This month we have several important issues to deal with. Not the least of these is the election process to fill the one vacancy on the Board of Directors. That process has already begun. It is vitally important that we have Directors to oversee the business of running Pine Mountain Lake. We are blessed to currently have a very good staff to run the business of PML and they do their job very well. What we need is Property Owners to volunteer for the Board of Directors which oversee the business process and make decisions affecting PML now and in the future. PML will not run itself. It needs you to consider becoming a candidate for the Board of Directors. This year we will have one vacancy on the board when my term ends in August. Candidates can obtain forms from the Administration Office to place their name on the ballot.

We are still in the process of changing the Lake Use Rules. The big issue is wake / knee boarding. After spending several years trying to find a solution to the problem of large wakes without success, the board has decided to return to the original policy of not allowing

activities which produce large wakes. Waterskiing will remain an activity because it generally does not produce large wakes. Proponents of wake-boarding and knee-boarding have pointed out that wakeboards do not make wakes, boats make wakes. This is true. The real problem is that wake and knee boarding is done at a much slower speed so, naturally, the boat goes slower. When the boat does not go fast enough to "plane", it makes a very large wake, much larger than it would if it were go fast enough to plane. This is also compounded by the fact that many wakeboarding boats are specifically designed to make very large wakes. It is these large wakes that are at issue. The board will vote on the proposed rules at the May Open Board Meeting on May 17 at the Lake Lodge beginning at 9 a.m.

Progress is being made in the legal action brought by Ken Lett and Mel Kauffman against present and former Directors and the Association. Due to the fact that not all of the issues have

been settled, it is inappropriate to go into detail at this time. What has happened is that charges and allegations made against individual Directors have been dismissed. The action against the Association continues and once again we feel very strongly that we will prevail in that action as well. We should have more information by next month.

In the financial arena, we have been blessed with fair weather for this time of the year and it is reflected in our finances. Revenues for the golf course, restaurant and bar activity rose well above budgeted levels this month and we expect that trend to continue in spite of the fact that we thought we may have problems due to a sluggish economy. The recent changes at the restaurant which have resulted in a dramatic rise in the quality of food and service are having the desired effect. More of our members are now enjoying one of our best amenities. If you haven't tried the restaurant lately, please do. You will be pleasantly surprised.

GENERAL MANAGER'S MESSAGE

Swimming Pool ADA Ramp and Restroom/Shower

I am happy to report that we have received the final from the County on our ADA Ramp and Restroom/Shower project at the Swimming Pool. The project came in on budget and ahead of schedule.

Main Gate Entrance Project

Our Maintenance crew is installing the irrigation and lighting systems as well as the retaining wall walkway railing. They are also installing the landscaping in and around the monuments. The logo sign is up and the entry lane signs are on order so we will be able to remove the old roadway signs soon. The project has taken longer than expected but will be well worth the wait.

Parking Lot Maintenance at the Country Club and Dunn Court

The Dunn Court parking lot has been slurry sealed and painted just in time for the summer season. The Country Club parking lot and the lot near the Country Club entrance between Tennis Courts 5 & 6 and the cart path to the 1st Tee were also slurry sealed and painted on April 21st and 22nd. We timed these projects when the Golf Course was closed for aeration. And it worked out great.

Split Rail fencing project near PML and Admin Entrance

Maintenance started the split rail fence project near the end of April with the removal of large portions of the old fence. The new fencing was installed and matches newer portions that have already been installed in recent years.

Committee Applicants

The Association is currently seeking applicants for the Budget and Finance, Editorial and Covenants Committees. Interested members are asked to fill out the committee application form which is available at the Administration Office and on the PML Website.

Quagga/Zebra Mussel workshop

On March 20th my Assistant Rick Whybra and Marina Manager, Ron Prieto attended an invasive species workshop at the Stockton Yacht Club. They brought back a lot of great information on the impact and mitigation of the quagga/zebra mussel.

As PML members start to launch their boats in Pine Mountain Lake, we are taking steps to fight the transportation of invasive species. Part of the process is signage and education. It is important that Lake Users become informed and take precautions to keep our Lake healthy. Our staff has recently attended an invasive species workshop held by the Water Qual-

ity Control Board and came back with some great information. We will continue to post the latest information to the PML Website and publish articles in the PML News. All PML boaters are asked to be aware of this potential danger to PML and take the necessary precautions. Members can access more information at the Department of Fish and Game website at www.dfg.ca.gov/invasives/quaggamussel.

Air Medical Ambulance Service Presentation

The PHI Air Medical Ambulance is scheduled to give a presentation at the May 17th Board meeting. This is an Air Ambulance with service based in Modesto and Sonora. They offer an Air Membership Program for groups and individuals that is very cost effective and considering our rural location, really practical. Families pay an annual fee (very reasonable from \$30-\$60) and they receive any air ambulance service through PHI Air Medical for what their insurance will cover. The plan sounds like it may be a benefit to Pine Mountain Lake members, so we have

agreed to set aside some time for them at the Board meeting. Interested members are encouraged to attend.

Fire Abatement Project

Requests for proposals were sent out to four qualified contractors to bid on our Fire Abatement Project. Two of the contractors declined to bid. The other two bids came in and were reviewed by our registered forester consultant and Fire Abatement Team members. After consideration of pricing per acre, type of equipment and vendor availability, the team came in with a recommendation and agreement that will be considered by the Board and executed as soon as possible. Once the contract is signed we should be able to start before May.

PML Restaurant Survey

The Long Range Planning Committee extended the submission time for the Restaurant Survey until the end of April and plan to provide the results to the Board and membership at the May 17th monthly Board meeting. We would like to thank those members that participated and took the survey. This information should be useful for future planning at our Country Club operation.



The following proposed Board resolution is an amendment to Resolution #05.01 PMLA Boating and Lake Rules. The purpose of the rules change is to update the text of the previous rules for grammar and clarification of safety issues, to increase the use time for water skiers and to mitigate the impact of large, destructive wakes. The effect of the rules changes impact hours of use of the Lake, what can be used on the Lake and other policy changes. The main effect and change in this draft is the discontinuation of wakeboard and kneeboard devices on the Lake and the increase of use time for water skiing in the evening. The Boating and Lake Rules were discussed at the January, February, March and April monthly Board meetings and this draft was considered in February, March and April. The Board will take action on this published draft at the May 17, 2008 monthly Board meeting at the PML Lake Lodge. The meeting starts at 9 a.m. and all members are welcome to attend.

PMLA BOATING AND LAKE RULES Draft March 15, 2008

For your safety, California Boating Laws prevail. For your convenience, copies of the pamphlet "ABC's of California Boating Laws", published by the California Harbors and Watercraft are available at the Marina Store.

Listed below are further regulations that apply to Pine Mountain Lake boating usage. Failure to comply with them shall be grounds for termination of your privileges. Violations are subject to citation. All boats are subject to inspection to determine compliance with State Law and Association requirements. If you have any questions on the safety requirements of your boat, contact a Boat Patrol Officer or the Marina Store staff.

GENERAL BOATING RULES Know our rules and abide by them for your enjoyment and safety.

All boats on Pine Mountain Lake must meet both State of California and Pine Mountain Lake registration requirements. Only property owners in good standing may register their boats.

REGISTRATION: Requirements for registration include: current liability insurance with a minimum of \$300,000, proof of PML residency, proof that the boat meets California Boating Law safety requirements, compliance with PML non-wake enhancing requirements, and agreement to abide by lake rules.

PML non-wake enhancing regulations restrict the use of internal ballast tanks, external fins, foils, panels, or boat hulls specifically designed to increase wakes. Any boats incorporating these devices, registered at PML must adhere to PML's restrictions on not utilizing these devices.

All boats are limited to 5 mph except during water skiing hours, where the speed limit is 40 mph in the ski area only. All boats, except those signed up for skiing, must stay out of the ski area while skiing is in progress. Skiing or other high-speed boating activity is permitted during designated hours from May 1 thru October 31 only.

Open stack boats and others with a decibel level exceeding 82 db are prohibited. Likewise, radios or stereos may not be played at high volume.

Note that areas marked "no wake" mean no wake. These areas are marked with white buoys that say "No Wake". Boats may have to go slower than 5 mph in order not to create any wake.

NO "Jet Skis", "Wave runners" or other similar variations of personal watercraft are allowed on Pine Mountain Lake (except authorized emergency or law enforcement equipment).

Only skippers (16 years and older with a valid driver's license) designated by a boat owner may operate a powerboat, provided that they know the lake and marina rules. Boat owners are responsible for informing their operators of all lake and marina rules.

Boat owners are responsible for the operation of their boats and the wakes they create regardless of who may be operating the boat.

Reckless operation and disregard for others may result in citation and forfeiture of lake boating privileges.

Boaters must stay inside the passenger/ operator areas of the boat. Riding outside of the railing or gate is prohibited.

Powerboat operators may not tow or pull rafts, tubes, *wakeboards*, *knee boards*, paddleboats, kayaks, canoes or similar craft.

In case of an accident, give any necessary assistance, then immediately contact the Boat Patrol (based at the Marina).

Sufficient life preservers must be aboard for each passenger. All boaters less than 12 years of age and non-swimmers must wear properly tied life jackets.

Give a wide berth to sail and manually operated boats, as they have the right of way

Powerboats may not be operated within 50 feet of a swimming area.

When meeting another boat, keep to the right.

Individuals wishing to blow out their motors may do so during high-speed boating hours and must first check-in with the Boat Patrol. Blow-outs will be limited to two (2) times around the ski pattern and must adhere to all high-speed boating rules. A maximum of 4 boats are allowed in the high-speed lane with skiers/boarders given priority over boats wishing to blow out their motor. No engine blowouts will be allowed between 6:00 PM and 8:00 PM.

Every effort shall be made to **minimize** wakes, especially those affecting shoreline properties.

All lake activity is suspended when CDF helicopters perform firefighting procedures or during other emergencies that require use of lake water.

The Boat Patrol will be in effect daily. Citations may be given for PML rule infractions. Two citations will constitute action for removing your boat from Pine Mountain Lake for the remainder of the season. Any boating or swimming rule may be changed in an emergency based on input from PML management, Safety Dept., Sheriff's Dept. or other appropriate agency.

BOAT LAUNCHING & REMOVAL DATES

NO BOAT MAY BE LAUNCHED without current Pine Mountain Lake registration.

BOAT LAUNCHING AND REMOVAL is allowed only at the Marina boat ramp.

ALL BOATS NOT REMOVED from Dunn Court and the Marina area by October 31st of each year will be removed and stored AT THE OWNER'S EXPENSE.

NO TRAILER PARKING permitted, except for daily use, and only in designated areas. No trailer parking will be permitted the date of the Independence Day fireworks celebration.

DUNN COURT SAILBOAT OWNERS: Please relocate your sailboat the day before the annual fireworks display. This date may vary from year to year.

WATER SKIING AND WAKEBOARDING RULES

Homeowners wishing to register a ski or wake boat for the first time on PML will be given a tour of the lake and have these regulations and the PML Water-ski and Wakeboard Club's Good Neighbor Rules explained. This tour will be conducted monthly by the PML Boat Patrol, assisted by the PML WWC and must be completed before the homeowner may sign up for ski/wakeboard times at PML. Copies of the *Lake and Boating Rules* and the Good Neighbor Rules will be available to all boaters at the Marina. Wakeboarding and kneeboarding are not permitted. Marina staff are the final authority on other activities that are not permitted.

Skiing and wakeboarding will be on a one-hour session, reservation basis. High-speed boating hours are generally as follows:

On the Monday associated with the 3 three-day holiday weekends, wakeboarding will start at 4:00 PM. High-speed boating activities, wakeboarding or skiing, in the 9 AM to 12PM hours are not defined and will be worked out between the Marina Manager and the PML WWC.

State law prohibits the towing of water skiers from sunset to sunrise.

<u>Water</u> skiing and wakeboarding are <u>is</u> prohibited November 1 through April 30. The speed limit for all boats during

this time is 5 mph.

Reservations will be taken at the Marina Store (962-8631) up to 24 hours in advance and will be limited to one hour per day. Additional hours may be reserved on the day of interest. You may call or walk-in for reservations. When time slots become full, a stand-by list will be taken.

Reservations for skiing will be taken at the Marina Store (962-8631). You may call or walk-in (walk-ins have first priority). Reservations will be taken starting one hour prior to the morning ski time, one day in advance of skiing. Reservations will be limited to one (1) hour, morning or afternoon, 1 day prior to skiing. Those wishing to ski in both the morning and afternoon may reserve a second hour the day of skiing starting one (1) hour prior to the morning ski time. When time slots become full, a stand-by list will be taken. Skiing time will be limited to one (1) hour per reservation initially, and modified by the Lake Patrol and Marina Manager depending on demand.

All users of the fast boat lane must check-in with the Boat Patrol prior to commencing their activity. The Boat Patrol will wait 10 minutes for a user with a reservation. After that, the time slot will be opened to the next fast boat user requesting time. If there are no reservations or ad hoc fast boat users in line, the fast boat lane will be closed to fast boat activities for the rest of the hour.

A ski-flag or light system is located at the Marina Point. The flag or light indicates whether high-speed boating activity is or is not occurring. The ski flag will be dynamically raised and lowered based on whether the fast boat lane is open or closed on an hour-by-hour basis during reservation hours. Boaters can also call the Marina Store for ski-flag or light status.

A maximum of four (4) boats will be allowed to ski at any one time. A distance of 100 feet shall be maintained between boats.

A counter-clockwise ski pattern shall be maintained.

To minimize shoreline wakes on the North shore, high-speed boaters shall stay as close as possible to the main beach buoys when traveling from the dam toward Big Creek. When traveling Big Creek toward the dam, high-speed boaters should stay as close as possible to the center of the ski pattern as safety permits. Always pass an approaching powerboat on the right.

All boats being used on PML waters must be operated in a manner to minimize the size of the wake produced by the boat. With the exception of pontoon boats and those boats traveling less than 5 mph, all powerboat operators shall operate at planning speeds as soon as practical when in the ski pattern.

Wake Enhancement: The use of devices, equipment, or placement of passengers on boats for the purpose of creating an enlarged wake is prohibited. Further, no such devices or equipment may be used on any boat in PML. Such devices and equipment include, but are not limited to; exterior panels or wings deployed underwater; rubberized, plastic or metal tanks or bags filled with any material; crowding of passengers to the rear; insidethe-hull water tanks or boat hulls designed specifically to enhance the wake. Additionally, the operator of an outboard or I/O drive boat must keep the out-drive down to optimally trim the boat to minimize the size of the boat's wake at all times.

Any boat that produces excessive wakes may be cited. Two citations result in eviction from the lake for the remainder of the calendar year. Staging area for skiers is the White SKI BUOY outside the Marina. No other area! There is a voluntary drop area outside the 5 mph buoys at Fisherman's Cove. See Marina Store and Good Neighbor Rules for details.

Ski course is marked with red buoys. Stay inside of the red buoys. These buoys are not a SLALOM COURSE.

Ski boats must have a red or orange flag and an observer at least 12 years of age.

Ski boats returning to a fallen skier must make a starboard (right) turn to return to the skier while raising the red or orange warning flag. The boat operator shall make the 'turn-around' at a slow speed to minimize the wake. Obviously, safety is a concern, but anything a boat operator can do to minimize wake size is required.

The driver of any boat approaching a boat displaying a red or orange flag must acknowledge the downed skier's presence by raising their hand for the skier's towboat to see and take appropriate evasive action to ensure the safety of the downed skier.

Skier must raise one (1) ski (or wakeboard or kneeboard) when in water with slack towline to warn other boats in the area.

All skiers must wear proper Coast Guard approved life preservers.

Number of water skiers per boat: 2 maximum at a time. When one skier drops, the second skier must drop immediately.

Use of wakeboards, kneeboards, discs, inner tubes, surfboards, water toys and non-approved devices are prohibited. Water skis, kneeboards and wakeboards are the only devices permitted to be used in the high-speed boating lane. The Boat Patrol and Marina Staff have the final authority to decide what is a water ski and what is a non-approved device.

An area for beginning water ski instruction is available. Contact the Boat Patrol Officer or Marina Manager for details.

Water skiing may be limited on certain days such as, but not limited to holidays, fishing derbies and sailing regatta days.

KNOW OUR RULES AND ABIDE BY THEM FOR YOUR ENJOYMENT AND SAFETY.

FISHING RULES

A California State Fishing License is required and is to be displayed at all times while fishing. Fish limits are governed by California Fish & Game laws. NO LIVE BAIT is permitted other than worms.

Fishing off water taxi docks during water taxi operating hours is prohibited. Trespassing on private property is not allowed.

No fishing within 25 feet of designated swim areas.

SAILING RULES

Sailing Hours: Anytime

SAILBOAT LAUNCHING is allowed only at the Marina boat ramp.

Sailboats and all others must stay out of the skiing area during skiing hours.

The high-speed boating lane is outlined with red buoys. Stay out of this area while high-speed boating is in progress. Be aware of high-speed boating hours for your own protection. Avoid the east end of the lake (Lake Lodge and Big Creek entrance) during high-speed boating hours.

Sailing of rental boats in Big Creek is not allowed.

No windsurf boards without a sail are allowed on the lake.

PARKING, BEACH & SWIMMING RULES

SWIM AT YOUR OWN RISK. NO LIFEGUARDS ARE ON DUTY.

Follow all posted beach and marina rules and regulations. <u>Note:</u> The beaches and lawns are designated non-smoking areas.

Swimming is only allowed within the designated swim areas.

No float tubes, surfboards, "noodles", lounge rafts, etc., are allowed on the lake other than within 30 feet from your own private dock. (Tubes, noodles and "soft" float toys are allowed in the swim areas.)

Inflatable boats, canoes and kayaks that are used on Pine Mountain Lake must be registered in the same manner as hard-bottom boats.

Do not venture more than 30 feet from your own private dock. DO NOT swim across or in the open lake area.

No glass containers, loud music, hardballs, profane language *are allowed on any Pine Mountain Lake beach area.* Drinking of alcoholic beverages by anyone under the age of 21 *is not* allowed on any Pine Mountain Lake beach area.

Bicycles and skateboards must be walked through all amenity-parking areas. No riding is permitted.

Dogs are prohibited from the entire PML Marina, Dunn Court, and Lake Lodge amenities; except authorized PML utility dogs in the performance of their duties or-service animals assisting the blind or deaf. <u>Dogs should not be left</u> in cars parked in these areas.

If the marina parking lot is full, please park at Dunn court, the Lake Lodge, or Fisherman's Cove and ride the water taxi to the Marina. Water taxi operating schedule is available upon request.

FAILURE TO COMPLY MAY RESULT IN FINES OR LOSS OF LAKE PRIVILEGES.

Additional rules and regulations may apply. Rules are subject to change without notice.

ONLY property owners and PMLA employees on duty will be allowed to park at the Marina parking area on weekends and holidays from Memorial Day Weekend through Labor Day Weekend. Property owners will be required to provide a valid parking sticker or hang tag.

INVASIVE, EXOTIC, NON-NATIVE SPECIES?

cientists can't agree on what to call them; invasive species, aquatic exotics, non-natives, aquatic hitchhikers, weeds... and the list goes on. Perhaps the most fitting name is nuisance aquatic species. That takes into account species that come from other places as well as those that, all of a sudden, grow to nuisance levels because of changing conditions. Whatever you call them, we all need to work together to prevent their spread or reduce their impacts.

In my (almost) two years of studying your lake, I've been pleasantly surprised that most of the plants and animals (resident geese excepted) that I have identified fall far short of nuisance status. In fact, from a strictly biological or ecological perspective, they provide wide ranging benefits that include; food, habitat, shelter for juvenile fishes and shoreline stability. Perhaps the most important benefit that plants provide is that they help keep the water in your lake clear. The tules, reeds, rushes and other large plants (macrophytes) that you see, absorb large amounts of nutrients from the water and soil. Without them, the nutrients would be available to fuel the growth of the plants that you don't see (algae or phytoplankton). It's common knowledge amongst lake scientists (limnologists) that if you take away the large plants, you will likely see a significant increase in algae that can quickly turn a lake into a gooey green mess.

However, when those same plants interfere with the view off of your deck, get wrapped around your propeller, or make swimming unsafe, I'm afraid that to most folks they just become "weeds".

NOTICE

That's where proper lake management must provide a balanced solution. The soon to arrive aquatic "weed" harvester will be one of the tools that provide that balanced approach. Chemical treatment is another tool that is sometimes necessary. The long awaited dredge project might also provide some relief. But, if you consider what grows first on a bare patch of ground (weeds), the same thing can happen in an aquatic environment after sediment disturbance. And that is why IT IS SO DARN IMPORTANT not to introduce anything into your lake that doesn't belong there.

The seemingly harmless release of a pet fish can introduce plants that can clog a lake in no time. Likewise, an "unclean" boat that has been operated in infested waters (particularly the Delta) can bring with it some pretty nasty critters. And one of the most alarming calls I've had concerning your lake was from a property owner who thought they saw water-hyacinth in a pond near the lake. That's one of the fastest growing aquatic plants on the planet. I can't imagine what the coves would look like if it did find its way into your lake.

I could go on and on about plants but threats from the Animal Kingdom can also have serious consequences in the aquatic environment. In the interest of keeping this short, I won't go into the biology and seriousness of the threat posed by Quagga & Zebra Mussels and the New Zealand Mudsnail, but let me tell you, they are on your doorstep. Just recently a houseboat that was being prepared for launch at New Melones was discovered to be infested with Quagga Mussels. They were discovered by a specially trained K9 that can "sniff" them out

The upside of all this doom and gloom is that your Association is taking a very proactive approach to prevent the spread of nuisance species into Pine Mountain Lake. Agencies such as Fish and Game, the Forest Service, local water agencies, numerous nonprofits, Friends groups and special interest groups are all stepping up to the plate. Check out the Quagga links on the PML Homepage or the Protect Your Waters and 100th Meridian links on the Waterski and Wakeboard Club webpage. Also, check out the Friends of the Lake webpage for the latest lake conditions. The word is getting out and people care. With your help we will keep Pine Mountain Lake a healthy, thriving and enjoyable aquatic experience well into the future.



Shades of Green By Alan Macdonald, Golf Course Superintendent

huge Thank you to the 'Golf Doctor', Mr. Tony Murphy for his very generous contribution that allowed us to purchase 12 Coastal Redwood trees for the golf course. We also used his experience as a player to assist in the placing of the trees that were planted on holes #10 and #18. It is the desire of both the golf professionals and golf maintenance to have each hole play the way they were designed to be played by the architect. These trees have been planted in areas to protect them against the oaks failing in the future. As an example, the right side of #10 has seen major limb loss over the years to the oaks that line the right side of the hole. This past winter was a good example of how vulnerable our older oaks are and the need to protect each holes integrity as designed. It is not our desire to make the course any more difficult.

Other donations received were from Ron & Judy Maguire, Bob Bangs in memory of his wife Marilyn, John and Shirley Vaughn, Rick Whybra, John Case

and the Motherlode Invitational Committee. I would like to thank these folks and I know future generations of golfers would also like to thank them or occasionally under their breath say a bad word or two as the trees mature and have an influence as how the hole plays.

Other projects that are going on is aerating the entire course prior to greens aeration on April 21st & 22nd. We have also continued with some in-house tree trimming and the services of a professional tree arborist to maintain our most important oaks. In March the arborist did maintenance on holes #18 and #2. When using the services of the arborist, we take into consideration the trees health and overall appearance along with the need to remove lower limbs for proper irrigation coverage for better turf health.

We have received our 2008 equipment purchases that included a larger capacity topdresser to assist in our fairway topdressing program. Also included is a new rough mower and a turf truck that replaced a 1990 turf vehicle.

Golf Rules Quiz

Q #1. Several holes into a match you discover that you have left your three wood at the driving range. Can you replace the club after you have started the round?

A. #1 Yes. Rule 4-4 states that as long as you started the round with fewer than 14 clubs you can add clubs to your bag during the round to bring your total to 14. CAVEAT: You may not add a club that has been selected for play by anybody else playing on the course, so don't borrow it from your playing partner.

Q# 2 Addressing a putt in the wind. The wind is howling. You take your stance and ground your club on the green but the wind moves the ball away from its original position. What is the ruling?

A. #2 Rule 18 says that if a ball moves after you have addressed it, you must replace it and take a one stroke penalty. But if you let the club hover behind the ball and don't ground your club as you take your stance, you have not "addressed" the ball. If the ball does move because of the wind and you have not grounded your club, you must play it from where it comes to rest or incur a two stroke penalty in stroke play and loss of hole in match play.

JOE SMITH'S LAWS OF GOLF

- 1. When you look up, causing an awful shot, you will always look down again at exactly the moment when you ought to start watching the ball if you ever want to see it again.
- 2. Any change works for a maximum of three holes--or a minimum of not at all.
- 3. A golf match is a test of your skill against your opponent's luck.

And finally, here is one from Joyce Smith (Joe's wife):



Fire Abatement

We have a Project Plan, contractor bids, and are ready to start work.

By the time you read this, our work to reduce the threat of wildfire in our greenbelts has actually started...on the ground! But first a little background information to fill you in on what's been going on since I last wrote you.

Our Fire Abatement Team (yes, we're called the FAT) has been working with our forest consultant to finish writing a plan called the "Pine Mountain Lake Jump Start Vegetative Treatment Plan". We call it "Jump Start" because it's a plan to aggressively reduce fuel loads in our greenbelt areas now, in a way that allows our maintenance department to simply maintain each area in the following years.

The plan calls for a contractor to bring in a brush masticator to grind up the unwanted trees and brush in the most cost effective way and in a short amount of time. Then hand crews will tidy up the trees near homeowner's property for a nice look as well as work the areas along streambeds where we will not use heavy equipment that could pose an environmental threat. Our consultant has identified all environmental cautions as well as pre-historic and historic sites that need protection. And we've obtained all permissions necessary to start work.

We've also put out Requests for Bids, received and reviewed bids, and selected a contractor.

Where Will You See Equipment Working?

Because we have pretty good protection on the north side from the Pine Mountain Lake Shaded Fuel Break, several forest professionals recommended that for our first year we target a greenbelt on the south side of the subdivision. So we've chosen a large greenbelt area identified as TA-3. This area has Garrotte Creek running down the center. Property owners to the west are in Unit 8 on Hillcrest Circle, Butler Way and Jonny Degnan Court. Property owners to the east are in Unit 13 on Breckenridge Road and Blue Bell Court.

Another greenbelt we've target for this year is a portion of TA-5 near the dam. Some work has been done here in the past with CDC crews so it made sense to attack

LAKE USE SURVEY RESULTS

In this month's article, the Waterski and Wakeboard Club would like to provide an overview of the results of its survey on Lake Usage. The club undertook this survey to clarify the perceptions of lake users regarding fast boating, wakes, and their impact on other activities on the lake. The club felt that gathering people's opinions on the issues raised as a reason to change the Lake Rules was the only way to gain a common understanding of the magnitude of the problem.

Survey Approach

The club elected to target all lakefront homeowners and additionally any homeowners who had registered a boat on PML in 2006 with a direct mailing of the survey. This totaled 545 homeowners. We chose to target this subset of the association because the lakeside homeowners are directly impacted by activities on the lake and those who registered boats were the most likely to be regular users of the lake and the best able to evaluate the situation on the water.

Summary Results

Of the 545 homeowners targeted, 226 or 42% had responded during the first three

adjacent areas north of Big Creek.

What Happens Next?


The FAT will monitor the work of the contractor while we begin to write a Project Plan for 2009, year two of the 5 year Jump Start Plan. We'll target new greenbelt areas to attack and develop a budget proposal for the Board of Directors to consider continuation of funding.

We'll also be writing a Greenbelt Annual Maintenance Plan for the PML Maintenance department to use when planning yearly maintenance work for our greenbelts.

weeks of the survey. We received an additional 34 surveys from targeted homeowners who owned multiple properties or other homeowners who became aware of the survey for a total of 260 responses. The responses to date represent over 7% of the entire association, 44% of all lakefront properties, 52% of all pontoon boats registered in '06, 55% of all power boats registered in '06, 45% of all sailboats registered in '06, 40% of all fishing/row boats registered in '06, and 54% of kayaks, canoes, other.

Of the respondents, 24% were full time residents, 73% were part time residents, and 3% represented rental property owners. 61% of the part time residents said that they spend most of the summer or several full weeks and weekends at the lake. 55% of all respondents said they get out on the lake daily for at least an hour when they are at PML, and another 39% say they get out every couple of days for an hour or so. The respondents spend a lot of time at PML and spend a lot of time on the water and should be a very credible group when it comes to lake related issues!

From the standpoint of their favorite activities on the lake, we asked survey participants to identify their top 3 activities while on the lake. 60% listed Pleasure Cruising, 47% listed Fishing, 44% listed Canoe/Kayaking, 29% listed Wakeboarding, 30% listed Skiing which had about a 15% overlap with wakeboarding, so about 45% listed fast boat activities, and 17% listed Sailing. As you can see, most people enjoy multiple boating activities on the lake.

We then asked a series of questions about fast boating and wakes. To the question of "Do you believe that the association should continue to allow fast boating?" 77% answered yes, 23% answered no, a strong endorsement for continuing to allow fast boating on PML.

We then asked several questions about the impact of wakes. To the question "Do you believe you are unable to utilize the main part of the lake the way you would like to during ski hours because of large or excessive wakes?" 60% said it has "no impact on their usage", 20% selected "occasionally when it's busy", and 20% said it impacted them "all the time". As you'd suspect, folks that would like to see fast boating eliminated made up 77% of the people who said wakes were a problem all the time.

We then asked, "How often are wakes a significant problem for other boats or swimmers using the lake during ski hours?" 61% responded that they are not a problem or rarely a problem for others using the lake during fast boat hours. 26% indicated that wakes are always a problem or quite often a problem for others using the lake. The remaining 13% indicated that wakes were sometimes a problem. 34 of survey respondents see wakes as being an occasional problem, at worst, when the lake is busy.

We asked the question, "Do you believe

that eliminating knee and wakeboarding will address problems that may exist with large wakes?" 67% said no, with many comments emphasizing that it's not what's being towed that creates wakes. There were only 27 of 196 homeowners who support fast boating on the lake that thought that eliminating wakeboarding would help address wake issues. Most respondents that thought eliminating wakeboarding would help address wake issues showed by their comments that they were unaware of the restrictions already in place at PML regarding wake enhancing devices and other boat operation activities that increase wakes.

On the questions of hours, there was very strong support for contiguous hours for fast boating in the evening and limited interest for slow boat hours for dinner cruises.

70% of respondents thought that "forming a Lake Use committee to examine the issues and recommend solutions would be productive in bringing a common understanding of the issues and a better long term solution to the health and Equitable Use of our lake?"

60% of respondents "believe that further limiting access to skiing and wakeboarding will lessen the attractiveness of PML and reduce property values?"

Summary

The WWC believes that these results fairly reflect the views of the majority of lake users. For example, in order to swing the survey back to even a neutral position on most questions, it would take all of the remaining 100 lakefront homeowners taking the most negative positions on the survey relative to wakes and wakeboarding. We have also tracked response rates from users who paid the ski fee in '06 and '07 and homeowners who signed the petition last fall to revoke the current lake rules. Only 67% of the users who paid the ski fee have completed the survey to date and only 85 of the 200+ boaters who signed the petition to revoke the current lake rules last fall have filled out the survey so we know there is still a sizeable number of regular lake users who support power boating that have not been incorporated into the survey. With the current number of responses, there is very little support for the arguments used to eliminate wakeboarding. The results also beg the question of will the minority of homeowners who would like to eliminate fast boating ever be happy as long as there is any fast boating on PML.

Based on these results, the WWC has asked that the Board rethink their perception of the problems on the lake and consider other approaches to wake abatement. The WWC included a couple of ideas in our suggested changes to the rules in the March Board meeting and is interested in discussing other ideas that could have merit.

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

Groveland Highlanders 4-H Club is building a coop for them.



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CALIFORNIA SALES IMPROVE TO PRE-CREDIT CRUNCH LEVELS

the California housing market continued to reel from the joint effects of tighter underwriting standards, the ongoing credit or liquidity crunch, and a softening economy. However, home sales have improved in recent months and are now within range of pre-credit crunch levels. Sales of existing detached single family homes exceeded 300,000 for the second month in a row with seasonally adjusted and annualized sales of 343,220 homes in February. Sales rose 9.5 percent compared to January when 313,580 homes were sold, but declined steeply from 480,170 sales in February 2007, equivalent to a 28.5 percent year-to-year decrease.

Sales have now increased four months in a row from a low point of 265,030 sales in October of last year, and are just shy of sales in the 350,000-range that prevailed in the summer of 2007 just before the credit crunch drove sales down. Based on C.A.R. research, the background or 'baseline' amount of activity that occurs regardless of whether the market is in a slow or active mode is thought to be roughly 350,000 sales, given the state's demographics and stock of homes. During the worst of the credit crunch, activity fell below that range because of difficulty in securing funding for loans among buyers who otherwise could and would buy a home at this time. As time has passed, adjustments by both borrowers and lenders have enabled the market to move forward at a somewhat improved pace.

The median price, however, continued to decline by record margins in February. The median price in California was \$409,240, down 4.8 percent from the

January median of \$429,790 and down by a record-setting 26.2 percent from the February 2007 median price of \$554,280. The median price in February was 31.5 percent below the record median of \$597,640 that was set in April of last year. The statewide median was last in the low \$400,000 range during late 2003 and early 2004.

The credit crunch, tighter underwriting standards, and significantly higher jumbo loan rates all contributed to a steep decrease in sales of homes above \$500,000 as a share of the statewide market. This affected the mix of statewide sales and gave rise to the record-setting 26.2 percent decrease in the median. -- By comparison, the average year-to-year change in median prices across the regions of California was a somewhat smaller 19.8 percent decline in February.

Even if monthly sales for the state have shown improvement in recent months, sales for all of 2008 are still expected to decrease 6 percent annually compared to 2007. Moreover, home prices face stiff headwinds because of the large number of distressed sales that are expected throughout the year. On the bright side, lower prices and mortgage rates help affordability, while higher loan limits in 2008 should provide some welcome relief from the credit crunch.







Spring Prescribed Fire Program to Begin in Yosemite National Park

The National Park Service announced plans today to conduct a prescribed fire in the Wawona area of Yosemite National Park. This burn is scheduled to begin April 9, 2008, and to continue for approximately two weeks, weather and air quality conditions permitting. The total area of the burn is about 2000 acres. The fire unit is composed of grass, brush, Ponderosa pine and other mixed conifers.

The prime benefit of this prescribed fire is to ensure defensible space for the community of Wawona. Fire managers will utilize the area burned in last fall's Jack Fire, areas which were recently thinned, and previously burned areas as natural barriers. These recent

treatments will increase the margin of safety for firefighters by reducing fire intensity along the current project's boundary.

Prescribed fire is designed to thin forests and reduce the accumulation of unnatural fuel loads, composed of dead and down trees and other vegetative forest litter. The prescribed fire will create a mosaic of diverse habitats for plants and animals and will help recycle nutrients, aiding in the sprouting and re-growth of plants, shrubs, and trees.

This project is the first of several spring prescribed burns in the park.

Other projects are planned for areas around El Portal, Foresta, and the Hodgdon Meadow area.



Family Wellness Faire... A Successful Community Event By Bonnie Phillips

Yosemite National Park will also celebrate Earth Day Weekend (April 19-22) with a variety of stewardship and educational activities intended to



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ith summer beginning, it is time to turn our thoughts to lighter fare such as seafood. Our recipe calls for shrimp which are an excellent source of selenium, unusually low-fat, low-calorie protein, a very good source of vitamin D, vitamin B12 and a rich source of omega-3 fatty acids. The cardiovascular benefits of these nutrients are many: shrimp have an anti-inflammatory effect, prevent the forcells (protecting against fatal abnormal heart rhythms) and are a good source of the essential fats which lower blood pressure. So, enjoy trying this easy to make but quite delicious heart lovin' meal.

Pan-Seared Basil Shrimp with Multigrain Pasta (serves 4)

8 oz. dried multigrain spaghetti 1 tablespoon plus 1 1/2 teaspoons olive

1 tablespoon plus 1 teaspoon dried organo, crumbled

5 large garlic cloves, minced

1 lb. raw jumbo shrimp in shells, peeled, or 12 oz. without shells (21- 25 shrimp)

2 14.5 oz. cans no-salt-added diced tomatoes, undrained

3/4 cup chopped fresh basil leaves (about 1 oz.)

1/4 cup dry white wine (regular or nonalcoholic)

1 teaspoon sugar

1/4 teaspoon salt

1 tablespoon plus 1 teaspoon grated or shredded Parmesan cheese

1 medium lemon, quartered

Prepare the spaghetti according to package directions, omitting the salt and oil. Drain well in a colander and transfer to a serving bowl.

Meanwhile, heat a large nonstick skillet over medium-high heat. Pour the

oil into the skillet and swirl to coat the bottom. Once oil is hot, stir in oregano and garlic and cook for 30 seconds, or until garlic begins to release its fragrance, stirring constantly. Reduce heat to medium.

Stir in the shrimp. Cook for 5 minutes until shrimp are opaque in the center, stirring often. Stir in the undrained tomatoes, basil, wine, sugar and salt. Simmer for 1 minute. Spoon over the spaghetti. Sprinkle with the Parmesan and garnish with the lemon wedges.

Chicken Parmesan

Chicken Parmesan (Pollo alla parmigiana)

Recipe by Tom Knoth and Paula Martell

1 clove garlic, minced

1 stick unsalted butter (1/2 cup or 1/4 pound), melted

1 cup dried bread crumbs

1/3 cup fresh Parmigiano Reggiano cheese, grated

2 Tbsp chopped fresh parsley

1/4 teaspoon salt

1/4 teaspoon garlic salt

A large pinch of Italian seasoning (herb mix)

1/8 teaspoon ground black pepper 2 lbs of skinless, boneless, chicken

- meat, cut into pieces no larger than 2x2 inches
 - 1) Preheat oven to 450°F.
- 2) In a bowl, combine the minced garlic with the melted butter. In another bowl mix together the bread crumbs, Parmesan, parsley, salt, garlic salt, Italian seasoning, and pepper. Dip chicken pieces into garlic butter, then into crumb mixture to coat.

3) Place coated chicken pieces on to a 9x13 baking dish. Try to leave a little room between each piece. Drizzle with remaining garlic butter and bake uncovered 15 minutes, or until chicken is cooked through and juices run clear. Note that the chicken will get much more browned on the bottom side than on the top.

4) Top with Marinara and cheese per following directions:

Marinara & Cheese Topping 2 cups marinara sauce

1 tsp crushed red pepper

1-1/2 tsp Italian seasoning

1/8 tsp garlic powder

3 balls Cantare fresh mozzarella, sliced 1/4" thick

1/4 cup Parmigiano Reggiano cheese, grated

1/4 cup Romano cheese

Turn oven temp down to 350 degrees. Combine marinara, pepper, Italian seasoning, and garlic powder in mixing bowl. Slice mozzarella; combine grated Parmigiano Reggiano and Romano together. Spread 1/3rd of marinara mixture over cooked

Parmesean chicken, then layer sliced mozzarella, followed by another 3rd of the marinara sauce. Sprinkle Parmigiano/Romano blend, and then remaining 3rd of marinara mixture. Place back in oven uncovered for another 10 minutes or until cheese is melted.

Serves 4-6

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Star Trails

hooting photographs of Star Trails is a task that can be easily tackled by anyone with a camera that can take long exposures and a tripod. When photographing stars, you can either get a star "field," a static snapshot of the stars as points of light, or star "trails," where the stars' movements streak across the sky. How long you expose the image and whether or not you track the movement of the sky determines which you get.

The Earth rotates around its poles (north and south) making one revolution each day - approximately 24 hours. This rotation can be seen by noting the change in position of celestial objects in the sky. Most notably during the day is our sun and in the night is our moon. The stars and other celestial objects move across the sky in much the same way as the sun and moon. Pick a familiar constellation or group of stars in the sky, like the big dipper, and notice how it moves across the night time sky.

For people in the northern hemisphere, that would include the residents of Groveland, there is one point in the sky that doesn't appear to move. It doesn't appear to move because this is the North Celestial Pole, the point in the sky around which all the stars seen from the Northern Hemisphere rotate. The North Star, also called Polaris, is located almost exactly at this point in the sky. If you go out at night and find the North Star you will notice that it doesn't move during the course of the night, while all the other stars do move, they rotate counter-clockwise around the north star (from east to west - think about the sun rising in the east and setting in the west). It's similar to spinning a basketball at the end of your finger; the point where your finger contacts the basketball is almost stationary as the rest of the ball rotates around it. The most common Star Trail photographs are taken pointed at the North Celestial Pole because the star movement is so dramatic.

With typical camera lens focal lengths (think amount of zoom), you will begin to see star movement with about 30 seconds of exposure time. This movement is very slow, like the motion of the hour hand on an analog clock, but it is easily captured by the open shutter of a camera. Most of the astrophotographs that I've shared these past months used a telescope mount that tracked the movement of the sky to prevent star movement.

You will need a camera capable of taking a long exposure. This requires setting the shooting mode to "manual" or "bulb" and using a cable release or some other form of timer to control how long the camera shutter is open. Simply mount your camera on a sturdy tripod, point it towards the North Star, and start with an exposure 2 to 5 minutes long. I've found that taking many 5 to

10 minute exposures, then stacking them on top of each other with software is the easiest way to create a very long exposure of Star Trails. Most people who get started with photographing Star Trails want to capture the longest trails they can by keeping the shutter open longer. The problem with this is the ambient light in the sky. This light may come from nearby cities, your neighbor's lights, or even the moonlit sky. What your eye sees is nothing compared to a long exposure of a camera. So keep in mind that you'll want dark skies.

Here are a couple of things to think about:

- Power. Long exposures can eat up the batteries on your digital camera so you should use fresh batteries or an AC power source if one is available.
- Focus. Most cameras can't focus well on objects as dim as a star. You may need to manually focus your camera. Try focusing on distant objects, like the top of a tree far away, during the day and note where the focus point is on your lens. Sometimes, if there is a bright object in the sky like the planet Jupiter, your camera will be able to focus automatically. Bottom line don't underestimate the challenge of focusing your camera at night.
- Dew. A common problem with night photography is dew fogging the glass. One way to deal with this is to use a dew shield or devise a method to keep the lens slightly warmer than the ambient air.

Taken in the evening of May 30, 2005 and the early morning hours of May 31, 2005 – this photograph contains about 4 hours of 15 minute exposures at 400 ISO. I used a Canon Digital Rebel with an 18 - 55mm lens set at 18 mm. The camera was set up on a tripod on my back

patio in Pine Mountain Lake. Our house is on the 2nd fairway, the trees from the backyard are easily visible at the bottom of the photograph. At the center of the image is the North Star – the point around which the other stars are rotating. Many of the brighter star trails are from the brightest stars in the Big Dipper.

He still ropes and hauls around on cow ponies, though after trying to sleep curled under saddle blankets, he's become quite a Land Rover aficionado. Jack fixes, steers, and accolades long-distance trucks. "I've never seen a truck driver who looked as good as his truck." He's a sailor, meaning the gaff and square rigged type old boats, not these plastic jobs. On his first trip to Hawaii he piloted a nuclear submarine a good part of the way from Lahaina to Pearl Harbor, even bounced some yodels through that metal hull. His indomitable knowledge of the names and uses of every square inch on a sailing ship or truck can be exhausting even before you learn he pilots airplanes too. "Cowboy poets...call him up and quote 'cowboy rap' over the phone."

You're not likely to find Jack by looking for him. He's nowhere for long and

> everyone's got different stories along the lines of "When last I saw him..." If he happens to run across you, don't expect to have something to say. Don't expect to talk. Listen as a warm thick ale of a story, which will travel forward only circularly in a jigsaw logic, pours out as easily as breathing through Jack's whiskey voice.

In short, Jack is a "one of a kind character". He has a rare kinship with everything that is Cowboy & American Folk Music. Don't miss him on Saturday night, May 17th.

Groveland Fire Department Firefighter Lance Doyle

his month our Featured Firefighter is the newest addition to our staff. Lance Doyle is a Firefighter and EMT who is trained in structural, wildland, and aircraft fire suppression, auto extrication, basic life support, emergency medicine, low angle rope rescue, swiftwater rescue, confined space rescue, fire prevention and education.

Doyle's route to becoming a firefighter, although not the traditional one, show-cases his commitment to setting goals and working hard to achieve those goals. After receiving a Master's Degree in Business Administration and working in the business arena Doyle found his job to be high in pressure and low in fulfillment.

He then started pursuing the rigorous training needed to become a firefighter. Being an outdoor person who was physically active made it possible for him to train for and pass the demanding physical testing.

In 2005 he received his certification and began to volunteer as a Firefighter and EMT. When he was able to move his family to the Sierra foothills, he decided to pursue firefighting as a full time occupation.

When asked what advice he would

give to someone who wanted to become a firefighter Doyle replied: "Do something every day to make yourself ready to meet your goal. Take a class, read a book, work on your skills." Doyle is great example of pushing hard both mentally and physically to pursue an objective and we at the Groveland Fire Department are fortunate to add this hard worker to our team.



Groveland Fire Department Applicant Requirements

A person applying for a position of a full time firefighter with the Groveland Fire Department must meet the following requirements:

Each candidate must be a Fire Academy graduate with Firefighter 1 Certification. This certification process involves a minimum of 250 hours of training. In addition, each applicant must be a certified EMT (Emergency Medical Technician). The EMT certification requires 130 hours of training.

In order to test physical capabilities, all candidates must have successfully completed the CPAT (Candidate Physical Ability Test). As described on their website the CPAT is "a standard-

ized, timed, pass/fail test designed to identify individuals who possess the physical abilities to effectively and safely perform the duties of a fire fighter. It consists of eight separate jobrelated events that are performed in a continuous sequence. The eight events are: Stair Climb, Hose Drag, Equipment Carry, Ladder Raise and Extension, Forcible Entry, Search, Rescue Drag, and Ceiling Breach and Pull. During the entire testing process, candidates wear a 50-pound vest to simulate the weight of firefighter personal protective equipment (PPE) and a self-contained breathing apparatus (SCBA), with an additional 12.5 pounds on each shoulder during the Stair Climb to

simulate the weight of a high-rise pack (hose bundle). To pass the CPAT, candidates must correctly complete all eight events in 10 minutes and 20 seconds or less."

Along with passing the rigorous CPAT and completing Firefighter 1 and EMT 1 certifications, a potential candidate must go through a written test, a panel interview, a chief's interview and a background check. Becoming a Firefighter is obviously not possible for everyone and we are fortunate at the Groveland Fire Department to have such a highly qualified and trained staff on call to meet the needs of the unique terrain and population that makes up our community.

DID YOU KNOW?

Age-Related Changes In The Sensory Organs

The information here is generalized and will vary from individual to individual, influenced by lifestyle, genetics and the presence of chronic conditions. However, it offers a valuable platform to caregivers and others in understanding and identifying issues that can come with aging.

Vision: The changes in vision can be troublesome and in some cases debilitating.

- 1. The most common and familiar change in vision is difficulty seeing objects closer than two feet.
- 2. Seeing in dim light becomes challenging as the eye's lens becomes denser and decreases the amount of light that can enter the eye. In addition, the cells in the retina that sense light become less sensitive. This means that someone over the age of 60 needs three times more light to read than someone 20.
- 3. Reacting to changes in light are also more difficult because the pupil reacts more slowly and the muscles that widen and narrow the pupil weaken.
- 4. Changes in ability to see colors often goes unnoticed. However, as the eye ages, the lens tends to yellow. This affects how the color spectrum is perceived. For example, blues tend to appear more grey.

This means that there can be difficulty reading black print on blue background, or reading blue letters.

5. The ability to see shades, tones and fine detail decreases with age, possibly because the number of nerve cells between the eye and the brain decreases. This affects depth perception and the ability to judge distance.

Hearing: The changes in hearing can be troublesome and can cause difficulties and misunderstandings in communication.

1. Age often carries a loss in ability to hear high pitched sounds, specifically the voices of women and children. Those affected may believe that others are mumbling. This type of hearing loss actually affects the ability to hear consonants, while vowels are not impaired. 2. Earwax accumulation increases with age and can affect hearing. Regular earwax removal is recommended. 3. Other age-related changes to the ears can affect balance.

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Clinics and Construction-silver Anniversary Mexico, March 28-29, 2008

his year marks the 25th year of a humanitarian project south of the border by local service club members, spouses and friends. On March 28th, thirty seven volunteers joined their hosts, The Calafia Rotary Club of Mexicali members, to perform five medical clinics and to rebuild and refurbish the Progreso School fifteen miles southwest of Mexicali. Dr. Tom Mihok, OD, Oakdale Lions, and his team of thirteen volunteers, examined 140 patients and dispensed 70 pairs of glasses at the eye clinic. Groveland's Dr. Jose Bustos, assisted by university dental students, performed extractions, fillings, and application of 157 fluoride treatments in the mobile dental unit provided by the University. Dr. Ted Mihok, DPM, examined 80 patients and performed minor surgeries as needed in the foot clinic. The general medical examination clinic was staffed by Dr. Antonio Garcia, assisted by volunteers from the Calafia Rotarios. Dr. Nadia Rosales, MD, assisted by two medical volunteers from Alameda, performed female cancer screenings in a new mobile medical unit built by five Rotary clubs in the USA and the Calafia Rotary Club.

The non-medical portion of this mission included demolition work, rebuilding and refurbishing of an el-

ementary school by a team of eleven workers. A 20x20 storage building was built and the entire school was painted with 80 gallons of donated paint. Playground equipment was donated and installed at the Casa Hogar Emanuel Orphanage and clothes and toys were given to the children there. 115 computers and equipment and 35 cases of Spanish/English

books were donated to various schools. Medical equipment and supplies went to the local hospital, and ambulance equipment went to the San Felipe Red Cross and Baja Rescue.

Service clubs represented on this mission by volunteers and/or donations of money, goods and services, include Oakdale Lions, Alameda Breakfast Lions, Groveland Soroptimists, Groveland Kiwanis, and the Rotary Clubs of Groveland, Twain Harte, Oakdale Sunrise, Oakdale, Manteca, Riverbank, Calafia and the Calafia Interact Club. 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Japanese Master Potter Has Demonstration At Columbia College During West Coast Tour

ention of the name Yoshida among art circles in Tokyo receives instant recognition. For Yoshihiko Yoshida at 72 is a well-respected sensei for having achieved a distinguished level of mastery in his art form – that of pottery.

He studied with Arakawa Toyozo (1894-1985), a recipient of the Japanese government's Living National Art Treasure title. Yoshida established his own kiln in 1969, and his work is described by Robert Yellin, art reviewer of The Japan Times as "subdued, understated, refined, contemplative, graceful and honest."

Yellin goes on to say, "More than his sterling resume, though, it's his work that shines. It's not the kind of work that dazzles like a fireworks display and as quickly disappears. Quite the contrary: It seduces one's senses on a very subtle, wabi-sabi level that one will never grow tired of and will only cherish more as time passes, like a good friend."

Yoshida's workshop is located within a dense forest in the hills of Toki City, Gifu Prefecture. Toki is where Mino pottery was first made in 1573 by Kato Kagemitsu (1513-1585). Mino, which is actually the

geographical name of the old province, is used as a broad term for Shino, Oribe, Ki-Seto and Setoguro wares. Yoshida fires all of them, except Oribe.

Yoshida plans on visiting the West Coast this spring and has been invited to conduct demonstrations in the San Jose, San Francisco and Portland areas while in the U.S. In addition, he has agreed to hold a slide show and potter's wheel demonstration in the Sierra foothills at Columbia College on Tuesday, May 13 from 9:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. in the Dogwood Forum theatre. The college is located off Sawmill Flat Road in Sonora. Event sponsors are the Central Sierra Arts Council and Columbia College. The public is invited to attend at no charge. While limited food purchases can be made in the college's Manzanita Bookstore, attendees are also encouraged to bring their own lunches.

"It is really a rare opportunity to meet and observe an artist of the stature of Yoshihiko Yoshida," said Harry Nakamoto, a noted local ceramist and part-time art instructor at the college. "We are very fortunate to have Sonora as one of his stops during his West Coast visit."

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
