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

GENERAL **MANAGER'S MESSAGE**

Lake Dredging Project Delayed Due to **Permit Process**

After meetings and comprehensive review by Tuolumne County, the Regional Water Quality Control Board, the Department of Fish and Game and the Army Corps of Engineers, we have received the supplemental requirements that must be met prior to approval of the permits for our project.

Several environmental and biological concerns were brought into consideration by all of the governmental agencies, including several negative comments listed as responses to the Tuolumne County survey sent out to property owners. Negative comments reported in an article in the local Sonora newspaper were also considered detrimental to the permit process and may have contributed to the delay.

We have scheduled a meeting with our consultants to determine what reports or studies will be required to address all of the agencies concerns. Obviously these reports and studies will need to be prepared by County approved outside professionals and the cost could be substantial.

Our goal was to initiate the staging of the project this December and begin dredging in January or February. This is the optimum time to dredge as the Lake already has high turbidity and the dredging would cause minimal impact to fish and wildlife during that timeframe. Unfortunately the delay in acquiring permits forces us to reschedule our project for next year.

It is unfortunate and frustrating that we face this road block after putting in so many hours of effort to get this project going. I would like to thank the dozens of PML members who have called and written letters of support for this project. Your continued positive input will help us push through the "red tape" and get this important project completed.

I will continue to keep members updated with new information as soon as we meet with our consultants and determine the best course of action and attributed cost.

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors at a duly noticed February 18, 2006 meeting of the PMLA Board of Directors, enacted a moratorium on lot mergers effective April 1, 2006 for a period of 120 days. At a duly noticed PMLA Board of Director's meeting on July 15, 2006, the Board extended the moratorium until October 21, 2006. The purpose of the moratorium was to allow the Board the opportunity to review and study the Association's current policies concerning mergers and demergers, to solicit member input and mitigate the erosion of the Association's yearly assessment base. Since the announcement of the moratorium, the Board has discussed and received member input on mergers and demergers; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors of Pine Mountain Lake Association finds that

the allowance of lot mergers within the Association directly causes an erosion of the assessment base and places an additional unfair burden on the other property owners;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RE-SOLVED that the Board of Directors for Pine Mountain Lake Association adopts the following resolution:

1. Repeal of Resolution No. 90-.05

Resolution No. 90-.05, adopted by the Board of Directors on April 2, 1990 is hereby repealed.

2. Lot Merger:

It is now the general policy of Pine Mountain Lake Association that Lot Mergers are not allowed as being inconsistent with the goals of the Association as a whole unless a variance is recommended by the Environmental Control Committee and approved by the Board of Directors.

3. Variance Procedure:

Members seeking a variance must submit an application to the Environmental Control Committee pursuant to the procedures set forth at Article VIII, Section 20 of the First Restated Declaration of Restrictions. All applications for a variance must meet the following conditions.

- **a.** Compelling Justification TheLot Owner in his/her application for a variance must show a compelling justification for the lot merger as determined by the Environmental Control Committee and the Board of Directors.
- **b.** Other Rules The Lot Owners must still comply with all other zoning and permitting rules promulgated by the Board of Directors or other laws enacted by the County of Tuolumne or other regulatory agencies.

4. Effective Date:

This resolution will become effective on

President Marilyn Hathaway introduced our guest speaker, Ken Seifarth, assistant manager of the Moccasin Creek Fishery and a career fish farmer. Ken gave us a terrific presentation on the California Fishery system and answered all our questions about fish farming and fish management.

For example:

• Did you know that baby trout stay at the Moccasin hatchery for 12-14 months, before they are large enough to be released for our fishing pleasure? And, that Moccasin generally has over a million fish in residence at one time.

- And, what do you think is the biggest impediment to safely raising those fish - the great blue herons that lurk about looking for lunch!
- We also learned that a female salmon lays about 4000 eggs at a time; and it's a good thing, since most young salmon are killed by predators before they can return to spawn.
- California Fish and Game uses planes, trucks, and even pack animals to stock fish in lakes all over the state.

In the spring, we will be organizing a Friends of the Lake special behind the scenes tour of Moccasin Creek Fishery.

Stay tuned for details.

Friends of the Lake recently donated \$100 to the Groveland Volunteer Fire Fighters Association in appreciation for their help providing emergency back-up at the lake swim. We also donated six rescue buoys to the PML boat patrol to have onboard in case of a water emergency.



From Little Nuts Buckeyes Grow Reprint article from 1974 Pine Mountain Lake News

Must be 21 to gamble

cattered throughout the landscape of Pine Mountain Lake are Buckeye Oak trees. These trees usually put a little scare into people because they tend to drop their leaves a couple of months before the other type of oaks. For this reason, they give the appearance of dying with other trees having their green foliage around them.

Buckeye Oaks have compound leaves and erect clusters of white and reddish flowers. They form giant glossy brown nuts that fall to the ground and during February, March and April these nuts germinate and send out a heavy white shoot. If these shoots can work into the ground then new healthy little trees will start to grow.

Some of the residents at Pine Mountain Lake discovered the germinated nuts this March and planted them indoors in pots. To their happy surprise leaves are forming at this early stage. Needless to say a large pot is required: the nut itself will measure approximately 3 inches in

If any of you Pine Mountain Lakers

wish to start your own Buckeye Oak simply take a walk through the subdivision until you find a Buckeye Oak tree.

Under the tree you will find the nuts. Plant your nut in a pot in the same position that you found it on the ground. Keep your pot moist and do not let it dry out until you have a good thickness of leaves.

REMEMBER: When it starts dropping leaves don't throw it away. It's not dead! That's nature! Just place in an out-of-theway place until the leaves start forming again. Happy nut hunting and Happy Buckeye growing!

Editors note: The initials stand for Royal Order Of Fantastically Beautiful B_____ [rhymes with witches]. You are, and we are happy to know you.

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
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
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Tips From June Dee

Prepare for the Heating Season...

- Prepare your fireplace for the winter by having it thoroughly cleaned and your carbon monoxide levels checked. Install carbon monoxide and smoke detectors, or check the batteries on existing detectors.
- Know the warning signs that your furnace or fireplace may need servicing. These include the pilot light outages, "booming" noise on furnace ignition, excessive soot inside fireplace or vent or any continuous odors. Also, be aware that carbon monoxide presence can cause headaches, lethargy, or other flu-like symptoms.
- Check your chimney for any blockage or obstructions. Birds and squirrels are notorious for building nests in vents and chimneys.
- Furnace filters should be changed every month. It may be necessary to change them more often during the winter months when people and pets spend more time indoors.

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
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Labor of Love: Building Camp Tuolumne Trails by Virginia Gustafson

"adopted" two of the six children's bunkhouses and built them in record time as a team project.


The Groveland Rotary took responsibility for another of the bunkhouses and some 20 members contributed their labor.

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





New Sheriff



The local residents of Tuolumne are hoping that a new Sheriff will be elected in the upcoming November election. The votes will have to choose between two different candidates for the job. Tom Memmer and Jim Mele are both current employees with the Tuolumne County Sheriff's Department. They each have had over 18 years of service in the TCSD; Memmer as a detective working on the Narcotics Team (TNT), and Mele working as a sergeant in charge of general investigations. They both agree that the jail is overcrowded, that the sheriffs on the force are underpaid and that the moral in the department is at an all time low. But the way in which each one of these candidates wants to make changes is what sets them apart from one another. Their ideas on how to make changes may decide which one of them wins the election on Tuesday November 7.

This election in November will include a number of things that are important to votes throughout the state of California. For example, who we choose for Governor, and lots of different initiatives that vary from alternative energy use to residential restrictions for sex offenders. There is always important information on the internet, sample ballots are sent to registered votes to review before somebody goes to the polls to vote, and if you want a first hand opinion on who to vote for, it might be a good ideal to check with a sheriff or a teacher in the school district. It is very important that the right people be voted into offices. The new Sheriff must be supportive of his department and fight for the pay increases that are needed by the TCSD. Our sheriffs are the lowest paid in comparison to all other law enforcement agencies in the surrounding counties of Calaveras, Stanislaus, Amador and Mariposa. Our school board needs people who will support the bond issue that was passed last November and guarantee that the bond money is spent properly for the three schools in our district.

So if you want to support the sheriffs and the school children in this community, do your best to research the issues and make an informed choice on November 7th at the voting polls. It is in the best interest of everyone who lives in this community.

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Celebrate Open Space

he Tuolumne County Community Identity Element, part of the general plan, begins with this profound paragraph "Quality of life perhaps begins with the aesthetic and scenic values near one's living areas: a landscape that is a pleasure to live in, where the senses are heightened by it's richness, aesthetic quality, and feeling of life; and, a place which all valuable resources, both natural and urban, blend in concert to elevate the human spirit."

Open space is an important part of developing a community plan and the Northern Yosemite Corridor Partners, Inc. (NYCPI), a Groveland/Big Oak Flat not for profit group, is giving open space high priority.

What is open space and what is its purpose? Open space is land that is protected for present and future generations. It can be forest or wetlands set aside as bird sanctuaries, oak woodlands, parks, agricultural land and more. It is often used to define communities creating greenbelts of beauty between urban developments.

Many of us were drawn to the Sierra foothills because of its natural beauty. As the population explodes, (the United States is now the fastest growing population in the world) it is critical that we set aside open space for our children and grandchildren. Setting aside scenic corridors and hilltops will ensure that the rural character and quality of life be protected.

How is open space created? The Tuolumne County Land Trust is a good example of how open space is preserved. The Tuolumne Land Trust is dedicated to perpetuating this area's scenic, natural, historical and agricultural values. The trust serves the land owners who wish to protect the special features of their lands by using a technique called a conservation easement. Citizens may also contribute funds to a land trust and they in turn will purchase land that is often environmentally sensitive or land that will act as a buffer to distinguish communities from each other.

You can visit some of the open space preserved in Groveland's Mary Laveroni Community Park and on GCSD's lands by joining us in a easy 3- to 4-mile, halfday hike that begins at 10am, Saturday, November 18th. Please bring water, snacks and sturdy footwear. For more information about the hike, please call Frank Oyung at 962-7585. The hike takes place rain or shine.

Needs that arise from this sponsorship include providing housing and supervision for the girls attending high school and help in finding and selecting Mayan girls who want to continue their education. The funds SIG has donated as an associate partner will help address several inequities experienced by Guatemalan women and girls. psychological counseling, self defense training, safe houses, American Cancer Society, Healthy Heart Campaign, Breast Cancer Awareness, Family Wellness Fair, Girls' Club activities and more. We will distribute free books, primarily for children, and free refreshments for all to enjoy.

During the month of November you may wonder why Main Street is covered in purple ribbons. Since 1994, Soroptimist International of the Americas adopted the prevention of domestic violence as a main focus. Domestic violence, the abuse of family members, can take many forms. In all cultures, the perpetrators are most commonly the men of the family and the victims are most commonly women. Elder and child abuse are also prevalent. Acts of domestic violence generally fall into one or more of the following: physical, sexual or psychological battering. The Soroptimist campaign to end domestic violence is centered primarily on educating women and children on how to prevent it and where to get help. A banner across Main Street posts the national phone number to call to get the closest help in your area: 1-800-799-7233 (SAFE). On October 21, SIG and Helping Hands supported the Kiwanis Club of Groveland with their annual children's shopping spree. Forty children (1st-12th grades) who are in financial need were taken to Mervyn's to spend a gift certificate (ranging from \$100 to \$150 depending on age) on school clothes. A chaperone accompanied each child during the hour and a half shopping spree. After they "shopped until they dropped", the children were treated to a pizza party at Two Guys and then received a new backpack loaded with school supplies. Kiwanis started this project to help needy children in our community who could not otherwise afford to buy new clothes and school supplies. SIG is proud to have supported them in this effort.

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Unfunded, Mandated Projects Nearing Completion

ver the past few years, GCSD has been addressing several unfunded, mandated capital projects, including the upgrading of our water treatment plants and upgrading of our sewage collection system. Though they are expensive, various regulatory agencies are requiring the District to do these upgrades or face substantial fines.

These expensive projects are nearing completion. And with their completion, we will have met the various regulatory requirements that have been imposed on the District over the past six to eight years.

In 1998, the US Environmental Protection Agency mandated that we change our water disinfection process in order to avoid the creation of trihalomethane compounds in our water. Trihalomethane (TTHM) is the byproduct of the reaction between chlorine, used for water disinfection,

and naturally occurring organic compounds that occur in many surface reservoirs, such as Hetch Hetchy.

To meet the regulatory requirements, we must replace chlorine as a disinfectant with a combination of chloramines (a mix of chlorine and ammonia) and ultraviolet light. This conversion process will be completed in the next few months. This project will cost the District about \$3 million. Unfortunately, the mandate by USEPA came with no funding. For this reason, we will need to sell bonds to pay for it.

In addition to the water treatment plants, we are required to have a standby emergency water supply. As it turns out, we will need this facility on line by January 2008 when Hetch Hetchy Water & Power's Mountain Tunnel is taken off line for repairs that will last up to 60 days. These repairs will continue over the next 10 years,

with each annual shutdown lasting 60 to 90 days. The District is currently designing a portable plant that will treat Pine Mountain Lake water. This project could cost as much as \$2 million, again, with no outside sources of funding, though we are looking for grants.

Our water customers are currently paying \$5.13 in debt service toward these two major capital water projects, which is in addition to the 1998 bond of \$9.83 and the \$6.50 RID bond (which will be retired in mid-2007). This debt service charge will be increased by about \$4.00 per month per customer after we sell bonds.

On the wastewater side, the District was ordered in 2001 to upgrade its sewage lift stations so that the District does not spill raw sewage into the creeks or Pine Mountain Lake, as often occurred during rainstorms in the late 1990s and early 2000s. We are nearing completion of the hub lift station upgrades. These upgrades include new standby generators, additional wet well storage, bypass pumping capability, new electronic controls, and new submersible pumps. The upgrades to the five hub lift stations will cost the District about \$2 million. We are now ready to go to bid for the upgrade of the remaining eleven satellite lift stations. These upgrades are far less complex but will cost about \$1 million.

In addition, the District has undertaken a process of inspecting and repairing our 30-year-old sewer lines and upgrading the quality of our reclaimed water, both of which are regulatory compliance issues. Meeting these sewer line compliance issues will cost an additional \$1 million.

Currently, our sewer customers do not pay any debt service charge on their sewer bills. These \$4 million worth of wastewater projects will result in an additional \$15 per month per customer in debt service. This charge is relatively high because we only have about 1,450 sewer customers to share the cost as compared to the 3,100 water customers.

The impact of the Long Gulch Ranch project has been raised as a concern and possible cause of these anticipated rate increases. This is not true. The District will have to construct the various water and wastewater projects discussed above whether or not Long Gulch Ranch is developed. However, if Long Gulch Ranch is developed, the additional water and sewer service connections may help reduce the monthly customer debt service because we would be able to spread the debt service over more customers.

The exact amount of debt that the District will take on will be determined by the Board of Directors in the next few months. Concurrent with this activity, the District is conducting water and sewer rate studies. At this time, we don't expect the fixed and variable rates for water and sewer to increase by much more than the cost of living index.

In summary, the water debt service will increase by about \$4 over existing debt service. The sewer charges will increase by about \$15 because of the new debt service.

Land of the Miwoks

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The Miwok Indians called these hills and valleys "home' long before the discovery of gold brought the white man in the frantic and often ruthless search for instant wealth.

There was a Miwok Village, or Rancheria, on Big Creek. Artifacts from this village were found when the dam was being constructed for Pine Mountain Lake.

The Miwok lived in harmony with the land, practicing ecology long before the white man invented it. Utilizing what he found in the world around him, subject to the whims of nature and the cycle of the seasons, he led a simple, hard life. Not being farmers, the Miwoks hunted game, fished for trout, gathered roots and bulbs, nuts, berries and acorns.

His shelter reflected his environment. Conical dwellings eight to fifteen feet in diameter were made by leaning overlapping slabs of bark together so they supported one another or by arranging them around a framework of poles 10 or 12 feet long with tops inclined together. Bark of the Digger Pine, Yellow Pine or Incense Cedar (depending on what was available) was stripped only from the dead trees to form these single-family dwellings. In summer when the family lived outside under brush arbors these shelters were used as storage places.

The heart of the Miwok's village was the semi-subterranean earth lodge.

It was the gathering place for social and ceremonial life. Here meals were shared, games played, and rituals performed.

The Indian Village and Museum Garden in Yosemite National Park represents a grouping of dwellings, granaries and a round-house lodge.

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
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
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
