The August 16th Annual Member's meeting was the changing of the guard, or in this case, changing of the President of the Board. Ron Maguire retired after three long years of Herculean efforts and Ian Morcott joined the Board as Director at large.

I cannot thank Ron Maguire enough for all of his efforts supporting your Association. Ron put in countless hours and days working with our attorneys to protect your Association against our current lawsuits. A very special thanks also goes to Judi Maguire as the ever suffering spouse. Behind every great man is an even greater woman!

One of the first challenges for your new board is to create the 2009 budget. It is never an easy task to balance the needs of the Association against the available funds. That task is even more difficult this year as the economy continues to slog along in a Bear market. Nonetheless, the Pine Mountain Lake in-

frastructure continues to age and more money is required to maintain each of our wonderful amenities. Over the next few months the Association General Manager and his managers will be creating a straw man budget for presentation to the Board for their consideration. Now is the time to float your ideas on things you would like to see included in the budget. If you have some ideas, please send them to Joe Powell and he will pass them along to us. Now is the time to get involved.

One of the really big topics the 2007/2008 Board struggled with was what level to fund the reserves. Up until just this last year we were a pay-as-you-go reserve program, that is, we conjured up the money each year to cover the needs of the reserves in the budget. The reserve budget is used to replace/repair items that break down or just plain wear out. We now have a reserve program and will attempt to set aside some amount of money to try and cover existing reserve requirements as well as future reserve requirements.

Think of the reserves as a savings account. We all have savings accounts where we keep money for those "what if moments" like when the water pump on the car lets go or new tires are required. If you tried to run your financial life on a pay as you go basis you could, depending on your luck, find yourself behind the financial eight ball. Your association needs to be run with more financial discipline than that, hence the new reserve program.

Under the heading of long range planning, which I am very interested in, the Long Range Planning Committee held a Town Hall meeting after the last Board meeting. At the Town Hall meeting Gary Oing presented the recommendations for future developments here at PML. The recommendations were the output of what you, the homeowners, felt were the most important amenities that needed improvement. The short version is that there is a perceived need to improve/replace the Marina building and build a new cart barn for electric carts at the golf course. The cart barn is necessary as a result of PML not being allowed to purchase any more gas carts and will need a new building for the charging stations for electric carts. The text of the Town Hall meeting and the survey results are available at the Administration Office.

Hopefully I will be able to report good things regarding the Lake Dredging project and the litigation issues facing the Association, but that will have to wait until next month.

General Manager's Message

Association CC&R and Rules Enforcement

Like most homeowner associations, PMLA has many rules, policies and guidelines.

The CC&Rs and rules were adopted to establish standards for property use and personal conduct. Rules enhance member's enjoyment of their property, the common areas and property value.

Over the years I have talked to members and some feel that we do not perform enough in the way of enforcing the rules. Still, other members feel that we have too many rules and we are way too enthusiastic in our enforcement. Most members are willing to comply with the rules and follow through when we contact them. Others are not willing to comply no matter how reasonable and fair a rule is and they inevitably force the Association to take legal action. This is an avenue of last resort and unfortunately it wastes a lot of time and money for all parties concerned. I never understood why self-proclaimed anarchists choose to reside in a homeowners association. It just does not make sense to me but we deal with it and move on.

During the months of June and July I can report the following enforcement actions:

-27 files were completed and closed by resolution and member compliance.

-19 remained open, pending verification of compliance.

-4 others were pending documentation by report and/or photography by staff.

-5 files were in my office for status review and action.

As you can see, my staff and I work on enforcement constantly. Some violation investigations are started by member complaints and some by PML staff as we travel within the subdivision. Some are neighbor vs. neighbor issues that can be handled easily if members would talk to their neighbors. Many members mistakenly think that the Association can, and should, handle every issue. Often it is a civil matter between the neighbors that is out of the jurisdiction of the Association. We still try to help resolve the matter if we can but being nice to your neighbor and talking things over gets you much further than turning them in or going on the attack. I know this from first-hand experience.

As property sells within PML we change over to new members that are unfamiliar with our rules. To help communicate PMLA rules to our new members a large disclosure binder is provided by the seller to the buyer. It contains a copy of the CC&R's, Board resolutions and other rules and information.

We also post our rules on the PML Website and, when there is a proposed change to a rule or resolution that impacts our members, we publish the draft in the PML News and invite members to our monthly Board meetings to provide their input directly to the Board.

To help members understand how the enforcement process works and to communicate some of the issues that we handle daily, I will be publishing information in upcoming issues of the PML News and post the same information to our website. I hope that members will find the information timely and helpful.

PML Purchases Three New Work Trucks for the Maintenance Department

Part of the 2008 Budget included three new work trucks for our Facility and Roads Maintenance Department. Over the years we had put off purchasing these vehicles to save money. They finally reached a point that they required replacement. Association Controller, Ken Spencer, and Maintenance Manager, Tom Moffitt, negotiated a great deal with the dealer that saved us several thousand dollars and the trucks have been delivered and fitted with the appropriate equipment. We held a sealed bid auction to dispose of the old, used vehicles to recover as much money as possible out of them and this was a big success.

Litterbugs within PML

This year we are experiencing more littering than usual. If you witness a litterbug or anyone dumping household trash in PML dumpsters or trash receptacles, please report it immediately to PML staff or the Main Gate (209) 962-8615. Help do your part to keep PML clean and our costs low. Members or guests that do not have garbage service can sign up for garbage pickup by contacting Moore Brothers at (209) 962-7224. Members, guests and renters can also purchase pre-paid Moore Brothers garbage bags at the Main Gate for a nominal fee. These are large bags that are authorized to be placed in the dumpster at the Maintenance yard. It is easy and user-friendly.

PML and County Fire Prevention Guidebooks and Information

The PML Fire Prevention Guidebook was in the July issue of the PML News and posted to the PML Website for easy member access. Members can also pick up a copy at the Administration Office. All members should take the time to review the Guidebook as it contains a lot of great information on how to make their property fire safe. Members can also pick up a copy of the Tuolumne County Wildland Fire Evacuation Plan and the Fire Safe Councils "Living with Fire in Tuolumne County" at the PML Administration Office. These are brochures published and distributed at the County level and contain a lot of great information. Members that have questions should contact our Fire Safety Coordinator, Larry Woodruff ,at 962-8616.

No way! But, here it comes, and the leaves will be changing color, the nights will get cool, and we will be drier than ever.

The Maintenance Department will be on full preparation for the changing

of the seasons. And though we are still busy tackling the ongoing fire season, we are working on roads and drainage problems. The dry conditions have prolonged the fire abatement season, and the falling leaves and pine needles will add to the danger. We have masticated the slash pile and reduced the compost heaps; this will provide a larger area to deposit this debris. Please use the PML Compost Pile, near the campground, to

drop your leaves, pine needles, brush and limbs.

It is a community effort to keep our properties, roads, shoulders, and drainage ditches clear of this debris. Please collect your leaves and pine needles and take them to the Compost Pile. Some may believe that we pickup the piles left at your driveway, we do not. Disposing of the piles properly will keep the debris from washing into our drainage ditches and culverts if and when the rainy season finally returns.

The PML Maintenance Staff will be working these drainage ditches throughout the entire rainy season. But a clogged culvert can create an entire snarl of problems, including flooding, erosion of roads, shoulders and embankments. Many property owners have DPA (Drainage Protection Areas) drainage ditches on their properties. This is a valuable infrastructure here at PML. And, as we all know, when the rains come down from above, it will keep going down to...well, somewhere? Probably, we might think, to Southern California. We just want to make sure it gets there without creating any problems along its way, here on its visit to PML.

It may seem strange to be talking about rain and the problems it can bring but now is the time to prepare. And, of course, without the anticipated rains, the fire season becomes prolonged and severe. So please, keep in mind that the brush pile burn season is far off and may not come at all. Fire danger and drainage is the reason for this season.

PMLA Money Matters

elcome back to another edition of PMLA Money Matters, where we discuss a topic of interest relating to the Association's finances. This is a chance for you to get a bit more knowledge on where your assessment dollar goes each month and how it works to improve the quality of life here in beautiful Pine Mountain Lake.

This month I'd like to discuss something that every property owner, resident and visitor to PML uses and probably never gives it a second thought... the roads. Unlike the roads outside of Pine Mountain Lake, the roads inside our community are not maintained by a government agency. Neither the county nor state government takes any responsibility for the condition of the roads that we all drive on every time we are in the area. Maintaining, repairing, striping and plowing the more than 42 miles of roads inside the gates of PML is completely the Association's responsibility.

Did you know that on average we spend over \$500,000 each year to keep the roads in top driving condition? That works out to over \$139 per property owner annually. On a monthly basis this is less than \$12 per month. That seems to be to be a good value for your dollar.

The funding for these road projects comes out of our Reserve funds. These moneys are set aside each year during the budget and assessment process. We then invest the money into safe Certificates of Deposit in order to maximize our interest income and make more funds available for this critical project. In order to take advantage of economies of scale we now perform the road work every other year. This allows us to spend more of the money on actual work and less on the cost of hauling all the of the required equipment up here every year. Another example of how we work hard to get the greatest value for your assessment dollar.

So, the next time you drive along one of those 42 miles of roads inside Pine Mountain Lake, you can rest assured that they are being cared for and maintained so that your ride is smooth and safe. A pretty good feeling for only \$12 a month.

Well, that's it for this month. Hope you check back in October when we discuss how we keep your money safe and available to do all the important things that go into making PML the great place to live that we all enjoy.

Not Just any Country Club

'n last month's article I mentioned that we were going to change the tee blocks. We went to the 4 X 4's about three or four years ago and thought they would serve the purpose. We found out a lot of players did not like those so we communicated with the golf shop and came up with another idea and that is what we now have. workday. Divots were filled and weeds were pulled. Thank you for your efforts.

One of our projects for August and September will be improving the dry spots or hardpan areas. When you play and have a nice lie on healthy turf or the opposite of a bad lie in a hardpan area and three feet away is healthy turf, it makes you ask why? These areas that are dry are getting the same amount of nightly irrigation that the other healthier areas are receiving. What we need to alter is the soil. We are going to be as aggressive as time permits and aerate, slice, top-dress and fertilize to create better growing conditions.

RULES OF GOLF:

Q #1. What is the proper process for moving your ball-marker on the putting green when it interferes with another player's line of putt?

Q #2. In addressing the ball, a player accidentally causes the ball to oscillate, but it returns to its original position. Has the ball moved? A #1. There is no prescribed procedure for moving a ball-marker one or more putter heads to prevent interference with another players line of putt. The only requirement is that you replicate the exact procedure that you used to move the ball/ball marker when replacing it.

A #2. By the rules of golf, the ball it is not considered to have moved and no penalty is accessed.

JOE SMITH'S LAWS OF GOLF

The Moore Bros. Free Clean-Up Day Coupons are here!!

Usually by now Moore Bros. has already hosted the 1st of 2 annual County-Wide Cleanup Days usually held in the Spring and Fall months. The program has now been changed to be more user friendly. The new Moore Bros. Clean-Up Day Coupons will be available at Moore Bros. office beginning August 1st, 2008.

Please refer to the frequently asked questions below to learn more about the new program. If you have any questions, don't hesitate to call Moore Bros. business office at 962-7165 Mon. thru Fri. 9:00 AM to 4:00 PM.

1. What is the Moore Bros. Clean Up Day Program?

The Clean-Up Day Coupon Program is a County program implemented by Moore Bros. to reduce the illegal disposal of hard to handle wastes. The program is designed to provide Big Oak Flat/Groveland area residents an opportunity to properly dispose of, at no charge, large appliances, old furniture, and junk items that essentially won't fit in a standard trash can. All eligible area resident households can receive two coupons per year that are good for the free disposal of one yard (approx. 200 lbs.) per coupon of large, hard to handle waste.

2. What is hard to handle waste?

Hard to handle waste is classified as non-hazardous solid waste that will not fit into a standard 32 gallon trash can. Hard to handle waste includes such things as refrigerators, dishwashers, clothes washers & dryers, water heaters, couches, mattresses, old patio furniture, car parts, etc. Each coupon is good for one yard (approx 200 lbs.) of junk, or one appliance, or one piece of furniture. There will be an additional charge for appliances containing Freon. Household refuse or garbage, household hazardous waste, televisions, computer monitors, or other materials designated as Universal Waste, are NOT accepted in this program.

3. Who is eligible for the program?

Residents that are customers in good standing with Moore Bros. Scavenger are eligible to participate in the program. Also, a person who lives in the Big Oak Flat/Groveland area and self-haul their waste to the Groveland Transfer Station are eligible to participate in the program after presenting four current receipts (weight tags). The rule is two coupons per household, per year.

4. Where can you get the coupons?

Moore Bros. Scavenger customers will need to come into the office (11111 Scofield, Big Oak Flat) Monday thru Friday to pick up their coupon. Groveland Transfer Station customers can also come into the office with their four Transfer Station receipts to pick up their coupon. You will not be able to pick up your coupons at the transfer station.

Spontaneous Combustion

s we get into late summer and early fall homeowners are motivated to get ready for winter by doing yard work and building maintenance. Typically, we see homeowners repairing roofs, rain gutters, painting, and resealing decks. The purpose of this article is to remind you of important safety issues when using stains and oils.

Many common products are used to re-seal decks or natural wood exterior finishes. One of the most important things to remember when using these products is to review the application, first aid, and clean up instructions on the product of choice.

A common mistake is when a homeowner fails to follow the product instructions on clean up. Most people do not think about certain products having the possibility of spontaneously combusting. This can happen when a substance, with a relatively low ignition temperature, begins to release heat, which can occur by oxidation or fermentation.

If the heat cannot escape, and the temperature of the material rises above its ignition point, then combustion begins if sufficient oxygen is present. The product will begin to smolder and catch fire. Once the product supports combustion the product and material around will catch on fire.

When re-sealing decks, keep in mind the time of day the manufacturer recommends for application. Also beware of applying the product to other areas not intended for the product such as pine needles and beds of duff underneath the deck. The product drippings can build heat in the duff piles supporting ignition of a fire. Another area of caution is when cleaning up the tools that have been used such brushes, rollers, rags, etc. Most manufacturers recommend soaking all tools used to apply the product in water before disposing of them in a garbage can.

Another source of spontaneous combustion is hay found in stables and dairies. This hay may have been piled when it was damp, therefore letting the hay mildew. The bacteria in the mildew can become very hot during the warmer days of summer supporting combustion in the pile. Or the hay may have been piled so tightly that under the right conditions spontaneous combustion may occur causing the whole pile to ignite. Hay stack fires take large amounts of water and farm equipment to put them out.

Another possible source we see in the foothills is lawn clippings catching fire. When you mow your lawn and catch the clippings in a bag, remember to spread out the clippings when you are disposing of them. Piling clippings one on top of one another over several weeks of accumulation stores heat in the piles. As these clippings dry they build gas and heat and, in the right condition, can begin a fire.

So please, think about fire safety as you do your house and yard maintenance this summer and fall.

Behind the Scenes of Emergency Responses BY FIRE CHIEF SHANE WARNER

ver the past several months I have had inquires about emergency response procedures around the Groveland/Big Oak Flat area. Concerns were voiced about the number of personnel sent to an emergency incident. Specifically, why is a fire engine (or even two fire engines) and an ambulance sent in response to a 911 call.

Back in the early eighties, foothill fire department personnel did not respond to medical calls because they were not trained to handle medical related emergencies. The problem then as it is today is that there were not enough ambulances strategically placed to be able to respond in some of the rural areas. As the population grew it triggered a rise in emergency incidents. Every foothill fire department member was brought up to a basic level of training and became, at the very least, CPR certified with basic first aid training. This lead to the First Responder Program which puts rural fire department personnel, who are closer to the emergency calls, on the scene with a faster response time.

The Groveland Fire Department fulltime staff is currently trained to a minimum level of EMT (Emergency Medical Technician). Volunteers and reserve firefighters are currently trained to the minimum level of First Responder. We are also very fortunate to have a fulltime firefighter who is also trained as a Paramedic.

So, when you see a fire engine and an ambulance at an emergency scene, you can feel very fortunate to have the system we have in place, especially living in Groveland, forty-five minutes away

from a hospital. The First Responder system has proven to be an effective tool in pre-hospital care, especially when the ambulance is off of the hill transporting a patient and we receive back-to-back emergency calls. The Fire Department is able to stabilize the patient prior to the arrival of the ambulance. On several occasions Fire Department personnel have been able to keep a patient alive while waiting for an ambulance to transport them to the hospital.

Recently, during the Telegraph Fire, the Groveland Fire Department was able to staff an engine for a county wide strike team. This strike team was originally formed to head out to the Telegraph Fire but was then told to hold in Tuolumne County when the Serpentine Fire broke out just outside of Coulterville on Highway 49. Since the county was stripped of resources fighting these two fires, the strike team was told to hold in Tuolumne County to be available for emergency incidents within Tuolumne County.

This is the first time in several years that the Groveland Fire Department had the staffing to offer assistance outside of our response area. So, if you see fire engines and personnel around town, they all have a purpose and are all needed based on current emergency incidents and the condition of county resources. Our first responsibility is always to Big Oak Flat and Groveland but if we are able to staff a second engine, we can offer mutual aid to the Tuolumne County Fire Department, The California Department of Forestry and the U.S. Forest Service.

Help Needed For Groveland Family Medical Clinic

s you probably know, the community of Groveland will be able to keep our outstanding doctor, Steven Shield. A few weeks ago, it was doubtful. But after this community banded together with email and letters to the president and the chief financial officer of Sonora Regional Medical Center...and with petitions bearing over 600 signatures...the hospital reentered negotia-

tions, giving Dr. Shield an acceptable contract.

But, one of the conditions of his agreeing to stay is that he have the ability to create and keep all medical records electronically. The equipment to do this costs nearly \$20,000. The hospital has agreed to finance a part of the cost, but it is up to our community to raise the remaining \$15,000 to purchase the equipment and to cover the costs of installation. The equipment will bring data handling "up to the 21st century" and result in major time savings for the doctor and his staff.

The equipment includes laptops on which the patient's entire history will be visible. As the patient is examined, all of the pertinent facts will be stored in the computer. Any prescription will be sent electronically to the patient's pharmacy. This equipment will eliminate the need for all subsequent work on charts and their transcription for the records. Instead it will all be done at the time of the examination AND it will permit him to see more patients and better serve the community. It is Dr. Shield's desire to accept more patients and serve the community even better, and the new electronic data handling will enable him to do so.

ongratulations are in order for the lease agreement that was reached on July 14, 2008, with the Groveland Community Services District and Southside Senior Services, Inc. to build "The Gathering Place", the long awaited center for mature, active adults. The lease outlines what the District can do in establishing and allowing SSSI to build The Gathering Place should SSSI so desire. However, the rumors indicate that we (SSSI) are going to build all of the things mentioned in the lease, i.e. a 17,000 square ft. building, a swimming pool, a fitness center, etc. The lease allows for all of these things to be built if SSSI so desires. This may or may not happen because SSSI has not yet made a final decision on the size of the building or buildings. We are still in the planning process and our mission has not changed.

With regard to the headline article in the Union Democrat on August 4, 2008, (Groveland senior center cash may disappear), please be advised that two years ago the county Board of Supervisors placed a marker of \$11,000 in the county budget in order to facilitate the allocation of \$300,000 which were reuse funds of the Community Development Block Grant program for the development of The Gathering Place. These particular funds must be spent on low income projects. In addition, these funds must be spent and the project completed before 2010 or be returned to the state. Since The Gathering Place cannot be completed within the time allowed, the funds had to be used for something else or the county would lose them. Therefore, the \$300,000 was allocated to other programs. It is unfortunate that The Gathering Place could not qualify for these funds at this time, however there will be other opportunities in the near future.

The article published in the Union Democrat was very misleading. It implied that The Gathering Place was going to "disappear". We attended the County Supervisors Board meeting on August 5th and informed them that we are in fact alive and well. It was a good opportunity to be before the Board and invite them to our grand opening of The Little House (which is another project of Southside Senior Services) in the fall. Unfortunately, the Union Democrat article did impact us as evidenced by some of our acquaintances in Sonora and Groveland who asked if The Gathering Place was not going to be built. This demonstrates that misinformation causes unfounded rumors even for projects that the community strongly supports.

Rest assured that Southside Senior Services Inc. will continue in its endeavor to create a lifelong learning environment for active adults that encourages social interaction, activities, education, and provide health services, nutrition and legal support, in a friendly atmosphere where no one is a stranger.

ver worry about the future of this country and the "younger generation?" Well, stop worrying - there are some really great kids out there. Some of them are working as counselors at Camp Tuolumne Trails this summer.

Each camp group brings their own counselors and medical staff since the needs of each group are so different. Camp La Honda recently spent two weeks on site with two different groups of campers with developmental disabili-

This is a tough job - on duty almost 24 x 7, heavy physical work, and sleeping with kids who have breathing problems or seizures, so there's little rest even at night. They don't do it for the money – these counselors earned just a tiny stipend.

Ryan Dixon, from Stockton, is a senior at Cal Poly where he is studying to be a behavioral therapist, specializing in autism. Ryan has been a counselor with developmentally disabled campers







ever since 8th grade. He looks forward to camp every year, even taking vacation from his regular summer job. The campers all love Ryan; some of them even phone him throughout the year. He loves the campers' high spirit and their positive outlook. They are always happy and it makes him happy to be with them.

Emily Armstrong, from Stockton, is a sophomore nursing student at Boston College. Her older sister and younger brother are counselors also. One of her cousins has Down's Syndrome. During the school year Emily volunteers with disabled children in Boston. She loves being a counselor and feels she learns so much from the campers, including appreciating the small things in life, like being able to feed yourself and taking a shower alone. She thinks the best thing about camp is letting the campers be silly and enjoy themselves.

Nathan Harrison, also from Stockton, is a second year architecture student at Drury University in Missouri. This is his second year as a camp counselor. He says it's not only very rewarding, it's fun to work with these campers. One of his young campers was afraid of the dark and being "in the forest." Nate dis-

covered that playing music calmed him. He credits excellent training from the Camp La Honda managers in teaching him how to develop patience and the skills to work with children and adults with developmental disabilities.

Both counselors and campers love the facilities at Tuolumne Trails. "I want to live here, it's so beautiful," one of them told me. "The beautiful location and the purpose-built facilities are the perfect fit for our special needs," said the camp manager.

Thanks once again to the Pine Needlers and all the quilters of Groveland for the wonderful handmade pillowcases. We have been giving them out to each visiting child, and they are a big hit with the kids and a tangible reminder of their special camp experience.

Jerry and Paula Baker recently received a wonderful letter from one of our first campers. Noah came with his family for the Cerebral Palsy Family Camp in June. Noah is 12, he can't walk or speak, but he has a "talker" computer which allows him to communicate. Noah wrote, in part, "Thank you for making Tuolumne Trails camp. It's a very 'thumbs up' place. I liked the ice cream, the new camp friends, and going to the campfire and making marshmallows. I really like being in my power chair at camp. I was surprised I could drive into the bathrooms...your camp is so cool!"

Having this kind of positive impact on children with special medical needs makes it all worthwhile for the Bakers and all volunteers who have contributed to making the camp a reality.

2008 '49er Parade Grand Marshals, The Blankenburgs, in Smithsonian

he Grand Marshals this year are Pine Mountain Lake residents Kent and Sandy Blankenburg. They were chosen by the '49er Festival Committee for the generosity and involvement they have given the community each year. Their first year as residents they knew they wanted to have a Christmas Party with a purpose. They checked around town and found out about the Community Christmas Basket program. AHA!! This was just what they were looking for. They invited a few guests and had the first 'It's a Wrap Party' where the attendees brought gifts for local children. These were given to the Christmas Basket program for distribution with the food baskets. That was 13 years ago and they've had the party each year since, although it's grown from about 64 guests to nearly 240. Throughout the year they open and share their 'museum' to local clubs and organizations for various social events, meetings with guest speakers, school field trips, weddings, memorial services, and much more. They agree that it might be a lot of work, but to both of them, the rewards far exceed the energy that goes into it.

Did I say museum? In Pine Mountain Lake?? More on this later.

What brought them to Groveland, specifically Pine Mountain Lake, was their love of flying. Kent literally grew up in the newspaper business because his parents owned papers in several towns in Oregon and California. Following in his parents footsteps, his career was spent as the owner/publisher of the local paper of 5 small towns in southern San Luis Obispo County. Sandy was the Advertising Director of the same paper, as well as being constantly involved in her kid's school and extra-curricular activities. Kent has always loved to fly and has been a pilot for over 30 years. While living in Central California, they would fly to Columbia (yes, our Columbia, CA) for the Luscombe Fly-in each year. They wanted to live 'on the airport' where you can park your plane as close to home as you park your car. In fact, they wanted to live in their hangar. According to Kent,

there are very few communities that allow this. When they discovered PML airport, they researched it and found out this was an option, though not previously done. They originally had a lot near the lake and then bought the land at the airport on which they currently reside. When they left the newspaper business and retired 13 years ago, they built a home on their airport lot, which has since been turned into a guest cottage. This allowed them to be near and monitor the construction of their hangar-home. Consequently, they had the first hangar-home in Pine Mountain Lake. They love living in their beautiful loft home with a spiral staircase that leads right down to their hangar. In 1999, realizing their collections of planes and cars were growing, as were their number of friends and functions they host, they purchased the lot next door and built the 'big' hangar. This hangar is complete with an industrial kitchen which enables them to host approximately 240 friends and neighbors at their many yearly events, one of which is the Luscombe Luau, held each May, that piggy-backs on the Columbia Fly-in they've attended since their pre-PML days. Talk about coming full circle.

Although they've traveled to air shows around the country for years, and met many dignitaries from the aviation community, they were especially honored to have been invited to attend the 2005 Reno Air Show where they accepted the Smithsonian Rolls-Royce Aviation Heritage Award for their 1948 Luscombe Sedan. Their almost life-size award is engraved with their names and housed in the Smithsonian Institute. As if the award wasn't enough, it was presented to them by the 1st man on the moon, Neil Armstrong and the last man on the moon, Gene Cernan. The smaller award commemorating this event is displayed proudly in their home, along with their many other aviation awards. This was a very proud and moving honor for them.

When they moved to Groveland, they said good-bye to their Central California ocean home and traded it for the mountains that they love so much. They still go back frequently because that's where they each have 2 grown children and between them, 4 grandchildren. They're just an hour away, by air, of course.

By Kent's admission, Sandy is the high-energy force behind the coordination of social events and shopping for their many aviation mementos and art deco items. Although some of the items they've picked up along the way may not have been in the best of condition, Sandy, with steel wool and polish in hand, has them all gleaming like new in the museum as well as in their home.

One of their newest purchases, and a source of great pride, is their chariot red 1951 Oldsmobile Super 88 Rocket Convertible (hmmn, still has an aviation theme) that reflects in the sun like a new mirror. This was their anniversary gift to each other and bought specifically for the 2008 '49er Parade. They will be dressed in vintage 1950's attire and chauffeured by grandson Cameron Munger. In addition to air shows, they also enjoy attending car shows and plan to take this new member of their car family to the Concourse D'Elegance at Ironstone.

Now, back to the 'Museum'. The Blankenburgs are flattered, and consider it an extreme compliment, to have their hangars called a 'Museum', when, in fact, it's a tastefully displayed collection of their various vintage

airplanes and cars, art deco items and all things from the 1930-50's. In either of their two hangars, as well as their lovely home, you can see vintage memorabilia that range from the meticulously polished and expertly maintained cars and aircraft to a collection of flight attendant (in those days called stewardesses) uniforms on mannequins. There are 'scenes' and vignettes depicting various activities of those times. There are even children's toys, large and small, from that era. It's truly a step back in time and a feast for the eyes, as well as a fantastic collection of vintage Americana. Even the bathrooms in the hangars have vintage soap dispensers and vending machines for spray perfume (remember those?). Not a detail was left out. The subject and era they gravitate to are art deco (30's and 40's) and aviation, and they're certainly experts at marrying the two themes. They derive great pleasure in finding these treasures on their travels, mainly in the U.S. and Canada, loading them in the plane and bringing them home to join their other unique finds. Believe it or not, except for the 4 planes they brought with them when they moved to PML, this extensive collection was started after they came here 13 years ago. Sesame Noodles

RECIPE BY TOM KNOTH AND PAULA MARTELL

1/2 lb Chinese egg noodles or linguine fini3 Tbsp dark sesame oil

5 TDSp Gark Sesame C

Sauce:

2 Tbsp peanut oil

2 green onions, thinly sliced on the diagonal

- 1-inch piece fresh ginger, minced
- 3 garlic cloves, minced
- 1 teaspoon red chili paste or Sriracha chili sauce
- 2 Tbsp brown sugar
- 1/2 cup creamy peanut butter
- 3 Tbsp rice vinegar
- 3 Tbsp soy sauce
- 6 Tbsp hot water
- 1 Tbsp toasted sesame seeds

Garnish Options:

1/2 cucumber, thinly sliced3/4 Cup roasted peanuts, chopped1/4 Cup fresh cilantro leaves

Cook the noodles in large pot of boiling unsalted water over medium heat until barely tender and still firm (follow package directions). Drain immediately and rinse with cold water until cool. Drain the noodles really well and transfer to a wide bowl; toss with the sesame oil so they don't stick together.

In a small saucepan, heat the peanut oil over medium-low flame. Add the green onions, ginger, garlic, and chili paste. Cook and stir for a minute until soft and fragrant. Mix in the brown sugar, peanut butter, vinegar, soy sauce, and hot water. Stir until the sugar is dissolved and the peanut butter has smoothed out. Toss the noodles with the peanut sauce until well coated. Serve at room temperature or chilled. Sprinkle with the sesame seeds and garnish with cucumber slices, peanuts, and/or cilantro.

Note: The secret to this Chinese favorite is to not let the noodles sit in the sauce very long; prepare and add the sauce just before serving.

The Planet Jupiter

eptember is a great month to write about the planet Jupiter because it shines prominently in our night time sky. Jupiter is easily visible to the unaided eye. The Sun, Moon, and naked eye visible planets all travel approximately the same ecliptic path in the sky from our point of view on Earth. Because our solar system is almost flat - it forms a plane. This plane is called the ecliptic of our solar system. Look for Jupiter, as well as other bright planets like Saturn and Mars, to travel the ecliptic of our solar system throughout the year. Just remember the path that the Sun and Moon travels in the sky as a guide to look for planets, like Jupiter. During the month of September, Jupiter appears high in the night sky crossing the meridian at about 9:00 PM at the beginning of the month and will be lower in the western part of the sky at 9:00 PM by the end of the month. The meridian is the imaginary line that connects the North Pole, passing overhead, to the South Pole. There are several Web sites that show the current position of Jupiter (and the other planets) in the sky.

Jupiter is the fifth planet from the Sun and is the largest one in the solar system. It is the fourth brightest object in the sky (after the Sun, the Moon and Venus). It has been known since prehistoric times as a bright "wandering star". If Jupiter were hollow, more than one thousand Earths could fit inside. It also contains more matter than all of the other planets combined. Colorful latitudinal bands, which are atmospheric clouds and storms, illustrate Jupiter's dynamic weather systems. The wind speed in the upper atmosphere of Jupiter is believed to exceed 400 MPH.

Jupiter is a "gas" planet. Like our Sun, it is composed mainly of hydrogen and helium. Other "gas" planets include Saturn, Uranus, and Neptune. Saturn has a similar composition, to Jupiter but Uranus and Neptune have much less hydrogen and helium. The gas planets do not have solid surfaces; their gaseous material simply gets denser with depth. What we see when looking at these planets is the tops of clouds high in their atmospheres. The cloud patterns on Jupiter can change within hours or days. The vivid colors seen in Jupiter's clouds are probably the result of subtle chemical reactions in Jupiter's atmosphere. The colors correlate with the cloud's altitude - blue lowest, followed by browns and whites, with reds highest. Sometimes we see the lower layers through holes in the upper ones.

Jupiter is just about as large in diameter as a gas planet can be. If more material were to be added, it would be compressed by gravity such that the overall radius would increase only slightly. A star can be larger only because of its internal (nuclear) heat source which pushes out from the center of the star in a tug-of-war against gravity. Jupiter would have to be at least 80 times more massive than its current mass to become a star.

Jupiter has rings like Saturn's, but they are much fainter and smaller. They were totally unexpected and were only discovered in 1979 when two of the Voyager 1 scientists insisted that it was at least worth a quick look to see if any rings might be present. Everyone else thought that the chance of finding anything was nil but there they were. Unlike Saturn's, Jupiter's rings are dark. They're probably composed of very small grains of rocky material. Also, unlike Saturn's rings, they seem to contain no ice. Ice reflects sunlight and makes Saturn's rings much easier

to see. Jupiter is so easy to observe because it's so bright – it's probably one of the most photographed planets in our solar system, second only to Saturn with its magnificent rings. This image was taken a few years ago from our home in Pine Mountain Lake.

As described in previous articles, most images that I take are long exposures. Imaging bright planets like Jupiter or Saturn is an exception. Because these planets are so bright, long exposure times are not needed. What are needed are clear skies with minimal atmospheric turbulence (for a clear, crisp image) and high magnification. This can be accomplished with the use of a webcam that has been modified to replace the eyepiece of a telescope. The advantage of shooting video with a webcam, instead of still images with a camera, is that you can capture many (often



10 to 30) frames per second. Because our atmosphere is constantly changing, that is the air that you look through when you view with a telescope, brief periods of exceptionally calm conditions can be captured with this webcam video technique. Then, using computer software, the best (most sharp) frames from the video can be stacked to form still images that rival the best images taken from professional telescopes and camera equipment only a decade ago.

The image shown here is an "aligned and stacked" image from the best 256 of 607 frames of video. Very little other post-processing was done to this image other than some sharpening. Many of Jupiter's atmospheric bands are clearly visible. I always enjoy looking at Jupiter through my telescope and sharing this giant "gas" planet with others because the atmospheric bands are so easy to see and they change from night to night. Another great feature of observing Jupi-



ter is that most nights at least a couple of its moons are easy to spot orbiting the planet. One of Jupiter's moons (the moon "Io") can be seen in this image – it looks like a small light colored "speck" at about the 9 o'clock position relative to Jupiter.

Mount Dana, Yosemite National Park, Sunday, Sept. 14, Day Hike (2C)

The hike to the top of Dana is a strenuous 6 mile round trip with a climb to 13000 feet elevation starting at the Tioga Pass (9900 ft.) entrance to Yosemite N.P. Weather at this time of year can be cold and windy so hikers are warned to be prepared for brisk winds and wind chill temperatures in the teens. Carry snacks and sufficient water

to prevent dehydration; altitude sickness is a possibility so taking a couple of aspirins a few hours ahead can prevent nausea and headache on the climb. A hiking staff(s) is also recommended as the trail is covered with loose rock and volcanic debris. Lunch shall be at the summit.
