



#### **Lake Dredging Project**

Back in June, Tuolumne County sent out a letter and survey to all residents located within 1000 feet of the Lake Dredging project site. I would like to thank all of the PML members that participated in the survey and expressed their opinions. We have obtained copies of all returned surveys and plan to use the information during the permit process. It is encouraging and helpful when we receive positive support for the maintenance of our amenities.

An important part of the Lake Dredging Project is the permit process. Permits are required from several agencies before we can begin dredging. So far, we have met with Tuolumne County, the Regional Water Quality Control Board and the Department of Fish and Game. We have scheduled a meeting with the Army Corps of Engineers for September. We are happy that the permit process is moving forward and will keep members updated as the project progresses

#### **Neighborhood Watch**

As part of the ongoing effort to fight crime in PML, a grassroots effort is beginning to form with members participating in and forming their own Neighborhood Watch Programs. The Association is also involved in communicating and supporting these efforts. If you are interested in starting a program in your neighborhood, please review the following information.

• Become acquainted with your neighbors and what seems to be normal in and around your general neighborhood. Note in detail any suspicious persons, vehicles (attempt to obtain license plate numbers) or circumstances. Coordinate with your neighbors, including those who are not full time residents, and watch each other's homes and the general area. Exchange

telephone numbers with your neighbors as appropriate. Take the initiative to organize your neighborhood into a neighborhood watch group. Do not attempt to actually enforce the law yourself.

- Watch for strangers in the neighborhood and around homes where you do not think they belong.
- A scream heard anywhere might mean a robbery, assault, or someone requiring assistance.
- The sound of breaking glass or other loud sounds could indicate an accident, burglary, vandalism, etc.
- Persons loitering around schools, parks, and/or secluded areas should be of specific interest.
- Anyone forcing or attempting to force entrance into, or tampering with, a residence, business, or vehicle. Someone loading property into a parked car from a home or closed business, day or night, which appears suspicious.
- One or more person's walking casually through the neighborhood looking into cars, yards, and generally acting suspicious
- Persons running for no apparent reason, especially if they are carrying property, and/or exhibiting unusual mental or physi-

#### 1) Board Announcements

President Scott made the following announcements:

A) Executive Sessions

Executive Sessions were held June 9, 2006 - Discussed litigation and other legal matters.

B) Special Board Meeting

MARINA MANAGER BARBARA BARNES, 1/118, commented on reports of noise from the moored boats and responsibility of boat captains to ensure wavier forms are signed.

GENERAL MANAGER, JOE POW-ELL commented on insurance coverage and legal review.

DENNIS DECANT, 4/080, stated if area by dam were opened, Big Creek congestion would not be an issue as the dam area would be preferable.

DIRECTOR HART asked if we could incorporate swimmer's registration with the boat registration each year.

DIRECTOR MARGOSSIAN made a motion to accept the amendments to Resolution #00.06 with the changes to hours and wording for publishing in the PML News. Director Hart seconded. The motion passed unanimously.

MARILYN HATHAWAY, 1/438, suggested being consistent with rules of swimming from boat or from dock.

BARBARA BARNES, 1/118, stated the rules would have to be specific for each area.

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#### DRAFT RESOLUTION

#### PINE MOUNTAIN LAKE ASSOCIATION BOARD OF DIRECTORS POLICY RELATING TO LOT MERGERS

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors of Pine Mountain Lake Association is granted by the First Restated Declaration of Restrictions, Article III, Section 7 (a) the power to propose, enact and amend rules and regulations of general application to the Owners of Lots within the Properties; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors of Pine Mountain Lake Association is granted by the First Restated Declaration of Restrictions, Article II, Section 7 (a) and (b) the power to amend or repeal rules and regulations of general application to the Owners of Lots within the Properties; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors at a duly noticed February 18, 2006 meeting of the PMLA Board of Directors, enacted a moratorium on lot mergers effective April 1, 2006 for a period of 120 days. At a duly noticed PMLA Board of Director's meeting on July 15, 2006, the Board extended the moratorium until September 9, 2006. The purpose of the moratorium was to allow the Board the opportunity to review and study the Association's current policies concerning mergers and demergers, to solicit member input and mitigate the erosion of the Association's yearly assessment base. Since the announcement of the moratorium, the Board has discussed and received member input on mergers and demergers; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors of Pine Mountain Lake Association finds that the allowance of lot mergers within the Association directly causes an erosion of the assessment base and places an additional unfair burden on the other property owners;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RE-SOLVED that the Board of Directors for Pine Mountain Lake Association adopts the following resolution:

#### 1. Repeal of Resolution No. 90-.05

Resolution No. 90-.05, adopted by the Board of Directors on April 2, 1990 is hereby repealed.

- **2. Lot Merger:** It is now the general policy of Pine Mountain Lake Association that Lot Mergers are not allowed as being inconsistent with the goals of the Association as a whole unless a variance is recommended by the Environmental Control Committee and approved by the Board of Directors.
- **3. Variance Procedure:** Members seeking a variance must submit an application to the Environmental Control Committee pursuant to the procedures set forth at Article VIII, Section 20 of the First Restated Declaration of Restrictions. All applications for a variance must meet the following conditions.

#### a. Compelling Justification

The Lot Owner in his/her application for a variance must show a compelling justification for the lot merger as determined by the Environmental Control Committee and the Board of Directors.

b. Assessments

The Lot Owner must agree to continue to pay the yearly and special assessments for each separate lot merged; and

c. Other Rules

The Lot Owners must still comply with all other zoning and permitting rules promulgated by the Board of Directors or other laws enacted by the County of Tuolumne or other regulatory agencies.

#### 4. Effective Date:

This resolution will become effective

cal symptoms and persons taking shortcuts through others property.

- Human traffic to and from a residence on an unusually frequent basis.
- Vehicles moving slowly through a neighborhood, especially if without lights on at night, and occupied parked vehicles of a suspicious nature.
- A beam of light such as a flashlight in a neighbor's home or a business.
- Be generally alert to what is normal or not normal in your neighborhood.

#### **NOTIFICATION:**

If a routine matter, telephone the PML Department of Safety at 962-8615;

If an obvious crime, but not urgent, telephone the Tuolumne County Sheriff's Department at 533-5815 and then notify the PML Department of Safety that you have notified the Sheriff's Department.

If an obvious serious crime, telephone the Tuolumne County Sheriff's Department emergency number of 911 and then

notify the PML Department of Safety that you have notified the Sheriff's Department of an emergency situation.

- If you become aware of any safety hazards within PML notify the Department of Safety of the circumstances and
- If you see someone intentionally damaging PML gates or reflector signs, or vandalizing PML or private property, report the circumstances, location, and descriptions of persons and vehicles to the PML Department of Safety.
- If you observe a serious traffic violation, obtain a description of the vehicle and license number if possible. Do not attempt to take action yourself. Unfortunately some people, including property owners, exceed the speed limit within PML and intentionally fail to stop at posted stop signs. This disregard for traffic regulations places others at risk with the potential for serious injuries.
- Even though the PML Department of Safety, Tuolumne County Sheriff's Department, and California Highway Patrol patrol the area, each citizen needs to be

alert to Public Safety matters and be willing to testify as necessary.

• It is suggested that residents take the initiative to start an informal Neighborhood Watch Program in their own neighborhood. One person in a neighborhood can simply contact neighbors, including off the hill property owners, in a logical radius of their residence and coordinate the exchange of telephone numbers. The person who organizes this informal Neighborhood Watch Program and exchange of telephone numbers could provide their name and telephone number to the PML Safety Department. Neighborhood Watch meetings would not necessarily be needed to organize an informal program. The above information could be utilized as a handout. One person could collect the appropriate telephone numbers and (with the permission of each person) prepare a list of residents and telephone numbers in the neighborhood, again including off the hill people, and then provide the list to the appropriate residents.

The plaintiffs, Ken Lett and Mel Kauffman, are former members of the PMLA Board of Directors. The allegations in the complaint generally assert malfeasance and suggest other improprieties by the present board, some past board members and their decisions while serving in that capacity. THESE ALLEGATIONS ARE FALSE and the Association and the board members intend to vigorously defend themselves. We have obtained legal counsel and intend to prove that all decisions made by the board members who have been falsely accused were done pursuant to their authority and with the utmost respect for the appropriate guidelines allowed under the bylaws and other

We are certainly disappointed that the Association will spend monies defending itself in what we believe is a meritless case, especially when the Association could otherwise spend these monies on the legitimate business of the Association. 



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## A Look Ahead for Groveland Fire Department

The Groveland Fire Department provides a vital service to the communities in southern Tuolumne County. It is the third busiest department by call volume in the county, behind the

County Fire Department and Sonora Fire Department. With the exception of the County Fire Department, we have the largest service area of any fire department in the county.





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One problem we face in the south county is that the County/CDF fire station in Groveland is only manned 6 months out of the year. During the winter, our backup from Sonora is nearly 45 minutes away. And with the recent defeat of the county sales tax that would have supported the fire and sheriff's departments, the future of these backup services is called into question.

Today, about 56 percent of the call volume for the Groveland Fire Department is for medical aid, which is understandable considering that the average age in Groveland is about 55. Vehicle accidents, wild fires, and structure fires account for 9, 3, and 2 percent, respectively. The remaining 30 percent includes false alarms, public assistance (like hanging banners across Highway 120), and smoke checks. Each of these responses requires different training and equipment.

The Groveland Fire Department has undergone profound changes over the past 10 to 15 years. We've grown from an all volunteer fire department to a combination full-time and volunteer fire department. In 2003 we had six full-time fire fighters and the fire chief, backed up by 19 volunteers. Today, we have six full-time fire fighters and the fire chief, plus a currently vacant fire captain position, backed up by 11 volunteers. Though the volunteers have done a great job, their numbers have dwindled over the years.

One of the disturbing trends we see is the ability of the volunteer force to adequately back up the full-time fire fighting force. Two things challenge our use of volunteers. First, volunteers may not be available to respond to a call-out because they work out of the area. The second and more important issue is that volunteers today must not only meet minimum initial training but must continue to train. The initial training takes over six months several nights per week plus Saturdays. Once this training is completed, volunteers must participate in mandatory, on-going training. This commitment of time has reduced the volunteer force. The result has been higher overtime costs for the District.

To explore this challenge, as well as other issues that need attention in the fire department, such as training, equipment and building maintenance, and response times, the District Board of Directors directed staff to hire a firm to develop a master plan for the department. For example, the master plan will explore our fire engine inventory and recommend the types of apparatus we need, what its life expectancy should be, and how we can pay for it. We will also explore the benefits of having a second fully staffed fire station near the airport.

As part of the master planning process, the District will be sending out a questionnaire to poll our customers about the level of service they want and are willing to pay for. Depending on the recommendations presented in the master plan and the input from our customers, the District may decide to place a change in the existing fire assessment before a vote of property owners in 2007. During the planning process, the District will hold several public hearings to present information and to hear from the public.

The Groveland Fire Department is owned by you and for this reason your input to this process is vital.

## Genealogy Chat by Peggy Andrews

The Chat Club took their July meeting on the road to the Northern Mariposa County History Center,in Coulterville. Many thanks to our guides Gail Tyler, curator and Virginia Bruch and Ellen Fiske, members of the Accessions Committee, for giving our group a wonderful tour of the museum located behind the restored steam engine "Whistling Billy".

The earliest legal description of the build is dated June 1, 1863, when George Coulter, founder of the town, sold it to Augustus Olney. Over the years the building changed hands several times and was eventually bought by Vernon C. Pepper, who operated the drug store as a commercial museum. Mr. Pepper sold the building on July 18th, 1976, to the Coulterville Community Club to be developed as a public museum for Northern Mariposa County. The museum was paid for in 1980, through memberships and contributions, and volunteers began working to restoring the historic

building which had been damaged by fire and rebuild only to be burned again.

The museum truly has something for everyone, with it's revolving exhibits related to pioneer families, the old Rush and mining operations. The museum also houses a wonderful collection of clothing and accessories worn by early residents and for the children, or the child in all of us, there are toys, and hands-on exhibits.

Even though located in Mariposa County, Coulterville and Groveland share many of the same early Tuolumne County, families. Those of you doing research in Tuolumne County would probably benefit from a trip to Coulterville and the Museum and those of you who love history and are looking for a day trip back in time, this is a trip for you.

## The Gathering Place Bid for GCSD Land Delayed by Sharon Hunt

The Gathering Place met with the GCSD Board during their regular board meeting on June 28th to present their case for moving forward with GCSD's Intent to Provide land for the building. Paul Bunt and Catherine Santa Maria handed the Board our completed Business Plan. The design for the Gathering Place building was presented by Dick Pollock, our architect. Prior to making the design presentation, Mr. Pollock had walked the Rhode Island Mine land on the hill above Mary's Park to ensure the proper requirements were included. The GCSD Board deferred to their lawyer to give a legal option as to the authority of whether they could donate or lease the site.

At the July 10th GCSD Board meeting the Gathering Place was given a two page document by Vicki Hartigan, Esq, the GCSD lawyer. Here is a summary of the document.

"The District has been reviewing alternatives by which it can authorize the use of District property by Southside Seniors Services, Inc. ("SSSI") dba the Gathering Place, a non-profit private corporation, for the construction and operation of a senior center. In particular, the District has taken into consideration whether it can sell or

lease the real property to SSSI for the construction of a senior center.

Since SSSI is a private non-profit organization the District can only sell the land to SSSI at full market value as set forth in Government Code Section 54220.

A continuing contractual relationship with SSSI, such as a long-term ground lease upon which SSSI would construct a community center for the benefit of seniors and others, would be permissible provided the criteria is satisfied, i.e. the lease promotes one of the purposes for which the District was formed and does not constitute an unconstitutional gift of public funds.

The parties could agree that the building constructed by the non-profit corporation upon District property will become District property at the end of the lease as partial consideration for the lease."

During the last four years the SSSI Board has worked diligently to establish a professional relationship with GCSD. We have asked the community what they wanted in a center for active adults, we have written our five year Strategic Plan, applied for grants, developed a Business Plan, designed the building, and held numerous community thank you events

along with our signature fund raiser, Cinco de Mayo. For the last two years we have meet with GCSD as a sub committee to move this project along. During this time 500 persons signed a petition saying we want an active adult center in Groveland.

GCSD is now developing a land use

plan before any further action can be taken. Therefore, the Gathering Place site is on hold pending further developments and opportunities. Despite this delay the SSSI Board is committed to making the dream of the Gathering Place a reality for our community.



Squeezing More From Your Gas Tank

Is your budget choking over the increase in automobile fuel costs? Try easing the pain by joining a car pool, taking public transportation, or hopping on a bicycle. In the meantime, these suggestions will help you stretch your gas dollars:

**Take it easy** – Aggressive driving can lower your gas mileage by 33 percent on the highway and by 5 percent around town.

**Act like a tortoise** – Every five miles per hour you drive over 60 mph is like paying an additional \$0.20 per gallon of gas. Avoid jackrabbit starts at red lights.

**Clean it out –** An extra 100 pounds in your vehicle could reduce your miles per gallon by up to 2 percent. Smaller vehicles are affected more than larger ones.

**Shut 'er down –** Idling wastes gas after two minutes. If you anticipate a longer wait, turn the engine off.

**Go cruisin' –** Using cruise control on the highway helps you maintain a constant speed and–in most cases–will save gas.

**Gear up** – When you shift into overdrive, the engine speed goes down, which saves gas and reduces engine wear.

**Be a hummer** – A finely tuned engine with good timing, new spark plugs, and a clean air filter will have you singing.

# The Five Most Important Estate Planning Documents

ost investors avoid estate planning because it usually involves unpleasant topics such as death, incapacity and taxes. But no matter your age or how much money you have, you need an estate plan to protect yourself, your family and your assets. Before preparing your estate plan, you should understand some of the key documents involved in the planning process.

Will. A will provides instructions for distributing your assets to your family and other beneficiaries upon your death and names a personal representative, or executor, to distribute these assets. Your attorney can customize its provisions to meet your needs and your stated wishes. If you have minor children, you can also designate a guardian for them.

To be effective, a will must be filed in probate court. The court oversees payment of liabilities and the distribution of assets and your personal representative will usually have to hire an attorney. Because a will does not take effect until you die, it cannot provide for management of your assets if you become incapacitated. Additional documents

will be needed for incapacity issues.

**Durable power of attorney.** A power of attorney is a legal document in which you name another person to act on your behalf. This person is called your agent or attorney-in-fact and can be given broad or limited management powers. It is important to keep in mind, you should choose this person carefully because he or she will generally be able to sell, invest and spend your assets.

A traditional power of attorney terminates upon your disability or death. However, a durable power of attorney will continue during a period of incapacity to ensure your affairs are addressed in a timely and efficient manner. A durable power of attorney will also terminate upon your death.

Health care power of attorney. A durable power of attorney for health care authorizes someone to make medical decisions for you in the event you are unable to do so yourself. This document can be invaluable for avoiding family conflicts and possible court intervention should you become unable to make your own health care decisions.

Living will. A living will expresses your intentions regarding the use of life-sustaining measures in the event of a terminal illness. It expresses what you want but does not give anyone the authority to speak for you. Therefore, this document combined with a health care power of attorney is essential to express your intentions should you not be able to do so.

**Revocable living trust.** There are many different types of trusts with different purposes, each accomplishing a variety of

goals. A revocable living trust is one type of trust often used in an estate plan. You can change a revocable trust's provisions at any time during your life and if you act as your own trustee, you continue to manage your investment and financial affairs. By transferring assets into a revocable trust, you can provide for continued management of your financial affairs during your lifetime, at your death, and even for generations to come. Your revocable living trust lets those assets in the trust avoid probate and reduces the chance that your personal information will become part of public records.

Once you have executed the appropriate documents for your estate planning needs, you should review them periodically to make sure they remain current given any changes in your situation. Creating your estate plan may not be as overwhelming as you imagined. By working with a team of professionals, including your financial consultant, CPA and attorney, you can create a solid estate plan.



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

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## **Strike at Half Dome**

n Friday, September 15th at 7: 30 pm in the Groveland Community Hall, you can see and hear about a gripping episode on Half Dome in which two hikers were killed and three critically injured by lightning. Bob Madgic, author of Shattered Air. A True Account of Catastrophe and Courage on Yosemite's Half Dome, will address The Southern Tuolumne County Historical Society (STCHS, pronounced stitches) in a special meeting on the eve of Groveland's 49er Festival. STCHS also runs the Groveland Yosemite Gatewav Museum.

As with The Perfect Storm and Into Thin Air, Shattered Air is a gripping account of recklessness, tragedy, courage and rescue, a book whose depiction of Nature's fearsome power is tempered by unforgettable portraits of human courage and the will to survive. Bob, a writer on the outdoors and a Half Dome hiking vet, presents a visually stunning power point program entitled, "Strike at Half Dome." It begins with an overview of Yosemite: its art legacy, natural and conservation history, and stunning physical features; it then relates the story of the five hikers who began their ascent on July 27, 1985, in the face of an imminent thunderstorm. In an eerie foreshadowing event, lightning killed a hiker in nearby Kings Canyon National Park earlier that same day. On Half Dome that evening, two successive lightning strikes left two dead and three gravely wounded. Other hikers arrived on the scene and administered medical treatment for over five hours that kept the victims alive before a harrowing midnight helicopter rescue evacuated the victims from the summit.

Were there conflicting versions about what happened and why? How has our understanding of lightning changed since then? Are most people misinformed about how to avoid lightning? Bring your own questions and get the answers to these. Every meeting attendee will be entered

## No Satellite Treatment Plant by Dan Levin at Long Gulch Ranch

If GCSD approves the annexation of Long Gulch Ranch, there will not be a satellite treatment plant as proposed in the developer's Preliminary Design Report. Rather, the existing wastewater treatment facility will be upgraded. This decision was reached at an August 10th meeting at GCSD's offices that included the developer's consultant, RBF, and GCSD's consultant, Kennedy/Jenks.

"Our review concluded that the longterm interests of the community would best be served by expanding and upgrading our existing facility," said Jim Goodrich, GCSD's General Manager.

Dan Levin, the local resident who is a general partner in the project, concurred, adding, "One of the benefits of the satellite plant had been the ability to ensure that GCSD's existing customers do not subsidize any of the work done at Long Gulch Ranch. However, the consensus was that GCSD would be able to provide an accounting to demonstrate that this would not occur." The final decision, however,

rests with the GCSD Board of Directors after one or more public hearings in September and October.

If approved, the work for Long Gulch Ranch would probably be done at the same time as some of the State-mandated improvements to the existing wastewater treatment plant.

The two consulting firms, both based in Sacramento, will meet to agree on certain key assumptions and a revised report will be prepared and submitted for review in September. A vote on the annexation could occur in early October.

Long Gulch Ranch was approved by the County in 1996 for the development of 372 homes on 1,158 acres. Annexation to GCSD for water and sewer services was one of the conditions of the approval. The Preliminary Design Report was the first step in GCSD's review. The PDR can be viewed on GCSD's website (www.gcsd.org), or a copy can be obtained from Dan Levin (962-0875).

### Moving Our Community's Visions into Work Projects

orthern Yosemite Corridor Partners, Inc. (NYCPI) was formed by Groveland/Big Oak Flat residents following the Community Visioning meeting held at the Groveland Community Hall in January, 2005.

The all-volunteer team has been working steadily, building the organizational infrastructure needed to move the communities' visions toward reality and to sustain the work over the long haul. That included getting 501(c) 3 status as a nonprofit corporation, adopting bylaws, and electing officers, as well as supporting various measures that aligned with the communities' visions. A new website is under construction and will be the home of the group's documents and records, project updates, and related communication links.

A major accomplishment has been the publication of a "Community Visioning Source Document" from the community's work on January 14-15, 2005. Over 140 residents attended those meetings and wrote 838 separate visions. The document synthesizes those visions. Five major categories emerged: Downtown and its Venues, Economic Development, Livable Communities, Open Space and Wildlife Preservation, and the Corridor Planning Process, complete with specific components. The NYCPI team adopted draft Goal Statements for all five of these categories. They can soon be seen at the new website, www.nycpi.org, coming

online in mid-October. They also will serve as input to the County as it drafts a Groveland/Big Oak Flat Area Plan.

The "Community Visioning Source Document" can be seen now at the GCSD website (www.gcsd.org). Copies are available to read at the library and GCSD office. Service organizations received copies of the "Community Visioning Source Document" so they might select aspects of the visions for projects.

On May 20th, a public Community Meeting was held where approximately 30 attendees selected goals where they personally wanted to put their energy. Five table groups, representing the different vision categories, met to launch projects they could work on and shared their work with the larger group. These project teams are meeting to continue work on their selected projects, many of which will move into higher gear in the fall. Project updates will be posted on the new NYCPI website.

All citizens in the Groveland/Big Oak Flat area are invited to participate, both in NYCPI meetings and as part of the project teams working to improve and sustain our communities. NYCPI Board meets on the third Wednesday at First American Title from 4:00 to 6:00 PM. 

#### **Fall Planting in the Foothills**

fter moving from the Central Coast to Groveland, we were initially in shock at how high Groveland summer temperatures soared, especially this last summer! Soon we got used to it (like most of us); yet thank goodness for those cool days of fall to offset the hot days of summer! Our newly planted gardens can experience the same kind of heat shock as we do. Until they get established for a few months they are, like many new transplants to the Groveland area, just getting 'settled'. That is why it is so important to give our new plantings an extra hand by planting in the fall when temperatures are cool and months of rain are on their way.

Fall is the best time to plant many perennials, shrubs, trees, and spring flowering bulbs. It is a great time to savor the autumn air in your garden, plant foundation plants, and mulch existing ones. Here are a few reasons why Fall is the best time to plant in the foothill areas:

- lessens transplant shock
- easier digging
- · less transpiration (water evapora-
- soil has an easier time retaining moisture, and therefore is easier on root systems
- long winter rains help establish

deep root systems for next summer

- better daytime temperatures for you and your plant
- deep winter established root systems can help defend your plant against next summer/fall deer foraging.

Here is a checklist of a few other activities to do while in your foothill garden:

- 1. Make sure to plant perennials and evergreens first, (by November) giving their root structures 6 weeks to settle in before any hard winter frosts.
- 2. This is the time to divide many perennials (grasses and flowering plants) and spring flowering bulbs.
- 3. Early fall is the time to seed or re-seed and aerate your lawn.
- 4. Cover your plants with a good couple inches of mulch to help protect and insulate against any hard winter freezes.
- 5. Start 'hardening off' any sensitive plants that may not make it through the winter temperatures. Bring them onto covered porches or cover with Christmas outdoor lights to keep frosts from harming leaves.







This made for really great wall décor since walls were the best way to display a publication while it was in progress. Illustrations were all done by hand, so if something got messed up, you didn't have the luxury of starting from the point before the mess-up.

The color we see today had to be manually created and/or cut out of what is called "rubylithe" or done with film positives or negatives. What a job that was! Creating intricate jobs using this technique took weeks! Now it just takes days.

The dark room was a lot of fun back then too. Well before the fun started in Adobe Photoshop, David & Christina had fun dodging and burning in an actual dark room. Tools needed were made out of tape, paper clips and cardboard, or pretty much whatever worked Now our darkroom is in our computer.

dog park in Groveland moved a step closer to becoming a reality when Jim Knudson's presentation was favorably received by the GCSD Board of Directors at their regular meeting on August 14th. This would be a fenced facility where dogs could run free and socialize with each other while their owners did the same.

While Leon Rose Baseball Field is being considered as a temporary site, the Board is also considering creating a dog park in their upcoming review of the uses for GCSD's land. In the meantime, Knudson will meet with Board President Gus Allegri and General Manager Jim Goodrich to discuss using the ball field as a temporary facility.

Concerns were expressed about the field being left clean for subsequent recreational uses. I attended the meeting and let the group know that I am personally in favor of the shared use of facilities that aren't being utilized to their fullest extent. As a local coach, I also expressed my negative concerns in regards to not using the field during the high school's baseball and softball seasons.

Jim Knudson gestured to the fifteen supporters who accompanied him to the meeting, stating that he would coordinate a group of dog owners who would scour the field to ensure it was always left clean. These same people would also provide the volunteer labor to create the fenced-in area should GCSD agree to designate some of it's land for a dog park.

Knudson also expressed his appreciation for the forum Groveland Citizens provided for him to launch this effort. "The breakfast was delicious," he said, "and I appreciated the support expressed by the group at their regular monthly meeting in July."

Groveland Citizens sponsors a breakfast on the third Sunday of each month at the Community Hall. A meeting to discuss ways to improve Groveland is held at 11:00 AM, at the conclusion of the breakfast. The cost is \$5, with children free, for a meal prepared by Chef Victor from the Hotel Charlotte. The next one is scheduled for Sunday, September 17th, the day after the annual '49ers parade.

#### **Groveland Citizens maintain** access to health care services

Tith as much information written about Tuolumne General Hospital in the past year, one would think that the public would have understanding regarding the status of the various programs and services offered by TGH. Unfortunately, the opposite is true. The volumes of newsprint have caused many to become confused about the status of services, which will remain and which will be closed. Of surprise to some is that most services at the hospital, including Acute Care, Intensive Care, Inpatient and Outpatient General Surgery, and 24 hour Emergency Room services, are fully operational at the present time.

Groveland residents are especially concerned about maintaining health care services in their community. Of relief to many is that Mother Lode Physical Therapy in Groveland will continue full operations. The Groveland Physical Therapy Center is a viable service of Tuolumne General Hospital and a needed service in this community.

The Adult Day Health Care Center in Sonora is fully operational and accepting new participants. Groveland ADHC participants were able to continue to participate in the program by attending the Sonora site. The Groveland ADHC satellite suspended operations in July.

Over the next several months, the scope of services at Tuolumne General Hospital is expected to change. The five services that will make up the core of the new non-acute health care system

include: Adult Day Health Care, Acute Psychiatric Center, Mother Lode Medical Center, Family Health & Wellness Center, and Long Term Care.

Other Ancillary Services of the hospital, which will continue operations, include: Radiology, Ultrasound, CT Scan, Lab, Respiratory Therapy, an Urgent Care Center, and Cardiac Rehabilitation.
