookin \$1480: R.M. DeFerrari \$1430.'

The road descends now, and then rises again, up and down several times, like a gentle roller coaster. A gulch drops off to the right, with Jackass Creek running swiftly at the bottom of the gully. Just before the road circles around the end of the ridge and crosses the creek, we can see the roof of a building at the dead end of the gulch. It is part of the PJUK mine. We stop a moment to investigate before continuing on across the bridge.

George Gookin says that when his father built the bridge over Jackass Creek he dug up three bodies - one still had its boots on.

A little further, on the left, is the remains of the rock wall Frank Ferretti built.

Within a mile or so we enter Mariposa

County. Only a wooden post and the remains of rock pillars that once held a gate mark the line.

There is a turn off to Greeley Hill, but we continue on. Shortly we come to a large red barn with a metal roof and a low house. There are horses grazing, and a pen with sheep and little lambs, its fence right on the edge of the road. On the right, across the street is a high rock retaining wall and above that is an old red house with white railing.

James Munn and his family live here. It was the Cuneo ranch, and the Munns are Cuneo descendants. The three Munn daughters are fourth generation Tuolumne County residents The house was built in the 1890's, the barn in 1915.

As we look back at the ranch we see a small waterfall as Cuneo Creek drops off a ledge.


At the sharp bend in the road ahead we see the remains of a fireplace that warmed a prospector's cabin on the bank above the creek.

A stop sign signals the intersection of the secondary highway. We turn right toward Coulterville and soon begin to see the buildings of the settlement once known as Boneyard. There was a stage stop along here, and a restaurant.

Coulterville is ahead and we will stop here for a while to browse in several of the shops, especially Mr. Dunlap's on the left side of the road. His collection of barbed wire and old bottles, among other things, is outstanding.

We wouldn't miss the museum in the old hotel on the corner across the street. Here is a unique collection of coins, rocks, rifles and memorabilia of the area's history.

There are several alternatives for our return route: Highway 49 to Moccasin and up Priest Grade; back the secondary road we've just traveled, following it east until it intersects with Smith Station Road (J20) to Highway 120; or back the Priest-Coulterville Road we've just traveled. Each has its beautiful vistas. It's hard to choose.

## **Bond Measure Approval**

The community of Big Oak Flat-Groveland approved a bond measure that would make available funds to improve the Tioga High School, Tenaya Elementary School, and Don Pedro High School. The funding program was outlined as \$2,000,000 from developer fees, \$4,500,000 in state matching funds, \$9,300,000 in Bond funds for a total of \$15,800,000.

Caldwell Flores Winters, Inc. researched and proposed an original and revised project list for the bond fund. The original proposal outlined \$9.95 mil for Tioga, \$5.3mil Don Pedro, \$2.15mil Tenaya, \$.5mil Moccasin CDS. Based on input from community including school site meetings the project list was reduced by \$2 mil in order to gain approval. The new Project list was \$9,6222,839 for Tioga, \$3,180,976 for Tenaya, \$2,950,960 for Don Pedro.

The figures were outlined on the School District Web Site, promoted to the community through a voter phone bank, promoted by myself with confirmation from Board President of the approximately 80% Groveland and 20% Don Pedro. The tax base as of 6/30/2005 is 22% from Don Pedro and 78% from Groveland.

The current estimate is for the Don Pedro Gym to be \$4.5 mil or 28% of the total revenue available. The extra money spent on the Don Pedro Gym will be revenue taken away from improvement at Tenaya and Tioga Schools.





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

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## Mother Lode Memories by Nancy Perry and Debra Durai

This is a great article by Cheri Sicard touching on some of the "Spirits" of the Mother Lode. There are many businesses/buildings/homes/highways in the Mother Lode that claim to have strange occurrences and/or "visitors." We know you'll enjoy this article on the Gold Rush Ghosts and hauntings.

One very famous site, the Willow Hotel in Jamestown was not mentioned so we thought we'd add a little information on the Willow Hotel and on Jamestown.

The Willow Hotel reportedly has been haunted since the 1800's. A gold mine runs directly below the old hotel, which once hosted many dignitaries, including President William McKinley in 1901. Under the Hotel the old gold mine caved in and killed 23 miners, and now the hotel is haunted by those miners. Over the years several employees have reported "odd" occurrences and some claim to have seen ghostly images still roaming the premises.

There are also several mentionables: the Wyllie House in San Andreas built in 1893, or visit "Eleanor" at the Murphys Historic Hotel in Murphys. The Diamond Springs Hotel built in 1916 has many ghostly visitors and claims to be "Happy, Homespun and Haunted." Then there is The Argonaut in Coloma built in 1916 who claims to have a washwoman still living there. The Mine House Bed & Breakfast in Amador City is another to add to the list. This is a beautiful brick Victorian built in 1868. The owners got a little something extra when they purchased this property.

#### Jamestown

The true charm of the mining towns comes through loud and clear here, with Jamestown's covered balcony architecture that is so typical of the Gold Rush era. A number of 1850's brick, stone, and adobe structures still stand.

Colonel George James, a San Francisco lawyer, founded Jamestown in 1848 within a few months after gold was discovered in Woods Creek, a mile south of town. This discovery was itself within a few months after the original discovery of gold in Coloma, upstream from Sacramento on the American River at John Sutter's sawmill that initiated the California Gold Rush. In the earliest years, the American miners continued to mine near Jamestown, while miners from Mexico moved a few miles up Woods Creek to what has now become known as the City of Sonora. Jamestown fell on hard times after the Gold Rush, but had a resurgence in the 1880's and 90's because many underground quartz mines were nearby. In 1897, a steam railroad was built, running at first from Oakdale to Jamestown, and later to Sonora and Tuolumne City, which was headquartered in Jamestown and further contributed to

the town's economic prospects.

The richness of the diggings on Woods Creek became legendary. The creek was so rich that it was reported that Woods & Company extracted \$200 to \$300 (40 to 60 ounces) daily by simply prying nuggets from their resting spots with hunting knives. Comparing the \$8 to \$12 an ounce in 1848 to the price of gold today (about \$620 an ounce), imagine the excitement of finding that same 40 to 60 ounces today which would be worth \$24,800 to \$37,200. WOW!!!

The glory days of large nuggets, big strikes, and easy placer mining were short lived. Even though many miners moved on, Jamestown managed to hang on. Other establishments that sold liquor, food, and "Ladies of the Night" held the town together during the years after the gold rush.

On November 10, 1897, Jamestown boomed again when the Sierra Railroad arrived. The town became the lifeline between Tuolumne County and the outside world. Today, Railtown 1897 is a living museum as a 26-acre California State Historic Park. The original depot and a hotel were destroyed by fire, but another depot was rebuilt.

Many of the historical structures of Jamestown have undergone reconstruction due to fires in 1855, 1966 and 1978.

#### TUOLUMNE COUNTY, CALIFORNIA,

USA - In area with as much history as Tuolumne County, CA, hub of the historic California Gold Rush, it's hard to avoid ghost stories. Nearly every hotel and many restaurants in the area had some sort of tale to share.

After taking in Tuolumne County's plethora of sites and activities by day, Weird Wanderers can come home to the elegant comfort of haunted locales by night. Some of the county's best food and drink are also offered in these establishments, so whether you need accommodations or not, you might want to cross check this article with our Dining in Tuolumne feature and plan some memorable culinary experiences at the same time.

#### **The City Hotel**

The historic City Hotel is actually a part of Columbia State Park. More than a "park' in the way you'd normally imagine a state park, Columbia is an actual old west town just like it was back in the days of the California gold rush. You not only get to read what it was like, you get to wander the same historic streets, stay at the same hotels, and eat at the same restaurants. Along the way, you'll interact with trained guides and costumed docents who really know what life was like back then.

Each room at the City Hotel is decorated with authentic period antiques reflecting the town's heyday - 1850-1870. Many of the furnishings were originally imported from Europe to fill some of San Francisco's finest mansions. More than a century later they made their way to Columbia. One of the hotel's furniture focal points is the ornately carved bed in room 1, for in addition to its fine craftsmanship and artistic design, it came with a tragic history. It seems a woman, who hotel guests and staff came to name Elizabeth, actually died in childbirth in the bed. The hotel never was haunted before the bed came to rest there in the 1970's. But ever since strange happenings go on, especially in room 1. Doors open and close randomly, and often a perfumed "scent of a woman" will waft through the room with no apparent cause. According to City Hotel dining room manager Kathi Ann Harvey a repeat guest once told her that on a previous visit her young son woke her and said he saw a woman in a white dress at the end of his bed.

Not finding anything there, the guest dismissed the child's claims - three times - putting him back to bed each time. Kathi says the guest later came back to Columbia for one of their historic ghost tours. "She heard about Elizabeth and felt so guilty."

#### **Hotel Charlotte**

Ever since they took over the Hotel Charlotte in 2003 owners Lynn Upthagrove and Victor Niebylski have grown accustomed to guests asking if their building is haunted. Two weeks after moving into the hotel, a parapsychologist came in off the street and asked Lynn if he could look around. She took him into room 6,

and even though she'd never thought about ghosts before, his energy convinced her that the ghost of former owner Charlotte still inhabited the hotel.

"He took photos into the mirror - it was so interesting and he was so very convincing that he saw a ghost, it made me believe," says Lynn. While looking through the ghost hunter's camera, pointed towards the bathroom mirror in room 6, Lynn saw the room behind her, including a hanging lampshade, and the face of Charlotte floating in front of it! When she turned around, there was no one there.

Lynn never heard from the investigator again and doesn't know if the photo ever came out, but she's been a believer ever since.

In Charlotte's day, the hotel was a rooming house built to house middle management staff from the nearby Hetch Hetchy Dam building project. History tells us that proprietor Charlotte never married. Local legend says she was in love with the man who regularly rented room 6, although he never saw her as anything other than a friend. It's said her ghost haunts room 6, and has been known to nurturingly check that the guests sleeping there (especially the male guests) are comfortable and tucked in at night. Charlotte is so popular, some repeat guests come back just to experience her again and again.

With a smile in her voice, Lynn says "I always put single male guests in room 6 so Charlotte will feel comfortable and the guest will be well cared for. I want to keep my ghost happy. I never want a mad ghost."

#### **The Groveland Hotel**

Like the Hotel Charlotte, the Groveland Hotel was originally built as a rooming house for management personnel sent from San Francisco to oversee the Hetch Hetchy Dam building project. After the project was completed, the building became a residence hotel for miners and  $\leq$ prospectors working in the now defunct gold mine and creek running behind the hotel.

The Groveland's resident ghost, Lyle, kas a prospector who died of natural causes in 1927. Current owner Peggy  $\gtrsim$  Mosley was lucky enough to obtain the  $\lesssim$ hotel's colorful parapsychological history from local resident Ernie Greenbeck, who passed away in 1998 or 1999 at the age of 104.

It seems Lyle was somewhat of a re-

cluse, preferring to spend a lot of time alone in his room. He was dead for several days before folks thought to look for him. Lyle was found in his room (#15) with a box of dynamite - a tool of his prospecting trade - under the bed.

Peggy says that long before she bought the hotel, in 1990, locals had been talking about the building being haunted by the ghost of Lyle.

"He doesn't like women's cosmetics on his dresser - he removes them," Peggy says.

"I first became aware of it one time when we had 4 couples staying here for 3 nights. On the 2nd day the lady asked if I would prefer if she would not put her cosmetics on the dressers. She said that every time she came back to the room she found them on the sink. I told her I had no problem with the cosmetics being on the dresser and even checked that the staff

#### hadn't moved them."

Peggy says these guests enjoyed their experiences with Lyle so much, they return every year or so and always request room 15 (also known as "Lyle's Room"), because the woman with the cosmetics bag always likes to "play games with Lyle."

And according to Peggy, he never fails her. Another time Peggy was hosting a dinner for a group from Delta Airlines. They had arrived at the hotel late and dinner wasn't finished until about 11pm. Peggy was regaling the group with the building's history. She had just gotten to the part of the story about Lyle when, all of a sudden, the dining room's lights started to go up and down. Suddenly the lights stopped fluctuating and everyone in the rooms felt a "whoosh" of cold air rush past them. According to Peggy everyone in the room gasped at once. "It was definitely a hair-raising experience," she says.

Peggy enjoys the Groveland Hotel's resident ghost. She says he's a fun charac-

ter, a prankster who has even been helpful. One night the chef had bread baking and forgot to set the timer, the oven door flew open at the right time for perfectly baked bread.

Several guests have recounted Lyle encounters in the hotel's guest books.

One said that, while sleeping, one of the room's high backed chairs was pulled against the side of her bed - it's high back towards the bed.

Another guest in a downstairs suite reported a tall shadowy figure walking by the bed as if checking on everybody, before vanishing into thin air.

Peggy says lively breakfast discussions about Lyle are frequent occurrences at the hotel's dining room tables and that just about every staff member at the hotel has had at least one Lyle encounter.

But, she warns, sometimes Lyle disappears for weeks. "We always laugh and say that he and Charlotte are out somewhere enjoying a tryst."

Sonora's Gunn House Hotel started life as a hospital for the old gold rush town. Owner Shirley Sarno says odd little things happen around the hotel all the time. "Things will fall off kitchen shelves for no reason, and the housekeepers always report lights going off and on at random. They also sometimes have trouble opening doors to rooms, as if someone's pulling on the other side - but there's nobody in the room."

Shirley says guests have experienced different presences in different rooms. Just last weekend (July 2004) the husband half of a couple of repeat guests found himself thrown out of bed and tossed around the room. Shirley says the couple were fine about their nocturnal wake up call and plan to return.

Other guests through the years reported seeing the image of someone standing at the foot of the bed in 12.

Nonetheless, when a team of parapsychologists evaluated the room with electronic ghost hunting equipment, Shirley says they got the highest readings from room 3.

#### **Jamestown Hotel**

First built in 1858 as a wood-frame boarding house, the Jamestown Hotel has, at various times during its existence, operated as a bordello, a bus depot and the Motherlode Hospital. The Hotel burned down twice, along with the rest of Jamestown. During the 1970's, the exterior was remodeled with San Francisco brick, and in the 1980's, the hotel underwent a major restoration, transforming it into the 11room bed and breakfast it is today.

The hotel's downstairs houses a fine dining restaurant and old-time bar open to the public as well as hotel guests. The Jamestown Hotel also comes with a ghost story has all the elements of a pulp romance novel.

It seems that Mary Rose; granddaughter of Frank Sullivan - a Jamestown prospector who struck it rich in the 1850's - fell in love with a handsome British soldier. They wished to marry, but both families were adamantly against it, with Mary's lover's influential parents arranging to have him shipped off to India. Unfortunately, while there he was captured during a Hindu-Muslim uprising, chained, tortured and killed. Naturally Mary Rose took the news hard, especially since she was carrying her lover's child.

One spring morning, she arrived in Jamestown and checked into the then Mother Lode Hospital's room number 7. The melancholy woman didn't speak much to anyone, preferring to spend her days forlornly gazing out the window. When the time came to give birth, something went terribly wrong and neither mother nor child survived. They were interred in the nearby cemetery, overlooking the town of Jamestown.

Mary Rose and her British Lieutenant are the hotel's oldest and most constant tenants. Guests have heard moans from room 7 (think it but don't say it folks), as well as seen misty apparitions - one wrapped in chains.

#### **National Hotel**

Besides being our favorite place to dine in Tuolumne County (their wine list is awesome - exclusively featuring wines from the Sierra Nevada foothill wine region) the National Hotel is also home to one of the area's most famous ghosts.

A perusal through the guest books in each room - which welcome guests to share their comments about the hotel - reveals numerous accounts of doors slamming, lights going on and off, clothing being dumped from suitcases onto the floor, and a woman's sobbing coming from the hallway in the middle of the night.

Housekeepers report going into rooms only to be greeted by icy cold air, even though the heater was working.

Stephen Willey, the hotel's current owner, has been hearing tales of "Flo" from staff and guests for over 28 years now, although he has never personally encountered her. But many a non-believer has left here with a whole new attitude, he says.

Willey says the National Hotel's resident ghost generally stays upstairs, seemingly favoring the rooms in the front of the building, although she has, on occasion, been seen early in the morning downstairs, floating through the dining room and right through the walls.

#### **Showshoe Brewery**

The building that now houses this casual restaurant, which makes some of the best micro-brewed beer <http://www. fabuloustravel.com/usa/tuolumne/dining. html> we've ever had, started life as the Pickering Lumber Co. Built in 1820, the office building which houses the Snowshoe Brewing Co. is one of only 3 originally buildings left from the mill town of Standard. A walk through the restaurant and brewery will reveal many relics of the building's past, including photos, old lumber company tokens (used in lieu of cash), townsite maps, and old business documents.

Marketing manager Al O'Brien said, "When we started renovating the building we found all sorts of old office equipment, records, survey maps and other stuff including some baseball memorabilia from the company baseball teams of the early 1900's. We even found spots where carpenters had signed boards and dated them under plaster walls 100 years ago."

Al spent many hours alone in the basement excavating for structural support for our brewery equipment. While he says he always experienced the assorted creaks and noises many old buildings make, he personally never experienced anything he would consider "unusual."

However, Snowshoe's master brewer Mike Hastings has had experiences with an unidentified entity. Brewers usually make an early morning start to mill the 1000 pounds of grain needed for a fifteenbarrel brew. According to O'Brien, the brewer had several visits from a man in a bowler hat and black suit who walked in front of the brewery to the former President's office -- now a banquet room. After conversations with friends and family about this apparition and how he should react, Mike decided to confront the presence.

The next time the man made a visit, Mike asked him who he was and what he was doing or looking for. The entity stopped, looked around and moved on.

That was the last time Mike saw the man.

#### Sterling Gardens B&B

While this B&B was built relatively recently -- in the 1980's -- it was built on top of the old Kincaid Gold Mine. Owners Charlotte and Carl Tucker have seen a presence on occasion, but not usually in the building.

"Most often we see this man down by the road, where our mailbox is now located. He's there and then just gone," says Charlotte.

"He seems friendly and we like to joke that he is waiting for the mail."

There are two entrances to the old Gold Mine on the property, although they have both been blasted shut so people can no longer go down into the mine, which is now filled up with water anyway. There is a vertical air shaft can be found at the bottom of property's 90 foot deep, two plus acre pond. "We've thought that the ghost might be an old miner from the 1849 gold rush," Charlotte theorizes. "If that was the case, he might then be waiting for a coach there by the side of the road." 


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
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## Groveland's Oldest Building

he Big Oak Flat Road to Yosemite credits Peter King, a miner, with building Groveland's oldest structure - a cabin/trading post built in 1849.

Unfortunately, the tax rolls and other sources can shed no light on King.

However, a Frank King does appear on the rolls in the early 1860's, and is believed the owner of the subject building. By the 1870's, Francis Martin owned a large piece of property in this area, which included the adobe house. Mary Ann Sheehan acquired the property in 1896 at about the same time that the two-story frame building was constructed around the adobe room. Mary Ann, soon to become Mary Ann Schroeder, operated a hotel and saloon on Main Street and may have had this structure built as a boarding house known as the "Elite Hotel." The hotel provided room and board for the miners working in the newly opened hard

rock gold mines. In the late 1910's, the building was converted to a small hospital. Hetch Hetchy construction crews utilized the facility until San Francisco finished a new hospital, adjacent to the railroad in Groveland. The additions and remodeling have diminished the historical integrity of the building but is still is a significant contributor to an historic district.

Hopefully, they won't be green, but, this recipe for Smashed Red Potatoes will still be perfect for your upcoming St. Patrick's Day dinner. The Irish love potatoes with their corned beef and this recipe includes the most nutritious part of the potato...the skins. So "Here's to eyes in your heads and none in your spuds!"

Smashed Red Potatoes (serves 5, 1/2 cup servings)

1 pound small red potatoes (about 7) quartered

3/4 to 1 cup fat-free or low-fat but-termilk

3 tablespoons thinly sliced green onions (green part only)

1 tablespoon plus 1 teaspoon shredded or grated Parmesan cheese

1/4 teaspoon salt1/8 teaspoon pepper

Put potatoes in medium sauce pan with enough water to cover. Bring to boil and reduce heat to simmer for 10 to 15 minutes (until fork tender). Drain and return to saucepan.

Meanwile, in a small saucepan, heat buttermilk over medium-low heat for 5 - 7 minutes...making sure it doesn't boil. Remove from the heat.

Using a potato masher, mash potatoes, adding enough buttermilk to make them creamy. Add the remaining ingredients, stirring just until blended.



## **Protect Your Fish**

**G** CSD will be converting to chloramine disinfection of its drinking water supply in March. Though this form of disinfection is healthful for humans and is used widely across the country, it is harmful to fish and other gilled organisms.

Groveland Mercantile has in stock a chemical neutralizer that can be used in aquariums to protect your fish from the harmful effects of chloramines and chlorine.

While supplies last, Groveland Mercantile will be providing free one-ounce samples of this neutralizer, manufactured by OSI Marine Lab, Inc. This is enough to treat about 500 gallons of aquarium water. After the free samples are gone, Groveland Mercantile will be stocking the neutralizer for purchase or it can be obtained directly from the manufacturer.



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#### **PML News January issue 1979** REE-NAPPING SMALL CEDARS, PINES by Mary Wortham

here are permissible ways to "abduct" small trees to transplant to your own lot, working within the PML boundaries.

If you would like to start some small natives on your property, winter is the best season, unless the ground is frozen. And you probably won't have to worry about watering until summer.

There are two sources. Seedling cedars, sugar and ponderosa pines pop up along the roadsides.

They will not survive the spraying and servicing of the roads by the maintenance crew, and you are welcome to them if they are not in front of lots with building.

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It is recommended you get off the main thoroughfares for tree napping. And keep

within 5 feet of the road's edge to avoid trespassing. Another source of seedlings is in our

greenbelts where there are many infant groves of seedlings, which would actually benefit from thinning since they obviously have not room to make it to maturity.

If you limit yourself to little trees that obviously have too much competition already, you are welcome to give them a new home.

You can tell the sugar pines from the ponderosa pines by the number of needles in the bundle. Ponderosas have three needles per cluster and the Sugar pines

have five shorter needles.

1) Transplant trees that are a foot to two feet tall. Each pine has a tap root that goes down as far as the height of the tree and you need the tap root for a good chance at survival.

2) The most common mistake in transplanting is to dig the new home hole too small and too shallow. The tap root needs to point straight down, with no up-curl at its tip.

3) Get your new hole ready before you bring your tree to it and keep those roots moist. Small roots can be killed in only two minutes of exposure to warm dry air.

4) Unless the soil is firmly compacted around the new roots, air pockets will kill off the tree.

5) Balling the treelet with a gunnysack after digging a trench around it is the very best way to transport it. Provide for that pine tap root to stick out. The more original dirt that can be held around the roots, the better.

6) Once watered in its new hole, the young native will probably need no water until the weather turns warm and dry. Then a good watering every 3 weeks should suffice.

7) Some finicky tree-nappers say that the original orientation should be preserved; that is, the east side of the tree should still be its east side when its transplanted.

8) Go easy on the artificial fertilizers. These are natives you are dealing with.

9) Finally, when tree-napping, be sure to fill up the hole from which you took the tree and leave the ground so that no one can tell you've been there.

One big advantage to transplanting local trees is that you can be sure they really like this altitude and this climate. Furthermore, it's fun to do it yourself.

The Forest Service would like you to be reminded that it is unlawful to dig out trees from National Forest Land.

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## **COMMUNITY CORNER MOTHER LODE MEMORIES**

here is quite a bit of speculation regarding the on going battle to restore the Hetch Hetchy Valley/Reservoir. The following information was found on the Sierra Club website. We thought you'd find it interesting and informative.

#### **Hetch Hetchy history**

From 1901 - 1913. John Muir led the Sierra Club in a campaign to protect the Hetch Hetchy Valley, a part of Yosemite National Park, from being filled by a reservoir.

The battle for Hetch Hetchy was perhaps the first effort at what is now known as "grassroots lobbying," getting individual citizens to contact elected officials in support of or opposition to legislation.

John Muir wrote to his friend Robert Underwood Johnson:

"We held a Sierra Club meeting last Saturday--passed resolutions and fanned each other to a fierce white Hetch Hetchy heat. I particularly urged that we must get everybody to write to Senators and the president keeping letters flying all next month thick as storm snow flakes, loaded with park pictures, short circulars, etc. Stir up all other park and playground clubs, women's clubs, etc ... "

Despite opposition from many citizens, including most of the nation's leading newspapers, Congress passed the Raker Act in 1913 allowing the city of San Francisco to destroy Hetch Hetchy. The City built a dam and reservoir, drowning this beautiful valley, even though other less-damaging sites existed.

It was the first time the young national park system had been so violated.

Although the Sierra Club lost that battle, the loss of Hetch Hetchy served to awaken the nation in defense of its national parks. Remembering the loss of Hetch Hetchy, in the 1950s and 1960s, the Sierra Club successfully stopped dams from being built in Dinosaur National Monument and in Grand Canyon National Park.

Let us never forget what happened here. The Sierra Club today still holds fast to the words William Colby wrote to Gifford Pinchot in 1909 with reference to Hetch Hetchy:

"Let me assure you that we have only begun to fight, and we are not going to rest until we have established the principle 'that our National Parks shall be hold forever inviolate,' and until we have demonstrated to the satisfaction of every one, including yourself, that the American people stand for that principle. We are going to keep up the good fight without fear or favor, 'if it shall take until doomsday.'

#### **Hetch Hetchy Timeline of the Ongoing Battle Over Hetch Hetchy**

\*1871 - John Muir first visits Hetch Hetchy

\*1873 - John Muir first writes about the beauty of "Hetch Hetchy Valley," <http://www.sierraclub.org/john muir exhibit/writings/muir\_hh\_boston\_25mar1873. html> in the Boston Weekly Transcript, March 25, 1873, an article later expanded in the Overland Monthly in the same year.

\*1882 - City of San Francisco begins to consider Hetch Hetchy Valley as one of several places for the location of a reservoir.

\*1890 - Yosemite National Park is established, including Yosemite Valley's less famous cousin, Hetch Hetchy.

\*1890 - San Francisco Mayor James Phelan first proposes damming the Hetch Hetchy Valley to create a reservoir for San Francisco.

\*1892 - Sierra Club formed.

\*1901 - Mayor James Phelan first files for water rights in the Hetch Hetchy Valley - using his own name.

\* 1903 - Mayor Phelan applies to the Interior Department for a permit for water storage in Hetch Hetchy Valley. Secretary of the Interior, Ethan Hitchcock promptly denies the request, since Hetch Hetchy is in a national park. The City of San Francisco appeals, arguing it will only enhance the beauty of the park to have a reservoir. (Later, Muir would respond to this argument thus: "As well may damming New York's Central Park would enhance its beauty!") By the end of the year, Secretary Hitchcock denies the appeal.

\* 1904 - First of many Sierra Club "High Trips" to include Hetch Hetchy Valley.

\*1905 - Mayor Phelan again applies for water rights to Hetch Hetchy, and the permit is once again denied. John Muir and William E. Colby launch 8 - year campaign to prevent Hetch Hetchy from being dammed for a reservoir.

\*1906 - The San Francisco Earthquake and Fire gives new impetus to the idea of enlarging the city's water supply. James Garfield succeeds Hitchcock as Secretary of the Interior in November.

\*1907 - San Francisco city officials meet with Secretary Garfield on July 24 to lobby

for damming Hetch Hetchy. On August 30, the Sierra Club board of directors adopt a resolution addressed to the Secretary of the Interior strongly opposing damming of Hetch Hetchy Valley. Club leaders begin campaign in earnest against destroying Hetch Hetchy, urging the Club membership to write to President Roosevelt and Secretary of the Interior Garfield to oppose damming Hetch Hetchy Valley. That fall, John Muir, age 69, with his friend William Keith, re-visits Hetch Hetchy Valley, after a 12-year absence.

\* 1908 - On May 7, the City files a petition asking the Secretary of the Interior to reopen San Francisco's application for water rights, requesting both Lake Eleanor and Hetch Hetchy Valley. The City's application promised to develop Lake Eleanor first to full capacity before beginning development of the Hetch Hetchy site - a promise never fulfilled.

Muir writes in the Sierra Club Bulletin <http://www.sierraclub.org/ca/hetchhetchy/ hetch\_hetchy\_muir\_scb\_1908.html> that to dam Hetch Hetchy Valley one "may as well dam for water-tanks the people's cathedrals and churches, for no holier temple has ever been consecrated by the heart of man." Willing to compromise, he urges President Roosevelt to give the city only Lake Eleanor. Muir sends a message to the 1908 Governors Conference on Conservation: "Nothing dollarable is safe, however guarded. Thus the Yosemite Park, the beauty glory of California and the Nation, Nature's own mountain wonderland, has been attacked by spoilers ever since it was established, and this strife I suppose, must go on as part of the eternal battle between right and wrong." But the City's permit application is approved by Secretary of the Interior James Garfield, who had never visited Hetch Hetchy, only four days after he received it. Congress soon schedules hearings, and the Sierra Club begins producing circulars opposing the damming of Hetch Hetchy Valley, and schedules summer outings to Hetch Hetchy for 1908 and 1909.

\*1909 - In congressional hearings, the City reverses itself and insists that it must have both Lake Eleanor and Hetch Hetchy Valley.

Meanwhile, the Spring Valley Water Company again offers a buyout to the City of San Francisco - a far less costly option than building the Hetch Hetchy system. Sierra Club representatives testify at the Senate hearings on the issue, and senators and congressmen receive hundreds of letters from all over the country opposing the destruction of Hetch Hetchy Valley. Sierra Club leaders form a new organization, "The Society for the Preservation of National Parks" with notable figures across the country as leaders, to further publicize the campaign against the dam. John Muir and William E. Colby join the Sierra Club Outing of 1909 to Tuolumne Meadows and Hetch Hetchy Valley, which also includes notables such as poet Harriet Monroe, Dr. William Linn Jepson, founder of California botany, and other prominent scientists. Congress recommends that President Taft appoint a special commission to investigate the Hetch Hetchy issue, thus

avoiding an immediate decision and delaying the City's efforts.

\*1910 - After considering the commission's report, and visiting Hetch Hetchy Valley personally, in February Taft's Secretary of the Interior Richard Ballinger suspends the interior Department's approval for the Hetch Hetchy right-of-way, and asks the city to "show cause" why Hetch Hetchy Valley should not be removed from the Garfield grant. The City demands a hearing, held May 26. The Interior Secretary asks the City to prepare more data, and to make a study of other water sources sufficient for the Bay Area, and to do a thorough evaluation of a dam's damage to the scenic features of Hetch Hetchy Valley. Poll of Sierra Club members votes 589 - 161 (79%) in support the Club's position opposing the use of Hetch Hetchy Valley as a reservoir.

\*1911 - Secretary Ballinger resigns in March, citing failing health. President Taft appoints Walter L. Fisher as the new Secretary of the Interior. That October, Secretary Fisher visits Hetch Hetchy, with a party that includes both San Francisco advocates and defenders of the Valley.

\*1912 - In November, Secretary Fisher convenes a hearing on Hetch Hetchy, with advocates for both sides testifying. At the conclusion of the hearing, Secretary Fisher turns over all the testimony to his advisory board, all professional engineers. Woodrow Wilson is elected President, and would appoint former San Francisco City Attorney Franklin Lane as Secretary of the Interior. Lane supports damming Hetch Hetchy, though he never visited it. San Francisco renews its campaign to dam Hetch Hetchy; hires Michael M. O'Shaughnessy as city engineer.

\* 1913 - In February, the Interior secretary's engineer's report recommends damming Hetch Hetchy, though acknowledging other options existed. On March 1, three days before leaving office, Secretary Fisher decides that he lacks the statutory authority to grant a permit to San Francisco, thus throwing the decision to Congress. Over the rest of the year, Congress holds hearings, and the City lobbies hard. The New York Times repeatedly opposes damming of Hetch Hetchy <http://www.sierraclub. org/ca/hetchhetchy/ny\_times\_1913\_editorials. html>, along with most other newspapers in the country. Senators receive thousands of letters opposing destruction of Hetch Hetchy Valley. But at the end of the year, Congress nonetheless passes the Raker Bill, allowing flooding of Hetch Hetchy Valley. The bill stipulates that the city could not sell water or power for resale. President Woodrow Wilson signs the bill on December 19.

John Muir says he is "glad the fight for the Tuolumne Yosemite is finished," and hopes that "some sort of compensation must surely come out of this dark damn-dam-damnation."

\*1914 - Last Sierra Club outing to Hetchy Hetchy Valley. John Muir dies on December 24.

\*1923 - Construction of O'Shaughnessy Dam <http://www.sierraclub.org/ca/hetchhetchy/oshaughnessy\_dam\_1998.asp> completed, at a cost of \$100 million and the



#### lives of 67 men and one woman.

The project transports water 160 miles by gravity alone to customers in San Francisco and 32 other Bay Area communities.

\*1924 - San Francisco voters approve a bond proposition for \$10 million to pay for a series of tunnels that would deliver water through the Sierra and Coast Range mountains.

\*1928 - San Francisco voters approve \$24 million in bonds to help further the Hetch Hetchy Dam Project.

\*1934 - Completion and dedication of the Hetch Hetchy system.

\*1938 - The O'Shaughnessy Dam is raised to its current 430-foot height.

\*1947 - San Francisco voters approve \$25 million for a second pipeline for the Hetch Hetchy system.

\*1955 - Sierra Club publishes a film, Two Yosemites <http://www.hetchhetchy. org/catalog/two\_yosemites\_video.html>, filmed and narrated by David Brower, a passionate portrayal of the beauty of Yosemite Valley contrasted with the ugliness of the low-water Hetch Hetchy Reservoir.

\*1961 - San Francisco voters approve \$115 million in bonds to expand the existing hetch Hetchy system.

\* 1970 - Sierra Club board of directors recommends removal, rather than an expensive restoration or reconstruction, of both O'Shaughnessy Dam and Eleanor Dam. The Board also stated: "The question of how to remove O'Shaughnessy Dam, and the problems of how to restore Hetch Hetchy Valley to its once magnificent grandeur, should be studied in depth.

The studies should include the problem of plant succession as the valley is drained, the removal of silt, and the practical alternatives available to San Francisco if the Hetch Hetchy water supply is lost."

\* 1987 - Secretary of the Interior Don Hodel suggests removal of O'Shaughnessy Dam and the restoration of Hetch Hetchy Valley. Sierra Club Board re-affirms its 1908 policy, and adopts a further policy <http://www.sierraclub.org/ca/hetchhetchy/club\_policy.asp> supporting taking a "long view" of the issue, and endorsing feasibility studies. Sierra Club establishes a national Hetch Hetchy Task Force with Sally Reid as chair.

\*1988 - Legislative funding to study restoration of Hetch Hetchy is defeated in Congress.

\* 1990 - Sierra Club continues to advocate restoration; sponsors a display, "Restore Hetch Hetchy" <http://www.sierraclub.org/ ca/hetchhetchy/graphics/restore\_display.jpg> at the Yosemite Centennial Symposium.

\*1994 - Republican congressmen propose that the City of San Francisco should pay the federal government \$25 million per year, since the city generates an average of \$38 million annually from selling hydroelectric power from Hetch Hetchy to other municipalities. California Democrats in Congress kill the proposal.

\*1997 - The Sierra Club's California/ Nevada Regional Conservation Committee establishes a Hetch Hetchy Task Force with Ron Good as chair. \*1998 - Harold Wood of the Sierra Club Hetch Hetchy Task Force creates a feature devoted to the restoration of Hetch Hetchy on the Sierra Club website.

\* 1999 - Leaders from several environmental organizations, including the Sierra Club, join together to form a new non-profit organization, Restore Hetch Hetchy, to focus exclusively on the goal of restoring Hetch Hetchy, and establish a website advocating restoration at <http://www.hetchhetchy.org/>.

\*2000 - Restore Hetch Hetchy <a href="http://www.hetchhetchy.org/">http://www.hetchhetchy.org/</a>> gains tax-exempt, tax-deductible status to pursue educational efforts.

\* 2001 - Restore Hetch Hetchy <a href="http://www.hetchhetchy.org/">http://www.hetchhetchy.org/</a> raises funds; hires Ron Good as Executive Director to further pursue a feasibility study for the restoration of Hetch Hetchy. Restore Hetch Hetchy invites people to join as members <a href="http://www.hetchhetchy.org/join.html">http://www.hetchhetchy.org/join.http://www.hetchhetchy.org/join.html</a>. Sierra Club Hetch Hetchy Restoration Task Force continues its efforts.

\*2002 - October 19 - New York Times <http://www.hetchhetchy.org/news\_2002. html> advocates feasibility study <http:// www.hetchhetchy.org/news\_2002.html> to see whether it would be economically and hydrologically feasible to remove the dam that created Hetch Hetchy reservoir in Yosemite National Park; says San Francisco's water needs could be met in other ways. [The NY Times seventh editorial on Hetch Hetchy, but the first in 89 years!

\*2003 - Restore Hetch Hetchy releases a new video/DVD <http://www.hetchhetchy. org/catalog/hh\_yosemites\_lost\_valley.html> explaining its campaign to restore Hetch Hetchy. A University of California Master's thesis indicates that it is feasible to restore Hetch Hetchy - the first of several recent studies <http://www.hetchhetchy.org/studies.html>to make this determination.

\*2004 - Bush Administration proposes raising the rent for Hetch Hetchy from \$30,000 to \$8 million a year <a href="http://www.yosemite.org/newsroom/clips2004/february/020404.htm">http://www. yosemite.org/newsroom/clips2004/february/020404.htm</a>. The annual rent of \$30,000 San Francisco pays for Hetch Hetchy has not changed since the 1920s. Nothing happens.

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## Proposed Community Plan For Big Oak Flat/Groveland

n January 2007, Tuolumne County awarded a contract to prepare an Area Community Plan for the communities of Big Oak Flat and Groveland. Funds for this undertaking are from a Technical Assistance Community Development Block Grant obtained from the Federal Government for the amount of \$35,000.

A Request for Proposal For Consultant Services was sent to a list of qualified consultants in early December, 2006. Out of 3 bids submitted, the successful contractor chosen is Sierra Business Council (SBC). Formed in 1994, with headquartered in the northern Sierra Nevada at Truckee, the firm has established an enviable track record in community planning. Among community plans completed were : Inyo 2020, Placer Legacy, June Lake, and Minden, Nevada.

Completion of the local plan is slated for the end of September 2007.

SBC's mission is to secure the economic, social, and environmental health of the Sierra Nevada region. It was awarded the American Planning Association's prestigious Daniel Burnham award in 1997 for its publication, "Planning for Prosperity: Building Successful Communities in the Sierra Nevada".

This reference guide encompasses a number of principals for sound planning, "Safeguard the rural quality of the Sierra Nevada by maintaining a clear edge between town and country.



• Preserve historical assets.

 $\cdot$  Build to create enduring value and beauty.

• Enhance the economic vitality of our small towns through on-going investment in the downtown core.

• Anticipate and address the housing needs of all community residents.

• Conserve and showcase each community's natural assets.

• Maintain the economic productivity of our region's agricultural lands and forests.

• Do not place people and structures in harm's way.

• Maintain the health of the natural systems that support life in the Sierra Nevada.

• Expand local and regional transportation options to reduce traffic congestion and the intensity of public dependence on automobiles."

As defined by the county's Development Department, the BOF/Groveland community plan (exclusive of Pine Mountain Lake) must be consistent with the Tuolumne County General Plan (approved in 1996) which includes these elements:

- Land Use

- Cultural Resources
- Community Identity



## **FDA WARNING**

#### **FDA Warns Consumers Not to Eat Certain Jars of Peter Pan Peanut Butter** and Great Value Peanut Butter

The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) is warning consumers not to eat certain jars of Peter Pan peanut butter or Great Value peanut butter due to risk of contamination with Salmonella Tennessee (a bacterium that causes food borne illness). The affected jars of Peter Pan and Great Value peanut butter have a product code located on the lid of the jar that begins with the number "2111". Both the Peter Pan and Great Value brands are manufactured in a single facility in Georgia by ConAgra. Great Value peanut butter made by other manufacturers is not affected.

If consumers have any of this Peter Pan or Great Value brand peanut in their home that has been purchased since May 2006, they should discard it.

Symptoms of food borne illness caused by Salmonella include fever, diarrhea and abdominal cramps. In persons with poor underlying health or weakened immune systems, Salmonella can invade the bloodstream and cause life-threatening infections. Individuals who have recently eaten Peter Pan and Great Value brand peanut butter beginning with product code 2111 and have experienced any of these symptoms should contact their doctor or health care provider immediately. Any such illnesses should be reported to state or local health authorities.

FDA's warning is based on a justcompleted epidemiological study by the Centers for Disease Control and Preven-

tion (CDC), the states and local health agencies, which links 288 cases of food borne illness in 39 states to consumption of varying types of Peter Pan peanut butter. This report was provided to FDA on February 13.

The outbreak appears to be ongoing and the first consumer may have become ill in August 2006. The cause of food borne illnesses can be difficult to identify. As a result of extensive epidemiological testing and recent case control studies, CDC was recently able to identify Peter Pan peanut butter as the likely cause of illness. Great Value brand peanut butter beginning with product code 2111 is manufactured in the same plant as Peter Pan peanut butter and, thus, is believed to be at similar risk of contamination.

ConAgra is recalling all Peter Pan and Great Value peanut butter beginning with product code 2111 that already was distributed. The company also is destroying all affected products in their possession. The company will cease production until the exact cause of contamination can be identified and eliminated. ConAgra will advise consumers to destroy any Peter Pan and Great Value brand peanut butter beginning with product code 2111 in their possession. To assist in this endeavor, FDA has sent investigators to ConAgra's processing plant in Sylvester, Georgia where the products are made to review records, collect product samples and conduct tests for Salmonella Tennessee.

FDA will provide regular updates as more information becomes available.

Carey is a wildlife artist from Sacramento who specializes in color pencil. He creates the beautiful custom log frames that accompany each piece on display.


Eisenhauer lives in Yucca Valley, CA full-time and visits Groveland frequently. His wildlife sculptures are made of alabaster.
