In the near future we will be drafting mandatory cleaning procedures for all boats entering PML prior to launch. These are forms of aquatic life that we can do without. The new Point of Sales (POS) system is now up and running. The installation and training went smoothly with only a few minor glitches. The whole project came in on schedule and we anticipate a significant improvement in our efficiency and plan to open new avenues for operational improvements. My thanks to all those involved in making this happen.

If you have been down to the Golf Course lately, you may have seen our Maintenance people playing Paul Bunyan. They are not practicing for the lumberjack games but rather they are clearing a path for the wireless communication to the Snack Shack. This was necessary to tie it into the POS system without incurring the cost of running expensive and unsightly wiring. Once again science

and engineering has prevailed over the untrained mind.

Another project that has moved into the completed column is the replacement of the Kitchen flooring. After ripping up the old (as in 30 years old), we found only minimal water damage. We had to replace some drywall and install some new drains along with the seamless flooring. Along with these changes we also incorporated quick disconnects on all the gas lines that was mandated by the County. During the repair period, all the equipment was removed to Maintenance where they were sandblasted and steam cleaned. We also installed casters on all the heavy equipment so that they can be easily moved for weekly cleaning. I think we can stick a fork in that turkey, it's done!

Finally, now that the warm weather has arrived, it's time to start thinking about cleaning up our lots in accordance with the Fire Abatement policy. If you've been watching the news lately, you've seen the destruction that wildfires can cause. Keeping our lots free of weeds, brush and debris we eliminate much of the fuel that permits fires to spread. Just a reminder, all lots are to be cleared by June 15th or bad things happen. You really don't want to get a nastygram from Larry in Fire Safety telling you to get cracking.

Enough of my ramblings get out into the sun and get started on that yard work. Other than that, just kick back, relax and enjoy the warm weather,

June Board Meeting Location

The June 16th Board meeting location has been moved to the Country Club to accommodate the Annual STCHS Wine Tasting Cruise Fundraiser. The meeting is scheduled to begin at 9 a.m. as usual. On Saturday the Club opens for Breakfast at 8 a.m. and Lunch at 11a.m. so it will be very convenient for members to try out the new menu before or after the meeting.

Fire Abatement

With the spring weather, grass, shrubs and trees experience a lot of growth. It is important that all members do everything they can to keep PML Fire Safe. Our Fire Safety Coordinator, Larry Woodruff will be inspecting lots and sending out notices to owners that do not comply with the Fire Safety Program. You will save your Association a lot of time and money by properly clearing your lot by the deadline. Remember, all lots must be in compliance by June 15, 2007. If you have any questions, feel free to call Larry at (209) 962-8616.

Country Club Kitchen Floor Project

The Country Club Kitchen Floor Project was completed in time for our yearly Easter Buffet. During the project, all equipment was removed, scoured and repaired and replaced with new floor casters and quick release gas line couplers for easy maintenance and proper cleaning. I want to thank our Maintenance and Country Club crews for the fine job they did working together to complete this project in time.

Point of Sale Hardware and Software

The new POS system project for the Club and Golf Pro Shop was completed on schedule. Our Controller, Ken Spencer, my Assistant Rick Whybra really pushed this project through to completion on schedule. Their time and effort really made the system replacement easier for our Country Club and Pro Shop staff. Staff training was conducted and everyone is pleased with the new system. If approved, the Country Club and Pro Shop operations will be able to implement the member "House Charge" program that was suspended a few years ago. We are also looking at loyalty and gift cards that can be reloaded as a program for the future.

Stables Phase II Fencing Project

Phase II of the Stables Fencing Project was completed on schedule. Stables Manager Lester Scofield and my Assistant Rick Whybra worked hard to make sure the project was completed properly and I

want to thank them for their efforts. The new fencing and new landscaping gives the Stables a new look and really raises the standards for this facility. I encourage all members to pay a visit to this amenity. They will be impressed.

Designated Open Water Swim Area

In September of 2006 the Board of Directors amended Resolution #00.06 the PML Designated Open Water Swim Area Policies and Procedures. As part of the amendment, the Board designated a second location for mooring buoys near the east end of the Dam. They also approved the funding of two mooring buoys for this purpose. The manufacture of the buoys and concrete deadmen to secure them is nearly complete. We anticipate installation of these buoys by next month prior to the start of summer activities at the Marina.

Lake Dredging Project

Secondary environmental impact studies will be conducted in the next couple of weeks. It is our hope that these will be the remainder of the supplemental environmental studies required by the County to address environmental and biological concerns. Once complete the contractor will finish preparing the report. We are confident the report will culminate in the granting of permits by all of the agencies involved so that we can start dredging and we anticipate completion of the supplemental report soon.

Main Gate Entrance Project

The final decision on a design concept was made by the Board on March 17th. The decision was made to combine portions of each of the two design concepts, incorporating the best of each into a new design. We have reviewed these changes with our architect and he is preparing the final plans. The Association did not have copies of adequate topographical plot maps to start the project. We considered multiple bids and hired a licensed surveyor to prepare the necessary maps to move this project forward.

RESOLUTION ADOPTING ELECTION PROCEDURES Adopted May, 20, 2006

WHEREAS, California Civil Code section 1363.03 now regulates the conduct of elections of the board of directors of common interest owner associations and mandates the use of a secret ballot voting process, as described in accompanying election procedures; and

WHEREAS, California Civil Code section 1363.03's election procedures control to the extent that the election procedures in any other Pine Mountain Lake Association governing documents or rules are in conflict with those statutory procedures; and

WHEREAS, Civil Code Section 1363.03 requires the use of either one or three inspectors of election to receive and tabulate ballots and to perform other functions related to the election that are enumerated in the Election Procedures that are attached hereto as Exhibit "A" and permits the designated inspector to be a person who is employed by the Association, such as the Association's Auditor; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors has determined that it is extremely important for elections of the Pine Mountain Lake Association to be free of any question regarding the fairness and impartiality of the election; and

WHEREAS, the Association has, for many years, retained the services of it's independent auditors, to serve as the inspectors of election, with full authority to receive and tabulate ballots; and

WHEREAS, the Association's Bylaws authorize the conduct of director elections through the use of a mailed ballot voting process as described in California Civil Code section 7513, which process can be modified to accommodate the new secret ballot voting process mandated by Civil Code section 1363.03;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that this Association establish and implement the election and secret ballot voting procedures that are attached to this Resolution as Exhibit "A" and incorporated herein by this reference; and

FURTHER RESOLVED, that the President and the General Manager of the Association be, and they hereby are authorized, empowered and directed to take such further actions as they deem necessary and appropriate to implement the purposes and effect of these resolutions and to further have the authority to modify these procedures solely to conform to any subsequently enacted emergency legislation that directly affects the content or protocols of the attached election procedures as such procedures will apply to the Pine Mountain Lake election of directors.

EXHIBIT "A" PINE MOUNTAIN LAKE ELECTION PROCEDURES

Effective July 1, 2006, amendments to California's Davis-Stirling Common Interest Development Act (specifically Civil Code section 1363.03) require that common interest development property owner associations, such as the Pine Mountain Lake Association ("PMLA"), adopt rules regarding the conduct of elections of directors (as well as other specified votes conducted by an owners' association). Those election rules must comply with a number of specific requirements that are set forth in the new statute.

Formation of the Long Range Planning Committee

Recently you might have read about the formation of the PML Long Range Planning Committee or LRPC. The LRPC is made up of 4 members including PML Director, Rita Hart and property owners, Gary Oing and Ron Dodson. Our general goal is to take a look at all Association infrastructure, most of which is 37 plus years old. The specific goals are as follows:

Mission:

The Committee's mission is to maintain a high quality of life for PML homeowners for the long term, and to supply the finest facilities possible with the minimum financial burden to the property owners.

The Committee will consider future needs of the Pine Mountain Lake Association in support of homeowners over the next five years. The group will make recommendations on priorities for maintenance, improvements and replacements of amenities to the PMLA Board of Directors and will present these recommendations to homeowners. If approved, the Board of Directors may budget reserves accordingly.

Parameters:

Included -

- All amenities
- Changing demographics and related changes in homeowners needs
- Input from the Reserve Study
- Input from amenity managers on improvements and replacements needed.
- Consideration of possible new amenities

${\bf Not\ included\ -}$

- Potential build out of Units 14 and 16
- Roads

Objective:

Due to the fact that some of our existing infrastructures are more than 37 years old, the Committee will produce a plan and set of recommendations for amenity maintenance, improvements and replacements for the next five years.

Priorities:

Currently, the LRPC is prioritizing amenities with an eye to those that are used the most and in need of the most repair or replacement. In no particular order, some of those under consideration are:

- The Lake Lodge
- The Marina building and parking lot
- The Country Club interior
- Safety building and equipment
- Campgrounds

We are looking at all of our amenities and buildings, but the above list is getting most of our attention. We will be using the Reserve Study to help us determine which amenity is

A large part of the attraction for us to purchase PML property was the small, peaceful lake in a beautiful setting. This decision was highly reinforced by the fact that there would be NO obnoxious jet skis or loud, fast powerboats zipping about the lake, causing potential threat to the safety of others using the lake, along with the added noise and air pollution.

There are several large-waterbody alternatives nearby that are MUCH more suited to power boating, including Don Pedro, and Lake Tulloch. There is plenty of open water for skiing and towing people on tubes, etc. These lakes are widely used by powerboats. PML is one of the few places where power boating has not taken over the lake. This is a small, peaceful lake that is MUCH more suited to human, wind-powered, and slow electric-powered boating than it is to power boating. Families can still swim, kayak, sail, bicycle-boat, row boat, pontoon boat, etc. The ambiance of our special lake is not destroyed and people have the option to spend a peaceful day at PML lake or have a more robust skiing/towing day at one of the larger nearby lakes.

Therefore, I am against ANY expansion of powered boating days or hours or increased privileges and allowances within PML, and certainly advocate the permanent ban against jet ski's or the like.

The procedures that follow were drafted to reflect those new statutory requirements and it is these procedures that will be used by the Pine Mountain Lake Association in the election of directors unless certain provisions of these procedures must be modified or amended to reflect subsequently enacted State legislation:

- 1. Equal Access to PMLA Media. In accordance with PMLA Board Resolution 01.07, as amended and updated, the following guidelines remain in effect regarding the use of PMLA Media:
- (a) Campaign Signs. Campaign signs must be in compliance with current Association rules and State law.
- (b) PMLA Advertising. The Association offers each candidate one-half page for a campaign statement in the June, July, and August issues of the PML News (text to be supplied by the candidate and printed in each issue) in addition to a 450 word resume. Candidates may utilize the advertisement in any manner they choose, i.e., written statements, charts, pictures, letters of endorsement, etc., in accordance with PML News Editorial Policy. The cost of the space in the PML News is \$200.00 per qualified candidate, to be paid at the time the petition of candidacy is filed with the Association. By state law, the Association may not edit or redact any content from these communications, but may include a statement specifying that the candidate or member, rather than the Association, is responsible for the content of the statement.

Candidates and other members advocating a point of view may also purchase a maximum of an additional one-half page of PML News space per edition (June, July, and August editions) at regular advertising prices.

- (c) Provision of Mailing Labels. Candidates are entitled to purchase labels for mailing at a cost of \$100.00 to be paid at the time the labels are ordered.
- (d) Other PMLA Media Access. It is not the policy of PMLA to provide other means of candidate access to Association media, newsletters or internet websites during a campaign. In the event that the statements or actions of an incumbent director who is also a candidate for re-election to the Board, are reported in any PMLA media solely in the context of that director's performance of his or her duties, those reports or statements shall not constitute provision by PMLA of access to its media for campaign purposes. Should this PMLA policy change in the future, the new Civil Code election rules provide that equal access to any permitted media shall be provided to all nominees and members advocating a point of view (whether or not endorsed by the Board of Directors). An association cannot edit or redact ay content from any candidate communications, but the Association can include a statement specifying that the nominee or member authoring the communication, and not the Association, is responsible for the content of the communication. In accordance with Civil Code section 1363.04, no Association funds shall be used for campaign purposes, except to the extent necessary for the Association to comply with the duties imposed upon it by law.
- 2. Equal Access to Association Meeting Areas for Nominees and for Members Advocating a Particular Point of View. The Association shall provide equal access to the Common Area meeting facilities at Pine Mountain Lake during a campaign, at no cost, to all candidates, including those who are not incumbents, and to all members advocating a point of view, including those not endorsed by the Board, for purposes reasonably related to

the election. This requirement, which is imposed by statute, shall not be interpreted as obligating the Association to provide access to such meeting spaces at times when the space is normally and customarily utilized for other Association or community purposes. In other words, the Association retains its authority and responsibility to ensure that the Common Facilities are managed, operated, and accessed for the common benefit and enjoyment of all PMLA members.

- 3. Minimum Qualifications for Candidacy. In accordance with the Association Bylaws, in order to be eligible to be a candidate for election to the Board of Directors, the candidate must be a Member of the Association who is in good standing (meaning that the proposed candidate is not delinquent in the payment of Association assessment obligations and is not otherwise subject to a suspension of membership privileges as the result of disciplinary action initiated by the Association).
- 4. Nominations for Election to the Board of Directors; Self Nomination. In addition to the nomination procedures specified in Section 7.04 of the Association Bylaws, by State law, the Association must now permit any member to "self-nominate" himself or herself for election to the Board of Directors, Any Member desiring to nominate himself or herself as a candidate for election to the Board must: (i) satisfy the good standing requirements for candidacy applicable to other candidates at the time the person's candidacy is proposed and thereafter; (ii) present written notice to the Board of Directors of the person's desire to self-nominate on or before the deadline of the nominating committee for the presentation of its list of candidates to the Board of Directors. Section 7.04 requires that candidates for election must submit a petition signed by at least two percent (2%) of the members in order to demonstrate support for the candidacy. In the event that a person self-nominates himself or herself without presenting a petition signed by at least two percent (2%) of the members, that candidate's name may appear on the ballot under a heading which states: Self-Nominated Candidates With No Supporting Petition". Candidate's names shall be listed on the ballot alphabetically by last name.
- 5. Voting Eligibility. Each Member of the Association in good standing is entitled to cast one vote for each lot that the Member owns. In order to be eligible to vote the Member must be in good standing, with all assessment obligations current and the Member cannot be subject to any other suspension of voting rights privileges as a result of disciplinary action duly imposed by the Association. Because membership voting rights are appurtenant to the ownership of particular Lots, if a Member is delinquent in the payment of assessments as to any particular Lot owned, that Member can be denied voting rights as to the Lot where the assessment obligations are delinquent.
- 6. Proxy Voting. The secret ballot voting requirements of Civil Code section 1363.03 do not prohibit the use of proxy voting, However it is the policy and practice of the Association to conduct its elections by use of written ballot voting in accordance with Civil Code section 7513 and that form of balloting contemplates that each Member will receive a ballot by mail or personal deliver and shall therefore have the right to cast the ballot personally. In corporate law, proxy voting contemplates a situation in which an agent of an absent member (i.e., the proxy holder) presents evidence of authority to act on behalf of the absent member (in the form of a written proxy) at the meeting that the issuer of the proxy was unable to attend. In the context of PMLA elections, the annual membership meeting is the forum for the announcement of the results of the election conducted by use of mailed (written ballot) voting, but the election does not actually take place at the meeting. For that reason,

the Civil Code rules relating to proxy voting in the election of directors do not apply to the election of directors pursuant to the written ballot election process utilized by PMLA.

- 7. Duration of the Voting Process. The secret ballot voting procedures of Civil Code section 1363.03(e) specify that ballots for the election of the Board of Directors, must be sent to all eligible Members not less than thirty (30) days prior to the deadline that is established for the tender of ballots. In the election of the Board of Directors, written ballots must be received by the Inspector of Election, no later than the 4:30 P.M. the day before the scheduled Annual Meeting of the Members and Directors Election. Due to the requirement that the Association utilize a double envelope ballot system in the election of directors, any ballots that are sent to the Inspector of Elections by facsimile transmission or email cannot be counted.
- 8. Use of Secret Ballots and Ballot Completion Requirements. In accordance with Civil Code section 1363.03, ballots used in the election of directors shall be secret ballots which shall not identify the voter by name, address or lot number. The secret ballots, together with two pre-addressed envelopes with instructions on how to return ballots shall be mailed by first-class mail or delivered by the Association to every Member of the Association not less than thirty (30) days prior to the deadline for voting. The unsigned ballot shall be inserted into an envelope (the "Ballot Envelope") that is sealed and this sealed Ballot Envelope shall then be inserted into a second envelope (the "Address Envelope") that is sealed. In the upper left hand corner of the Address Envelope, a space or lines shall be presented where the voter can print and sign his or her name, address and Lot number. The Address Envelope shall be addressed to the inspector or inspectors of election who shall tally the votes. The Address Envelope (containing the ballot and the Ballot Envelope) may be mailed or delivered by hand to the location specified by the inspector of election for the return of ballots and the Member may request a receipt for delivery of the ballot.
- **9.** Determination of Election Results/Succession to Office. The candidates receiving the highest number of votes, up to the number of vacancies to be filled in the election, shall be elected as directors and shall take office immediately following their election. In the event there is a tie vote between those candidates who receive the lowest number of votes necessary to qualify the candidate for election, the tie shall be broken by random drawing.
- 10. Supervision of Election Process; Appointment of Inspector(s) of Election. In order to insure secrecy of ballots and fairness in the conduct of director elections, the Board of Directors shall select an independent third party or parties to serve as the inspector(s) of election. Civil Code section 1363.03(c) specifies that the number of inspectors of election shall be one or three. However, in accordance with longstanding practice, the Association's Board of Directors has determined that the Association's Independent CPA and Accountancy Corporation shall be the sole inspector of elections. The inspector of election is allowed to appoint and oversee additional persons to verify signatures and to count and tabulate votes as the inspector deems appropriate, provided the persons are independent third parties. As the duly appointed inspector of elections, the Independent CPA and Accountancy Corporation shall have the full powers of an inspector of elections appointed by the Board pursuant to Corporations Code section 7614 and shall perform his duties impartially, in good faith, to the best of his ability, and as expeditiously as is practical. Any report made by the inspector of election is prima facie evidence of the facts stated

in the report. The sealed ballots at all times shall be in the custody of the inspector of election or at a location designated by the inspector or inspectors until after the tabulation of the vote, at which time custody of the ballots shall be transferred to the Association.

Without limiting the foregoing, the inspector election shall do all of the following:

- (i) Determine the number of memberships entitled to vote and the voting power of each.
- (ii) Determine the authenticity, validity, and effect of proxies, if any.
- (iii) Receive ballots. Sealed ballots shall at all times be in the custody of the inspector or inspectors of election or at a location designated by the inspector or inspectors until after the tabulation of the vote, at which time custody of the ballots shall be transferred to the Association.
- (iv) Hear and determine all challenges and questions in any way arising out of or in connection with the right to vote.
 - (v) Count and tabulate all votes.
 - (vi) Determine when the polls close.
 - (vii) Determine the result of the election.
- (viii) Perform any acts as may be proper to the conduct of the election with fairness to all Members and in accordance with the Association Rules pertaining to the conduct of elections and section 1363.03 of the Civil Code.
- 11.Requirements for the Counting and Tabulation of Ballots. The designated inspector of election must count and tabulate the votes in public at a properly noticed open meeting of the Board of Directors or the Members. Any candidate or other Member of the Association may witness the counting and tabulation of the votes. The inspector of election, or his or her designee, may verify the member's information and signature on the outer envelope prior to the meeting at which the ballots are tabulated. Once a secret ballot is received by the inspector of elections, it shall be irrevocable. No person, including a Member of the Association or an employee of the Association's management company, if any, shall open or otherwise review any ballot prior to the time and place at which the ballots are counted and tabulated. In the event that tabulation of the ballots cannot be concluded prior to the designated time for adjournment of the annual membership meeting, the meeting shall be continued for such time as is required to complete the tabulation of ballots and Members shall be entitled to remain in attendance at the continued meeting to observe the tabulation.
- 12. Announcement of the Results of the Election. The results of the election shall be promptly reported to the Board of Directors of the Association and shall be recorded in the minutes of the next meeting of the Board and shall be available for review by Members of the Association. Within fifteen (15) days of the election, the Board shall publicize the results of the election in a communication directed to all Members.
- 13.Retention of Ballots. After tabulation, election ballots shall be stored by the Association in a secure place for no less than one year after the date of the election. In the event of a recount or other challenge to the election process, the Association shall, upon written request, make the ballots available for inspection and review by Association Members or their authorized representatives. Any recount shall be conducted in a manner that shall preserve the confidentiality of the vote.



Putting Greens

by Alan MacDonald, Golf Course Superintendent

his month I would like to discuss our Putting Greens and their different shades of green.

Originally, when the course was constructed, the greens were planted with a variety of Bentgrasses. As the years go by, Poa Annua (annual Bluegrass) has invaded the greens. Poa is different than bent in its fertility needs, water needs, and can be more prone to disease. As many as 30 different strains can be growing on a green. It also produces a seedhead that makes the greens be a little bumpy and white in color.

To reduce the seedhead we use a growth regulator. The application should begin two weeks ahead of seeing the seed (which varies with the type of winter we are having) and continues through out the growing season on a monthly schedule. This season our first application was in early February. I do not believe we have had the success rate this year as in previous years. I am consulting with the manufacture on this subject.

Poa also requires more spot watering due to being shallow rooted. Poa by nature tends to become puffy which requires vertical mowing to correct. Another difference between Poa and Bent is the need for fertility. Higher fertility levels have benefits that are not apparent for Bent grass. Higher levels of nitrogen is beneficial in reducing Anthracnose outbreaks.

So you can see all the factors going on below your putt that have contributing factors as to color and ball roll.

Another interesting part of golf course management is tree care. Trees and turf do not mix for ideal playing conditions. With our old oaks, being the huge asset to our course that they are, it is difficult to make the decision to remove them. Recently three were removed near #5 green that were diseased and a liability to the condominiums there.

We are now preparing to remove the old oak nearest the cart path on #2 that is 50 or so yards off the tee. We have planted trees around it, knowing this day would come. When the tree is removed, we will replace it with something that is fast growing and as turf friendly as possible.

As the years roll by there will be more that will need to be removed. Most will present a liability to the golfer. Others will need to be removed to allow more winter sun or in some cases just to reduce the shade canopy to improve playing conditions.

That is it for this month,- so appreciate and enjoy your golf course and remember to rake that bunker and leave the rake inside the bunker.

Teen Drivers Lack Good Role Model

any teenagers drive as dangerously on real city streets as do characters in movies about reckless driving, researches at sun Diego state university have found. After serving 2,310 southern California teens between 15 and 18 years old, the researchers found that these young drivers felt on average, they were speeding only if they were driving 90 m.p.h. or above. 14% of all deaths due to motor vehicle accidents are teen drivers. Teen drivers deaths-due to motor vehicle accident-occur on weekends 53% of the time. 72% of the time the person driving the automobile speeding was a teen driver. This age group makes up 7% of licensed drivers, but 20% of all reported accidents.

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



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

Increase your 401(k) contribution. One of the most effective ways to save for retirement is through an employersponsored plan such as a 401(k). Hopefully, you are already taking advantage by participating in such a plan, which allows you to make regular contributions with pre-tax money straight from your paycheck. Bytes & Bits From John

Simple Maintenance can save you time, heart ache and of course money. You already know this from owning an automobile. Regular oil changes, diagnostic service, brakes, tires, etc., but what about your computer? Do you pay attention to its service schedule as religiously as you do your car? You should, and here are some easy do it yourself procedures you as the "user" should be responsible for. It doesn't take a lot of effort and only takes about 15 minutes a week.

De-fragmentation: In simple terms. organizing your data on the hard drive. Putting the oranges in the orange basket and the apples in the apple basket. As the operating system via the read/write function extracts and implants magnetic data on the drive disk. some files will become fragmented. (i.e.; bits and pieces of files become scattered.) This is normal. Your operating system will find them when you need them, but generally the more scattered, the longer it takes. One of the most common complaints I deal with is "my computer seems to be running slower and slower". I ask them, "When was the last time you defragged?" A typical response is "de-what?" I recommend a program to address this issue called "Diskeeper"... just like it says...You can run this program manually or it can be scheduled to run when you want it to. Once a week will keep your hard drive running at optimal speed. I like this program because it is much faster and more efficient than the built in windows component defragmenter. You can check it out at Diskeeper.com

Clear up Unused Software and Temporary Internet Files: If you have old software applications you don't use, why let them take up storage space? It's also nice just to clean up unnecessary "crud" that you don't use such as temporary files

and internet cache. For this, I recommend a program called "CCleaner". It will Uninstall old applications, scan your system with a full CCleaner run to clear out temp files and internet cache. Go to ccleaner. com for this program.

Virus Scan: The best defense is to practice safe computing habits by avoiding websites that contribute viruses and malware. However, you should still do a weekly scan using a program I recommend called "AVG Antivirus". AVG is excellent software and is free for home use. AVG is less bulky and intrusive to your system than many other antivirus programs that are very costly and harder to manage. Bulky utilities tend to slow down system performance, especially on the internet. You can download this program at AVG.com.

Spyware/Malware Scans: Unfortunately, it has come to the point where we have to protect ourselves from criminals even when we use our computer. With identity theft a major problem, not to mention other problems, I feel it crucial to run a good anti spyware program. The program can catch the evil culprit before it spreads throughout your machine and downloads more malware behind the scenes. "A-Squared" is a good program that is perfect for this. The program is available at emsisoft.com

Backup Your Hard Drive: Backup, backup, BACKUP!!! Am I placing some emphasis on this? It's very important you do a full backup of your hard drive. There is nothing sadder than a hard drive with year's worth of contacts, pictures and sometimes business data vanquished from a physical hard drive failure. Hard drive failure really happens and more often than you may think. Sometimes I have been able to retrieve data easily, and there have been times when I got

it back through some unknown intervention or a miracle. Don't count on it though. There are some labs that have very advanced technology that work to retrieve data. They don't guarantee anything, and they cost into the thousands of dollars. You pay, regardless. Yes, backing up data can be a major pain. Not only is it tedious, it is seldom on a regular basis. My recommendation is an "automated" backup. You schedule it and forget it. That simple. If your computer is turned off when you had a backup scheduled to run, it can start automatically the next time you turn on the computer. To keep your automated backups efficient, they should be referred to an external hard drive or network storage. The storage should be at least the size of the hard drive being backed up, but preferably twice the size. CD's and DVD storage is becoming obsolete because of large file digital photographs, music and videos, unless you

use a Blue Ray or HD-DVD recorder (will discuss in future article). My favorite backup software is Acronis True Image. This will backup your entire hard drive, including the operating system, applications or just specific files or directories as you select. This is available at Acronis.com.

If you try all these suggestions and your computer still runs below par, it may need a major tune up and professional diagnostic.



HEALTHY HEART RECIPE

As we approach the Cinco de Mayo season, our tastes turn to something spicy. Fortunately, spices and herbs are figure and heart flattering, as long as you use them with low fat sauces and meats. The following recipe should perk up all of your taste buds without sacrificing flavor or good heart health. Ole!

Picante Chicken

serves 4; 3 oz. chicken, 1/2 cup rice, 1 T. sauce per serving

Vegetable oil spray

4 boneless, skinless chicken breast halves (4 oz. each), all visible fat discarded 1/4 to 1/2 teaspoon ground cumin 2 teaspoons olive oil

1/4 cup mild picante sauce (low sodium) 1 cup uncooked instant brown rice 1/4 teaspoon ground tumeric (optional) 1/4 teaspoon salt

2 tablespoons fat-free or light sour cream

2 tablespoons snipped fresh cilantro

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Lightly spray an 11x7x2 inch baking dish with vegetable oil spray. Put the chicken in the baking dish. Sprinkle with the cumin, drizzle with the oil, and evenly spoon the picante sauce on top of the chicken using back of a spoon. Bake for 25 minutes or until chicken is no longer pink in the center.

Meanwhile, in a small saucepan, prepare the rice according to the package directions, omitting the margarine, using only 1/4 t. salt and adding the turmeric.

To serve, spoon the rice onto plates and put chicken beside the rice. Spoon the sauce over all. Top the chicken with the sour cream and cilantro.

GAINs . . . on the Hill

s a community collaborative, Groveland Area Involved Neighbors (GAINs) has developed several new activities and services for the benefit of those of us who live "on the hill," southern Tuolumne and northern Mariposa counties. The goal is to look for things we can do as a community, to get something started, and then to find individuals or groups who would like to carry it on.

Last year we wrapped up a project for expanded healthcare services in our area, funded by The California Endowment. We learned a great deal about what healthcare services might be available and settled on starting our own community Rural Health Clinic. As a result of our efforts, Sonora Regional Medical Center is changing the Groveland Family Clinic into a Rural Health Clinic, which means services for everyone. They get extra federal funding because of our rural area status. In addition, Fremont Hospital in Mariposa is putting a Rural Health Clinic in Greeley Hill. So we'll have two clinics in our area and didn't need to start our own! GAINs board members help establish the Groveland Area Health Advisory Council, which continues to watchdog our community's healthcare interests. Liz Mattingly heads up that program.

In May GAINs will distribute the 5th edition of the GAINs Resource Directory, *Over the River and through the Woods.*

This innovative directory of over 140 services and businesses in southern Tuolumne and northern Mariposa counties has become a regular companion to telephones in local homes and businesses. The Directory is not just another phone book as it includes more contact information, hours of operation, a category section in the front, and a paragraph of description for each entry. Over 1400 free copies are picked up at local businesses in May and at the Groveland Library and Northern Mariposa Museum throughout the year. People tell us they reach for it rather than the regular phone book because its easier to use and has so much more information. Look for the new directories in May.

GAINs will soon update the Healthcare Services Directory published in 2005 as part of the Expanded Healthcare Project funded by The California Endowment. This directory is also free and is available at the Groveland Library and the Groveland Family Clinic. A grant will be applied for to cover the cost of printing.

Next month we'll write about, "Movies on the Hill" and projects for our youth. Members of the Board of Directors are Lynn Bonander, Amy Bullock, Colleen Carr, Jim Goodrich, Judy Myers, Frank Oyung, and Phil Yoon. 
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Area Planning Update

Sierra Business Council Wins Bid for Big Oak Flat/ Downtown Groveland Community Plan

he following news article expands upon the article published by NICPI in March which announced the award of a federal grant to prepare an area plan for the communities of Big Oak Flat and Groveland. More detail are now available and have been provided by SBC.

The Sierra Business Council works to secure the social, natural and financial health of the Sierra Nevada for this and future generations. It is a not for profit association of more than 500 businesses. The Council explicitly rejects the notion that sierra communities must choose between economic and environmental health. The Sierra Business Council views environmental quality as key to the Sierra Nevada's economic prosperity and natural resource conservation as essential to building regional health.

The Sierra Business Council, recognizing the importance of Groveland and Big Oak Flat as a Sierra Nevada gateway community to Yosemite National Park, bid on and won the contract to create a community plan for Big Oak Flat and downtown Groveland.

The plan will be a product of the extensive public outreach process being planned for this spring and summer. It will include

a number of components, including a brief history of the region and identification of planning issues and opportunities. The community plan will include sections on land use, traffic and circulation, conservation, open space, public facilities and services, cultural resources and community identity. Additional sections may be added depending upon the results of the public outreach process. The plan will eventually become part of the Tuolumne County General Plan.

Who can participate? Everyone in Groveland, Big Oak Flat, and these surrounding areas is invited to participate. Steve Frisch, from SBC, would like to meet one on one with as many individuals as possible. Steve would also like to meet with groups. To make an appointment, call Ellie Owen from NYCPI (Northern Yosemite Corridor Partners Inc.) at 962-6874 or e-mail eowen@hub3.net. After meeting with individuals and groups, Steve will schedule workshops in the Tenaya Gym, dates to be announced and published later.



Organizers of a Veterans Information Fair, to be held September 8, 2007, are seeking veterans who have served since the Vietnam War, up to and including Operation Iraqi Freedom and Operation Enduring Freedom. The one-day event will be held at the Sonora Elks Lodge from 9 am to 3 pm.

"We need younger veterans to help us older veterans in getting the word out about VA benefits that are not being accessed by these newer generations," said Frank M. Smart, chairman of the event. Smart is representing Sonora Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 3154, one of the lead organizations promoting the event.

According to statistics, there are 2.2 million veterans living in California but only 11% have applied for, or are using, their benefits.

The Mission Statement of the Veterans Information Fair states that the event will provide veterans, service-members, and families support in accessing employment, educational opportunities, VA programs, benefits and resources.

"We are not just talking about combat veterans either. To us a veteran is a vet-

eran is a veteran," Smart noted. While the emphasis will be on the younger men and women, all veterans of all eras are encouraged to come and speak to representatives about their rights and benefits.

Women veterans are of particular interest to the veteran's community, according to Smart.

"Fifteen percent of active-duty forces are women. There are 1.7 million women veterans which is 6.8% of the total. Those are significant numbers. Female soldiers will suffer the same traumas men do," Smart said.

There have been 155,000 women deployed to Iraq and Afghanistan. There have been 10 killed and 9 wounded in Afghanistan, 65 killed in Iraq and 453 wounded.

"We need to put a 'young face' on this event. We need these younger generations of veterans to become active in our organizations to keep them alive for future generations, and we also need to ensure that all veterans have full access to the benefits they have so rightfully and painfully earned," Smart concluded.

Did You Know

Four of the first five Presidents of the United States came from Virginia - Washington, Jefferson, Madison and Monroe.

PRIEST GRADE, GRIZZLY GULCH

It's interesting to note that the New Priest Grade, Old Priest Grade, Grizzly Gulch, what ever you choose to call these roads, winds up almost 2,000 feet of mountainside in a few breath-taking miles. There are two routes, which climb the mountain between Moccasin and Priest, the original wagon path labeled The Grizzly Gulch Road when built in the 1850's and the current highway, christened New Priest Grade when open in 1915.

Today, the older, steeper route is called "old grade" while the highway, despite its years of use, remains the "new grade." The "old grade" scales the mountain climbing 1575 vertical feet in less than two miles, ascending at a seventeen percent rate in some places. It has served the higher communities for more than a half century and even to this day it seems to be the preferred route for most residents.

Before the horseless carriage, heavily laden wagons regularly made the pull up the steep hill, sometimes traveling at night to avoid the heat. It was not uncommon for the difficult climb to take as long as five hours, depending on the weight of the load.

For many years, a shed stocked with ropes and tools required by the teamsters in conquering the grade, sat near the spring. All that remains of the old water tank, so necessary to both man and beast during the earlier days, is the broken water pipe, allowing the water to flow aimlessly down a nearby draw.

Understandably, the residents of Big Oak Flat and Groveland began looking for a less taxing way to reach the mountain communities. When the financially strapped County Road Dept refused their requests, the residents took it upon themselves to build a new route up Grizzly Gulch.

At a mass meeting held in Groveland, the hill folks agreed that anyone who couldn't contribute cash to the venture would instead put in a week's work.

Area mines provided explosives, the Hetch Hetchy threw in twenty five hundred dollars and the Yosemite Power Company added fifteen hundred dollars. Charlie Baird, the local stage driver volunteered to transport the work force to the construction site each day.

Unlike the old grade, the new grade would gradually snake its way down the opposite side of Grizzly Gulch to intersect the existing highway near Stevens Bar. The county reluctantly agreed to build the bridge across Moccasin Creek and to maintain the new roadway once it was completed.

Despite their best efforts, though, the volunteer road builders, by faithfully following the contours of the canyon wall, merely substituted curve for pitch. While the four percent grade could more easily accommodate automobiles, the over one hundred curves and hairpin turns were too much for horses and wagons. The new grade was also more than twice as long as the old route.

Along about 1950 widening but rarely straightening the curves improved the upper part of the "new grade". The lower part of the grade completely disappeared twenty-five years later with the construction of the Don Pedro Reservoir.

The Pine Needlers Quilt Guild

andy Smith, Pat Helling and Joyce Reitzen told us about the Quilt Stroll, which will be on June 9, 2007. They went to the Modesto Quilt Guild to talk about the Quilt Stroll. They were very receptive and many plan to come.

There will be quilts for sale, as well as a central booth where smaller quilted items will be sold. The committee has done extensive work to get this off the ground. The quilts will be hung along the highway from Yosemite Bank all the way to Mary Laveroni Park. This is going to be a major event for our Pine Needlers Quilt Guild. It is the first Stroll and will be held every other year, so if you don't have a quilt to put in this show, start one now and finish it for the 2009 Stroll.

A suggestion for quilters entering quilts, put a sheet on the back of your quilt, so if it rubs against a building, it won't get soiled. All quilts need a 4" sleeve on the back, so they can be hung. The hangers will be very careful to hang them properly, so there won't be any damage to your precious quilts. Clothesline will be strung between trees and buildings and the quilts will be hung safely on the clothesline.

The Challenge Quilt will be a crayon quilt. Three crayons were picked out of

a bag (without looking) and those three colors must be used in a quilted item, quilt, vest, placemat, etc. These will be due in June.

Mark Rhyne, who is a sewing machine repairman, did part of the program, explaining what he does when he gets a machine to repair or clean. He also explained some of the common problems like putting the needle in backwards or threading the machine incorrectly. His number is 878-3569 and he also repairs sergers and sharpens scissors.

Wina Helm took a class from Sandy Klopp on mitered borders and she did a short demonstration of the technique.

Bunny Rose told about her new Classroom at her house and she will have an Open House on Sunday, April 22 from 1:00 to 5:00.
