# PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE By Dennis Scott : Board President

By the time that you receive this issue of the PML News your Board of Directors will have approved our Association Budget for 2006. Association Management, Amenity Managers, and the Board have spent a considerable amount of time the past few months developing a budget that controls expenses as much as possible without having a negative impact on the service to the Property Owners. Within the next few weeks you will be receiving your copy of the Budget with the exact numbers and details.

We have several major projects included in the Budget for 2006. We included around \$100,000 to redo the Arbor at the entrance to the Association. As you may recall, the old one had to be taken down due to age and for safety reasons. We will be installing a new computer software system along with

some hardware, which also will cost us around \$100,000. Our current system is so old it no longer meets the needs of the Association. In addition, because of its age, the manufacturer no longer provides repair and support service. We will also be replacing the fences at the Equestrian Center. The old fences have become a safety issue. For many months we have been pointing out that we had hired a firm to analyze the condition of our lake and provide us with a report and their recommendations on action that we could take to properly maintain the lake. After reviewing their preliminary report we have decided to fund the project over the next three years rather than do a Special Assessment. Included in our 2006 Budget is \$180,000 for this project. There will be another \$180,000 in the 2007 Budget, with the remaining \$180,000 collected in 2008. The project

work should start the end of 2006 after all of the permits are received.

Because of the rising concern from Property Owners pertaining to the Sheriff support to our community, we have asked the County Supervisor representing our area, Mark Thornton, to attend the November Board Meeting to discuss this issue with the Property Owners. In addition, we have also asked him to try and get a representative from the Sheriffs office to attend as well. If this is something that is of concern to you, we strongly urge you to attend this meeting. The date of that meeting will be November 19.

In addition, also making a presentation at the November Board Meeting will be the company that completed the lake survey. Again, if you are interested in this item I encourage you to attend the meeting.

The preliminary financials for September show that we continue to run favorable to our budget for this year. With just three accounting months left we will make every effort maintain a positive variance to our 2005 Budget.

### **Tuolumne County Sheriff Deputy Cover**age and Safety Issues

There is a lot of controversy surrounding the service and coverage PMLA residents are receiving from the County Sheriff's Department. As a result, we have asked the Tuolumne County Sheriff, Dick Rogers, and County Supervisor, Mark Thornton, to meet with us at the November 19th Board Meeting. If you are concerned and interested in safety, crime and coverage in the PMLA community, please attend. The meeting starts at 9 a.m. at the Lake Lodge.

In an effort to support law enforcement, PMLA continues to offer a reward of \$1,000 for information leading to the arrest and conviction of persons responsible for vandalism and other crimes within the PMLA community.

If you see a crime in progress, please call 911 and report it immediately. If you are the victim of a crime, please call the County Sheriff and report the incident. If you witness something suspicious and you are unsure if it is a crime, call our Department of Safety at (209) 962-8615 and report it so we can follow up. Help PMLA and your neighbors stay safe.

### **Main Gate Arbor Removal & Replacement**

As you know, the Main Gate Arbor structure became a safety issue and was removed recently. Funding for this project is in the 2006 Budget.

Please look for the Main Gate Entrance design contest in the January issue of the PML News. Every member will have the opportunity to comment and give their opinion as to the design of this project and we will keep you informed on the PML Voice website, the PML Official website, PML News and at Board meetings.

### **Lake Lodge Deck Replacement**

We are currently replacing the deck and some other areas that require maintenance at the Lake Lodge. This project was funded in this year's budget and is scheduled for replacement before the end of the year. Some of the inside work was put on hold until the start of this project. This work will be finished within the same time frame as the deck. We are asking members and the organized groups to please be patient while we perform this necessary replacement and maintenance. If you have a function scheduled in the Lake Lodge during this construction, please contact the Administration Office if you have any questions.

### **Country Club**

The California Department of Fish and Game and the Department of Waterways Division of Dam Safety were notified as usual. ### **Against Lot Development**

esponding to the "President's Message" in the September issue of PML News, I am completely AGAINST development of Units 14 & 16 into additional PML lots for these reasons:

- 1) The beaches at the lake have gotten to the point of being maxed out during summer. On Holiday weekends, they are so terribly packed with people and vehicles that they have become a place to avoid rather than enjoy. The grass areas are covered from end to end with people, and don't even think about getting a parking space unless you're willing to wait.
- 2) If Long Gulch Ranch goes through and if they are allowed to use our beach facilities (which I hope they are not), our existing problems will be worsened. In addition, at a conservative estimate of 2 vehicles per residential unit, Ferretti Rd will see an increase of 744 vehicles from Long Gulch Ranch alone. We certainly don't need any additional traffic, noise, pollution, or safety hazard of hundreds or even thousands more vehicles on that or any other road.
- 3) My experience attests that despite claims to the contrary, increased growth will NOT keep assessment costs down, but rather spending will INCREASE, and in fact costs will go UP as more demands are made

on the community and the costs associated to maintain those increased demands.

4) By only allowing the EXISTING vacant lots in PML to be developed, there will be sufficient population and demands on our community.

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

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
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

he PMLA Fire Safety Department will continue the effort this fall and winter inspecting lots and notifying property owners of necessary clearing. There are still a number of lots that require fire safety maintenance. Thinning out vegetation, debris piles, trimming trees and removal of dead limbs, downed trees and brush are a must in preventing fires. If your lot needs attention, take action during the burn season. Tree limbs, leaves, needles and grass may be taken to the PMLA compost area (7) days a week from 7 a.m. to 3 p.m. weather permitting. No plastics, construction debris or other "non natural" materials may be deposited.

For emergency and quick identification, all members are required to post the Unit/Lot and address number on their property and the sign must be visible from the street

Remember, all lots must be fire safety compliant by June 15th of each year. Please help keep PMLA fire safe by doing your part.

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### Hurricane Katrina Hits Groveland

n August 29, 2005, Hurricane Katrina hit landfall along the Central Gulf Coast near New Orleans, Louisiana, as a Category 4 storm. Its storm surge breached the levee system that protected New

Orleans from Lake Pontchartrain. The lake's waters flooded the city. This and other major damage to the coastal regions of Louisiana, Mississippi, and Alabama made Katrina the most destructive and costliest natural disaster in the history of the United States. The official death toll as of September 30 stands at 11:30 and is still climbing. The estimated cost of the damage is over \$200 billion, topping Hurricane Andrew as the most expensive natural disaster in U. S. History. Over a million people were displaced — a humanitarian crisis on a scale unseen in the U. S. since the Great Depression.

Ms. Evelyn Cooper, a resident of Baton Rouge, Louisiana, and "care giver extra ordinaire," recently relocated to Groveland, California after going through the wrath of Hurricane Katrina. She has taken a position at The Groveland Hotel at

Yosemite National Park. "The destruction, both in Louisiana and Mississippi was unbelievable," stated Evelyn. Evelyn's family resided in Louisiana and Mississippi and lost everything they had to Hurricane Katrina. "The pictures you see on television are nothing compared to actually seeing the people, the hurt. Not just physical hurt, but the horrific mental anguish they suffer," she says. Evelyn is staying with her close friends, Don and Rita Sibley of Pine Mountain Lake. Don and Rita asked Evelyn to come to California to assist in the convalescence of Rita who recently underwent major surgery.

Evelyn says she is not sure of her plans for now. She and so many others have lost everything. "These are people that have worked all their lives to build up for retirement and everything has been destroyed. There is nothing to go back to." It's hard to imagine being without your loved ones at a time like this. "I miss my children and grandchildren something awful," she says. Family is important in times of crisis. The Groveland Hotel is privileged to have her onboard as a member of their family. We're glad she's come to Groveland, a community that is gentler than most, and we hope everyone will join in welcoming her.


### Soroptomists Stay Busy

He spent 15 years as percussionist and technical director for Eddie Money and although semi-retired, Bobby says, "I still love getting together with good friends and playing really great jazz."

Christine LaPado has been hugging her upright bass for about 4 ½ years now. "I fell in love with the upright while watching my music professor at Solano College play at a show with his band. That was it!" Shortly after, Christine bought her first bass, an electric Ibanez Roadster. She played Rock and Roll clubs throughout Reno and parts of California but laid it down to raise a family. "I moved to Chico, California during this busy time and I hadn't been playing at all and I really missed it." She mentioned this to a philosophy teacher who told her she needed to pick it back up again. "I did, but this time I picked up an upright bass and I've been playing ever since." She is now a full-time musician and a Journalist for Chico News and Review and spends a good amount of time playing for Newman AmiYumi. "I love to play for Newman because his style is completely insane and avante garde. You never know where he's going next. He gets pretty crazy!"



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
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


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### EDDIE MONEY, IRON DOOR, & FML GOLF RAISE \$10,000 FOR TIOGA HIGH by Peter Barsotti



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## GAINs Makes Community Clinic Plans

The local, independent Rural Health Clinic proposed by the GAINs Healthy Community Project, funded by The California Endowment, would serve Highway 120 Moccasin to the Park, and the Coulterville and Greeley Hill areas. It would be eligible for special grants and higher reimbursements from MediCare and MediCal. It would also accept any other insurance and offer a sliding scale for those who do not qualify for insurance. There would be a social worker to help find appropriate medical reimbursement plans. The plan includes hours 9 to 5, Monday to Friday, and 1 to 4 on Saturday. As the practice grows, a 24/7 advice line will be added.

The health survey taken in May of this year indicated many people go 'off the hill' for health services and 95% said they would get services here if they were available and affordable.

Following last month's mandate to move forward with the plan, several groups are making progress. The Strategic Plan Committee includes Jim Goodrich, Liz Mattingly, Gloria Marler, Kate Newcomb, and Karen Serrett, and they are developing the necessary mission statement and goals and will be visiting the Sierra Family Clinic out of Nevada City for more information.

The Clinic Plan Committee, Barbara Broad, Lillian Carson, Etty Garber, and Jo Thomson, is interviewing consultants to assist with the implementation plan. These people have experience in setting up clinics like we propose.

Barbara Broad, Etty Garber, and Regina Tilley attended a Northern Sierra Rural Health Clinic Roundtable meeting. Other clinics offered advice and support as well as advice on funding sources. In addition, they gave their encouragement. Other members of the team attended the *Central California Rural Health Clinic Roundtable* in Angels Camp and made more contacts, getting more advice, help, and encouragement.

The Fundraising Committee is focused on two areas: local fundraising and grants from the government and private foundations. Local fundraising is very important, as GAINs needs to show that the community is willing to get behind and help the clinic become a reality. And we are a community who cares about taking care of our own!



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

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
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## 49er FESTIVAL DECORATIONS





## Teddy Roosevelt and Yosemite

The Southern Tuolumne County Historical Society (STCHS, pronounced stitches) sponsors a speaker every 3rd Saturday of the month at 7: 30pm in the Groveland Community Hall. STCHS also owns and runs the Groveland Yosemite Gateway Museum.

On Saturday, November 19th, Steve Medley, president of the Yosemite Association (YA), will discuss Teddy Roosevelt's visit to Yosemite in 1903, Roosevelt's relationship with John Muir, and his conservation work as it related to Yosemite and other national parks and public lands. The YA recently celebrated it's 80th anniversary as the nation's first cooperating association and fundraising organization in a national park. With over 10,000 members, the YA has done much educational work and service within Yosemite.

Mr. Medley will provide answers to such questions as why did Roosevelt skip the grand dinner in his honor and ignore all the dignitaries and politicians who had gathered to welcome him in Yosemite Valley? What impact did Roosevelt's support and ratification of the Antiquities Act have on the national parks and other protected areas? Why is there no landmark

in Yosemite named in honor of Theodore Roosevelt?

A product of Gilroy, California, Steve is the married father of three grown sons, whom he raised in Oakhurst. Steve has a BA in communications from Stanford and a JD degree from the University of California at Davis. He began work as a seasonal ranger in Yosemite in 1971 and now has thirty years of experience in the park. Among his books are The Complete Guidebook to Yosemite and Antelope, Bison, Cougar.

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





## **Community** Center **Plans** Unveiled

lans have been unveiled for the community center planned to be built at Long Gulch Ranch. There will be a six-lane, heated, indoor swimming pool, a separate 1,000 square foot aqua aerobics pool, a fitness center, locker rooms and a multi-purpose room with adjacent kitchen facilities that will accommodate 400 people for a meal.

"This is what the people of Groveland said they wanted," according to Dan Levin, the local resident responsible for Long Gulch Ranch. "However, this is a work in progress and I am actively seeking additional community input about the details related to these facilities."

Levin cited the swimming pool as an example. Last month he advertised that it would be eight lanes wide but his architect advised that this was too large and too intimidating for most recreational swimmers. So, the lanes were reduced to six. and the space for aqua aerobics expanded in size and made into a separate pool. The six lanes in the main pool will still allow swim meets, and should Tioga High School field a swim team, they would be

able to use the pool free of charge.

A detailed schematic floor plan can be found elsewhere in the paper in a full-page advertisement.

This community center will be the first structure constructed at Long Gulch Ranch. It will be open to the public with the fees charged based on the ongoing maintenance costs only. The initial construction cost will be paid by the developers of Long Gulch Ranch.

Building these facilities and maintaining them for public use will be a requirement of Long Gulch Ranch receiving water and sewer services from the Groveland Community Services District. The developers of Long Gulch Ranch will also pay all of the costs associated with bringing these water and sewer services to the property. "Long Gulch Ranch will not cost the citizens of Groveland one penny," stated Levin.

When asked why such extensive facilities would be built for public use, Levin responded this was the best win-win situation he had encountered in 26 years as a real estate developer. "The residents of Long Gulch Ranch will benefit because they will have access to a much larger facility than 372 homes would normally support. The people of Groveland will benefit because they will have access to facilities that otherwise would not be available. Everyone will enjoy the buzz of activity as the different components of this new community center are used and enjoyed by the entire community."

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

## Tioga High School Gets Fire Truck

uring the school year of 2003 the Principal of Tioga High School, Sandra Bradley, was looking for a class for Tioga High School to fill the needs of the local ROP program and to further meet the need and interests of her students. She set her sights on a Fire Science class. The class would be taught at her school and also at the Don Pedro High School, both a part of the Big Oak Flat School District. A recent retiree from the U.S. Forest Service, Tom Atkin, was contacted and agreed to help set up and teach the class.

Twelve to fifteen students were signed up for the class at each school respectively and the program began. At the end of the first year four graduating Seniors received credit at Modesto Junior College and the U.S. Forest Service for parts of the class. Three students went on and gained employment with the U.S. Forest Service and one student with the Don Pedro Recreation /Turlock Irrigation District.

In the second year of the program, another teacher, Robert Ott, was hired to teach at the Don Pedro High School. Mr. Ott was an active Federal Fire Fighter with NASA who lived in the local area of the Don Pedro High School. Unfortunately with the class size dwindling because of the ability



of students to choose between several other ROP classes, this class was dropped from the schedule at the mid term. However the Tioga Class in Groveland continued to grow. This year, after graduation, three seniors from Tioga went to work for the Forest Service and two Juniors also worked for the Forest Service under a special Tuolumne County Recreation program.

The third year of the class again saw three more certified graduates employed at the Forest Service and two Juniors were given the opportunity to work under the special Tuolumne County Recreation program.

However, even with this successful employment of students, there was still something missing in the program. The Forest Service, C.D.F and Groveland Community Service District Fire Dept. were helping with special equipment and tools; Full Wild Land and Structor Turn Outs, SCBA's (Fire fighting breathing devices), Hand tool, ladders and more. This was tremendous support, but what was missing? A Fire Truck!

Finally after a three year search, an Engine dedicated to the class for training was found and donated by the Tuolumne County Fire Department. What a score! After contact was made with Mike Newnan with the County, a special arrangement was made to have an Engine transferred to the School District. The truck had been housed at the Smith Station Fire house six miles above the town of Groveland. After years of service and going out on calls, it now makes it's new home with the Tioga Fire Department at Tioga High School. What a fitting retirement for this engine; staying in the local area, training our new young Fire Fighters and only six miles from her old home.



#### **GARROTTE LIONS OF GROVELAND SPONSOR RED RIBBON WEEK AT TENAYA ELEMENTARY & TIOGA HIGH SCHOOLS**

ed Ribbon Week was celebrated by the Groveland schools October 23rd

The Groveland Garrotte Lions Club helped sponsor Red Ribbon Week by donating Red Ribbons carrying the messagage, "Its great to be Drug free" and "Drug Free and Proud".

These ribbons were worn by the students from Tenaya Elementary and Tioga High School along with the teachers and bus drivers. Red ribbons were also tied around posts up and down the mainstreet of Groveland.

Drug awareness is designed to encourage the prevention of drugs and was spearheaded by Dave Palmer's committee at Tenaya school. They planned a great week for all the students...

Now for a review of the origination of Red Ribbon Week.

On Thursday, February 7,1985, Enrique "Kiki" Camerena, 37, stashed his badge and service pistol in his desk drawer and headed for lunch with his wife, Mika. Kiki, a U.S. drug enforcement administrative agent, had been on the trail of Mexico's marijuana and cocaine barons.

He was due to be reassigned in three weeks. He had come dangerously close to unlocking a multi-billion dollar drug pipeline which he expected extended into the highest reaches of the Mexican Army, Police and Government.

According to the DEA's reconstruction of events, as he headed to lunch, five men appeared at the agent's side and shoved him into a car. That was the last time anyone but his kidnappers would see him alive.


Kiki Camerena's body was found one month later in a shallow grave 70 miles from Michoacan, Mexico.

He had been tortured, beaten and brutally murdered. Mika would have to tell her three sons that their daddy would not be coming home again.

As news of this atrocity began to appear in newspapers, and on radio and television broadcasts, many school parent associations, already angry and sick of the killing and destruction caused by alcohol and other drugs in America, were looking about for some way to proclaim their concerns and to make a demand for action in their local communities. Several of these groups banded together and selected a red ribbon as their symbol and set about creating a red ribbon campaign to show intolerance for drugs in our schools, our work places and our communities.

In 1988, with Nancy Reagan as honorary chair, an eight day "RED RIBBON WEEK" was proclaimed by the congress of the United States. Each year since 1988 the Red Ribbon campaign has grown and now impacts millions of Americans like no other drug prevention movement in history. In schools, in particular when everyone is wearing a red ribbon, this little piece of satin carries the message that it is, "OK, TO SAY NO TO DRUGS.

Thanks go to Dave Palmer and his Committee, plus the schools, for all the hard work they have put into the Red Ribbon Week program. They are a real credit to Groveland.



## Long Gulch Ranch

#### By the Numbers

- O Amount in dollars that the public will have to spend for the pipes that will be installed and the plant improvements that will be made by GCSD to provide water and sewer services to Long Gulch Ranch.
- 25 Years Long Gulch Ranch has been designated for residential development in the General Plan of Tuolumne County.
- 1980 Year Long Gulch Ranch was first designated for residential development in the County's General Plan.
- 1996 Year Long Gulch Ranch was approved and this residential designation was reaffirmed during an update to the County's General Plan.
- **2011** Year the existing approvals expire.
- 1,157 Total acres of Long Gulch Ranch.
- 653 Acres of Long Gulch Ranch dedicated for open space, recreation and public uses.
- 56% Percentage of property dedicated for open space, recreation and public uses.
  - 34 Number of single-spaced pages required to list all of the conditions imposed on Long Gulch Ranch by the County to ensure an environmentally-sensitive environment.
- 130 Number of specific conditions imposed by the County that mitigate all but three of the project's impacts on the environment.
- 372 Number of home sites approved by the County after an extensive public review process that included a 1,200-page EIR.
- Minimum number of home sites the County would require if a new project were proposed for the property. (Required by Ordinance 2595 passed in December 2004 to protect open space and agricultural land by forcing residential development to occur on land already zoned for residential development.)
- Maximum number of home sites that could be approved under the current zoning if a new project were proposed.
- 400 Number of people who will be able to eat a meal in the multi-purpose room of the new community center at Long Gulch Ranch that will be open to the public.
  - **6** Number of lanes in the heated indoor swimming pool in the new recreation center at Long Gulch Ranch that will be open to the public.
- **1,000** Size in square feet of separate pool devoted to aqua aerobics that will be open to the public.
  - 2 Number of locker rooms (one each for men and women) at Long Gulch Ranch that will be open to the public.
  - 3 Number of separate areas (aerobics, strength and stretching) of fitness center at Long Gulch Ranch that will be open to the public.
  - 18 Number of holes on golf course at Long Gulch Ranch that will be open to the public.
  - 2 Number of lighted tennis courts at that will be open to the public.

## A Day in the Life of a Drinking Water Drop By Jim Good General Manager

Before I get started with a look at our water supply system, I want to remind you to vote in the upcoming GCSD Board election. We have important policy issues facing the District, such as millions of dollars in capital projects and the potential for expanded residential and commercial development. In a small community like Big Oak Flat and Groveland, every vote counts. If you have any questions about the issues, I invite you to call any of our Board members or me to get them resolved.

One of the issues that the GCSD staff and Board must wrestle with each year is water rates. Are the rates too high? Are they too low to keep our water system safe and reliable? Do we collect and maintain sufficient reserves? Answering these questions is complex and requires an understanding of our water system and how it is managed and maintained. Before these questions can be addressed, I want to take you on a journey.

Our water comes from the High Sierra source of Hetch Hetchy Reservoir, which is owned and operated by the City & County of San Francisco. Water in this reservoir is among the most pure of any drinking water supply in the world—it has so little minerals in it that it almost qualifies for "distilled" water status. While flowing over the granite rocks of the High Sierra, and while sitting in Hetch Hetchy Reservoir, the water picks up a few parts per million of minerals, as

well as some organic matter contributed by such things as decaying leaves that settle in the lake.

When the water is released from the reservoir, it travels by pipeline and then by tunnel beneath Groveland and Big Oak Flat, on its way to the San Francisco Bay area. The water takes about six hours to travel the 30 or so miles from the reservoir to Groveland. If you take Cherry Lake Road off of Highway 120, you will pass through the Early Intake facility located along the South Fork of the Tuolumne River. At this location, the water comes out of a pipeline, passes through a hydroelectric power plant, and then into the Mountain Tunnel. The Mountain Tunnel runs about 18 miles from Early Intake to Priest Reservoir located at the top of the hill above Moccasin. This tunnel runs directly under the high voltage lines that run parallel to Highway 120. So when you pass under these lines near Sugar Pine Ranch, look down about 700 feet through solid granite and you will find a 12-foot diameter tunnel filled with pure mountain water.

GCSD has two pumps that are installed in the tunnel that lift the water up to the ground surface where the water is disinfected with chlorine after which lime is added to reduce the corrosive action of the water on your water pipes. Yes! Pure water is corrosive, that's why it is called the "universal solvent." From our water treatment

plant, the water is pumped up to the large storage tanks that are scattered around the community. From there, the water flows by gravity through a 70-mile network of water distribution water pipes and eventually to your home.


The average water customer uses about 4,000 gallons per month. Your water bill is divided into two parts: fixed costs and variable costs. The variable costs include paying the City of San Francisco for the water pumped out of the Mountain Tunnel; this is about 40% of the variable rate. About 20% pays for the electrical energy needed to pump the water out of the tunnel and then up to the storage tanks. The remaining 40% pays for the chemicals, laboratory costs, and other incidental costs associated with treating the water.


The other fee on the bill is the fixed cost which pays for District labor and other fixed costs needed to monitor the water supply, maintain the water treatment plants, 70 miles of distribution pipelines, 2 booster pumps, and 5 storage tanks. This is a big job that takes operators certified by the State of California. They not only fix the occasional leak in the pipeline but also maintain over 500 fire hydrants and over a thousand valves of various types. The 16 dedicated men and women that are mindful of your water system are also looking after the sewer collection and treatment systems that consist of a treatment plant, 16 lift stations, and over 35 miles of sewer mains. Unlike many utility agencies, our staff is trained and able to operate and maintain both the water and sewer system—we call it cross-trained, which saves the District many dollars each year.

Are we paying too much to operate and maintain this high quality water supply and delivery system? In the good old days, the Board of Directors decided how the water system was maintained and how qualified the maintenance and operations staff were, which is directly

related to how much we spend on water rates. Today, how we maintain our water system and the quality of staff we use to do it is regulated by the state. Water rates are also impacted by the number of customers (in our case, about 3,000) that pay for the operation and maintenance of our complex water system. More customers would lower the fixed-cost portion of our water bill but would impact the rural community atmosphere that we enjoy so much. So, I guess the answer to the question is how much are we willing to pay for a safe and reliable water supply in paradise?

These and other issues are considered each month by the GCSD Board of Directors. It is an important (and often thankless) job. The people who have volunteered their time to guide the District into the future deserve your consideration at the voting booth on November 8th. Please vote.
