

Thanksgiving just a few weeks away. Thanksgiving is one of the best days of the year, not just because lots of folks get together with their families and loved ones, but because of the tradition of being thankful for the blessings that come our way. We are very fortunate to be part of a particularly beautiful part of the Sierra Mountains, enjoying a community which provides so many activities.

This month the Board will review, revise, and pass the budget for 2008. Joe Powell, our General Manager, and Ken Spencer, our Controller, met with all of the amenity managers and developed an initial budget presentation. On October 20, Joe, Ken and all of the managers met with the Board of Directors to review that presentation. Some very hard decisions will have to be made to keep the 2008 budget reasonable.

Pine Mountain Lake is about 38 years old now and because of that age, maintenance, repair and replacement of

facilities is getting to be a serious (read expensive) subject. In previous years we have strived to keep the annual assessment as low a possible by paying as we go for needed repairs and replacement. We have now reached the point where we need to increase our reserve fund as some of the future repairs or replacements will be much more expensive due to their age. We can either increase the reserve fund gradually or impose a special assessment when needed. Your current board believes that a gradual build-up of the reserve fund is the proper choice.

Fire abatement is also a very serious issue. Communities such as Pine Mountain Lake received a wake up call this year with the terrible Angora fire in Lake Tahoe. We inspected our greenbelt areas and found they need professional help. For the past ten years we have used in-house labor for fire abatement in order to keep costs down but our staff is too small to keep our greenbelt areas as safe as they need to be. We are developing a five year plan with an outside contractor to bring PML up to current fire safety standards. We simply cannot allow our community to suffer the tragedy of a fire getting out of control.

In October we had a special meeting followed by a study session for the purpose of having interested property owners voice their opinions of how the lake is used by various boating activities. Many ideas were presented and they certainly covered a broad spectrum. Unfortunately, our lake is not getting any larger and we have more and more members using it. After the budget process is completed, the board will be tackling this problem in an effort to modify the lake use rules and have them in place before the 2008 summer season begins.

There has been little progress in the current litigations initiated by our former General Manager. The Arbitration of his employment agreement is currently in the stage of attorneys submitting their briefs to the arbitrator. The second action filed against past and present Board members is currently in the deposition stage. In spite of the fact that they are moving slowly, we are nearing completion, which hopefully will take place early next year. As stated before, it is our firm contention that these actions are without merit and that the Association will prevail. As these actions progress, we will keep you informed.

Thanksgiving is a special day. I hope that all of our members have an opportunity to spend the day with your families, enjoy a thanksgiving dinner together and to give thanks for the many blessings which have come our way.

GENERAL MANAGER'S MESSAGE

Main Gate Entrance Project

We have received bids from qualified local contractors to perform the concrete and rock work (monuments) portion of this project. The project was awarded and the final phase should be well under way by the time you read this. Once the concrete foundation and rock work is complete, we will finish the project with new directional signage. We have diverted traffic lanes during the project from time to time and we are asking all members to be cautious and observe the traffic directional signs to help ensure their safety and the safety of our staff and project workers.

Vehicle Safety

Speeding and vehicle safety continues to be an issue within PML. We have a 25 mph. speed limit and it is often ignored. Members and guests are encouraged to observe the posted speed limits and obey all traffic laws. With winter approaching, light conditions and wet and icy streets will be safety concerns and speeding will only cause more risk of an accident. The

deer herds are also more prevalent searching for food. Too often I have seen the results of deer vs. vehicle accident that could have been avoided by obeying the speed limit. Please do your part and help keep PML safe for everyone.

Swimming Pool ADA Ramp and Restroom

We have received the County permits for this project and put it out to bid. The bids came back and we awarded the contract to one of our great local contractors. The plan is to complete this project during the off-season so that we do not impact member safety and convenience to be ready for the 2008 summer season.

Lake Dredging Project

Some progress has been made with the Department of Fish and Game regarding this project. We have asked Tom Rut of Moffat and Nichol, our Lake Dredging consultants, to provide an update and presentation on the Lake Dredging Project at the November 17th monthly Board

meeting. The meeting is scheduled to be held at the Lake Lodge and start at 9 a.m. Mr. Rut will be happy to address all issues and concerns regarding our project and provide the membership with all of the facts and planned progress. We encourage all members that are interested in the project to attend.

I would like to thank all members that have sent in letters and emails in support of this project. We will take these with us when we meet with the governing agencies. It is important that we let them know that this project will have a huge positive impact for our Lake and association and is long overdue.

2008 Budget Process

On October 20th the PMLA managers met with the Board of Directors to discuss the needs of the Association for 2008. The meeting started at 8 a.m. with an overview provided by Association Controller, Ken Spencer, and myself. The Board reviewed the budgets of every department and amenity and the capital and reserve needs for the future. It was a lengthy, comprehensive meeting and many questions were posed by the Board and members in the audience. The final approval of the 2008 Budget will be handled at the November 17th Board meeting at the Lake Lodge and all members are encouraged to attend.

NOTICE TO ALL PML MEMBERS

The following proposed Board resolution is an update of the Association Collection Policy. The changes in this draft are needed to bring our policy in compliance with current law and it has been reviewed by the Associations lien service and Association Counsel. The draft resolution includes the schedule of monetary fines which has also been updated with some minor changes. Action will be taken by the Board on this resolution at the November 17, 2007 Board meeting at the PML Lake Lodge. The meeting starts at 9 a.m. and all members are welcome to attend.

PINE MOUNTAIN LAKE ASSOCIATION COLLECTION POLICY

A. ASSESSMENTS

Timely payment of regular and special assessments is of critical importance to Pine Mountain Lake Association. The failure of any owner to pay monthly assessments when due creates a cash flow problem for the Association and causes those owners who make timely payment of their assessments to bear a disproportionate share of the Association's financial obligations. Therefore, the Board of Directors has enacted the following policies and procedures concerning collection of delinquent assessment accounts.

1. Regular assessments are due, in advance, on the first (1st) day of each assessment period and delinquent if not received, in full, by the Association within fifteen (15) days after the due date thereof. Special Assessments and Special Individual Assessments are due on the date(s) specified upon imposition and each installment thereof shall be delinquent if not received by the Association within fifteen (15) days after it is due.

A late charge of ten dollars (\$10.00) or ten (10) percent, whichever is greater, shall be due on any such delinquent assessment. The Association may also recover interest on all such amounts due once due and unpaid for thirty (30) days, at the rate of twelve percent (12%) per annum.

- 2. If any portion of any such assessment, late charge, interest or cost of collection remains unpaid seventy-five (75) days after the original due date, a "Notice of Intent to Lien" will be prepared and sent to the owner(s) by certified mail. The Notice will, among other things, state the current charges owed by the owner(s), and any additional information required by California Civil Code Section 1367.1 or comparable superseding statute. All resulting collection fees and reasonable costs and charges will be added to the total delinquent amount.
- 3. The Association may, at its discretion, send any account that is seventy-five (75) days past the due date to a professional collection agency.
- 4. If all such amounts have not been received one hundred and five (105) days after the original due date thereof, or thirty (30) days after the mailing of a "Notice of Intent to Lien", whichever is later, a Notice of Delinquent Assessment ("Lien") will be prepared and recorded as to the delinquent property and the owner(s) thereof, and all resulting collection fees and costs will be added to the total delinquent amount secured by the lien.
- 5. If all such amounts have not been received, in full, within thirty (30) days

after the recordation of such Lien, or within the time frame outlined in Civil Code Section 1367.4, whichever occurs later, the Association may, without further advance notice to the owner(s), proceed to take any and all additional enforcement remedies as the Association, in its sole discretion, deems appropriate, including, without limitation, non-judicial foreclosure of such Lien, judicial foreclosure, or suit for money damages, all at the expense of the property owner(s).

- 6. The Association may recover all reasonable costs incurred in collecting any delinquent assessment, including reasonable attorney's fees.
- 7. In addition to pursuing any other collection alternatives, membership in the Association must be maintained in good standing in order for the member to retain privileges of membership, including the right to vote and to use and enjoy Association recreational common facilities. The Board of Directors reserves the right to suspend membership privileges to those members who are delinquent in their assessments.
- 8. The Board may, for good cause based upon the Board's sole discretion, agree to a payment plan, which permits payment of the delinquent assessment(s), late charges, interest and collection costs.
- 9. Unless the Board agrees to a payment plan as specified in Section 8 above, all amounts due pursuant to this policy, and all other assessments and related charges thereafter due to the Association until all such amounts are paid, must be paid in full and the Association shall not be required to accept any partial or installment payments from the date of the institution of an action to enforce the payment of delinquent amounts to the time that all such amounts are paid in full.
- 10. All payments received by the Association, regardless of the amount paid, will be directed to the oldest assessment balances first, until such time as all assessment balances are paid, and then to late charges, interest and costs of collection unless otherwise specified by written agreement.
- 11. All above-referenced notices will be mailed to the owner(s) at the last mailing address provided in writing to the Association by such owner(s).
- 12. The mailing address for overnight payment of assessments is: Pine Mountain Lake Association, 19228 Pine Mountain Drive, Groveland, CA 95321.

B. SERVICE BILLING

1. Boarding, advertising, golf and other service billings are due on the first day of each calendar month and are delinquent if not paid by the 30th day of the month. If payment is not received by the thirtieth

(30th) day of the month, a late charge of ten dollars (\$10.00) or ten (10) percent, whichever is greater, will be posted to the account. Delinquent billings, late charges and all reasonable costs of collection posted with respect to a delinquent owner's account, if not received in the Association office on or before the thirtieth (30th) day following the due date, shall bear interest at the rate of twelve (12) percent per annum.

- 2. The Association may, at its discretion, send any account that is sixty (60) days past the due date to a professional collection agency.
- 3. The Association may recover all reasonable costs incurred in collecting any delinquencies, including reasonable attorney's fees.

C. FINES, FEES and OTHER CHARGES

1. Fines, fees and other charges posted to an account will be due as stated in the notification. If payment is not received by the due date, a late charge of ten dollars (\$10.00) or ten (10) percent, whichever is greater, will be posted to the account. Delinquent fines, fees and

other charges, including late charges and all reasonable costs of collection posted with respect to a delinquent owner's account, if not received in the Association office on or before the thirtieth (30th) day following the due date, shall bear interest at the rate of twelve (12) percent per annum.

- 2. The Association may, at its discretion, send any account that is sixty (60) days past the due date to a professional collection agency.
- 3. The Association may recover all reasonable costs incurred in collecting any delinquencies, including reasonable attorney's fees.

D. RETURNED CHECKS

1. The Association shall charge a "returned check charge" of twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) for all checks returned as "non-negotiable", "insufficient funds" or any other reason.

The Board of Directors of the Association may revise this policy, either generally or on a case-by-case basis, if it finds good cause to do so.



SCHEDULE OF MONETARY PENALTIES

Civil Code 1363(g)

The Board of Directors is authorized to adopt and publish a schedule of reasonable fines and penalties for common or recurring violations of the Governing Documents. The following schedule of fines will serve as a guideline for the imposition of appropriate penalties in the context of member enforcement proceedings. The Board may also, by resolution, authorize and empower the Association's General Manager to issue notices of fines in appropriate circumstances involving commonly recurring violations.

8.1. Traffic Violations

Within the boundaries of the Association, all traffic violations fall under provisions of the California State Vehicle Code.

8.2. Fines for Violation of Declaration of CC&R's, the Association Bylaws or the ECC Design Guidelines (the Governing Documents):

A. Property Use Restriction Violations

Uncorrected violations of the Governing Documents pertaining to property use restrictions or property maintenance (CC&R's, Articles VII and VIII):

- 1. First violation: Up to a maximum of **\$100**.
- 2. Each month or portion thereof a continuing violation remains uncorrected, an additional fine of up to \$200 per month may be levied.
- 3. Each subsequent violation within one year of the preceding violation shall be **\$250.00**.

$\begin{tabular}{ll} B. & Environmental & Regulation \\ Violations & \\ \end{tabular}$

Uncorrected violations of any matters that are under the jurisdiction of the Association's Environmental Control Committee (see primarily Articles V and VI of the CC&R's):

1. Unauthorized Earth Work and Site Alteration

a. Grading of lot/putting in trenches without a permit (fine to be determined by the severity of the action): \$100.00 - \$1,000.00.

2. Construction Violations

- a. Initiating new construction without ECC approval.
- (i) House, garage, additions, multiple commercial projects: \$500.00 \$1,500.00.
- (ii) Sheds, decks and minor alterations: **\$50.00 \$500.00**.
- b. Failure to pick up permit prior to commencing approved construction: \$50.00 \$150.00.
- c. Failure to clean up construction debris: **\$50.00 \$150.00**.
- d. Failure to obtain extension prior to expiration of permit: \$50.00 \$250.00. Additional deposit may be required.
- e. Failure to complete project within allotted time frame: \$100.00 per month.

f. Failure to schedule final inspection within time required by CC&R's: \$250.00.

3. Deviations from Approved Plans

- a. Major deviations without prior approval (i.e., changes from approved design, color, and/or materials): \$100.00 \$1,500.00.
- b. Minor deviations and changes without prior approval (i.e., window changes on side/rear elevations, minor changes to front elevation): \$50.00 \$500.00.

Note: Any changes in plans which are made without prior approval from the ECC shall be subject to a minimum fine of \$50.00 and may be subject to an order requiring corrective action.

4. Unauthorized Tree and Brush Removal and Limbing

- a. Tree removal, per tree: \$100.00 \$1,000.00.
- b. Tree removal from common area, per tree: \$100.00 \$2,500.00.
- c. Limbing of live limbs above 15'; dead limbs above 35': **\$50.00 \$150.00**.
- d. Limbing of live limbs in common area: **\$150.00 \$500.00**.
- e. Failure to properly dispose of tree removal debris: **\$50.00**.

The fine for unauthorized tree removal shall be at the discretion of the ECC. The fine shall be based on such factors as: the severity of the violation; size and density of trees per Schedule A; and the adverse impacts on views or other aesthetic considerations of neighboring property owners.

Under no circumstances shall trees be removed or limbed or brush removed from the common area. Any violation of this could result in a maximum fine of \$2,500.00 per tree and replacement of said tree(s).

NOTE: Dead or hazardous trees or brush in the common area should be reported to the ECC.

The fine for limbing shall be determined by the height to which the limbs are removed. Example: 15' to 20' would carry a minimum fine. Any limbing above 20' will be fined accordingly. Limbs removed in the upper 1/3 of the tree's height will carry a maximum fine. Any unauthorized tree removal on a lot may require not only the imposition of a fine as per the above schedule, but also replanting of the lot with an approved landscaping plan.

5. Miscellaneous Items

- a. Exterior alteration to existing structures without ECC approval (i.e., changes on roof material or color, changes to exterior surfaces, color or material, addition of windows and/or doors, etc.): \$50.00 \$500.00
- b. Exterior lighting fails to meet acceptable standards, per fixture: **\$25.00**.
- c. Violation of sign ordinance: \$25.00.
- d. Installation of satellite receiving antenna without prior approval *notification*: **\$100.00**.
- e. Installation of fence without prior approval: \$100.00.
 - f. Installation of exterior UHF-VHF an-

tenna without prior approval <u>notification</u>: \$25.00.

Other violations not listed may also be subject to a fine by the ECC. (The above fines could be assessed per month until corrected.)

The fine policy and schedule of fines may be amended and modified from time to time by the ECC after proper notification and Board approval. Such changes will be posted in the ECC office. FINES MAY BE ASSESSED ON A DAILY, WEEKLY, OR MONTHLY SCHEDULE, ACCORDING TO THE INFRACTION AND AT THE DISCRETION OF THE ECC. Multiple violations may result in multiple fines. Each subsequent violation for the same or similar offense within a one-year period may subject owners to a fine double those listed above.

C. **Delinquent Assessments** – Civil Code 1365(d)

Uncorrected violations of any of the Governing Documents pertaining to the payment of assessments as levied by the Board of Directors (CC&R's, Article IV):

- 1. Assessments are due on the first day of the month and are delinquent if not paid by the fifteenth (15th) day of the month. If an assessment becomes delinquent, the owner shall incur a late charge not exceeding 10 percent of the delinquent assessment, or \$10.00, whichever is greater.
- 2. If delinquent assessments and late charges remain unpaid thirty (30) days following the due date, the delinquent amounts, reasonable costs of collection, and late charges shall begin to bear interest at the rate of 12 percent per annum until paid.
- 3. If assessments remain unpaid for a period of sixty (60) seventy-five (75) days or more, the owner's account may be referred to legal counsel to initiate the lien and foreclosure proceedings.
- 4. In lieu of pursuing its lien and foreclosure remedies, the Association may initiate a small claims court action against a delinquent owner to recover any delinquent assessments, fines and other reasonable costs of collection imposed by the Association.

In accordance with California law, each year when the Association distributes its annual budget, the members shall also receive a schedule of the monetary fines and penalties, which may be imposed for violations.

8.3 Fines for Violation of the Rules and Regulations

A. First violation: \$25.00 up to a maximum of \$100.00.

B. Each subsequent violation within one (1) year of the preceding one shall be \$50.00 and up to a maximum of \$250.00.

C. Each month or portion thereof a continuing violation remains uncorrected, and additional fine of up to \$250.00 per month


may be levied.

D. In addition to fines levied in accordance with the above schedule, any owner who is determined to have violated the Declaration of Restrictions may be ordered by the Association to restore any damaged, destroyed or altered plant materials, flora or structural improvements to their pre-existing condition. In the case of any violation which constitutes a breach of the rights of quiet enjoyment of any other property owner or resident, the violator may be ordered to cease or discontinue the offensive action or activity.

Further Legal Action

1. In any case where a property owner fails to pay levied fines or take corrective action as detailed in any Committee decision, the Board of Directors may pursue collection of fines or enforcement of the Committee's decision in any manner permitted by law. In the event the property owner fails to complete whatever corrective action the Committee specifies in its final decision, the Committee may reconvene to assess a monetary fine, within the guidelines of the above schedule, as a penalty for the owner's failure to act. The Committee shall notify the Board of the owner's continued noncompliance in order to enable the Board to consider the propriety of further legal action.

2. As more particularly described in Article XIV of the Declaration of Restrictions, in the event that resort to formal legal action becomes necessary, the prevailing party shall be entitled to recover his/her/it's costs of suit, including reasonable attorneys' fees. Furthermore, if any fines or attorneys' fees are not paid when due, they may be treated as a Special Individual Assessment levied against the offending owner and his or her lot. Special Individual Assessments are subject to foreclosure by the Association (see Article IV, Sections 4 and 9 of the Declaration of Restrictions).



Golf Maintenance

By Alan Macdonald, Golf Course Superintendent

all aeration has come and gone. It has been about two weeks and most of the greens have healed. We had some breakdowns and used other equipment that allowed us to keep on schedule. As a result a few greens had some larger holes and will take a little longer to heal. During and after greens aeration we began doing tees, fairways and collars along with the rough. As we sweep our fairways plugs, we are utilizing our new verticut attachment that is breaking up the plugs and verticutting our fairways. I thank everyone for their patience during this process, which this year should be completed in 14 days or so.

Each spring we spray insecticide on the fairways for Billbug. Its larvae will become quite active in late May or June and can be very destructive. The insecticide does not last long enough to restrict the development of the second generation of the Southern Masked Chafer (White Grub), which is what the skunks and raccoons tear up the turf for. This year, maybe due to the winter being drier and for the most part warmer, we have had many more hot spots of grubs and more damage from the critters. Most

of this damage is wide spread so to limit all the damage we would have to spray the entire course which would result in using 20% of our maintenance supplies budget. This is an area we will monitor and if necessary apply an insecticide twice a year.

Some of our fall projects will include drainage projects, improving the area around five tees with different varieties of shrubs and some work on the tee itself.

During the fall our labor force is reduced so, with our projects and day-to-day activities to get the course ready for daily play, we will be busy.

Please remember not to trip over the rake but to use it as you exit the bunker.

Windows Home Server

omething very common in many households these days are multiple computers. Often each member of the family has his own computer. This keeps everyone from adjusting eachothers' settings and installing software that the other person doesn't want. Most importantly, everyone can be on the computer at the same time.

Most people that own more than one computer know that the computers can be networked without a server so that an internet connection can be shared. It is also possible to share folders and printers from each machine if properly configured. This type of network is called a workgroup. There is one big difference between a home network (workgroup) and a typical business network. That difference is a server. A good server is almost critical for any real business network. I know the advantages and conveniences of them so I set up my own at home for my computers. Many times I have wanted to recommend a server to people for home too but until now they have been too complicated to setup and too expensive.

Microsoft has recently released a new operating system called Windows Home Server. For those of you that don't already know, Microsoft builds other operating systems besides Windows 98, Windows XP, and Windows Vista. Businesses have the option of choosing a server operating system depending on the size of their business, such as Windows 2003 Small Business Server, Windows 2003 Server Standard, or Windows 2003 Server Enterprise. These operating systems are different than XP or Vista and have many advanced features built in for efficiently managing a network. Now people can get most of these enterprise features in a home-friendly package by buying a Windows Home Server.

So what does Windows Home Server do? First, it offers simplified sharing. It's a way to share and store important files or videos, movies and photos. It allows access to this information from any computer in your home, or in the world, provided you have an internet connection. This is accomplished by a built in web server that you can connect to from a friends computer. Not only can you access these files from computers, you can also stream video to the XBOX360 and other Windows connect devices. There is even a Tivo add-in that allows streaming videos from the server to the Tivo.

It's convenient to be able to access all your files from any computer at anytime because a server is always up and running. Also your files are protected from

hardware failure! Windows Home Server let's you add multiple drives to your server to create one large drive. You can easily upgrade to larger hard drives as you need the space with an easy migration wizard. Windows automatically distributes the data across multiple drives and you can see them all as one giant drive. You can then enable redundancy for specified folders that are most important and then if one drive fails it's still backed up on the other automatically.

Speaking of backups, my favorite feature of Windows Home Server is its backup capability. I'm a fanatic when it comes to backups. After all, who wants to lose all their family photos and expensive music collections? This is where a home server can save you a whole lot of time, money and frustration. Viruses and Spyware are very common problems these days and are very hard to get rid of once infected. Usually it is impossible to completely remove a virus from your computer without completely reinstalling Windows. WHS can replace your external backup hard drive or whatever other type of backup you use with automatic backups of all the PC's on your network. The backups are intelligent too; once the software has made a full backup of your PC it will only backup files that haven't been backed up before. If all your computers are being backed up nightly then when a virus hits your PC, you can simply restore your last backup right over the network.

Another feature that is handy is roaming profiles. You may have noticed that Windows XP and Vista allow multiple user accounts. When you boot your computer up, you get that screen with little pictures and everyone's name who has his own user profile on that computer. When you click on your name, it logs you into Windows with your very own documents folder, desktop background, favorites, e-mail and so on. If you have multiple people accessing multiple computers around the house then you can enable roaming profiles. With this feature, no matter what computer you log into with your name you will get the same documents and settings as the other computer. This is because it actually stores it all on the server instead of your local hard drive.

Pine Mountain Lake Fire Abatement - A Report

Card: Part One By Ken Codeglia

n my last article, I put a calendar "stake-in-the-ground" by referring to the 1994 Pine Mountain Lake Fire Safety Plan. I summarized the plan in three areas:

#1- Private property: property owner efforts to reduce fuel loads on their own property

#2- Greenbelts: 9 parcels owned by the association where no homes will be built

#3- Fuel breaks: in and around Pine Mountain Lake, to offer firefighters defensible space

In this month's article, I want to give you my opinion as a frank and honest appraisal of how well we're doing in reducing the threat of fire in each of those areas. To start, I met with Association staff. We discussed our rules and enforcement procedures for property owner responsibility. On two afternoons we toured all 9 greenbelts and the undeveloped parcels called Units 14 and 16. And we were able to look over a map of firebreaks surrounding PML, created by a 7 year old consortium of agencys called "SWIFT", the South-West Interface Team. As you might expect, the Report Card is mixed.

A Report Card: Good, Bad, Ugly

Let's start with us...us property owners. The good news is that our Association has rules and guidelines about how we are to police our own property. And with the PML Fire Safety Coordinator, Larry Woodruff, we have a readily available resource to help us learn what needs to be done, how to do it, and references to vendors who can do the work for us if we choose.

The Report Card grade of "Good" ap-

plies to the many, many property owners who have done an excellent job of fuel reduction. And they continue to get good grades each year as they battle the constant re-growth.

But the Report Card rating starts to go "Bad" when a closer examination reveals that, to some property owners, complying with our fire safety rules simply means mowing down the weeds that come up each year. They seemed to have ignored the overgrowth of bushes and dead tree limbs close to the ground. Or maybe the front yard looks great but the back yard is a disaster.

But where we get the "Ugly" grade, is mostly in the area of undeveloped lots. Maybe it's because there's no home built and no regular visiting by the property owner, an "out-of-sight, out-of-mind" mental state exists. If people don't come up and walk their property, they don't get a sense of what's needed.

So imagine how odd it is for the property owner who's put in a lot of hard work to clear brush around his home, just to have the overgrown, undeveloped lot next door provide a big threat. 'Hardly seems fair, does it?

How Did It Get This Way? What Should Be Done?

As for good news, the Association does have enforcement procedures to help resolve problems with property owners who've neglected their properties. The bad news is that our current enforcement policies are weak, and it can take up to two years of "discussions" with property owners before action is taken and fuel reduction work is started.

To correct the problem, our General Manager is developing new enforcement procedures to be proposed to the PML Board of Directors. These new procedures would shorten the discussion period and allow the Association to hire a fuel reduction crew and send the bill to the property owner.

As property owners, we need the cooperation of all of our neighbors on this issue. And for those who cannot comply, we need the Association to take action.

Reducing Fuel This Winter- Some Tips

As you get started on this year's fuel reduction efforts, see if it's possible to grind up the slash on site and spread it around for nutrients and soil erosion prevention. Or, you can take the material to the Pine Mountain Lake recycle area. If you must burn your pile, we need to make sure we avoid polluting our neighborhoods with smoke. Make sure you follow these simple rules:

- Have a burn permit

- Burn only on days when burning is allowed
- Make sure your piles have had ample opportunity to dry, especially pine needles
- Make small but concentrated piles that burn hot and create less smoke

Pay Yourself First

o matter how hard you try to avoid it, sometimes it seems like your day-to-day living expenses just eat away at your entire paycheck. Before you know it, the money in your paycheck seems to vanish, and you don't even know where it went. And while you're focused on just making ends meet, putting money

away for the future may be the last thing on your mind. Even so, you need to remember that taking care of your longerterm financial goals is just as important as meeting your current needs.

Ever since the days of putting pennies in a piggybank, you've likely received plenty of advice on the value of saving

A Rebalancing Act

on't put all your eggs in one basket." If this everyday piece of advice comes to mind when thinking about your investments, then you may already understand the importance of a diversified portfolio. But even the most carefully composed investment portfolios can get out of balance from time to time. To make sure your portfolio stays on track to helping you reach your goals, it's important to take the time regularly to rebalance your portfolio to make sure it's still in line with your investment objectives.

Some of the most common reasons your portfolio could get out of balance would involve a change in the ratio of the asset classes in your portfolio, or a change in the value of your various assets. Asset classes refer to the general types of investments that make up your overall investment mix: stocks, bonds, cash, mutual funds and ETFs, to name a few. As the respective values of those various investments change, the proportions in your portfolio will change as well. That's why it's important to check in on your investments to make sure the division of your assets doesn't stray too far from the allocation you want.

To help understand this problem, let's take a look at how your portfolio can get out of balance. Consider a very basic portfolio made up of stocks, bonds and cash. Out of these three asset classes, stocks are likely to see the biggest price fluctuations. If the price of your stock position rises significantly, the overall percentage of stocks in your portfolio grows in relation to the percentage of cash and bonds. The proportion of cash and bonds is therefore decreasing.

This imbalance may increase the volatility of your portfolio as a greater percentage of your assets face a higher level of risk, due to the fact that stocks tend to carry a greater level of risk. At the other end of the spectrum, if your stock prices drop, the percentage of equity assets in your portfolio decreases as well. The risk

is lowered, but so is your opportunity for growth.

Another way to look at it is to consider a hypothetical example with numbers. Let's say you invest \$10,000 in bonds and \$10,000 in stocks at the beginning of the year. By year end, you see that your stake in bonds has grown to \$10,475 (for a return of 4.75 percent on the year) while your stock holdings are now worth \$11,560 (or a 15.6 percent return).

While that's a nice overall return for your portfolio, you'll notice that your investment mix in stocks and bonds has strayed from the even 50-50 you started with at the beginning of the year. At this point, your portfolio is 52.5 percent stocks and 47.5 percent bonds, and at this pace the difference could get much bigger in just a few more years. Rebalancing helps put you back in line with your original allocation.

When your portfolio gets out of balance, it's important to realign your investments by making adjustments in accordance with your long-term strategy. Meeting with your financial consultant on a regular basis to discuss your asset allocation can help you spot significant changes and make the necessary adjustments to get your portfolio back on track.

your money. But when mom and dad aren't taking care of the necessities any more, and you have your own bills to pay, it's easy to lose track and forget to save. As a reminder of just how important it is to put part of your income aside – and to do it sooner, rather than later – take a look at an example of just how the numbers shake out.

For this example we'll use two investors – one who starts early and lets her savings grow, and another who waits until later to begin. Let's say the early investor puts away \$5,000 per year for five years, and then allows that investment to grow for 15 years without putting in another penny. The late investor, on the other hand, waits for 10 years before he even begins his savings plan. He then invests \$5,000 a year for 10 years, putting his total investment at \$50,000 – exactly twice as much as the early investor.

Assuming an eight percent average annual rate of return on their investments, if we jump ahead now to 20 years from the time our two investors started, the difference in their accounts is substantial. Our early investor would have accumulated a total of roughly \$100,493 in her account by this time. Keep in mind she hasn't put a penny of her own money in for the last 15 years. Meanwhile, the late investor's account has grown to only \$78,227, and he has been contributing each year for the past ten years. That means that our early investor only put in half as much of her own money, and came out well over \$20,000 ahead.

Now, this example is only meant to illustrate the advantages of saving regularly and starting early. This does not reflect the performance of any specific investment, nor does it take into account the eventual effects of taxes. It does, however, make the point very clear – by delaying 10 years in getting started, the late investor loses out on the benefits of compounding over a longer period of time.

Disciplined investment habits aren't always easy to come by, but there are several things you can do to improve your savings routine. One of the easiest ways to establish a savings plan is by taking advantage of the convenience of electronic funds transfer (EFT). You may be familiar with this type of service if you currently receive or make electronic deposits to your bank account. This service is also available from other financial services firms, and paying yourself first by using an EFT system can help you get in the habit of saving.


Direct deposit allows you the opportunity to deposit all or part of your paycheck to the account of your choice, so you could choose to set aside a certain portion to go directly to a savings account as opposed to your checking account. Another way to take advantage of EFT is to set up an automatic monthly deposit. This is a simple, disciplined way to add to your account, authorizing a specific amount to be transferred from one of your accounts to another (i.e. from checking to a savings or investment account).

Regardless of which method you choose – or even if you decide on completely different investment strategy – putting aside money now will help you prepare to reach your financial goals that lie further down the road.





The October program meeting featured Kimberlee Reed. M.D., surgeon from SierraCare Surgery. As this is breast cancer awareness month, she was instrumental in keeping us up to date on where we are now with breast health. We were informed that 1 out of 8 women in this country will develop breast cancer. 180,000 women and 1600 men are diagnosed each year. As far as cancer deaths are concerned, breast cancer is the #2 cause with lung cancer being #1. If breast cancer is diagnosed at stage 1, there is a more than 90% survival rate and those will have a normal life span. Most of the risk factors: being female, age, two or more first level relatives, under 40, having breast cancer and those who have dense breast tissue are not under an individual's control. However, Dr. Reed's best advice to minimize risk is to walk/exercise, minimize the alcohol you drink, lose weight and get annual screenings/mammograms. As far as treatment, there seem to be fewer bad side effects with chemotherapy now. She stressed that often a viable alternative to mastectomy is a lumpectomy and radiation treatment. Something being tried with older women is manipulating hormone levels as opposed to the more toxic chemotherapy treatment. Much appreciation to Dr. Reed for her informative talk.



Fall Fire Prevention

any of us, who have been raised around woodstoves and fireplaces, take it for granted that everyone knows how to prevent catastrophic damage such as a structure fire. In my last article I wrote about fire prevention in general terms. In this article I would like to be more specific because fall is upon us. I would like to talk about chimney, or a better term would be flue fires, wood burning appliances, and what to look for when you purchase wood to heat your home.

I would like to explore the physics behind the creosote build up in most chimneys or flues. Heated wood releases hydrocarbon gases. When these gases get hot enough, approx. 1100 degrees F, they mix with air and catch fire. When woodstove or fireplace fires smolder. unburned gases condense and deposit on the stovepipes and the flue as runny acids and liquid tars then harden into creosote. Both a cool flue and steam from green or wet wood encourage this condensation. Pressed logs are not a good option because of creosote and heat issues. They produce much more residue, sooty deposits, in the flue than wood fires. Creosote can appear as any of the following: a sooty powder, a gummy mess, a hard glaze, or a deposit that looks like burnt marshmallows.

I recommend that everyone have their woodstove and flue inspected by a certified chimney sweep professional at least once a year. This will reduce the chance of a flue fire and also let you know, as a homeowner, that your woodstove, piping, flue cap, and screen are in good working order and that bricks and mortar are in good repair.

If you have a flue fire, you can try to prevent the fire from growing, as well as extending into the attic or roof, by throwing a glass of water directly on the fire which will flash into steam, rise up into the flue, inhibit oxygen and snuff out the fire. This should be done in conjunction with turning down the air damper on the front of the stove and closing the doors. This will help keep the fire in the flue and in most cases put the fire out. Get everyone out of the house and keep them a safe distance away. Call 9-1-1 so the local fire department will respond to check for any extension of the fire in the attic and on the roof.

Once the fire has been put out, the chimney or flue should be serviced by a professional to clean and inspect the flue and assess the damage. Your chimney or flue may need to be repaired and relined to make it safe. Do not light another fire in the woodstove or fireplace until you have had the flue or chimney professionally inspected and repaired. To prevent a flue

fire a homeowner should burn smaller, hotter fires using seasoned firewood with a good draft and never air-starve the fire. The heat will quickly warm up the flue and increase the draft, while volatile gases burn up in the stove.

An open flue is an invitation to trouble and sometimes disaster. A flue cap will keep out leaves, critters and birds and protect your flue from the effects of the weather. Rain coming down an open flue mixes with soot or creosote causing unpleasant odors and deterioration of flue walls. It can run down into the stovepipe, stove, fireplace insert or propane stove, where it causes rust damage. It can also rust out the damper. A flue cap can also prevent flaming balls of creosote from spewing out onto your roof if there is a flue fire. Without a flue cap there is a greater potential of a roof fire depending on the roofing material and how well the homeowner has performed yard maintenance by cleaning gutters, pine needles and leaves from the roof.

Another cause of structure fires is careless handling of wood ashes from the fireplace or wood stove. Wood ashes are amazing in their ability to hold heat for several days after a fire has been extinguished. Use a small metal shovel to transfer ashes to a metal bucket with a bail handle. Take it outside and place on bricks, concrete or in a cleared area away from brush, bushes or trees for a couple of days. Never dispose of ashes in a cardboard box or use a vacuum to clean out the fireplace or woodstove. Even minuscule embers can ignite from the draft generated by a vacuum.

I would like to leave you with a few helpful hints when purchasing firewood this season. Firewood should only be purchased by the cord and not by the truckload or by the half or quarter cord. A cord of wood is 4 feet high, 4 feet wide, and 8 feet long, or 128 cubic feet. The most common wood length for woodstoves is 18 inches and fireplaces will usually accept 24 inch lengths. Wood for burning in a woodstove or fireplace should be dry to burn with maximum efficiency. Dry means the wood is aged. When a tree is cut down the wood is green. Depending on the specie, it can take six months to a year of normal storage for wood to season. Hardwoods and softwoods are chemically similar. The difference is density. Hardwoods, being denser, produce a longer lasting fire. Softwoods make good kindling. A telltale sign that wood is seasoned are loosened bark and darkened, dried out and cracked log ends. Well seasoned logs will be lighter in weight than green or partially seasoned logs. Expect to pay more for well seasoned wood.

Carabas Quilts on Display at Columbia College

That the Amish, those plain-living and plainly dressed folk, had a huge influence on mid-20th century art takes a bit of explaining. Eschewing electricity and living where the winters get very cold, they began a tradition of quilt making. Through the early and mid-1900s, Amish women sewed quilts of the most amazing, brilliant color combinations; and they laid these colored fabrics into tight, bold geometric patterns overlaid with creative, mostly floral patterns of stitchery. These quilts, even today, startle with their strong, emotive power.

In the 1950s some artists started collecting these quilts and began to paint in a new, flat style they called geometric hard edge, sometimes copying the quilts and other times, using them as inspiration for the artists' own compositions and color schemes.

Earlier art movements such as Russian suprematism and the constructivist movement had their influences but for large, bold, crisply executed abstract paintings, the main influence of geo, as it came to be called, was Amish quilts.

This brings us to the present day and an artist, Leslie Carabas, who has gone full circle from geo back to quilt making. She freely admits the Amish influence but, with a MFA degree in art from San Francisco State University, she is just as strongly influenced by the geo ethic.

While some of her quilted art such as "Amish Influence #3" looks like a direct steal from the Amish, other pieces, like "Refractions," are very much like an updated constructivist painting. Some of her stitchery flows like Amish sewing while other bits take a strict geometric, linear form. Her approach to color ranges from the most subtle use of tans and grays to brilliant juxtapositions of red and blue, magenta and green.

Amid the great revival of women's craft as politically charged art polemic, Carabas' quilts are a standout smack in the male chauvinist's eye. And yes, we still have male chauvinists among us. Brilliantly conceived and brilliant in their color and execution, these quilts demand everyone's attention and admiration. They are like a sledgehammer.

"Leslie C. Carabas, fiber artist," is currently on display in the Rotunda of the Manzanita Building on the Columbia College campus. Admission is free, although there is a small parking fee. Rotunda hours are: Monday to Thursday, 8 a.m. to 7 p.m. and Fridays from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

A Successful Year at GCSD

This has been a very successful year for GCSD, even in light of the many expensive mandates that have been thrust upon us by the state and federal governments. We completed the upgrade of two water treatment plants. We have completed the upgrades to the major (hub) sewer lift stations and will have several of the minor (satellite) lift stations upgraded by the end of the year. The alternative water supply project will be completed by the end of the year so that we will be ready for the Hetch Hetchy Mountain Tunnel shutdowns. The backlog of financial audits has been completed and we are about ready for the current audit cycle. In our recent bond sales, we saved just under \$5 million over traditional debt programs by using innovative financing methods. Cal OSHA awarded the District a coveted safety award last year and we have been nominated for another one this year. The effectiveness of our fire and rescue response has been increased by adding a firefighter reserve program, at no increase in the fire assessment. And, we have reduced the District's overall labor and operating expenses by about 5% over last year. Here's the status of our major water and sewer projects.

For the past several years GCSD has been busy designing and constructing two new water treatment plants that will allow us to meet the stringent US EPA mandated water quality regulations. I am happy to report that the plants are on line and operational.

The treatment process consists of two methods of disinfection. In the first step, UV light kills bacteria and viruses immediately upon contact. The second method uses chloramines (a combination of chlorine and ammonia) to give long-term disinfection while the water is traveling through the pipes and stored in our reservoirs.

The California Department of Public Health (DPH) is now in the process of issuing the permits for these plants. This is a 6 to 8 month-long process. The first step is to validate the UV disinfection process. With just the UV system in operation, the water from the plants meets or exceeds the regulation requirements for trihalomethane (TTHM) formation. The haloacidic acid (HAA) formation has been reduced by a factor of two and is right at the regulatory requirement. Once the second treatment method (chloramines) is fully incorporated into the treatment process after the DPH validation, the TTHM and HAA numbers will drop dramatically, well under the regulatory requirements.

The other large project that GCSD has undertaken to meet its regulatory mandates is the upgrade of the sewer lift stations. Over the past two years, we have completely rebuilt 5 hub lift stations. We are now rehabilitating the remaining 11 smaller lift stations. These upgrades will help assure that raw sewage does not spill into Pine Mountain Lake, especially during heavy rain events and power outages.

Since late 2004, GCSD has not experienced any sewage spills as a result of lift station failure. And since that time, no sewage has entered Pine Mountain Lake from any sewer source. This is significant, especially given the big rain storms we experienced in 2006, which caused over 11,000 sewage spills across the state. To my knowledge, GCSD was the only sewer agency in the central Sierra Foothills that did not have a sewer spill during these rain events. This is a big change since the days of chronic sewage spills into the lake that we experienced back in 2000 and 2001.

We at the District are very proud of our recent accomplishments. Our success comes from a dedicated and well-trained staff, as well as a Board of Directors that has given us the resources to do our jobs well, while reducing the overall operating expenses of the District. I would like to thank you, our customers, for your patience over the past several years as we have come a long way in successfully healing an ailing community services district.

Nov. 10, Sat. Day Hike (2B) Mohegan Mine trail, Groveland area. Hike 8 miles, roundtrip and 1500 feet down on an abandoned gold mine trail to the Wild and Scenic Tuolumne River. We pass by limestone deposits, artifacts from early day mining activities and note the varied vegetation in the lower Sierra foothills forest and chaparral ecologic zones. At the river are California Fuchsia with their bright red trumpet-shaped bloom. This fall is

when Kokanee salmon from Don Pedro reservoir journey up the river to spawn and later die. These fish can be seen if conditions are right. If there was a campfire gathering with music, Juni was there with her guitar, singing the songs of the west she'd learned from her father. In 1984 she moved to Santa Ynez, CA, to train cutting horses.

Members of the noted Rancheros Vistadores, an elite group of ranchers from across the nation, noticed her singing around town, which led her to working L.A. area clubs with a popular country band which was also playing western and cowboy music.

Juni's ability to ride at speed across the hills found her working as a fox hunting professional, and she accepted a position with a hunt club in Tennessee. Point to point racing, steeple chasing, and horse trials took the place of cow horses while she honed her songwriting skills amongst some of Nashville's finest. She and her husband keep two favorite horses these days, living in Franklin, Tennessee.

Juni Fisher is a lot easier to find these days, performing at venues across the country. Through radio and word of mouth, the work and the kudos keep rolling in.

Sweet Potato Bread Pudding with Orange-Nutmeg Sauce

(serves 6; 4 x 2-2/3" piece bread pudding & 2 tablespoons sauce per serving)

Vegetable oil spray 4 slices whole-wheat bread 2 tablespoons fat-free or light tub margarine

1/3 cup dried apricot halves, diced

3/4 cup canned sweet potatoes in light syrup, drained

3/4 cup fat-free milk

Egg substitute equivalent to 2 eggs, or 2 large eggs

1/3 cup firmly packed light brown sugar 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon

1/8 teaspoon ground allspice

1/4 cup chopped pecans

3/4 cup fat-free or low-fat vanilla yogurt 1 teaspoon grated orange zest

1/4 teaspoon ground nutmeg

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Lightly spray an 8" square baking pan with vegetable spray.

Spread the bread slices with a thin coating of margarine. Cut into 1/2" cubes. Put bread cubes in baking pan and stir in apricots.

In medium bowl, mash sweet potatoes, whisk in milk, egg substitute, brown sugar, cinnamon and allspice. Pour over bread mixture and then sprinkle with pecans.

Bake for 50 to 55 minutes, until toothpick inserted in center comes out clean. Let cool for 5 minutes before cutting. Place pieces in small serving bowls.

Sauce: In small bowl, whisk together yogurt, orange zest and nutmeg. Cover and refrigerate until ready to serve. Spoon 2 tablespoons sauce over each serving.







Over the course of the dinner, guests







Lunar Eclipse - Part 2

ast month, in the October issue of the Pine Mountain Lake News, I discussed the total lunar eclipse that occurred in August. A lunar eclipse occurs when the Moon passes through some portion of the Earth's shadow. As you might expect, this can occur only when the Sun, Earth, and Moon are aligned exactly, or very closely so, with the Earth in the middle. Just such an alignment took place in the early morning hours of August 28th.

I decided to take a series of photographs, over a 4 hour period, to document the entire lunar eclipse event. The equipment set up for these photographs consisted of a digital SLR camera attached to a telescope that is mounted on a motor driven telescope mount. A photograph of this setup was printed in the October issue of the Pine Mountain Lake News.

As most people know, the sky is in continuous movement. The most obvious indication of this movement is the movement of our sun during the day – rising in the east and setting in the west. Our entire planet rotates around the north and south pole axis. The purpose of a motor driven telescope mount is to "track" the movement of the sky in a way that keeps the objects being viewed in the telescope (or camera in my case) centered within the field of view. Lunar photography is less demanding on a telescope mount than deep sky objects (galaxies, nebula,

star clusters, etc.) because the photographic exposure time is short - on the order of thousands of a second to several seconds.

This lunar eclipse was scheduled to begin at 1:51 AM (PDT) on the morning of August 28th and end at 5:24 AM. By 11 PM the night before, I already had my equipment set up and began taking photographs of the full moon. An eclipse of the Moon only occurs during a full Moon and only if the Moon passes through some portion of the Earth's shadow. The Moon does not completely disappear, even during a total lunar eclipse because of the refraction of sunlight by the Earth's atmosphere.

The Earth's shadow is composed of two cone-shaped components, one nested inside the other. The outer or penumbral shadow is a zone where the Earth blocks part but not all of the Sun's ravs from reaching the Moon. The inner or umbral shadow is a region where the Earth blocks all direct sunlight from reaching the Moon - this is when things get exciting. During a lunar eclipse, the moon can appear various shades of yellow, orange, and red because sunlight reaching the Moon must pass through a long and dense layer of the Earth's atmosphere, where the light is scattered. Shorter wavelengths are more likely to be scattered by the small particles and so by the time the light has passed through the atmosphere, the longer wavelengths dominate. This resulting light we perceive as red. This is the same effect that causes sunsets and sunrises to turn the sky a reddish color. The amount of refracted light depends on the amount of dust or clouds in the atmosphere.

The lunar eclipse photograph printed in this article is a series of 14 separate images of the moon taken during various times/phases of the eclipse. The time-line begins at the top of the photograph (12 o'clock position) with a full moon and moves clockwise. As you circle clockwise around this photograph you can see earth's shadow begin to cover the view of the moon. At first glance, this may appear like the normal phases of the moon that you view in the sky each month except these views of the moon are taking place over a 4 hour period instead of the 29.5 day cycle that it takes for the moon to go from "full moon" to "new moon." At the bottom of this composite photograph (6 o'clock position), the moon was completely in the earth's shadow.

This lunar eclipse experience was spectacular. It was amazing to watch the moon go from full, to a small crescent, to total eclipse, and back to full again. I

took over 300 photographs to create this final composite of 14 images. The moon "phased" through many shades of orange and red, and the night sky went from being so bright during the full moon that I could barely see the North Star, to so dark during the total eclipse that I could easily see the Milky Way.

Unlike solar eclipses, lunar eclipses are completely safe to watch. You don't need any kind of protective filters. It isn't even necessary to use a telescope.





Handcrafts, skateboarding contests, and on and on.

Land Donation Agreement Expires

MODESTO, CA – The deadline for delivery of a donation parcel to build a West Side outreach site of Modesto Junior College in Patterson expired on September 30, 2007. Although the donor's valiant plan to donate 28 acres to the Yosemite Community College District (YCCD) fell through, YCCD still plans to expand its presence on the West Side.

According to YCCD Chancellor Roe Darnell, "In the next 2-3 weeks, we will begin the process of developing an educational plan for each of the outreach sites identified in Measure E – West Side, Calaveras, Turlock and Oakdale. Our goal will be to have the educational plans completed shortly.

Faculty and the communities being served will be involved in developing the plan. This planning, however, will not delay the District from exploring offers for site acquisition on the West Side," stated Dr. Darnell.

"Just the opposite is true," according to Darnell. "We know that the ideal site will be at least 20 acres and that we must move quickly to finalize site acquisition because the need for a college outreach site on the West Side is very high." Because of contractual obligations, the

District was exclusively committed to the 28-acre site in Patterson. The District will now entertain other offers. YCCD Trustee Anne DeMartini, whose trustee area includes the West Side, stated "the District will continue to aggressively seek land to secure a West Side site. We have a commitment to the West Side and expect to hear from other potential partners that will enable us to provide educational services to serve the West Side's needs."

YCCD passed a \$326.1 million general obligation bond in November 2004, of which \$5 million was earmarked for a West Side Center. In an effort to leverage those dollars as much as possible, the District entered into the land donation agreement with Mr. Miroyan. After revising the location of the parcel, amending the agreement, and initiating preliminary feasibility and environment studies on the parcel, the District committed to the site with the stipulation that the donor provide free and clear title by September 30, 2007. Darnell stated, "We thank Sperry Road for the opportunity and their hard work in trying to make the donation happen, but the District is obligated to move on."
